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School board approves 2020-21 budget, levy

Shawano also suspends athletic fees for school year

The Shawano School Board unanimously approved a 2020-21 budget of over \$31 million and a tax levy just shy of \$14 million Monday.

The tax rate for the Shawano School District will remain at \$9.58 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation, which means a property owner whose property is valued at \$100,000 will pay \$958 in the school portion of property taxes. Business manager Nick Curran said that property values in the district went up 4.8%.

Curran noted that the budget was balanced, something that was consistent throughout most of the budget process. He noted the budget for the year made a heavy investment in technology, which has become vital as the district has spent much of the current school year in a virtual environment.

"We're also sticking to our goals of investing in our capital improvement fund, our debt service payments because we're looking at doing some defeasance there," Curran said. "We're aligned with our current goal of keeping the mill (tax) rate at \$9.58."

Superintendent Randi Anderson

reported that the district was down 79 students from the previous year, which could result in less state aid next year, but the district has been in a downward trend with its student count for several years in a row. Anderson noted that the state itself has been seeing a downward trend in students.

Most of the budget items on the agenda were approved without much fanfare, save for one. The board voted 8-1 to suspend its athletic fees for the school year due to the uncertainty of the sports seasons during the coronavirus pandemic.

Curran said the issue of student fees went to district's executive and finance committees, and they both recommended that the athletic fees should not be charged this year. Many school districts in northeast Wisconsin shifted their fall sports seasons to spring, although Shawano did not, but Curran pointed out that the winter and spring sports seasons are far from set in stone due to the pandemic.

"That means we will not collect any athletic fees for the school year," Curran said. "The budget you've adopted takes this into consideration."

Curran noted that the district is still offering academic services, regardless of pandemic status, but athletic programs are not as certain. He said that the soccer team lost two weeks of its season due to delays in the season and other teams bowing out.

"We felt it was appropriate to continue to charge them (the other

fees)," Curran said.

Board member Mart Grams, the only board member voting against suspending the athletic fees, said he felt more than the athletic fees should be suspended, considering the financial straits many people are in. Grams said the district's policy and curriculum committee had discussed suspending computer fees, as well, since only about 30% of families are paying the computer fees.

"That's much more of a penalty to parents (for nonpayment), regardless of whether they're getting education or not," Grams said. "That's a much larger fee. A family with three or four kids, they're paying a much larger fee than not playing soccer. If we're looking for this to be a poverty issue, not just because they couldn't kick the ball around."

Board member Diane Hoffman, who chairs the district's finance committee, disagreed and pointed out the computers students use constitute a considerable expense to the district.

"The fees are being suspended because we have uncertainties regarding athletics, but as far as the computer fee you're talking about, everyone is still accessing and using (computers), even though there may be difficulties with some of it," Hoffman said. "That fee is technically the insurance (of the computers). They're paying to have the insurance on it."

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Mayoral election tentatively slated for April

Shawano Common Council President Rhonda Strebel will serve as acting mayor starting Dec. 1 until an expected election to fill the vacancy can be held in April.

It was the consensus of the council at a meeting Wednesday that a mayoral election be held in April, but the council can't order the election until after the seat is actually vacant on Dec. 1. Mayor Ed Whealon is resigning his seat effective Nov. 30 to

move to a recently purchased home in the Town of Wescott.

As council president, Strebel would normally assume the duties of a sitting mayor when the mayor is not available.

Her appointment as acting mayor will not affect her District 2 council seat, which she will continue to hold.

Prior to appointing Strebel, the council rejected an effort put forward by Seth Mailahn to appoint Lisa Hoffman, whose council seat would have had to be filled had she been appointed.

If, as expected, a mayoral election is ordered for April, those interested in running would have until Jan. 12 to circulate and return nomination papers.

If needed, a primary would be held on Feb. 16.

Three council seats will be on the April 6 ballot: the District 1 seat to which Jeanne Cronce was recently appointed; the District 3 seat held by Mailahn; and the District 5 seat held by Sandy Steinke.

Middle school students interviewing veterans

Project gives students insight on what it means to serve in the military

Shawano Community Middle School students will be taking a different route to honor veterans this year.

The coronavirus pandemic has closed the Shawano school to most public traffic, so the annual Veterans Day assembly it normally holds had to be canceled. In its place, SCMS students will be interviewing local veterans and posting videos of the interviews online.

"The goal is to meet with veterans and hear their stories," said Rod Watson, SCMS associate principal. "We've identified 10 local veterans who would be interested in telling their stories, and we have 10 corresponding students who will interview them."

Watson said the plan is to bring the veterans to the school to sit at the computers and talk with the students, who are operating from home while Shawano's public schools are in an all-virtual learning mode through November. The interviews will be set up in an online presentation where visitors can choose which interviews they want to watch, he said.

"They're going to be about 10-15 minutes in length, because that's about the middle school attention span," Watson said. "The veterans come from all the branches and eras in our community."

Having the students learn for themselves about what veterans sacrifice for the country's prosperity and freedom is an important lesson, in Watson's view, and something that goes beyond what they learn in textbooks.

"I think it's crucial," Watson said. "We all serve in some ways, and we don't get to continue the society and the life that we're used to unless some people are willing to step up and play their role. On Veterans Day, we recognize that as the men and women in uniform, but of course, we have teachers and nurses and cops that are serving the community every day, and I think that when students are able to meet with veterans, they can picture

themselves and figure out how they're going to give back to their community."

Doing the interviews will also demystify the perceptions of veterans to those young students, Watson said, who at this point have a view of veterans painted by video games and movies.

"The dramatic parts are there, but not the more mundane, realistic parts," Watson said. "Talking to a veteran, they can start to understand the experience a little better what it means to be a soldier and what they give up for their country."

Watson noted that nine of the 10 students he talked with to do the veteran interviews had not even heard of Vietnam.

"Why would they have? They're 12 years old," Watson said. "I'm trying to caution them about the uncomfortable topics surrounding the Vietnam conflict and how you broach that as an interviewer."

The veterans to be interviewed range from one in his 20s to those who served in Vietnam. Watson noted that he hopes to find someone who served during the Korean War, as well, to show how military service has spanned the decades.

Some of the questions to be asked include what specific jobs they did in the military, what prompted them to serve, what role models they looked up to in the military and what helped them get through the tough times.

Even though the veterans project is in lieu of the middle school's annual celebration, Watson is considering having both programs thrive in future years. He noted the school had been considering a reboot of its assembly program, which he said was getting too "passive," even before the pandemic upended all the schools' plans. One possibility is to show the video interviews during the assembly, where there would be a known audience to watch and learn.

"We have many veterans in the community that could be interviewed that were not part of this," Watson said. "There's certainly room to do this again and differently."

Watson said the video interviews can be seen at a later date at the Herbert E. McLaughlin VFW Post 2723's Facebook page.

The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions (Clintonville School District, Town of Grant), the voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, (Clintonville School District, Town of Grant), the voter shall connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall select the candidate for which he or she intends to vote by touching the screen at the candidate's name or by using the keypad. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question or the voter shall touch the screen next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If a voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so that the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall then deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

New homeless shelter opening on time

Facility expected to help more people

SAM's House has moved to its new location and will be ready to open Nov. 1 with some expanded and additional amenities.

The homeless shelter, managed by Shawano Area Matthew 25, recently moved to 105 E. Richmond St. in Shawano after spending several years at 213 E. Green Bay St. The old facility is currently still in use for some administrative needs, according to SAM25 executive director Jen Laude Bisterfeldt, but all the essentials to operate the new facility are in place on Richmond Street.

The old shelter's capacity was usually 15 occupants, although many nights it was over that capacity, according to Bisterfeldt. The new shelter can hold about 25 people comfortably, and the facilities are wheelchair-accessible.

"It depends on the family makeup, because it's usually one household per room," Bisterfeldt said, noting that larger families might take up two rooms. "The old shelter had five bedrooms, and they were all smaller, so they didn't fit as many people. Here, we can fit about 25 with current staffing."

With the coronavirus pandemic still in full swing, the shelter will not be able to pair up single homeless people like they could before, Bisterfeldt added.

The front entrance is for people seeking to participate in resource days, where shelter staff help people find jobs or connect with other essential needs, Bisterfeldt said. There is a rear entrance for those utilizing the shelter overnight to allow them some privacy, she said.

"We did that with our old building, and that worked really well," Bisterfeldt said.

An expanded kitchen and dining area are part of the new shelter, as is a new children's room where children can play. There is also a room for classes, according to Bisterfeldt.

"We're getting in," she said. "We've had to move all the food over and the plates and the cups. There's so much stuff."

There are a few minor things being taken care of, like installing cabinet doors, touching up paint jobs and checking the plumbing, but everything is coming together, in spite of a pandemic that caused delays and headaches.

"A lot of materials were delayed, or you just couldn't get them, so we had to switch to different things," Bisterfeldt said. "The doors, for example, we had to change the type of doors we use, which cost more because we couldn't get the other doors in time. There was too far of a lag. Everything is on delay right now for everyone, so we're just lucky and grateful we were able to get it done."

There are a pair of rooms that can be utilized as a quarantine area, if necessary, not just for the coronavirus but for the regular flu season, as well. Bisterfeldt noted that having a separate area for people who are sick was not an easy task in the old shelter.

"Even outside the pandemic, it's always nice to have a place in case somebody is ill or needs some privacy," Bisterfeldt said. "In any shelter environ-

ment, you're going to have a cold go around or a flu bug. There's also a family bathroom in case people need more privacy."

Still in the works is a clinic facility to assist those who are sick. Bisterfeldt said the clinic was only recently approved by the state, which is why that has not been completed.

"It'll be a free clinic for anybody that doesn't have insurance and can't afford to pay for their services," Bisterfeldt said. "It'll be basic care, kind of like the urgent care. There won't be surgeries or anything like that being done, but they can get to a doctor or a nurse if they need it."

While SAM25 exceeded its goal of \$410,000 on the capital campaign it waged last year to renovate the new facility, costs during the pandemic went up, according to Bisterfeldt, but the shelter has made it as far as it has due to donated services and more.

"We used all local people. They've always been very good to us and done a lot to support us," Bisterfeldt said.

SAM25 has been fortunate to get grants to help with expenses, as well. Bisterfeldt estimated about \$200,000 in grants helped to complete the renovations.

An expanded facility means expanded services, including the resource days. Started in 2017, they used to be once a week but have turned into an everyday affair, as the number of calls has tripled in the last year, Bisterfeldt said.

"People don't just come on Tuesdays; they come every day," Bisterfeldt said. "We want to increase staffing for that and increase those programs."

SAM25 will also be able to expand life skills, budgeting and parenting classes for those staying at the

shelter, according to Bisterfeldt.

"We want to expand that to the community, not just for the guests at the shelter, but for anybody who might need help," she said. "We want to try and help people before they become homeless."

With the pandemic, many of the traditional fundraisers for SAM's House have had to be canceled. This included the Empty Bowls event, which allowed community members to decorate bowls to be sold off. Bisterfeldt said that raised about one-third of SAM25's annual budget.

"We're very concerned about that for the future," Bisterfeldt said. "People have been incredibly kind to us — our local people. Some of the foundations have helped, like the Shawano Area Community Foundation. Different places like that have been awesome and reaching out to see what they can do to help."

This year, the Empty Bowls fundraiser was replaced with a virtual open house of the new shelter. Bisterfeldt said some matching donors stepped up and helped to mitigate some of the losses, along with a successful online silent auction.

"Our fundraising season is our off season (when the shelter is not operating)," Bisterfeldt said. "Normally, we are very busy doing farmers markets and brat fries and all sorts of things that had to be canceled because, with the pandemic, we felt it wasn't safe to do it."

Individual donations have also increased, Bisterfeldt said.

The organization is also opening a thrift store at the front part of the shelter, which is expected to help make up for the losses. The thrift store is expected to be open sometime in the next couple of months.

Biker Peg Gallagher reaches 1,000 mile goal

Biking benefits health, coping with COVID-19

Bicycling for 1,000 miles in a single year is no easy feat.

"I've had that goal for several years," said Peg Gallagher, 83, Shawano. "This year, I said, 'I'm going to get that 1,000 miles,' and by George, I did."

Gallagher will have that achievement noted by the Wisconsin Bike Federation on its website.

She did every mile on the one bike she owns. She said she really likes the bike for its "step-through" frame, which makes it easy to mount and dismount.

Biking has helped her to cope with the enforced isolation during the COVID-19 pandemic, she said, and is something she can do safely with friends and family. The goal of biking 1,000 miles was made easier because she couldn't go for her usual fitness center workouts. Closed businesses and other pandemic restrictions ensured her of more time to herself, she added.

Because "I'm not one to be home," Gallagher said she now has her sights set on biking 87 miles as part of the "Run for Ruth — We Dissent," an ongoing virtual event ending in November honoring the late U.S. Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

She will miss her late afternoon and evening rides as part of her daily ride routine as the days get shorter, she added.

One pleasant aspect of that is exchanging greetings with other riders that she sees regularly as she pedals around the city, Gallagher said.

The longtime resident enjoys the increasingly bike-friendly aspects of living in Shawano, including the paved Mountain Bay Trail that cuts through town on its way from Weston to Howard.

She has participated regularly in the annual Shawano Pathways' Bike the Barn Quilts event as a participant and volunteer.

"On some of my rides, I feel nostalgic and venture on the path out of town to the west and ride into the country to the neighborhood on the river where I raised my son and two daughters," Gallagher said.

Another favored route is the "Park to Park Loop" from Sturgeon Park to Kuckuk Park, then east past the soccer complex, passing through Woodlawn Cemetery and back to her home near the Wolf River.

She has struck out on her own routes this past summer, cruising on every north-south street in her neighborhood.

She looks forward to a time where there is a trail around Shawano Lake, calling that possible ride "awesome."

Meghan Gallagher, one of her daughters, lives across the street, and

the mother and daughter enjoy their rides together, Peg Gallagher said.

Her interests are not confined to biking as she continues to be a sales representative for Adventure Keen, a publishing-printing company headquartered in Alabama. The company specializes in outdoors and do-it-yourself titles and that fits right in with her work space where she can see cardinals and hummingbirds at her numerous bird feeders.

Gallagher said she only developed her love of biking when she reached her 70s, and she said it is an ideal ac-

tivity for the retirement years. For her peers who might consider picking up the hobby, she recommends working with professionals at a bike store to get properly fitted equipment.

She also recommends a helmet and high-visibility clothing. Also for safety reasons, she has a rear-view mirror on her handlebars.

Gallagher noted biking's "obvious health benefits." She added that her children appreciate biking for its promotion of good balance, which helps to prevent falls — one of the major health perils for older people.

Green Bay trying to avoid slip up

Pack not judging Vikings by record

For a second straight week, the Green Bay Packers will take on an opponent with just one win.

After bouncing back from their first loss by taking care of the Houston Texans, the Packers return to Lambeau Field for an NFC North battle with the 1-5 Minnesota Vikings, a team the Packers dismantled back in week one.

After a slow start in the season opener in which Green Bay trailed 7-3 after a quarter, the Packers erupted for 19 second-quarter points and eventually led by 19 before easing to a 43-34 win.

Quarterback Aaron Rodgers got his MVP campaign started by throwing for 364 yards and four touchdowns, with receiver Davante Adams collecting 156 of the yards and two of

the touchdowns.

The Rodgers, Adams combination that put together another monster performance against the Texans could be in line for another big day against a Vikings pass defense that is the fourth-worst in the league (286.7 passing yards allowed per game).

Minnesota is also in the bottom half of the league in rushing yards per game (127.0) and third-worst in points allowed per game (32.0).

The Vikings also have one of the league's worst point differentials at minus-37.

One of the few things working in the Vikings' favor is that the team is coming off a bye week, so some of their injured players could return after missing their last game. Star running back Dalvin Cook and starting cornerback Holton Hill and guard Dru Samia were among the Vikings that missed the team's 40-23 loss to the Atlanta Falcons.

Even after the strong showing against the Vikings back in week one and what Minnesota's numbers show for the entire season, Green Bay isn't

taking its opponent lightly.

"I don't really care what the record states, we know that we are going to get the best Minnesota Viking team that we've seen up to this point," said coach Matt LaFleur on Monday. "I think they're extremely dangerous, and we've got to come ready to play."

While it was the Packers offense that again stole the headlines in the team's win over the Texans, Green

Bay's defense put together one of its better showings, making several key plays to finish off the win after a strong first half.

After surrendering 72 first-half points combined in its first five games, including 28 against the Buccaneers, the defense pitched a shut-out in the first half. Houston punted on its first three possessions before missing a long field goal on its fourth.

Along with forcing a late fumble to seal the win, Green Bay's defense created several other big plays with three sacks and 7.5 tackles for loss.

Just like it did against the Texans, the Packers will try and start this Sunday's game strong on both sides of the ball and jump out to an early lead.

A strong start followed by keeping their foot on the gas could help the Packers put the game away early. A lackadaisical start where the Packers face an early deficit could give the Vikings enough confidence and energy to pull off the upset, something the Packers cannot afford as they try and keep up with the rest of the NFC's top teams.

Rodgers throws 4 TDs as Packers beat Texans

Adams has career-high 196 receiving yards

Aaron Rodgers threw for 283 yards and four touchdowns, and the Green Bay Packers rebounded from their first loss with a 35-20 win over the Houston Texans on Sunday.

Rodgers played a near-flawless game and tied his season high for TD passes. The performance came after he threw two interceptions, including one that was returned for a touchdown, with no TDs in a 38-10 loss to Tampa Bay last week.

Despite being without leading rusher Aaron Jones and left tackle David Bakhtiari, Green Bay (5-1) had no such trouble handling the woeful Texans (1-6) on Sunday as the Packers built a 21-0 lead by halftime.

Green Bay's strong day on offense was aided by a career-high 196 yards receiving by Davante Adams, who had touchdown receptions of 3 and 45 yards.

Green Bay made it 35-13 when Jamaal Williams scored on a 1-yard run with about four minutes to go.

Deshaun Watson threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to Will Fuller with about 90 seconds left before the Texans recovered an onside kick. But David Johnson fumbled after a reception on the next play, and the Packers ran out the clock.

The home crowd, which was limited to 13,000 people because of coronavirus restrictions, was filled with Green Bay fans in the team's first trip to Houston since 2012. The stands were so overrun by Packers fans that players on Green Bay's defense raised their arms to hype up the crowd when the Texans started a drive at their 2 in the second quarter.

After failing to move the ball effectively in the first half, the Texans finally got on the board when Watson threw a 3-yard pass to Johnson to cut the lead to 21-7 early in the third quarter.

But Green Bay pushed its advantage to 21 again later in the third when Adams got in front of the defense to grab a 45-yard reception. It is the second game for Adams this season with at least 150 yards

receiving and two touchdowns, making him just the third player in franchise history to have two such games in one year and the first since Antonio Freeman in 1998.

The Texans added a field goal early in the fourth quarter and got another one following a blocked punt that got them within 28-13 with about 10 minutes left.

The Packers took an early lead when Adams grabbed a 3-yard touchdown reception on the first possession. They made it 14-0 when Jace Sternberger caught a 3-yard TD pass early in the second quarter. That play was set up by a 36-yard reception by Adams two plays earlier.

Watson was sacked twice on one drive with about four minutes left in the first half to stall the offense. The Texans attempted a field goal after that, but Kaimi Fairbairn's 41-yard try sailed wide left.

Watson threw for 309 yards with two touchdowns, and former Green Bay receiver Randall Cobb had 95 yards receiving.

Malik Taylor scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard reception late in the second quarter that put the Packers up 21-0 at halftime.

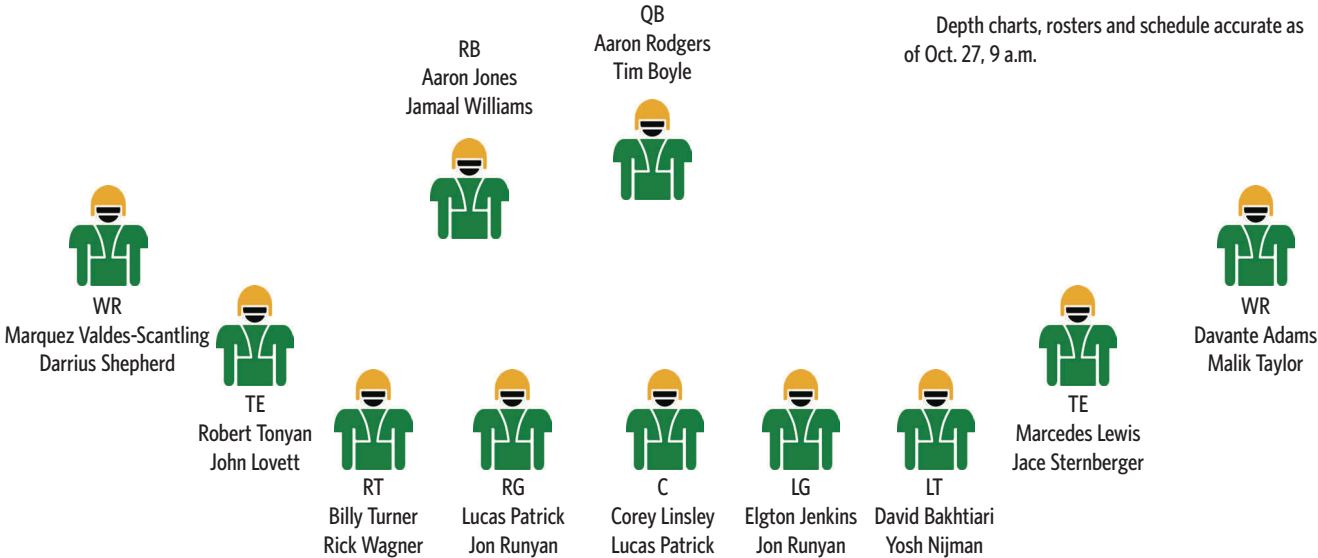

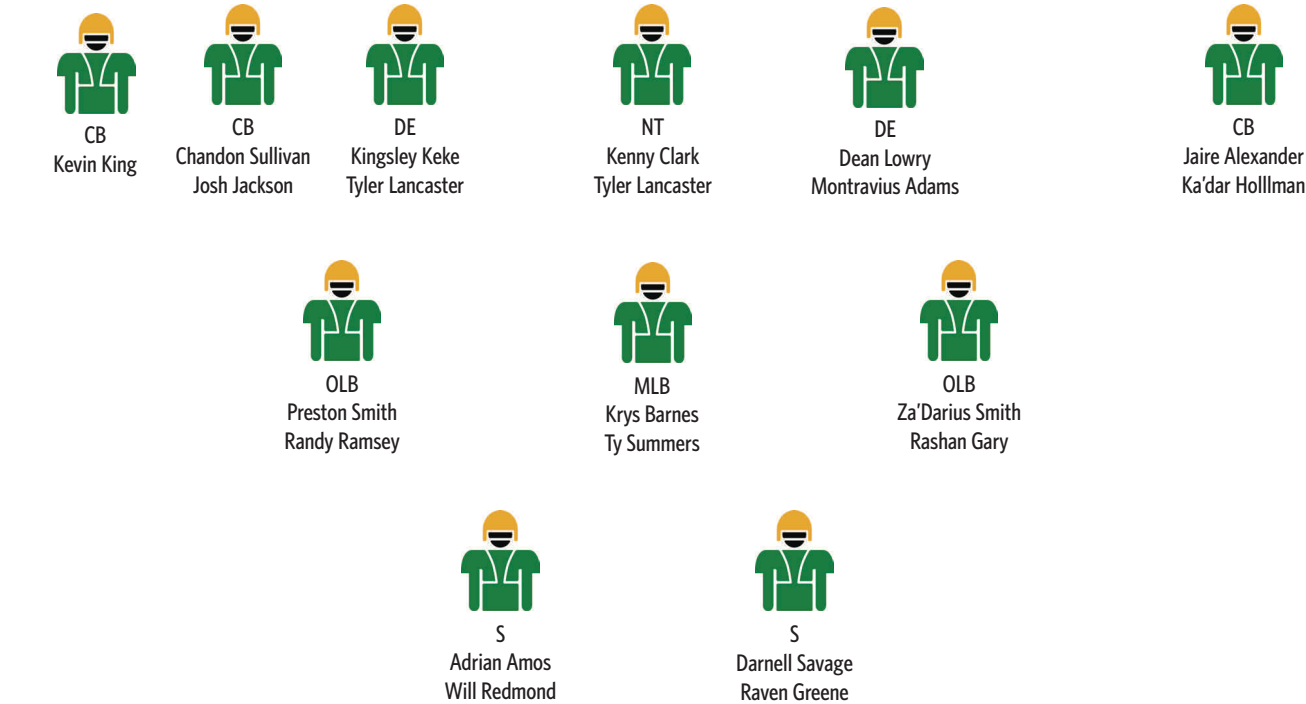

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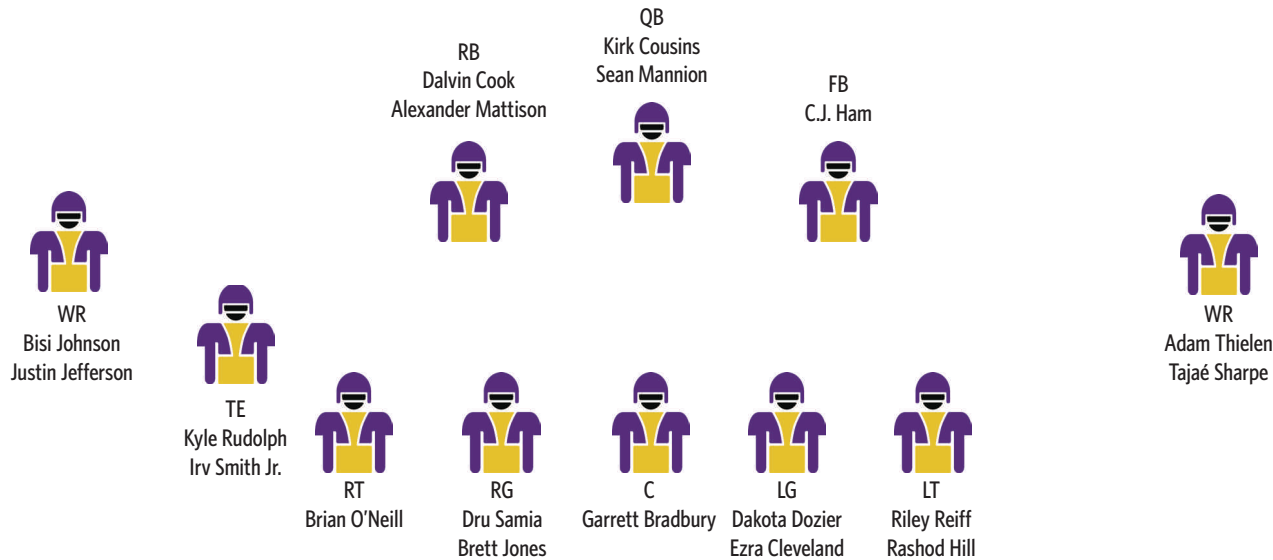

When the Packers have the ball

The 5-1 Packers are second in the NFL with 32.8 points per game. The 1-5 Vikings are 30th with 32.0 points allowed per game.

LaFleur doesn't want to hear about the standings or any of those numbers.

The Vikings hoped to line up this season with Danielle Hunter and Yannick Ngakoue as their defensive ends. Instead, Hunter is on injured reserve and Ngakoue, who was acquired in a trade before the season and had five sacks in six games, was traded to Baltimore. So, the Vikings' defensive ends are Ifeadi Odenigbo and Jalyn Holmes. Odenigbo has 2.5 sacks this season after producing seven last year. Holmes has no sacks this season and only one in his three seasons in the league.

That group must step up because the cornerback corps is young and struggling. The Vikings rank 29th in opponent passer rating and 30th in yards per attempt. Mike Hughes (first round, 2018), Jeff Gladney (first round, 2020) and Cameron Dantzler (third round, 2020) are listed as the top cornerbacks.

Hughes barely played before the bye due to a neck injury. Green Bay's dynamic duo of quarterback Aaron Rodgers and receiver Davante Adams riddled that group in the opening game, with Adams tying the franchise record with 14 receptions and Rodgers throwing for 364 yards and four touchdowns.

Starting with that first game, the rookies have taken their lumps. Of 124 cornerbacks with at least 20 percent playing time, Gladney ranks 118th in yards per coverage snap and Dantzler 115th, according to Pro Football Focus.

Holton Hill, an undrafted free agent in 2018, has played frequently

off the bench. He is 101st in yards per snap but does lead the team with three passes defended.

Hunter and Ngakoue aren't the only major losses. Linebacker Anthony Barr is out for the season with a torn ACL. So, standout middle linebacker Eric Kendricks is flanked by Eric Wilson and former Badgers standout Ryan Connelly. Wilson leads the team with two interceptions.

The strength of the defense is Kendricks and safeties Harrison Smith and Anthony Harris. Kendricks is fourth in the NFL with 66 tackles. Smith and Harris haven't produced many game-turning plays this season — Smith has the only interception produced by the secondary — but they combined for nine interceptions and three forced fumbles last year.

When the Vikings have the ball

If the Vikings are going to sal-

vage their season, it will be up to quarterback Kirk Cousins to return to form. Last year, he had a 107.4 passer rating with 26 touchdowns vs. six interceptions. This year, he has an 88.2 passer rating with 11 touchdowns vs. 10 interceptions. In a loss to Atlanta before the bye, Cousins threw for a season-high 343 yards but also tossed three interceptions.

Cousins had two excellent receivers with Adam Thielen and Stefon Diggs last season and has that luxury again with Thielen and the emergence of first-round pick Justin Jefferson. Thielen had 110 yards and two touchdowns in the opener vs. Green Bay and has seven touchdowns on the season. Jefferson caught only two passes in week one but has games of seven catches for 175 yards, four catches vs. 103 yards and nine catches for 166 yards in his last four games. He's 10th in the NFL with 537 receiving yards

and fifth with 19.2 yards per catch.

It will be interesting to see how Packers defensive coordinator Mike Pettine will deploy star cornerback Jaire Alexander. According to PFF, Alexander has allowed a total of 37 receiving yards the last four games. The return of cornerback Kevin King after missing the last two games with an injured quad would provide a big lift.

The health of the star running backs will be worth watching. Green Bay's Aaron Jones missed last week's game at Houston with a calf injury. Minnesota's Dalvin Cook missed the Atlanta game with a groin injury. In five games, he's rushed for 489 yards with seven touchdowns while averaging 5.3 yards per carry.

Similar to the Packers with Jamaal Williams, the Vikings have a competent backup with Alexander Mattison. He had a big game with 112 yards at Seattle in week five but was limited to 26 yards by the Falcons.

"I guess the best compliment I can give Matt is that when Dalvin leaves the game, I don't change my mindset at all," offensive coordinator Gary Kubiak said before the Atlanta game.

Left tackle Riley Reiff, left guard Dakota Dozier, center Garrett Bradbury, right guard Dru Samia and right tackle Brian O'Neil form the line. Behind them, Minnesota is fifth with 5.0 yards per carry but 22nd with a sack rate of 8.0 percent. Samia and Dozier have been the weak links in pass protection, which should play into the hands of defensive tackle Kenny Clark and outside linebacker Za'Darius Smith on passing downs.

Special teams

Aside from kicker Mason Crosby, who hasn't missed a field-goal attempt all season, Green Bay's special teams have been underwhelming. Last week at Houston, Green Bay gave up a blocked punt and failed to field an onside kick.

Minnesota's special teams haven't been good, either. It enters the week ranked 32nd in punt-return average and punter Britton Colquitt is fifth-to-last in net punt-average.

Kicker Dan Bailey, who was 27 of 29 on field goals last season, is 6 of 8 this season. His 75.0 percent success rate ranks 24th.

PACKERS NOTEBOOK

The Adams' show

In the Green Bay Packers' week one victory at the Minnesota Vikings, Davante Adams stole the show. Facing a revamped cast of cornerbacks, Adams tied Don Hutson's franchise record with 14 receptions, which he turned into 156 yards and two touchdowns in a 43-34 victory.

Adams was at it again in last week's victory at Houston with 13 receptions for a career-high 196 yards and two touchdowns. It was the most receiving yards by any player in the league this season, though it was eclipsed by Seattle's Tyler Lockett in the Sunday night game.

It marked his fourth career game with at least 10 receptions, 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns, tied with Keenan Allen, Pro Football Hall of Famer Raymond Berry and former Texans star Andre Johnson for the third-most such games in a player's first seven seasons in league history. Only Chad Johnson and Andre Rison (five apiece) have more.

"I don't know what he can't do," Packers coach Matt LaFleur said. "He is a complete player, man. I don't think there's a route he can't run, so we're fortunate to have a guy that we can lean heavily on, as was the case (at Houston). I think all our third-down conversions were to him, and that's rare that that ever happens. When the opportunities present themselves, he consistently delivers. I know he and Aaron have a great connection."

Minnesota ranks 29th in opponent passer rating and 30th in yards allowed per attempt, a key reason for its 1-5 start to the season. Its young cornerbacks, according to Pro Football Focus, have given up nine touchdowns vs. zero interceptions.

Mike Hughes, a first-round pick in 2018, and rookies Jeff Gladney and Cameron Dantzler have given up big games to big-time receivers all season. In week four, Houston's Will Fuller caught six passes for 108 yards and one touchdown. In week five, Seattle's D.K. Metcalf caught six passes for 93 yards and two touchdowns. In week six, Atlanta's Julio Jones caught eight passes for 137 yards and two touchdowns.

Adams will be the latest test for a defense that hasn't performed to coach Mike Zimmer's usual standard.

"He's terrific," Zimmer said of Adams. "These young corners, that's part of the deal. It's not like college. You get a good (receiver) every

week and you get a quarterback that can really throw the heck out of the football. Davante has been terrific on crossing routes, terrific on the deep throws, versus press, versus off, he catches the ball on the sideline.

"And, obviously, he's got a quarterback who can do all of those things to get him the ball. They're doing a good job scheming him, as well. They don't leave him in one place. They move him all over the field. Sometimes he runs the jet sweeps, and sometimes he's on the backside by himself. Sometimes — last week against Houston — they throw a screen to him when he's in the slot. So, we'll obviously know where he is and we're going to have to do our very best to try to challenge him. He's always a tough matchup."

Martin's debut

Rookie linebacker Kamal Martin, a native of Burnsville, Minnesota, and former standout at the University of Minnesota, was on injured reserve following knee surgery for the opening game at the Vikings. He'll be on the field — and perhaps in a big role — for Sunday's rematch.

In his NFL debut, he had a team-high six solo tackles, including one for a loss, in 29 snaps at Houston. Martin opened the game alongside Krys Barnes as the starting tandem. When Barnes exited with a shoulder injury on the first play after halftime, Martin took over in the every-down role.

"I was encouraged by what Kamal did," LaFleur said. "Obviously, there's some things to clean up, but I was happy with a lot of the things he did and him just flying around. He's a big, physical presence out there. We just need to get him more work, more reps in practice to get him comfortable so he knows what he's doing at all times. I see a guy that has a lot of playmaking ability. So, I was really encouraged by what Kamal did."

It wasn't just Martin's first game of the season but, because he missed the Golden Gophers' bowl game following surgery on his other knee, it was his first game since he recorded nine tackles vs. Wisconsin on Nov. 30.

"It was definitely a lot of fun to get back out there," Martin said. "I hadn't played football in a very long time, so it was fun to get back out there with the guys and just do our job with all 11 guys."

Protecting Rodgers

Even with four-time All-Pro left tackle David Bakhtiari out of the lineup with a chest injury, Aaron

Rodgers wasn't sacked by the Texans. Billy Turner moved from right tackle to left tackle and allowed one quarterback hit, according to Pro Football Focus. Rick Wagner took over and didn't allow a pressure.

"I thought they did a fantastic job," LaFleur said. "We always talk about trying to get our best five out there, and we felt like that was the way to do that. There's always adjustments you have to make up front. I don't think it's the easiest job in the world to go from the right side of the line. When you kick him over to left tackle, that's a tall task.

"We're fortunate to have guys that are versatile and can step up and go out there and do an outstanding job versus two really good rushers, J.J. Watt, Whitney Mercilus. The fact we gave up zero sacks, I was really proud of their efforts. I thought they handled themselves really, really well."

Bakhtiari's status for Sunday's game is unknown but the Vikings' pass rush has gone from strength to weakness.

Premier defensive end Danielle Hunter is on injured reserve and plans on having season-ending surgery to repair a herniated disc.

Hunter was supposed to be paired with Yannick Ngakoue. The Vikings acquired him from Jacksonville before the season for second- and fifth-round draft picks. He piled up a team-high five sacks in six games but was traded to Baltimore during the bye for third- and fifth-round picks.

Bye week blues

The Packers were given the short end of the stick in terms of bye weeks and their division rivals. Minnesota had a bye last week to get rested and ready for Sunday. Chicago will have a bye week before it plays at Green Bay on Nov. 29.

However, the Vikings are 2-4 under Zimmer coming out of the bye, including losses the past two years.

Self-scouting, as is the case for all teams, was the emphasis for Zimmer as he attempts to right the ship. That was especially true for his defense.

Zimmer's defenses have finished in the top nine in the league in scoring for each of the past five seasons, including finishing first in 2017 and fifth last year. This year, they're 30th.

Moreover, the Vikings are near the bottom of the league with 12 giveaways and a minus-7 in turnovers.



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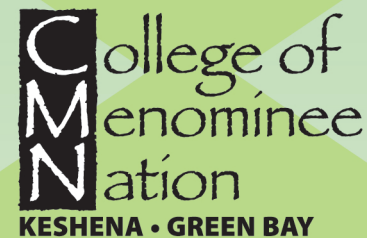
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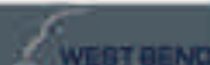

Sec. 6-5. – Regulation of Beekeeping.

- a. Definitions. The following words, as used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them:
- Apiary shall mean all hives kept for the purpose of beekeeping and any area within ten feet of such hives.
 - Beekeeping means intentionally creating, fostering or maintaining a colony of honeybees.
 - Hive shall mean a structure built to accommodate a colony of honeybees.
 - Honeybee shall mean any life stage of the European honeybee (*Apis mellifera*)
- b. No person shall engage in beekeeping without having an approved conditional use permit and obtaining a paid beekeeping permit from the Director of Municipal. In reviewing a permit application, the Director of Municipal Operations shall consider the number of honeybees to be possessed, their location, the facilities to be used for such purpose, and the likelihood of a public or private nuisance being created.
- c. Manner of keeping.
- (1) All hives shall have combs which are kept in sound and usable condition and removable for inspection.
 - (2) The apiary shall be entirely located on one parcel of land.
 - (3) A property owner shall cause any abandoned hive to be removed from the property.
 - (4) No hive may house a colony of insects other than honeybees.
- d. Illegal colonies or hives. If the Director of Municipal Operations finds any hive kept in violation of this section, he or she may order the violation corrected within 30 days. If the property owner fails to correct the violation within 30 days, the hive in violation may be destroyed and/or removed from the municipality by the Director of Municipal Operations, or his or her designee, and the cost thereof shall be charged back to the property owner as a special charge pursuant to § 66.0627, Wis. Stats.

Pediatrician offers Halloween safety guidelines

With northeast and central Wisconsin seeing a significant increase in COVID-19 cases, health care officials are warning everyone to approach the upcoming Halloween holiday with caution.

"Halloween is a fun day for people of all ages," said Dr. Abby Smolcich, a pediatrician at ThedaCare Physicians-Darboy. "This year, it is going to be especially important that everyone follow the recommendations for avoiding COVID-19. That will mean getting creative in how we celebrate this spooky holiday."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services consider traditional trick-or-treating to be a high-risk activity and generally discourage it. Smolcich agrees with the

recommendations to avoid traditional trick or treating.

"With the current level of COVID-19 activity in our area, it's not advised to have kids going door-to-door and having someone hand out candy or other treats," she said. "We've been doing a great job this year finding other alternatives to traditional holidays and activities, let's do the same with Halloween."

She added that trunk or treating — the practice of parking cars in an area and having kids pick up bags of candy out of the trunks of cars — probably isn't a good idea either. Instead, Smolcich suggested a safer option would be to place candy in individual plastic bags and leave the bags on the doorstep or on a table on the sidewalk for children to pick up individually.

Mertz dazzles as No. 14 Wisconsin routs Illinois

Freshman tosses 5 TDs

Graham Mertz threw five touchdown passes to match the Wisconsin record in a commanding first career start and the Badgers beat Illinois 45-7 on Oct. 23 to open the pandemic-delayed Big Ten football season.

Mertz set a school record for completion percentage on 20-of-21 passing, finishing with 248 yards. The lone incompletion was a pass that running back Garret Groshek dropped midway through the third quarter.

The redshirt freshman quarterback delivered a buzzworthy performance during the Big Ten's long-awaited opening night.

Mertz became the first-team quarterback after returning starter Jack Coan underwent foot surgery on Oct. 7, leaving him out indefinitely. He wasted no time making the

most of his opportunity. The only previous Wisconsin quarterbacks to throw five touchdown passes in a game are Darrell Bevell against Nevada in 1993 and Jim Sorgi against Michigan State in 2003.

Mertz was 14 of 14 for 190 yards and four touchdowns in the first half alone as Wisconsin built a 28-7 halftime lead. Three of his five touchdown passes went to tight end Jake Ferguson, who had seven catches for 72 yards.

After Illinois fumbled the ball away on the game's second play from scrimmage, Mertz hit fullback

Jason Stokke for a 10-yard touchdown pass. He found Ferguson wide-open in the back of the end zone for a 5-yard score to make it 14-0.

Illinois briefly got back into it late in the second quarter when Ferguson fumbled at the end of a 9-yard completion. Illinois linebacker Tarique Barnes picked up the loose ball and ran 39 yards into the end zone to cut Wisconsin's lead to 14-7.

Mertz responded to Illinois' touchdown by throwing a 34-yard completion to Ferguson and then hitting the senior tight end again for a 14-yard score with 1:06 left in the half. After Illinois went three-and-out on its next series, Mertz threw deep and found Danny Davis for a 53-yard touchdown pass with 28 seconds left until halftime.

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OPINION

When force of nature becomes force for change

It is not a gentle process, making wood.

“Making wood” is technically not the right term. Trees make wood, and we make firewood, taking chunks of what used to be a forest and converting them into pieces that fit in a stove.

The process involves a loud motor pushing a heavy, hydraulic-powered blade through 2-foot sections of oak or maple or, if you are very unlucky, cottonwood.

We were reminded of the satisfaction of making wood when we rented a splitter this weekend and converted a large pile of logs, each roughly the size of a Volkswagen Beetle, to pieces that can be grabbed with one hand.

The splitter works by making a heavy blade, the irresistible force, meet the log. The log, which had felt like a nearly unmovable object, moves catastrophically and splits into pieces.

The pieces often do not break gracefully.

They groan and shift, splintering, shattering, releasing a shower of sawdust or bits of bark or lumps of insect nests. They force of the blade yields patterns and colors you'll never see if the tree is alive. Some logs split in beautiful straight columns. Some break into layered pieces as beautiful as smooth layers of sandstone.

The logs also hide secrets of the tree's past life. Small holes indicate bugs; larger holes, woodpeckers chasing them.

Straight, even logs that split easily have few hidden surprises. Even these can have tendrils that connect them even after being subjected to the splitter. Pieces of pliable wood fiber hang on, as if they were trying to hold the log together.

The splitter has physics on its side, and eventually every piece can be torn apart. After decades of growth and strength, we reduced trees to firewood by lifting logs and pressing a lever. Splitting, it seems, is easy.

There are exceptions. Some of the logs had hidden branches. These are branches that are completely contained within the log, invisible from the outside. After they formed — sometimes at 90 degree angles to the trunk, the tree grew around them.

They are a nightmare to split.

It occurred to me, right around log 477 (perhaps that is a slight exaggeration) that the unexpected branches,

the whorls and burls and unexpected shapes were what kept the logs from splitting easily.

Wood cutting was supposed to be a respite from the daily deluge of political discussion. And yet, out in the yard, we could see the entire system playing out in each piece we cut.

Splitting is easy. Anyone armed with the right tools can tear the country apart as easily as we split oak. No community is so perfect, so impenetrable, that it can hold off the right combination of forces. You don't have to be bigger or stronger to break things up. You just have to have the tools and the desire.

The tools can be words. The blade can be insinuations, or mockery. The power can be disenfranchisement. The tools can be words. The blade can be insinuations, or mockery.

The power can be disenfranchisement. For four years, the division has started at the top and spilled into every corner of life. Splitting is easy when you have the right tools.

What we don't expect is the resistance from within the very pieces we are trying to divide.

The curve, the branch that doesn't belong, the scar that healed over — these make it hard for the splitter to do its work. They make the wood shift

in unexpected angles. The things that choke the splitter in our communities are often hidden, but they are there. These are diverse ideas, respectful disagreements or a humble question that one asks without knowing the answer in advance.

A respect for diverse points of view clogs up the community splitters the same way that the 90-degree branch slowed down our wood-making. We may not even notice how the impact until it gets in the way of the ones who want to divide us. Like the unexpected hidden branch, the things that make us different are also the things that keep us together.

An election is coming, and we are a national community that has discovered how easy it is to be split. We can also remember that each of us has the opportunity to be the one stray branch, the one unexpected obstacle in the process to divide.

We have an opportunity to be — if only for a moment in time — the immovable object that keeps all of us from splitting apart.

Stay warm, and vote.
