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Bonduel 3K attracting a lot of attention

More classes expected from program that offers all-day, everyday learning

The Bonduel School District is currently the only public school in Shawano County that offers all-day, everyday school with half-day options to 3-year-old kindergarten students.

That gives flexibility to families.

"This makes it easier on the children and parents," said Heidi Cynor, Bonduel 3K director. "It offers more consistency with the day-to-day routine. It also gives us a head start with the educational side."

Bonduel had 15 children that open enrolled this school year just for the 3K program alone. Out of the 15, all 15 enrolled for next year in Bonduel. The fifth grade will potentially be moving to the middle school next year to make room for more students in the elementary school.

"This is a good thing," said Brad Grayvold, Bonduel Elementary School principal. "It means our school is doing its job. Our staff is amazing. Once kids start here, they want to stay. This program is funded through the community fund."

Grayvold noted that Cynor and her staff have proven to be trustworthy to the children and their parents alike.

"Heidi surrounds herself with the best staff around," Grayvold said. "I have been in education for many, many years — 33 years. I have never seen an early education program so successful. The reason for that, Heidi Cynor and her staff."

Bonduel's 3K program started in 2019. Grayvold pushed to start the program and knew Cynor would make a great director. It started as two days a week for half days. They had so much success and interest they decided to provide the option of everyday all day.

"You probably heard of universal preschool," Grayvold said. "We want to be a step ahead and show that it can be done. Parents are looking for the best option with the least amount of transition. Bringing their child to one place, with highly qualified staff that are going to provide a safe and nurturing environment like we do."

Cynor noted that the 3K program is not simply daycare, but is curriculum based. Bonduel adapted Tools of the Mind to provide the learning component.

"It's learning through play," Cynor said. "Things like, wait your turn, standing in line, restaurant learning center, doctor office learning center, routine, schedule. These are all foundations of learning. It makes the next step that much easier for them. Research has proven early childhood helps children so much more down the road. Many benefits, I could go on for

days explaining them all."

Cynor said the support at all levels, from the teachers to administrators to the Bonduel School Board is what has made the 3K program a success.

"It trickles around," Cynor said. "It makes everything run smoother. It is truly a great place to work. Everyone cares about each other. People notice that. Parents notice that. Kids, they all notice it when everyone around them are happy and working together. Growth Mindset Committee ran by Kylee Richter is a committee that helps keep positivity between staff and students. Things like that, it all makes the program successful."

Currently Bonduel has three full 3K classes, each have one teacher and one aide. Potentially, there may be four classes needed if this continues to be as successful as it has been. That will be determined when open enrollment ends.

Flo'ing With Kindness relocates following fire

Volunteers come out to help move inventory temporarily to Gresham Lions Club headquarters

The Flo'ing With Kindness Food Pantry that called downtown Gresham home is having to relocate temporarily after a fire that decimated a neighboring building also caused damage to the building housing the pantry.

On March 4, more than two dozen volunteers turned out to haul undamaged canned food to the Gresham Lions Club headquarters just outside the village. Frozen food also survived the fire and was expected to be moved to the Lions Club at another time. It was only the pre-packaged food that perished from the smoke permeating the food, according to Dave Mendoza, executive director for The FRESH Project.

"The day of the fire, the firemen took the frozen food and brought it next door across the street to the bar, which had some empty freezer space," Mendoza said, indicating Jungles on Main. "They were able to salvage that for us."

Mendoza said that the food pantry building mainly suffered water damage from 2 inches of water impacting the tiling and some smoke damage, which he estimated could be cleaned fairly easily.

"The equipment didn't suffer any water damage," Mendoza said. "Because it was sealed."

Electricians tested the refrigerators and other appliances and found them to be in good working order, according to Mendoza.

"We could have lost all that equipment," he said. "Insurance would have helped with it, but not enough to replace everything."

Mendoza didn't have an estimate on when the food pantry could return downtown, but he noted the Lions were willing to let Flo'ing With Kindness operate from their headquarters for the duration.

"Hopefully, it's not going to be

too long," Mendoza said. "The laundromat next door, they were able to go right in and clean it up, and it's operational now."

The food pantry will continue on a modified schedule, according to Mendoza, with its Wednesday hours curtailed for now. Those hours were designated for receiving donations or registration for new people needing the food pantry's aid. Distribution will remain on the third Thursday of the month, and anyone interested in donating food or registering can call 715-851-8335 for the time being.

"They can call us anytime if they need to sign up for food or if they need to donate, we'll schedule a time to come up here and accept the donation," Mendoza said.

The change in operation comes at a rough time, as the federal program providing extended FoodShare benefits expired in February, cutting the funding by \$90 per household, but it's unclear how much that will impact the Gresham area, which Flo'ing With Kindness has served since 2019.

Feeding America is also helping the food pantry out and trying to secure additional funding so that the food that was lost can be restocked. Mendoza said that pre-packaged foods like rice and dry goods are a need at the moment.

Mendoza said he was not surprised to see so many people come out to help the food pantry relocate, which made the work much easier.

"It's very heartwarming," Mendoza said. "Gresham is a really warm community. That's one of the charms of living in small towns, a true sense of community where people can jump in and help each other. There have been a lot of people who don't receive assistance from the food pantry who have thanked us for being there, and now they're here making sure people in the community can get the assistance they need."

After an impressive 102 years, Frieda Alma Minnie Ida Evans, (née Krause, Kunschke) passed on Feb. 24, 2023. Born in Gresham on the winter solstice of 1920, the first years of Frieda's well-lived life are not easily imaginable today. Navigating the Krause homestead at the time, one would quickly stumble upon the family cow, many canaries, a pen of pigs, some chickens, a team of horses (Fan and George) and Spike, the family's legendary canine.

Although her parents were born in Wisconsin, the family only spoke German. Frieda learned English once enrolled in school when she was 4. Her formal education ended in 1934 — not only because the school burned down the June after she completed eighth grade, but because the nearest high school at the time was a distant 16 miles away, in far-off Shawano.

By that time, Frieda's informal education had already begun. When she wasn't helping care for her sister, Virginia, she was encountering the likes of Baby Face Nelson, whom she always claimed once bought her and her friends ice cream while his gang cased the bank safe in Gresham.

When she hadn't been tagging along with her father, Emil, as he

By 1938, Frieda would marry Ervin Kunschke, and the two would settle in Clintonville, where he worked making powdered milk at Borden's. Erv enlisted in the U.S. Navy a few years later and was stationed in Virginia Beach while Frieda remained in Clintonville, working as one of only two women employed (at that time) at the Four Wheel Drive Auto Company, where she helped manufacture trucks for the

helped rebuild the Lutheran Church in Shawano or grade the roads throughout the county, or at the logging camp, Frieda shadowed her mother, a midwife, Lydia. With skills she picked up on their weeks-long adventures, Frieda herself became a midwife for a number of years, until she started slinging coffee and serving eggs in her Uncle Her-

war effort.

After Erv's return from the service, Frieda gave birth to Jonnie Lanea in 1947, who soon passed away from respiratory complications, and later, birth to Joy Lynn in 1949. The couple relocated to Ogema after Erv had secured a loan to purchase the Omega Creamery. In 1952, in a house about 20 miles away, in Phillips, Frieda gave birth to her third daughter, Judy Lu.

After returning to Shawano with her two daughters in the mid-1950s, Frieda worked at Kroll's peeling potatoes for 20 cents a plate and would occasionally go out dancing at the Rustic Resort or the Broadview. In 1956, Frieda married Delmore "Runt" Evans. Through the late 1950s and 1960s, Frieda would bartend and waitress at several well-known spots, like Stan and Buds, the Light Resort and the North Shore. Serving locals, tourists and a number of Green Bay Packers and their head coach, Frieda would often work alongside Delmore "Runt" Evans, until his death in 1965.

Frieda spent much of the 1970s and early 1980s working as an in-home caregiver to a number of prominent families in Milwaukee, until moving in with her daughter and her family in 1983. She spent the

rest of her life in Neenah.

Frieda is survived by her daughter, Judy (John) Lautenschlager; grandchildren, Scott (Kim) Krueger, Peter (Kimberly) Krueger, Jamie (Ken) Usterbowski, Chris Lautenschlager (April Hamlin) and Joshua (Sarah) Lautenschlager; many great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by Delmore Evans; parents, Emil Krause and Lydia (Duwe) Krause; sisters, Dora Bartlein and Virginia Moesch; an infant brother; brother, Harvey Krause; and her daughters, Jonnie Kunschke and Joy Krueger.

A visitation is scheduled for March 11, 2023, 9-11 a.m. Service at 11 a.m. at Westgor Funeral Home in Neenah.

Sister Jean "Jane" Marie Miller, CSJ, passed away on Saturday, Jan. 14, 2023, in St. Louis, Missouri, at the age of 84. Jean Marie, better known as Jane, was born April 27, 1938, in Keshena to the late James and Emma (Reed) Miller.

Jean Marie — better known to most as Honey Girl — entered the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet in 1953 and was received into the novitiate in 1954 as Sister Marie Kateri. She received her license as a practical nurse in 1964.

Always proud of her Native American heritage as an enrolled member of the Menominee Nation (James), with lineage to the Oneida Nation (Emma), Honey Girl devoted nearly 70 years of faithful service to the ministry, with St. Joseph Institute for the Deaf as Sister Jean for nearly 40 of those years.

She began in the mid-1970s when St. Joseph Institute for the Deaf was still located in University City and served as a childcare worker/house parent; research/recreation assistant director and dining room manager. At the Chesterfield location, she served as a purchasing agent, purchasing coordinator and laundress.

Early on in her ministry work, Sister Jean served as a licensed practical



nurse. She worked at Nazareth Convent in St. Louis (1956-60), St. Joseph Hospital in Kansas City, Missouri (1964-65), and Riverside Nursing Home in Oconto (1974-75). She was also a childcare worker/houseparent at St. Joseph Carondelet Child Care Center in Chicago (1960-63), St. Joseph Male Orphanage in Washington, Georgia (January through June 1965), and St. Joseph's Home for Boys in St. Louis (1965-73).

Throughout her time in service to the ministry, she always maintained a close connection to her family on the Menominee Reservation, coming home for regular visits, staying with family and enjoying the traditional foods and unique kinship found only in Tribal communities. In doing so, as others passed away, she quietly assumed the role of family matriarch with daily calls to offer reminders of the importance of faith as a foundation to family strength.

She spent time traveling beyond

the routine, making special trips to the Rome with a visit to Vatican City and throughout the United States to share her devotion and love for a higher power. Her willingness to expand her boundaries and explore other places served as an inspiration to many in her family and the other special lives she touched.

Sister Jean retired in 2012 and volunteered at the St. Joseph Provincial House serving her CSJ community. She moved to Nazareth Living Center in 2014 where she carried out her ministry of prayer and presence, becoming a mainstay and playing an informal role of hall monitor from her perch at the end of the hall. Her faith, her new role and completing jigsaw puzzles with visits from dear friends and family carried her spirit through the challenges of advancing age.

Surrounded by family members to bathe her in comfort and offer reassurance in her final moments, Honey Girl closed her eyes in the late morning of

Jan. 14, took her final breath and quietly joined those preceded in death; her parents and her sister, Barbara Jean Rohr (Miller), and brothers James V. Miller Jr., Lawrence Miller, John (Jack) Miller, Marvin Miller, Warren Miller and Bernard Miller, along with numerous aunts, uncles, cousins and special friends.

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Schmidt gets input through listening sessions

Attendance sparse, but legislator explains his views as he learns what constituents want

Sparse attendance marked the first two listening sessions held March 6 by Rep. Peter Schmidt in Bonduel and Shawano, but he plans to continue the practice to further find out from constituents what they want him to do in the Wisconsin Legislature.

Although the wintry weather is what Schmidt suspects kept more people from attending the daytime sessions, he was able to hear in-depth from the few who attended about what concerns them about their government. Although much of the discussion addressed state issues, there were some federal issues discussed, and Schmidt said that whatever decisions he made would be ones that kept freedoms, not ones that take them away.

"In today's world, we don't have much freedom," Schmidt said at the Bonduel listening session. "Government has way too much power, which we saw in 2020. It's just human nature to acquire power at any cost."

There is discussion in the legislature to make COVID-19 vaccines a requirement for school, the same as for measles, rubella and other ailments. Schmidt is against it, saying "That's no good."

"I don't support mandating that," Schmidt said. "You've always got the religious exemptions but you want a bill where it would be optional."

Schmidt also pointed out that schools are required to be a lot of things already in society, including parents at some times. He blamed the diminishment of the family unit and recommended reform take place so that teachers only have to worry about teaching.

"It's important to have our family structures," Schmidt said. "We don't have a family unit. Mom and dad both work. The kids are home with the technology. They go to school, and teachers are responsible for them now like they're parents."

Schmidt said he is in favor of marijuana being legalized for medical purposes but not for recreational use. Currently, 37 states have legalized medical marijuana, and 21 of those have marijuana legalized for recreational use, as well, but it is still illegal at the federal level on both counts.

"My district won't support full legalization," Schmidt said during the Shawano listening session. "The reason why law enforcement is against legalizing marijuana is it's being laced with other drugs, including fentanyl."

A couple of women in attendance in Shawano asked Schmidt for his side of the story in regards to the rift between him and the Shawano County Republican Party. The GOP denounced him in the general election, claiming he lied to them about his criminal conviction for assaulting one of his farm workers.

Schmidt noted he is still censured by the county conservatives, even though he won the election, and he said he's fine with that, because he believes partisan politics is what's keeping things from being done at

the state and federal levels.

"It doesn't bother me one bit, because I stand for free speech," Schmidt said. "When you apply for a job, do you tell your HR everything about yourself for that job? It's the same thing running for office. What right do these people have that they should know every day of my life? Do I know everything they did?"

Schmidt noted the knowledge of what happened can be used to slander someone's character, and he believes that his efforts going door-to-door earned him more respect because he was able to face someone individually.

"I volunteered with the Shawano County GOP for years and went to their events," Schmidt said. "The people up here, they want people to do what they want. They use people to get what they want. If you look at the biblical standpoint, that's not Christian."

Schmidt expects he'll go against the grain on a lot of things in office. He pointed out that he turned down the legislature's health insurance, preferring to keep what he has

through his farm in the Town of Hartland.

Schmidt brought up some points regarding election integrity, a hot button issue on both sides of the aisle. He noted in the Bonduel session that Gov. Tony Evers is only interested in reform if it expands voting rights, but he thinks some things should be tightened up, including going back to one-day voting with limited exceptions, something he admitted may not be realistic.

Schmidt said he's against automatic voter registration when someone turns 18, but thinks that felons should have their rights restored once they've left prison.

"If you have more people vote, that makes it harder to cheat, harder to steal an election, and harder to corrupt things because you have more votes when you expand the base," Schmidt said.

Schmidt held two other listening sessions in Pulaski and Seymour. He plans to hold three more on March 13.



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Virtual learning plan for snow days halted

School board approves extra days in calendar to make up for closures but stops online education

The suggestion of virtual learning on days when Shawano's public schools have to close due to inclement weather prompted the Shawano School Board to suggest administrators revisit the idea.

Superintendent Kurt Krizan presented a revision to the school district's yearly calendar. The original calendar had room for four days off in the event of winter storms. So far in the 2022-23 school year, Shawano has had to close for five days and also release students early an additional day, which currently puts the district almost 10 hours short of the 1,137 hours the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction requires for students in grades 6-12.

"These weather days have resulted in a loss of 37.5 instructional hours, which puts us below the 1,137 hours of instruction needed," Krizan said.

The revision is requiring the district to make April 10, the day after Easter, a full school day instead of a professional development day that students would have been out of school. The last day of school, June 7, will now be a full day instead of a half day to allow the school to make up the hours.

Winter is not over, however, and there is concern the district might need to close school again in March and possibly April if nasty weather impacts the Shawano area on weekdays. Krizan proposed having any additional closure days become virtual learning days for middle and high school students in lieu of

adding days to the end of the school year. Elementary school students would not be required to engage in virtual learning because DPI requires fewer hours for those grades.

Krizan acknowledged that the area's poor access to broadband would require teachers to develop lesson plans that could be emailed to students and did not require live teaching or videos through the internet. He noted that Bonduel and Wittenberg-Birnamwood school districts are already doing this.

That was not enough to assure some board members who recalled the lengthy school closures during the coronavirus pandemic and how poorly virtual learning was executed during those times.

"What if we do nothing?" said board member Mart Grams, who has previously denounced virtual learning and blames it for students being so far behind educationally. "What if we say, 'Screw it'? The state is not going to punish us because they'd be harming children."

Krizan responded by saying he does not see shrugging off the needed hours as what's best for the students, but Grams said he saw it as preferable as trying to bring back the virtual learning as an alternative.

"Digital learning is the worst thing we can do for these kids. I watched it for a year and a half, and it was horrendous," Grams said. "I took my own son out of school because of that digital learning."

Krizan noted several other options were looked at before deciding on virtual learning. Extending school days did not sit well with Kobussen Buses, which provides

bus service to Shawano, Bonduel and other school districts, because the area's three parochial schools would need to be on board, as those students ride the same buses as their public school counterparts. There was concern about adding days to the end of the school year because summer school is scheduled to start June 12, a few days after the last regular school day.

"I know it's not ideal," Krizan said. "We've looked at a lot of options. One of the suggestions was our Wednesday early releases that we looked at. We may need that, as well (in the future)."

Board member Jeana Winslow, who sits on the district's executive committee and first heard of the plan at its Feb. 28 meeting, said she saw the virtual learning as the best alternative and believed Krizan was doing what was best for teachers and students. Winslow was the lone vote against the measure once the virtual learning proposal was taken out.

"Hearing Kurt talk about that his number one concern was that teachers were impacted the least by implementing this told me that he has your back," Winslow said to the teachers in the audience. "I felt for

the first time that it was genuine, that he took that into consideration."

Several board members asked teachers for their thoughts, but most declined, saying they feared administrative reprisal. Only one teacher, Chris Kent, commented and said that, in his 31 years of teaching, the district had never added teacher days to the end of the school year, referring to plans to make the planned April 10 professional development take place on June 9. Kent said teachers weren't asked about the proposal.

Board president Mike Musolf recommended that Krizan approach school teacher leadership teams with ideas to address future weather closures.

Winslow grew frustrated during the meeting as suggestions of class-action lawsuits for more pay and other things popped up during the discussion.

"I think we're going way off the road here. This is major," Winslow said about having so many weather days. "This isn't a plan that Kurt came up with to screw all the teachers. The weather just sucks here in Wisconsin."

Owner of Box Drops hopes to build meaningful relationships with community

For those in need of beds and couches, look no further than Box Drop, which recently opened its doors in Shawano.

Box Drop, located at 325 S. Main St., opened in early February and is set to provide mattresses and sofas at a reasonable price, according to store owner Matt LaFave. The Shawano store is the newest of close to 400 stores nationwide.

“Because we have all of this buying power, we can get any manufacturer,” said LaFave. “Really, it is just keeping our overhead low and buying direct from the manufacturer — (the customers) get all of the warranties and we can save them 50-80%.”

LaFave, who also owns the Box Drop store in Green Bay, said he and his family opened the store in Shawano to help fill the furniture need in the city.

“There is only one furniture store here,” said LaFave. “We obviously saw the need for it. Every week at the Green Bay store, we had people from Shawano saying that we need to get one of the stores there. It wasn’t a hard decision for sure.”

In his first month running the store in Shawano, LaFave said that the reception from the Shawano community has been all positive.

“Everyone has been really nice, and honestly this has turned into my favorite store,” said LaFave. “We have sold a lot of beds in the first month. We beat Green Bay (last month) and I have been there for six years, so that is saying something.”

LaFave said that one thing that has opened challenges for him and his staff is having customers understand that these items are the same that you can find in other stores.

“These are the same products and they aren’t used,” said LaFave. “We are getting you the same warranties and getting you the same products.”

He added that the store is open by appointment and that customers have the opportunity to take home their purchase on the same day, or have it delivered to their house.

LaFave went on to say that an important part of the store to him is that it is family-run. LaFave runs both the Shawano and Green Bay stores with his wife, Courtney. With the store being family and communi-

ty-oriented, LaFave said that his top priority is to help residents in the Shawano community.

“We are all about giving back — we are not going to bring people in from Green Bay, or anything like

that,” said LaFave. “We honestly do care. It is not all about the money for us; we are here to help people.”

As the store continues to grow, LaFave said that he teaches his employees to put a strong emphasis on creating relationships and not pushing sales on people who aren’t ready to buy.

“We gladly will let you leave and come back, because we want you to price check,” said LaFave. “Relationships are the only way that we are going thrive. We have people who have purchased mattresses and told their friends, who told their friends. They are telling them that they sat here for 30 minutes just talking and not even about the mattresses — just kind of hanging out.”

LaFave wrapped up by saying that he hopes the store can act as a place where customers feel comfortable shopping and socializing with staff and others.

Sometimes I think I made the right decision by self-publishing my novels, and two recent incidents in the publishing world seem to back that up.

A couple of weeks ago, I read online about the plans to change some of the text and situations in the books of Roald Dahl, including the classic “Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.” It’s one of my favorite books, and when I heard that Penguin Random House planned to sanitize the sweet tale along with Dahl’s other tales, it was like I wasn’t living in the United States, where freedom of speech is supposed to mean something.

In “Charlie and the Chocolate Factory,” for example, they’re not going to refer to Augustus Gloop as “enormously fat” and are going to refer to the Oompa Loompas as “small people” instead of “small men.” Another Dahl tale, “Matilda,” is also being altered so that Miss Trunchbull is now a “most formidable woman” instead of “most formidable female,” like “female” is supposed to be a dirty word.

What’s really disturbing is that Dahl’s literature is not in the public domain. Dahl’s estate still has control

School board approves GED Option Two

The Shawano School Board signed off on a graduation alternative March 6 that allows work experience to be included as high school credit for juniors and seniors struggling to pass standard required courses.

Described as a second option to the grade-equivalency diploma, Shawano School District officials presented the GED Option Two program to the district's policy and curriculum committee Feb. 24, and the committee recommended the mea-

sure move forward to the full board. The program has already received approval for a three-year period from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.

"The policy and curriculum committee met for a good hour discussing GED Option Two," Superintendent Kurt Krizan said to the board.

Krizan said at the Feb. 24 meeting that he believes GED Option Two will be beneficial to those students who didn't take the earlier part of high school seriously but might realize now that doors are closing. Krizan noted that the school already has

summer school and credit recapture opportunities to help keep students on track. GED Option Two would be seen as a last resort, he said, for juniors and seniors who are in danger of dropping out and not graduating.

The district is only expecting a few students to qualify for the program for now, but it could affect dozens in future years.

The option had originally been presented to the board Jan. 16, but board members requested that it go through the committee process before final approval.

Board member Al Pyatskowitz said

he wanted to hear from the board's student representatives on the proposal, but the trio were mum on the issue.

Board member Sam Sousek didn't have any problem articulating his feelings, though.

"I think it's an excellent program," Sousek said.

Board member Bobbi Lemerond agreed.

"It was a very good presentation, and it will benefit students who really need it," Lemerond said.

Kussel orders after-the-fact variance null and void

Homeowner ordered to deconstruct deck addition on Washington Lake

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. ruled March 6 that the Shawano County Board of Adjustment's decision to grant an after-the-fact variance for a deck addition null and void.

The ruling comes after Shawano resident Carney Garcia had reported violations to Shawano County regarding a shared property lot on Washington Lake in July 2021. Garcia reported that two homeowners had built an extension on a deck four feet into the shared lot without pulling permits and using 2-foot setbacks, instead of 25-foot setbacks.

During a Board of Adjustment meeting in April 2022, the board voted 3-2 to grant an after-the-fact variance to the homeowners. Garcia then filed a writ of certiorari for the Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court to review the ruling.

During Kussel's oral ruling, he opened the meeting introducing attor-

ney Josiah Stein, who was representing Garcia, and attorney Andrew Smith representing the Shawano County Board of Adjustment.

"This matter involves the after-the-fact variance request regarding the expansion of the deck with compliments to the Shawano County zoning ordinance, which the board, by a 3-2 decision, granted the request," said Kussel.

Kussel said that Garcia is one of the neighbors who was impacted by the variance and said the the actions of the board of adjustment were deficient to grant the variance. When reviewing the information, Kussel said that the board of adjustment is to detail why they made a decision, something that Stein argued that the board did not do during the oral arguments court hearing on Jan. 24.

"In this case, the only real detail to why the board acted as they did stated as follows, 'If we are going to all of sudden start obeying the rules as rules, then instead of giving people a variance, you hand them this and tell

them it is no — you can't do anything different," said Kussel, reading from the April Shawano County Board of Adjustment meeting. "I say to the people that say you have done this, just remember do onto others as you would have them do onto you. That doors swings both ways, and we have cut a lot of slack on lake variances. We try to let people make the most out of their properties.

"I think our job here is flexibility — we are just talking about four feet," said Kussel, continuing to read the quote.

Even though the board of adjustment passed an after-the-fact variance based on "neighborly kindness," allowing the homeowner to maximize their property, Kussel said that does not fall in line with the standard set by Shawano County.

"That ordinance defines what is a necessary hardship or property limitations for protection of public interest," said Kussel. "The board failed to consider the standards required by the ordinance or at least failed to detail

their decision regarding those standards. The reason stated by the board shows that either inadvertently or intentionally failed to call the standards for variance review criteria. Therefore, evidence is that the board's decision was based upon their will, not their judgment."

Kussel went on to say the court agrees with the Shawano County Board of Adjustment on its decision to have a meeting to discuss the variance, but he said that wasn't enough.

"That's not enough since they failed to follow procedures as to properly applying the law and detailing the basis for their decision," said Kussel.

Kussel judicated the board's decision to grant the after-the-fact variance and ordered that the property return to the condition prior to the construction of the 4-foot addition to the deck. He said that the homeowner has 90 days from Kussel's ruling to make the change, and that they are in charge of deconstructing the deck.

Pursuant to Section 174.052 Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Shawano County that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the statutes.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies of all dogs is required (Section 95.21 (2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 5 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. Older vaccinated dogs must be revaccinated when the certificates expires or within 3 years of the previous vaccination. Presentation of evidence that the dog is currently immunized against rabies must be presented when obtaining dog licenses.

All dogs 5 months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00 upon presentation or evidence attesting to the same and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unsplayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year. These minimums may be supplemented by local municipal action. The fee for a multiple dog license is \$35.00 for the first 12 dogs. There is an additional fee of \$3.00 for each dog over 12 dogs.

PENALTIES

A late fee of \$5.00 shall be assessed the owner of each dog 5 months of age or over who fails to obtain a dog license by April 1, 2023.

An owner who fails to have a dog vaccinated against rabies as required by statute may be required to forfeit not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00. 2023 dog licenses must be obtained from your local treasurer.

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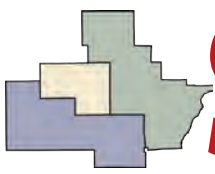

Hawks' season ends after regional final loss

Hawks topped Wausau East in previous round

The Shawano Community High School boys basketball team wasn't able to finish off a second-half comeback effort in a 77-65 Division 2 regional final loss to Mosinee on March 4 in Shawano.

After trailing by double digits at halftime and for a good chunk of the second half, the second-seeded Hawks got back within two after a 9-0 run. A Luke Guenther 3-pointer, Michael Metcalf-Grassman three-point play and Jacob Landon triple provided the points on the run.

Third-seeded Mosinee answered back with the next five points, but Shawano wasn't done yet. Metcalf-Grassman converted a shot and Julian Perez hit a triple to get the Hawks within four with still over six minutes to play.

The visitors responded with a 3-pointer of their own, but buckets from Landon and Logan Sipple brought Shawano within three, 58-55, with over four minutes to play.

"Every time we'd get close, they'd come down and hit another tough shot and answer back," said Shawano's Brandon Reed. "They just kept answering."

The back-and-forth theme continued for the next couple minutes. Mosinee went back up seven before a Guenther basket. Mosinee scored about 20 seconds later before Sipple scored a quick basket on the other end. Mosinee scored on its end before Sipple scored again for the Hawks.

With just 1:40 left in the contest, Shawano decided to put the pressure on Mosinee at the free-throw line, where the visitors had struggled most of the second half. When the shots counted the most, Mosinee came through, making 11 of its 18 attempts in the final 100 seconds of the contest. While the seven misses left the door open for Shawano, the hosts were only able to convert one field goal in that span.

Mosinee made one free throw on the first chance at the charity stripe,

and Landon made two on the other end to get Shawano within four. The next time the Hawks scored, Mosinee had built a nine-point advantage, and Metcalf-Grassman's bucket with under 50 seconds to play proved to be the team's final points of the contest and season.

"I mean, I give credit to our team. We had a heck of a comeback, we were battling, we battled to the end," said Metcalf-Grassman. "They just made plays. I mean, we got it within two a couple times and they

just hit 3s and made plays. They are good."

Bears fall short in sectional semifinal

Bonduel ousted by Mishicot

The Bonduel High School girls basketball team had its state dreams dashed by Mishicot in a Division 4 sectional semifinal playoff game on March 2 in Oconto Falls.

Bonduel fouls and Mishicot free throws were a big theme in the second half and proved to be the deciding factor in the final seconds. Bonduel was whistled for a foul with 1.9 seconds left, allowing Mishicot to make two free throws and come away with a 42-40 win.

It was another heartbreaking finish to a season for Bonduel, which was ousted from the playoffs on a last-second 3-pointer against Westfield in a sectional title game last winter.

Much like that contest, Bonduel needed a comeback effort just to potentially send the game into overtime. This time around, Bonduel led for a good portion of the game.

Bonduel was up 34-30 with over six minutes to play, but Mishicot cut into the deficit with a field goal with roughly five minutes to go. Mishicot only hit one more field goal in the contest, but got to the free-throw line several times to surge ahead.

By the end of the game, Mishicot attempted 18 more free throws than Bonduel. The Bears were whistled for 18 fouls, while Mishicot had just six.

A free throw with 4:05 to play and another with 3:16 to play tied the game at 34. Mishicot grabbed the lead with another free throw with 2:09 to play and then were awarded two more free throws after an offensive rebound and foul after a missed free throw that appeared to not make contact with the rim.

After Mishicot made those two free throws, Bonduel turned the ball over, leading to a breakaway layup and a five-point deficit.

The Bears continued to fight and got back within a point after a bucket from Audrey Weier and two free throws from Ella Hischke. Mishicot made a free throw to go back up two with 31.6 seconds to play, but Weier made another shot with about 15 seconds left to tie it.

Mishicot moved the ball into the

frontcourt before calling timeout with 6.8 seconds left to set up the final sequence. Mishicot missed its initial shot attempt, but got an offensive rebound and was fouled on the follow-up attempt.

Bonduel wasn't able to get a shot off in the final 1.9 seconds after a timeout of its own.

The Bears overcame a slow start to the game by working the ball into the post and getting some good looks around the basket. Bonduel led by as many as seven before taking a five-point break into halftime.

Bonduel continued to attack the paint in the second half, but the shots weren't falling nearly as frequently. The Bears had several great looks roll off the rim, sometimes two or three in

a single possession.

"Obviously, we really wanted to make those shots, especially because they were so close, but whatever happens, happens," said Kendra Troxel, one of three seniors on Bonduel's roster.

"Yeah, it was frustrating. I mean, we could have done a little better on the boards too, me included," said Hailey Zernicke. "But it is what it is, shots didn't fall."

Mishicot started the second half by scoring five of the first seven points before Bonduel's Ella Hischke hit a 3-pointer. Mishicot responded with the next five points to tie it up.

Hischke hit a couple jumpshots before Zernicke and Troxel scored to make it 34-30.

In the first half, it was Weier who led the Bears, scoring 12 of the team's 21 points. She finished with 16 points and three steals.

Bonduel struggled to get going offensively at the start of the game, with Josie Anvelink coming off the bench and getting the team's first points about 3½ minutes into play.

Weier had the next four points before a Zernicke triple and basket from Weier tied it at 11. Another Weier basket with about five minutes to play in the half gave the Bears their first lead.

More strong defense led to a fastbreak layup from Bonduel's Hailee Thompson. After a Mishicot 3-pointer, Weier hit two more shots before Anvelink capped the team's scoring in the opening half with a basket.

The loss left Bonduel with a 22-5 record on the season, which included a 13-1 mark to win the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division by a game. The Bears last loss before the sectional semifinal was back on Dec. 29.

Coach Jerry Reinke thanked his three seniors — Troxel, Macy Niles and Bella Delzer — for their contributions and leadership over the year and their careers.

He then laid some of the groundwork on what the team needs to focus on in order to help the program take the next step and reach state.

"We gotta get out and work in the offseason. I think we gotta be able to shoot a little bit more from the perimeter, obviously we can get in the paint and play through that but it's going to take work in the offseason to get to that next level," Reinke said.

The Bears will return their top four scorers and hope to use the feeling of the sectional semifinal loss to fuel them.

"We'll all use it as motivation," said Hischke. "It ended the same way last year, just one game farther. We're all in the gym in the summer, we all go to summer league games. Our team works hard in the summer, so I think it'll pay off."

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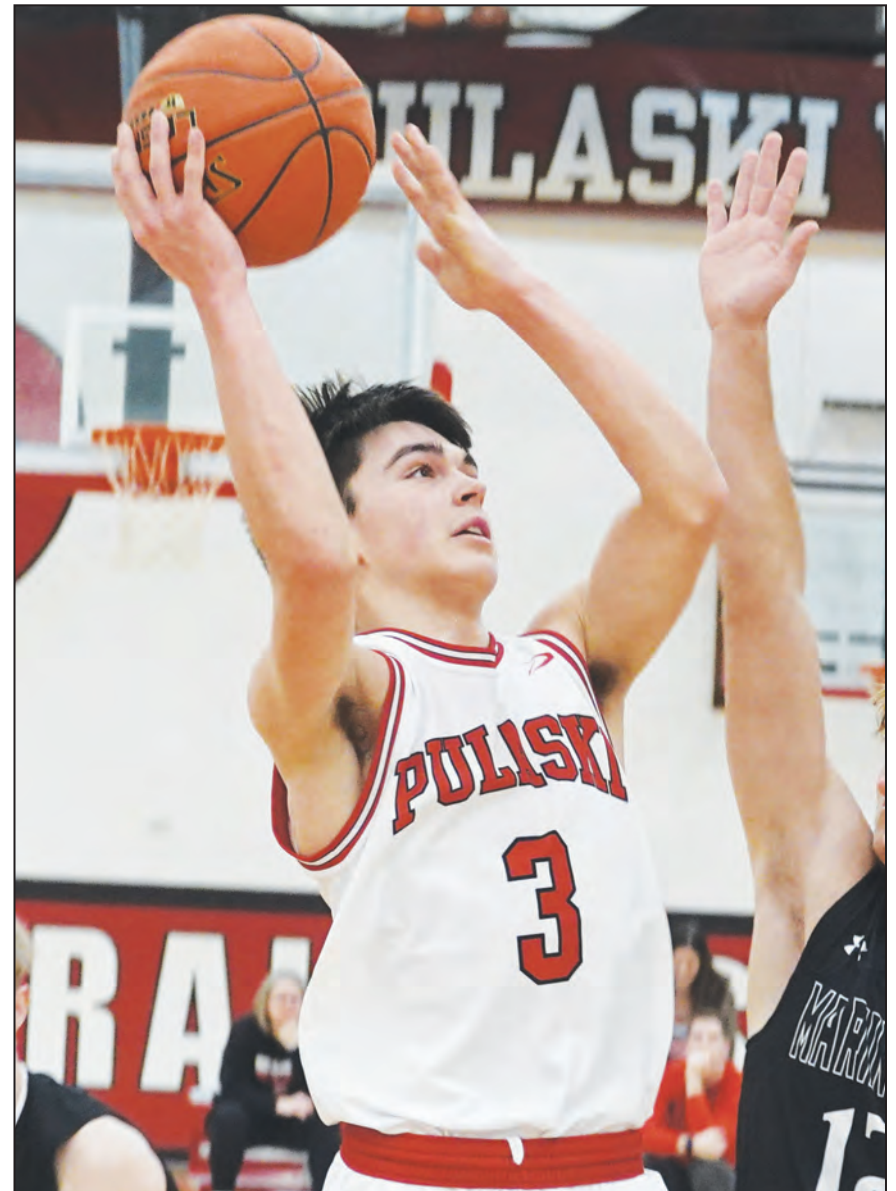

Teen's tractor business a real moneymaker

Sidney Sylvester's gift of 3-D printer turns into successful plan to pay for college

Many high school seniors are trying to figure out how to pay for college, whether with the help of family, scholarships or even loans.

Sidney Sylvester, a senior at Lena High School, isn't too worried about that, as he's already got a plan to pay four years of tuition in the bag, and it's all through making toy tractors.

Making the tractors has been a way of life all through high school for Sylvester, who received a 3-D resin printer as a gift when he was in seventh grade.

"For years, I would use

that printer to create whatever I wanted, whether it be a phone case, a phone stand or any little models," Sylvester said. "That gave me a lot of experience in computer-aided design, which then gave me the skills I needed when my brother asked me to 3-D print him a pulling tractor, because he'd always been interested in toy tractors since he was little."

Sylvester estimated it took him about 15 hours to design and print that first tractor. He decided to design five more and try to sell them on Facebook. Right away, he received orders for 30 tractors among those initial designs.

"From there, we made more and more, and now we sell 74 different products today," Sylvester said, noting that includes kits for people to build the tractors themselves and individual parts for people to design their own tractors, like engines, steering wheels and chassis.

In addition to becoming wildly popular through the internet, Sylvester's company, J&S Customs, has helped him earn plenty of money and given him a chance to compete recently at a Wisconsin Junior Achievement competition comparable to the ABC series "Shark Tank."

The prize was a \$10,000 scholarship, but even though Sylvester didn't win, it appears he didn't even need it as he prepares to embark on the next four years at University of Wisconsin-Platteville, where

he plans to pursue a degree in electrical engineering and eventually hopes to work in aerospace at NASA. Sylvester doesn't plan on putting his successful business on hold, however, as he said he's going to spend the whole summer printing plenty of stock to be sold while he's in school, recruiting his brother to ship out the orders.

"I never expected to have a business, especially a business like this, in high school," Sylvester said.

Engineering was something he'd be interested in from an early age. He noted that the 3-D printer he received in seventh grade was the only Christmas gift he asked for that year.

"That tool was what honestly enabled me to further my skills, and then those skills allowed me to upgrade my machines and then start my business," said Sylvester, who noted he had as many as seven 3-D printers at one point creating the

toys but currently has three large ones in operation. "It's all a big snowball effect. Once you get something started, you can keep working off of what you have."

Sylvester noted that it's easy for him to make custom 1/64-scale models. Customers send photos of their personal pulling tractors, and he can make the model from there.

Paying for tuition doesn't appear to be a problem for Sylvester, if his business plan holds. In 2022, he made \$26,000 off of creating and selling his custom tractors and other items, with only \$10,000 in expenses. This year, he projected he would make \$56,000, more than double the previous year, but he expects that could go up as the projection was made prior to his decision to build surplus stock to be sold while he's in Platteville.

"Popularity and range of products is what I think is driving the sales up," Sylvester said. "More people are seeing my business, and my returning customers have more products to buy now. I used to offer only 10 or 15 tractors, and they could

only buy a certain amount, but now they have a wide range of products to choose from that they can get more and more and more."

Sylvester has already received several requests to sell his items at retail, and he even had an offer to buy out his business, which he declined.

The business hasn't been a hindrance to Sylvester's high school education, as he boasted a 3.85 grade-point average.

"I've been able to do most of my homework at school," Sylvester said. "There are very few projects I've had to take home, so that frees up time in the evening to get more work done and make more profits."

If Sylvester does get his dream job at NASA, he might retire from building custom tractors and other items. He anticipates the business could go to his brother and inspire more creative customs.

"Things change so quickly, so I honestly don't know right now," Sylvester said.

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CMN's 30th year of restoring Native nations

When President Christopher Caldwell thinks about College of Menominee Nation's 30th anniversary, he thinks about netaenawemakanak. The Menominee word translates to English as "all my relations," which he sees as a component of the "generational" nature of the college.

Caldwell explained: "This anniversary reminds us of the continual handing down to the next in line to lead. It reminds us to take time to pause, reflect, and learn from our stories."

CMN's story began when Virginia Nuske called founding President Dr. Verna Fowler. On behalf of the Menominee Tribal Legislature, Nuske asked Fowler to return to the reservation to establish the college. At the time, Fowler had aspirations of becoming a college professor, but she agreed to shelve those plans in order to serve her people.

Fowler is quoted in the March 12, 1993, edition of the Shawano Leader, explaining: "I began to think of the Menominee people, and what this would mean to all of us." The article's reporter, David Niles, captured that, in the speech at the college's launch, Fowler "recalled the past struggles of the tribe, and how she believes education would help the tribe deal with those struggles and crisis."

In that same story, Tribal Chairman Glen Miller stated that the creation of CMN would allow "the Menominee to strengthen themselves and contribute to the strengthening of American society."

Thirty years later, CMN has graduated over 1,200 students while boasting an average class size of one faculty member for every four students. CMN students past and present represent 83 Native nations and 93% of the school's alumni matriculated without incurring any debt. Its graduates serve in a variety of roles, contributing to the success of private businesses, public entities, and tribal nations.

Similarities to CMN's founding are evident in its leadership today. Like Fowler, Caldwell imagined a different future prior to being called to lead the school. Caldwell said: "I grew up in the shadow of the saw-

mill. My intent was to be a forester, but you have to be prepared for leadership."

Caldwell took the helm at CMN in February 2020. He reflected: "What I found when I came into this role was that the lessons of forest management applied to education. It's a story of relationships. How we care for the forest and the people."

"Our elders said that if you take care of the forest, it will take care of you. At CMN, we say, if the college takes care of the students, the students will take care of the college."

Applying the wisdom inherent in the mantra of Menominee sustainable forestry practices to education has proven essential to CMN's success. The school's top three leadership positions are all currently held by its alumni — President Caldwell, Chief Academic Officer Geraldine Sanapaw, and Chief Financial Officer George Otradovec.

Caldwell noted that this leadership team often thinks about their successors. He said: "We think it's

more than likely that the future leaders at CMN are walking our hallways today."

Evidence of the leadership team's premonition can be found in the CMN students who traveled to Washington, D.C. last month. They spoke to lawmakers on behalf of the 35 tribal colleges, sharing what CMN has meant to them and their future.

Oneida tribal member Rita Reiter is one such student. The business administration major stated that the experience was profound. She said: "CMN has provided me with more than I anticipated. I am empowered as a Native American, and the staff truly put me in a position to give back. Someday I hope to teach at College of Menominee Nation so that I too can be an example to our Indigenous people."

Still, CMN is not resting on its laurels. Caldwell pointed out that the school's charter called for it to "serve Menominee people — it doesn't say to only educate those living on the reservation."

"Relocation led to Menominee diaspora," Caldwell explained about the 1950s federal policy. "We now have the ability for online classes and remote learning. We are reaching out to Menominee people. We are inviting other Indigenous people to 'come learn with us,' both physically and virtually. We want to create a physical pathway for those who want a long-term connection."

Caldwell summarized: "When we focus on the 30th anniversary, we focus on the past while thinking about the future. It comes back to generational. We're thinking about the sustainability of the institution and how we reflect Menominee values."

To put it another way, CMN's president sees the school's most recent milestone as another opportunity to take stock on how it can best serve the people whom he calls netaenawemakanak.

Radio personality prefers teaching over trophies

Marc Drewek, a weekly outdoors radio show host for more than a dozen years, has an enviable number of big bucks under his belt and still enjoys chasing them with bow, muzzleloader and rifle.

Today, he'd rather teach newcomers about hunting through the state's Learn to Hunt program or on his own.

"I was deer hunting when stands were little wooden planks in the trees," said Drewek, 63, as he spoke to members of the Clintonville Bow Hunters Club on Feb. 25 at Northwinds Banquet Hall in Marion during its annual banquet. "I love to go out and hunt, but it's time now to give more than I take. That's what's going to continue and maintain stewardship of the outdoors."

Since 2010, the Neenah resident had hosted "Living the Outdoors" on The Score, 95.3 FM, at 5 p.m. Wednesdays. The show's recorded podcasts are available on demand at www.TheScorewi.com.

If you live in the Fox Valley and enjoy hunting and archery, you've probably crossed paths with him either at the former Gander Mountain store in Grand Chute (where he worked as guns and archery manager for 10 years) or The Real Shot in Appleton, where he was store manager for 12 years. Drewek has set up and tuned hundreds of compound bows in his career.

Drewek's love for hunting started with grouse hunts with his dad, and duck hunts with high school pals around Glendale, where he grew up and graduated high school in 1978. He did lots of grouse and woodcock hunting in Langlade County and near Spread Eagle in Florence County.

He's since pursued deer and waterfowl in at least a dozen states, with frequent trips to Iowa, Minnesota and Colorado. He owned and hunted on property in Iola for 17 years. He's run out of room for big racks on his walls, with some in storage. He estimates he's tagged 15 ranging from 125 to 180 points (if scored by Pope and Young or Boone and Crockett record book scorers), including 10 with the bow and others with muzzleloader, shot-

gun and rifle. Ironically, he's never had one officially scored for the books — he's just not interested.

"It's not that I needed to kill more deer," he said. He's switched over to focusing on waterfowl in recent years.

His real passion today and for the past 20 years or so is introducing others to outdoors adventures.

He does it both on his own — he recently introduced his taxidermist to grouse hunting, helping him bag his first bird — and through the

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Learn to Hunt program, focusing on turkey hunting.

DNR wardens on his radio show's "Ask the Game Warden" monthly segment asked him if he wanted to help with the Learn to Hunt program, and he began helping at the Outagamie Conservation Club in Hortonville.

Learn to Hunt uses four hours of classroom and field instruction before the newcomer hunts with a qualified mentor, according to the DNR website. The program is open to most ages and in some cases, license requirements are waived. You can learn more or sign up at <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/Education/OutdoorSkills/lth>.

The DNR also offers webinars for more information. All hunters must first obtain a DNR customer ID number online (this number is linked to your licenses and permits as long as you hunt and fish in Wisconsin).

Drewek also introduced about 75 women to archery during a women's archery event at The Real Shot. He's watched the progress of some of them as they became avid bowhunters or target archers.

He called his recent work on the Learn to Hunt program "life-changing."

"We all started at the bottom somewhere along the line," he said, explaining that he tells rookies everything not to do. "The outdoor life is a pretty special thing. It's my happy place. It will put you in a better place. If you have the opportunity to impact another person's life in the outdoors, take advantage of it."

He compared hunting and other outdoor pursuits (he also enjoys fly fishing for trout and tying his own flies) as therapy, a welcome respite to life's everyday duties.

The reward comes when those novice hunters approach him later and say, "Now I understand why you turkey hunt."

Those of us who have hunted and otherwise enjoyed the beauty and soul-cleansing powers of the outdoors (in archery legend Fred Bear's words) may underestimate these effects on newbies, Drewek said.

"The impact on their lives — it's stronger than we think it is."
