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Plans in works for former Pick 'N Save

Store in Woodlawn Plaza has sat vacant for 6 years, but manufacturing company seems interested

There could be signs of life in the former Pick 'N Save building in Woodlawn Plaza after the site has been vacant for years.

However, it's not going to be some other grocery store, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard. He told the Shawano Industrial and Commercial Development Committee on Sept. 21 that the city and Shawano County Economic Progress Inc. are working with a developer to turn the building into a production and manufacturing site with a potential retail component.

Sheppard told the committee he could not discuss which company specifically wanted to use the building, as negotiations are ongoing for the property, but he mentioned it was a company with some "name recognition."

"It would be a different use," Sheppard said. "The building size and setup is ideal for what they want to do."

If things move forward, rezoning the property will be necessary, he said, as the strip mall is not zoned for industrial use.

"Given some of the things that this could do, including job creation and just bringing in another company with name recognition, we are exploring that," Sheppard said.

The building's floor plan would need to be adjusted to accommodate the company's plans, according to Sheppard. He noted that he and Peter Thillman with SCEPI have met with the executives, gone through the building several times and had extensive conversations about the building use.

"It is a different use, but it's been a challenge with big box stores filling them as they go vacant," Sheppard

said. "Currently, the way things are, they're getting harder to fill. When you've got a 50,000-square-foot facility just sitting there empty, it becomes attractive for larger production-type uses."

Mayor Bruce Milavitz noted that the loading docks in the building are a plus for the manufacturing company, "so it makes it very useful for them."

"In talking with the owner of the strip mall, he went to a meeting with other mall owners, and they all struggle with the same thing — these large areas — and they need to start thinking out of the box more of how to utilize (the space) to benefit the community," Milavitz said. "I believe this company would do all of that."

Sheppard noted that the building being set back so far from Green Bay Street makes finding another grocery store operator willing to move in problematic, so having a manufactur-

er fill the space might be the simpler solution.

"It's not ideal," Sheppard said. "You'd really like to have Green Bay Street frontage. While it's accessible and (the mall is) on Green Bay Street, the location is not ideal to bring something big and new."

Sheppard noted that more details could be revealed at the commission's next meeting on Oct. 19.

Pick 'N Save closed its Shawano operation in June 2017, with parent company Roundy's claiming in a written statement that the store was not meeting long-term performance goals. The closure was another blow to Woodlawn Plaza after its other anchor store, Kmart, closed a few years earlier. Dunham's has filled up some of the former Kmart space, but the remaining area is still vacant.

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Over 2,000 bookings at county jail in 2022

Sheriff's office releases annual report that shows number of incidents down from last year

Shawano County deputies made an average of 1.77 arrests each day last year and booked more than 2,000 people into the county jail throughout the 12 months of 2022.

Those numbers and more are part of the 2022 sheriff's office annual report filed last month with the Shawano County Board of Supervisors.

Crimes against persons, property and society generally ran between 40 and 80 each month, with a low of 37 in March and a high of 81 in November.

Crime against property include burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, forgery, fraud and vandalism. Of

these crimes, there were 48 arrests made and 55 of 266 cases cleared.

Crime against persons included assaults, sex offenses, and one non-forcible sex offense. Of these, there were 61 arrests, and 73 of 119 offenses cleared.

Crimes against society include weapons and drug violations. These resulted in 186 arrests, with 281 of 321 offenses cleared.

All told, deputies made 647 total arrests, which included 572 adults and 75 juveniles.

Arrests of adults included 139 driving under the influence and 81 disorderly conducts. Juvenile arrests included 39 disorderly conducts and three trespassing.

Law enforcement incidents across all of Shawano County in-

cluded 13,044 by the sheriff's office, down from the 14,987 reported in 2021.

City of Shawano police incidents were reported at 8,236, also down from the 8,498 of 2021. Stockbridge-Munsee police reported 1,720 incidents, up from the 823 of 2021.

Total incidents numbered 23,090, down from the 24,308 reported in 2021.

In addition to courtroom security, general patrol duties, and tickets and paperwork, deputies also spend a lot of time transporting prisoners to and from the jail across the street to the courthouse for hearings. It is estimated three to six prisoners are transported daily for these hearings.

Criminal summons cases are held Tuesdays, and between three and 10

inmates are taken to these each week.

Each inmate stays with a deputy at all times, and a deputy is present for the entire court hearing. On special occasions (high profile hearings) the protocol is to have multiple deputies with one inmate.

In the jail, there were 2,229 bookings of which 65% were male and 35% female. Also, 51% of those booked were white, 42% were Native American and 4% were Black.

The average inmate spent 15 days and seven hours in the jail.

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Nonprofits in need of volunteers

Showcase allows groups to highlight missions, projects

National statistics show one in four Americans formally volunteers in their community.

From 2019-21, people ages 41-56 had the highest rate of volunteerism of all generations what percentage?. People 16-17 had the highest rate of all age groups at 28%, followed by people ages 45 to 54 at 27%.

Like is the case nationwide, Shawano County organizations could also use more help.

“A lot of our volunteers are 70-plus,” said Mark Flunker, executive director of the Wolf River Habitat for Humanity. “They have the time and help out one or two days a week. We can always use more younger members.”

Flunker was one of several dozen leaders of area groups participating in a Nonprofit Showcase on Sept. 20 at Peace United Church of Christ in Shawano. The annual event allowed residents to learn about local nonprofits’ missions, their impact in and around Shawano and how to get involved.

Flunker said the Habitat for Humanity group is in need of volunteers not only at the construction site but at the retail store, too. Help at the store can include sales but also prep work, such as stocking and other behind-the-scenes tasks.

“We can always find something for you to do that will help,” he said.

He said the six volunteers at the construction site are all older than 70, but they each volunteer a day or two a week. However, some are snowbirds and are out of the area when the weather turns colder.

“I understand they’re volunteers, and that’s why we need more people,” Flunker said.

Kathy Brown is a volunteer with the Shawano County Historical Society. Again, having additional younger volunteers would benefit the society the most.

“The hardest part is many of our members are older people, who have a lot of knowledge and time,” she said, “but we need to get some

younger members.”

The group has been 170 members, but only about 20 are active on a regular basis, she said.

Younger residents often lack the time to commit to volunteer, unless family members are involved, such as at schools.

Parents with children younger than 18 formally volunteered at a higher rate (30%) than those without children in their household (21%). Also, nationally, women volunteer at a higher rate than men.

Members of Shawano Pathways, Shawano Paddlers and Friends of the Mountain Bay Trail shared an information table at the event and are also searching for volunteers to help with the hiking, biking, kayaking and canoeing events across the county.

Several other group participated in the showcase, including Shawano Area Matthew 25, ThedaCare Girl Scouts, Shawano County Humane Society, Junior Achievement of Wisconsin-Wolf River Area and many more.

Lawmakers propose allowing baby drop boxes

Officials claim Safe Haven boxes alleviate stigma associated with relinquishing newborns

A bill to enhance Wisconsin's Safe Haven law remains in the Assembly's Committee on Children and Families, as legislators continue their discussions.

Rep. Ellen Schutt (R-Clinton), along with Sen. Joan Ballweg (R-Markesan), introduced legislation in the summer that would expand the existing safe haven law to include the use of newborn infant safety devices.

Wisconsin's current safe haven law allows parents to anonymously surrender a newborn infant believed to be fewer than 72 hours old to designated authorities. However, the law does not explicitly address or permit the use of "newborn infant safety devices," limiting relinquishment to in-person exchanges only.

The proposed law would allow a municipality to install a newborn infant safety device at a hospital, fire station or law enforcement agency building and thereby allow a parent to anonymously relinquish a child under the age of 72 hours. The legislation

aims to address the concerns and fears that may deter some parents from utilizing the safe haven law, particularly in tight-knit communities where stigma surrounding relinquishment exists.

"Allowing a parent to anonymously relinquish a child under the age of 72 hours will save numerous newborn babies," said Schutt.

Michael Richter, a local supporter of the Safe Haven baby boxes, said there are local residents who are willing to pay to install a box. He said the cost is about \$10,000.

Officials with the Shawano County Human Services Department did not respond to inquiries about the whether there have been any inquiries from women about the use of the existing law, as well as the positives and negatives about the proposed expansion.

In March, a newborn baby was left in a field in Whitewater. According to the criminal complaint, the mother admitted to leaving the baby because of fear of losing her other children due to the nature of her pregnancy.

"The heart-wrenching story driven by fear and desperation, highlights the

urgent need for solutions that can prevent such heartbreaking outcomes," Schutt said. "Baby boxes, with their potential to provide a safe and anonymous option for parents in distress, will save lives."

The founding purpose, and continuing mission, of the organization Safe Place for Newborn is to save the lives of newborns in danger of abandonment and to help preserve the health and future of their mothers.

Opponents of the Safe Haven boxes believe putting a baby into someone's arms when relinquishing the child is safer than relying on technology. When a child is dropped into a Safe Haven baby box instead of handed over to a first responder, the person who is dropping the child off loses an opportunity to get help from social services, opponents of the baby boxes claim.

The Safe Haven Law in Wisconsin was enacted on April 3, 2001.

Women can safely deliver their newborn in a hospital and still use this law. Any infant born in a hospital may be relinquished at that facility as long as the decision is made within the 72-

hour time frame.

A woman who chooses this option and safely surrenders an unharmed newborn 72 hours old or younger to EMT, hospital employee or at a fire or police station you will not be asked any questions or punished in any way.

Once a woman makes the decision to choose Safe Haven for their baby, all identifying information is removed from the infant's medical record. When the infant is reported to the local child welfare agency, the mother's name is not provided.

Safe Haven infants are kept safe at the hospital until medically stable to be released to their pre-adoptive home. All infants are discharged directly to pre-adoptive families. They do not move through several foster homes. They are placed with a family pre-approved for adoption where a child welfare agency monitors the child's well-being until the adoption is finalized.

Schools that teach human growth and development are required to also explain the state's Safe Haven law.

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2 semis collide Sept. 21 on Highway 47; 1 person hurt

State Highway 47 was closed for about seven hours Sept. 21 after law enforcement dealt with the aftermath of two semis colliding.

At about 7:50 a.m., Shawano County sheriff's deputies responded to a report of a two-vehicle crash just north of County Road S. The initial report indicated this crash involved two semitrailers with road

blockage and injuries. Upon arriving on scene, both semis were disabled in the lane of travel and the entirety of Highway 47 in that area was closed. Detours were set up to re-route traffic, according to a sheriff's department press release.

Upon investigating the crash, it was determined the semi traveling northbound crossed the center line.

The driver of the southbound semi attempted to avoid the crash and swerved toward the northbound lane. The semis then struck each other in the southbound lane of travel.

The driver of the semi headed northbound had minor injuries and was transported by ambulance to a local hospital. The driver of the semi headed southbound did not sustain any injuries.

Highway 47 remained closed

while the crash was investigated and the semis were able to be removed. The highway was reopened for travel just after 3 p.m.

Shawano Ambulance Service, Navarino-Lessor EMS, Bonduel Fire Department, Navarino-Lessor Fire Department, Shawano County Highway Department, Wisconsin State Patrol, and Crosby's Heavy Duty Wrecker Service assisted at the scene.



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Wagenson elected to Wisconsin Soybean Board

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection has announced that Matthew Wagenson, of Bear Creek, has been elected to the Wisconsin Soybean Board as the representative for the 7th District, starting his three-year term on Sept. 1.

Wagenson will represent Shawano, Menominee, Oconto, Brown, Calumet, Door, Florence, Forest, Kewaunee, Langlade, Lincoln, Marinette, Oneida, Outagamie, Vilas and

Waupaca counties.

The soybean board is composed of seven producers in seven districts across the state. The board oversees the collection and use of about \$2 million in assessment fees paid by Wisconsin soybean producers. This funding is used to support the soybean industry through research, education and promotion of Wisconsin-grown soybeans.

NWTC president takes pulse of Shawano

Listening session shows Raney about various issues community faces from pandemic, work gaps

Northeast Wisconsin Technical College President Kristin Raney has been touring the college's various campuses trying to find out what the college can do better, and she paid a visit Sept. 20 to Shawano.

Raney said she and her staff are hoping to get a lot of issues addressed as the community listening sessions take place.

"We really want to hear key issues and opportunities and priorities that are unique to the communities that NWTC serves so, when we're done with our listening tour, we have a really good sense of some of the issues that are not only unique but also prevalent things we start to hear across the district that NWTC serves," Raney said. "I think that's really important at any time, but that's really important as a new president."

Raney has 20 years of experience in the technical college system, describing it as a calling, along with some time at St. Paul College in Minnesota and Eastern Iowa Community College. She believes her experience outside the technical college system will help her to develop some fresh ideas that can be adapted to places like NWTC.

Raney took her post with NWTC the last week of June and quickly learned about where it has been in the past 26 years while Jeff Rafn was president. Now, however, it's important to figure out where to take the technical college in the future, she said.

"It's important for me to get into the communities and learn about all of what's happening here so that, as I continue to learn about the college, I can start making sense about some new directions where we can go as an institution," Raney said. "What are some opportunities as a college to partner with our communities, to share priorities not only from NWTC but community-based organizations, our high schools, our transfer institutions."

Marlene Gauthier noted that the pandemic and the time students spent out of school has created a gap in what students should know at a certain grade level, which particularly impacts those getting ready to enter NWTC. She

acknowledged that it wasn't just an issue for Shawano, but for all rural areas.

"They just aren't up on their reading and math," Gauthier said. "What do you see the college doing to help that situation?"

Raney noted that, even with the health emergency behind communities, the impact of COVID-19 and the pandemic that shut down schools for months is still unfolding to this day.

"We saw, at a college level, the impact on students at the sophomore and junior levels, when the pandemic began, and how it was as they completed their high school years and how stressful that was," Raney said. "Then they came to college. We could see the immediate impacts around mental health but also around a sense of loss. There were some academic gaps and readiness in some key areas, particularly around writing and communication, because everything went online."

Where the pandemic really hurt, in Raney's view, is the students who were learning to read when the pandemic took hold and how they have fallen behind as they continue to navigate the K-12 system.

"I do know that, in Brown County, the third grade reading levels have dropped significantly," Raney said. "We have to partner with and continue to look at our K-12s. The pandemic has hit them hard, and they're still reeling from that."

Raney acknowledged that shortages of teachers and other staff have also played a factor, and she hopes to find ways to help the public schools.

Kim Penske noted that another factor impacted by the pandemic was the issue of social skills and how students felt isolated. She suggested that NWTC should do what it can to encourage socialization.

"Even answering a phone is something that's not, for them, normal," Penske said. "It's a skill that, when it comes to employment, we

assume that they have that. Is that even true anymore?"

Raney said service learning is a way to institute and refresh the social skills.

"That's something NWTC thinks about when we design our academic pathways and programs," Raney said. "There's a role for faculty to design opportunities for students to work with and learn from each other."

While pandemic issues continue to be a factor, Raney wants to be sure that NWTC is still focused on its core mission, which is to make sure students are ready to enter the workforce.

"It is about developing communities and individual community members and preparing them to go to work in the community where they study," Raney said. "We want our students to have access to programs and training where they go to work in their communities."

Shawano crews to pick up leaves starting Oct. 9

The Shawano Public Works Department has scheduled Oct. 9, for the beginning of fall curbside leaf collection.

City residents should have their loose leaves to the curbside on their normal scheduled garbage collection day. City crews may run behind schedule during this time, and they appreciate residents' patience and understanding.

The limit of six bags or containers of yard waste will be waived from Oct. 9 to Nov. 22. After Nov. 22, residents must place all yard waste and leaves in paper 30-gallon capacity biodegradable bags or plastic containers and set at the curbside on their

normal garbage collection day.

Residents who place yard waste in a plastic container need a yellow "Shawano Yard Waste" sticker placed on the container clearly visible to the collection crew. Stickers are available at the Shawano Public Works office at 2905 E. Richmond St. and at Shawano City Hall at 127 S. Sawyer St.

To help city staff more efficiently collect leaves, remember the following:

- Rake leaves in windrows (a long narrow line) rather than piles next to the curb. Also, the city will not pick up anything in the alley.
- Keep windrows as close to the curb as possible but do not rake

leaves into the street.

- Keep windrows away from trees, hydrants, signs, posts, electrical pedestals, or other obstacles.
- Keep all garbage, metal, branches and sticks out of the windrows.
- Crews will not pick up any plastic bags that are filled with leaves or yard waste at any time.
- Do not park vehicles next to the leaf windrows. If crews cannot get their vacuum to the windrows, pickup will have to wait until the next collection day.

Weather may slow down the leaf picker. The vacuum will not work if the leaves are extremely wet or if it is snowing. Also, bulky limbs and

cuttings from trees and shrubs must be cut into four-foot lengths and tied into bundles not more than two feet in diameter. Wood and brush should not be placed in a container or garbage can. Place this directly on the curb.

All property owners are responsible for disposing of entire trees that are left at the terrace for collection. Grass, leaves and garden waste are composted at the landfill and can be taken to the landfill by any city resident during normal business hours, from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays. The landfill will also be open from 8 a.m. to noon Saturdays until Nov. 11.

Then there's Marion County, Kansas, a quiet area with a population well below those of either Shawano or Oconto counties where the police chief decided to take his beef with the local newspaper, the Marion County Record, to the next level by raiding the newspaper's offices and the publisher's home on Aug. 11, claiming that the newspaper impersonated a business owner or lied about the reasons why public records were needed on said business owner. The alleged crimes were the unlawful use of a computer and identity theft, with the identity charge being a felony.

Gideon Cody, the police chief, was actually being investigated by the Record after the newspaper was tipped off that he had left the police department in Kansas City under suspicious circumstances and was facing discipline and demotion. Nothing was published in the Record about the suspicions on Cody, but this was the guy who led the charge to confiscate the paper's computers, servers, cellphones and other files.

Despite the seizing of the equipment, the Record found a way to

get a paper out the next week, and the county attorney announced five days after the raid that the warrant was being withdrawn and the equipment was all being returned. However, by then, media outlets across the country had been alerted to the drama unfolding in sleepy little Marion, and they united to throw their support behind the Record.

Because it could easily have happened to them, too.

The Record is an impressive success story with 4,000 print and digital subscribers, which is quite the feat when you consider the county only has about 12,000 people. A Washington Post story noted that the Record received more than 4,300 new requests for subscriptions after the raid, which is clear

evidence that the newspaper was doing its job.

The raid might have actually emboldened the Record to do its job even better, as the reporter who hesitated to publish the information on Cody's previous law enforcement post decided to put it in the public eye and letting folks decide for themselves.

By law, police officers have to serve journalists with a subpoena when investigating a crime, and then it's up to the reporter whether or not to turn over materials. State laws shield journalists from being compelled to identify their sources or turn over unpublished material to law enforcement. Instead of doing it the right way, Cody seized the equipment in a fashion that would probably prompt applause from Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong Un.

The raid in small-town America is a clarion call to every one of us tasked with informing our communities about the activities that our elected officials. Much like the folks interviewed after school shootings who cry, "We never thought it could happen here!" this has made everyone with a notepad and

camera aware that all it takes is one corrupt individual with a badge to pierce the supposedly bulletproof laws that keep us safe.

I've been fortunate to work with law enforcement that realizes we both have jobs to do and that my prodding into certain affairs when needed isn't a threat to their jobs. However, it doesn't mean that the next police chief or sheriff that rolls into town wouldn't try to raid my office or home to find out how much information I had about questionable hijinks. It's not stopping me from doing my job, though.

National Newspapers Week is Oct. 1-7. We provide the fun photos of festivals and the charming tales of folks who have achieved great things, but we also serve as the watchdogs of government officials, a necessary thing to keep American communities like ours from becoming places where freedom is abolished. That cannot change, because once that part of the First Amendment crumbles, the other pieces aren't far behind.

Families, child care services deserve help

To the editor:

Parents and child care workers are a child's first teachers. Positive early experiences at home, child care and school are proven to prevent costly social and health and educational problems down the road for our next generation of citizens. Can we please all agree that preschool children need to have positive experiences from parents and child care centers?

Unfortunately, like many other states over several years, Wisconsin has experienced an approximate 70% loss of its child care programs — from 8,000 to 2,500. The remaining child care centers have stayed afloat during and beyond the pandemic years with the help of the federal Child Care Counts program. This has helped keep costs lower and paying workers a competitive wage. But federal funding for the program expires early 2024. Adding insult to injury, Wisconsin's majority Republican-controlled state Legislature has opted to defund the program by 50% starting this June. Why?

The bottom line reality? Wisconsin's businesses across the state are struggling to fully staff up, while at

the same time, far too many parents are unable to return to work because they cannot find child care or afford the high cost.

To specifically address child care availability and affordability, as well as broader workforce development issues, Gov. Tony Evers called for a state legislature special session on Sept. 20 to "finish your work on the 2023-25 biennial budget, and pass a comprehensive plan to address our state's chronic workforce challenges." He also stated, "Despite the benefit of the largest surplus in the state's history, Republicans rejected much of my workforce plan, all without providing any real justification, any kind of substantive debate or any meaningful alternative of their own."

It may be likely that the Republican-controlled legislature will replay their tactic of gaveling in and immediately gaveling out of the special session, thus ending any discussion about the worsening child care issue.

Other states are coming up with innovative and aggressive solutions to this problem to stay competitive. Is it too much to ask that our state legislature work with Gov. Evers to do the same?

Children and their families are our future. Let's help them. Please call your state legislators and ask them to

work together with Gov. Evers to find a solution that supports child care programs and working families in Wisconsin.

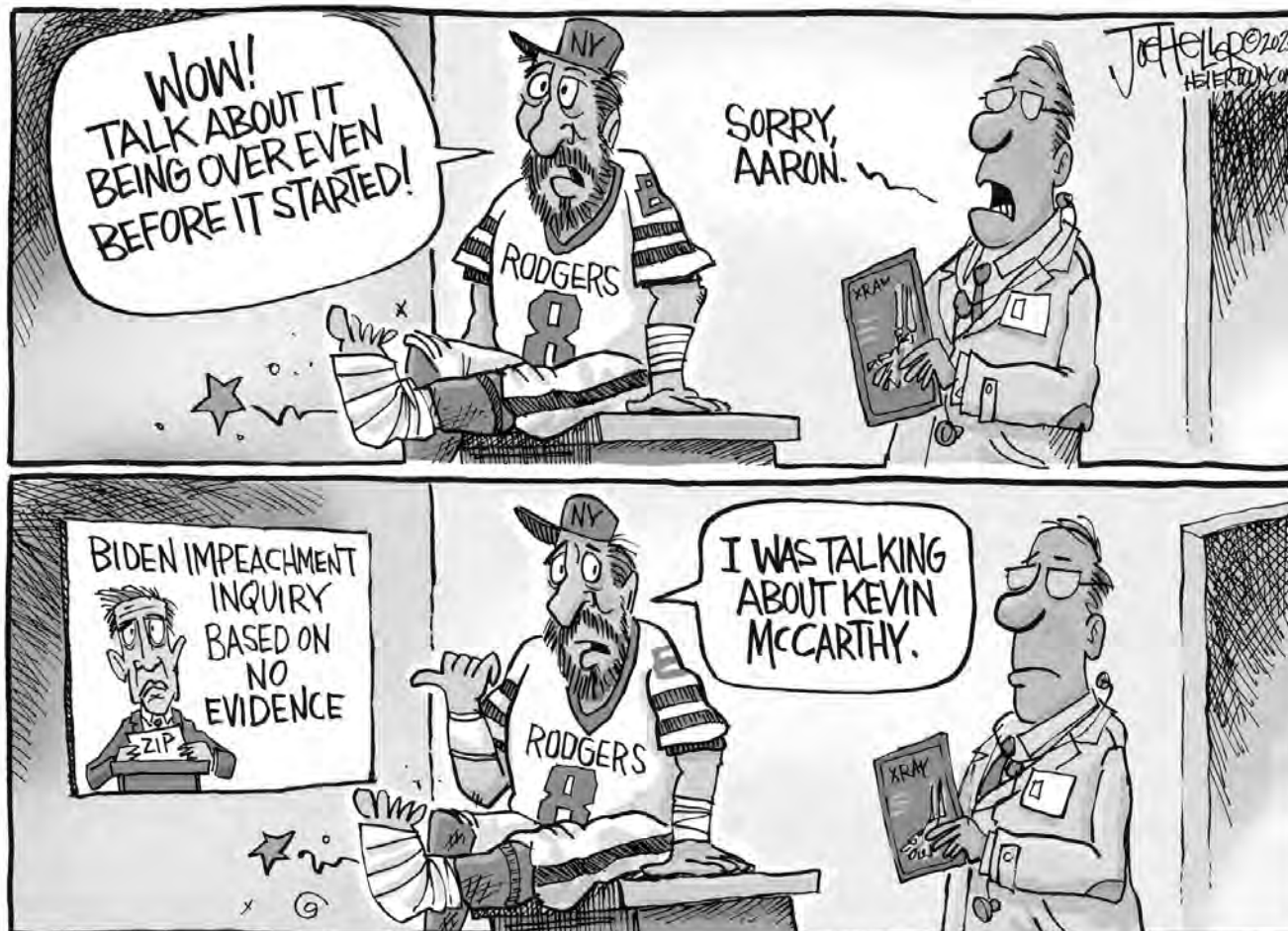

Artists congregate for beautiful displays

Annual Miles of Art to bring out woodworkers, painters and more for fun fall event

The first full weekend in October will provide plenty for art lovers to see and do as Miles of Art hits numerous locations across Shawano County.

The big site is the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, W9711 Butternut Road, Gresham, which is in the process of being restored. Megan Dorsch, chairwoman for the Miles of Art board, noted that many people are eager to see the work that is being done to restore a building that has a lot of culture and history attached to it.

"I think the Novitiate is a really nice draw for people," Dorsch said. "Not only is it a big group of artists and a lot of things to look at, but everyone wants to see the Novitiate. They're doing a lot of work on the building. The new owners have been working really hard to restore and refurbish the site."

There will also be a number of what Dorsch calls "satellite spaces," additional locations where artists will work on projects and showcase what they've already done. In Gresham, there's the Aschenbrener Bronze Studio at W10181 Cherry Road. The Menominee will show off its tribal artists and other creative types at the Menominee Logging Museum, W3426 County Road VV. Shawano has two sites where artists will play — Off the Wall Studio and Gallery, 122 S. Main St., and Pubanz Art Studio, N6725 Balsam Row Road.

"There are between 20 and 30 artists scattered around those places, with many of those artists at the Novitiate site," Dorsch said.

Among the artists are painters like Judy Pubanz and Shanti Bennett, illustrators like Dorsch, and a couple of new painters from the Green Bay area. Woodworkers will also be represented by Len Pubanz, and Darrell O'Katchikum will show off his artistic ostrich eggs with carvings of animals etched into them. Nancy Miller Korth, a Gresham artist, will showcase her pottery during Miles of Art.

A new fabric artist will join the lineup, Susan Shenek, who Dorsch said produces amazing prints

and dyed colors. Dorsch said beadwork is among some of the potential art on display.

"There'll be jewelry. There will be fabric. There'll be wood crafts," Dorsch said. "There will be lots of traditional paints and painters. We've got a lot of variety."

Besides the artists, Miles of Art will also have musicians performing at the Novitiate throughout

the day on Oct. 7. Shawano musician Joel Kroenke will perform from 10 a.m. to noon, and Dorsch said it is a sure bet that he'll have a harmonica. That performance will be followed by Dick Sarnwick and his bagpipes at noon. Poor Boys Remedy will perform at 2 p.m.

Miles of Art has been part of northeastern Wisconsin's landscape for over a decade, and despite setbacks from the pandemic, Dorsch said it continues to provide a source of pride in community artists, especially in Shawano and Menominee counties.

"I think it's a nice time of year to be outside," Dorsch said. "You're not outside when you're at the studios, but it gives you some time to drive around the county and things, see the leaves starting to turn. It also gives you a chance to see local artists that you don't necessarily see everywhere. A lot of these people don't have Facebook pages, don't necessarily have websites, so this is really a good opportunity to see fine art. It's not just a craft show. It's an art show."

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Improve shooting vision with exercise, training

You depend on your eyesight for dozens of things every day, but for shooting, vision is crucial. In a self-defense shooting, better vision could be life-saving.

Many of us wear eyeglasses, perhaps even bifocals or trifocals. Those of us over 60 may feel our vision isn't good enough for accurate shooting, whether for hunting, competition or self-defense. Mike "Ox" Ochsner argues that not only can aging eyes get the job done, but they can be improved with proper exercise and training.

Ochsner, author of "Real World Gunfight Training," was one of many expert speakers Sept. 10 as part of the three-day United States Concealed Carry Association Concealed Carry Expo in Milwaukee. The USCCA, based in West Bend, offers insurance plans and training for armed citizens.

As a shooting instructor for my own concealed carry students and an educator at Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources hunter safety classes, I sought out Ox's class to both learn and improve my teaching. I was rewarded with a wealth of information on vision and how it relates to shooting.

In hunter safety and concealed carry classes, we teach the importance of determining your master eye — the eye that dominates over the other one. Usually this is done by creating a small circle by forming a circle with the fingers of both hands outstretched in front of you,

then closing one eye at a time to see which one is directly looking at the target. Over many decades of doing this, I've encountered a few students who are unable to figure out which eye is dominant, and thought it was because they didn't listen to the instructions. Apparently I was wrong.

Ochsner, during his "See Quicker, Shoot Quicker" seminar, said there are actually four types of eye dominance: left, right, cyclopean (11%) and shared/mixed or unstable (20%). This last group is a hybrid and can change. Information on cyclopean dominance can be found at <https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC7141094>.

For those who are right-handed and right-eye dominant, shooting a handgun with both eyes open is easy. Just point the handgun from the right side of the body, focus on the front sight, line up the sight in the rear sight, center the front sight on the target and squeeze the trigger. For those like me who are right-handed but left-eye dominant, it's easy to just bring the handgun

across the body to the left side, line up the front sight with the left eye and repeat the other steps needed to hit the target.

If you hunt with a scoped rifle, eye dominance isn't crucial, since you will likely close your non-scoped eye anyway. I was 34 years old when I discovered I was left-eye dominant and by that time I had acquired quite a few right-handed rifles and shotguns, so I sure wasn't going to learn to shoot left-handed.

Handgun shooters should always shoot with both eyes open for many reasons. If you are defending yourself in your home, closing one eye could block your view of one or more attackers. Ochsner says your reaction time will be 20-30% faster with both eyes open.

Closing or squinting one eye increases eye fatigue and in a high-stress situation; it is much harder to close just one eye.

Older eyes can be dry and literally out of shape because they are not exercising enough. The eyes are not getting as much glucose, he explained. Easily trainable "fast visual shifts" that can be done even when stopped at a stoplight can quickly improve vision, improve balance and reaction time, reduce flinching and even reduce brain fog and vertigo, according to Ox.

He's had success training more than 2,500 students in his techniques, which are explained in his book "Real World Gunfight

Training." In about two weeks of training, students can expect to be able to read clearly two font sizes smaller. The improvements also translate to safer driving.

His techniques may even improve ADHD and other attention issues, he noted.

One technique he demonstrated in class was a long-advocated method called palming. We closed our eyes and placed our palms on both eyes, holding light pressure for about a minute while also taking deep breaths. This calms the sympathetic nervous system and, after an initial blur, improves vision, he said. Ox used to use this when working on a SWAT team just before an entry breach to improve focus.

Ochsner's techniques often bring about improved shooter training more quickly and efficiently, according to many of his students and experts in the field.

Consider getting these 3 vaccines this fall

Dear Savvy Senior:

Which vaccines are recommended for Medicare seniors this flu season?

Just Turned 65

Dear Just Turned:

There are actually three different types of vaccines seniors should consider getting this fall to protect against a repeat of last winter's "triple-demic" of respiratory illnesses, which included flu, RSV and coronavirus. Here's a rundown of the different vaccines the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is recommending and how they are covered by Medicare.

For people age 65 and older, there are three flu vaccines (you only need one) that the CDC recommends over traditional flu shots.

These FDA-approved vaccines provide extra protection beyond what a standard flu shot does, which is important for older adults who have weaker immune defenses and have a greater risk of developing dangerous flu complications compared with younger, healthy adults. The three senior-specific options include the:

- Fluzone High-Dose Quadrivalent vaccine, which contains four times the amount of antigen as a regular flu shot does, creating a stronger immune response for better protection.

- Flud Quadrivalent vaccine, which contains an added ingredient called adjuvant MF59 that also helps create a stronger immune response.

- FluBlok Quadrivalent vaccine, is a recombinant protein (egg-free) flu vaccine that contains three times the amount of antigen as compared with a regular flu shot.

There isn't enough evidence yet to indicate whether one of these three vaccines provides superior protection over the other two for seniors.

As for side effects, you should

know that the Fluzone High-Dose and Flud vaccines can cause more of the mild side effects that can occur with a standard-dose flu shot, like pain or tenderness where you got the shot, muscle aches, headache or fatigue. The side effects of FluBlok tend to be a little less frequent.

All flu vaccines are covered 100% by Medicare Part B as long as your doctor, health clinic or pharmacy agrees not to charge you more than Medicare pays.

Anyone age 60 and older, especially if you have any heart or lung conditions, diabetes, kidney or liver disorders that make you vulnerable to the respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) should consider getting one of the new FDA approved RSV vaccines (either Arexvy or Abrysvo).

These vaccines, recommended by the CDC, will help protect older and immunocompromised adults from respiratory illness, which is responsible for 6,000 to 10,000 deaths and at least 60,000 hospitalizations each year in seniors 65 and older.

The new RSV vaccines are covered

by Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plans.

If you haven't had a COVID-19 booster shot lately, you should consider getting one this fall. Even though the public health emergency has ended and the number of cases has gone way down, it has been surging in recent months causing an increase in hospitalizations, especially among the elderly.

The updated COVID vaccine targets the XBB omicron subvariants that are some of the most dominate coronavirus variants circulating in the U.S. It will also provide protection against the EG.5 variant (Eris), which is closely related to the XBB.

Most health officials agree that it's safe to receive the flu and COVID-19 booster at the same time. Because the RSV vaccines are new this year, many doctors are recommending a two-week window between an RSV shot and the flu and/or the COVID-19 shots.

You can find all three vaccines at most pharmacies, medical clinics and health departments, or you can do a search at www.vaccines.gov.



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Speaker series to focus on Peshtigo Fire

The Oconto County Historical Society will present its monthly speaker series program at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 5 in the meeting room of the Beyer Home and Carriage Museum, 915 Park Ave., Oconto.

The October program will be on the Peshtigo Fire.

The Peshtigo Fire was a large forest fire on Oct. 8, 1871, in northeast-

ern Wisconsin, including much of the southern half of the Door Peninsula and adjacent parts of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. The largest community in the affected area was Peshtigo, which had a population of approximately 1,700 residents.

The fire burned about 1.2 million acres and is the deadliest wildfire in recorded history, with the number of

deaths estimated between 1,500 and 2,500. Although the exact number of deaths is debated, mass graves, both those already exhumed and those still being discovered in Peshtigo and the surrounding areas, show that the death toll was much greater.

The program will be presented by Karen Vincent Humiston, a genealogist and family historian. Karen has

researched the stories of hundreds of families involved in the Peshtigo Fire, on both sides of the bay. Her presentation will focus on several families and individuals — their lives leading up to the disaster and their experiences in it. The program will include lots of visual elements.

The program is free with light refreshments served.

Family apple orchard continues to grow

Stage next, pumpkin patch on the horizon

“Ugly apples are sometimes the best tasting,” said Paul Hammen, of Hammen Family Orchard and Winery on County Road E west of Bonduel.

Certain varieties, such as the knobbed russet, aren’t as red, round and shiny as the apple people would typically reach for, but Hammen attested that they can surprise with exceptional taste.

“That’s why we do apple tastings. Because there are lots of ugly apples out there,” he said. “The knobbed russet is the world’s ugliest apple but one of the best tasting apples.

“We do apple tasting every Saturday, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. We wedge up everything we have in our cooler. Last year, at our peak, we had 97 varieties. I was trying to get 100 in there, but we ended up with 97. People come with their kids and grandkids.”

Apple season at the orchard began in late July this year, along with peach season.

“We have 270 varieties of apples and 10 varieties of peaches,” Hammen said. “Lodi, sort of like a yellow transparent, and quint, a red sweet, were the first apples to ripen. We have one variety of peach left to ripen yet. We’re getting to the peak now right toward the end of the month. We’re getting to the end.”

It depends on what time during the growing season customers visit as to what varieties will be available.

According to Hammen, Saturday is the big day for apples.

“Just this weekend, all the crates were full,” he said. “As fast as we’re picking, they’re going out the door.”

The orchard operation has been going since August 2019.

“I actually started planting trees four years before that, across the highway,” he said. “I was supposed to retire, but this is my brainchild, for passing on to the kids, grandkids. We just turned into an LLC (limited liability company) and rolled it into the kids’ and grandkids’ names.

“So ... I’m their helper. But they work me like a dog. It’s fun, it’s enjoyable, it’s a hobby for me.”

Family is of high importance to Hammen. He has no employees other than his family.

His three daughters are all involved in the operations in some manner. Amber Hammen and Alyssa Wudtke are both teachers but help in a variety of ways with the storefront or other operations. Heather Olsen co-manages the Storefront Gift Shoppe and the winery with Amber Hammen.

Son-in-law Matt Wudtke keeps busy with grinding and pressing apples and almost all other areas of the business. His mother, Jeanne Wudtke, labels bottles, helps fill cider jugs, checks over the apple room and fills in as needed.

Hammen laughingly praised his grandson, Christopher Wudtke, for being the one who always does what he’s told.

“One of the most interesting pieces about working here is meeting all of the different people,” Jeanne Wudtke said. “We have people come from all over. Last year, we had a couple come from Colorado for the Packer game and came in for the wine tasting.”

“I’ve always been into the heirlooms,” Hammen added. “I used to read Mother Earth News magazine when I was a kid. And they had articles about heirloom apples, even though there are 10,000 kinds of apples out there. So I started trying to get different kinds of apples and stuff.”

He bought the land 30 years ago.

Hammen is an accomplished online researcher, seeking out how to make apple cider, for example. He

usually will follow the websites of different universities to get the most authentic information, rather than dealing with commercial websites that try to sell something. In his opinion, the University of Minnesota is the best for viniculture, the cultivation of grapes for wine making.

“The Honey Crisp apple came out of Minnesota,” he said.

He said that he’d been making wine all of his life. Currently, his grapes come from Pulaski and New London wineries.

“I’m getting 3,500 pounds of Niagara grapes, which I’ve never made before,” Hammen said. “I’m going to make that into a sweet white wine. I don’t have the room to grow a lot of grapes. It takes a lot of grapes to make wine.”

Wine tasting on weekends is also a big part of the business.

He’s started making apple cider.

“We don’t use sulfites,” Hammen said. “I think that’s a positive thing, because it can give people headaches.”

The Storefront Gift Shoppe offers sweet apple cider, which is made on the premises.

“Next week, I’ll be making cider with bitter apples, when they come in,” he said. “They make a good cider. Some of the bitters are just bitter; others are bittersweet. But it’s the blend that you want in your cider.”

Hammen has lots of ideas for expanding his business. He is interested in getting his apples into local school lunch programs. He would provide three kinds of apples, with written information about each one, as an educational component.

He’d like to expand his acreage and start a pumpkin patch with hayrides in the future. As soon as he can clear out some things in the processing area, he’ll build a stage.

“On Sunday, Oct. 1, we’ll have music starting here. We’ll have Lonesome Road and Pat Wiley from Clintonville,” he said.

He’s waiting for the state to approve his application to get the name on the blue tourism signs on the highway, to list the orchard as an attraction, which would help bring in more customers.

Fall migration brings whimbrels this way

Over our heads these days, mostly while we sleep, millions of birds are making their way south on their fall migration. Guided by the stars and other cues, they navigate great distances from their breeding grounds in the north to reach the warmer parts of North, Central and South America where they spend their winters.

I was fortunate to see a pair of one of the long distance migrants, the whimbrel, at Red Arrow Park in Marinette earlier this month when scouting for birds with the Marinette birding group. The whimbrels were foraging along the shore. According the Cornell Lab All About Birds (AAB) website, their long down-curved bills provide the perfect tool for probing the nearshore areas for invertebrates, such as crayfish, small fish and snails in our part of the world and crabs, sea cucumbers, sand shrimp, and marine worms along the ocean coasts.

Other distinguishing features of the whimbrel are its large size (about crow size), mottled brown and white feathers along its back and neck, tan belly, head capped with brown and a distinct dark line running either side of the eyes. Its size and distinctive bill make it hard to miss.

Wanting to learn more about

whimbrels, I found a shorebird story map (slide show) called “Whimbrels on the Wing,” on the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network (WHSRN) website at www.whsrn.org/whimbrels-on-the-wing.

The conservation story of these birds is told with the help of three whimbrels fitted with transmitters that are revealing valuable information on the habitats they use and their amazing migratory journeys.

Whimbrels tracked by researchers have brought to light the amazing distances these birds traverse during migration. A male bird, called T6, flew 9,160 miles from its breeding grounds in northern Alaska to southern Chile. During one year, the same bird flew nearly 20,000 miles over the course of its migratory journeys.

Another whimbrel, named Postel,

revealed the amazing stamina these birds have; they can fly for days without stopping. Postel flew 2,000 miles, non-stop, for five days on its way north from the coast of Georgia (a stopover site) to Ontario, Canada, where it rested one day, then flew two more days to reach his nesting ground near Hudson Bay. During its fall migration, after flying south to the Georgia coast once again to refuel, it flew another 3,400 miles non-stop to its wintering grounds on the coast of Brazil.

Tracking whimbrels has also shown that there are at least three separate migratory routes they take from the far north to the tropics. To help the birds on their long journeys, a series of important breeding, wintering and stopover habitat areas have been secured and are part of the WHSRN.

There are currently 119 WHSRN sites located in 20 countries covering almost 40 million acres. These sites have been championed by 443 partners who have diligently given their time and expertise to protect these areas for whimbrels and other shorebirds on the wing.

It's hopeful to know that so many people are doing so much to protect these birds across the Americas. This

is especially important considering the many threats shorebirds face along their migratory routes, including those pointed out on the AAB website; the loss or modification of coastal wetland habitats, environmental contamination, and rising sea-levels that threaten the bird's wintering and stopover habitats in particular.

It's exciting that a pair of whimbrels is using Red Arrow Park as a stopover site where they can rest and refuel. It's likely that this pair may have traveled to South America within a week of that stop.

You may not be lucky enough to see whimbrels this fall, but other birds are making their way south as well. Among them are thousands of warblers, raptors, sandhill cranes, Canada geese, ducks, egrets, pelicans and those rolling waves of blackbirds. Keep your eyes and ears open to catch some of this spectacle as fall unfolds and the skies become highways to the south for so many of our birds.

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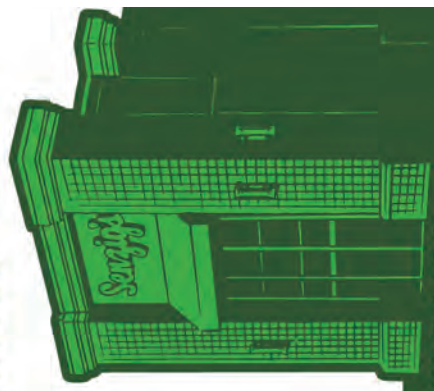
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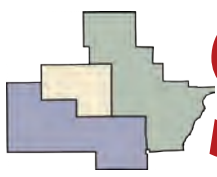
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Chargers swim team cleans up against Shawano

Packers come alive in fourth, defeat Saints

Green Bay scores 18 unanswered points for the win

The Green Bay Packers' defense held strong, shutting out the New Orleans Saints in the second half to complete an 18-point comeback and win 18-17 on Sept. 24 in Green Bay.

Entering the second half with a 17-0 deficit, Green Bay rattled off 18 points in the fourth quarter to hold the lead in the NFC North. The comeback was catalyzed by a strong fourth quarter performance from quarterback Jordan Love.

Love finished the game with 259 passing yards and one touchdown, with 104 of those yards coming in the fourth quarter. He added a rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter as well, evading former All-Pro Linebacker Demario Davis on the one-yard line.

The story of the game, though, was Green Bay's defense. In total, the New Orleans Saints were only able to muster 10 points, with seven of the team's 17 points coming from a punt return touchdown from New Orleans' Rashid Shaheed.

New Orleans' first touchdown of the game came on the team's second drive as former Packer Jimmy Graham found the end zone on an 8-yard touchdown pass from Derek Carr. The defense's strong performance came without star defensive back Jaire Alexander, who was ruled out before the game, after injuring his back in practice.

"Having a guy like that out — we have no choice but to step up, and that is what everybody did," said Packers pass rusher Rashan Gary. "One thing about this group is that we understand the standard; we understand what it is like to play at a high level. We just have to be consistent, and today is just a stepping stone to being consistent."

That touchdown to Graham proved to be Carr's only major contribution to the game, as the Fresno

State alum was knocked out of the game with a shoulder injury. Jameis Winston took over for Carr, but he proved lackluster as he threw for just 101 yards on 10-of-16 passing.

Gary's claim to being one of the best defensive players in the league was hard to argue, as he led Green Bay's defense with three sacks, including the one that knocked Carr out of the game.

"The most important thing is being an impact to this team, and I am happy that I was able to do that today," said Gary.

The turning point of the game came on Green Bay's drive that resulted in Love's rushing touchdown. The drive started with two long defensive pass interference calls, totaling 67 yards. From there, Love connected with Jayden Reed for 11 yards on third-and-10 to the New Orleans 2-yard line to extend the drive. Two incompletions and a 1-yard rush from Patrick Taylor set up a fourth-and-one, ultimately ending with Love's rushing touchdown to bring the score to 17-9. In a curious

move that ultimately paid off, coach Matt LaFleur called for a two-point attempt. Love connected with wide receiver Samori Toure to add the additional two points.

Finally, Green Bay's winning drive came late in the fourth quarter, as Love connected with wide receiver Romeo Doubs for an 8-yard touchdown to put the team up by one. The Saints quickly marched down the field but a field goal attempt from Blake Grupe missed wide right, giving Green Bay the ball back to kneel out the clock.

"I have never been a part of a win like this," said LaFleur. "The guys in the locker room — they believe in one another and they continue to battle and really, as a coach, that is all you can ask of anybody. To hold an offense to 10 points in this league, you should typically win that game, but the resiliency of that locker room was incredible. I have never seen anything like it."

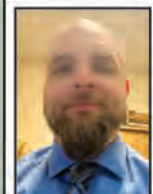

Packers' running game needs a lift

Packers' offense vs. Lions' defense

The Packers' offense was about as ugly as could be for the first three quarters on Sunday against the New Orleans Saints.

They were shut out through three quarters and had little they could hang their hats on. The injury situation on offense has been abysmal. Christian Watson, Aaron Jones, David Bakhtiari and Elgton Jenkins all missed Sunday's game with a litany of ailments.

Zach Tom exited Sunday's game with a knee injury of which the severity is unclear. If Tom can't play, Yosh Njiman would likely be called upon. The Packers have said they're confident in him, but he's already been passed on the depth chart by Rasheed Walker.

On the other side of the line of scrimmage, the Lions have a budding star as one of their pass rushers.

Aidan Hutchinson has tormented the Packers in his short career. He has two sacks and an interception in two games against them.

Hutchinson didn't have any sacks coming into Sunday's game against the Falcons but had 13 pressures in the first two games.

Typically production follows quickly with disruption numbers like that. It did for Hutchinson as he brought Desmond Ridder down twice in the team's 20-6 win.

The Lions' defensive front has been stout against the run. Opposing run games are averaging a paltry 3.2 yards per carry over the first three games.

That could present a problem for the Packers who have not been able to run the ball at all through the first three games.

Aaron Jones hasn't played since the second half of the season opener against Chicago.

AJ Dillon, who has struggled in the early going, appeared to cede some of his snaps to Patrick Taylor.

Taylor is out of practice squad elevations, and he would have to be signed to the active roster in order to play in Thursday's game.

Taylor has been the preferred second option to preseason darling Emanuel Wilson. Taylor's ability in the passing game appears to be the

difference there. He caught three passes on four targets against New Orleans.

Regardless of how the running backs are performing in the passing game, the Packers need to be more productive in the run game.

The offense isn't going to be successful all that often when Jordan Love is the team's leading rusher as he was in Sunday's game.

In Jones' absence, Packers running backs have run for 106 yards in two games. Considering this team was supposed to have a dynamic ground game, that isn't good enough.

The pass catching group was a mixed bag for the Packers on Sunday. Love has spread the ball around to a variety of receivers and had a different leading receiver in each of the first three games.

Luke Musgrave had a big game on Sunday with six catches. He was open

for what could have been the biggest play of the game, but Love missed him down the middle of the field.

If there's a place the Lions' defense can be had, it's in the secondary. CJ Gardner-Johnson is out of the lineup with an injury that ended his season.

Cam Sutton, Brian Branch and Jerry Jacobs are the team's preferred starters at cornerback. Two of the three are ranked in the bottom half of Pro Football Focus' corner grades. Branch is a rookie, which could cause Matt LaFleur to try and scheme up some opportunities for his receivers against him.

The Lions' other safety is Kerby Joseph, who caught the final pass of Aaron Rodgers' career with Green Bay.

Packers' defense vs. Lions' offense

The Packers' defense bounced back tremendously after getting

shredded by Bijan Robinson and the Atlanta Falcons' run game.

New Orleans held a three-score lead for most of the second half. They had a two-score lead until the midway point of the fourth quarter as well.

The game lent itself to New Orleans being able to run the ball and lean on Green Bay's defense that has struggled against the run traditionally.

Instead, the Packers' defense bowed its neck. They held Saints' running backs to 77 yards on 22 carries.

That was as big of a reason as any that Green Bay was able to make a dramatic comeback Sunday.

One potential pressure point for the Green Bay defense is the cornerback situation. Jaire Alexander did not play on Sunday with a back injury. His status for Thursday is unclear.

Carrington Valentine, who started in Alexander's place, left the game with a biceps injury.

That leaves the team with three healthy cornerbacks. Rasul Douglas, Keisean Nixon and Corey Ballentine.

Ballentine was elevated from the practice squad for Sunday's game. With the injury situation at cornerback, presumably he will be elevated from the practice squad again.

The shortage at cornerback comes at a time where the Packers are facing one of the more dynamic passing offenses in football.

Jared Goff is often looked at as a failed draft pick for the Rams, but he's been excellent for the Lions.

He's thrown five touchdowns through the first three weeks. He distributes the ball to all of his playmakers, but his go-to guy is Amon-Ra St. Brown.

St. Brown has caught at least 90 passes in each of his first two seasons as a pro.

He operates primarily in the slot, where he'll be met by Nixon.

Nixon is coming off a game where he blanked Saints' primary slot receiver Rashid Shaheed: 0 catches and 0 yards for Nixon's primary assignment.

Nixon had a tough first week of the season, but has been largely good since then in coverage. St. Brown, however, is a different challenge than anything he has seen on

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this young season. The winner of that matchup could go a long way toward determining who wins the game.

Apart from St. Brown, Sam Laporta scored his first touchdown of the season on Sunday. He's been a focal point in the Lions' offense early in the year. He can make an impact in both the run and passing game.

Special teams

The Packers are coming off one of their worst special teams performances on the young season.

The special teams group was penalized three times, with nothing to make up for those penalties in the return game.

The punt coverage team gave up a 76-yard touchdown to Shaheed, who was not touched on his way to the goal line.

On the bright side, Anders Carlson has not missed a kick in the regular season. He made the game-winning extra point in Sunday's 18-17 win over the Saints.

The Lions' special teams is led by return specialist Kalif Raymond. He averaged 13.2 yards per punt return a season ago.

The Lions ranked sixth in Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings

a season ago. Detroit kicker Riley Patterson has not missed a kick yet in 2023. The group led by Dave Fipp has been excellent to start the 2023 season after a strong 2022 campaign.

This could be one of the biggest advantages the Lions have in Thursday night's game.

Speaking of the run game.

The Lions have the 12th overall pick in the backfield. Jahmyr Gibbs is one of the more explosive young players in the NFL. He's also the style of back that typically gives Green Bay fits.

Gibbs isn't the same caliber that Atlanta's Bijan Robinson is. There aren't many, if any, that are as good as Robinson.

Gibbs, however, is an explosive runner with a slashing style that can attack the edges of Green Bay's defense. With a strong emphasis on rushing the quarterback, the Packers have struggled to set the edge.

Maybe that starts to change with Rashan Gary starting to earn more snaps. He played the most snaps of the season on Sunday and rewarded the defense with three sacks.

With as many guys that are missing due to injury, getting more from Gary will help soften some of that blow.

Injury report a big challenge for Packers against Lions

Packers vs. injury report

Love was greeted for his first start at Lambeau Field with an inactive list that included Christian Watson, David Bakhtiari, Elgton Jenkins and Aaron Jones.

There's an argument to be made those are the Packers' four best players on offense.

To boot, Jaire Alexander missed the game with a back injury after he popped up on the injury report on Friday. That's five of their 10 best players.

It's hard enough to win in the NFL. Every team will talk about a next man up mentality, but there's a reason the next man up is on the bench. It's hard to win in the NFL without your star players.

Should the Packers be missing any combination of those players, they'll be trying to do just that against a Lions team that has had some injury issues of its own.

Thursday's matchup against Detroit is one of the first true litmus tests for the Packers' ability to compete for a division title this season. Asking Love and company to win against a solid Lions team without their best players would be a tall order.

Packers cornerbacks

vs. Amon-Ra St. Brown

Amon-Ra St. Brown keeps a list of every receiver drafted before him in a notebook that he uses for motivation.

One of those receivers is former Green Bay Packer Amari Rodgers.

St. Brown will not be short on motivation for this game. Not that he needs much anyway. He has become the Lions' go-to guy in the passing game.

He's caught at least 90 passes in both seasons of his young career.

The Packers could be short-handed at cornerback with Alexander missing last week's game with a back injury.

Even if Alexander plays, it remains to be seen how much he matches up with St. Brown. St. Brown operates primarily from the slot, with Alexander playing on the boundary.

Alexander may travel with St. Brown some if he plays, but that won't be every snap. Keisean Nixon and Rasul Douglas should see plenty of St. Brown throughout the course

of the game as well.

When Jared Goff needs to make a big play, more often than not, he's looking for St. Brown. If the Packers can slow him down, that will go a long way toward slowing down the Lions' passing game.

Packers' offensive line

vs. Aidan Hutchinson

Aidan Hutchinson has not been in the NFL for long, but he has already become a thorn in the Packers' side.

Hutchinson was picked second overall by the Lions a year ago to

boost their pass rush and help change their culture.

He has done both.

He had 9.5 sacks as a rookie with three interceptions.

One of which came on an ill-advised pass to Bakhtiari when the Packers were in Detroit last November.

Hutchinson followed that up with two sacks at Lambeau Field in the season finale.

It's anyone's guess as to whether Bakhtiari is going to play. Even if he does, Hutchinson is a tough matchup for anyone that he lines up against.

He's had a quiet start to the season in terms of sacks but had 13 pressures going into play on Sunday. Big plays typically come in bunches when a player is around the quarterback as much as Hutchinson has been.

Rasheed Walker has been the next man up at left tackle if Bakhtiari cannot go. He struggled in Atlanta for his first career starts.

The potential struggles of a tackle making his second career start could make for a long night for Love.

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LaFleur happy with Packers' resiliency

Score reflects 1-point decision for 2nd straight game

For the second game in a row, Green Bay saw its final score come down to one point.

In fact, in a very similar fashion to how Atlanta beat Green Bay, Green Bay beat New Orleans. Against Atlanta, Green Bay played three very good quarters of football and one very bad quarter; against New Orleans, Green Bay played three really bad quarters of football and one really good quarter.

In the face of adversity, Jordan Love, Matt LaFleur and the rest of the Packers delivered and were able to squeak out a victory. That point needs to be stated, as having as young of a team as Green Bay does can often lead to losing a game like this one, as proven by the loss to Atlanta.

The adversity came even before kickoff though, as many of the Packers' best players — including David Bakhtiari, Jaire Alexander, Elgton Jenkins, Aaron Jones and Christian Watson — were out with injuries, leaving LaFleur to put a skeleton crew on the field Sunday.

"I just can't say enough great things about this group in terms of their mentality, their belief in one another, the way they work," said LaFleur. "Obviously we were short-handed. When you looked at that injury list, there were a lot of big name players on that list. But it doesn't matter, because that is the NFL, and everyone is dealing with injuries. But our guys continued to fight and continued to battle. It was like a nightmare that went to a dream."

LaFleur's comment about a nightmare becoming a dream shows that this Green Bay Packers team is not one to lay down and die when it is put into tough situations. That is something that any fan can get behind, and it is something that each member of the organization is getting behind.

LaFleur pointed to Green Bay

successfully converting the two-point conversion as when he felt that nightmare turn into a dream. The momentum and the overall vibe at Lambeau Field took a 180, and if you had just walked into the stadium, you would have thought that the Packers were about to win the NFC Championship. With such a young team, it is very easy for the players to buy into the momentum and the energy that the crowd is giving off, somewhat helping the team as a whole battle that adversity.

"After we got that two-point conversion — I have been on the other side of that thing now, when that momentum flips. It is a crazy phenomenon that you cannot explain," said LaFleur. "I think that there is a lot of belief that we were going to find a way."

While facing and overcoming adversity is great, the seemingly obvious sticking point is: How can Green Bay avoid find themselves in another 17-0 hole? Obviously, having those five key contributors back on the team is a start, but can Green Bay really rely on Bakhtiari to play every

game the rest of the season? Will the team clean up the numerous penalties in the first half that played a large part in them going down three scores? And can the Packers hold a lead once they have it?

The answers to these questions and more probably have to fall on the back of Love. While he has only started four games in the NFL, the time and preparation that he has from sitting behind Aaron Rodgers and the overall belief in him from both his teammates and the Green Bay fans is a great starting point to covering up mistakes and ultimately putting together four quarters against a team that is not the Chicago Bears.

"We went into the locker room, and we knew it wasn't good," said Love. "We knew that we were putting some drives together, but penalties and not converting third downs were hurting us. So we knew that if we stuck together, stuck to the plan and executed and locked on all of the details, that there was a chance for us (to win) — and we did."

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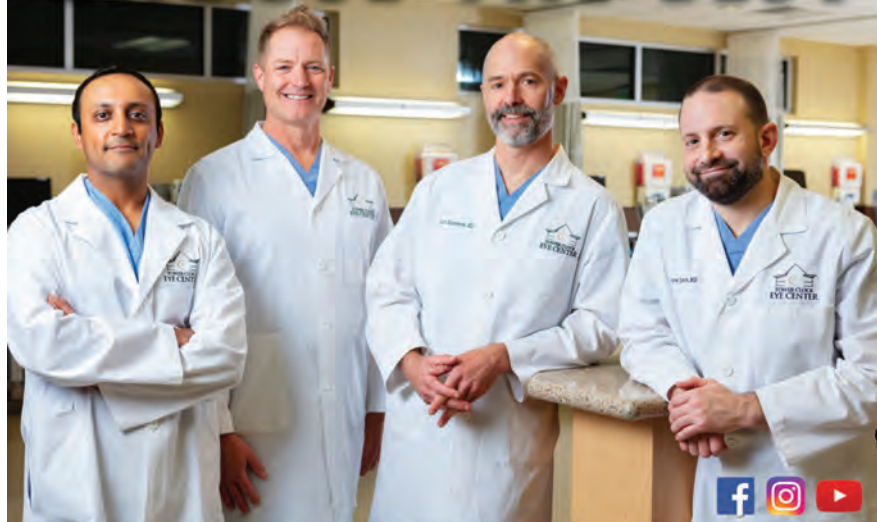

You threw the first pitch at the Brewers game, was it good?

I threw a foul ball but it got to the plate. So, I did a little something.

What do you think about the life of a rookie, throwing the first pitch in Milwaukee, are you a celebrity now?

That's great. First-time thing for me. My family got to be in attendance, so it was a great experience. I appreciate the Brewers for having me and my family there. It was definitely a cool experience just being at a baseball game and being in a suite and watching it from up top.

You've played in front of 80,000 people before. Were you nervous before throwing the first pitch?

I wasn't really that nervous. Usually, it's more (nervous) during the football game, where it's a little more rowdy. It was kind of a pregame thing. Obviously, I never threw a first pitch, so that was kind of nerve-racking, but I've thrown a baseball before. It was cool.

Would you rather play on grass or turf?

Grass — 1,000%. I'm not a huge turf guy. I do agree that turf causes more injuries. I've been seeing all the controversy with that, and I totally agree with what David said. I'm not a huge turf guy at all. I love the grass way more.

Are you faster on turf?

No doubt. You're definitely faster on turf, for sure, but I say safety over speed any day.

Are you happy with your performance thus far?

Yeah but I've got a lot to clean up even with making those big plays. Every ball that touches your hands, it should be caught. I definitely think I've got a lot to clean up. Obviously, that's why we've got practice.

I've never caught a punt. So, what's up with the little hop you have?

The pause.

Why do you pause?

It's really just to let everybody get on their blocks and try to bring the punt team in a little bit. Pause them, draw them more to me so I can make my decision, whether I hit it vertical, if I hit it around the outside. I just want to freeze the punt team a little bit. That's really my plan with that. I want to freeze them a little bit to create more space for me.

How do you keep your eyes on the ball and the kicking team?

No doubt. It's definitely a multi-tasking job. My first thing is when the ball's punted, I try to take a look at the gunners, see if they got off the jam or not. If the jammers jam pretty well, I'll take my eyes off them and I'll lock in on the ball. Really, it's a feel thing. You get a feel of the punt team the closer they get. The more reps you get at it, the easier it gets. It's a rhythm thing. You've got to trust it.

Is catching a punt done with a feel? Do you have a time clock? How does it all work?

It's so weird. It's easier said than done.

Yeah, it sounds impossible.

If I'm looking that way, I can feel you being in my space. It's kind of like that. If someone walks behind you, you can feel them walking behind you sometimes. It's that kind of feeling. So, looking up, you can feel them getting closer and closer.

On the big return, you've got space. What's in your head?

Just take it. I've got to win with speed at that point. Hit the edge. You've always got to be able to make one guy miss. That's the main thing. Once I got the edge, I had to make one guy miss, make another guy miss. They did great blocking for me so I was able to hit the edge.



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
