Trial postponed in overdose death

French's attorney says two sides are close to resolution of case

A trial scheduled to begin Dec. 18 has been postponed in the case of a Green Bay woman accused of supplying the drugs that led to the 2021 death of a man who died at Mohican North Star Casino Resort in the Town of Bartelme.

Stephany L. French, 29, appeared before Shawano-Menominee County Court Judge Katherine Sloma on Dec. 8 for a final pre-trial conference, but defense attorney Eric Steven Maciolek asked that the trial be adjourned while negotiations continue on a possible resolution of the case.

District Attorney Gregory Parker filed an amended information removing two of the five charges against French, after Maciolek filed a motion to dismiss those two counts. Maciolek argued that one charge, delivery of heroin, should be dismissed because there was no evidence of heroin in the man's body or the room where

he was found. The other charge, delivery of a controlled substance,

is already an element of the main charge, first-degree reckless homicide by delivering drugs, Maciolek's motion said.

French is still charged with the homicide count, theft from a corpse, and a misdemeanor charge of failure to aid a victim or report a crime.

"The parties have been in negotiations, and I received an amended offer from the state very recently," Maciolek told Sloma. "I would like to discuss it with my client and with the state, as well."

Sloma took the trial off the calendar and scheduled a status conference for 3:45 p.m. Jan. 30. At that time, if the two sides have reached an agreement or are close to one, a plea hearing would be scheduled, and if not, the trial would be placed back on the calendar, she said.

According to the criminal complaint, the man's body was found Sept. 3, 2021, by a housekeeper at the hotel. An autopsy listed the cause of death as fentanyl, meth-

amphetamine and ethanol toxicity.

Shawano County sheriff's deputies found a white powdery residue on the nightstand next to the bed, but no drugs or drug paraphernalia were located in the room, the complaint said.

Hotel registration showed that a Lynn French was listed as the man's guest. After searching his vehicle, authorities found paperwork for the owner of the car.

When contacted the car owner stated that the victim was with his cousin, Stephany French, and alleged that she had a \$400 a day heroin habit, the complaint said. The victim's family stated that the victim liked to drink alcohol, but was not a drug user.

According to the complaint, French at first denied being in the room, but when confronted with video surveillance photos, she said she didn't know what happened to the man but tried to revive him by pouring cold water on him.

Plea agreement near in Pulaski bonfire explosion

Hearing scheduled for Feb. 5

A plea agreement is apparently close in the case of the teen charged with injuring at least 13 people during a bonfire incident in the Town of Maple Grove that took place during Pulaski High School's homecoming week in October 2022.

Samuel J. Armstrong, 18, has been charged with 13 felony counts of injury by negligent handling of explosives

or fire in connection with an explosion Oct. 14, 2022, during a bonfire at a home on Cedar Drive.

During a short hearing Dec. 6 in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court, defense attorney Greg Petit, appearing via Zoom, told Judge Katherine Sloma that he received a plea agreement offer Dec. 5 from District Attorney Gregory Parker.

"I've talked to my client, and we would like to set this matter for a plea hearing," Petit said.

He asked that the hearing be scheduled for early February. Sloma set the hearing for 3 p.m. Feb. 5 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

According to the criminal com-

plaint, Armstrong admitted that he and another youth threw a 55-gallon barrel partially filled with a diesel and gasoline mixture onto the fire but did not think it would do what it did and injure someone.

The incident was not reported immediately, because a number of underage people at the bonfire were reportedly drinking alcohol. Authorities learned the next day that several people between the ages of 16 and 18 had been admitted to hospitals in Green Bay for burns and other injuries.

The investigation led to the Cedar Drive home, where a man told a detective that Armstrong and the other youth had moved the barrel.

Armstrong said he tried to help put out the flames on one of the victims when he was punched from behind, according to the criminal complaint. He claimed four or five people went after him, and he ran into a nearby cornfield, where he hid for about five minutes before leaving in his vehicle.

The criminal complaint indicates that Armstrong said he'd consumed six beers.

Armstrong was charged Aug. 3 and has been free on a \$100,000 signature bond. If convicted, he faces a prison sentence of 3 1/2 years, a \$10,000 fine or both for each of the 13 counts.

Competency exam granted for Retzlaff

Defendant claims she fired attorney, but judge won't address issue until after exam

Marathon County Circuit Court Judge Mark Moran granted the defense's request for a competency exam for former campground owner Ann Retzlaff on Dec. 11, even as the defendant claimed she fired her attorney.

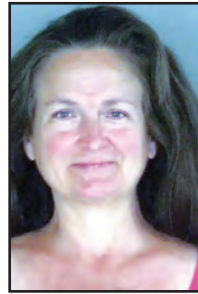
Moran noted he couldn't hear any other motions or requests, including the one where defense attorney Michael Hughes was no longer serving Retzlaff, as long as competency was in question. He said that there were other motions filed by someone else besides Hughes but were not scheduled for the hearing that day.

The motion for the competency exam was filed Nov. 3, according to online court records. District Attorney Greg Parker said he had no objection regarding the exam.

When Moran asked the attorneys if there were any victims that wished to speak in accordance with Marsy's Law, Retzlaff replied: "I am a victim of this case."

Both Retzlaff and Hughes appeared via Zoom, so there was little Hughes could do to keep Retzlaff from interrupting the proceedings aside from urging her not to ask the court questions. That was when Retzlaff claimed she terminated Hughes the day before the motion for the competency hearing was filed.

"He is requesting the competency exam because he and I have fundamental differences in law," Retzlaff said. "I believe in God and the Bible and that our laws are based on the Ten Commandments and all of our

laws are derived from that to include the maxims of law. That does not mean that there should be a competency exam."

Retzlaff claimed she only agreed to utilizing Hughes'

services because she wasn't able to communicate with Parker directly.

"He wasn't returning my emails, my phone calls," Retzlaff said. "I even tried to visit him personally, and the door was actually slammed in my face in Shawano County."

Retzlaff said that if Parker had an offer to be discussed, it should be done at that hearing. She also claimed Hughes had not been able to communicate with Parker on the case.

"We've been working on this since May of 2021, your honor," Retzlaff said. "I want this done. I want to move forward and get on with my life. I am still incarcerated with excessively high bond, and why? Because the DA's office is failing to do his job and put this offer on the table, so if you could order DA Parker to do his job, that'd be great, your honor."

Retzlaff was charged May 2021 in Shawano County with felony counts of fleeing and eluding officers and two counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, as well as a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer from a police pursuit. She also faces misdemeanor charges through Menominee County for resisting and failing to stop.

After missing court in November 2021 and later being arrested again in April 2022 on body-only warrants, she faces additional charges of bail jumping and disorderly conduct. She paid \$15,000 to be released in August 2022 but then missed a hearing earlier this year, prompting Moran to issue nationwide bench warrants, and she was arrested in Oconto County in August, which resulted in two more bail-jumping charges being added.

Retzlaff remains in the Shawano County Jail, where the bond for all charges totals \$57,000.

Moran reiterated that all other motions were on hold until the issue of competency was resolved, but noted that Hughes and Parker were able to have discussions in the meantime.

"We're not going to proceed to any other hearings at this time," Moran said. "There were some submissions made that were not submitted by attorney Hughes — I'm not sure who made those submissions, and I'm not even sure if those submissions were made by someone who is licensed to practice law."

Among those was another request for bond modification filed Dec. 8. Hughes, in a hearing in

October, had tried to get the bond reduced without success.

Retzlaff pointed out that, in her case in Sauk County, the judge there claimed she was competent to proceed there. Retzlaff is facing five counts of criminal slander of title and two felony bail jumping charges after allegedly filing false liens against representatives with Bank First and the new owner of the former Annie's Campground, now known as On the Rocks Family Kampground.

"She asked me a few questions and determined that I was competent to represent myself in Sauk County Court," Retzlaff said.

Moran countered that there's a difference in competency requirements when representing one's self versus being able to communicate with an attorney.

Retzlaff is claiming that "Brady material," along with "missing" 911 tapes from Menominee County, have not been provided to her or Hughes.

"They do exist, and they've been suppressed by the prosecutor," Retzlaff said. "This is prosecutorial misconduct."

Teachers on Call to help with sub shortage

Shawano School District having hard time filling in teacher absences with existing setup

The Shawano School Board signed off with an agency that is expected to ease the burden of finding substitute teachers.

Teachers on Call was approved by a 5-0 vote Dec. 11 as board members Jeana Winslow and Christine McKinnies were absent from the meeting, and John Arens and Al Pyatskowitz left the meeting early. The program is expected to cost over \$100,000 in a single year but is expected to provide a larger substitute pool and avoid tapping existing staff to take on extra duties.

Working with Teachers on Call would include a dedicated person to oversee efforts to get substitutes when they are needed, according to Nicole Hartlaben, district human resources director, but it would continue to use the automated system teachers use when they inform the district they will be absent. Teachers on Call would take over the payroll for substitute teachers, and the district has to option to cancel its contract on 30 days' notice.

"We've met with the finance committee twice on this, and we've met

with our current sub pool and given them the opportunity to look at this," Hartlaben said.

Rosie Thiel, the district's current substitute coordinator, eagerly welcomes the help. She informed the board that, while waiting for the agenda item to come up, she was in the audience trying to get substitutes for the next day.

"The problem is, when I started 10 years ago, we had three secretaries who were able to call somebody and say, 'Hey, I've got an opening. Blah, blah. Can you fill it?'" Thiel said. "We went down to two secretaries, and now you're down to me doing that job."

Thiel said Teachers on Call would be a benefit if the agency can find more people to fill the substitute pool. Like other districts, finding people to fill the void on short-term and long-term substitutions has required some effort, many times without success.

"Right now, what scares me is that you see people out there with job fairs saying, 'Come work for us,' and they're not getting people," Thiel said. "If this can get more people in for us, I think it's going to be a good deal. The scary thing for me right now is if something happens to me, there's

no backup except for secretaries that have to do what I do. Their plates are pretty full right now as it is."

Thiel noted she spent four hours the previous day trying to fill vacancies for the week and was not able to resolve the shortfalls. She said that, even though Teachers on Call is taking over, the agency still wants to work with her to better fill the gaps.

Superintendent Kurt Krizan pointed out that there was one pay period where 64 substitute teachers were needed for the district, and 30 vacancies went unfilled, which is almost half.

"That was our teachers who needed to fill those pieces or our interventionists and whoever else," Krizan said. "When you think that half of those are high school and middle school — they teach three periods a day — and you have close to 60 people who are affected by unfilled vacancies."

Krizan and Hartlaben told the board it is unclear whether long-term substitutes would remain on the district's payroll or work for Teachers on Call. Nearby Marion and Oconto Falls school districts currently use the agency for its substitute needs, but the Shawano district was first intro-

duced to Teachers on Call through Marinette.

"I want to keep them (long-term subs) on with us, but if they want benefits, I think they should have the opportunity to work for Teachers on Call," Hartlaben said.

The \$100,000 that the district will pay includes a 30% upcharge on payroll, according to Hartlaben. In addition to the annual cost, there will be a \$2,500 setup fee for the district.

Board member Bobbi Lemerond said that, if things don't work out with Teachers on Call, the situation the district is in would necessitate hiring additional people to coordinate subs.

"If we're willing to spend an extra \$100,000 a year, we could hire two new people at \$50,000 a year to help," Lemerond said. "If this doesn't work, we need to hire some help."

The district had 12 substitutes working long term for the 2022-23 school year due to unfilled teacher positions, according to Thiel, and this year there are nine. She believes filling teacher positions will help to ease the sub shortage in the process.

"That's not the trend I'm seeing," Thiel said.

Library mold, leak repair plans placed on hold

Quotes to be sought for most immediate needs

A proposal by the Shawano County Highway Department to fix the most pressing issue of leaks and mold at the Shawano County Library has been put on hold while officials collect quotes from private firms.

Once collected, the Shawano County Library Board will meet with the Shawano County Public Property Committee next month to discuss this step and the long-range plans for the building.

"It was the recommendation from the public property committee that the highway department, have them tear out what's in the Veslak Room, remove that because ... that's where our big problem is," said Milt Marquardt, board president.

The highway department's esti-

mate for this work is \$11,500.

"That's for us to come in, remove the interior, so the drywall, paneling and the insulation, and then we would inject the cracks with a waterproofing Eurothane and seal it from the inside," said Grant Bystol, highway commissioner.

Bystol said repairs to the Veslak Room are just one piece of the solution.

"You do have a problem on the north side of the building," he said.

The lot line is only about 3 feet from the building, the concrete by the building slants toward the building instead of away from it, and there is nothing stopping water running off the neighboring building and parking area and against the library's north foundation wall.

Bystol suggested the library board get quotes from other firms — Sure-

Dri and ABC were brought up in the discussion — to compare with the highway department's price. The two firms had offered quotes for similar work a few years ago.

Estimates to fix the immediate needs as well as the exterior issues would cost about \$130,000.

Board member Gina Shatters questioned why the county would continue to put money into a building that has foundational issues.

"What's the longevity of this?" she asked. "This is a short-term fix for a long-term problem. We keep sticking money in the building. I understand we're not ready to move or any of those things, but this is a lot of money."

A discussion about space needs, costs to relocate, rent, and the size and cost of a new library quickly filled the room.

Jim Davel, county administrative coordinator, said that until a repair

project begins, you may not know how bad a situation is.

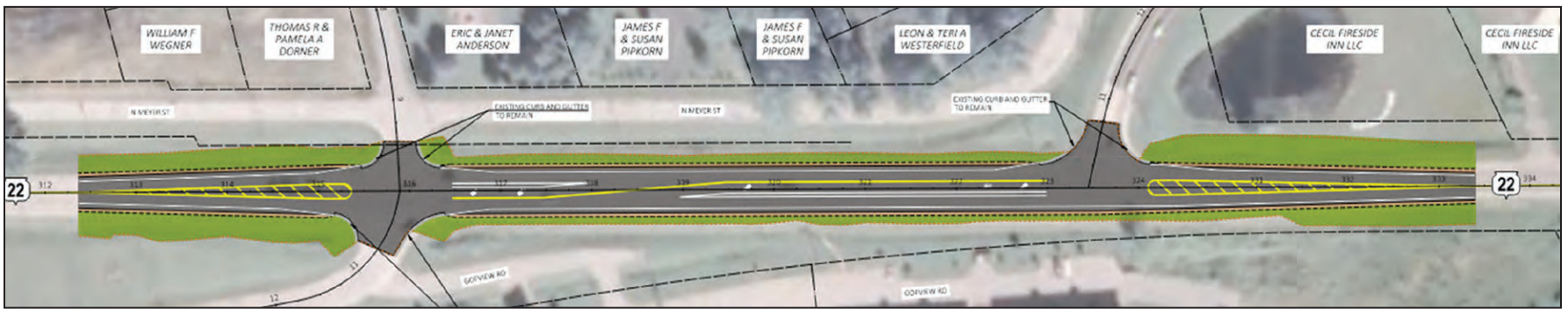
"It's really hard to guarantee this work," he said.

He also said discussion needs to take place about the future direction of the library, not just the immediate needs.

"We get so wrapped up on size rather than get wrapped up on services," he said. "This stuff is not cheap anymore. When you look at the age of the facilities, quite frankly, these discussions should have happened a long time ago. It's costing us more money to be nickel-and-dimed every day."

The library board and public property committee are expected to hold a joint meeting in January to discuss the quotes to repair the immediate needs and the long-term use of the building. Suggested dates for the meeting are Jan. 10 or Jan. 11.

Comments sought for Highway 22 project

Repaving, culvert replacement, bridge repairs set for 2026

A public involvement meeting was held Dec. 7, and comments are still being accepted on proposed options for a state Highway 22 road project between County Road BE and the Oconto County border with Shawano County.

Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) officials said the purpose of the 11.5-mile proposed project is to repave the road and replace culverts and guardrails. The project would also convert a four-lane stretch of road between Warrington Avenue

and County Road R to two lanes with left-turn lanes. A left-turn lane would also be added at Resort Road, and deck repairs would be completed on the bridge over Pickerel Creek.

Construction is scheduled to occur in 2026.

The existing pavement is showing signs of distress with cracking and rutting, officials said.

These cracks may deteriorate further to become safety hazards, especially during weather events, and contribute to continued accelerated pavement deterioration by allowing water to seep beneath the roadway.

There are several culverts that are deteriorating and nearing the end of their service life.

There is an operational issue near the County Road R intersection where traffic is weaving to avoid left-turning vehicles within the short four-lane section. There are several locations

of guardrail along the project that do not meet current design standards and will be upgraded with this project.

There is an existing rear-end crash pattern at the Resort Road intersection; safety at this intersection will be improved by adding a left-turn lane to eastbound state Highway 22.

The pavement project includes cold-in-place recycling with 3-inch asphalt overlay, 3-inch mill and overlay from Warrington Avenue to County Road R, base stabilization with 3-inch asphalt overlay from County Road C to end of project limits and 2-inch asphalt overlay for park and rides.

When the project is being completed, it is proposed traffic be detoured for about four weeks along state Highway 117, state Highway 29, state Highway 160 and state Highway 32. The remainder of the project work should be performed under flagging with single lane closures.

Detours would be established for the replacement of two deep culverts, rehabilitation work for the bridge and base stabilization from County Road C to the end of project limits.

Local access along state Highway 22 would be maintained throughout construction. Temporary driveway closures would be necessary during parts of the construction process.

A small amount of real estate acquisition is expected for the Resort Road intersection improvements and select culvert replacement locations. The real estate acquisition process will begin in spring 2024.

Comments about the project will be accepted until Dec. 21 by Michelle Guoin, project manager, at michellem.guoin@dot.wi.gov.

The final design is expected in August 2025.

Two indicted for crimes on Menominee Reservation

Both men have trials scheduled for February 2024

Two men were recently indicted in federal court, one for alleged theft, and a second for drug offenses on the Menominee Indian Reservation.

According to the U.S. Attorney's Office, Merwin J. "Pete" Wynos Jr, 35, of Keshena, was charged with theft in Indian Country for allegedly stealing property valued in excess of \$1,000 from four companies at a construction site on the reservation.

The alleged theft occurred on or about Sept. 25, 2023.

On Nov. 29, Wynos was arraigned on the charge and ordered into detention by Magistrate Judge James Sickel who found that the weight of

evidence against Wynos was strong, his prior criminal history and his previous failure to appear in court as ordered.

Trial was set for Feb. 5, 2024.

If convicted, Wynos faces maximum penalties of five years in prison and three years' supervised release.

In his prior conviction for burglary and assaulting Menominee Tribal Police Officer Vincent Grignon, Wynos was arrested for the June 1, 2015, burglary of the Thunderbird Convenience store.

Grignon approached a car stopped on County Road VV that was reportedly involved in the burglary. Grignon recognized Wynos behind the wheel of the car and ordered him to shut off the engine

and show his hands.

Instead, Wynos accelerated the car toward Grignon, who jumped into the door frame of his squad and pulled the door closed to avoid being hit.

Wynos then fled driving in excess of 100 mph before running off the road in Shawano County. When law enforcement approached the stopped car, Wynos was observed drinking liquor stolen from the Thunderbird store.

In May 2016, Wynos was sentenced to three years in prison and placed on three years' supervised release for burglary and resisting arrest.

His supervision was revoked in June 2021 and Wynos was sentenced to an additional six months' incarceration.

Also recently indicted is a former Wausau man for drug charges allegedly occurring on the Menominee Indian Reservation.

Charles A. Parham, also known as "Red" and "Cuzzo," faces five to 40 years in prison if convicted for possessing fentanyl with the intent to distribute. He faces a maximum of 20 years in prison if convicted of possessing heroin with the intent to distribute.

Parham allegedly sold fentanyl on Sept. 29 and allegedly possessed 40 grams of fentanyl on Oct. 12 at the tribal casino.

Parham was arraigned on the charges on Nov. 30. His trial date is Feb. 5, 2024.

He is in custody in the Shawano County Jail, according to online courts records.

Crawford Center roof takes step forward

Shawano County Executive Committee expected to vote on proposal in January

A new roof for the Crawford Center at the Shawano County Fairgrounds took another step forward Dec. 7 when the Shawano County Public Property Committee endorsed a bid for the project.

A base bid of \$243,000 from Mathena Roofing and Sheetmetal was accepted by the committee, with the executive committee to discuss and debate two alternate projects that could add another \$130,000 to the cost.

Steve Dreher, manager of the county maintenance department, said two bids were received, although one did not offer a bid on a Firestone product as required. The existing roof is a Firestone product.

In addition to the base bid, there were two alternates officials were seeking pricing on as well. First was removal and replacement of gutters and downspouts. Second was an additional 4 inches of insulation on the roof.

Mathena Roofing and Sheetmetal bid an additional for \$13,500 for the first alternate and \$118,260 for the second. With both alternates, the total cost would be \$374,760.

The second bidder, Custofam, offered a Carlisle roof instead of a Firestone. Dreher said this company was very tenacious in discussing the bid, and they believe the Carlisle roof is as good as the Firestone.

The Custofam base bid was \$190,620, with the gutter project at \$25,588 and the insulation at \$164,115. The total cost would be \$380,323.

"They were told they could bid the Firestone and propose an alternate," Dreher said. "Obviously, they did not pay attention to the bidding instructions."

Discussion on which bid and when to forward it to the executive committee and possibly the county board ensued.

"If we pass it here today and

forward it on to the executive committee and they approve doing it using ARPA money, we don't have to go to the full board," said Supervisor Tom Kautza.

Committee members agreed to forward the Mathena bid to the executive committee. With that committee's December agenda already set and full of other items, it will be brought up at the January meeting.

Prior to the discussion on the bids, Shawano hockey coach Adam Gafner reiterated his and the hockey league's desire to help the county make the building a financial success throughout the year.

"We are here, as a community to support, your board and that facility and the fundraising during the other time of the year that the hockey league is in there," he said. "I'm fully aware from the spreadsheet standpoint that it's a money pit when you look at it from the sky down."

He again said the league would like to consider installing a interior subroof about 20 feet below the actual roof to help insulate the rink. He said the league investigated the costs a few years ago and had a rough figure of about \$70,000, which he said the hockey league would pay for if the county would agree to a long-term lease for the building.

Right now, the league has a one-year lease to use the Crawford Center.

From a donor's standpoint, Wendy Crawford said energy efficiency grant money might be available to help with the costs. She, too, suggested a long-term lease.

"We're interested in the future story," she said. "In order for donors to donate to the future, we need that future story, we need that commitment to that building."

Dreher noted that lease negotiations will begin again soon.

Shawano County Board vacancies piling up

Several districts need candidates for spring election

The number of supervisory districts without a candidate has jumped 50% in the first half of December, Shawano County Clerk Kara Skarlupka said.

Vacancies now include seats without a supervisor due to a resignation, redistricting that created four districts without an incumbent and a few more where the incumbents will not seek re-election.

As of Tuesday, there were no candidates officially considering running for one-third of the seats on the board.

District 3 incumbent Milt Marquardt is not seeking another term. The district represents the city of Shawano, Wards 5 and 6.

District 5 Supervisor Sandy Steinke resigned earlier this year. No one has stepped forward to fill that spot, which represents the city of Shawano, Wards 9 and 10.

District 15 Supervisor Grant Staszak earlier announced he won't seek reelection in the spring. The new District 15 includes the Town of Hartland, Ward 2; Village of Bonduel, Ward 1; Town of Navarino, Ward 2; and Town of Waukechon, Ward 2.

Due to redistricting, new districts

with two incumbents now living in them are the 7th District (Jeremy Gretzinger and Michael Stupecky), 18th District (Devin Krizan and Steve Gueths), 19th District (Arlyn Tober and Dick Olson) and 23rd District (Jerry Erdmann and Steven Natzke).

Gueths has announced he will not seek another term, leaving Krizan to run unopposed at this time. Tober has done the same, leaving Olson on his own, although he has not filed any papers yet. Also, Erdmann will not run, leaving the seat to Natzke unless someone else enters the race.

David Heideman, who currently represents District 16, is not running for re-election. The district includes the Town of Waukechon, Ward 1; and the Town of Belle Plaine, Wards

3 and 4.

Four districts without an incumbent in 2024 due to redistricting are the 8th District (Town of Wescott, Ward 4), 14th District (Bonduel, Ward 2, and Town of Hartland, Ward 1), 17th District (Town of Richmond, Wards 1 and 2, and Town of Belle Plaine, Ward 1) and 22nd District (Town of Morris, Ward 2; Town of Seneca, Ward 1; Town of Grant, Ward 1; and city of Marion, Ward 4).

All nomination completed papers are due back in the clerk's office by 5 p.m. Jan. 2, 2024.

The spring election, which will also be the presidential primary, will be held April 2.

Meyers share story of 'Faithfulness Fulfilled'

Husband, wife co-author 2nd book in 'God Knew' series

Becoming an author grew from the sorrow and grief that James Meyer of Shawano experienced when his parents died within 18 months of each other.

His journey of writing and publishing "God Knew: Revelations of God's Grace in Unexpected Ways" in 2015 brought him comfort from his sorrow and provided a way to offer solace, guidance and support to others who were also mourning the loss of loved ones.

A Harris Poll indicates that 36% of Americans don't feel like celebrating the holidays due to grief or loss.

"Grief isn't unique," Meyer said. "But the way we grieve is. There is no right way or wrong way to grieve. This is my way, leaning on God, who's always there."

In the book, Meyer shows how to navigate grief through the holidays by sharing how he dealt with his grief.

Meyer, an only child, lived with his parents until they died.

"Because I took care of my parents, I never married," Meyer said.

And then his life took another path. His grief healed to the point where he could look toward his future. He met Linda, and they married in November 2018.

A new book, "God Knew: Faithfulness Fulfilled," written by both of them, was published in August. Their belief that God is present in extraordinary ways in their ordinary life, as an ordinary couple living in Shawano, is part of the message of this new book. The Meyers believe that the new book will help readers become closer to God and demonstrate his

faithfulness in their lives.

"Our stories are surprisingly similar, as far as taking care of parents, not being married, being active in our churches," James Meyer said.

He went on to explain his belief that their lives were parallel lines, and that God was the only one who could make parallel lines intersect.

Talking about how they met and how they moved on a path to write the sequel, Linda Meyer said, "After my mom passed, I didn't know what to do with myself. I had a lot of grief, same as Jim. I was very close to my mom. My heart started to heal. I got involved in some ministries that were very important to me. I started online dating.

"Two weeks into it, Jim messaged me. We started dating, we got married in 2018 and I moved up here.

"I had a bad few months earlier this year, which prompted us to write the sequel."

After the second book was published, the couple trademarked the phrase "God Knew" and have plans to spread its message through future sequels, incorporating stories from individuals in upcoming books.

Their website, www.godknew.org, reaches a wide audience. They are committed to passing on their hopeful messages through social media, an online store at their website, book signings, speaking events and podcasts.

The Meyers put together something they call the God Knew Comfort Box.

"It's got both of our books, a calendar, mouse pad, a New Testament, coffee mug, Door County coffee, a bracelet and key chain," James Meyer said. "For someone who has everything, they don't have this."

Evergreens more noticeable during Christmas season

The holiday season is here, and regardless of what we celebrate, we can enjoy the beauty of Wisconsin's many evergreens, or conifers, throughout these festive times.

Wisconsin is home to a number of native conifers, along with a few non-natives that have been heavily planted throughout the state and have naturalized themselves in many areas.

Conifers, or cone-bearing trees, are for the most part evergreen. There are a few exceptions, however. Native conifers in Wisconsin include a variety of pines, spruces, junipers, firs, hemlocks and white-cedars.

In the pine family, white pine and red pine are best known, while Jack pine is common in our area, as well. White pine is loved for its softer, more feathery look, while the stiff needles of red pine and Jack pine set them apart. Examine the needle clusters to determine the type of pine. White pine clusters appear in groups of five softer, flexible needles, while red pine and Jack pine needle clusters contain two sharp, firm needles.

White spruce and black spruce are our two most common native spruce varieties. In addition, you'll find Colorado blue spruce and its many hybrids in many landscaped areas, as well as old homesteads. This spruce features unique, powdery blue foliage in all of its forms. Norway spruce is another non-native spruce that features elegant, downward-sweeping boughs and short needles on its branches.

Northern white-cedar, commonly known as arborvitae, is found through-

out the area and features broad, scaly, evergreen foliage. Eastern red cedar, technically one of the junipers, features foliage that is thinner in appearance and bluish-green in color, along with plentiful blue juniper berries.

Our area is also rich in firs and hemlocks. Balsam fir is one of the most well-known with its perfect spires of flat-needled branches and beautiful, silvery bark. Eastern hemlock grows quite large with short, soft needles that give the tree a elegant and pristine look, especially when tufted in snow.

Another of our well-known conifers is the glorious tamarack. Most of tamaracks in our area are now bare of their needles as this is the only conifer that characteristically drops its needles every year. Before they fall, they turn the most brilliant shade of golden yellow during late October into November.

YOUR RIGHT TO KNOW

Protect the rights of student journalists

About a year ago, Simon Mehring came home from a high school journalism conference with an idea.

Mehring, now a junior at Stoughton High School, had learned about an Illinois law that protects student media from censorship. He also found out that Wisconsin doesn't have such a law.

So, armed with model legislation from the Student Press Law Center, he raised the issue with state legislators, in conversations that lasted through the school year and into the summer.

Mehring, in an interview, said he spoke several times with Rep. Dave Murphy (R-Greenville), who chairs the Assembly Committee on Colleges and Universities. This fall, Mehring was at school and "all of a sudden, I got the news that they were going to introduce the bill."

The legislation, AB 551, was patterned off the model legislation. It's co-authored by Sen. Rachael Cabral-Guevara (R-Appleton) and Rep. Tom Michalski (R-Elm Grove), with cosponsors from both parties. It was introduced on Oct. 23 and had a hearing in Murphy's committee on Oct. 26. It passed a committee on Nov. 2

and five days later was voted on by the full Assembly, where it passed unanimously.

"The biggest surprise is how fast it went," says Mehring, who, along with testifying at the Assembly hearing, submitted letters from other Wisconsin student journalists who have experienced censorship.

The bill as passed would do several things:

- Establish that public-school journalists in grades 6-12 and student journalists at a UW System university or a technical college have "the right to exercise freedom of speech and of the press in school-sponsored media."
- Let student journalists determine "the news, opinion, feature, and advertising content of school-sponsored media" and prohibit school

officials from "exercising prior restraint of materials."

- Preclude student journalists and their advisers from being disciplined for "for acting in accordance with the bill" and give the ability to enforce their rights in the courts.

- Require school districts, the UW System and technical college boards to "adopt a policy related to student journalists exercising their freedom of speech and the press in school-sponsored media," including an appeal process for students.

The Student Law Press Center says 17 states have passed similar bills intended to offset a 1988 U.S. Supreme Court decision that muddled the issue of censorship of student media.

Some of the support for the Wisconsin bill comes from Republican legislators concerned about protecting the free speech rights of conservative students on UW campuses. But the unanimous vote shows that the ideals it seeks to protect have deep bipartisan support.

The bill did draw criticism from Howard Schweber, a UW-Madison professor of American politics and political theory, who told the Badger

Herald newspaper it might be a "disastrously bad idea" to give middle-school and high-school students the same press freedom as college students.

But Matthew Smith, a Fond du Lac journalism teacher, student journalism adviser and the president of the Wisconsin Journalism Education Association, said at the Oct. 26 hearing that he knows from experience the legislation will work at the high-school level, having seen how students "follow the standards we talk about in class" — that is, to behave responsibly and "focus on truth."

The bill is now with a Senate committee and would need committee and full Senate approval before going to Gov. Tony Evers.

Mehring is hopeful about its chances — and stresses its importance. "Even though this bill is a niche issue," he says, "it affects a lot of people."

'Delinking' legislation will be detrimental

To the editor:

As a member of the board of directors for a bank in the Badger State, I have an interest in the economic prosperity of Wisconsin. I want to ensure employers can offer high-quality health coverage and benefits to their employees. I am concerned over proposals being considered in Congress that will increase premiums if the policy is applied to the commercial health care market.

"Delinking" legislation that changes how pharmacy benefit companies are currently compensated for successfully securing rebates from drug manufacturers will be detrimental to seniors, businesses and taxpayers across our state. Rebates determine how businesses can provide better and more

comprehensive health benefits to employees. These rebates are used for lowering premiums to help decrease health care spending or even offering wellness programs that help ensure our benefits remain competitive in the current labor market.

For the commercial market, which is how most of us get our coverage, economist Alex Brill, estimates that it would increase premiums up to \$26 billion every year, increasing health care costs for patients who get their coverage from their employers.

Economist Casey Mulligan estimated that "delinking" would cost patients and payers an additional \$18 billion in just one year, while increasing government spending on Medicare Part D premiums \$3 billion to a whopping \$10 billion. This would result in higher premiums for seniors.

Additionally, just the commercial market and Medicare Part D changes would put more than \$32 billion back into the pockets of big pharmaceutical companies at the

expense of patients.

Ike Brannon, senior fellow at the Jack Kemp Foundation, looked into these proposals and pointed out that the legislation ignores the fact that "rebates on prescription drugs are not correlated to the prices that drug companies set, proposals to delink PBM compensation from list prices seem to assume that PBM compensation have choices on how we compensate and contract with pharmacy benefit companies ... it's unclear why politicians who generally advocate for free market policies feel compelled to push a policy that limits the prescription drug market without a beneficial outcome for taxpayers."

We need to do something about lowering drug pricing and health care costs, but these kinds of policies will have the opposite effect. I hope Wisconsin lawmakers in Congress look at the data, speak to small business owners and recognize that "delinking" is the wrong approach to lowering prescription drug costs.

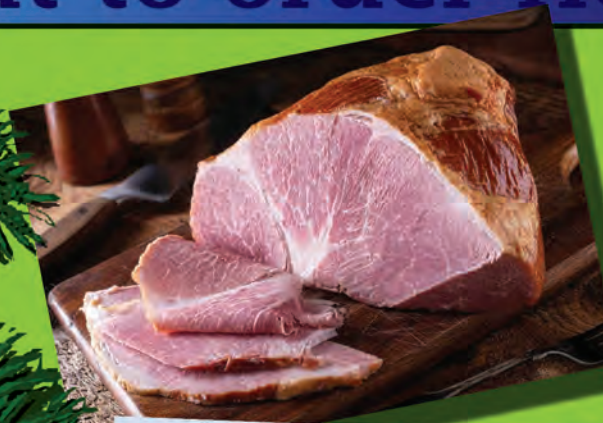

ThedaCare believes holiday stress manageable

The holidays are often a time that people look forward to spending together, by celebrating with parties, family gatherings or travel.

Spending time in close proximity with others — and the seasonal changes — also mean there's a need to take a few precautions when it comes to staying healthy.

"With an increased risk of developing illness over the holidays, it's important for people to take steps to help them stay healthy and enjoy the season," said Katie Harris, an advanced practice clinician with ThedaCare. "We also encourage each person stay up-to-date on recommended vaccinations to help protect themselves and others from illness."

Those at greatest risk of complications and death due to both the influenza virus and COVID-19 are people over age 65, and those who have certain medical conditions such as asthma, lung or heart disease, neurological impairment, weakened immunity or are obese.

"While the pandemic has officially ended, COVID is still very much present," Harris said. "The number of hospitalizations were increasing in some areas of the state this fall. Getting vaccinated is one of the most effective ways to prevent the spread of this virus."

Frequently washing hands and regularly using hand sanitizer can also help, especially when people are interacting with others.

For those who do get sick, it is recommended to stay home.

"Many of us are used to virtual visits, so consider this as an option for family gatherings if you're under the weather," Harris said. "It's better to stay away to protect family and friends who may have conditions that will make them more susceptible to serious disease."

Harris also noted other ways to stay healthy during the holidays, including:

- Limit alcohol use. The potential for alcohol-related crashes rises with each holiday. Those who do drink should designate a sober driver for the evening or stay the night where

they are. Additionally, the American Heart Association says heart attacks are more likely during the holiday season.

- Manage stress. Likewise, stress can be a contributor

toward heart disease. Manage the number of holiday activities, set boundaries with family members, and try to keep the strain on finances to a minimum.

"We often think stress is just a natural part of the holidays — but it can become overwhelming and impact our health," Harris said. "It may be necessary to take a close look at all the contributing factors and decide what you can do without."

- Get enough exercise. While the colder months sometimes keep folks inside, adapting to the change and maintaining exercise routines as much as possible can help stave off stress and chronic disease, including heart problems.

"Keep yourself moving, even if it's just to walk around the block," Harris said. "The American Heart Association recommends 150 minutes of activity per week that gets your heart pumping."

Joining a gym or exercising with online videos at home can be ways to stay active indoors.

- Eat right. While the temptation is ever-present to celebrate the holidays with cookies and other junk food, as always, practice moderation.

"Foods that are high in sugar, fat or salt can contribute to obesity and chronic health problems," Harris said. "Keep a good habit of eating lots of fruits and vegetables, which also can help you boost your immunity."

- Prioritize sleep. Getting adequate sleep can help boost the immune system and ward off stress.

Harris also recommended having a plan for when and where to get care if someone becomes sick.

"Making your health a top priority can mean a happier holiday season for you and your family," Harris said. "We're here to provide care for our communities, empowering each person with the tools they need to support health and wellness."

VILLAGE OF BOWLER, SHAWANO COUNTY, WISCONSIN AN ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION NO. 2023-01 ENTITLED "TEMPORARY MOVING CONTAINERS"

The Village Board of the Village of Bowler, Shawano County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1: Section No. 2023-01, entitled "Temporary Moving Containers", of the Village of Bowler is hereby created to provide as follows:

(1) Temporary Moving Container means any portable storage container, storage unit, semi-trailer, storage pod, other fully enclosed trailer, shed-like container, or other portable structure, that can be, or is used for the storage of personal property of any kind.

(2) Temporary Moving Containers shall be allowed in all zoning districts provided that the following conditions are met:

A. A Temporary Moving Container shall not exceed ten (10') feet in width, twenty (20') feet in length, and ten (10') feet in height.

B. Temporary Moving Container shall be setback five (5') feet from any property line and (5') feet from the nearest structure.

C. A Temporary Moving Container shall not be placed in any public right-of-way.

D. A Temporary Moving Container shall not encroach on any public right-of-way or sidewalk.

E. A Temporary Moving Container shall be permitted on the property for up to ninety (90) days per calendar year.

F. There shall be no more than one Temporary Moving Container per lot.

G. A Temporary Moving Container shall be placed on asphalt, concrete, or other, similar hard-paved surface.

(3) Prior to the placement of any Temporary Moving Container on any property within the Village, the user of such container shall obtain from the Village Clerk a permit.

A. The permit application shall require the name and contact information for the owner of the Temporary Moving Container and the owner of the property with which the use of the Temporary Moving Container is associated.

B. There shall be a fifty dollars (\$50.00) application fee.

C. No permit issued shall be transferable or assignable to any person, business, organization, or other party not originally designated on the original application.

(4) Any person who violates this section shall forfeit twenty dollars (\$20.00) along with the cost of prosecution. Each day a violation continues to exist shall constitute a separate offense. The Village may institute any appropriate action or proceeding to enjoin or abate a violation of this section.

SECTION 2: If any provision of this Ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this Ordinance to any person or circumstances is found invalid or unconstitutional by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the provisions or application of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION 3: All Ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication or posting as required by law.

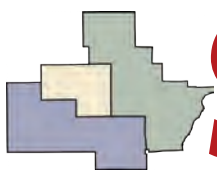

Hawks sweep wrestling triangular

What stood out in this one was having both of the Bears wins come late in the match, while the Hawks surrendered only one pin, which came at 126 pounds. Apart from that, it was a dominating performance and one that sent a message for what was to come later in the night.

The Hawks knew things were going to be much tougher against a good Jaguars squad. Instead, it was another quick start from the Hawks as they opened up an early 12-0 lead and never looked back. Carsen Herm started things off with a quick pinfall at 157 pounds, with Drew Chelberg following suit at 165 pounds.

After Jacob McVane scored the Jaguars first win with an 8-1 decision over Mason Theis at 175 pounds, Ashwaubenon took a 9-6 lead with Easton Hockers securing a pin at 190 pounds.

Trailing for the first time all night, Shawano responded with a strong showing at 215 pounds where Kadin Campbell came away with the 19-9 major decision win to put the Hawks back in front 10-9.

That was the beginning of what was 22 unanswered points for the Hawks as Chase Katchenago (285), Dylan Garther (106) and Dane Hodkiewicz (113) all secured pinfall victories to put the Hawks in front for good 28-9. All of those guys

Kaydin Campbell, Kia Waukau, Dylan Gartner, Dane Hodkiewicz, Owen Montour, Kody Popelka and Drake Herm all earned two victories on the mat tonight," he said. "They continue

to work hard and will be up-and-comers as the season goes on. We will rely heavily on them in the future."

Looking to battle back and at the very least keep things interesting, Ashwaubenon put an end to the Shawano run with 10 points of their own to pull within 28-19. Charles Smith secured an 8-0 major decision at 120 pounds, with Noah Egandruny scoring a pinfall win at 126 pounds. That was as close as the Jaguars would get the rest of the way as a pair of pins from Montour (132) and Popelka (138) led to 12 quick points, with a forfeit win at 144 pounds putting an end to the night for Shawano and another victory to bring their season record to 4-3.

Although Herm was awarded a forfeit win in his second match of the night, he continues to set the tone along with Carsen as those two have been a huge reason why the Hawks have done well this season.

Randal Chevalier, Joan Delabreau and Rachel Fernandez.

Michael Fish Jr. is the only off-reservation candidate on the ballot.

Due to the resignation of a tribal legislator in 2022, the fourth highest vote-getting candidate will fill the vacancy for the remaining one-year term.

a write-in candidate for the Menominee Tribal Legislature who has been convicted of a major crime as defined in Bylaw V of the Constitution and Bylaws, unless the Tribal Judiciary certifies that a tribal member in question is rehabilitated. Such certificate of rehabilitation shall be based upon the tribal member's record of behavior since the conviction.

For eligible members wanting an absentee ballot, the deadline to request an absentee ballot is 4 p.m. Dec. 28.

Packers fumble
chance to stand
out among playoff
contenders



Green Bay quarterback Jordan Love was 25-of-39 passing for 218 yards with one touchdown, one interception and one lost fumble against the New York Giants on Monday. Green Bay was 5-of-14 against one of the best third-down defenses in the NFL but 2-of-5 against one of the worst red-zone defenses.

Giants stun Packers on Monday night

Bullock's game-winning field goal pushes Green Bay to 6-7

A 37-yard field goal from Giants' kicker Randy Bullock as time expired pushed Green Bay to a game under .500, as the Giants knocked off the red hot Packers 24-22 on Dec. 11 in New Jersey.

It looked certain that Green Bay was going to lose, as the Giants, up 21-16 with 5:30 remaining in the game, began to march down the field. Giants superstar running back Saquon Barkley saw two carries to open the drive, one going for six yards and the other going for 17 yards. On his third attempt of the drive, Barkley broke free for a 34-yard gain down the right sideline, but as he was tripped up fumbled the football, which in turn was picked up by Packers' defensive back Carington Valentine and returned 50 yards down to the Green Bay 36-yard line.

"I saw nobody touched him, the ball popped out and I grabbed it and started running," said Valentine, on the fumble recovery.

All of a sudden, Green Bay was in a prime opportunity to take the lead late and steal the game at MetLife Stadium.

The offense did its part, as the drive started with 3:34 remaining in the game. Running back A.J. Dillon churned out 14 yards on the first three plays of the drive. That was followed up by two completions from Packers quarterback Jordan Love. A Love scramble later, Green Bay faced a second-and-goal from the Giants six-yard line with 1:42 remaining.

Love got the snap and avoided defenders, stepped up in the pocket and ran to the right side of the field, before throwing a dart to receiver Malik Heath. Heath initially caught the pass, but before he could control the ball, it was knocked out by a Giants' defender, setting up a third-and-goal.

On the ensuing play, Heath, who was isolated to the left side of the field, ran an out route and made an incredible catch, sneaking into the end zone to give Green Bay a one point lead with 1:33 left in the game. The following two-point attempt failed though, as Jayden Reed was tackled just short of the end zone on an end-around.



Running back AJ Dillon (28) had 15 carries for 53 yards against the Giants on Monday night. So far this season, Dillon has rushed 164 times for 574 yards, a 3.5 yards per carry average. The Packers are 21st in the NFL with 1,382 yards in 2023. Based on the team's 324 carries, the Packers are averaging 4.3 yards per carry. The team has seven rushing touchdowns.

Giants quarterback Tommy DeVito then began his march down the field, completing three short passes before connecting with wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson for 32 yards to put New York into field goal range. From there, Barkley chewed the clock with three straight runs, setting up the eventual 37-yard make from Bullock to give Green Bay its first loss since the team's Nov. 12 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"Obviously, extremely disappointed," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur. "I think our team learned a valuable lesson in terms of if you don't play your best, it doesn't matter who you are playing, where you are playing, when you are playing - you are not going to win the game."

In relation to the last three games, it was an uncharacteristically underperforming game for Love, as he

completed 25-of-39 for just 218 yards and one touchdown. Love also threw one interception and lost one fumble.

It was tight end Tucker Kraft, who was the leading receiver for Green Bay, catching four passes and recording 64 yards. As for the run game, Dillon logged 53 yards on 15 carries. He added another 25 yards receiving.

"Not good enough," said Love, on his performance. "Obviously not good enough to get the job done there at the end and obviously two costly turnovers hurt us a lot, so just not good enough."

The game opened with three straight punts, before the Giants were faced with a fourth-and-eight from the Packers 30-yard line. Bullock ran onto the field to attempt to open the scoring, but a missed field goal kept the game knotted at zero. Green Bay then took over and

marched down the field on a seven-play drive, capped off by a Reed 16-yard rushing touchdown. The Giants immediately responded with an eight-play drive that resulted in a Barkley five-yard rushing touchdown.

Love fumbled on the next drive, but the Packers were able to hold the Giants to a turnover-on-downs to get the ball back late in the first half and kick a field goal to go up three.

Coming out of halftime, the Packers forced the Giants to punt, but a muff by Packers' returner Keisean Nixon set the Giants up at the Packers' 31-yard line. DeVito picked up his biggest play of the game on the drive, rushing 26 yards on 2nd-and-six to set up Barkley's second touchdown of the game.

Green Bay was forced to punt on its ensuing drive. It was the Giants though who muffed the punt this time and Green Bay took over at the Giants' 14-yard line. The Packers could not do anything with the drive though and were forced to settle for a field goal to cut New York's lead to one.

The Giants immediately responded with a touchdown as DeVito found Giants receiver Isiah Hodgins in the back corner of the end zone to go up eight.

Green Bay then pushed down the field quickly on the backs of a 16-yard reception from Samori Toure and a 14-yard reception from Romeo Doubs. That drive yielded no points though as kicker Anders Carlson missed the 45-yard attempt. From there, the crazy fourth quarter commenced.

The loss to the Giants does not immediately hurt the Packers in the playoff picture, as despite its 6-7 record, Green Bay still finds itself in the seventh seed, one game behind the Minnesota Vikings and three back of the Detroit Lions for the lead in the NFC North. Green Bay still controls its own destiny, but four teams in the NFC sit at a 6-7 record looking to swipe that seventh seed.

For what it is worth, the New York Times Playoff Simulator gives the Packers a 50% chance to make the playoffs. If Green Bay beats Tampa Bay next week, that goes up to 67%. If Green Bay loses to Tampa Bay next week, that goes down to 25%.

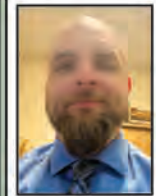

Bucs' weak ground game could be a blessing for Packers' defense

Mayfield's done enough to keep Bucs respectable as they move on from Brady

Packers' offense vs. Bucs' defense

The Bucs' defense was what was their strongest unit when they ended the Packers' Super Bowl dreams a few years ago. A large portion of that defense is still in Tampa Bay under Todd Bowles.

They may not be as strong, but there are still capable players on that side of the ball.

Antoine Winfield Jr. is as good as it gets at the safety position. The son of former Packer nemesis Antoine Winfield has three sacks and two interceptions on the season. He seems to have a nose for the football.

The Bucs' defense is built from the front back and that starts with Vita Vea. Vea was one of the game wreckers from the NFC title game a few years ago. He is able to stymie any team's run game but also rushes the passer.

The defense as a whole is ranked 27th in the NFL in yards per game. Despite being at the bottom of the league, this is not a unit to sleep on. They still have players that have played a lot of football and made some big plays.

The Packers' offense continues to come on strong. Their performance against the Kansas City Chiefs was one of the best of the season. They had five scoring drives and only punted twice.

Their two punts were a result of self-inflicted wounds more than anything the Chiefs did.

The young offense is growing up in front of all of us.

Jordan Love threw three more touchdown passes against the Chiefs, and going into Monday Night Football had thrown eight touchdowns to zero interceptions during the team's three-game winning streak.

On Monday, he added another TD but also added an interception.

Christian Watson was one of the stories of that winning streak, but unfortunately injured his hamstring

late in the fourth quarter against the Chiefs. Watson was having his best stretch of his young season, and the offense appears to be at its best when he is at his best.

In Watson's absence, the team will be hopeful to get Aaron Jones back to full strength. Jones practiced all week last week, and could be ready for prime time against Tampa Bay. That will help the team as a running back and a receiver out of the backfield.

The biggest key that needs to continue as the Packers go through this final stretch of games is that Love has not turned the ball over.

During the Packers' losing streak early in the year, he worked his way to the top of the leaderboard in interceptions.

He's played clean, and as a result, the offense has been much better.

The run game is still struggling, and that may be the case all season.

AJ Dillon and Aaron Jones have rarely been on the field at the same time this year as Jones has battled injuries all year.

The third running back spot has been a bit of a revolving door. Patrick Taylor has been in and out of Green Bay. Emanuel Wilson was there before he was placed on injured reserve after injuring his shoulder against the Los Angeles Chargers.

The Packers signed Kenyan Drake and released James Robinson a week ago. Whether or not that gives the team a boost remains to be seen. If nothing else, Drake has experience as a pass catcher, and he could give some more juice there.

Whether Jones is ready for an extended workload remains to be seen. If he is, it'll likely be Jones and Dillon trying to jumpstart this anemic Green Bay ground game.

Packers' defense vs. Bucs' offense

Tom Brady chose the Bucs in part because of the group that would surround him in Tampa Bay.

Brady brought Rob Gronkowski and Antonio Brown with him, but they were role players on that team.

The stars of the show were Chris Godwin and Mike Evans. Those two are still in Tampa Bay, and they're still causing headaches for opposing defensive coordinators.

Baker Mayfield has stepped in and played solid football for the Bucs. He's not Tom Brady, but then again nobody is. That being said, he's done enough to keep the Bucs respectable in their first season transitioning away from the future Hall of Famer.

The Bucs' run game is a source of concern for them. They're ranked 30th in the NFL in rush yards per game.

The Packers have had their struggles against opposing ground games. They've allowed more than

200 yards rushing in three games this season. The Bucs struggles are likely a welcome sight for Green Bay, considering how well they're set up to defend opposing pass games.

The Packers' defense has not always looked pretty, but they've been effective. Joe Barry recently said the most important number was the one on the scoreboard.

The Packers have done well in that regard. They've crept into the top 10 in points allowed per game. They have not allowed more than 24 points in a game since Week 2 against Atlanta.

One of the biggest reasons for that is Green Bay's pass rush.

Rashan Gary has four sacks and two forced fumbles in two of the last three games.

Preston Smith, Lukas Van Ness and Kenny Clark have all at least shared a sack as well in the last two games.

The Packers cornerback room finally got on the board for an interception when Keisean Nixon picked off Patrick Mahomes late in the fourth quarter of their game against the Chiefs.

They should have more opportunities to catch errant passes from Baker Mayfield if they're able to put him under pressure.

Special teams

The Packers' kicking game has rebounded nicely. Anders Carlson, after having missed a kick in every game since the bye week, had a massive rebound against the Chiefs. Carlson made what is likely the biggest kick of his career when he drilled a 48-yard field goal to give the Packers an 8-point lead.

Keisean Nixon has to feel like more opportunities are going to come his way to return kickoffs. As the weather gets deeper into December, the temperatures will continue to drop, which should mean kickers won't be able to drill the ball out of the back of the end zone.

The Packers' coverage units have gotten better in recent weeks, but are still ranked near the bottom of the league in Special Teams DVOA.

Coming into Week 14, the Packers were ranked 30th in that regard.

The Bucs were ranked 30th in Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings a year ago. Their kicker situation is solid. Chase McLaughlin has only missed two of the 43 kicks he's attempted this season. That includes drilling a 57-yard field goal against the Minnesota Vikings. He has plenty of range, which makes things interesting in a game that could come down to the wire.



With just a couple minutes left in the game Monday, Jordan Love maneuvered around the pocket before throwing a bullet to Malik Heath in the end zone for what appeared to be a touchdown, but safety Jason Pinnock knocked it away from Heath, who was a bit lackadaisical after the grab; the ruling stood upon review. That made it third-and-goal from the 6 and Heath made amends with an incredible all-hands catch at the pylon.

Packers, Buccaneers ready for another 'Battle of the Bays'

The Green Bay Packers return home on a short week after having to travel to MetLife Stadium to take on the New York Giants.

This week, they face another NFC opponent who has had struggles of their own, but one they're pretty familiar with.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers used to be division rivals with the Packers. The famous "Battle of the Bays" was something that would happen twice a year. There were epic battles between Brett Favre and Warren Sapp, including a 21-7 slugfest in the Divisional Round of the 1997-98 NFL Playoffs.

The two teams have not been division rivals since the early 2000s, but did meet up three years ago for the NFC Championship.

Tom Brady and the Bucs beat Aaron Rodgers in the Packers in the only playoff matchup between the two legendary quarterbacks.

The two teams met last year in Tampa, with the Packers winning 14-12.

The two teams are in transition now. Baker Mayfield is the starting quarterback in Tampa Bay after Tom Brady retired.

Jordan Love and company are rolling and eyeing a spot in the NFC playoffs.

If they're going to get there, here are the keys to beating the Bucs at home.

Packers' corners

vs. Mike Evans and Chris Godwin

Brady might be gone, but the structure of the Tampa Bay passing game that helped Brady lead the Bucs to three consecutive playoff appearances is still in tow.

Mike Evans is over 1,000 yards again in a career that may have him fitted for a gold jacket at the end of the season.

Chris Godwin is one of the better slot receivers in all of football.

The Packers' cornerback situation is tenuous.

Carrington Valentine has been a revelation. He was pushed into the starting lineup after Rasul Douglas was traded to the Buffalo Bills at the trade deadline.

Valentine has been flanked by Corey Ballentine. The two started again in New York against the Giants.

Keisean Nixon made the first interception by a Green Bay cornerback on the active roster with a massive play against the Chiefs late in the fourth quarter. He has played better of late, and will likely see a lot of Chris Godwin on Sunday.

Jaire Alexander missed another game with a shoulder injury that has completely derailed his season. At this point in the year, it's hard to say when Alexander will be back on the field. He has only missed one practice since Week 11, but has not suited up at game time.

Even if Alexander does play, Evans and Godwin represent a challenge for a Packers secondary that has been decimated by injury throughout the season.

Packers' pass rush vs. Baker Mayfield

The Packers' pass rush was supposed to be one of the strengths of their team.

They've started to flex their muscles during the team's winning streak. They had three sacks against both Jared Goff and Patrick Mahomes in their most impressive two-game stretch of the season.

Rashan Gary is a star, and has played like one over the last month.

He's likely to only get better as he gets further removed from an ACL injury that derailed his season a year ago.

Kenny Clark has just as many

pressures on the season as Gary according to Pro Football Focus.

Both are tied for the team lead with 41 apiece.

Clark has an opportunity to create some havoc against a Tampa interior that struggles with pressure.

In addition to those two, Preston Smith, Lukas Van Ness and Karl Brooks have all created some havoc over the last month of the year.

That's a positive sign when a team is set to face Mayfield.

When Mayfield is pressured, he gets reckless with the ball. The Packers saw that firsthand in a Christmas Day matchup two years ago where Mayfield was picked off four times.

Mayfield comes into play on Sunday with 20 touchdowns to just eight interceptions.

The key will be getting pressure

against Mayfield and forcing him to make mistakes.

Matt LaFleur and Jordan Love vs. Todd Bowles

The Packers have gone through a bit of a gauntlet of defensive coaches in the last two weeks.

Steve Spagnuolo is one of the

most decorated coordinators in the sport. The Packers moved the ball seemingly at will against the Chiefs. Spagnuolo threw a variety of looks at Jordan Love, and they seemed to have answers for all of them.

They moved from Spagnuolo to Wink Martindale.

Against the Giants, the Packers' pass offense looked too much like

the one that stumbled through the month of October.

Todd Bowles is a little different than both Martindale and Spagnuolo. He lives in a cover-2 world and is not as blitz heavy as Martindale or Spagnuolo has proven to be.

He is good at disguising coverages and making opposing offenses think about what they are seeing.

Bowles was the defensive coordinator on Bruce Arians' staff that helped stifle Aaron Rodgers and the high-powered 2020 Packers' offense.

He'll be looking to try and force Love into some mistakes. Matt LaFleur will need to help his young quarterback and offense that is coming into its own of late.

Long reunites with Gary, others

Newest Packers' cornerback ready to contribute right away

The Green Bay Packers claimed cornerback David Long Jr. off waivers from the Carolina Panthers on Dec. 5.

Long (5-11, 196), a fifth-year player out of the University of Michigan, was originally selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the third round of the 2019 NFL Draft. He played four seasons for the Rams (2019-22) before joining the Las Vegas Raiders this past offseason. He played in eight games with one start for the Raiders this season before being released on Nov. 2.

Long was then claimed by Carolina, where he appeared in three contests with one start.

For his career, he has played in 63 regular-season games with 12 starts, recording 94 tackles (81 solo), an interception, eight passes defended and two tackles on special teams.

Long appeared in six postseason contests with one start for the Rams (2020-21), posting 12 tackles (11 solo),

a tackle for a loss and an interception returned for a touchdown.

So what's this been like for you? It's the ups and downs of the league I suppose, but what's this last 48 hours been like for you?

It just comes with the territory of being in the league. You know, I was cut one day and then claimed and then you just get on the flight and get prepared to insert yourself into another system, culture and just do all you can to help the team win.

What's the toughest thing about changing teams again?

Man, I think it's tough, you know, because this is a business of people, and you get familiar with people. But, you know, just being yourself, packing a light bag so it's easy to move around, and then just going out there and giving your best for your new teammates and new peers so that they have earned respect for you.

Do you know anyone?

I actually know a good amount of guys. I was with Robert Rochell in L.A. I went to school with Rashan

Gary; we're the same recruiting class, so I spent three years with him in Michigan. John Runyan, as well. I was with Matt, the long snapper, in L.A., as well, Super Bowl year. And I know Keisean Nixon; he's from the L.A. area. I'm from Pasadena, but I played high school in Los Angeles.

I know you just got here, but I assume you know the defense at least fairly well, right? Because you spent four years with the Rams, and this is their defense.

Yeah, there's some familiar calls and things like that. So that's always easy when you go to a system or defense that you're familiar with. So, just getting used to the terminology and things like that and their identity and mindset on the defense.

You mentioned packing a "light bag." What did you bring? Couple changes of clothes?

Yeah, the biggest bag I pack probably is my football stuff: cleats, stuff to keep my body together.

And then clothes-wise, underwear, toiletries, you get that when you go and then you just kind of pack some warm clothes heading out here. And then everything else kind of sorts of stuff.

Reuniting with Gary?

It's cool. I've spent a good deal of time with Rashan. We kind of grew up from boys to men at Michigan. And I've been a huge fan of his. Happy to see his success the last few years. So, to be here and be able to share the field with him is extremely cool for me, and we already have a connection in terms of just like understanding who I am, who he is. We've grown some being in the league but, at its core, I think I understand who he is and he understands who I am.

You were a top prospect that's bounced around. Confidence?

Yeah, that's a valid question. Sometimes, it's not always me. I think I'm very self-aware. I understand things I need to work on, but the thing about this league is it's not always black and white in terms of why things happen and why things don't.

You see a lot of guys bounce around the league that have been productive or can be productive, and I think for me it's just staying in the fight. I'm not coming into a situation where I feel like I need to be a CEO when the opportunity to make the team or to make the company is cleaning in the floors. I'm willing to

do whatever I can or wear whatever hat. I don't really allow my ego and my pride to get in the way.

I was a starter in the Super Bowl, and then I've been bouncing around this past year for the first time between teams. I was playing a little bit on defense and not playing. But, yeah, just leaving my pride and my ego out of it and just trying to do the best I can for the defense. I don't really think too much about myself. My personal journey, that will take care of itself as long as I do what I need to do for the team.

Is Rasul Douglas a good example of what can happen with a fresh start?

I think every opportunity is a fresh start for me. I think this is a great place. They're turning in the right direction. I'm happy to be here. And I'm just willing to take advantage of my opportunities, and we'll see where it goes from here.

Where are you playing inside? Outside?

I've played everything, honestly. Super Bowl year, I was featured mainly in the slot, but I've bounced around outside, as well. This last year, I've been a lot playing corner, but I can do it all. Like I said, I understand my skillset; they understand it. So, whatever the team needs, I'm willing to do that. That's kind of how I go about it.

How Green Bay responds to loss will determine future

After winning three straight and turning its season around, the Green Bay Packers got slapped in the face Monday, losing 24-22 to the New York Giants.

It really seemed like the Packers had turned the corner after its victory over the Kansas Chiefs two weeks ago. The mistakes that fans had seen in the first ten games were seemingly over in the Packers' three-game win streak. There were fewer penalties and close to no turnovers, but that seemed to change in Green Bay's loss to the New York Giants.

While Green Bay did hold the lead late against the Giants, the game felt closer to how the team played when it was 3-6, rather than when it was 6-6. The problem with that is that it came in a very winnable game. Even though the Giants have now won three games in a row, it seemed that at the time, the Packers were clearly the superior team.

But as Packers head coach Matt LaFleur has said multiple times, the

NFL has a way of humbling you and that wasn't more true than on Monday night for Green Bay.

"No, not at all," said LaFleur, when asked if the team sensed a poor performance like this throughout the week. "That is why it is disappointing. You get a Monday night game on a big stage, and I thought we had a good week of preparation, and in practice, it was pretty clean, but ultimately you have to do it on gameday."

The theme for the Packers this season has been the youth, and the common saying is that with a young team, there is going to be some ups and there is going to be some downs. That hasn't been more true this year, as Green Bay started 2-1, before going 1-5 and then 3-0. With the loss to the Giants, Green Bay needs to avoid another low point in the season as the playoffs loom large.

Even though the team is 3-1 in the last four games, it really feels like Green Bay needs to come away with another statement win and that can happen this week against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. With Tampa Bay

coming to Lambeau Field on Sunday and looking to solidify its playoff life, not only getting a win, but a dominant win should work wonders in righting the Packers' season before it goes south quickly.

"They are all critical, they are all critical," said LaFleur, on how critical the loss is. "But, we better have a short memory. You have to learn from it and move on and we are on a short week now against a team in Tampa that is also fighting for their playoff lives and are the leaders of their division, so we are going to have to play a lot better than we did tonight in order to come out on top."

LaFleur is right, Green Bay is going to need to play a lot better than it did against the Giants.

The good news for Green Bay is that the loss to the Giants was only LaFleur's first loss in December. With Baker Mayfield starting at quarterback for the Buccaneers, it also poses a strong opportunity for the Packers, as Mayfield has historically struggled at Lambeau Field. In two career starts at Lambeau Field, Mayfield is 0-2, throwing for three touchdowns and five interceptions.

Now obviously, the team he is leading this year is much different than teams in the past, but given Tampa Bay's inconsistency on both the offensive and defensive lines this year, Green Bay needs to control the line of scrimmage to come away with a victory here.

There are still four weeks left in the regular season, and realistically the playoffs may come down to Green Bay's matchup with the Minnesota Vikings in week 17, but this game against the Buccaneers really has a must-win feel to it. If Green Bay loses and any of the Los Angeles Rams, Seattle Seahawks, Atlanta Falcons, New Orleans Saints, or New York Giants win next week, the Packers could find themselves out of the playoffs.

For a team that once looked like it was going to get a top-7 pick, to a team that looked like it could sneak into the playoffs, to a team that now controls its destiny, the next four weeks are going to be very stressful in Green Bay. That all starts this week, as the Packers have as close to a must-win game as one team can get without having a must-win game.
