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Gaggle to monitor school-issued devices

School board approves spending \$20K to install system to prevent bullying, suicide, more

The Shawano School District will be using a new system to oversee all computer devices owned by it after the Shawano School Board approved a deal with Gaggle Safety Management on Dec. 11.

Using the services is expected to cost \$20,778 for the first year and about \$18,000 annually after that. The system is expected to flag concerning content on school-issued accounts for review and block potentially harmful content. That flagged content is reviewed by at least two Gaggle safety experts and, in severe situations, the district is contacted about potential harm from the content.

The funding for the initial purchase will be coming from the district's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funds.

Superintendent Kurt Krizan reported that the district had previously used the system called Bark to watch over computers and issue alerts whenever there were incidents of online bullying, cheating and more. Krizan said the system at the time had been free, but its use had been suspended by "a previous administration."

The district was planning to use Bark again but learned the system was now going to cost. Eric Brunner, the district's technology director, said the cost to use Bark would be \$13.50 per student annually, while the cost for Gaggle would be \$9 per student.

The idea came from Shawano Community High School principal Matt Raduechel, who had previously used Gaggle while being an administrator in the Wausau School District.

Gaggle claims it has analyzed more than 6.7 billion student emails, chats and computer files during the 2021-22 school year and found over 454,000 that required district attention, with one in three of those referencing suicide or self-harm.

Board member John Arens expressed concern about technology being used to monitor students while having policies that keeps them from utilizing artificial intelligence in their work.

"We're going to buy some software that's going to monitor students ... and yet we can't allow our students to use machine learning to maybe enhance their education?" Arens said. "I think the argument goes both ways on machine learning. It's not like this is an emergency, and we need this."

Raduechel said that the district shouldn't wait until there is an emergency to set up the Gaggle system.

"When we talk about student safety, there's no less than a dozen if not more in my seven years as an AP (associate principal) at John Muir Middle School where we had suicidal ideations that were caught by the Gaggle platform," Raduechel said, noting there were several instances where he was contacted early in the morning about the information flagged by the system and contacted law enforcement to do a wellness check on the students. "That's something that we're not able to do with Bark or anything that we're currently doing."

Besides suicide, Gaggle can pick up on student searches on weaponry and bullying, according to Raduechel. Any attempts to access pornography, especially involving children, will be blocked, he said.

"Sometimes, students are researching a video game, but other times, they're talking about weaponry or something like that," Raduechel said.

Arens noted that instances where the board has had to go into closed session about student expulsions over threatening behavior has not come from the school-issued devices but

from their personal cellphones, which Gaggle would not be able to monitor unless the students access their school accounts.

Madeline Schroth, a student representative on the school board, questioned how using foul language on a student device would be considered a safety issue.

Foul language alone would not be an issue in single instances, according to Raduechel, but pervasive use, especially if it's a threatening nature, would be cause for alarm.

Board member Al Pyatskowitz expressed concern that the surveillance is being put in after the devices have already been checked out to students, and notifications aren't going out to families. Pyatskowitz also criticized how the matter was going to the full board and bypassing the review of the district's finance committee.

"We talked about this last summer that we don't want to have a situation where we say, 'You have to vote on this tonight right away,'" Pyatskowitz said.

Despite board members' concerns, the expenditure on Gaggle passed unanimously.

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Shawano County OKs study of future needs

Report will focus on strategic plans instead of nuts-and-bolts details

Earlier this year, the Shawano County Board of Supervisors was presented with an in-depth study of the condition of the courthouse, heating plant, sheriff's department and jail.

Now, the public property committee wants a study aimed more at the future needs of the county.

A \$2,500 contract with The Samuels Group was authorized by the committee at its Dec. 7 meeting.

The study will concentrate more on the spacial concerns and needs as opposed to the recent study that focused on the state of the existing buildings.

"This would avoid another study where you would just spend a bunch of money, having somebody draw up another set of plans, or what they

think you should build," Supervisor Tom Kautza said.

The recent Somerville study centered on the age and status of select buildings — the number of hot water heaters, the age of the elevator, wear and tear on doors and locks, etc.

Jim Davel, county administrative coordinator, said the study offers a way for the county to establish its future. Prioritizing the county's needs is essential to developing a strategic approach to address the needs through a long-range plan.

"This guy's going to look at all the things we have on record right now," Davel said.

The Wausau-based company will provide the county with a preliminary opinion of a building master plan phasing schedule. The master plan will be based on previous building studies the county has completed as well as existing building tours and interviews with key county staff members and officials.

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Shooter training helps police, emergency crews

Event at Maple Lane allows for bugs to be worked out in case mass shooting happens in Shawano

It's rare for a day to go by without hearing something in the news about a shooting somewhere in the United States, whether it be a school, mall, park, place of worship or department store.

While it might be worrisome for many, folks in the Shawano area can rest easier knowing that local law enforcement and emergency services are training to take swift and decisive action if one of those mass shootings ever came here. The Shawano Police Department, Shawano Area Fire Department, Shawano County Sheriff's Department and Shawano Ambulance Service came together Dec. 12 and Dec. 14 at the former Maple Lane Health Services facility in the Town of Belle Plaine for active shooter training.

The training ranged from tabletop exercises to full interactive scenarios where the shooter or shooters must be taken out of play, those with injuries can get care as quickly as possible, and others in the hot zone can be rescued and reunited with loved ones. NEW Media got an up-close look of some of the scenarios that local officials trained for.

Local children played some of the injured, who were taken out of the building by a combination of EMS and fire personnel, closely flanked by law enforcement in order to keep emergency crews safe in case the shooter is still on the loose. One of the things participants try to do is establish a "warm zone" to bring the injured in an area where immediate care can be given, according to Shawano Police Chief Bradley Rabideau, but it is still considered a hazardous area if the shooter has not been neutralized.

Another aspect that officials focused on was establishing a tactical area where at least one representative from each agency was there to dispatch law enforcement and emergency crews on site. Rabideau noted that is necessary because dispatchers will often be overwhelmed by other calls coming in once word gets out there has been a shooting incident.

The training showed there were some things that needed to be ironed out. One example was bringing injured out before ambulances were on-site to take them to area hospitals. Rabideau said that, ideally, the ambulances should stop just long enough to load the wounded and take off, as minutes and even seconds can make the difference between life and death.

However, officials would rather that mistakes be uncovered in the training so that things can be ironed out. According to Capt. Shane Stange, mistakes should come out now rather than when the real thing comes about.

"That's how you grow," Stange said. "In order to grow, you have to make some mistakes. The next time we do this, I have no doubt that it will be even more efficient. You want to make as many mistakes

here as possible so that, when we're actually on the scene, we're not making as many mistakes."

It has been a couple of years since the police have done an active shooter scenario, but Stange hopes to conduct the training on an annual basis. He noted the police department has done trainings on various situations on a monthly basis.

"I think law enforcement has done a good job in the last couple of years of going towards the threat and eliminating the threat," Stange said. "We haven't focused as much on what happens after that threat is done. There's always two threats at every scene. The first thing is the shooter. The second thing is time. We want to get the victims to the hospital as fast as possible, so it's not just eliminating the shooter, but also the most efficient way to get victims to the hospital."

Stange noted the training uses a "crawl, walk, run strategy," which is why it started with discussions and tabletop exercises before the live active shooter scenarios. To do otherwise overloads the people in training and is akin to "drinking from a fire hose," he said.

Stange added that it was helpful to have a larger facility to train, which he attributed to the benevolence of North Shore Healthcare, which owns the building.

"When we contacted them, they said, 'Absolutely,'" Stange said. "They brought all these treats for us, and they've been very supportive of what we're trying to do here."

"There's no point in running before you learn how to crawl," Stange said. "You start out slow, and you gradually build up."

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Dotcom Branding to expand operations

Company to renovate blighted building in 200 block of North Main Street

A longtime vacant building in the city of Shawano's 200 block of North Main Street could soon see signs of life again.

The Shawano Common Council approved a development agreement between the Shawano Redevelopment Authority and Dotcom Branding LLC, a company based in Shawano, to renovate the building at 201 N. Main St., known as the Muehl property. The RDA will provide a \$50,000 grant that will go toward the renovations.

Currently, Dotcom Branding is operating in a smaller space at 142 S. Main St. Kasey Hohn started the business many years ago from his home but moved into the downtown facility in 2020 as his business expanded.

Dotcom Branding currently provides apparel and wrap branding for the Shawano, Bonduel, Pulaski and Clintonville school districts, along with Sacred Heart Catholic School. He also provides wraps and tinting, decals and other apparel.

The Muehl building is one of the more blighted in the city, which has been trying to renovate a number of buildings in the 200 block in recent years. According to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard, the complex has three buildings, and Dotcom Branding will operate in two of those buildings, with the third one being demolished.

"The third building, we believe, has to come down," Sheppard said. "We've had multiple meetings with structural people there and had a tour through it with members of the historical society, and it probably isn't salvageable. That will be part of a different deal, because they (Dotcom Branding) aren't planning

to use it, anyway."

The total cost to renovate the two buildings is estimated to be \$266,500. That will include heating, ventilation and air conditioning work, along with roof repairs and replacement, flooring, lighting, electrical work, plumbing and bathroom and a new garage door. Once the business relocates, Dotcom Branding will replace the windows within 18 months after opening at an additional cost of \$26,000.

"This will bring the building up to operational standards, which it cur-

rently is not," Sheppard said. "There's a considerable amount of work, so we're essentially taking the \$50,000 purchase price and providing that as a development incentive on the project, so we're doing a value transfer. There won't be a cash transaction."

Under the agreement, the city will agree to do a curb cut, estimated at \$800, to allow vehicles to access the buildings.

Sheppard said the city has had over 20 different prospects on the property but feels Dotcom Branding's proposal

has the best chance to revitalize the buildings. The Muehl building has been vacant since around 2003.

"It's worth getting the buildings reactivated," Sheppard said. "It'll become a value again to downtown."

It's up in the air what the cost to the city will be for the building to be demolished. Sheppard noted that the city has to check and see if there's asbestos abatement that needs to be done.

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Police step up efforts to bust drunk drivers

The Shawano Police Department and the Shawano County and Menominee County sheriff's departments are stepping up enforcement to get impaired drivers off the roads this holiday season through the annual Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over holiday enforcement campaign that goes until Jan. 1.

The campaign takes place over

the holidays to prevent impaired driving crashes and ensure everyone can celebrate safely.

"We are not just focused on stopping or arresting drivers. Our goal is to save lives," Shawano Police Lt. Mike Musolff said. "Someone is killed or injured in an impaired driving crash about every two hours in Wisconsin. We must put an end to these preventable

tragedies so everyone can make it home for the holidays."

Nearly 7,000 police officers are trained in advanced roadside impaired driving enforcement to help detect and remove impaired drivers from the roads. There are also almost 400 highly trained drug recognition experts in Wisconsin, among the most in the nation.

Besides the local enforcement,

there are 29 multi-jurisdictional high-visibility OWI task forces operating around the state.

"Preventing impaired driving is so simple, but it requires a commitment from everyone in Wisconsin," Musolff said. "Help us keep you, your friends, and your family safe this holiday season. Talk with your loved ones about getting home safely and always drive sober."

County wants out of airport business

Kautza, other supervisors upset with costs, lack of benefits

The Shawano City-County Airport could soon have a new owner – sort of.

Shawano County officials are weighing the option of turning over the airport 100% to the city of Shawano.

Currently, the two governments share costs for airport operations, and a joint commission that has jurisdiction for the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance and operation of the airport.

“I don’t see any benefit at all coming out of the airport for the county besides spending money,” Supervisor Tom Kautza said to the county’s public property committee Dec. 7. “I can see no real benefit for it, of what it produces around here. It’s nice to have, but it’s another one of these things that’s nice to have, but how many people really use it, and what’s it do for everybody.”

Many municipalities began operating airports in the 1940s. The Shawano airport was dedicated in July 1940.

“That’s around World War II, and this is such a different time,” Kautza said. “That’s when they were building radar bases and everything else. I simply can’t see where what it would gain, with Green Bay’s close proximity, Appleton airport, central Wisconsin on the west end.

“And the grand plans that they have coming up for a seaport and all this other stuff. Who’s going to use that seaport?”

Supervisor Randy Young, who represents part of Shawano, is opposed to the city going it alone. He noted recent discussions he’s had with Mayor Bruce Milavitz and City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

“I asked them to convince me why it’s a good idea for the city to take it over,” he said. “Their answer basically was just because the county wants out, and we don’t want it to go away.”

Several days after the meeting, Milavitz and Sheppard confirmed Young’s comments.

“These talks (about going our separate ways) have been going on for some time,” Sheppard said. “We believe the airport is an important asset to the community. We are OK

with the county transferring its levy responsibility, but this process can take up to a year, so no changes will be made until 2025.”

The airport commission is another sore spot for the county board chairman.

“The airport commission doesn’t want to answer to anybody,” Kautza said. “And the city will not give up on having the airport commission.”

Jim Davel, county administrative coordinator, said the county preferred disbanding the commission and hiring an airport director to report to the city.

“We thought that was a good plan, and they just didn’t want to do that,” he said.

Milavitz said the city has not had any issues with the commission. It operates completely above board and determines rates and other costs based on a fair market analysis.

Kautza said the airport was another “money pit” for the county.

“It’s the most inefficient run operation that is getting government money, and to tell you the truth, that’s one of the things I can’t stomach about it,” he said. “There’s no sense of where the money is coming from, and it’s like when they come with something, they’re demanding it, that we

have to do this.”

Kautza said Milavitz, who sits on the airport commission, also helps set the rates for himself as a member of the commission.

Supervisor Jerry Erdmann agreed.

“The county, we get nothing out of it,” he said. “They have ideas, but their ideas are just going to cost the county money.”

Young disagreed.

“I’m probably not going to support it, because, from the city, I don’t think it’s maybe the best idea for the city to go alone,” he said.

Milavitz said the county’s position is based on a lack of understanding on how the airport commission works, as well as a personality conflict that has little to do with the airport.

“The airport is a great asset for the community — the city as well as the county,” he said.

The county pays about \$75,000 a year from its general fund for the airport, and upwards of another \$25,000 for capital improvements when requested.

A resolution for the county to pull away from the airport will be discussed at the January county executive committee meeting.

Shawano water rates to go up 23%

More frequent, smaller increases expected in future years for water, sewer

Water rates for average residential customers of the Shawano Water and Sewer Utility will increase by 23%, or \$5.43, monthly effective Dec. 31, according to the utility.

The cost for average residential customers using approximately 3,000 gallons of water a month will increase from \$23.71 to \$29.14, according to a rate order the Public Service Commission issued on Dec. 4.

The above amounts include the Fire Protection Charge the utility collects for hydrant maintenance and other costs it incurs association with firefighting.

Rates for multifamily, commercial, industrial and public authority customers increased between 25% and 43% depending on customer class and usage.

There were no comments made at the Nov. 14 public hearing on the proposed rate increase. The city accepted PSC's revenue recommendation prior to the hearing.

It's the first significant rate increase since February 2015, although the utility received a 3% overall increase against inflation from the Public Service Commission in 2018.

Since then, inflation, which has increased operating expenses, and additional investment in the utility's infrastructure have reduced the 5.25% rate of return the PSC authorized in 2015 to a projected 2.45% this year.

The utility sought a 6.5% rate of return on the value of its infrastructure, which would have produced a 29% overall increase in rates. However, the PSC authorized a 6.3% rate, stating that it was the benchmark it had selected based on municipal bond rates in effect

when the utility filed its rate application in June.

The new rates will boost the utility's annual revenue by \$431,732 to \$2.188 million. Against total expenses of \$1.482 million, the PSC projects the utility will have a net income of \$705,788.

Without the new rates, the utility's net income was projected at \$274,056.

The city's sewer rates increased this year by 14%, shortly after the PSC turned over regulating sewer rates to the city.

No increase in sewer rates is expected in 2024, said city finance director Greg Smith.

The city will likely continue the practice of seeking more frequent but smaller water rate increases to lessen the impact on water customers, he said.

"We'll probably lessen the time be-

tween rate increases in order to make them less steep," he said.

The water utility operates with relatively little debt, Smith said, choosing to finance many capital projects from its cash flow.

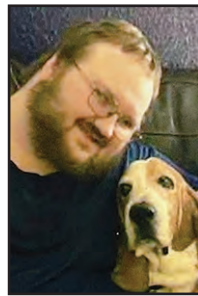
Among the capital projects planned for 2024 are replacing water mains at a cost of about \$2 million, Patrick Bergner, water and sewer utility foreman said.

Community Development Block Grants will cover much of the cost with the city supplying small matching funds.

Mains buried below the streets are replaced during major street reconstruction projects. Next year, certain blocks of South Lafayette, South Lutz, South Franklin and St. Andrews streets will be reconstructed. Bids for those projects are scheduled to be opened this month, he said.

Referendum plans start to coalesce

New middle school out as potential project, while high school pool plans altered

The Shawano School Board is getting closer to planning what specifically it will ask for a referendum question in April, but it appears the plans will not ask for a new middle school at this time.

A work session on Dec. 18 showed consensus that the district would need to maintain the existing middle school building for a few more years in the hopes of asking voters for the new building later down the line.

"If you remember from the survey results, a new middle school did not survey well," said Jody Andres, K-12 education specialist with Hoffman Design, the firm helping the district with the referendum process. "The results told us that if we put it out there, it would probably not pass, and there were some different reasons for that. We're only going to do the things that the community supports."

Building a new middle school and demolishing the existing one would cost the district \$53.7 million if it was done today, about half the money of the total projects the district was looking at for the proposed referendum. A referendum in 2015 put over \$9.5 million into updating the current Shawano Community Middle School, but it has proven to be costly to keep it up in recent years.

"The big caveat is, do we put any money or investment in the existing middle school," Andres said.

Andres recommended that, once the April election is finished, the district should start taking a hard look at what a future middle school would look like and potentially get the community involved. That way, in a few years, if the district decides to pull the trigger, a new referendum would have a higher likelihood of passing.

It also appears that work on the pool at Shawano Community High School will be just enough to make fixes instead of turning the existing infrastructure into a competitive pool for the school's swim team instead of the \$5 million project advertised on a community survey sent out in the fall.

The pool was one of the more favored projects by the community, with 45% of respondents saying the pool should be fixed while 34%

favoring closure. However, there was concern that making the pool a competitive pool under Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association standards would make it less accessible to community members who want to use it.

There was also discussion about building a second pool to be the competitive pool while maintaining the existing pool for the community, with a price tag of over \$13.3 million. The concern about doing that,

though, was whether the district could do that while addressing the deferred maintenance at the current Shawano Community Middle School and keeping the referendum under the \$70 million mark the community survey indicated would most likely pass the scrutiny of voters in April.

The plan for now is to put a new liner in the pool, which doesn't address temperature issues in the facility but would give the infrastructure another five years, according to

Andres, so that a new pool could be properly planned out.

"You've got a direction to fix that pool," Andres said. "Does that mean minimally fix it or fix it to give you another 20-30 years of life?"

Board member John Arens said that doing just the one pool and making it a competition pool would not be a good thing for the district.

"If we just do one pool right now, it will be a competition pool, and then we're going to lose the community's trust," Arens said. "If we want to sit down and make a long-range plan on some of this stuff, then the community can say, this is our goal and get behind us on."

What will be on the ballot is expected to include renovations at Shawano Community High School, which would include expanded areas for athletics, performing arts and technology education, as well as remodeling classrooms and labs and addressing critical maintenance needs to the tune of about \$30 million. An additional \$9.1 million would go into outdoor athletics facilities and a stadium that would include permanent bleachers and rebuilt concessions, ticketing and restrooms, along with putting a track at SCHS instead of using the SCMS one.

At Olga Brener Intermediate School, the district's second oldest facility, officials want to replace the roof along with heating/cooling, electrical and plumbing systems and renovate to make the school fully compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act. This is expected to cost around \$4.4 million.

Hillcrest Primary School would also see remodeled facilities, but it would also turn underutilized areas of the school into a day care, with the cost for this school's work topping out at around \$5.2 million.

Board member Bobbi Lemerond recommended that the final plan include something that will impact all students, not just athletics.

"We need to make sure that we're affecting every student in this district," Lemerond said.

A final decision on the referendum question will be voted on Jan. 8. Once that's done, the question will be put on the ballot for the spring general election April 2.



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Taxi fares in Shawano could increase

Costs to operate service have gone up 40% in 10 years

The city of Shawano's taxi service could be raising its fares as the Shawano Common Council approved annual agreements Dec. 13 with the company running the service.

The rates for City Cab are currently \$4 within city boundaries and \$3 for the elderly and handicapped, with an additional \$1.25 per mile outside the city's boundaries.

According to Greg Smith, the city's finance director, the rates have not been adjusted in at least a decade, but the cost of doing business has. He told the council that the cost per hour of operating City Cab was \$25.82 in 2014. Now, it's \$32.95, and it's expected to jump to \$37.59 in the future.

"Within 10 years, this cost has gone up quite significantly, over 40%," Smith said. "We haven't raised costs, as far as I can see, in over 10 years. So that's something to consider with this rising cost."

About 57% of the costs are expected to be covered by a federal grant, Smith said, although that will not be finalized until April. That will be when it's determined if the rates

need to increase and by how much.

"At that point, I'll reach back out to you," Smith told the council. "Right now, we're just going through the application process. Being conservative in some of our numbers, I believe we should be OK, but once DOT (Department of Transportation) comes out with its final allocations, spreading out the state and federal dollars, we should know a little bit more."

The council approved a five-year contract with Running Inc., based in Viroqua. Running Inc. operates a number of transit services throughout Wisconsin, including Tomah, Beaver Dam and Stoughton. The contract requires a maximum of \$443,712.36, based on 11,804 hours of service at the \$37.59 rate.

According to Smith, two companies submitted bids for the contract.

The council also approved submitting an application to purchase a new handicap-accessible minivan for City Cab, with the city providing up to \$10,000 in matching funds. Smith noted that the van being replaced will be put up for public auction to replenish the funds.

"There are sufficient funds to cover that portion of the grant this year," Smith said, who noted the total cost of the van could be around \$75,000.

The council also approved a resolution leasing the six current vehicles to Running Inc.

Hoffman declined to comment on why she is not running for another term. She was first elected to the council in 2017 and is currently serving as council president.

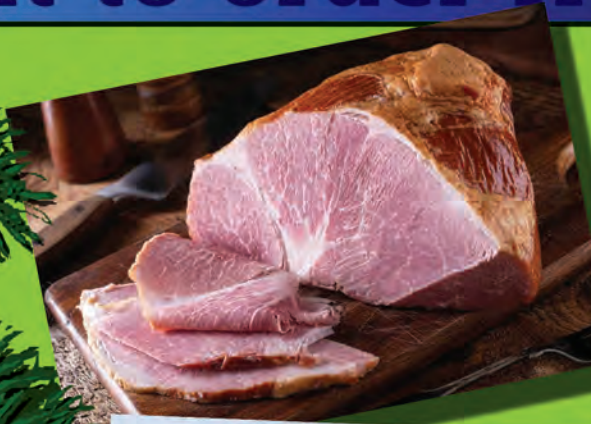
Also up for election are the second

The deadline to submit paperwork is Jan. 2. Mayoral candidates need the signatures of 50-100 city residents, and council candidates need 20-40 signatures from residents in their district. Anyone interested in running

As of Dec. 19, at least one other person, Brian Suprise, submitted a declaration of candidacy for the sixth district but had not submitted the signatures.

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Menominee chefs serve in Washington, D.C.

Alegria, Husby expose national politicians and other tribes to Menominee cuisine

Menominee chefs Francisco Alegria and Leah Husby got the rare opportunity to bring Indigenous cuisine to Washington, D.C., this month as they served up plenty of natural taste for the Tribal Nations Summit.

Chef Robert Kinneen from the North American Traditional Indigenous Food Systems program asked Alegria and Husby in November if they were interested in cooking at the summit, with only five chefs across the nation being invited to participate. Alegria said that while the invitation was last minute with only 10 days notice, he and Husby were eager to show off the work they're doing as they try to get the Menominee people to embrace ancestral foods again.

"All the tribal leaders meet for a summit in Washington, D.C., so we were asked to come represent the Menominee and create a menu for one of the days," Alegria said.

He added that the invitation likely came as a result of working with Sean Sherman, NATIFS founder and executive director, in 2022 when Sherman came to the Menominee Reservation and helped to prepare a community feast.

"He got to know us pretty well during that event," Alegria said. "I'd cooked with him a couple of times previously, but this was where I could be one-on-one and talk with him."

During the summit, chefs planned a luncheon daily that served 500 people, as well as a cocktail party for 175 people with the U.S. Department of the Interior. Alegria said that Menominee menu included a wild rice and corn salad using Oneida white corn, along with a soup with cranberries, kale and smoked trout. For dessert, they made a berry compote with blueberries macerated in maple syrup with some white pine.

"We went a little bit more traditional," Alegria said, noting that the Menominee menu was served on the last day of the event. "The fish soup

was a seasonal soup."

Alegria was concerned about whether they'd be able to get all of the ingredients needed for the meal, being so far away from the reservation, where cranberries, wild rice and more are readily available, but he and Husby pulled it off.

"We picked the soup because there was a little more wiggle room," Alegria said.

Husby and Alegria also took some Menominee tea from a local tea-maker to Washington and served it to people daily.

Alegria noted that the logistics were interesting, because the chefs had to prepare the meals down the road from where the summit was taking place and then haul it over.

"There was all this security entering the building," he said. "There was no open flames. There was a challenge with keeping food warm."

Alegria and Husby also got to speak to national media during the summit, but reporters seemed more interested in political viewpoints than culinary ones. During the summit, President Joe Biden signed an executive order to streamline tribal access to federal funding, as well as announcing additional steps to help preserve Indigenous history and resources along with buffalo expansion and preservation.

Husby said the experience is one she will always remember.

"Not only is it the highlight of our career but also our lifetime to showcase our community and our foods on that level, to make our community visible at that level for our youngsters that are interested in this kind of career," Husby said. "I think, for both of us, the magnitude of it hasn't really sunk in yet. Everything was so fast while we were there, and then we came back and went to work right away. It almost seems in a way like it didn't happen, just because it was so amazing."

Alegria noted that it was all business in Washington, D.C., but was definitely an incredible experience.

He feels he could go head-to-head with other nationally renowned chefs.

"After cooking all day, you just want to go home and eat something because you're going to do it again the next day," Alegria said. "It wasn't just a one-time thing. We were rocking and rolling until we literally had to leave from serving our food to catch our Uber and then catch a plane. I'm glad to be home."

In addition to working for the Menominee tribe through its agricultural program, Alegria and Husby operate a catering business on the reservation and beyond. Alegria also writes a monthly column on Indigenous food for NEW Media.

Along with the five chefs, there were also aspiring chefs from the Southwestern Indian Polytechnical Institute in Albuquerque, New Mexico, who helped keep the food coming during the summit that took place Dec. 3-7. Seeing the SIPI students has gotten Alegria thinking of potentially doing an Indigenous culinary program on Menominee land, although the concept has not been discussed with tribal officials yet.

"I never knew there was a program like that," Alegria said. "That kind of sparked my interest in that we could get something like that here, some culinary interest here."

Christmas bird counts and last-minute gift ideas

Although it's been unseasonably warm a few weeks before Christmas, those winter doldrums are looming on the horizon for us sportsmen and sportswomen.

The gun-deer season was abnormally quiet for me and many of the hunters I talked to. I saw just a few deer and nothing within gun range. I'm used to hunting the late season, though, and will be out enjoying the Holiday Hunt (Dec. 24 to Jan. 1) for antlerless deer in Waupaca County. Depending on my hunting location, I'll be using either a muzzleloader or a 7-30 Waters pistol. Shawano also has a Holiday Hunt this year.

Archery season (bow and cross-bow) continues through Jan. 7 in most counties and Jan. 31 in a few, so bundle up and get out there. If you shoot a vertical bow, don't forget the armguard with all those extra clothes. Oconto County has the extended archery season to Jan. 31.

I've always had an interest in birds, and love to watch them when on my deer stand or checking my home bird feeders (if I remember to fill them). The National Audubon Society marks the 124th anniversary of its Christmas Bird Count this year, when birders nationwide attempt the Herculean task of trying to count the numbers of as many species as they see from Dec. 14 through Jan. 5 (each local group chooses a single day for their counts).

The grassroots tallies serve as a barometer of each species' health, although such a limited search with folks that may or may not be skilled at bird identification is not a strictly scientific endeavor, but it is loads of fun and if you hang with a few experts (as I have over the years), you'll get better at bird ID. To learn more about the Christmas Bird Count and find a group in your area,

Birders are a unique bunch. A rare yellow-billed loon made an appearance in Rock Falls, Illinois, when I was a reporter for the Telegraph Herald in Dubuque, Iowa (I attended junior college in nearby Dixon, Illinois, but the Arctic visitor quickly made both the local and national newspapers). The winter visit on the Rock River drew birders from around the world, eager to add this off-course loon to their life lists.

I watched as a member of the Linnean Society (the group that gives birds their common names, frequently changing them), wearing a heavy parka and holding his camera, waded into the frigid river up to his waist to get the proper angle of the bird. My headline for the story referenced the "loony" birdwatchers coming to see the loon. How could I resist?

The greatest birder I've ever met, and probably the best to ever practice his craft in Iowa or Illinois, was Pete Petersen, owner of Pete Petersen's Wild Bird Shop in the village of East Davenport, Iowa. When Petersen was a boy, he became crippled from polio and couldn't enjoy physical sports, so his mom gave him a field guide and binoculars. He and his wife traveled the world on birding adventures.

I went out before dawn one spring morning with him when I was a full-time outdoors writer for the Quad-

City Times in Davenport. He was doing a spring breeding bird census, and to say he took it seriously was like saying teenagers take their cell phones seriously. He'd been doing the survey for decades, following the same route and stopping for a few minutes in each spot every year.

We stood on a bridge before sun-up, and he identified eight or 10 species by their calls alone. We hopped in his Mercedes and followed a dirt road until we saw a "road closed" sign. The sign didn't stop him. He drove around it and approached a huge ravine filled with construction equipment. For a second, I thought he was going to try and jump the perhaps 100-foot gap, but he said, "Oh, dear," and we drove around it on another road. Pete complained about how this would alter his survey, but

we had no options. I realized then how seriously he took his birdwatching.

Petersen died of cancer many years ago, and he and his wife donated their collection of rare bird books to Western Illinois University in Macomb: www.wiu.edu/foundation_and_development/profiles/petersen.php.

Christmas is near, and if you're like me, you'll be buying some last-minute gifts. That's the way we guys roll.

A shooting stick is the ideal gift for the gun hunter on your list. I use one for rifle, pistol and even cross-bow hunting. The handy ones are bipods, and can quickly be adjusted to different heights. They will give you a much steadier shot and double as hiking sticks.

Binoculars are perfect for hunters and birdwatchers alike. Don't go for more than 10-power magnification, because you can't hold it steady. Great choices are 7x35 or 8x40 models. You should be able to divide the objective lens (bigger number) by the power (first number) to get a factor of five or more for the most clarity. I probably own eight pairs of binoculars but can always use another.

In the spirit of buying local, I recommend a wildlife calendar or art derived from trail camera photos. Jim Schoenike of Big Oak Products (www.bigoakproducts.com) in Marion offers calendars and note cards for individuals and companies wanting to put their logo and message on them.

Happy holidays. Time spent with family and friends, outdoors or in, is time well spent.

"Go home and enjoy your vacation, Mike. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year."

I was relieved when he left because I had two stops to make before heading home. Our English department had pitched in to provide Christmas dinner for a less fortunate family, and I had volunteered to do the grocery shopping.

It took a while to get everything, and darkness was descending as I threw in a package of Oreos as my own special treat.

I loaded the car and consulted a scrap of paper containing directions. Soon I found myself in a section of Kaukauna many called "the other side of the tracks." I found the address, a decrepit old house divided into down and upstairs apartments. Shivering from more than the cold, I saw light in a downstairs window. Ascending the crumbling cement steps, it was obvious no one lived upstairs. I knocked. No answer. I knocked again.

Finally, the door opened. There stood Mike. I couldn't help but glance inside. Oh my God, how can people live like this? I thought. He must have read my mind because he turned bright red. "What're you doing here, Miss Brantmeier? Seemed like you were in a hurry to get home." Now it was my turn to blush.

"I brought groceries to make Christmas dinner for the family ... ah ... upstairs," I fibbed.

His reply contained a bit of sarcasm. "Nobody up there; uninhabitable." He pronounced each syllable carefully, spelled it correctly, and proudly grinned. It was a vocabulary word we had just covered in class.

I thought quickly. "Then I do need your help, Mike. Can you please take this food?"

"Must be other people who need it more'n we do," Mike countered.

"Maybe," I said, "but please take it; as a favor to me?"

He reluctantly agreed. "All right, but only to help you out. You wait here; I'll carry up the bags. Sorry I can't ask you in, but Ma's sleeping.

She works nights cleaning."

When school resumed, I didn't mention the encounter. He'd quit dropping by my classroom after school, but I didn't ask him about it. I assumed he was embarrassed that I'd discovered his home circumstances. I found out why a few weeks later.

I was at the hardware store after school when I saw Mike there. He was wearing a shirt with the store logo. We exchanged smiles, but he was busy helping a customer find the right tool to fix a leaky faucet. I was impressed. Obviously, he had found his niche.

As the owner waited on me, I thanked him for giving Mike a chance.

"Great kid," he said. "Glad I took your recommendation."

Funny, Mike hadn't asked if he could use me as a reference. I smiled and nodded, pleased that Mike had trusted me enough to know I would say yes.

For the next three and a half decades, at least one student hung around my classroom on the day before Christmas vacation. Long after the rest had bolted as if the school was on fire, they lingered. I did, too. If they felt safer and merrier with me, well, it didn't cost anything to give them a few extra minutes.

After all, as Charles Dickens so wisely observed: we are all fellow travelers to the grave. Indeed. Merry Christmas and God bless us all, every one.

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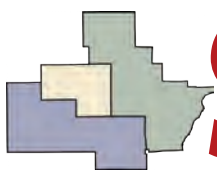
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Wynos signs to play softball in Minnesota

Crop insurance premium rebates open

In partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Risk Management Agency, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) opened the application period for crop insurance premium rebates Dec. 1.

There is \$800,000, or 160,000 acres of coverage, to be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Recipients will receive a \$5 per acre rebate on their summer 2024 crop insurance premium for acres that were planted with cover crops in 2023, then planted with an insurable crop the following year.

Producers who received state or federal cost-sharing to plant cover crops in 2023 are not eligible for this year's program. Applicants will need to use their FSA-578 form to complete

the application, and there is no limit on acres an applicant can apply for. Applicants should keep seed receipts and planting records, as DATCP may conduct audits to ensure cover crops were planted.

The rebate application will be web-based and will be available on DATCP's website until Jan. 31, 2024, or until program funding is exhausted. A copy of the application questions and instructions will be available for reference on DATCP's website prior to the application period opening.

Termination arrived for the Menominee Tribe in 1954. This ended Federal supervision and trust responsibilities for the Menominee Nation.

RESTORATION

On December 22, 1973, the long devastation from Termination ended, and a new era began.

RESILIENCE

In March 1993, the College of Menominee Nation was founded. For 30 years, our Tribal members, surrounding tribes, and communities have provided leaders, administrators, teachers, and nurses.

Menominees mark 50 years of return to tribal status

December 22, 2023, will mark the 50th anniversary of the Menominee Indian Tribe's Restoration from the federal policy of Termination.

The U.S. Congress passed the Menominee Termination Act in 1954 but it did not take effect until April 30, 1961. The Termination Act discontinued federal services and set in motion an economic collapse, social disruption and failure of infrastructure in the Menominee community, according to the tribe.

A core group of Menominee that included Ada Deer, Sylvia Wilber and others lobbied to once again become a federally recognized tribe.

In December 1973, President Richard Nixon signed the Menominee Restoration Act, which reinstituted the Menominee Indian Tribe as a federally recognized sovereign Indian tribe and restored federal services furnished to tribes because of their status as American Indians.

In recognition of this historical milestone, Menominee leadership created a 50th Anniversary Restoration Planning Committee that included Chairperson Myrna Warrington and members Joey Awonohopay and Rachel Fernandez.

The Menominee Tribe of Wisconsin set forth the following timeline regarding Termination and Restoration.

1931

Several Congressional Acts, including the Indian Reorganization Act, authorized per capita distribution of Menominee tribal funds and strengthened the Menominee tribe as a more self-governing entity. The tribe hired attorneys to assist them in a lawsuit against the U.S. government. The lawsuit was for losses sustained through the mismanagement of the lumber operation. In all, 13 lawsuits were initiated against the government.

1934

The Wheeler-Howard Act, known as the Indian Reorganization Act, was signed into law. This allowed tribes to develop a constitution and set up their own governing body.

1935

A congressional act initiated hearings on claims of the Menominee Tribe against the government for cutting other than dead and down timber and fully matured and ripened green timber. The tribe voted and accepted the Reorganizational Act but never organized or operated under provisions of the act. Instead, they decided to keep their 10-member elected Advisory Council and



the General Tribal Council as official decision-making and governing bodies.

1945

The swamp lands case was settled. The government recommended the state be paid for the loan out of Menominee funds. However, the government had to pay for its own oversight and the 38,000 acres of swamp land on the reservation was released from the state jurisdiction.

On July 5, after more than 90 years of intermittent litigation, the tribe received title to 33,870 acres of swamp land for which the federal government paid \$1,590,854 to the state of Wisconsin. The swamp land had been lost to the tribe in 1854, under provision of the Swamp Land Act of September 28, 1850. The award also allowed \$13,666 to the tribe in compensation for timber removed by the state from the swamp lands. The final Court of Claims decision was rendered June 5, 1944, but the conclusion of the matter was delayed until 1945 due to an initial refusal of the Wisconsin Secretary of Treasury and the Secretary of State, both members of the State Land Commission, to sign the transaction.

1951

The Menominee Tribe won an \$8.5 million judgement against the government for failure on the part of the government officials to carry out provisions of the LaFollette Act. About 20,486 acres of pine-hardwood-hemlock forest had been clear-cut northeast of Neopit. The judgment was the result of a settlement entered by the federal court following the consolidation of five lawsuits pending since 1938.

1952

The tribe petitioned Congress for a \$1,500 per capita payment of the award monies for each of the 3,270 enrolled Menominees. The request passed the House but when it reached the Senate, it ran into a road block. Sen. Arthur Watkins (R-Utah) attached a provision to the bill. This

required the tribe to accept termination of federal supervision to get the requested payment. This termination program was a federal policy of forcing tribes to assimilate by withdrawing federal supervision.

Tribal records indicate members assumed they were requesting a portion of their money from the U.S. Treasury. Watkins exerted pressure to coerce the tribe and enforce the termination policy. The Federal Indian Relocation Program started. This program was designed to take Indians from the reservations and assist them in finding work in the city of their choice.

1954

On June 17, the Menominee Termination Act was signed into law by President Dwight Eisenhower, providing for termination of federal control of the Menominee Indian Reservation. This was in spite of the fact the Menominee called another council meeting and unanimously voted to reject termination. The Menominee Tribal rolls were closed as a result of the Termination Policy. The Menominee Tribal Leaders were informed that they had until 1958 to develop a plan to take over the Reservation and submit the plan to the Secretary of Interior. Ironically at this same time, the tribe celebrated the 100th anniversary of the creation of the reservation.

1959

On Jan. 17, the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the newly formed Menominee Enterprise Inc. were adopted by a 91-16 vote at a general council.

On July 3, Gov. Gaylord Nelson signed a law making Menominee County the state's 72nd county, the first to be formed since 1901. The law took effect at midnight on April 30, 1961. Menominee County then had about 3,300 residents; including 2,720 enrolled members of the tribe, whose total membership at this time was 3,700. Creating the new county was the major concern for the state. For the tribe, it was organizing the tribal lumber business. Crucial to the issue was the preservation of the forest and mill as a source of livelihood for tribal members.

1961

Shortly after termination was finalized, the hospital in Keshena was closed by the state on the ground that it did not meet state fire standards.

1962

The Menominee Council of Chiefs was organized as a Wisconsin non-

profit corporation. The main purpose of the organization was to preserve the name "Menominee Indian Tribe," which was technically abolished at the time of termination. To preserve its name as a tribe, the Council of Chiefs acclaimed the special name as "Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin Inc."

1964

A petition with 789 signatures of Menominee was signed and forwarded to President Lyndon Johnson requesting a repeal of termination. Johnson ignored the petition.

1968

In May, the U.S. Court of Claims ruled in favor of the tribe. It was the court's opinion that the Menominees did not relinquish their hunting and fishing rights when the tribe was terminated from federal control. This was a landmark case that helped other tribes, because the Supreme Court ruled that termination did not abrogate treaty rights. This helped force the federal government to abandon their termination plans.

1970

A grassroots organization titled DRUMS (Determination of Rights & Unity of Menominee Shareholders) was established to stop the land sales and restore the reservation to federal status.

1971

In November, MEI, DRUMS and county officials began discussions concerning the restoring of the reservation to federal status.

1972

On April 20, Sens. William Proxmire and Gaylord Nelson introduced Senate Bill 3514 calling for restoration of the Menominee Tribe. 1973

Another Menominee Restoration Bill was introduced in Congress.

On Oct. 16, House Bill 10717, originally sponsored by Rep. Harold Froelich and recommended by the House Subcommittee on Indian Affairs, passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 404-3.

On Dec. 7, the Senate Interior Committee recommended a slightly amended bill. This measure was considered and was passed by the Senate. The House concurred with the Senate amendments, and the bill went to the President.

On Dec. 22, President Richard Nixon privately signed the Menominee Restoration Act into law. Public Law 93-197, The Menominee Restoration Act, made provisions for the return of the Menominee Indians to full tribal status and the return of the tribal assets to trust status.

"It was very cool," she said. "It was kind of scary at first with all those people, but scary in a good way. There was a lot of cheering and a lot of noise. It was pretty loud and hard to hear out there."

She said she joined the team when it was created last spring as something fun to do. After the practice session at the Don Hutson Center, the girls were given a tour of Lambeau Field, which was her first time there.

During homecoming activities the past two years, she played on her class' powder puff football team.

Joining the Bystol sisters on Shawano's team were Ella Stuber, Marissa Tomashek, Maci Beyer, Tela Hopfensperger, Braylyn Babino, Adalyn Barkley, Trinity Popelka and Abby Wachtel.

The Bucs scored touchdowns on three straight possessions through the third and fourth quarters to open up the advantage. They likely would've scored a fourth straight TD, but running back Rachaad White slid down in the red zone late in the game to run out the clock.

Baker Mayfield, Buccaneers too much for Green Bay

Packers chances to make the playoffs drop to 26%

Tampa Bay Buccaneers quarterback Baker Mayfield became the first visiting quarterback to ever record a perfect passer rating at Lambeau Field as the Buccaneers beat Green Bay 34-20 on Dec. 17.

Mayfield gashed the Green Bay defense as he completed 22-of-28 for 381 yards and four touchdowns.

Chris Godwin was Mayfield's number one target on the day, as the Pennsylvania State alum recorded 155 yards on 10 receptions. Superstar receiver Mike Evans was held to just 57 yards on four receptions, but one of those receptions went for a touchdown. That touchdown for Evans was his 97th career touchdown, which puts him 12th on the all-time list and ties former NFL tight end Rob Gronkowski and Las Vegas wide receiver Davante Adams.

Green Bay's run defense continued to struggle in this game as well, as Tampa Bay's running back RaShaad White picked up 89 yards on 21 carries. White also recorded two receptions for 50 yards.

"We have to challenge much better in the backend, I get it, they have some good wideouts, but you have to be willing to challenge, especially if you are getting gashed," said Packers coach Matt LaFleur.

Mayfield's biggest throw of the day came late in the game, as the Buccaneers were up 27-20 and facing a third-and-four from its own 48-yard line. Mayfield dropped back and hit David Moore right past an outstretched hand from Packers line-backer De'Vondre Campbell. Moore took the pass and ran down the right side of the field before scoring a touchdown. The play was originally reviewed but was determined that Moore crossed the goal line to give the Buccaneers a 14-point lead with 6:30 left in the game.



Tampa Bay Buccaneers quarterback Baker Mayfield diced up Joe Barry's defense to the tune of 381 yards on 22-of-28 passing with four touchdowns for a perfect 158.3 passer rating in the 34-20 win over the hometown Packers. It marked the most points the Buccaneers have ever scored at Lambeau Field.

Green Bay was unable to rebound from the two-score deficit, as its final push came up short.

On the first five plays of the ensuing drive, Packers quarterback Jordan Love got five different Packers involved with Romeo Doubs, Malik Heath, Patrick Taylor, Tucker Kraft and Dontayvion Wicks helping to advance the ball to the Tampa Bay 30-yard line. From there, three incomplete passes set up a fourth-and-10 for Love and the offense. On fourth down, Love dropped back and was sacked for a loss of 19 yards, ending Green Bay's hopes of winning a game with huge playoff implications.

For Green Bay, Love completed 29-of-39 for 284 yards and two touchdowns.

In his first game since Nov. 19 against the Los Angeles Chargers, Aaron Jones recorded 13 carries for 53 yards, adding another 16 yards through the air on four receptions. Wicks was the leading receiver for Green Bay in the game, recording 97 receiving yards on six receptions.

"I think that they easy we started was decent - we put some good drives together, and I think the the thing that hurt us was getting down to the red zone and not capitalizing on some of those opportunities," said

Love, alluding to the two field goals and a turnover on downs that Green Bay was forced to settle for. "That's definitely what hurt us tonight."

Green Bay opened its scoring early, as Mayfield was stripped of the ball on the Buccaneers four-yard line. After Jones got stuffed for a one-yard loss, LaFleur called for a screen pass on the next play. Love dropped back and hit Kraft, and with a great block from Rasheed Walker, Kraft leaped into the end zone for his second career touchdown.

Love's second touchdown pass came on one of his best plays in his young career.

On third-and-14 from the Tampa Bay 17-yard line, Love took the snap and was forced to roll to his right. It appeared Love could have ran for the first down, but instead he threw a dart to the corner of the end zone. In heavy traffic, Jayden Reed made a contested catch, while keeping both feet in bounds in what was reminiscent of Aaron Rodgers throwing a touchdown to Davante Adams.

"On those plays, anything can happen. Basically, I had a corner route - I was kind of a decoy route," said Reed, on his touchdown. "It was kind of scramble mode and I turned towards Jordan and we locked eyes. He made a great throw, so I could make the catch."

The loss for Green Bay now gives the Packers a 6-8 record. With the Chicago Bears losing this week, Green Bay still holds a one game lead over its rivals to avoid the bottom of the NFC North. The Minnesota Vikings also lost this week, maintaining Green Bay's one-game deficit to the team.

That may all be for nothing though, as the Packers now slide to the 11th seed in the NFC, making the next three games on its schedule as close to a must win as possible.

For what it is worth, according to the New York Times Playoff Simulator, the Packers currently hold a 26% chance to make the playoffs. If the Packers were to beat the Carolina Panthers next week, those chances only rise to 34%. If the Packers do beat the Panthers, then a win in week 17 against the Minnesota Vikings would spike those chances all the way up to 65%.

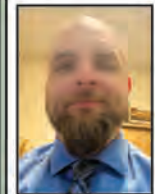

HISTORY: These two teams have met 17 times with the Packers boasting an 11-6 record. The most famous meeting between the two teams came in January 1997. The Packers had disposed of the San Francisco 49ers with the entire crowd chanting, "We want Dallas."

The crowd would not get their wish as the upstart Carolina Panthers led by future Packers' defensive coordinator Dom Capers would upset the Cowboys. A rout would follow. The Packers won the NFC Championship Game 30-13 against an overwhelmed Panthers team.

The last time these teams met was during the COVID-19 season, with the Packers winning 24-16.

The last time these two teams met in Carolina was in 2017. Aaron Rodgers returned from a broken collarbone suffered earlier in the season to try and make a late season run at the playoffs.

His return would last one game, as the Panthers would beat the Packers 31-24, effectively ending the Packers' season.

KEYS TO THE GAME

A win over the Panthers not a given for the Packers

Just two weeks ago, the Green Bay Packers controlled their own playoff destiny. They were 6-6 coming off a massive win against the Kansas City Chiefs. The playoffs were an expectation. They even had an outside shot at winning the NFC North if they continued their winning ways and got some help from the teams around them.

Now, all of those dreams have been dashed. The Packers are 6-8 after back-to-back disappointing losses to the New York Giants and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Through 14 games, this team has proven one thing clearly. They are capable of beating anyone, as evidenced by back-to-back wins over the Chiefs and Detroit Lions.

They are also capable of losing to anyone, as evidenced by the last two games they've played.

The Packers are favored on the road against the worst team in the NFL this week. The Carolina Panthers are coming off a 9-7 win over the Atlanta Falcons.

In the era of Aaron Rodgers, this game was considered a layup. Jordan Love, while improving, is not to that point of his career where any game can be considered a layup. That's especially true in a road game.

To avoid hitting rock bottom, here is what the Packers need to do to beat the Panthers on the road:

Packers secondary vs. Bryce Young

Bryce Young had high hopes surrounding him when he was the top pick of the 2022 draft. Those hopes have not shined through on the field this year.

Young has not thrown a touchdown pass since before Thanksgiving Day. He has nine touchdown passes on the season and nine interceptions.

The team has struggled mightily to move the ball through the air. The good news for Carolina is that their stoppable force is about to meet what proved to be a very movable object with the Packers' pass defense



The Packers' defense cannot take the upcoming Carolina team for granted, even if the Panthers have the worst record in the NFL. Tampa Bay quarterback Baker Mayfield on Dec. 17 completed 22-of-28 for 381 yards and four touchdowns against that Packers' defense. The defense allowed Mayfield to reach his season-high for passing yards before the third quarter expired. They gave up a perfect passer rating to a guy on his fourth team in three years. They allowed more than 100 yards on the ground, including more than four yards per carry to Rachaad White and Chase Edmonds. This game felt like one where the Bucs could have thrown for 400 or run for 200. It was just a matter of what they chose to do.

coming to town.

With Jaire Alexander missing his sixth consecutive game for a shoulder injury, Baker Mayfield and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers piled up more than 350 yards through the air. He threw four touchdown passes on his way to a perfect passer rating. Mayfield's perfect day was the second in the history of Lambeau Field, the other belonging to Aaron Rodgers in 2019 when he tore apart the Oakland Raiders.

The secondary, and pass defense as a whole, is reeling. They need the Panthers to be some medicine to cure what has ailed them.

If they're not, the Packers have some big questions they'll need to be asking as soon as the game ends.

Ground game vs. Panthers' defense

The Packers' ground game has never felt like it's been at full strength this season. AJ Dillon just missed Sunday's game with a broken thumb, which coincided with Aaron

Jones' return from a knee injury.

Jones started the season on the wrong foot with a hamstring injury that kept him out of two games and limited for several others.

The reality of the situation is Green Bay has not had an individual 100-yard rusher on the season. The bread and butter of this offense was supposed to go through the ground game spearheaded by these two running backs.

It's unclear if Dillon will be able to play Sunday with the thumb injury, but even if he doesn't, the Packers need more from their ground game.

Love and the passing offense have done their part, but this is not an offense at a stage where it can be one-dimensional.

Carolina is 22nd in the NFL in rush yards allowed per game. They allow 123 yards on the ground.

There should be some opportunities for the Packers to get back to their bread and butter on Sunday afternoon.

Packers' tackles vs. Brian Burns

When the Packers were on the clock in the 2019 draft, they were targeting a pass rusher. Brian Burns was on the board, as was Michigan's Rashan Gary. The Packers took Gary and the two careers became intertwined. Both players have become two of the better pass rushers in all of football through their short careers.

Gary signed a contract extension earlier in the year, and it remains likely that Burns will get one from Carolina sooner rather than later.

Love has played much better of late, but any quarterback is going to struggle if he is not protected.

Rasheed Walker and Zach Tom both performed admirably against Tampa Bay on Sunday. Love was only sacked twice, one of which came late in the game against an all-out blitz when the game had already been decided.

Burns is a game wrecker, and the Packers have had their struggles against players of his ilk.

Aidan Hutchinson had a big game against them in September. Maxx Crosby did as well.

The Packers' offense should be able to find some holes in the Panthers' secondary, but protecting the quarterback is always at a premium.



Patrick Taylor had one carry for six yards and two receptions for minus-four yards in Sunday's 34-20 loss to the Buccaneers. With AJ Dillon (thumb) sidelined, Taylor worked as the backup behind Aaron Jones, and he played 26 snaps compared to the 29 Jones received. However, Taylor only tallied three touches while Jones finished with 17. The Packers used a similar distribution in recent weeks when Jones was sidelined and Dillon wasn't, so there is little reason to expect much from Taylor -- he has not recorded more than six touches in a game this season -- unless both of his fellow running backs are unavailable.

Bulaga grateful for time spent in Green Bay

Bryan Bulaga, a first-round draft pick in 2010 from Iowa who manned right tackle for the better part of a decade, returned to officially retire as a Packer on Nov. 17.

He had not played since the last of his two years with the Chargers in 2021.

"Being drafted here and being part of this organization — I think the greatest organization in the NFL — was an absolute honor. Green Bay, it feels like home to me for more than one reason.

"Getting drafted and winning a Super Bowl and all that here, that's part of it, but I think coming here as a 21-year-old, really had no responsibility besides play football and worry about myself, and then becoming a man here, getting married, having kids, make relationships outside of this building. It felt like home from the minute I stepped down here till I left in 2020.

"So, to make it official as a Green Bay Packer to me means the most, be-

cause it's truly where I felt I belonged, where I felt the most comfortable, where it felt like home and family. For me, it truly is a special moment.

"Obviously start right away with Ted Thompson. Took a gamble on a short-armed, small-handed guy from Iowa. Probably not the greatest 40 time and stuff like that. But selected me in the first round and I will be forever grateful for that. Hell of a guy, the times he actually wanted to talk to me. Ted was a man of few words, so the times I did get to speak to him, he was a helluva guy to be around, so very thankful.

"And finally, obviously, Aaron (Rodgers). I'd like to think from time to time we made Aaron look good. Maybe some people would disagree. But he made us look good a lot.

"Being able to block for a Hall of Fame quarterback and experience what it's like to watch greatness and be a part of greatness with him is something I'll always be appreciative of."

What was your message to the team after practice Nov. 17?

"What I told them, it's cliché and

things like that, but times weren't always good for even us when we were here. I mentioned 2017 and '18, we went through some hard times.

"But the thing we believed in that locker room with the guys that we had we could come out the other side better than what we were in right now. We trusted in each other, and we stuck together. There was never any finger-pointing; there was never any getting down on each other. We knew we had the guys. We just needed to pull it together and get it together, and we eventually did.

"My message to them was stick together during this. It's not always going to be pretty; it's not always going to go the way you want. But if you guys hold together, keep fighting for each other, keep fighting for the guys you have in the huddle, you'll come out of this better."

What do you miss?

"I miss the locker room. I miss the guys. I miss the camaraderie. Sundays, it's hard to replicate Sundays and the feeling you get going out there in front of all the fans on Lambeau, you'll never replicate it, because it's

awesome. But the thing you miss is the locker room, the guys, the camaraderie, the O-line dinners, the meeting rooms, the BSing. That's literally the hardest part of walking away is knowing you're not in that little group anymore. You're excluded. Yeah, you may be in a group text, but you're not there doing it. So I think for me, that's probably the toughest part.

Talk about the Super Bowl run.

"I didn't really realize what was happening until we beat the Eagles in that first-round playoff game. I remember, we're sitting on the bench and Cliffy, he looked at me, he was like, 'Man, this doesn't happen every day. Like, we have a really good team; we're hot.'

"At the end of the season, we got hot. Going to Philly against one of the better teams in the league and we kind of took care of them. We didn't blow him out by any stretch, but it was a comfortable win — at least we felt it was in the locker room. And he goes, 'This kind of stuff doesn't happen every year, so just start enjoying this and taking this in, this playoff run.'

Packers have edge on paper but can't take Panthers for granted

Packers' offense vs. Panthers' defense

Carolina's defense has kept them competitive throughout the season, and they have some star power to give them some teeth on that side of the ball.

Brian Burns is one of the league's best pass rushers and has continued to wreak havoc on opposing quarterbacks this season. He has six sacks and one forced fumble on the season.

Jaycee Horn is working his way back from injured reserve and has a world of potential at cornerback.

The unit is led by Ejiro Evero. Evero, of course, was the runner-up in the Packers' 2021 search for a defensive coordinator.

After Jim Leonhard turned the Packers down, LaFleur was left with two choices, Evero, and Joe Barry.

LaFleur chose Barry, and Barry has yet to outperform Evero, in either Denver or Carolina. That is a blunder that could keep LaFleur up at night as the team went from Super Bowl contender, to fringe playoff team.

The Packers' offense continues to play well. The offense scored 20 points against a tough Tampa Bay defense but was a mistake or two away from putting up more points. Jordan Love missed an open Jayden Reed on the opening possession that caused them to come away empty as opposed to having an opening drive touchdown.

They were 2-for-5 in the red zone after struggling against the Giants as well.

The red zone issues need to get cleaned up. If they do, the Packers could light up the scoreboard, as they've continued to move the ball well between the 20s.

Jordan Love bounced back from a below average game against the Giants, with a strong showing against Tampa Bay. Love threw for 284 yards and two touchdown passes against a Bucs defense led by the well-respected Todd Bowles.

Dontayvion Wicks shook off an ankle injury to catch six passes for 97 yards. The Packers were uncertain

as to whether Wicks was going to be able to play after his ankle injury last Monday night.

Jayden Reed caught six more passes and is becoming a focal point of the offense.

Ditto for Tucker Kraft, who made a nice 40-yard catch on a wheel route last week against Tampa Bay.

The team clearly misses Christian Watson and his deep speed. It's unclear if he will be able to play this week. He was listed as doubtful for Sunday's game against Tampa Bay. If he can play, however, that should open up more things underneath for the other receivers similar to the way it did against Detroit and Kansas City.

The run game is still struggling, and that may be the case all season. AJ Dillon and Aaron Jones have rarely been on the field at the same time this year as Jones has battled

injuries all year.

Once Jones finally returned, Dillon missed Sunday's game with a broken thumb. His status for the rest of the month is unclear, but ball security is difficult without a working thumb.

The third running back spot has been a bit of a revolving door, and there weren't many opportunities for the other running backs last week.

Jones carried the ball 13 times Sunday. The other two backs combined for two carries for six yards. Considering the way LaFleur likes to rotate his running backs, that was an odd development. Maybe it was just a byproduct of trailing by two scores for a majority of the second half.

We'll see if LaFleur wants to give Jones more of a workload, or if he pulls the reigns back a bit as Kenyan Drake and Patrick Taylor should be more comfortable in the offense.

Packers' defense vs. Panthers' offense

Carolina's offense has struggled mightily this season. Bryce Young has clearly not developed at the same rate as his draft classmate, CJ Stroud.

Young has not been surrounded by a strong supporting cast. His best receiver on the season is former Minnesota Viking Adam Thielen. Thielen has had a strong season, but he should not be the best receiver on any team that has any sort of aspirations of developing a young quarterback.

As a result, Young has struggled. In fact, at the completion of Sunday's game against Atlanta, Young has not thrown a touchdown pass in a month. His last scoring throw was Nov. 19 against Dallas.

He has nine touchdowns and nine interceptions on the season. If the Panthers had not traded their first-round pick to acquire him, they would likely be in the quarterback market. As it is, they'll look to continue to build around him this offseason.

Perhaps some good news is on the way for Young. The Packers' defense allowed Tommy DeVito to earn NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors, and likely will play a large part in Baker Mayfield receiving that honor as well.

Mayfield finished Sunday's game with more than 350 passing yards and a perfect passer rating to go along with four touchdown passes.

The Bucs could have traveled through the air or on the ground to do whatever they wanted.

Despite the poor performance, Matt LaFleur made it clear that he is not thinking about an in season change at defensive coordinator.

With that being the case, it will be more of the same blueprint for Joe Barry in this defense.

They followed some of that blueprint last week against Tampa Bay. They sacked Baker Mayfield five times, only to see Mayfield convert on third-and-long scenarios through the air later in the drive.

Lukas Van Ness has two sacks in three weeks. Rashan Gary and Kenny Clark continued what has been a strong December in rushing the

passer.

The secondary got a boost last week with Eric Stokes returning as a full-time starter to the defensive backfield after being activated from injured reserve.

It was Stokes' first action on defense since a gruesome leg injury knocked him out for the remainder of the 2022 season and all of training camp this year.

Stokes will have his ups and downs. Carrington Valentine has continued to have his ups and downs as well.

This team was shredded on Sunday by Chris Godwin, who had more than 100 yards receiving in the first half. He finished the day with more than 150.

They gave up three touchdown passes of more than 20 yards, including a 52-yarder to seal a win for Tampa Bay.

The run defense only allowed 102 yards to Tampa Bay's running backs, but both backs averaged more than four yards per carry. Tampa Bay was ranked 29th in the NFL in rush yards per game coming into Sunday's game.

Green Bay's defense, as has been the case for years, is simply not good enough. They peacock a little

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about a solid points-per-game track record earlier in the season, but the underlying metrics that suggested a regression was coming have hit at the worst possible time.

Special teams

The ups and downs of a young kicker is showing for this team. After making all of his kicks against Kansas City, Anders Carlson missed a crucial field goal against the Giants in a game the Packers lost by two.

Against the Tampa Bay Bucca-

neers, he made all of his kicks.

The December temperatures that typically occupy Green Bay have not shown up. The Packers' most recent game against Tampa Bay had a kick-off temperature over 40 degrees in the middle of December.

Because of that, Keisean Nixon has mostly been put on ice for the season. The Packers have clearly coached him to be more cautious on kicks he takes out of the end zone.

The Packers' special teams as a whole are ranked toward the bottom of the league in almost any metric and are the most penalized team in that unit. For a team that promoted their special teams coordinator in the offseason, Rich Bisaccia's unit has been the biggest disappointment on the team.

Carolina's special teams has been in flux this season with Chris Tabor getting promoted to interim head coach. He is unlikely to keep that title beyond this season. They finished fourth in Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings from a season ago. Their kicker is former Chicago Bear Eddy Pineiro.

Former Packers' draft favorite Ihmir Smith-Marsette is the Panthers' punt returner, and he does have a return for a touchdown this season.

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Ballentine makes the most of opportunities

Cornerback Corey Ballentine played college football at Washburn and was selected by the New York Giants in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft. He also played for the New York Jets, Detroit Lions, Atlanta Falcons and Arizona Cardinals before joining the Green Bay Packers.

What's this season been like for you?

This season has obviously been up and down for me. I started on practice squad, and I've kind of worked my way up. That's kind of how every year my whole journey to the league has been. It hasn't always been easy or how I thought it would be, but I just kept my head down, kept working and let it all play out how it plays out. When I get my opportunity, take that opportunity and make the best of it.

Was it hard to stay positive?

There's been times where it was hard, yeah. I mean, switching teams or being released for whatever reason, or things that were out of my control. It was hard at some points

– just believing in myself. But I feel like over time, I just kind of, firstly, relied on my faith and believing in God and believing that whatever is happening, it's happening for a reason and he'll get me through it. And to this point, he has. I feel like when there's times where I doubt myself, I have to have something else to lean on, and that's kind of what I go to.

There's that phrase that you don't have to get ready if you stay ready. A challenge when back on practice squad?

I wouldn't say it was necessarily super hard, because I feel like I always have tried to prepare like that anyway. Especially since being activated, I prepare like anything could happen if somebody gets injured and I get thrown in. It's happened before in my career where I've just been thrown in, and I've been expected to play at a certain level. So I kind of know how it goes already, and I try to stay ready before I get out there so I don't have anything sneak up on me and I'm prepared for whatever situation that's in front of me.

I'm guessing it's maybe not exactly what you thought your ca-

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reer was going to play out, right?

I wouldn't necessarily say it was a surprise. I didn't really look at it in any type of way. I just kind of went to practice one day and they were just like, 'Hey you're going to be up.' Or just kind of how everything played out this season, just getting my opportunity, getting elevated off of the practice squad, getting signed. I just stayed ready. I just kept working. I didn't let the moment get too big, made plays where I needed to make plays, be where I was supposed to be, know my job, know my assignment, execute that, and don't make it harder than it needs to be.

And I really think that's just how I got to this point. I don't do more than I need to do; I don't do less than I need to do. I don't make it bigger than what it is. I do my job and let the rest handle itself.

What's it been like going out of the tunnel, 'Starting at corner from Washburn'? It's got to be pretty cool, considering everything.

It's a wild moment. It's a blessing. Being out there, my teammates supporting me, trusting me to be out there, and just the atmosphere, especially (against the Chiefs), was amazing. I'm glad I got the opportunity. I'm glad I could go out there and show what I can do.

Are you happy with how you've played?

Yeah, obviously, there's things that I could clean up, but I feel like, so far, I've done pretty well.

The only thing I would like

more is turnovers. But those come. I try not to force it. I don't want to sacrifice the integrity of the defense trying to chase plays. I want to let it come to me whenever it comes. Put myself in the best position to make the play, play the ball and, when it comes, it'll come. As of right now, I'm more focused on doing my job and then making sure we win the game.

What was the key on the defense with so many second-stringers in the secondary?

I feel like initially we were losing close games, and it was more so because of execution. We were practicing hard; we were doing everything we needed to do in practice. But I feel like when it came to the game, it was things like penalties that were throwing us off, or small mental errors here or there, or a missed cue here or there, or we didn't see this quite fast enough or whatever.

I feel like as time has went on, we've kind of meshed a little better. We looked back on what we could do as individuals to help the team get better. And I feel like everybody's kind of taken hold of that and tried to pick something out of their own game to make themselves better. And then, as we've been on the field together, we kind of just jelled together. We're just executing a lot better, getting off the field, offense putting together drives, special teams making plays and giving us good field position. I feel like it's all complementary ball. We're just playing executing much more efficiently than we were.

Packers' defensive coordinator's job still safe

A career day from Buccaneers quarterback Baker Mayfield was not enough for Packers head coach Matt LaFleur to commit to giving up on Packers defensive coordinator Joe Barry yet.

In what started out as an underperforming season for the Packers' defensive, given the expectations coming into the year, has quickly turned tumultuous for Barry, as over the previous two losses for Green Bay, the Packers have given up 539 passing yards and five passing touchdowns to Mayfield and Giants quarterback Tommy DeVito. In total, Green Bay has given up 819 total yards in the last two games. That equates to 17% of the total amount of yards Green Bay has given up all season.

"Now is not the time for that to be honest with you," said LaFleur, when asked if he would consider a change at defensive coordinator. "Now is not the time. I am trying to find solutions."

LaFleur's comments seem to

indicate that Barry will remain the defensive coordinator through the end of the season, but what does that cost? Green Bay now sits in a must-win situation for what feels like each of its last three games and an obvious deficiency has been the play of the defensive unit, especially on third downs. Just last week against Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers converted seven of 11 times when it was faced with a third down.

The inability to get off of the field on third down is not the only issue though, as the run defense has been less than impressive over the past two weeks as well. The Buccaneers and the Giants combined for 308 rushing yards, which brings Green Bay's total rushing yards given up to 1,943. That ranks 30th in the NFL. Given those alarming stats, it begs a fair question, why is Barry still employed by the Green Bay Packers?

Making a coaching change at any level and at any point in the season is a major event for a football team. That becomes exemplified when a team is as young as Green Bay is and is in a spot where it needs to win

to keep its season alive. Making a coaching change, especially one as important as the leader of the defensive unit, more often than not takes time to prove to be successful and time is something that is not really on the Packers' side right now.

Possibly to the dismay of Packers fans, it appears that Barry is going to remain the signal caller for the Packers for at least the next three games.

That stems from there not really being a plan for life beyond Barry yet. If Barry were to get fired, names like Jerry Montgomery (defensive line coach/run game coordinator) or Greg Williams (passing game coordinator) would probably be at the front to succeed him. If that were to happen, it would be hard to imagine that there would be any kind of overhaul on the scheme that Green Bay would run for the remainder of the season.

As much as Packers fans want to put all of the blame on Barry, he has had to manage injuries all season long. Jaire Alexander, De'Vondre Campbell, Eric Stokes, Quay Walker, Rashan Gary, Devonte Wyatt and Keisean Nixon are all starters on this

defense who have missed time due to injuries. As anyone who has ever played football will tell you, it is really hard to play, let alone win when you don't have your best players on the field.

With that being said, there have been numerous times this season where the opposing team was faced with a third-and-short, and Green Bay's corners have lined up 10 yards or more off of the receiver. There have also been times where inside linebackers were forced to cover slot receivers and times where linebackers and safeties were in no-man's-land in zone coverage.

It is obvious that something needs to change on the defensive side of the ball, but that may not come until the offseason. If Green Bay does in fact decide to fire Barry, some names that could be brought in for an interview might include Jacksonville Jaguars passing game coordinator Deshaea Townsend, San Francisco 49ers linebackers coach Johnny Holard or Dallas Cowboys defensive backs coach and former Green Bay Packers great Al Harris.
