Packers trade Adams to Raiders

Green Bay gets draft picks in return

The Green Bay Packers have traded wide receiver Davante Adams to the Las Vegas Raiders for a first-round pick (No. 22 overall) and a second-round pick (No. 53 overall) in the 2022 NFL Draft.

General Manager Brian Gutekunst announced the transaction March 18. “It’s never easy moving on from a player and person the caliber of Davante Adams. We have so much respect for all that Davante gave on and off the field during his eight seasons in Green Bay as he was integral to all that we’ve accomplished,” said Gutekunst. “He is undoubtedly one of the greatest players in the storied history of the Packers, and we look forward to him being enshrined into the Packers Hall of Fame one day. We wish nothing but the best for Davante, his wife Devanne and the rest of their family moving forward.”

Adams, originally a second-round pick by the Packers (No. 53 overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft, played in 116 games with 109 starts in eight seasons (2014-21) with Green Bay. In 2021, he set new single-season team records for receptions (123) and receiving yards (1,553) and became the first player in team history with three 100-catch sea-

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sons (2018, 2020-21). Adams is the only player in league history with 115-plus catches, 1,350-plus receiving yards and 11-plus receiving TDs in back-to-back seasons (2020-21). Despite missing a game last season, Adams finished No. 3 in the league in receiving yards, No. 2 in receptions and No. 5 in receiving TDs (11). He has 31 career 100-yard receiving games,

No. 2 in team history behind only WR James Lofton (32). Adams, who recorded seven 100-yard receiving games in 2020, set a single-season career high with eight 100-yard receiving games in 2021, becoming the first player in team history to have seven-plus 100-yard games twice in his career. Adams was named first-team All-

Pro by The Associated Press in 2021 as one of five unanimous first-team selections. He became the first Green Bay receiver to be selected All-Pro in back-to-back seasons since Sterling Sharpe in 1992-93. Adams also earned his fifth straight selection to the Pro Bowl last season (2017-21), making him only the second Packers WR to make five-plus consecutive Pro Bowls (Lofton, six in a row from 1980-85). Adams’ five career selections are tied with Sharpe for the second most by a WR in franchise history, trailing only Lofton (seven). Adams ranks in the top five in franchise history in receptions (No. 2 with 743), receiving TDs (No. 2 with 73) and receiving yards (No. 4 with 8,121). He joined WRs Marvin Harrison and Larry Fitzgerald as the only players in NFL history with 650-plus catches, 8,000-plus receiving yards and 70-plus receiving TDs in their first eight seasons in the NFL.

Adams has eight career games with 10-plus catches, 100-plus receiving yards and multiple TD catches, the most in NFL history. He is tied with WR Antonio Brown for the most career games with 10-plus receptions/100-plus receiving yards/receiving TD with 12. Adams and quarterback Aaron Rodgers connected for 68 TDs, passing Rodgers and WR Jordy Nelson (65) in 2021 for the most productive TD combo in franchise history.

Lena's Beyer named top player in M&O Conference

Gillett, Suring players also recognized

Lena High School senior Max Beyer was tabbed the Most Outstanding Player in the Marinette & Oconto Conference after his big boys basketball season this winter.

Gillett's Aydin Franti and Ben Matczak and Lena's Logan Shallow all made the second team, while Gillett's Jesse DeBauch and Austin Vande Corput and Suring's Jeremy Hensel and Ethan Lally were honorable mentions.

Beyer led the conference in scoring with 23.4 points per game in 15 contests. He also was the top rebounder with 7.2 boards a game.

Beyer shot about 52% from the floor, 82% from the free-throw line and 46% from behind the 3-point line.

"It's very special to know that all the hard work paid off," said Beyer of earning the conference's top honor.

Shallow earned a spot on the second team after putting up averages of 12.8 points, 5.2 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 2.9 steals. He led the team in assists and steals.

"It meant a lot to make all-conference as a senior," said Shallow. "I've worked for it for all of my high school career and to make it really meant a lot. I couldn't have done it without my teammates. How well they played this year definitely helped me get it. It was a really fun year with the guys and it is definitely an honor to be an all-conference member!"

Matczak averaged 9.5 points, 3.7 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.4 steals in 16 conference games.

The sophomore led the team with 30 3-point makes in M&O action, and shot about 45% from the floor.

"Making all-conference second team this year just shows that we are all improving from year to year," said Matczak. "My freshmen year, I just got honorable mention, so to one up that this year was a huge accomplishment. I feel that as the years progress we'll only get stronger and more determined. This

will only motivate me more to get first team all-conference next year, and by my senior year I'll be MVP."

Franti, another sophomore, led the conference in assists per game (4.4).

Franti also averaged 7.7 points, 2.6 rebounds and 2.2 steals in conference play.

"Well, it's helping to motivate me by wanting to get first team next year and work harder as an individual and as a team to get better in general and progress to be better for next year," said Franti of the conference honor.

Vande Corput, a junior, averaged 7.6 points, 3.3 rebounds and 1.2 assists in conference play. He also recorded 13 steals and 13 blocks in 15 games.

DeBauch made the honorable mention list as a freshman after leading the team with 10.9 points a game. He also averaged 3.1 rebounds, 1.5 steals and 1.4 assists a game.

DeBauch shot nearly 45% from the floor and knocked down 19 triples in 16 conference games.

Suring's Hensel did a little bit of everything on the court for the Eagles, along with playing with intensity and toughness.

"Well I couldn't have done it without my amazing teammates and coaches," said Hensel, a senior. "The all-conference award isn't just handed out to just anyone. It's handed to someone that has put in work and dedication, and all the fuel put into getting that award was for my teammates and coaches. I mean yeah it's an amazing thing to get, but it would've been impossible to get without my awesome team."

Lally was the team's leading scorer most of the season in his junior year. He was a big threat from behind the 3-point line.

Lena ended up tying for third with Oneida Nation in the conference standings with a 10-6 mark, behind Coleman and Crivitz (15-1 each). Gillett was fifth with a 9-7 mark, while Suring finished 5-11 and took seventh.

Gresham's Vele, Bowler's Kietlinski make 1st team in CWC-North

Players from Marion, Tigerton also honored

Gresham senior Belasaire Vele and Bowler junior Emmitt Kietlinski were among the eight area boys basketball players to make all-conference teams in the Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division this winter.

Vele stuffed the stat sheet all season for Gresham, putting up averages of 13.1 points, 9.5 rebounds, 5.3 assists and 2.4 steals per conference game.

"Being named first team in my conference is a great feeling," said Vele. "Coming from just an honorable mention last year, I used it to fuel the fire and be a solid player for my senior year."

Unlike many basketball players nowadays, Kietlinski did all his damage inside the 3-point line. He averaged 19.1 points per CWC-North contest.

He led the team in rebounds per game (10.1). The junior also averaged 2.1 assists and 1.7 steals a game.

"Being named first team gives me a lot of confidence heading into next season," said Kietlinski. "I want to improve in all areas of my game between now and then in order for our team to be more successful."

Gresham senior Lukas Pecore and Marion senior Ethan Scheef were each second teamers.

Pecore led Gresham with 17.9 points per game in conference play. He also averaged 5.4 rebounds, 2.3 assists and 1.8 steals.

Scheef averaged a team-leading 14.4 points in conference action. The senior also put up averages of 6.9 rebounds, 4.3 assists and 2.4 steals a game, with his assist total leading the team. He also blocked 10 shots.

"It's great the fact that I was still recognized, but I know I could've done better. The season had lots of up and downs," said Scheef. "I'm glad that I was named second team, and I

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honestly couldn't have done it without my team — those guys pushed me. I'm gonna miss basketball with those guys."

Tigerton senior Zeke Griepentrog, Bowler junior Beau Brunner, Marion junior Jaden Stuhr and Marion sophomore Parker Miller were all honorable mentions in the CWC-North.

Griepentrog led Tigerton with 14.2 points per game in conference action.

He also averaged 3.3 rebounds a game, while recording 14 steals and eight blocks in 14 conference games.

"It's pretty special coming into the season not knowing what was going to happen — but it is pretty special knowing that what all high school players work to achieve that I was able to achieve it and do it with the rest of the players on the team having my back and letting me be able to do it," said Griepentrog.

Brunner averaged 12.8, points, 4.1 rebounds, 3 assists and 2.4 steals in conference games for the Panthers. He also blocked a team-leading 10 shots.

Stuhr averaged 11.7 points, 4.4 rebounds, 2.3 steals and 1.8 assists in 12 conference games. Miller played in all 14 conference games, putting up averages of 11.3 points, 5.6 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 2.5 steals.

Manawa won the CWC-North with a 14-0 record, with Gresham coming in second with a 12-2 mark. Bowler and Marion tied for fourth with 7-7 records, while Tigerton went 2-12 in conference play.

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Theis commits to Bemidji State University

Shawano senior will join basketball team

Senior Brooke Theis celebrated her commitment to Bemidji State University in front of family, friends and teammates inside the Shawano Community High School on March 16.

Theis ceremoniously signed a letter of intent to join the women's basketball team at Bemidji State.

"It's just crazy how hard I've worked toward this and now it's actually coming true and I'm going to play D-II college basketball," said Theis of what the signing meant to her. "It's always been my dream, and I'm glad I've had my teammates and supporters out there to help me."

Theis called linking up with the Wisconsin Blaze the key to her

recruiting process.

The Wisconsin Blaze is a Amateur Athletic Union and Badger Region club organization that helps train athletes and prepare them for high-level competition.

Theis said it was the "greatest thing in the world to be able to play for Lisa (Van Wyk)." Van Wyk was Theis' coach on the Blaze, and attended her signing event.

The Shawano senior said there about 30 colleges looking at her and then about 12 offers to think over before landing on Bemidji State.

"I've always wanted to play D-II basketball and then when I went and toured Bemidji, I hung out with the team and they were just amazing," said Theis. "They just took me to a football game, and then I hung out with the coaches, they took me out

to lunch, and it just felt like home."

In terms of her future at Bemidji State, Theis expects to play the four or five position. She added the coaching staff will be looking to her to shine on defense with her six-foot frame and then also make an impact on offense by attacking the basket.

"The coaches treat me really nice — they're probably one of the best coaches I've talked to, so I'm pretty excited to continue my basketball career there," said Theis.

According to www.wisports.net, Theis played in 62 varsity games while at Shawano, spanning her sophomore, junior and senior seasons.

She averaged 5.5 points as a sophomore and 6.3 points in her junior season before scoring 12.1 points per game this past winter season.

Theis also averaged 8 rebounds and 1.8 blocks a game as a senior,

helping her earn a spot on the Bay Conference's second team.

The Shawano athlete enjoyed some monster games in her senior season.

She scored 27 points in a win over Antigo and 23 more in a victory over Merrill. In total, she scored in double figures in 16 of the team's 25 games, including 11 of the last 13.

Theis pulled down over 10 rebounds on six occasions, with 12 in wins against Waupaca and Merrill. She blocked shots in all but four of the team's games, including a season-high six blocks against Mosinee.

She will join a Bemidji State team coming off a 14-13 season overall. The team went 11-10 in Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference-North Division play to claim third.

Total of 9 Gillett, Lena and Suring players honored

Suring junior Christine Sleeter, Gillett junior Carleigh Kaczmarek and Lena junior Natalie McNurlen all made the Marinette & Oconto Conference first team for their play this girls basketball season.

Gillett senior Alaina Herzog earned a spot on the second team. Gillett senior Naomi Anker, Suring senior Kate Mahoney, junior MacKenzie Bailey and freshman Bunny Cramer and Lena freshman Eva Brooks were all honorable mentions. Anker was also tabbed the conference's Top Defensive Player.

Sleeter averaged a double-double in M&O play to earn her first-team spot, tallying 19.1 points and 12.6 rebounds a game. The junior also averaged 2.6 blocks, 4.3 steals and 1.5 assists.

"Making all-conference first team was definitely something I am very proud of," said Sleeter. "I am so glad the work I put in over the summer paid off. I am definitely going to use this to motivate me and push me to work even harder over the summer to hopefully get MVP."

McNurlen finished the conference portion of the season averaging 13.4 points a game, the most for Lena. She also averaged 4.9 rebounds, 3.1 steals and 2.2 assists per contest.

"It is really an honor to see all my hard work paid off," said McNurlen. "It definitely helps motivate me for next year, to want more."

"I'm super excited going into next season knowing what we have coming back. Being a leader on the team, I know what needs to happen out there, and I know my team is going to put in the work. I can say that my team is definitely determined and ready for next year."

Kaczmarek finished the season leading the team with 12.2 points a game.

The senior also averaged 3.5 rebounds, 2.9 assists and 1.9 steals.

Kaczmarek was happy to be honored by the conference and said

it will motivate her "to keep working hard, especially in the offseason, to accomplish more next year."

Herzog fell just short of averaging a double-double for the season, with averages of 9.4 points and 10.1 rebounds. She added 2.1 steals and 2 assists a game to help the team out.

"It was really special and surprising as well," said Herzog of the all-conference honor. "But it was a nice way to end my final season, and I feel really grateful to be given the spot for second team all-conference."

Brooks enjoyed a special freshman season for Lena and helps form part of the group coming back that McNurlen mentioned.

Brooks averaged 8.4 points and a team-high 11.5 rebounds a game. She also blocked 3.3 shots a game to go along with 1.8 steals and 1.4 assists a game.

Mahoney led the conference in assists per game (4.6) in conference play. She also averaged 8.1 points, 3.5

rebounds and 1.4 steals per contest.

"Basketball is a team sport. Each player has a role that contributes to the success of the team. Every year I have set a goal to be a better player and be a great leader for my teammates. It is an honor to be recognized by the coaches in the M&O Conference," said Mahoney.

"As my high school basketball career has ended, I will take away memories from games and conversations that I have had with officials, coaches and players. Win or lose, thank you for the competition."

Bailey was Suring's defensive stopper, but she also chipped in in several other areas. She averaged 6.1 points, 5.6 rebounds, 1.9 assists and 1.4 steals a game.

Cramer enjoyed a strong freshman season before sustaining an injury late in the season. During her 11 conference games, she turned in averages of 9.1 points, 3.1 rebounds and 2.2 steals.

As the Top Defensive Player

award might suggest, Anker excelled on defense, but she also made an impact across the stat sheet.

The senior capped the season with averages of 5.7 points, 4.7 rebounds, 2.3 steals and 1.9 assists per game.

"Making all-conference honorable was a good feeling. It was nice to know the work I put into basketball paid off all these years of playing," said Anker.

"Making Top Defensive Player was probably exciting for me and my coach. He told me before I started my senior year that defense was my thing. I was good at defense, so I was able to help my team. Getting these (honors) were amazing for me."

Gillett ended up tying for second with Niagara in the conference standings with a 10-4 records, behind only Coleman (14-0). Lena and Suring were next in the standings with 6-8 records.

10 Red Raiders make all-conference lists

Preslaski named conference's Coach of the Year

The Pulaski High School wrestling team was well represented on all-conference lists put out by the Fox River Classic Conference after a strong winter season.

The Red Raiders had 10 wrestlers honored, with Nate Preslaski earning the Coach of the Year honor after the team went 7-0 in FRCC duals.

Pulaski scored 440 points in those seven duals, 27 points higher than any other team. The Red Raiders surrendered just 86 points, the lowest mark in the conference by 43 points.

"The coaches throughout our program do a fantastic job. All of our youth coaches, middle school coaches — Brian Bogucki, Kare Goodness, Fred Hendzel, Luke Martinson — and high school coaches — Chris Brusky, Brock Manning, Dick Piechocki, Bradley Prentice, Jake Gille — are the backbone of the program," said Preslaski.

"They all put in so much time and work very hard. We have a bunch of kids who buy in and work hard. When you have that combination of coaches and kids, it makes it possible to have a lot of success. I'm just fortunate to be a part of a great program."

Senior Brady Gille, juniors Tristan Taylor, Trenton Gibbons, Mason Wells and Ethan Eggert and sophomore Chase Woosenkraft were all part of the first team.

Gibbons was one of seven FRCC wrestlers to go 7-0 in conference action. He ended the year competing at state, where he placed second in the 182-pound weight class. Gibbons had a 37-6 overall record for the year.

Taylor, Woosenkraft and Wells all finished 6-0 in their conference duals.

Wells and Woosenkraft also wrestled at state. Wells came in third at 220 pounds and finished 36-3 on the year. Woosenkraft capped the year with a 27-15 mark.

Taylor qualified for sectionals and ended the year with a 23-7 record.

Eggert and Gille each finished 6-1 in FRCC duals before ending their seasons at state. Eggert placed fifth and had a 39-9 record for the winter. Gille finished the year with a 30-12 record.

Seniors Ryan Frewerd and Ashton Kapla joined sophomore Conner Nooyen on the all-conference second team.

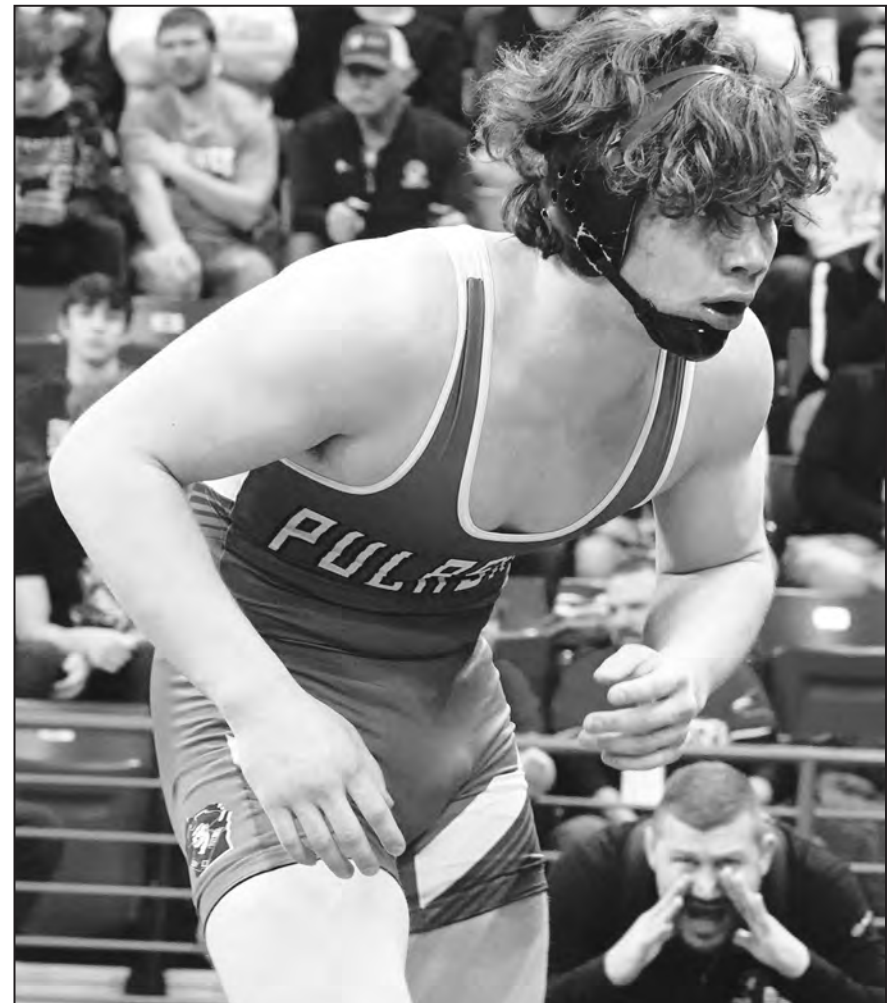
Frewerd posted a 6-1 mark in conference duals. He qualified for sectionals and had a 23-11 record for the winter.

"I think it was a good thing that I made second team, not as special as first team," said Frewerd. "I made first team last year as a junior, and I was hoping to live up to that again."

Kapla went 5-1 in conference duals, while Nooyen finished 5-2. Both qualified for sectionals, with Kapla ending the year with a 30-10 mark, and Nooyen going 25-10.

Sophomore Colin Pratt was an honorable mention for the Red Raiders. He also made it to sectionals, finishing the year with a 20-8 record.

After winning the FRCC title, Pulaski placed first at the Division 1 Shawano Regional to earn a spot at team sectionals. Twelve Pulaski wrestlers qualified for sectionals.

CDACs are public's voice in deer management

Each county in Wisconsin has a CDAC to provide input and recommendations to the department on deer management within their county. Councils work with local DNR staff to schedule meetings, provide community outreach and an opportunity for public input, review population data and deer impacts on forests and agriculture, develop recommendations on county population objectives and create annual antlerless harvest quotas.

In early May, each CDAC will make recommendations to the department for the 2022 season based on deer herd metrics, county deer population goals and public feedback. This summer, the DNR will bring its recommendations for the
