Shawano, Pulaski teams qualify for sectionals

Oconto Falls, Bonduel also moving on

Area high school girls golf teams enjoyed strong showings at WIAA regional meets on Sept. 28, with Shawano, Pulaski, Oconto Falls and Bonduel all placing in the top four to qualify for sectionals.

Shawano and Pulaski each competed in the Bay Port Regional at Brown County Golf Course in Hobart. Shawano placed third with a score of 376, while Pulaski was fourth with a mark of 378. Bay Port (342) and Notre Dame (344) placed first and second.

Oconto Falls and Bonduel were part of the Luxemburg-Casco Regional at Northbrook Golf Course in Luxemburg. The Panthers took second with a score of 449, while Bonduel was third with a score of 459. Seymour (401) took first, while Marinette (473) grabbed fourth to also advance as teams.

Bay Port Regional

Shawano earned its third-place finish behind sophomore Sophia Eggert.

Eggert tied for fourth as an individual at the regional with an 18-hole round of 84. She carded a 44 on the back nine before a 40 on the back nine.

Senior Teghan Kristof was second on the team with a round of 94, tying for 13th as an individual. After a 49 on the front nine, she tallied a 45 on the back nine.

Senior Riley Dreier and junior Braylyn Babino each fired rounds of 99 for the Hawks, tying for 22nd place overall.

Dreier carded a 49 on the front nine and 50 on the back nine. Babino had a 54 on the first nine holes before a 45 on the last nine.

"It's exciting to see our improvement from last year, with this being our second year together as a team," said Babino. "It also means that each and every one of us is competitive, and we want each other to succeed. We didn't give up as individuals, and that made us a stronger team."

"Today we all had holes that we would've liked to forget, but that didn't stop us — we all just pushed

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through to the next hole."

Junior Alli Johnson was the team's fifth golfer, tallying a score of 111. She had a 57 on the front nine and 54 on the back nine.

Pulaski advanced as a team behind strong finishes from Vivien

Ninham and Summer Jaeger.

Ninham placed eighth overall with a round of 88. The junior tallied a 47 on the front nine before a 41 on the final nine.

Jaeger was two shots back, with her score of 90 good enough to tie

for ninth. After a 44 on the front nine, the senior tallied a 46 on the back nine.

Junior Ella Ficarri was third on the team. Her round of 96 tied for 16th. She posted a 44 on the front nine and 52 on the back nine.

“Qualifying for sectionals means to me and the rest of the team that we have one more opportunity to play together and work together one more time this season,” said Ficarri.

“To move on, our team did really well on staying positive and focusing on the next shot and not the past shots.”

Danika Holewinski and Magdalen Jandric rounded out the Red Raiders’ five-golfer team, tallying rounds of 104 and 111, respectively.

Holewinski and Jandric, both juniors, each carded 55s on the back nine. Holewinski had a 49 on the back nine, while Jandric tallied a 56.

Shawano and Pulaski will take part in the Kimberly Sectional on High Cliff Golf Course in Sherwood on Oct. 4. The sectional opens at 9 a.m.

Luxemburg-Casco Regional

The Oconto Falls had a balanced finish to continue its successful season.

Senior Kate Pytleski led the team with a round of 109. Sophomore Taylor Miller tied for 10th with a round of 111, while senior Kloeigh Seidl tied for 12th with a 112.

Pytleski had the team’s best mark on the front nine, 56, and tied Seidl for the best mark on the back nine, 53. Seidl tallied a 59 on the front nine.

Miller had a 57 on the front nine and 54 on the back nine.

Senior Kenadee Seidl placed 18th overall for the Panthers with a round of 117. She tallied a 60 on the front nine and 57 on the back nine.

Lexi Nelson was the team’s other golfer, posting a round of 128. She recorded 64s on the front and back nine.

Like she has all season, Sarah Garside guided Bonduel at the regional, posting a score of 107 to come in seventh overall. The senior finished the front nine at 51 shots before needing 56 shots to get

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through the final nine holes.

Senior Kerry O’Harrow was 14th overall with a mark of 113. She posted a 57 on the front nine and tied Garside’s mark of 56 on the back nine.

Senior Thea Tauchen tied for 16th with a round of 116. She shot 56 times on the front nine and an additional 60 times on the back nine.

“As seniors, it meant a lot to me and my team as the season is almost done and it’s a big accomplishment

for us. A few of us started crying on the last hole today,” said Tauchen.

“We kept our heads up and moved on after we had bad shots, rather than let them bring us down.”

Sophomores Gabi Krause and Raina Dworniczak capped the Bonduel five-golfer team with rounds of 123 and 126, respectively. Krause tallied a 59 on the front nine and 64 on the back nine, with Dworniczak at 64 shots on the front nine and 62 on the back nine.

Gillett's Alex Peterson takes 3rd at invitational

Shawano, Pulaski also have strong individual finishes

The Gillett, Shawano and Pulaski cross-country teams all had strong individual finishers during the Red Raider Invitational on Sept. 29 in Pulaski.

The Shawano girls earned the top finish among those three teams, placing third behind Notre Dame and Green Bay Preble. The Pulaski girls took fifth, while Gillett came in 12th.

The Shawano boys placed sixth as a team. Gillett was eighth, while Pulaski took 10th.

Gillett

Alex Peterson continued his strong senior season with a third-place individual finish in the boys race.

Peterson completed the course in 16 minutes, 0.7 seconds, about six seconds off the top runner from West De Pere and just over a second back of a runner from Notre Dame.

"We definitely went out slow for the first mile in like 5:17, and after that we picked it up a lot," said Peterson of the race. "By the second mile, I was close to what I usually run and caught second with 1,000 meters left. I ended up getting third after the Notre Dame runner passed me with about 100 meters left.

"I obviously wish I could've beat him, but the way the race unfolded with going out slow and really kicking it the last two miles, it gives me lots of experience if state folds out like that."

Evan Peterson was the next Gillett runner across the finish line, posting a time of 16:48 to grab 12th place. Bradyn Wendorff recorded a time of 17:10.3 to finish 20th.

Scott Herroux (19:16.9) and

Chase Anderson (19:20.9) filled out the team's top five, taking 87th and 88th, respectively.

Carleigh Kaczmarek led the Gillett girls with an 11th-place individual finish in 19:52.9.

Sophia Limberg claimed 66th with a time of 22:18.9, while Cheyenne Krueger was 76th in 22:50.4. Lily Hansen (23:05.1) placed 81st, with Laney DeBauch (23:26.7) in 88th to cap the team score.

Shawano

Lily Guenther and Bailey Hendricks earned top-10 finishes to help the Shawano girls team to its third-place finish.

Guenther took sixth with a time of 19:41.5, while Hendricks came in ninth with a mark of 19:47.4.

Grace Chelberg claimed 24th in 20:28.1. Adalyn Barkley (21:31.8) and Maci Beyer (21:35.3) capped the team score after placing 48th and 51st, respectively.

The junior duo of Ethan Onesti and Will Chelberg paced the Shawano boys. Onesti took sixth in 16:16.4, with Chelberg in seventh in 16:22.2.

"I was very pleased with my performance," said Chelberg. "I tried to go out with the lead pack, and then just hang on until I could pick it up that last mile."

Andon Chelberg was the third Hawk to finish the boys race, taking 27th in 17:26.

Connor Chelberg placed 56th with a time of 18:17, while Quinn Olson rounded out the team score with a 76th-place finish in 18:49.6.

Pulaski

Angela Opolka and Olivia Stedl turned in top-20 finishes to guide the Pulaski girls team at the invitational.

Opolka grabbed 14th in 19:58.2, while Stedl took 16th in 20:04.7.

Emerson Fabry was the next Red Raider to finish, taking 34th in 20:41.4. Trennedy Roffers placed 37th in 20:50.1.

McKenna Lowery was the final

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runner to factor into Pulaski's team score, placing 54th in 21:41.8.

Gillett shuts out Wausaukee for homecoming

4 passing TDs from Jesse DeBauch leads way for Tigers

The Gillett Tigers football team recorded its second win of the season after shutting out the Wausaukee Rangers 36-0 on Sept. 30 in Gillett.

The two teams met earlier in the season, where the Tigers bested the Rangers, 52-50. The most recent game meant a little bit more to the Tigers though, as this win came on homecoming night.

"It feels a lot better to win on homecoming," said Gillett sophomore quarterback Jesse DeBauch. "We have only won one game, so it felt good to shut them out."

Gillett controlled the entirety of the game, as DeBauch totaled 179 yards passing and the team totaled 218 yards rushing. Senior running back Colton Sturm was the leading rusher for the Tigers, picking up 100 yards on the ground and one touchdown.

Junior receiver Brandon DeBauch was the main benefactor of the 179 passing yards, as he finished the game with 140 receiving yards and two touchdown receptions.

"Whenever the defense is playing closer on me, I can beat them every time — I am faster than almost all of them," said Brandon DeBauch, on how he was able to make so much noise in the passing game.

Sturm, Jesse DeBauch, Brandon DeBauch and junior running back Aydin Franti were busy for the Tigers early on the team's first drive. The biggest play of the drive came when Jesse DeBauch picked up 18 yards on the ground on an early fourth-and-4 play.

From there, Jesse DeBauch completed two passes, before a turnover on downs gave the ball to Wausauke

deep on the Rangers' side of the field.

Wausaukee's quarterback Conner Schroeder recorded carries of nine yards and eight yards, before Gillett stuffed running back John Kanzenbach twice and tackled him for a loss on a fourth down reception.

Gillett took back over on their own 37-yard line. Sturm was the leader of the drive for the Tigers, as he totaled 23 yards on three touches. Those 23 yards helped in part to set up Brandon DeBauch's 25-yard touchdown reception with 11:06 remaining in the second quarter.

Wausaukee responded by marching down the field in 15 plays. The big plays on the drive came from wide receiver Layne Rowley's 11-yard reception, a 14-yard rush from Schroeder and a 12-yard reception from receiver Nathan Shaw to bring the Rangers within 10 yards of scoring.

An 8-yard rush from running back Preston Brunette gave the Rangers a second-and-goal from the 2-yard line. Gillett stuffed Schroeder twice on rushing attempts and prevented his fourth down pass from being completed, as the Tigers turned the Rangers over on downs.

Gillett immediately marched down the field with a 15-yard reception from Brandon DeBauch and a 37-yard rush from junior running back Jackson Pecha. Five plays later, Jesse DeBauch threw his second touchdown pass of the game, a 12-yard strike to Franti.

The very first play of Wausauke's drive ended with an interception from Gillett's Ben Matczak right before halftime.

After turning Wausauke over on downs on its first second-half drive, the Tigers once again marched down the field on the back of Sturm's 26 rushing yards on the drive. Gillett went up 22-0 after a Matczak 12-yard touchdown reception.

Another turnover on downs from Wausauke led to a 5-yard touchdown rush from Sturm. A failed two-point conversion later and the Tigers were up 28-0 with 11:57 left in the game.

On Wausauke's subsequent drive,

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the Rangers once again were forced to turn the ball over on downs.

Jesse DeBauch's fourth touchdown pass came as he once again hit his cousin Brandon DeBauch for a 56-yard receiving touchdown. A two-point rushing attempt from senior Cody Carroll put the Tigers up 36-0, to pick up their second win of the year.

"Our defense stepped it up a lot," said Jesse DeBauch. "We tried using two defensive ends, four linebackers and two corners and it was a lot better than our first game against them."

Not only was this a homecoming win for the Tigers, but Gillett head coach Justin Daul said that this was "a program builder."

"It is our second win of the year — earlier this year, we snapped a 19-game losing streak and to win our

second game of the year albeit against the same team, proves that we are making strides in the right direction," said Daul. "I am proud of all of the guys — they have worked really hard to move in this direction."

The Oconto Falls High School volleyball team dropped a North Eastern Conference match to state ranked Luxemburg-Casco on Sept. 29 in Oconto Falls.

Despite being swept by scores of 25-13, 25-10, 25-22, Oconto Falls players and coaches didn't hang their heads, and were pleased with the effort throughout the match.

"I think we played really good," said senior Brailyn St. Louis. "I think that when we get down, we just got to pick each other up and bringing everyone up so that we don't keep getting farther and farther down. I think in that last set that we kept on picking each other up ... We kept fighting and going."

"I think that we really did try our best," said sophomore Amber Otto. "Even though sometimes it got hard and we were trying to adjust to things, I think we kept our heads up. I think we did really good, I think we just need to keep our heads up after that game."

The teams traded off winning the first six points in the first set before a quick 4-0 spurt gave Lux-Casco the advantage.

After a timeout, Oconto Falls got back within one after a couple mistakes from the visitors, but a 5-1 run from the Spartans made it a five-point deficit again.

Junior Keira Cole got a tip point to stop the visitor's run before Otto had a few kills to keep Oconto Falls in it. Lux-Casco went on a 4-0 run, and then after a St. Louis kill, a 3-0 run to finish off the first set.

The second set saw Lux-Casco score six of the first seven points and 10 of the first 13.

After a Panthers' timeout, Otto and junior Kati Raddatz scored points around an ace from junior Morgan Moynihan to bring the hosts within four, 10-6. Lux-Casco responded with an 8-0 run to take complete control again and soon

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finished off the set.

After battling hard all match, Oconto Falls finally got some more positive results in set three.

The Panthers jumped out to a 4-0 lead as senior Hanna Krejcarek served. Senior Morgan Kluth delivered a kill on the run for Oconto Falls.

After a Lux-Casco block got the visitors a point, Kluth had another kill to help the hosts to a 6-1 lead, but as they had all match, the Spartans went on a run to tie things up at six.

Oconto Falls continued to lead or be tied for the next 20 points. During that span, several Panthers scored. Junior Grace Molitor, Cole, St. Louis, Kluth and Otto had kills, while Moynihan and senior Madison Uelmen served aces.

"In the beginning, we had energy,

but then at the end, I think we started to pick each other up more," said Otto of the final set. "We started to pick up on their mistakes and that made us go higher and we made our own kills and we got good plays as well on our side."

After falling behind, Kluth and Molitor posted kills to help Oconto Falls go back ahead again. Lux-Casco grabbed the lead for good after a 3-0 run.

Otto had a couple more kills late, but eventually Lux-Casco reached 25 set points to end the match.

Otto led the Panthers with 12 attack kills on the night, with St. Louis adding four and Kluth and Molitor three each.

Moynihan tallied three of the team's five aces and also had seven assists and seven digs. Krejcarek

posted a team-leading nine assists, while junior libero Kyndra Staidl had seven assists.

Staidl had a team-high eight digs. Otto recorded six digs and Krejcarek had five.

The loss was the second conference setback of the week, after the team also fell to Fox Valley Lutheran on Sept. 27, but the Panthers weren't in panic mode.

"Honestly, where we're at, we're playing good teams, our conference is pretty good," said St. Louis. "I think that if we just keep playing the way we are and just keep trying to push each other to do better, more than what we are doing already, I think we can take it pretty far honestly."

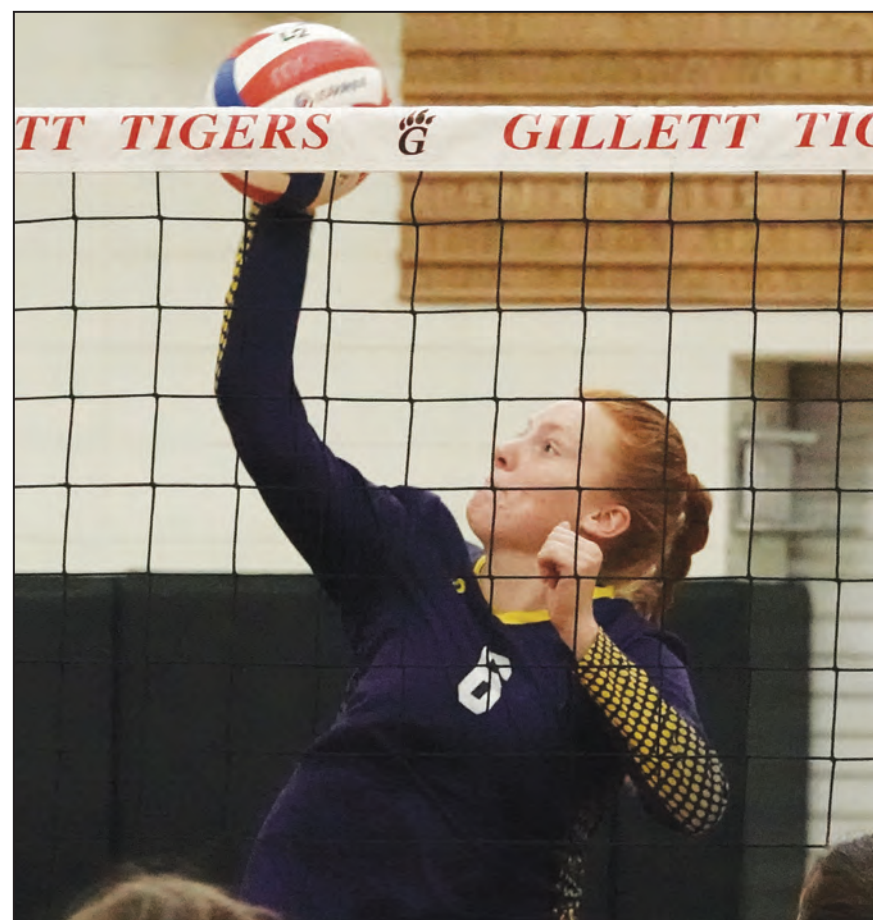
