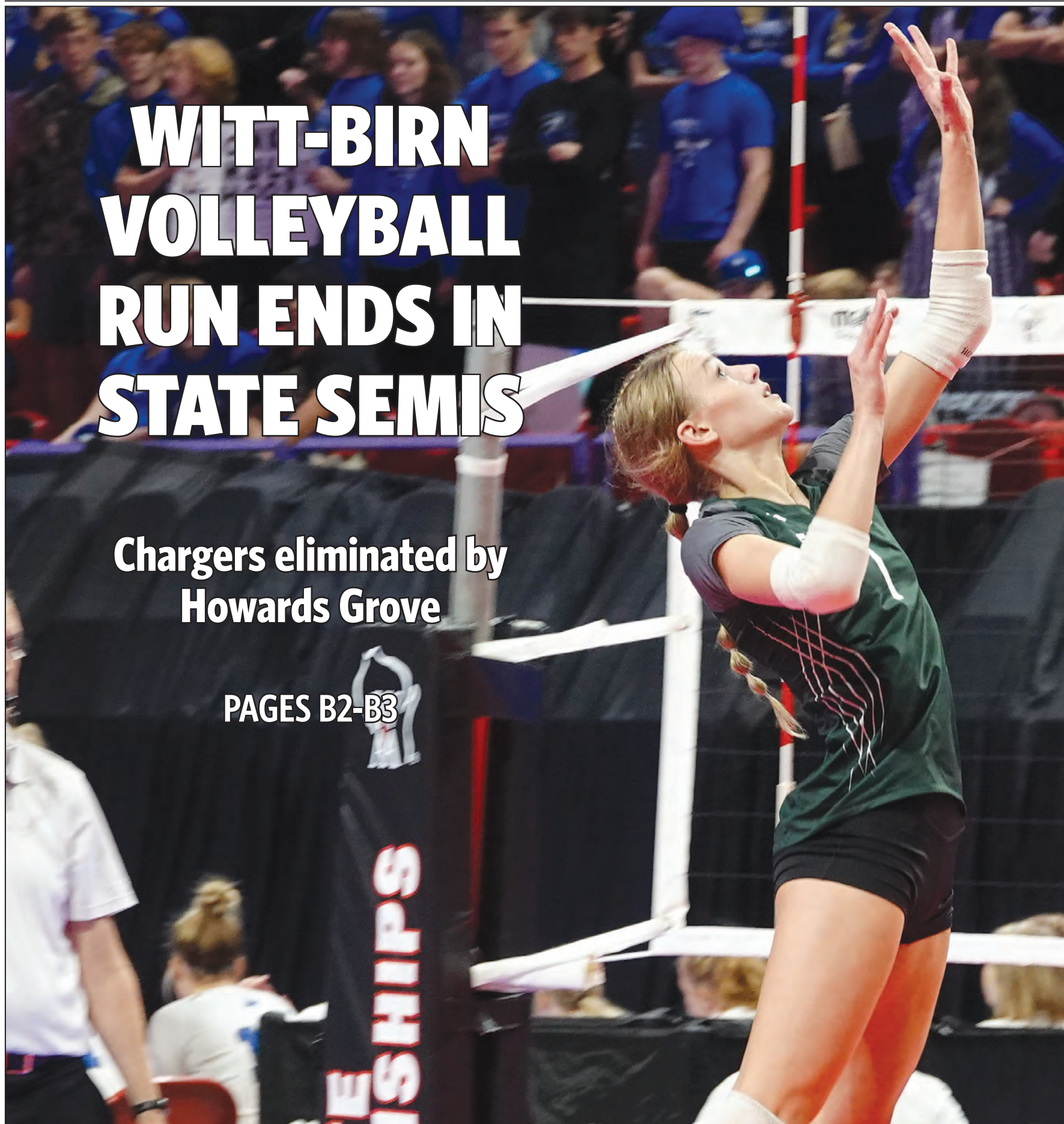

Chargers cap season with 28-9 record

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School volleyball team left everything it had out on the state court, but it wasn't enough to dethrone three-time defending state champion Howards Grove during a Division 3 state semifinal match on Nov. 4 at the Resch Center in Green Bay.

The fourth-seeded Chargers lost by scores of 25-13, 25-18, 25-9 to the top-seeded Tigers. Howards Grove

went on to win the state title for a fourth straight season.

"I'm so proud of all my girls," said Witt-Birn coach Becky Rew in a postgame press conference with seniors Reese Rogowski and Lilly Betry at her sides. "They fought the whole way through. They didn't let the nerves of state get to them. They fought and they pushed every point ... I just can't say enough about these girls and how they never give up on each other."

Witt-Birn came out swinging and with plenty of confidence in set one. The Chargers got their first two points on Rogowski kills and grabbed a 3-2 lead after an ace from senior Kiara Deruchowski.

Witt-Birn continued to battle

with Howards Grove and eventually was tied 7-7. The Tigers seized control of the set after a pair of 3-0 runs.

From there, Witt-Birn struggled to string together points as Howards Grove ran away with the set.

"They're a great team, they have three great hitters in the front row at all times," said Rogowski of Howards Grove. "Their back row is crazy good so just their whole lineup honestly is outstanding — they kept pushing and got all of our hits up."

Betry added that Howards Grove was "also very smart with the ball. They knew where to place it."

The beginning of set two saw the two teams split the first six points.

Rogowski added another kill to her stat line during that stretch.

Howards Grove broke things open with a 7-0 run and later led 12-5 before Metropulos delivered a kill and Metropulos and Melaina Granquist teamed up on a block.

The Tigers responded with the next four points before Metropulos had another kill. Again, Howards Grove went on a 4-0 run, grabbing a 20-8 advantage and forcing Witt-Birn's final timeout of the set.

The Chargers bounced back by winning the next four points.

Rogowski had two more kills as Metropulos served on the final three points.

After Howards Grove got within two points of taking the set, Witt-Birn went on another 4-0 run. Deruchowski served two aces on the run before Rogowski delivered a kill.

The Tigers were soon able to finish off the set, but the Chargers' fight and determination was what made Rew so proud postgame.

Had you looked on the Witt-Birn side of the court most of the match, one might have thought the Chargers were the ones controlling the set with all the smiles and laughs the team shared. That's something the team did all season regardless of what the scoreboard read.

"It's definitely a great mindset (that) these girls have, is 'I'm out there, I'm enjoying it and I'm going to do my best to give it my all and get the win,'" said Rew. "It's really come around for them and it's really been the way our team has played all season long."

Set three saw Howards Grove jump out to an 11-1 lead, but it still didn't spoil the Chargers' spirits.

Witt-Birn got a couple kills from Metropulos in the middle of the set to match points with Howards Grove before the Tigers pulled away for good.

The Chargers finished with 16 attack kills in the contest, while Howards Grove had 42. Rogowski tallied 11 of the kills, while Metropulos had the other five.

Senior Payton Foster tallied a

team-leading eight assists, while Betry had five. Deruchowski had all three of the team's aces. Rogowski, Foster and Metropulos all were credited with four digs in the contest.

It was a tough finish to an otherwise spectacular season for Witt-Birn. The Chargers finished 28-9 overall, winning the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division with a perfect record before claiming regional and sectional titles to get to state for the first time in school history.

It was a team dominated by upperclassmen and led by six seniors — Rogowski, Foster, Betry, Deruchowski, Halle Beversdorf and Allison Linke.

"Just the fans and the energy throughout the whole thing was amazing," said Betry on the state experience. "If I was going to play a last game, it's great to have it here. And to make it this far, it's an amazing season, I'm really proud."

"I'm so grateful for this experience, it's like no other really," said Rogowski. "Just getting to play our last game here like she (Betry) said is really special for us."

After receiving a bye to open the postseason, Witt-Birn swept Coleman before rallying for a five-set regional title win over Bonduel. Witt-Birn made quick work of Weyauwega-Fremont in a sectional semifinal before winning the final two sets against Edgar to claim another five-set match and punch a ticket to state.

Pulaski drops state semifinal to Whitefish Bay

Tackmier, Ambrosius score for Red Raiders

The Pulaski High School boys soccer team saw its season come to a close after a 4-2 loss to Whitefish Bay in a Division 2 state semifinal match on Nov. 3 at Kohler Engines Stadium at Uihlein Soccer Park in Milwaukee.

Whitefish Bay jumped out to a 2-0 lead before Pulaski scored its first goal. Just when the Red Raiders had settled in, the Blue Dukes scored two more goals to grab a comfortable 4-1 lead at the break. Pulaski fought hard in the second half and eventually were able to net a second goal late in the contest, but soon after ran out of time.

Fourth-seeded Pulaski, making its second state appearance ever, had a plan coming into the match to try and keep things tied — or grab the lead, of course — for as long as possible with top-seeded Whitefish Bay. The reason for that is because the Blue Dukes are no stranger to the state stage — making their 16th ever appearance and second straight — so keeping things tied at zero was a way to put the pressure solely on Whitefish Bay.

Things didn't go as Pulaski hoped.

Whitefish Bay scored 1 minute, 39 seconds into the contest after a lead pass down the middle of the field. The Blue Dukes headed the ball over Pulaski goalie Mason Baker with a couple other Red Raiders also in the vicinity.

"When you score in the first two minutes, all that pressure went away," said Pulaski coach Jeff Schneider. "They just were very calm and cool the rest of that half."

Whitefish Bay had a couple more chances to score in the early going, but Baker made a couple nice saves. Just when it looked like Pulaski had settled in, Whitefish Bay was able to tack on a second goal.

The Red Raiders were tagged for a foul deep in their territory, setting the Blue Dukes up with a great look at the goal for their penalty shot. Baker stopped the initial kick, but the ball bounced right back to the player

taking the penalty kick, and he snuck the ball past Baker on a second attempt at the 18:34 mark.

Whitefish Bay was tagged with a foul 11 seconds later, setting up a free kick near midfield. Dylan Carley sent a high kick toward the Whitefish Bay goal, and Corbin Tackmier was able

to get his head on the ball and sneak it over the keeper to make it 2-1 at the 19:14 mark.

There wasn't a ton of scoring chances over the next several minutes, with the next shot not coming until the 28:32 mark.

After another long Whitefish Bay

pass into the box, the Blue Dukes were able to tip the ball past Baker at the 33:41 mark to make it a two-goal cushion again.

Whitefish Bay then pushed its lead to three with another goal at 36:47.

"We were looking good at 2-1 and we were looking for a come

back, and then they just got those two and it just killed our spirits," said Austin Lipsey.

Despite being credited with nine saves during his 76:18 in the goal, Baker took most of the blame.

"It was just communication and then their long balls," said Baker on what allowed Whitefish Bay so many shots on goal. "A lot of it was on me, the communication just wasn't there between me and the guys in front of me, so that didn't really help."

Pulaski continued to battle in the second half, yet it was Whitefish Bay getting most of the shots up.

Pulaski's defense did a better job of fending off Whitefish Bay attacks, with Baker also making a couple more saves.

Pulaski's chances to cut into the deficit were few and far between. Hayden Burkel had a shot bang off the crossbar at the 49:46 mark. Burkel also got another look at the 68:35 mark, but Whitefish Bay's keeper made a sliding save to keep the match at 4-1.

After each team made some substitutions, Chase Ambrosius was finally able to sneak a shot into the goal. He broke free from some defenders and then skipped the ball past the keeper at the 76:18 mark.

"It felt pretty good. I'll always remember being able to score at state," said Ambrosius. "But I was pretty much just focused on looking

at the clock and seeing if we could manage to get one or two more to see how close we could get. But that one goal is a good way to top off the season, I guess."

Unfortunately for Pulaski, it was the last look at goal for the match, as both teams continued to sub players in as the final few minutes ticked away.

Gaven Haldemann spent the final 3:42 defending the goal for Pulaski. Burkel was credited with three of Pulaski's five shots in the contest. Pulaski was outshot 23-5 (13-3 shots

on goal) in the contest.

Pulaski played the contest without Ryan Drafz, who led the team in scoring this season. After dealing with an injury all season, a new injury to his opposite side this week put his status up in the air. He tried to give it a go during warmups, but the call was eventually made to not play him.

Pulaski ended the season with an 18-5-2 record and got redemption after falling a match short of state last fall.

"I think it's extremely special," said Jack Ryan on the team's state run. "We made history just coming

here, being the second time in school history, especially the fact that we were up 1-0 last year (in the sectional final) to go to this game. It makes it all the more special now that we redeemed ourselves from last year and kind of established ourselves as one of the best teams in the state."

"For these guys to finally punch through and get it, I think it's going to only help our program, because we do talk about getting to state and it's not a foreign concept," said Schneider. "Now that we've actually been here, we've played a game down here, I think the program in general — it's a bright future. I'm very proud of the team, this was a great opportunity and I thought, a good showing."

Witt-Birn, Pulaski sending individuals to state

Chargers' Dickman advances in 2 individual events, on 1 relay

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood and Pulaski girls swim teams will send individuals to the 2022 Girls Swimming and Diving Championship on Nov. 11-12 at Waukesha South Natatorium in Waukesha.

Witt-Birn had three individuals and a relay team qualify for state after competing in the Division 2 Merrill Sectional on Nov. 5, while Pulaski had a diver advance after competition in the Division 1 Neenah Sectional on Nov. 4.

Shawano/Bonduel competed in the Neenah Sectional alongside Pulaski on Nov. 5, but didn't have any individuals or relay teams advance.

Witt-Birn

Freshman Reese Dickman led the Chargers at sectionals, qualifying for state in the 50-yard freestyle and 100 breaststroke while also helping fill out the state-qualifying 200 freestyle relay team.

Faith Resch, Annika Resch and Olivia Bessette filled out the relay team.

Dickman won the 50 freestyle in 24.65 seconds, a new school record. She placed second in the 100 breaststroke in 1:10.13.

"To me qualifying for two individual events means that I have worked really hard this season and all of that work paid off," said Dickman. "My main goals starting off this season were to work hard and do my best. By doing this I was able to surprise myself and qualify for state my freshman year."

Dickman will swim in the first heat of the 100 breaststroke at the state meet, and she holds the best qualifying time of the eight swimmers in that heat.

Sophomore Faith Resch was the second-best finisher in the 50 freestyle at sectionals with a time of 24.86 to also qualify for state in the event.

She and Dickman will swim next to each other in the first heat of the 50 freestyle at state.

"Going into the meet I wasn't sure exactly what to expect," said Faith Resch of sectionals. "I haven't swam at the pool before or went up against any of the other swimmers. I knew all I could do is swim as hard as I can and hope it's enough. Stepping behind the blocks and believing in myself is really what made it all possible."

Annika Resch was the third Witt-

Birn individual to qualify for state after taking fifth in the 200 IM with a time of 2:27.28, grabbing the final state spot in the event.

The senior will swim in the first heat of the 200 IM at state.

The 200 freestyle relay team punched its ticket to state after placing second in 1:42.9. That time was over seven seconds quicker than their seed time coming in.

"We swam a great race at sectionals and truly deserve that spot at state," said Annika Resch. "Some of my teammates have been struggling with some injuries and I think qualifying for state really validates that what we have been working so hard for was finally able to pay off."

Bessette, a sophomore, was one of the Chargers dealing with an injury.

"Going into sectionals I didn't know that I would be able to swim," Bessette said. "I hurt my back at conference a week earlier and I didn't get back into the pool until Thursday. I chose to forfeit my individual races (at sectionals) so I was able to perform to the best of my abilities for our relays. Forfeiting my own races paid off. We all swam our best and I personally got my best time of the season."

The relay team will compete in the first heat of the event at state and hopes to all turn in personal records at state to beat their seed time.

Witt-Birn's swimmers are set to swim at 5:30 p.m. on Nov. 11.

Pulaski

Pulaski senior Taya Schmidt qualified for state in the 1-meter diving event.

"Qualifying for state means so much to me, especially since I'm a senior," said Schmidt. "It has been a goal of mine all year to make it and I'm super excited to compete. I think state is a great way to end my high school dive career."

Schmidt posted a sectional score of 461.35 to qualify for state for the third time in the event.

"Going into sectionals I felt really nervous but I knew I had to do my best to act like it was a normal meet so I wouldn't overwhelm myself," said Schmidt. "I think just trying to stay calm was the main thing I was focusing on and if a dive didn't go the way I hoped, I had to try and forget about it and focus on my next dive."

She placed eighth at state in the alternate fall state meet as a sophomore and then came in 22nd last fall as junior.

"For state my main goal is to make it through to the finals," said Schmidt. "I think making it to the finals would be great because last year didn't go so well for me and it would feel like redemption."

The Division 1 diving competition is scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. on Nov. 12. Schmidt will be the seventh of 24 divers to compete.

RBs Guerendo, Allen lead Wisconsin past Maryland

Wisconsin's players are making a strong argument that interim football head coach Jim Leonhard deserves to have the job for keeps.

Isaac Guerendo ran for an 89-yard touchdown and combined with Braelon Allen for 233 yards rushing as Wisconsin defeated Maryland 23-10 on Nov. 5 in Madison. Wisconsin (5-4, 3-3 Big Ten) improved to 3-1 under Leonhard, who was promoted from defensive coordinator after the firing of Paul Chryst last month.

"Of course, I think there's nobody more deserving than him," said outside linebacker Nick Herbig, who had two of Wisconsin's five sacks. "It blows my

mind that he's not the (permanent) head coach yet."

With each team throwing for just 70 yards amid windy and rainy conditions, Wisconsin's superior ground attack made the difference.

Allen rushed for 119 yards on 23 carries and gave the Badgers the lead for good with a 9-yard touchdown that opened the scoring late in the first period. Guerendo ran 12 times for a career-high 114 yards, including the 89-yard score that made it 14-0 in the second quarter.

Guerendo said the Badgers prepared all week for the likelihood of poor weather. Wisconsin outrushed Maryland 278-112.

"We knew it was going to be a run-the-ball type of day," Guerendo said. "I

appreciate the o-line for blocking their butts off today all day, opening up holes for me and Braelon."

Guerendo delivered the play of the day in the second quarter as he put Wisconsin ahead 14-0 by cutting to his right and racing down the Badgers' sideline while carefully staying in bounds.

"Mr. Tightrope himself," quarterback Graham Mertz quipped. "That was definitely fun."

Wide receiver Chimere Dike provided some exceptional downfield blocking to help Guerendo complete the fifth-longest run from scrimmage in program history. The school record is owned by Allen, who had a 96-yard touchdown in a season-opening 38-0 victory over Illinois State.

Nate Van Zelst provided the rest of Wisconsin's points by going 3 of 4 on field-goal attempts.

Wisconsin's defense capitalized on the elements to bother Maryland quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa all day. Wisconsin ended Maryland's string of 10 straight games in which the Terrapins had scored at least 27 points.

Although he entered Saturday having completed 72.5% of his passes to rank fourth among all Football Bowl Subdivision players, Tagovailoa went just 10 of 23 against the Badgers. The lone touchdown for Maryland came with 57 seconds left in the game.

Gresham, Tigerton, Bowler, Marion represented well

The Gresham, Tigerton, Bowler and Marion volleyball teams made up a good chunk of the all-conference teams in the Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division this fall.

The conference's top honor was split between Gresham's Chloe Bohl and Tigerton's Skyler Hauser. Both Players of the Year were seniors this fall.

"I am very honored to be receiving this reward; it makes me really happy that all of my hard work and dedication has worked out throughout the years," said Bohl. "I am super happy that people could look up to me and try and push themselves to do great things, too."

"Being named Co-Player of the Year means more to me than you know. I have been playing volleyball for about seven years now, and it has become my favorite thing to do," said Hauser. "Over the years, it has not only taught me playing skills, but it taught me how to love and play a game with so much passion. I've tried to work very hard and set goals for myself, and this was one of them — with it being my last year, earning this award as a senior was so special and such an honor."

In five conference matches, Bohl recorded 47 kills for the Wildcats. She also contributed 17 service points, six blocks and five aces.

Hauser recorded 69 attack kills, 12 block kills, 58 digs, 24 service points and five aces in conference play.

After winning the CWC-North crown again, Gresham ended up with three other players — juniors Maddie Haffner and Jessa Jensen and sophomore Rylie Kakwitsch — on the first team.

Haffner totaled 59 service points and 13 aces, with a serving percentage just under 99. She also had 25 digs and 12 kills.

Jensen finished conference play with 42 kills. She served 11 aces while tallying 21 service points and eight digs.

Kakwitsch was the Wildcats' libero,

tallying 31 digs in conference play.

Gresham sophomore Lexi Badd-moccasin-Barnes landed on the second team. She played as the setter, finishing with 66 assists, 13 digs, 49 service points and 18 aces.

Tigerton senior Abby Swartz and junior Samantha Suehring were each second team selections.

In conference play, Swartz recorded 32 combined kills to go along with 39 digs, 22 service points and six aces.

"After playing all-around for my entire high school career, it feels good to have recognition — especially this year as my senior season and the season back from injuries last year," said Swartz. "It feels good to be awarded among the talented ladies in the conference. I'm sad to see my volleyball career come to an end, but it was an honor to finish with a bang."

Suehring was credited with 48 digs, 56 service points and 11 aces, while chipping in five combined kills.

Bowler senior Brandi Spencer and junior Isabella Stevens were also second teamers this fall.

Spencer capped the conference portion of the season with 37 service points, 27 digs, 12 kills, 71 assists and 16 aces.

"It is a great accomplishment for all the hard work I put in this year and a great way to finish out my senior year," said Spencer. "Without my coaches pushing and encouraging me every day, this would not have been possible."

Stevens recorded 49 digs, 37 service points, 34 kills, 13 aces and five blocks for the Panthers.

Marion senior Emma Rasmussen also made the CWC-North second team.

"Throughout my high school career, I committed everything I had and more to the sport of volleyball," said Rasmussen. "I spent hours upon hours multitasking, watching college game films and completing piles of school work. Many days of my summers were dedicated to volleyball camps held by colleges all over. During the offseason, no matter how cold it was, I worked to increase my mobility, vertical and quick feet. 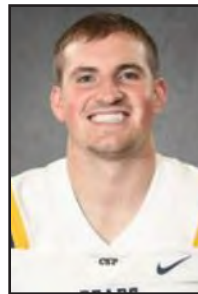
UW-Oshkosh
