

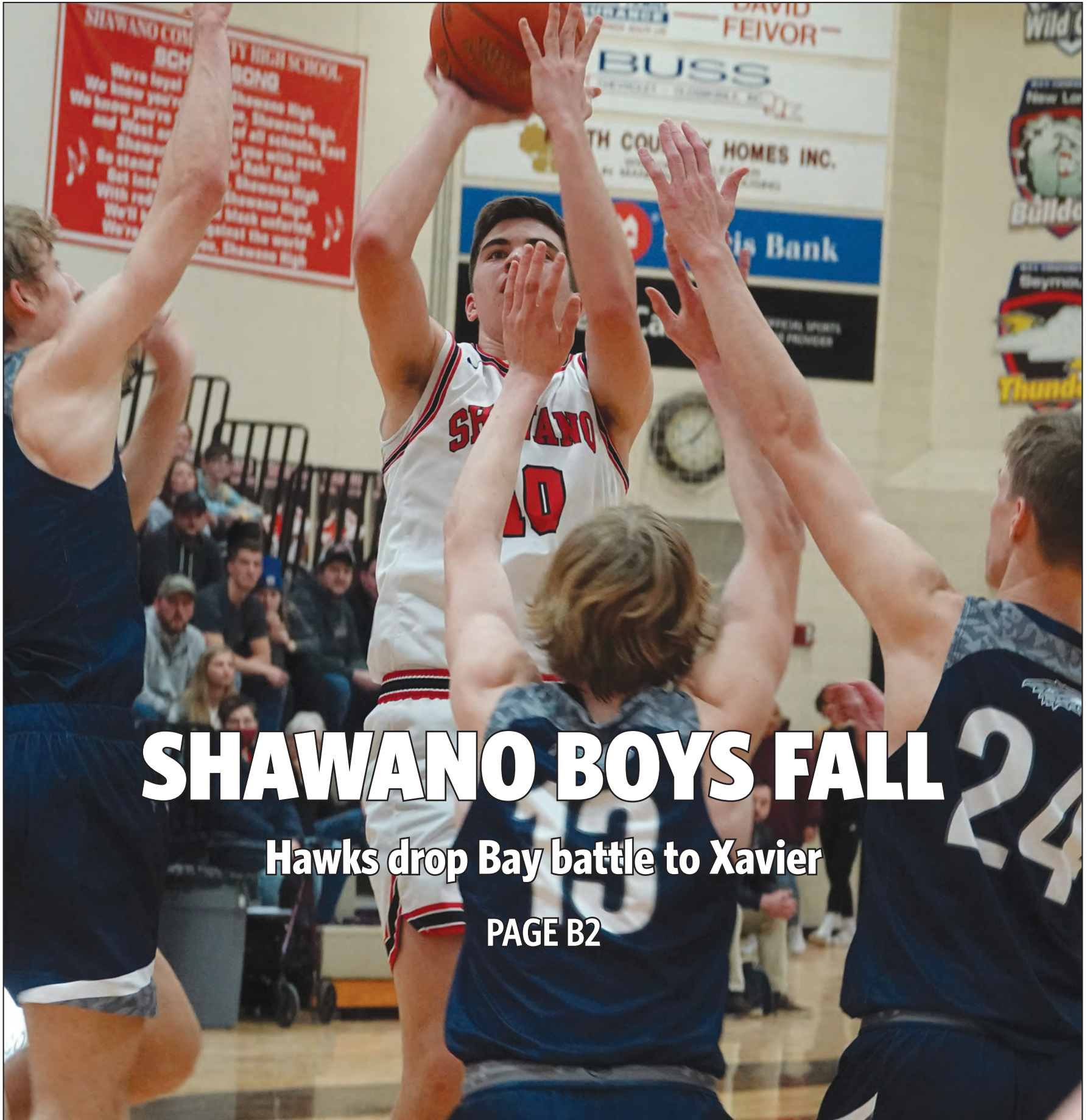

Shawano boys drops Bay battle to Xavier

Hosts outscored 10-0 in final 3:30

The Shawano Community High School boys basketball team dropped the battle of the Hawks, 74-64, to Bay Conference-leading Xavier on Feb. 3 in Shawano.

In what was a matchup of two of the top teams in the conference, with Shawano hoping to hand Xavier its third conference loss to create a four-way tie atop the standings, the action on the court didn't disappoint.

The first half was an up-and-down affair, with 3-pointers coming fast and furious. When the dust settled and halftime buzzer sounded, the teams were deadlocked at 40.

The pace slowed in the second half, as every possession got more meaningful.

Xavier pulled ahead 64-58 with just over five minutes to play. Shawano's Luke Guenther made a basket before Logan Sipple hit two free throws and a jumpshot to knot things up with about 3:30 to play.

Unfortunately for Shawano, those were the final points it scored in the game. Xavier pulled back ahead on a 3-pointer with roughly 3:10 to play, converted an and-one chance with 56.4 seconds left and then made three free throws in the final 30 seconds to seal things up.

In the final 3:30, Shawano simply couldn't make a basket. The hosts got some great 3-point looks, and had a close shot at the rim roll off.

"I mean, we got a couple good looks that we wanted, we just missed a couple. Those are shots we're gonna make most of the time, I think," said Shawano's Michael Metcalf-Grassman. "They capitalized on offense, we didn't defend well enough, I think. Then we got into the free throw game and we didn't hit shots in the end."

"We definitely missed a couple little, easy ones," said Sipple. "Like

Mike said, those are shots we're gonna make most of the time. I missed one there at the end and I completely hold myself accountable and I got to make that one next time, but just staying more calm and we just gotta hit those next time."

Sipple was a big reason behind Shawano's 40-point first half, scoring 15 of his 21 total points in the opening 18 minutes.

Shawano tallied just six points across the first four minutes, but a three-point play from Sipple jump-started the offense.

"I just got to stay aggressive and keep looking to score, even if I'm coming off the bench, I just got to keep staying aggressive — screen for my teammates, look to get them open as well," said Sipple on his mindset coming off the bench.

The teams remained locked in a back-and-forth battle, with included some shoving and a couple technical fouls being assessed at one point, before a 3-point contest broke out.

Xavier hit a triple to go ahead 13-11 before Shawano's Brandon Reed knocked in a 3-pointer. After a couple Xavier two-point shots, Sipple connected on a triple.

Xavier was able to build a 25-17 advantage after an 8-0 run that included two more 3s. Guenther snapped Shawano's scoreless streak with a 3-pointer, but Xavier got a quick basket on the other end right after.

The next five made shots between the teams were 3s. Metcalf-Grassman, Julian Perez and Sipple hit the triples for Shawano.

Xavier continued to lead by a couple possessions before dunks from Metcalf-Grassman and Reed got Shawano within two. After a Xavier triple, Sipple hit two free throws and another field goal before Metcalf-Grassman made a 3-pointer to give Shawano the lead. Xavier tallied the last field goal in the half to tie things at 40.

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Shawano went ahead by six right away in the second half after a 3-pointer and three-point play from Metcalf-Grassman. Xavier answered back with a 6-0 run before Guenther hit a triple and Jacob Landon added a basket to give the hosts a 51-46 lead.

The teams continued to trade small runs for the next few minutes before the two defenses tightened up. After Xavier went ahead 61-56 with 9:10 to play, only four total field goals were made before Shawano tied things at 64.

While the loss was a blow to Shawano's conference title hopes, the team is still holding out hope for that goal and a few others.

"All our goals are still on the table," said Metcalf-Grassman. "We still do have a chance at conference, and we wanted to win 20 games coming into the year and that's still on the table, and so is a sectional final like we want to get to. We gotta keep working."

Gauderman, Rogowski sign letters of intent

Both Witt-Birn athletes leaving state for college athletics

Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School seniors David Gauderman and Reese Rogowski took the next step in their athletic careers when they signed letters of intent in front of family, coaches, teammates and friends on Feb. 1 inside the high school library.

Gauderman is headed to the University of Minnesota-Duluth to play football, while Rogowski will compete in track and field at North Dakota State University.

"It's just kind of a big relief, now I don't have to worry about where to go or if I'm going to play college football or not," said Gauderman of signing. "Just to have it set in stone just really means a lot."

"I'm just blessed and thankful to be able to have this opportunity and to compete at the next level because it shows that all my hard work throughout the years has paid off," said Rogowski.

Gauderman is coming off a senior football season in which he rushed for 1,539 yards and 16 touchdowns across 10 games. He also caught 12 passes for an additional 157 yards and three scores.

Defensively, Gauderman accumulated 96 total tackles during the regular season, 22 of which went for losses. He also forced two fumbles, recovered one fumble and registered 7½ sacks.

Gauderman was surprised to only have two offers after his senior year wrapped up, and rightfully so after ranking near the top of the state on both sides of the ball in several different statistics.

He ended up choosing Duluth because, "I really love the town up there and the football team is always good, so it was a pretty easy decision to make."

Over the years, Gauderman said he "put a purpose to every workout that I want to make it to the next level" and that's what helped him get to this point.

He thanked his dad, Tony, for driving him to football camps over the years and all his coaches for their time and effort to work with him and his

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teammates. Gauderman also highlighted his teammates for "supporting me throughout the journey."

Gauderman is also a standout wrestler for Witt-Birn, and is currently ranked first in the entire state at 220 pounds in the Division 3 rankings put out by www.wisconsinrappler.com. The two-time state qualifier said there really was never a decision to make between the two sports.

"It was always football. Wrestling, I couldn't imagine doing that for 4-5 more years, if I'm going to be honest," said Gauderman with a smile. "It was always in the back of my head, but I think football is the main sport I've enjoyed doing."

Gauderman said he and his new football team have been talking a lot about what the future might hold. The plan is for Gauderman to play outside linebacker or defensive end.

Rogowski has been a star athlete for Witt-Birn since the day she started high school.

After having her freshman track and field season wiped out because

of the pandemic, Rogowski has made up for lost time by qualifying for state in four events — the 100-, 200- and 400-dashes and long jump — in her sophomore and junior years.

Rogowski has placed in the top 10 in each event, with second-place finishes in the 200 and 400 as a junior serving as her best state finishes so far.

When she began looking into college athletics, Rogowski thought she wanted to play basketball. She started getting emails from track coaches and decided to take a look around.

"I visited some basketball schools, and they just didn't feel like the right fit. I visited a lot of track schools, and when I went to NDSU I saw the team atmosphere and the atmosphere that the coaches provided for their athletes and it felt like it'd be a good place for me," said Rogowski.

She singled out coaches, family members and teammates for helping her get to the college level.

"My coaches push me hard in practice because they believe in me and

knew I could get here to this day, so that's really helped," said Rogowski.

Rogowski was also a star volleyball player for Witt-Birn, so she had options for what sport she could play at the next level.

She picked track because "It's a self-motivating sport and that's what I love about it. It all depends on you and the work you put in, and I love that aspect of it."

Rogowski said the coaching staff at NDSU wants her to compete in all of the events she can and not just specialize in one thing, like sprints or field events.

"That's going to be interesting to see how that goes, and it should be fun to learn new things," said Rogowski.

The senior also has one final track season with the Chargers, but there aren't specific places she hopes to achieve in each event. Instead, she wants to drop her times, improve her marks in field events and continue to get better each day.

Bonduel boys cruise past Green Bay West

Westrich leads balanced Bears' attack

The Bonduel High School boys basketball team led from start to finish during a 64-42 nonconference win over Green Bay West on Jan. 30 in Bonduel.

Plenty of Bears saw game action, and nine of the 11 players who took the floor scored.

"It's great. I feel like we all deserve to be on the court," said freshman big man Ryan Westrich, who led Bonduel with 19 points and 16 rebounds. "We all know that we can score and we all know that we can play tough basketball, and I'm just really glad that we all stepped up today."

Westrich was part of the reason why Bonduel jumped out to a 10-2 lead in less than four minutes. He hit two free throws to open the scoring and later had a three-point play.

Charlie Tauchen had the team's other five points on the run, including a 3-pointer.

Green Bay West settled in a bit after that, but Bonduel was still able to maintain control pretty much the entire game.

Brodie Hartmann scored five straight points for Bonduel before Westrich converted two more looks. A 3-pointer from Tauchen and Westrich basket made it a 24-7 advantage.

The visitors scored the next five points, but back-to-back layups from Noah Weier, and a third layup a bit later, kept Bonduel comfortably ahead.

"We knew we had to come out and just right from the get-go step on the gas and get a lead," said Weier. "We kind of came out a little slow and let their intensity get to us, but we picked it up, started playing harder. We know that when we play hard, we can play with anyone..."

Sam Roberts, Race Anvelink and Cade Johnson scored the Bears' final points of the half, leaving the team with a 35-20 advantage.

Bonduel kept rolling in the second half, scoring the first eight points. Westrich scored on the first possession and then hit the first of back-to-back 3-pointers, with Margelofsky having the other.

Green Bay West responded with a 9-0 run to make it a 14-point

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contest, but a second-chance bucket from Westrich and fastbreak score from Johnson got Bonduel right back on track.

A bit later, Anvelink knocked down a couple 3-pointers to push the lead over 20 again, and Bonduel coasted to victory from there.

"In the first half, I'm not going to sugarcoat it, we didn't play very good defense for our standards," said Westrich. "But we picked it up during the second half thanks to our coach

getting on our case about not hedging enough and not playing hard enough. I think that really helped us in the end there playing great defense."

Behind Westrich's double-double, it was a balanced scoring approach for the Bears.

Roberts ended up hitting four shots to finish with eight points, while Tauchen also had eight. Anvelink tallied seven points, while Weier had six. Margelofsky and Hartmann had five points each.

Witt-Birn claims 2nd at CWC Tournament

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School wrestling team earned a second-place finish at the Central Wisconsin Conference Tournament on Feb. 4 in Shiocton.

The Chargers had three conference champions and three second-place finishers on their way to scoring 203 points, only behind Shiocton's 273½.

Bonduel had five first- or second-place finishers at the conference tournament and accumulated 174 points to grab third place. Menominee Indian scored 44 points to take eighth.

Shawano and Oconto Falls sent girls wrestlers to Waupaca for the North Eastern Conference/Bay Conference Girls Championship on Feb. 4.

Seven Shawano girls wrestlers totaled 78½ points to help the Hawks take first. Two Oconto Falls wrestlers earned eight points for a 10th-place finish.

Witt-Birn

Devin Wudtke (126), Nico Pelusi (145) and David Gauderman (220) all

claimed first for Witt-Birn.

Wudtke defeated two opponents to grab first, claiming 13-2 and 14-2 major decision wins. Pelusi went 3-0, with a pair of pins and an 8-4 decision win. Gauderman went 2-0, with a pair of pins in the opening period.

Ben Miller (113), Easton Davis (120) and Andres Sanchez (138) all took second for the Chargers.

Miller went 1-1 on the day, with both his matches ending in pins. Davis was also 1-1, pinning his first opponent before falling by major decision in the title match. Sanchez also wrestled twice, with a win by pin and major decision loss in the first-place match.

Hawks get big 3s from Bystol and play strong defense

The Shawano Community High School girls basketball team hit some clutch shots and played tough defense late to claim a 52-40 nonconference win over Pacelli on Jan. 31 in Shawano.

The Hawks led most of the contest before the visiting Cardinals went on a run midway through the second half. Shawano called timeout with 7 minutes, 44 seconds to play and ended up outscoring Pacelli 17-7 the rest of the way.

After the timeout Pacelli hit a 3-pointer to grab its first lead since the 11-minute mark of the first half. Shawano came right back with a triple from Ella Stuber.

After a couple of scoreless minutes, Pacelli hit a shot tie tie things at 38. Shawano dominated the rest of the way.

Two free throws from Brynlie Boyles on a one-and-one opportunity gave Shawano the lead with 4:32 to play. After a Pacelli turnover against the Shawano full-court press, Abby Bystol knocked down a 3-pointer. Another Pacelli turnover led to a second straight Bystol triple, and just like that, Shawano led 46-38 with 3:18 to play.

"I was really struggling in the beginning (some missed jumpshots and foul trouble earlier in the game), coach is like 'Just keep shooting, they'll fall, they'll fall.' The worst thing to do is stop shooting, it makes it worse," said Bystol. "So I had to come out and hit those two 3s and I got (my confidence) back."

A Pacelli timeout didn't stop Shawano's momentum, as the next two possessions also ended in turnovers. Leah Nordin then converted a shot for the Hawks to make it a 10-point game.

Pacelli scored with about 1:45 to play, but four Shawano free throws accounted for the game's final points and the Hawks walked away victorious.

"Hopefully, coming off that Antigo loss, 70-71, hopefully this one is a morale booster for New London (on Feb. 3) because I know New London is going to be tough," said Nordin.

The freshman 6-footer carried the

Trinity Popelka had Shawano's first point in the game on a free throw before Nordin scored the next seven points. Anna Dreier followed with a basket to give Shawano a 10-4 lead.

Nordin and Braylyn Babino did the rest of the first-half scoring for the Hawks.

Nordin had the team's next two field goals to give the hosts a 14-8 lead. Babino later hit a 3-pointer, which was followed by a Nordin bucket to make it 19-10.

Babino scored on a fastbreak chance off an assist from Nordin to push the lead to double digits. Babino then hit another triple in the final minute of the half.

WIAA board supports 5-division girls volleyball plan

Several other changes approved for fall sports

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved a number of coaches' recommendations impacting five fall sports at its meeting on Feb. 1.

The board approved 10 recommendations that were originated and advanced by the fall coaches' or officials' advisory committees followed by a review of the executive staff, Sports Advisory Committee and the Advisory Council.

The one volleyball recommendation supported by the board was an amended coaches' recommendation to add a fifth division to the girls volleyball tournament series beginning in the fall of 2024. The executive staff has been given clearance to develop and promulgate a five-division model to advance to the Advisory Council and Board of Control for final consideration at its January meeting in 2024.

The lone rule changes in two sports

implement a game-ending regulation for significant score differentials. Beginning in 2023, a mandatory running clock will be applied during the 8- and 11-player football regular season and tournament series when the point differential reaches 35 points in the second quarter of a game.

If a deficit falls below 35 points at any point prior to the start of the fourth quarter, the running clock will be discontinued. If the point differential falls below 35 points in the fourth quarter, the running clock will continue for the remainder of regulation.

In soccer, if the point differential after 60 minutes of play reaches eight or more goals during the regular season or tournament series, the game shall be terminated. The score at the time of the stoppage will be recorded as the final score beginning in the fall of 2023.

The girls golf coaches' recommendation receiving acceptance from the board splits the Division 2 tournament series field into three regionals per sectional. Beginning in the fall of 2023, the top three teams, and top three individuals who are not members of the team qualifying for sectionals, advance to compete in the sectional meet.

The two tennis recommendations passed by the board include adding an appointed coaches association representative to the State Team Tournament Seeding Committee. The representative will cast a tie-breaking vote if necessary. The second approved recommendation moves the starting time of the state team tournament on Friday to 3 p.m. or the earliest possible time after 3 p.m.

Four Officials Advisory Committee recommendations were approved, including three in the sport of volleyball. Officials will now be allowed the option to use electronic headsets to communicate during a volleyball match. In addition, volleyball officials may wear any NFHS-approved color of officials' polo shirts, including white, blue or gray as long as the R1 and R2 match. The third volleyball officials' recommendation approved by the board, after it was amended, allows the WIAA logo to be placed on officials' uniforms.

The other officials' recommendation clarifies the limited responsibility of volunteer officials in soccer. Volunteers are not authorized to call offsides or fouls during a match.

Other board action includes authorizing the reinstatement of the Media Advisory Committee beginning this summer as well as approving three non-football, fast-track conference realignment requests.

Jordan Sinz, co-chair of the Competitive Balance Ad Hoc Committee, presented the board with a detailed summary of the Competitive Balance Plan being circulated and communicated with the membership. On March 7, the board is scheduled to vote on whether or not to advance the plan to a membership vote at the Annual Meeting on April 26.

Topics of board discussion included the proposed language and rationale of prospective constitutional amendments and the positions taken on them by the Sports Advisory Committee and Advisory Council; the status of the 2022-23 conference realignment process; continued efforts to recruit and retain licensed officials; the status of middle-level membership; plans for the 2023 Annual Meeting in April; upcoming Advisory Council and Board of Control elections; updates on the InsideOut Initiative; and planning for the 2023 Scholar Athlete program.

Oconto Falls boys fall to Waupaca in NEC play

Panthers' comeback effort fall apart late

The Oconto Falls High School boys basketball team erased a 17-point deficit but were outscored 10-2 in the final couple minutes of a 75-67 North Eastern Conference loss to Waupaca on Feb. 2 in Oconto Falls.

Oconto Falls trailed 37-20 with about four minutes to play in the opening half, but didn't give up and continued to fight. After getting back within single digits by halftime, the Panthers whittled the deficit down to two with 11 minutes still to play.

The Panthers lost their momentum and fell behind by nine again, but went on a 15-6 run to tie things up with three minutes to play.

Less than 30 seconds after Oconto Falls tied it, Waupaca went back ahead. Oconto Falls turned the ball on its next possession, but forced a Waupaca miss to remain within two points. An offensive foul called on Kody Vorpahl took away another chance for the hosts to tie it, and also fouled the senior post player out of the contest.

Waupaca took advantage, as its 6-foot-7 big man grabbed an offensive rebound and scored to make it 69-65 with about 1:15 to play. Another Oconto Falls turnover gave the ball back to Waupaca.

The visiting Comets drained over 20 seconds of the remaining time before turning the ball over. Oconto Falls missed a 3-pointer on the other end of the court, but Waupaca couldn't put the game away after a missed free throw.

Alex Haines made a driving layup with just over 20 seconds to play, but it turned out to be Oconto Falls' final points. Waupaca made two free throws on the other end, and added four more late free throws after a couple Panther misses and subsequent fouls.

"I think it's between fouls and just being frustrated," said Haines of why the team couldn't quite get over the hump in its comeback attempts. "We just couldn't score the point, and when you can't score, it gets in your head."

Vorpahl's foul troubles were a

big storyline to the contest. The 6-4 senior had the early assignment of guarding Waupaca's big man. Vorpahl did a good job of slowing him down and making him work hard in the early going, but was tagged with his second and third fouls in a six-second span less than eight minutes into action.

At that point, Waupaca was up seven points, and the calls continued to stack up against Oconto Falls, including a technical foul, before the deficit reached 17.

"We had to go in a zone and had to get a couple guys to box him out. It was a little tough," said Oconto Falls' Caden Birr on how the team's foul trouble played a role.

After struggling to find an of-

fensive groove for much of the first half, 3-pointers started to fall, and the hosts quickly started chipping away at the big deficit.

Jameson Beaman knocked down two 3-pointers to spark the Panthers, and Birr hit another triple to make it a seven-point contest. By halftime, Waupaca led 41-32.

Haines and Carter Hill powered the host's comeback efforts in the second half, combining to score the first 16 points and getting Oconto Falls within two points, 50-48.

After falling behind by nine points again, Evan Yuma got to the free throw line a couple times to spark the host's next big push. Birr then scored eight straight points, including two 3-pointers, to tie the

game at 65.

"These last couple weeks of practice, we've been putting in the work. (We) Don't want to do like the last couple years where we're losing game by 30," said Birr. "We wanted to keep in the game, so we battled back and tied it up after a couple made shots..."

New-look postseason ahead as girls join mix

Boys, girls will both wrestle in Madison for individual state

The postseason has arrived for high school wrestlers.

After girls wrestling held its inaugural state tournament in 2022 at the La Crosse Center, the girls will get to showcase their talents at state this winter at the Kohl Center alongside the boys. With the state tournament now including boys and girls wrestling, the postseason has a new look, and here's a quick look at some of the proceedings.

Regionals are set for Feb. 11, but will only include boys wrestlers, unless a girl wrestler chooses to compete in the boys individual tournament — girls cannot compete in both individual tournaments. Girls are eligible to participate in team sectionals or team state duals if their team advances that far, regardless of which individual tournament they choose to compete in.

In Division 1, Shawano and Pulaski are both part of the Green Bay West Regional, which will begin at 10 a.m. Oconto Falls is hosting a super regional in Division 2, with wrestling beginning at 10:30 a.m. Bonduel, Lena, Menominee Indian, Suring/Gillett and Wittenberg-Birnamwood are all in the Division 3 Crivitz Super Regional, which opens at 10 a.m.

To qualify for sectionals, regional wrestlers must place in the top four in their weight classes.

Sectionals will take place on Feb. 18, with girls wrestlers joining their boys sectional qualifiers at that point.

Shawano and Pulaski wrestlers will be in action in Shawano, with wrestling beginning at 10 a.m. Oconto Falls wrestlers will head to Wrightstown, with a 10 a.m. start there as well. Bonduel, Lena, Menominee Indian, Suring/Gillett and Witt-Birn wrestlers will take part in the Bonduel Sectional, which will be hosted by Seymour and starts at 10 a.m.

In the boys individual tournament, the top-two finishers in each weight class in Division 1 sectionals and top-three finishers at each weight class in Division 2 and 3 sectionals will qualify for state. In the girls tournament,

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only the top finisher at sectionals will punch a ticket to state.

The state individual tournament will run Feb. 23-25. A full rundown on the state schedule can be found at www.wiaawi.org/Sports/Winter/Boys-Wrestling/Tournament.

Even though girls wrestlers competed in a certain division at sectionals, all girls wrestlers will be tossed into one bracket at state. The boys state tournament will be broken down

by division as it has been in the past.

Taking a step back to address team sectionals and team state, here's how that schedule sets up.

Should Shawano or Pulaski place in the top two at the Green Bay West Regional, they would take part in the D.C. Everest Team Sectional on Feb. 14. If Oconto Falls wins or takes second at its super regional, it would head to Wrightstown for team sectionals. If Bonduel, Lena, Menominee Indian,

Suring/Gillett or Witt-Birn place in the top two teams at the super regional, they'd head to Suring for team sectionals.

Teams that take first at team sectionals would compete for state titles on March 3 or 4 at the UW Field House in Madison.

Of the 14 area boys individual wrestlers that qualified for state in 2022, six were seniors, so eight could make return trips to Madison. All three of the girls state qualifiers are back.

Nineteen area boys wrestlers were ranked in the Feb. 1 state rankings put out by www.wisconsinrappler.com. An additional 15 area girls were ranked in the rankings put out Feb. 2. Pulaski and Witt-Birn were both ranked in their respective divisions as of a Jan. 27 update.

There's a number of wrestlers that rank high at their weight class, with Witt-Birn's David Gauderman, Bonduel's Maddy Sokolski and Oconto Falls' Taylor Whiting all ranked No. 1.
