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Drug suspect arrested again while out on bond

Lindner given \$500 cash bond for 2nd time after new charges

SHAWANO — A rural Shawano man who was free on bond in a pending felony drug case was arrested again early Tuesday after a fight with Shawano police.

Lee E. Lindner, 31, was first arrested July 31 after authorities executed a search warrant at his residence in the town of Richmond.

He was identified in a criminal complaint as “a large-scale supplier of illegal drugs in the Shawano County area.”

He was charged with multiple felony drug counts, including delivering methamphetamine, manufacture and delivery of marijuana and maintaining a drug trafficking place, all with the use of a dangerous weapon, as well as felony bail jumping.

The state requested a \$25,000 cash bond for Lindner.

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge James Habeck instead set a \$500 cash bond, along with a \$4,500 signature bond.

Lindner posted that bond on Aug. 6, the day after his initial appearance. He had been free on that bond for one week before being arrested again.

Lindner appeared Tuesday via video hookup from Shawano County Jail on the new charges, including three felony counts of bail jumping and two misdemeanor counts of obstructing an officer.

“Mr. Lindner placed a plastic baggie inside of his mouth and chewed it to try to obstruct officers from discovering what type of drug was in his system,” Assistant District Attorney Catharine White told the court.

The baggie could not be tested for any residue because of the damage done, according to the criminal complaint.

Police obtained a search warrant for a blood draw from Lindner at

ThedaCare Medical Center.

“He did show all of the symptoms of intoxication by methamphetamines,” White said.

White, who detailed for the court Lindner’s

previous convictions and other pending criminal matters, once again asked the court for a \$25,000 cash bond.

Habeck once again imposed a \$500 cash bond and a \$4,500 signature bond.

According to court records, Lindner has previous misdemeanor convictions for battery, operating while intoxicated, resisting or obstructing an officer, criminal damage to property and bail jumping.

In addition to the felony drug charges filed two weeks ago, he is awaiting trial in a felony case on charges of strangulation and suffocation, false imprisonment and intimidating a victim.

Habeck has previously recused himself from cases involving Lindner due to a conflict of interest, according to court records.

In a 2017 case, in which Lindner was charged with misdemeanor counts of domestic abuse-related battery and disorderly conduct, Habeck signed a recusal order which stated, “the undersigned judge has a conflict of interest wherein the Defendant’s family has a significant money relationship with said judge’s parents.”

In his recusal order, Habeck cited a state statute that requires a judge to disqualify himself or herself, “When a judge determines that, for any reason, he or she cannot, or it appears he or she cannot, act in an impartial manner.”

Habeck is not presiding over the new criminal case against Lindner or either of the pending criminal

cases, which will be heard by Judge William Kussel Jr.

However, Habeck presided over Lindner’s initial court appearance in the drug case and the new charges filed this week and in both cases set the \$500 cash bond.

According to the new criminal complaint, a Shawano police officer stopped Lindner and questioned him shortly after 2 a.m. Tuesday.

The officer recognized Lindner and knew he was out on bond in connection with the Richmond drug case, according to the criminal complaint.

Lindner told police he had just left the home of a friend, who police knew to be a user and distributor of illegal drugs, according to the complaint.

Lindner appeared nervous and had a substance or object on his upper lip that he tried to wipe away, the complaint states.

When a second officer arrived at the scene, Lindner fled.

The officers chased him down and Lindner resisted being taken into custody, according to the complaint. One of the officers received a minor injury during the struggle before Lindner was finally handcuffed.

Officers then discovered Lindner had a plastic baggie in his mouth that he eventually spat out and tried to rub into the ground with his foot, according to the criminal complaint.

Lindner is due back in court before Kussel for an adjourned initial appearance on Aug. 26 on the new charges.

He is also scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Monday on the drug charges stemming from the Richmond search warrant. That hearing will also be before Kussel.

Lindner is also scheduled Dec. 10-11 for a jury trial in Kussel’s court in the felony domestic abuse case.

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Default judgment awarded to parents of teen killed in 2014 crash

Swadner convicted of vehicular homicide

SHAWANO — The parents of one of the teens killed in a 2014 crash that also took the lives of two others were awarded a \$500,000 default judgment Thursday in a wrongful death suit against the driver of the car and his parents.

The suit was filed by the parents of 17-year-old Cody Borsche, one of the passengers in a vehicle driven by Ryan Swadner, who was convicted last year of three counts of vehicular homicide and sentenced to 15 years in prison.

Swadner was also accused of being under the influence of marijuana on Oct. 21, 2014, when he swerved to avoid another vehicle stopped in his path on state Highway 22 in the town of Belle Plaine and lost control on a gravel shoulder.

The Ford Mustang he was driving crossed into the path of an oncoming sport utility vehicle and was hit broadside, according to the accident report.

Two Shawano Community High School seniors, Borsche and 18-year-old Tyler Welch, were pronounced dead at the scene. A Bonduel High School sophomore, 15-year-old Paige Brunette, was transported to Shawano Medical Center for medical attention and later died.

The civil suit filed by Wayne and

Wanda Borsche alleged the crash was the result of Swadner's negligence.

The suit also names Swadner's mother, Shannon Broder, and stepfather, Robert Broder, as defendants.

The suit maintained that Robert Broder sponsored Swadner's driver's license application and is liable for any damages caused by Swadner's negligent operation of a motor vehicle.

Attorney Craig Mares, the attorney for the Borchses, noted in court Thursday that Broder had signed a Department of Motor Vehicles document taking financial responsibility for Swadner.

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr., issued a default judgment against Swadner on Aug. 7 because Swadner had not responded to the legal action.

Thursday's hearing was intended to be a court trial for the remaining defendants, Shannon and Robert Broder, but they did not attend the hearing or have any legal counsel present.

The court heard testimony from Cody Borsche's mother, Wanda, who told of the psychiatric care and grief counseling that followed her son's death.

"Even grief counseling in a way isn't working because I'm so empty inside," she said.

Kussel ruled that because the Broders had ample notice and did not seem to be contesting the suit a default judgment would be awarded against them as well.

The judgment awards the Borchses \$500,000 in punitive damages.

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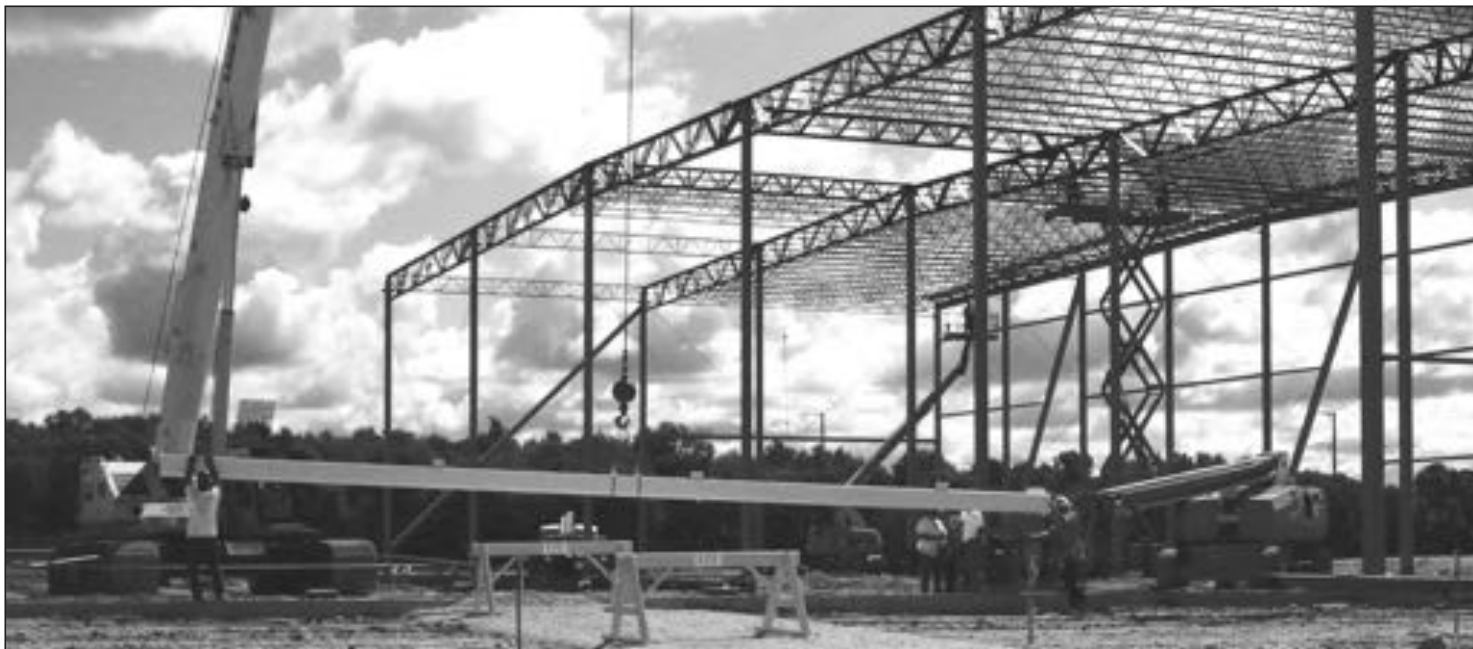

Ceremonial beam raising marks Reinhart construction progress

New facility going up on County Road B

SHAWANO — Local dignitaries and public officials, along with a group of Reinhart Foodservice executives and employees, saw a ceremonial beam raised into place at the company's new facility on County Road B on Thursday.

Those attending were invited to sign the white metal beam before workers from SPE hoisted it into its corner position. The 260,000 square foot facility on 46 acres is designed to be energy-conscious, featuring efficiency low-charge ammonia refrigeration equipment and 100% LED lighting. The facility will also house an employee training center and test kitchen. The fleet service center will move to the new site from the current Richmond Street location.

The new facility represents \$35 million in capital investment, according

to a company press release. Reinhart officials speaking at the event foresaw increased employment of up to 50 positions in addition to the current 275. Reinhart employs an additional 625 people at its two other Wisconsin locations. The Shawano distribution center covers the eastern half of Wisconsin, excluding Milwaukee, according to Reinhart's website, rfsdelivers.com.

Performance Food Group Company (PFG) acquired Reinhart in July from Reyes Holdings, LLC, in a transaction valued at \$2.0 billion. The acquisition positions the new company to be one of the largest food service distributors in the U.S. with about \$30 billion in net sales, per a news release from the purchaser. When acquired, PFG highlighted the value of Reinhart's 26 distribution centers across the eastern half of the United States, including New England, as one of the reasons for its purchase.

PFG currently has no other Wisconsin facilities.

Reinhart, from its headquarters in Rosemont, Illinois, employs about 5,600 people, marketing about 90,000 products to about 42,500 customers.

Reinhart, founded in 1972 in La-Crosse, has operated its distribution center in Shawano for nearly 40 years. It was the second largest privately-

held food service distributor in the U.S., and will contribute annual net sales of over \$6 billion to the new business.

Agency speaking with tribes, 17 counties impacted by macroburst

KESHENA — The Menominee Indian Tribe will ask Federal Emergency Management Agency for at least \$59,000 in disaster recovery funds.

Representatives from FEMA were in northeast Wisconsin this week to conduct preliminary damage assessments for 17 different counties and several Native American tribes impacted by a severe storm in July.

Shawano and Menominee counties were among the affected areas FEMA planned to examine.

On July 19, a macroburst moved across Wisconsin with straight-line winds that brought down trees and power lines, blocking roads and causing damage to property. The Menominee Reservation was particularly hard hit, with officials reporting that power was out for almost five days for many homes and facilities.

The tribe presented a preliminary

report Tuesday morning to FEMA officials at the Menominee Tribal Community Development Department. The tribe claimed about \$59,000 in costs for generators, emergency supplies and manpower, among other things, but over the course of an hour-long meeting, it was discovered a few items were not included, so the fund request is likely to increase.

"This is the first time we've ever gone through something like this," said Ben Warrington, the tribe's emergency management director. "It's definitely a learning experience."

Warrington painted a bleak picture of how the reservation was damaged during the macroburst. He noted that volunteer firefighters for two different tribal fire departments worked throughout the night to remove trees and other debris from the roads and at facilities like the College of Menominee Nation.

With power out, the tribe had to

open cooling centers in Keshena, Neopit, Middle Village and Zoar for up to 72 hours. The centers provided a cool place for people to rest and recharge their electronics like cellphones and laptops. Menominee Tribal Chairman Douglas Cox said many people even had to bring their food from their refrigerators and freezers to the centers to prevent spoilage.

"(Neopit) is one of our larger communities, so those that lost power in the community lost their freezers," Cox said. "They brought the food out of the freezers to the school in the large walk-in freezers there so they could save their food resources. Otherwise, like everyone else, they would have lost all their food"

The big ticket item for the tribe was replacing a sewer pump in Neopit that failed. The tribe had requested \$15,000 in compensation, but the total cost for replacement was \$19,500.

It will likely take two to three weeks for a formal emergency declaration to occur, according to Troy Christensen, FEMA external affairs officer. For FEMA to provide funding, there has to be costs to the counties and tribes that exceed \$8.5 million.

"The real goal this week is to get a really good idea from a statewide perspective what the overall impact of these severe storms and flooding really was," Christensen said.

He added that FEMA planned to talk with Shawano County officials by phone at some point.

Christensen praised how well everything was organized, including copies of timecards for employees who worked on the roads, at the tribal clinic and at the cooling centers during the storms.

"The documentation (from the Menominee) was fantastic, which is not always the case (from other entities)," Christensen said. "We didn't have to go to any sites for this particular assessment."

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Shawano teen charged in 2 auto thefts

Multiple vandalism counts also alleged in complaint

SHAWANO — A Shawano teen has been charged with two felony counts of auto theft and multiple cases of vandalism that recently took place in the city.

Payton M. Pagel, 18, was arrested after police received a tip that he was involved in a car theft in the city Monday morning and that there was a Snapchat video of him and another person in the stolen car.

The car was reported stolen in the 1000 block of East Zingler Avenue around 9 a.m. Monday and was later

found on Riverbend Circle “almost in the water,” according to the police report.

Police contacted Pagel for questioning, but he failed to show up at the police station, according to the criminal complaint.

On Tuesday, another vehicle was reported stolen in the 1200 block of Birch Hill Lane and was found crashed into a tree in the 800 block of South Prospect Street around 6 a.m. Tuesday.

Police located Pagel and took him into custody.

According to the criminal complaint, Pagel admitted to being involved in both vehicle thefts.

Pagel is also charged with seven misdemeanor counts of criminal damage to property, including mailboxes that were reported vandalized along

Robin Lane on Tuesday morning.

According to the complaint, Pagel told police he engaged in his crimes because he was bored.

“Pagel stated Shawano is boring and there is nothing for kids his age to do,” the complaint states. “Pagel stated it was just teenagers and teenager stuff. Pagel stated he and his friends would be sitting around and looking for things to do and this is the kind of things they thought up.”

According to Shawano police, Pagel is also believed to be connected to graffiti, described by officials as racist and obscene, that was reported at Olga Brenner Intermediate School in late July and at Shawano Community High School on Aug. 7.

The charges filed Thursday make no mention of the graffiti incidents.

However, one of the conditions set at a bond hearing Thursday was that Pagel, who is home-schooled, cannot be on school grounds.

Pagel could face a maximum six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each of the two counts of operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent if convicted.

He is also charged with felony criminal damage to property, which carries the same possible penalty, and felony theft, which carries a maximum 10 years in prison and \$25,000 fine.

Judge James Habeck set a \$5,000 signature bond for Pagel.

Pagel is due back in court on an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 3.

Anticipated work schedule for week of Aug. 19:

Recent proceedings from Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court:

- Gerald R. Hoffman, 52, of Shawano, was sentenced to five years in prison and four years extended supervision on one count of possession of child pornography at a sentencing hearing before Judge James Habeck on Aug. 14. Hoffman had been convicted after a jury trial on July 10. The jury found him not guilty on 10 other counts.

According to the criminal complaint, Hoffman also had a cache of so-called snuff porn, videos depicting women being murdered, though none of the charges filed against him were related to those videos.

Evidence related to the snuff porn videos was excluded from the trial on pre-trial motions that it would have been unfairly prejudicial.

- Matthew A. Klein, 27, of Shawano, was found not competent at this time to stand trial on charges of felony theft and operating a vehicle without the owner's consent after an Aug. 13 competency hearing before Judge William Kussel Jr. The court found Klein could become competent at a later time after treatment. A review hearing was scheduled for Nov. 11. Klein is accused of stealing a UTV from a residence in the town of Wescott on June 17, 2018.

- Lauren A. Mendez, 29, of Shawano, was charged Aug. 12 with felony counts of possession of math-

amphetamine and delivery of methamphetamine. According to a criminal complaint, Mendez came to the attention of police after she allegedly offered meth to a neighbor. She could face a maximum 12½ years in prison and \$25,000 fine if convicted of delivery of methamphetamine. She was freed on a \$1,500 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck and is due back in court for a preliminary hearing on Nov. 13.

- Jason R. Kelly, 46, of Readstown, entered a plea of not guilty by reason of insanity Aug. 14, on a felony count of burglary and a misdemeanor count of theft that allegedly occurred in the village of Aniwa on Aug. 10. He is accused of stealing guitars and other musical instruments from a trailer. He could face a maximum 12½ years in prison and a \$25,000 fine if convicted of burglary. Judge James Habeck set a cash bond of \$500. Kelly is scheduled for a court hearing on Sept. 16.

- Gamabne L. White, 33, was charged Aug. 13 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine after an arrest in Shawano on Aug. 12. He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. Judge James Habeck set a \$500 cash bond and \$1,500 signature bond. White is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 3.

- Ronald J. Asp, 60, of Suring, was charged Aug. 12 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine.

Asp was arrested at a residence in the town of Wescott on Aug. 7 when authorities executed a search warrant at that location. He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. Judge James Habeck ordered Asp held on a \$250 cash bond. Asp is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance on Aug. 26.

- Larry D. Gretzon, 36, of Birnamwood, was charged Aug. 12 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine. He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. Judge James Habeck ordered Gretzon held on a \$500 cash bond. Gretzon is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance on Aug. 26.

- Amber L. Roehl, 26, of Hatley, was charged Aug. 12 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine. She could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. Judge James Habeck ordered Roehl held on a \$500 cash bond. She is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance on Aug. 26.

- Benjamin J. Menchaca, 42, whose current address is listed as the Shawano County Jail, is scheduled for a preliminary hearing Aug. 29 on felony charges of theft, auto theft, removing a vehicle's major parts without the owner's consent and criminal damage to property. Menchaca is accused of taking a vehicle and vehicle parts from Witt

Family Ford in the town of Maple Grove on July 10. Judge James Habeck ordered Menchaca held on a \$5,000 cash bond.

- Isaac W. Boldt, 17, of Bonduel, pleaded not guilty at an arraignment Aug. 12 to felony charges of attempted sexual assault of a child under the age of 16 and stalking. He is scheduled for a pre-trial conference on Dec. 17. Boldt is free on a \$1,000 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck. He could face a maximum 20 years in prison and \$50,000 fine if convicted of attempted sexual assault of a child.

- David J. Yaeger, 35, of Wittenberg, is charged with 31 counts of forgery and uttering a forgery. He is accused of stealing a checkbook in the town of Wittenberg and cashing forged checks between June 1 and Aug. 1 totaling \$19,500, according to the criminal complaint. Yaeger could face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted on each of the forgery and uttering counts if convicted. Judge William Kussel Jr. set a \$5,000 signature bond at a hearing June 24. Yaeger is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 19.

- Sunday D. Dixon, 33, of Neopit, was charged Aug. 13 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine. She is free on a \$1,500 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck and is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 3.

'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over' in effect for two weeks

Hundreds of officers checking roads for drunk drivers

To enhance public safety and deter impaired driving, hundreds of Wisconsin law enforcement agencies will patrol in greater numbers for longer hours during the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign that began Friday and will continue through Labor Day.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) utilizes federal funds to support the stepped-up law enforcement efforts, public educa-

tion and outreach on the dangers of impaired driving.

"As we approach the last major holiday of the summer season, we're asking for the cooperation of all motorists to help us prevent needless tragedies along our roadways by being safe, alert and responsible every time they travel," DOT Secretary-designee Craig Thompson said.

Last year in Wisconsin, alcohol-related crashes resulted in 159 deaths and nearly 3,300 injuries. Also in 2018, there were 24,624 operating while intoxicated convictions in Wisconsin. While alcohol-impaired driving remains a concern, Wisconsin and many other states see a growing challenge with drug-impaired drivers —

people whose ability to safely operate a motor vehicle is compromised by illegal drugs like heroin or marijuana, prescription or over-the-counter medications.

To combat the problem, Wisconsin currently has nearly 5,000 law enforcement officers trained in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement to help detect and remove impaired drivers from roadways. There are also 301 highly-trained drug recognition experts — among the most in the nation — as well as 23 multi-jurisdictional, high-visibility OWI enforcement task forces that operate year-round across the state.

DOT is offering these tips:

- If you plan to celebrate, identify a

sober designated driver. Never allow someone else to get behind the wheel impaired.

- If you see a driver that you suspect is impaired, call 911. Be prepared to provide as much detail as possible about the driver, vehicle and location.

- Download the free "Drive Sober" mobile app from the WisDOT website. Among its functions, the app includes a "find a ride" feature to help locate transportation alternatives. Since its launch on Labor Day of 2013, more than 73,850 people have accessed the app.

- Some taverns and restaurants have programs to provide patrons a safe ride home. Visit www.tlw.org/ and click on "Safe Ride."

Good deeds become bad entertainment in legal mess

Most of us, growing up, were taught by our parents to take out the trash. When we did it willingly without too much whining, our parents would express their appreciation. To not have done so would turn our homes into prime locations for television shows about hoarders.

Shawano County Supervisor William Switalla did such a deed for the county, but instead of the county expressing appreciation for an act of kindness that he expected no compensation for, it decided to bring felony charges against him and threaten him with prison time.

The next time someone asks why people don't volunteer anymore, we should all point to this case and say that it's true that no good deed goes unpunished. Who in their right minds would want to perform good deeds when the payoff is jailhouse bologna sandwiches and years of wearing prison scrubs in the most hideous colors imaginable?

Rewinding to April 2018, Switalla was among a number of folks with the county government who checked out the property on Webb Street in Wittenberg that the county acquired. He offered to clean some of the garbage off the property, and among the trash was a grill. Switalla removed said grill, prompting ire from county officials, so he returned it.

That should have been the end of the story, but the county decided to make Switalla the poster child for why you should never try to take something from the government. The property had been returned, and yet the county still wanted to label Switalla a thief.

Let's look at the wasted man-hours — the time spent investigating the matter, the time spent on appointing a special prosecutor because having a Shawano County district attorney trying to lock up a county supervisor is a conflict of interest, and the time spent in court for what was ultimately something that could have been resolved with

a stern warning from the county. What was the end result? Deferred prosecution and 40 hours of community service.

Yep. That's an efficient use of our taxpayer dollars. Why don't we try to score death sentences for jay-walkers while we're at it?

The grill in question was described in Leader news stories as "rotten out" and garbage. Outside estimates put the value of the grill at \$2 to \$2.50, but County Treasurer Deb Wallace claimed it was worth \$100. Maybe in mint condition, but if trash was really worth money, we'd all be sending our broken furniture, appliances and other large items to a recycling center instead of the landfill.

Many of the major players in this melodrama, even the special prosecutor, Michael Balskus, agree that Switalla did not use the best judgment by removing trash before officially getting the county's blessing, but that what he did was not a criminal offense. How has justice been served by dragging this through the courts? How many other counties

or municipalities would go to this extreme over something that was ultimately returned?

The case would probably still be going on — Switalla and his attorney were originally asking for a jury trial — had the two sides not come to an agreement. Could you imagine the testimony that would have taken place, the strange logic county officials like Wallace would have used to justify the need to throw someone in prison for property that Switalla had returned?

If late-night talk shows had ever got wind of this, the name "Shawano" would cease to mean "from the south" and instead be defined as "southern hicks in the northwoods." We'd either scare away tourists, which would probably not please the chamber of commerce, or get an influx of visitors seeking to find out if we're all just as demented as those who work in county government.

What about what would have happened if, in some bizarre world, Switalla had been convicted? Forget the prison sentence for a moment

and realize that, with a felony count, he would have lost his county seat and his position as president of the Wittenberg Village Board, since felons cannot serve in elected positions. I realize Switalla's a Democrat in a county considered a Republican stronghold, but is a junk grill worth destroying someone's political ambitions?

The only bright spot in this gloomy tale of bureaucratic idiocy is that Switalla's not going to take the easy way out in his community service. He plans to go above and beyond the volunteer service he already engages in and lend a helping hand with our local homeless shelter to carry out the court's mandate.

I guess that means Shawano Area Matthew 25 is the only one benefiting from all this legal bologna. All other residents are likely shaking their heads and wondering if it's safe to tell people that they live in Shawano County.

Restoring public trust in the educational system

Education is the foundation for democracy itself. The education of our youth is crucial to its future. If a population can't think critically or know its history, it is easy to be manipulated by the powerful.

The idea of public education was first promoted by Horace Mann in the early 1800s. He believed that, in a democratic society, education should be free and universal,

nonsectarian and democratic in method, and reliant on well-trained professional teachers.

Wisconsin's highly acclaimed public education system began to erode with the implementation of Scott Walker's Act

10 in 2011. One billion dollars of cuts were made to education, and since then, that amount has never been restored. That legislation also lowered teacher take home pay by effectively taking away collective bargaining.

Small rural school districts feel the pinch more than larger districts, which have a higher tax base. It has become harder for small rural districts to stay afloat. Local taxpayers have had to vote for an additional \$1.4 billion in referenda funding to support their schools. Quality teachers are harder to find, since

fewer students are pursuing education majors in college.

If this wasn't bad enough, the Walker administration advocated for expanding private school vouchers which divert money away from public schools. According to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, about 28,000 students in the Milwaukee area use vouchers and about 10,000 throughout the rest of the state. The program grew about 9% during the last school year, costing about \$300 million.

School vouchers don't just violate the principle of the separation of church and state, they pose a grave threat to public education. Voucher advocates rely on a number of fallacious arguments. Here are six of the most common ones debunked:

- "Vouchers promote school choice." They do in a sense — but chiefly for the people who own and operate private schools. Vouchers offer no real choice to parents because private schools routinely deny admission or expel students who fail to meet certain criteria.

- "Vouchers boost academic performance." Voucher programs have been in operation in some states since the 1990s. Researchers have had plenty of time to study them, and one thing is clear: Vouchers don't increase student academic performance.

- "People who send their chil-

dren to private schools are taxed twice, once to pay for public schools and once for the private school tuition they pay." Private school tuition is not a tax; it's an extra expense some people have chosen to bear.

- "Vouchers spur public schools to improve by introducing an element of competition." The public school system and private schools are so dissimilar that there can be no true competition between them. Public schools by constitutional law must serve all young people even those with both physical and emotional disabilities. Private schools can select certain pupils and turn away others. Public schools are answerable to democratically elected boards. Private schools are free from most forms of state oversight.

- "Private schools offer a better education than public schools." This assumption is taken as a given by many Americans, even some public school advocates, but there's little data to back it up.

- "The American people support vouchers." No, they don't. Polls have consistently shown that a majority of Americans opposes voucher plans, and the more people know about vouchers, the less they like them. This probably explains why vouchers and other private school aid plans have been decisively defeated in numerous ballot referenda since 1967.

The latest research shows there is inequality in our schools but also reveals there are positive impacts if our school are properly funded. The Evers administration worked hard to listen to the needs and values of Wisconsinans, and that is exactly what was reflected in his state budget.

Even after claiming that they were making "historic investments" in Wisconsin's schools, the Republican's budget cut \$900 million from Gov. Tony Evers' proposal. Fortunately, by using his veto pen, Evers was able to add back \$87 million in school funding to the budget.

Although Evers wanted to rewrite the school-aid formula so that more funding could go to high poverty and rural school districts, he was not able to do that. With increased funding, there could be reduced student-to-teacher ratios and increased teacher salaries, which help to draw the best teachers to school districts.

The governor has put our children's future and the needs of our local schools first. We know that the people of Wisconsin, from every corner of the state, have been asking for a greater investment in our public schools. It's time to continue the fight for quality education for all students. Our children are our future.

Storms don't only damage property, they can affect your state of mind, and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has tips to help people cope with the stress and unexpected changes natural disasters can create.

Talk with others who understand how you feel. Don't isolate yourself.

Exercise. Even something simple like stretching or a walk can help reduce stress.

Get enough sleep. Establish and maintain a routine. For example, try to have meals at regular times.

Avoid excessive exposure to disaster coverage on television or

online. The constant replay of a disaster can increase stress.

If you have property loss or damage, seek out appropriate resources for recovery and cleanup.

Plan for the future.

Get involved. If your community is impacted, volunteer your time or efforts.

There is no right or wrong way to feel when disaster strikes, but if you have been affected, pay attention to these signs in yourself or in others:

- Eating or sleeping too much.
- Pulling away from people and things.
- Having low or no energy.

• Feeling numb, like nothing matters.

• Having unexplained aches or pains.

• Feeling helpless or hopeless.

• Smoking, drinking or using drugs.

• Feeling unusually confused or forgetful; on edge, angry, or upset; worried and scared.

• Fighting with family and friends.

• Unable to get rid of troubling thoughts and memories.

• Unable to perform daily tasks like taking care of kids or getting to work or school.

SAMHSA, the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration provides year-round and immediate crisis counseling (link is external) for people who are experiencing emotional distress related to a disaster. The Disaster Distress Helpline is toll-free, multilingual, and confidential. Call 800-985-5990 or text TalkWithUs to 66746.

First responders, like police, fire, and EMTs, also may need help coping due to the long hours and devastation they face. DHS has a Self-Care Pocket Reference Guide to help them deal with the stress.

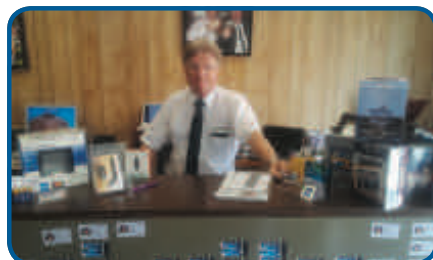

Report: Rain lead to record number of unplanted acres

WASHINGTON — Agricultural producers reported they were not able to plant crops on more than 19.4 million acres in 2019, according to a new report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This marks the most prevented plant acres reported since USDA's Farm Service Agency began releasing the report in 2007 and 17.49 million acres more than reported at this time last year.

Of those prevented plant acres, more than 73% were in 12 Midwestern states, where heavy rainfall and flooding this year prevented many producers from planting mostly corn, soybeans and wheat.

"Agricultural producers across the country are facing significant challenges and tough decisions on their farms and ranches," said Bill Northey, USDA undersecretary for farm production and conservation. "We know these are challenging times for farmers, and we have worked to improve flexibility of our programs to assist producers prevented from planting."

USDA supported planting of cover crops on fields where farmers were not able to plant because of their benefits in preventing soil erosion, protecting water quality and boosting soil health. The report

showed where producers planted 2.71 million acres of cover crops so far in 2019, compared with 2.14 million acres at this time in 2018 and 1.88 million at this time in 2017.

To help make cover crops a more viable option, USDA's Risk Management Agency adjusted the haying and grazing date of cover crops, and USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service held sign-ups in select states that offered producers assistance in planting cover crops. Meanwhile, USDA added other flexibilities to help impacted producers, including adjusting the deadline to file acreage

reports in select states.

This data report aggregates information from crop acreage reports as of Aug. 1, which producers file with FSA to maintain program eligibility and to calculate losses for various disaster assistance programs. The crop acreage data report outlines the number of acres planted, prevented from planting and failed by crop, county and state.

Because some producers have not completed their filing and data are still being processed, FSA will make available subsequent data reports in September, October, November, December and January.

Supervision is the best defense against drowning

DARBOY — On average, 10 Americans die every day from drowning accidents, not including boating accidents, according to the National Safety Council.

"Drowning is one of the highest causes of accidental death for children under the age of 5," said Dr. Abby Smolcich, a pediatrician at ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Darboy. "It is something we need to keep in mind at all times when children are around water."

Smolcich explained there are two age ranges in which drowning is most likely to occur. The first is children under the age of 5, and the second is males between the ages of 15 and 25.

The National Safety Council reported that drowning is the second-leading cause of preventable death through age 15, adding that 353 people ages 5 to 24 drowned in 2017.

Smolcich noted that babies under

the age of 1 typically drown in a bathtub, a bucket of water or a small kiddie pool, while those aged 1-5 typically drown in a backyard pool. For teens and older children, drowning usually occurs in a lake or river.

For males in their teens and early 20s, their tendency toward risk-taking behavior contributes to the drowning rate, as does the use of drugs and alcohol, she explained.

"Drowning is a silent accident," Smolcich added. "People think they will hear the child fall into the pool or they will be thrashing about, which will get their attention. That's not what happens. Typically the child will wander off into the pool area and accidentally fall in before the parents or adult caretakers notice they're missing."

Those brief moments can lead to tragedy.

"For children ages 1 to 4, inadequate adult supervision is the

greatest risk factor for drowning," she said. "That's followed by overestimating the child's ability to swim, then the parents or caretakers using drugs or alcohol while watching the child and lastly not having adequate flotation devices for the child's size."

The American Academy of Pediatrics offers these tips for preventing drowning:

- Install a 4-foot, four-sided isolation fence with a self-closing, self-latching gate around any pool to separate the pool from the house and the rest of the yard.
- Keep a telephone and rescue equipment approved by the U.S. Coast Guard (life buoys, life jackets and a reach tool) by the pool.
- When visiting a home or business with a pool or hot tub, parents should ensure basic barriers are in place, such as sliding door locks and pool fences with closed gates that are in good working order and ensure that supervision will be consistent.
- Learn CPR.
- During a pool party, parents and adults should take turns tapping in as the "designated watcher" and fully focus on the kids playing in or around a pool.
- If swimming at a beach or lake,

choose a location with lifeguards and designated areas for swimming.

• Teach kids to stay away from bodies of water in all seasons, even winter when they are covered in ice.

"I feel every parent should know how to do CPR to protect their children from so many situations," she stressed. "In a drowning situation, starting CPR immediately is vital."

She cautioned, however, that removing the drowning victim from the pool or body of water may not always be the best course of action.

"If someone dove into the shallow end of a pool or lake, they may have a neck injury. So removing them could do more harm," she explained. "In those situations, it's important to support the victim in the water until paramedics arrive. Whenever there's a drowning incident, someone should call 911 immediately to get professional medical assistance on the scene."

"Vigilance around any body of water is extremely important for people of all ages," she added. "The importance of conscientious adult supervision of babies, toddlers and young children around bathtubs or any body of water cannot be overstated."

Herbal supplements have health benefits but come with risks

Nearly every week, patients ask me about taking herbal supplements. Taking herbal supplements can provide health benefits. In some cases, these products may be unnecessary for good health, and they may even create unexpected risks. Because there is an abundance of unreliable and biased information about herbal supplements, users need to be informed.

Recently, a Harvard Medical School research team examined whether use of certain herbal dietary supplements was associated with increased blood lead levels. They investigated Ayurvedic herbs, echinacea, ginkgo, ginseng, St. John's wort, kava, valerian, black cohosh, bee pollen and nettle. They discovered that women using these herbs had lead levels more than 20% higher than non-users.

These findings agree with studies showing elevated blood lead levels in those who use herbs compared to nonusers. Unfortunately, examples abound in which herbal supplements have been associated with contaminants and harmful substances being found in users' blood.

One study found that herbal

supplements purchased from stores in the United States and Canada had detectable lead. Another study revealed that one-fifth of herbal supplements manufactured in the United States and India and purchased online contain detectable lead, mercury or arsenic. The long-term consequences of lead, mercury, or arsenic poisoning are sometimes serious and include increased risks for cancers.

The problem is that herbal products are not subject to premarket review or approval for safety, efficacy or good manufacturing practices. Under the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, the manufacturer of a dietary supplement is responsible for ensuring the safety and quality of the final product, including all ingredients received from suppliers.

This includes a responsibility for testing received ingredients (pre-mixed ingredients) and the final product for compliance with predetermined specifications for identity and composition. Despite these testing guidelines, many supplement products contain harmful substances.

It is recommended that you select only herbal supplements produced by manufacturers that use independent labs to test the purity of their products and provide reports to the public.

Make sure children get up early enough to eat a good breakfast before heading to school, or have on-the-go snacks ready for your child to eat on the bus. If your child brings a lunch from home, involve him or her in packing the lunch. This is a great opportunity to teach kids about good nutrition. If they eat school lunch, be sure to discuss what they ate that day so you can help them make healthy choices.

Threshereen celebrates early days of farming

TOWN OF RICHMOND — Dust is everywhere.

Clouds of particles of wheat stalks, cornstalks, dust and ash settle when the machines are quiet and swirl back into the air when the steam engines chug.

One engine ran a thresher and an

assortment of antique farm tools were on display last week at the annual Richmond Threshereen. It was held this year at the Red River Sportsmen's Club in the town of Richmond, just west of Shawano. The annual event is a demonstration, a chance to exchange questions and answers on finding parts and rebuilding units and an opportunity to share the love of simpler times and heavy duty equipment.

"We want to show the people how

the old time was — it isn't like that now," said Wayne Engel, event organizer.

"We want to show the younger generation how hard old people had to work," added his son, Justin Engel.

A thresher is a machine that strips grain from straw, Wayne Engel explained. A cylinder at the front of the machine does the separation but the grain must be pitched into the thresher by hand. The grain goes into the feed end and grain pours out of a side chute. Straw is blown into the back. If the threshing was any indication, the labor was long, dirty and hot.

A 1919 Nichols and Shepard steam engine, nicknamed "Old Floozie," provided 75 horsepower to run the McCormick-Deering threshing machine. A smaller steam rig powered a saw for firewood. Other engines were also on very noisy display. A vintage Oliver tractor power takeoff (PTO) provided the energy for an antique corn shucking machine.

Although the machinery did much of the work, tending the machines is no small amount of labor. Mark LeNoble, Shawano, said he, his father Vic, and his brother Doug spent most the week before the threshing getting their steam engine ready for work. Not the least of that was getting it on a semi trailer, as the county probably wouldn't have been pleased with the metal behemoth clanking down its roads, Mark LeNoble said. Getting up "a head of steam" takes 2 1/2-3 hours, he added.

For Wayne Engel, tending the machine is a labor of love.

The steam engines at the threshing were rescued from junkyards, or old farmsteads and kept running with recycled parts. Many are so old that parts are not available and have to be handmade, Wayne Engel said.

Attendees at the event are neighbors, friends, and "other antique enthusiasts," he said.

One of the attendees was James Beversdorf, who happened to be in town for his 1961 class reunion. He grew up in the neighborhood, and went to the Red River grade school.

"I saw these at our farm," he said. "They brought the machines here in the late '40s and early '50s."

Modern combines, which combine cutting and separating the grains, turn 20 hours of steam-based work into two hours, Wayne Engel said.

They are a great hobby, but neither he nor his son saw returning to that technology soon.

"Though you never know," he said. "The time might come when you have to go backwards."

FARM LIFE FROM A FARM WIFE

There's no place like home when you're far away

An acquaintance of mine just recently took a trip to Niagara Falls and then on to New York City, taking in the 9/11 Museum, Trump Towers and Central Park, to name a few of their stops. Seeing her images on Facebook, I scrolled, living vicariously through her pictures.

Thinking about all of that, I realized that whenever my husband and I had the opportunity to get away, and not very often during our dairy years, while I was grateful for the chance to travel, I was always so appreciative to come home. Just

like Dorothy in "The Wizard of Oz," I would always sigh and think, "There's no place like home!"

Sitting on the deck one day, I was husking corn from the garden for supper. My husband was out in the nearby field

baling big rounds, the dust swirling around him, the aroma of freshly-made hay hanging in the air. Gratefully, I realized that I was so very content. There is nowhere I'd rather be than on our farm in little Leopolis, smack dab in the middle of rural Wisconsin. I'm such a farm girl.

A number of years ago in September, I had the opportunity to travel with friends to California to visit our son, staying for a week. Their daughter worked in Los Angeles and I was invited to travel across the country with them, flying together, there and back. My husband, in the thick of chopping corn and

barn chores, could not get away. We decided I should go as this was a wonderful chance to see our son.

The week flew, but I realized how much I missed green grass and fresh country air and wide open spaces and peace and quiet and even cow manure. Our son was, at that time, living right in Los Angeles in a place where there were very few trees and a patch of what some people there would call a lawn. He has since moved out of the city, thankfully.

We took a bus once and the people were packed in. There were so many people everywhere. There was a big fella across the aisle from my son and me and I couldn't help but stare; he was so different looking than anyone from Wisconsin.

Soon I felt a nudge and looking at my son he quietly but sternly hissed, "Mom! It's not polite to stare in Leopolis and it's not polite to stare in LA!" Jumping, startled, I kept my eyes straight forward from then on. He just wanted to keep me safe, not get myself into some sort of confrontation.

He knows the rules and sadly, they are: keep to yourself, mind your own business and shut your mouth. I am so like, "Hi! Where are you from?" The culture shock going from Leopolis to LA astounded me. I don't think there could be a more stark contrast.

On the return trip, my son dropped me off at LAX airport to meet up with my friends, catching the return flight home. He couldn't go through security, so he made sure I was safely inside the terminal and, waving, left.

I could feel tears threaten. One, because I was leaving him, and two,

I was in a really big place with lots of people looking like they knew exactly where they were going. Once inside the terminal, I looked around and started to get that panicky feeling of being someplace where I do not know a soul nor do I know where to go.

Presently, I felt a warm hand on my shoulder and frightened, I turned to see a recognizable face, the husband of one of the girls I had come with. I could have literally hugged that man, he looked so dear to me right then. Motioning with his head, come on, I followed him like a little lost puppy, grateful to have found a kind, familiar face showing me the way home.

Back home in rural Wisconsin on my many travels to different work assignments, I enjoy the landscape and country scenery. Always mindful of deer in ditches, I've also come across what I call the cleanup crew; bald eagles and kitty hawks taking advantage of roadkill. I've seen turkeys, sand hill cranes, bunnies and chipmunks. I've been watching for bear, which I hear are all around us but haven't spotted any yet.

The country aroma of natural liquid fertilizer being spread on fields, which farmers have just harvested a third crop, hangs in the air. One morning, I met a guy who had just spread and his aroma kept my sinuses cleared for a mile after he was gone.

Along the way I take note of well-kept farms. Some farmers mow their lawn tight up to their fields and fields of tasseled corn with tidy lawns are a pleasure to behold. Despite the craziness of the spring planting season, the corn crop looks great around the county.

Because I know how much work is involved in just tending to crops and maintaining the animals, the beautiful flowers and gardens farm families keep is appreciated. There is one farm in particular that I always stretch my neck to notice. White picket fences are stationed along their sturdy red barns, complete with abundant green shrubs. They showcase flowers around their farm which have been blooming intermittently all summer long.

I notice pastured heifers in the woods across from their cow barn just down the road. The other day, I saw those black and white Holsteins having breakfast, circled close together around the bunk feeder, munching away. The farmer had tucked the wagon a bit inside the woods under some large trees, for shade. Their tails were busy swishing flies and they just so completely embodied the word contentment; the view so soothing I just wanted to stop and watch a while.

This. This is what I miss when I travel. While I am extremely grateful to have the chance to get away, I am always happy to come home. I love peace and quiet. I love green. I love fresh country air. I love simplicity.

I've discovered there's just no place like home.

Shawano hoping experience leads to turnaround

Clintonville gearing up for NEC play

SHAWANO — The Shawano Community High School football team hopes the tough and trying season it experienced last year will lead to a more successful year on the gridiron this fall.

The Hawks posted a 1-8 record in 2018, going 1-7 in the Bay Conference.

While it lost some impact players to graduation, several other starters are back from both sides of the ball for coach Alan Tomow.

Seniors Brayden Dickelman (running back), Keith Tourtillott, Jagger Theis and Ben Smits (offensive line) and Chase Huntington (tight end), junior Gage Timm (quarterback) and sophomores Elliott Lowney (wide receiver) and Jackson Smits (offensive line) are all back on offense.

Behind many of the same linemen, Dickelman rushed for 1,070 yards and nine touchdowns on his way to earning first team honors in the Bay Conference. Two of the team's linemen earned all-conference spots, with Tourtillott (honorable mention) back.

Dickelman will be the focal point of the team's offensive attack again this fall and other teams know that. Still, the Shawano running back remains confident he can keep producing, especially after the work he put in since last season ended.

"My offseason kind of started with track this year. I decided to participate in that and I got faster, and coach Tomow changed how we did our offseason lifting this summer and I feel I got a lot out of it and I'm even stronger and in better shape than last year," said Dickelman. "Our expectations for the season are to get better each and every day and compete with every team in this conference," said Burkhalter.

The Truckers compete in the North Eastern Conference, which was won by Little Chute last fall.

The first order of business for Clintonville will be replacing several starters on each side of the ball, including finding a new quarterback.

Returning starters on offense are seniors Dylan Danforth (wide receiver), Seth Keller and Ben Pappendorf (offensive line) and juniors Brock Smejkal (wide receiver) and Ryan Wegenke (tight end).

Back on defense are seniors Hunter Allender (defensive back), Daniel Rohrer and Matt Seefeldt (linebackers) and Devyn Gee and Levi Engel (defensive line). Junior Nathan Morse (defensive back) also returns.

"The challenges that we face are that we are still undersized and inexperienced on the offensive and defensive lines," said Burkhalter.

Burkhalter is hoping seniors Dominick Bricco and juniors Dylan Arnold, Brady Kasson, Connor Tate and Tyler Tellock will help fill some of the voids in the starting lineup.

Clintonville will open the season on the road against Wrightstown on Aug. 23. The team's next two games will come at home before four of the final six games are away.

Cephus' attorney says UW doesn't want player back

Former Badger receiver applied for readmission Aug. 6

MADISON — University of Wisconsin-Madison officials are sending a "clear message" they don't want former Badgers wide receiver Quintez Cephus to return despite his acquittal in a sexual assault case, his attorney said Monday.

Cephus, 21, of Macon, Georgia, was suspended from the football team in August 2018 after being charged with second- and third-degree sexual assault. He was expelled from the university earlier this year for violating its nonacademic misconduct code. Cephus applied for readmission on Aug. 6, four days after a jury found him not guilty.

Cephus' attorney, Stephen Meyer, said Monday that discussions with the university have collapsed. But the university, in a statement posted on its website, said Meyer was "false" and no decision has been made.

The university is gathering all relevant court records and will review the Cephus petition "as quickly as possible" once all the information is in hand, the school said.

The university also noted that students are held to a different standard under its code of conduct and may be found in violation even if what they did isn't found to be criminal.

"State and federal law require us to apply the code of conduct impartially and consistently regardless of the identities of the individuals involved," the university said.

Meyer wouldn't give details about what happened or why he thought the university would not look favorably on the readmission request.

"They sent us a clear message that they don't want Quintez as a student at the University of Wisconsin this semester," Meyer said.

A standout wide receiver, the 6-foot-1 junior played a combined 23 games in 2016 and 2017. He amassed 501 yards receiving in the 2017

season and led the Badgers with six touchdown catches despite breaking his right leg in November of that year, missing the final five games of the season.

Badgers head football coach Paul Chryst said last week that he would love to have Cephus return to the team, if that's what's best for him.

Seven players, including Heisman Trophy contender and running back Jonathan Taylor and quarterback Jack Coan, sent a letter supporting Cephus to UW-Madison Chancellor Rebecca Black, the Board of Regents and the UW System president urging that he be allowed back in school.

"Please do what is fair," they wrote in the letter, which Cephus' attorney released on Monday. "Clear Quintez's name and reconsider the punishment of a person, one of your students, who was found not guilty of what he was accused of."

At a news conference Monday afternoon, Meyer urged the university to follow the lead of the jury that acquitted Cephus and to not reinforce what he called the racial stereotype that black men are sexually aggressive. He said school officials need to think about how people of color will view the university's decision.

He accused the school of "slow-walking" Cephus' petition. He said his office has sent the university more than 250 pages of court documents already and the reinstatement decision should be easy.

Cephus, who was joined by about 20 of his former teammates including Taylor and Coan at the news conference, said he has no anger toward the university.

"The whole time I've had the support of my brothers and people who know me," he said in a quiet voice.

The women testified at trial that Cephus sexually assaulted them on the same night in April 2018 and they were too drunk to consent to sex. Cephus testified that the sex was consensual and was arranged by one of his accusers.

The jury deliberated for just over 30 minutes before arriving at a not-guilty verdict.

Cephus has said since the verdict that his top priority is returning to school and playing football again.

Bonus fall turkey permits on sale Saturday

Bonus fall wild turkey permits go on sale beginning at 10 a.m.

Saturday (Aug. 17). Anyone who has purchased a fall turkey license or conservation patron license is eligible for a bonus permit (one per day) until they are sold out. There are no drawings for fall turkey permits.

Zones 1 and 3 each have 5,000 bonus permits available, while Zones 2 and 4 have 2,000 each. There are no bonus permits available in the other zones.

The bonus permits are \$5 for hunters under age 12, \$10 for residents and \$15 for non-residents. They are sold at any license vendor or at GoWild.wi.gov.

The fall turkey season in Zones 1-5 is Sept. 14 through Jan. 5. The season for Zones 6-7 is Sept. 14 through Nov. 22.

Learn to Hunt Programs and hunter safety classes

If you are new to hunting, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources offers Learn to Hunt Programs that can introduce you to the sport.

This is also the time of year when many hunting newcomers look for hunter safety classes, which are required of anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1973, if you have not yet obtained a hunter safety certificate in Wisconsin or any other state.

Learn to Hunt programs include both classroom and field instruction before pairing the newcomer with an experienced hunter. Local conservation clubs and other groups can host a Learn to Hunt program by contacting a state wildlife biologist at least 30 days before the program. There are various programs aimed at teaching how to hunt deer, pheasants, raccoons, bears and food in general, as well as trapping.

Learn more by visiting dnr.wi.gov/education/outdoorskills/lth.html.

The DNR website now offers a number of online hunter safety classes that enable newcomers to learn the basics of hunting at their own pace, then take an internet field course in person at a local location in order to obtain a hunter safety certificate required for hunting.

The first step is to obtain a DNR customer ID number. Visit dnr.wi.gov/topic/hunt/ to get an ID number or find a hunter safety course.

New hunters also may hunt without a hunter safety certificate under the state's mentored hunting program. Search "mentored hunting" at the DNR site for details.

Wisconsin looks to prove 2018 was a blip

Chryst entering fifth year as coach

MADISON — Wisconsin won eight games a season ago, its fewest since 2012 and fewest under coach Paul Chryst.

"You hope it's a blip, right, and yet, that's the beauty of this season," said Chryst, who is in his fifth year at the helm of the Badgers' program. "You've got to go out and play it and you've got to earn it."

Chryst said his team needs to be smarter — knowing the situation and down and distance — in order to see the same success it experienced in 2017. That Badgers team finished as Big Ten West champions after compiling a school-record 13 wins. Last year's 8-5 mark included a lackluster 5-4 record in league play.

American a year ago who has rushed for 4,171 yards, the most ever by an FBS player through his first two seasons. That's also the highest career total among all active FBS players.

"He's our best player," Chryst said. "But he's also one of the best workers on this team. You'd hate to think — any coach or player — that you've arrived and that you're there. He certainly doesn't think that."

The question remains: Who will be blocking for the Big Ten's top back when the Badgers open the season Aug. 30 at South Florida?

Holes in the o-line

The Badgers lost four starting offensive linemen from a year ago.

Offensive coordinator and line coach Joe Rudolph said he expects sophomores Josh Seltzer and Kayden Lyles and seniors Jason Erdmann and David Moorman to compete for starting spots. Moorman played tackle, guard and center during the spring.

Returning starting center Tyler

Biadasz, who underwent hip surgery during the offseason, will anchor the line after earning first-team All-Big Ten honors in 2018.

"I have the most experience, yeah, but I think Cole Van Lanen, Jason Erdmann, Logan Bruss, they've all had great experience as well," Biadasz said. "I don't think we're nervous. We're excited. We're here to prove that we're getting back to Badger football and having a better season than last year."

To play or not to play

Graham Mertz is among the most talked about freshmen in the history of the program.

"I don't think there's anything fake about that kid," Rudolph said of Mertz. "I think he's very confident in his abilities and what he can do."

A new redshirt rule allows Mertz to play up to four games without losing a year of eligibility. Junior Jack Coan, sophomore Danny Vanden Boom, red-shirt freshman Chase Wolf and Mertz are vying for the starting job.

Registration opens for farmers' trade-relief program

WASHINGTON — Sign-up is available for the Market Facilitation Program, a U.S. Department of Agriculture program to assist farmers who continue to suffer from damages because of unjustified trade retaliation from foreign nations.

Through the program, USDA will provide up to \$14.5 billion in direct payments to impacted producers, part of a broader trade relief package announced in late July. The

sign-up period runs through Dec. 6.

"Our team at USDA reflected on what worked well and gathered feedback on last year's program to make this one even stronger and more effective for farmers," said Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue. "Our farmers work hard, ... and we aim to match their enthusiasm and patriotism as we support them."

Payments will be made to pro-

ducers of certain non-specialty and specialty crops as well as dairy and hog producers.

Assistance for 2019 crops is based on a single county payment rate multiplied by a farm's total plantings to the MFP-eligible crops in aggregate in 2019. Those per acre payments are not dependent on which of those crops are planted in 2019. A producer's total payment-eligible plantings cannot exceed

total 2018 plantings.

Dairy producers who were in business as of June 1 will receive a per hundredweight payment on production history, and hog producers will receive a payment based on the number of live hogs owned on a day selected by the producer between April 1 and May 15.
