WADC annual meeting on Friday

WITTENBERG — The Wittenberg Area Development Corp. will be having its annual meeting Friday at Tavern Front, 207 W. Vinal St., Wittenberg at noon. Anyone interested in finding out more about this organization is invited to attend.

The WADC — a nonprofit organization composed of local business owners and representatives — works under the village of Wittenberg board as an initial contact to bring in and retain area businesses. In the past, the development corporation has successfully acted as a confidential liaison between the village and business owners.

Shane Resch has been involved in the group for eight years and has served as president the past two years.

“Our role is getting potential businesses the information they need to decide if our community would be a good fit for their business,” said Resch. “We also work to sell the community as a destination for potential businesses.”

This past year, the WADC has been offering matching grants up to \$1,000 to existing businesses making improvements in their buildings. To date, Down to Earth Healing and Massage, Wittenberg Area Historical Society, Hanke's SENTRY Foods, Tavern Front and Resch Lanes have applied and have been approved for grants.

According to board member Dick Beversdorf, there is still another \$5,000 available and special consideration is given to members of the Wittenberg Area Chamber of Commerce.

To be considered for a grant, contact Treasurer Scott Nyman at 715-253-2111.

Resch is hoping the WADC can recruit at least one business to the community in the next five years. Ideally, that business would go in the business park, but anywhere in the community would be fine. The goal is to help generate high-paying jobs and increase local tax revenue for the community.

“We are looking for anyone with an interest in bringing new business to the area,” said Resch. “Unique perspective is a plus.”

The board currently has openings for people who want to serve on the board. Resch will be stepping down as president due to increasing demands of his business and home life.

Burglary charge dropped against village president

Misdemeanor theft charge will be dismissed after community service

WITTENBERG — A felony burglary charge against Wittenberg Village President and Shawano County Supervisor William J. Switalla was dismissed Thursday and a misdemeanor count of theft will also be wiped off the books if Switalla abides by the conditions of a deferred prosecution agreement.

Switalla will have to perform 40 hours of community service over the next six months as part of that agreement.

After the hearing, Switalla said he already performs a lot of community service for the village and county, but will do additional work.

"I could use up half of those hours with what I normally do, but what I'd like to do is come to Shawano and work with the homeless shelter," he said. "I've always wanted to do that because I've looked at the numbers on the homeless shelter and it's definitely a need."

Switalla was accused of breaking into a garage and taking a grill from a property the county had acquired in tax foreclosure.

According to the criminal complaint, Switalla was among several county officials who went out to view the property at 715 Webb St. in Wittenberg on April 24 of last year to establish a sale price.

When the county treasurer's office held an open house at the property for interested buyers, the staff noticed that the house and garage door were unlocked and items appeared to be missing from the garage.

Neighbors informed them that they had seen Switalla loading a grill

from the garage into his van, according to the complaint.

Switalla later returned the grill to the property.

Switalla's attorney, Paul Payant, had previously argued that there had been no felony committed; that Switalla removed the grill from the property along with garbage he offered to clean up for the county at the property the county had acquired.

Payant also questioned whether County Treasurer Deb Wallace, who signed the non-consent form stating Switalla had no authority to take the grill, was in a position to claim ownership of the property.

Michael Balskus, from the Winnebago County District Attorney's Office, who was appointed special prosecutor in the case, told the court that Switalla "exhibited bad judgment" in taking the grill, but he noted Switalla returned the property.

"There's really no need for a criminal conviction," he said.

Balskus was appointed after the Shawano County District Attorney's Office, which originally charged the case, determined there could be a conflict of interest given that Switalla is a county official.

Payant told the court Switalla intended to dispose of the grill along with the other garbage he had cleaned up, but because of the grill's weight he couldn't throw it in the dumpster and took it home with him temporarily.

Payant said outside assessments of the grill had placed its value at \$2 to \$2.50.

Balskus said in an interview after the hearing he agreed with those assessments.

"The inside was pretty well rotten out," he said.

According to the criminal complaint, Wallace had placed the grill's value at \$100.

Payant said after the hearing he didn't believe charges would have been brought had there been better communication between the county and Switalla.

He said Switalla was in this situation because he was performing a service for the community.

"Never has he kept anything, but he's cleaned garbage up," Payant said. "I don't think anybody would consider that a crime."

Switalla said after the hearing that he didn't know what motivated prosecution of the case.

Over the years it has morphed in a very caring community of independent souls.

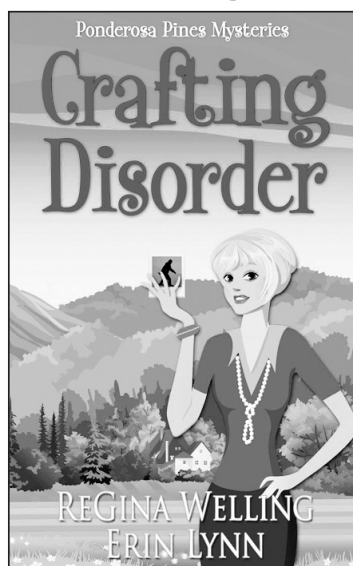
Emmalina Valentina Torrence (aka EV) is one of the most independent. She's the daughter of a founding family and she loves Ponderosa Pines with

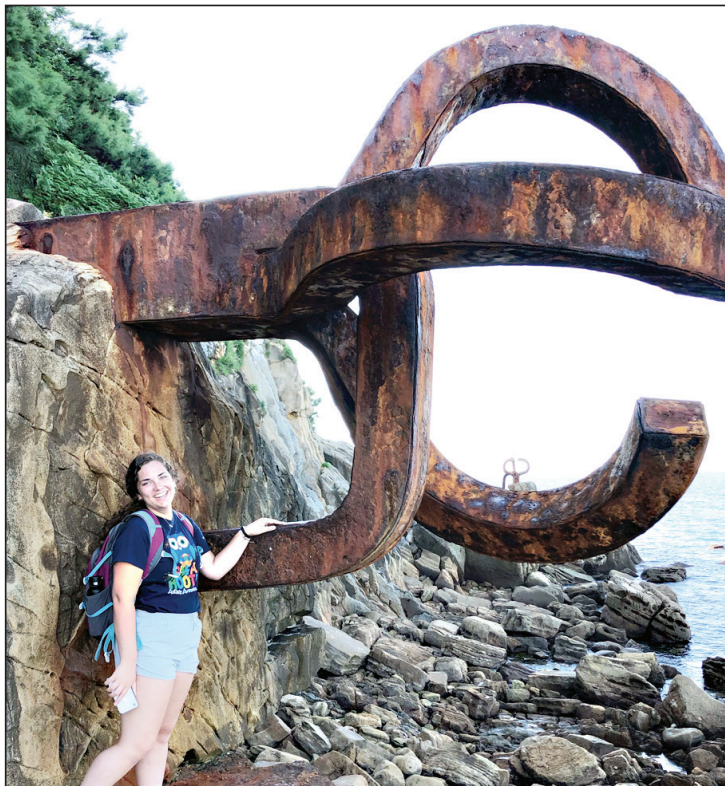

Student spends a month in Spain

Editor's Note: The Enterprise & News recently chatted with Karsyn Delforge about her Spanish language immersion experience this summer. She'll be a senior at Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School this fall and is the daughter of Andy and Stacey Delforge of Birnamwood.

Q: What did you do this summer?

A: Through a Study Programs International trip, I spent a month in San Sebastian, Spain, participating in a Spanish language immersion program. I had done some research online and felt that SPI offered the best experience for me.

Q: How long were you there and where did you stay?

A: I was there from June 28 until July 27, along with other students

from all over the U.S. We stayed with host families. I paired up with another student from Laguna Beach, California, and we stayed in an apartment with our host mother. A: I've had three years of Spanish at WBHS. Most colleges require two years of another language, so at WBHS the first two years of classes are generally full, but my third year, there were only six in my class. I felt the trip was a great opportunity to become more fluent and get to see how people live in Spain.

Q: What was San Sebastian like?

A: It sure was a lot bigger than anything I'm used to. The population of the city is about 180,000 and the entire metro area is over 400,000. There were some familiar American chain restaurants like Burger King, and Pizza Hut, but there were lots of traditional restaurants and small retail stores to explore. It's located on the north coast of Spain, about 12 miles from France. Having three beaches it naturally brings in a lot of tourists.

Q: How did you spend your time?

A: We had classes Monday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. broken into two sessions, one for grammar and the other for speaking. There were three different levels to be in and I was in the middle level. The kids in the high level were ones who came from bigger schools; some of them have been taking Spanish classes since kindergarten. Each class

included some cultural information as well. On occasion we would take a field trip instead of going to classes. We saw the Running of the Bulls in Pamplona, visited the Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao and we did a day trip into France.

Q: Did you speak only Spanish the entire time?

A: We did with our teachers and host parents. When we were on our own we'd speak English with each other. Sometimes we'd go to a restaurant and the waiters could tell we were Americans and would start speaking English with us and we'd have to tell them we needed to practice our Spanish. Sometimes it was hard to understand some people. San Sebastian is in the Basque area so the dialect is different. Also, some spoke a French-Basque dialect.

Q: What were some of the differences in their lifestyle?

A: My host mom would feed us breakfast and then send us off to school with a bag lunch. Because lunch was the biggest meal of the day we would often stop at a local market as well. We'd have free time until about 4 p.m. and then usually did an activity until 6 p.m. Supper wasn't until 9 or 9:30 p.m., so that took a little getting used to.

So many people walk or ride a

bike over there and you could tell the city put a lot of planning to have easy access for pedestrians and designated bike routes. The parks are so beautiful with lots of fountains and flowers. The markets would have things like pig heads or legs hanging up in the window.

Q: What was the cost of the program?

A: It was \$7,000 for the program and another \$1,000 for the airfare and then our own spending money. I brought 200 euros, a little over \$200 and burned through most of that in the first week so. Most everyone uses a debit card over there so I did that and saved my cash for the ice cream stands!

Q: What do you plan to do now?

A: I'm looking forward to my senior year. I'm on the dance team and I'm the football manager. I plan to audition for the musical and I'm excited get back to Spanish class.

Q: What are your plans for the future?

A: I'd like to go to college for speech pathology and Spanish. As a speech therapist I can work in schools or nursing homes or hospitals or have a private practice. I'm leaning towards working in schools because I love working with children and I think my

Spanish could come in handy.

Q: Would you recommend that other students take a language immersion class?

A: I think it was a great experience and most anyone could benefit from living in another country and speaking a second language. Europe is a great choice because so many people speak more than one language and some have a basic knowledge of several languages. When I get to college, I'm going to look into maybe taking a semester abroad program. I'd love to go to southern Spain.
