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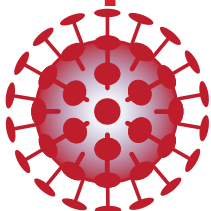
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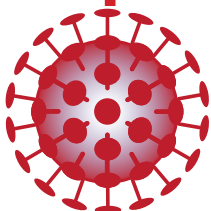
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3 county supervisors ousted in spring election

Results delayed after deadline for absentee ballots extended

A liberal-leaning state Supreme Court candidate pulled off an upset win over a conservative incumbent backed by Donald Trump when the votes were counted Monday from last week's spring election and presidential primary.

Three Shawano County Board supervisors were voted out, including two representing the city of Shawano.

Votes were finally tallied Monday after a coronavirus-induced delay of the deadline for absentee ballots.

The April 7 election went ahead as scheduled in spite of stay-at-home orders from the state aimed at curbing the spread of the pandemic.

An 11th hour attempt to postpone the election by Gov. Tony Evers was turned back in court after the Republican-controlled Legislature filed suit to force the election to be held as planned.

However, the court allowed absentee ballots to continue to be received until 4 p.m. Monday.

Former Vice President Joe Biden easily won the state's Democratic nomination for president against Bernie Sanders, who has dropped out of the race.

In a hotly-contested state Supreme Court race, Jill Karofsky defeated incumbent Daniel Kelly, a Scott Walker appointee, though Kelly carried Shawano County, 5,564-3,880.

Results will be certified by the Board of Canvass on Wednesday.

• In a contested County Board race, District 23, incumbent Supervisor Ray Faehling was ousted by challenger Aaron Damrau by a vote of 302 to 130. The district includes the town of Fairbanks, village of Tigerton and Ward 2 of the town of Germania.

Results of municipal and school board races around the county included the following:

• In the village of Eland, three candidates — Chet Matz, Harvey Johnson and Faye Slaney — were vying for two trustee seats. There was also a registered write-in candidate, Kyle Resch. Matz and Johnson were the two

top vote-getters, with 54 votes and 49 votes, respectively. Resch garnered 48 votes and Slaney 34.

• In the village of Mattoon, five candidates were seeking three trustee seats. The candidates were Brian Owen, Jeff Steig, Corey Zarda, Lee Parmer and Chaz Reuter. Steig, with 63 votes, Parmer, 52, and Owen, 51, were elected to the village board. Zarda finished with 36 votes and Reuter 26.

• In the village of Tigerton, there were four candidates for three trustee seats. James Gauthier, with 163 votes, Shawn Much, with 148 and Jeff Kopeke, 136, were elected to the board. Cary Robbins logged 96 votes.

• In the Bowler School District, Betsy Rosenow won out over Anna Smith, representing the town of Morris, 332-316; Joe Miller defeated Chenoa Martin to represent the Stockbridge-Munsee Community, 285-183.

• In the Tigerton School District, Rachael Hoffman defeated Brian Gleason for the school board seat representing the towns of Fairbanks and Wyoming, 369-154.

Two-headed goat is a celebrity

Nueskes offer special care for rare kid

WITTENBERG — A new arrival at Nueske Farms LLC is generating worldwide interest. Janus, a two-headed goat, was born April 5.

A perfectly normal kid was born first without any problems. It soon became apparent, though, that the second kid was going to need help being delivered.

"It took a little maneuvering, but we were able to welcome our two-headed celebrity into the world," said Carrie Nueske, wife of farm co-owner Dan Nueske.

According to Nueske, they have been getting calls from journalists from near and far, including Germany and England. They were also contacted by "Inside Edition," she said.

"Dan's uncle saw us on his local news in Topeka, Kansas," said Nueske. "We are amazed at the at-

tention he is getting."

She acknowledged that there are lots of people following Janus on their Facebook page from all over the world now.

They decided to name the goat Janus after the Roman mythological god that is usually represented with two faces — one to look to the future and one to look to the past.

Nueske noted that their goats typically have one to three kids. They have had four on occasion and have even had quintuplets in the past two years, but they've never before had a two-headed goat. The life expectancy for Janus is unknown. The kid is having difficulty learning to walk, but Nueske and her daughter, Jocelyn Nueske, who does most of the herd management, have been caring for Janus.

"He's not really getting the hang of it yet, but we keep working on it because we know that this is going to be a necessary skill for him to do well in the future if he survives," said Nueske. "We are also are working on giving him time everyday to hold his head up and strengthen his neck muscles."

Nueske guesses that the life expect-

tancy will depend a lot on how things are working internally and also how much each head can function on its own and be able to coordinate with the other.

"We understand that there is a good chance that he may not have a long life, but we will care for him as long as he will live," said Nueske.

At this point, both heads can eat, and the animal's digestive system is working properly. He is not yet able to stand on his own, but each day he is able to hold up his head a little better.

Brothers Dan and Billy Nueske own and operate Nueske Farms LLC at W17878 E Grand Ave., Wittenberg, which has just over 300 goats and 70 kids. One part of the farm is the goat dairy. They sell the milk to Saputo, a Canadian-based dairy company with operations in Wisconsin.

The Nueskes raise goats to be added into the herd for milking. The company also grows crops for animal feed and bedding, as well soybeans and corn as cash crops, Nueske added.

The fate of Wittenberg-Birnamwood summer school will be decided in May

I hope this newsletter is finding you all well as we continue to do our best in addressing the safety and health of one another, our families and our community. During this unprecedented time, I want to take this opportunity to provide some updates to our students, families and residents that many may be wondering about.

First, we will make an official decision in early May as to whether summer school 2020 will be offered. At this time, with all of our ongoing construction and the fact that we are still uncertain as to how the Safer at Home Order will play out, it is too early to confirm whether we will be offering a summer school program. For all interested, we will make a definitive decision on this in early May.

Regarding construction, because trade contractors are allowed to continue with project work as of now, we are continuing to get much done in the schools while students are learning at home. A question I often get asked is, "Since there are no students in the buildings, will you be completing the referendum project sooner than expected?" Although we are getting much more done in the buildings at this time, many of the contractors have scheduled a timeline of work between now and the fall. Which means if they were scheduling WB schools in July or August, we may not be able to move them up into an earlier slot. Additionally, other factors can impact the schedule, too, such as material availability, the health of the crews and rules they need to follow regarding building access. But, we will continue to forge ahead as much as possible to ensure our buildings are ready by September 2020.

Finally, in my last newsletter I addressed the graduating class of

2020. I have been receiving some questions regarding the graduation ceremony and other events that our students are missing as a result of this mandated school closure. We have every intention of

providing our seniors with a graduation ceremony. Ideally, we would like to have a traditional ceremony that may require us to move the event into late summer. But if we are able to, we would still like to provide this to our graduating seniors. Also, if possible, we would still like to honor our award winners with an awards assembly, potentially a senior class trip opportunity, and are even having discussions surrounding the idea of junior prom. Of course, much of this will depend on whether we are permitted to assemble by law before the next school year starts and logistical challenges that we'll need to work around. But all of that aside, we feel very strongly that our students deserve these opportunities and will do what we can to provide them.

In closing, as soon as we are able to make more definitive decisions regarding much of this, we will plan to share that with everyone at that time. I want to thank you for your continued support and confidence in the work we are continuing to do with your children and welcome any feedback you have for the school district regarding measures we can take to make this experience a positive one for all students.

Brief Facility Description (please include annual avg discharge flow (unless not applicable, such as CAFOs) and for POTWs also include the design flow): is a proposed Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO). Olson Dairy Farms, Inc. is owned and operated by Kurt Olson Jr. It currently has 958 animal units and is proposing to expand to 1,373 animal units by the end of 2020. Based on current herd size, Olson Dairy Farms has approximately 360 days of liquid waste storage and generates 7,507,517 gallons of manure and process wastewater annually. The expansion project includes construction of animal housing, runoff control systems, and feed storage structures. Construction schedules have been included in the operation's proposed permit. After the proposed expansion, approximately 11,520,739 gallons of manure and process wastewater will be generated. The storage structure built in the fall of 2019 will provide 211 days of liquid waste storage. Approximately 2,363,388 gallons of feed leachate & runoff will be collected and managed through a separate storage system. Olson Dairy Farms, Inc. has a total of 1,451 acres available for land application of manure and process wastewater. Of this acreage, 586 acres are owned, and 865 acres are controlled through contracts, rental agreements or leases, or under manure agreements. Of this acreage, 1,438 are considered spreadable acres.

The Department has tentatively decided that the above specified WPDES permit should be issued. This WPDES permit action is an integrated analysis action under s. NR 150.20(2), Wis. Adm. Code, and does not require a separate action under NR 150, Wis. Adm. Code.

Anyone providing comments in response to this public notice will receive a notification of the Department's final decision when the permit is issued. Where designated as a reviewable surface water discharge permit, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is allowed up to 90 days to submit comments or objections regarding this permit determination. If no comments are received on the proposed permit from anyone, including U.S. EPA, the permit will be issued as proposed.

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An old building gets new window frames

WITTENBERG — “Maintenance is tricky on buildings over 100 years old,” said Walls of Wittenberg President Elaine Knab. “But we’re happy to do our part to keep the WOWSPACE safe and beautiful.”

New anodized aluminum frames were installed last week on the front windows of the WOWSPACE building at 114 Vinal St. By replacing the deteriorating wooden frames, the windows will be more secure and will be easier to maintain, according to Steve Vera, a WOW board member who serves on the organization’s building committee.

Omni Glass and Paint in Oshkosh did the work on replacing the frames, and installers from their Wausau branch were in charge of the installation. Vera and local contractor Dan

Wisotzke were on hand to help with the project.

“It’s always expensive to do this type of repair,” Knab said, “but we were able to reuse the windows, so that helped a lot.”

No one is certain when the building was built. The best guess, according to some court papers, suggests it was around 1884.

WOW is a nonprofit organization that raises money to pay for professional artists to paint murals on the outside walls of businesses and schools in Wittenberg. Their purpose is to promote tourism through art and education. Since it formed in 2005, WOW has sponsored 30 murals.

The WOWSPACE serves as an art gallery to four art shows a year and an event space for the yearly Dueling Pianos show, which generates money for the adjacent Art Park, and as a theater space for two productions a

year. Some of the money generated from the theater productions pays for the bands hired for the three free summer concerts in the Art Park. All WOW fundraisers contribute 25% of the money raised to help support the maintenance and costs of operating the WOWSPACE.

Knab noted that WOW canceled its Wine, Beer and Cheese Gala, the main fundraiser of the year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The window frame replacement had been scheduled to be completed before the gala, which was to be held April 24. The gala serves as the opening of the spring art show, which had to be cancelled as well. The next show, which was to feature art from the students in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District, has also been canceled. Knab noted that the

summer concerts in the Art Park may be canceled, depending on the status of the pandemic.
