

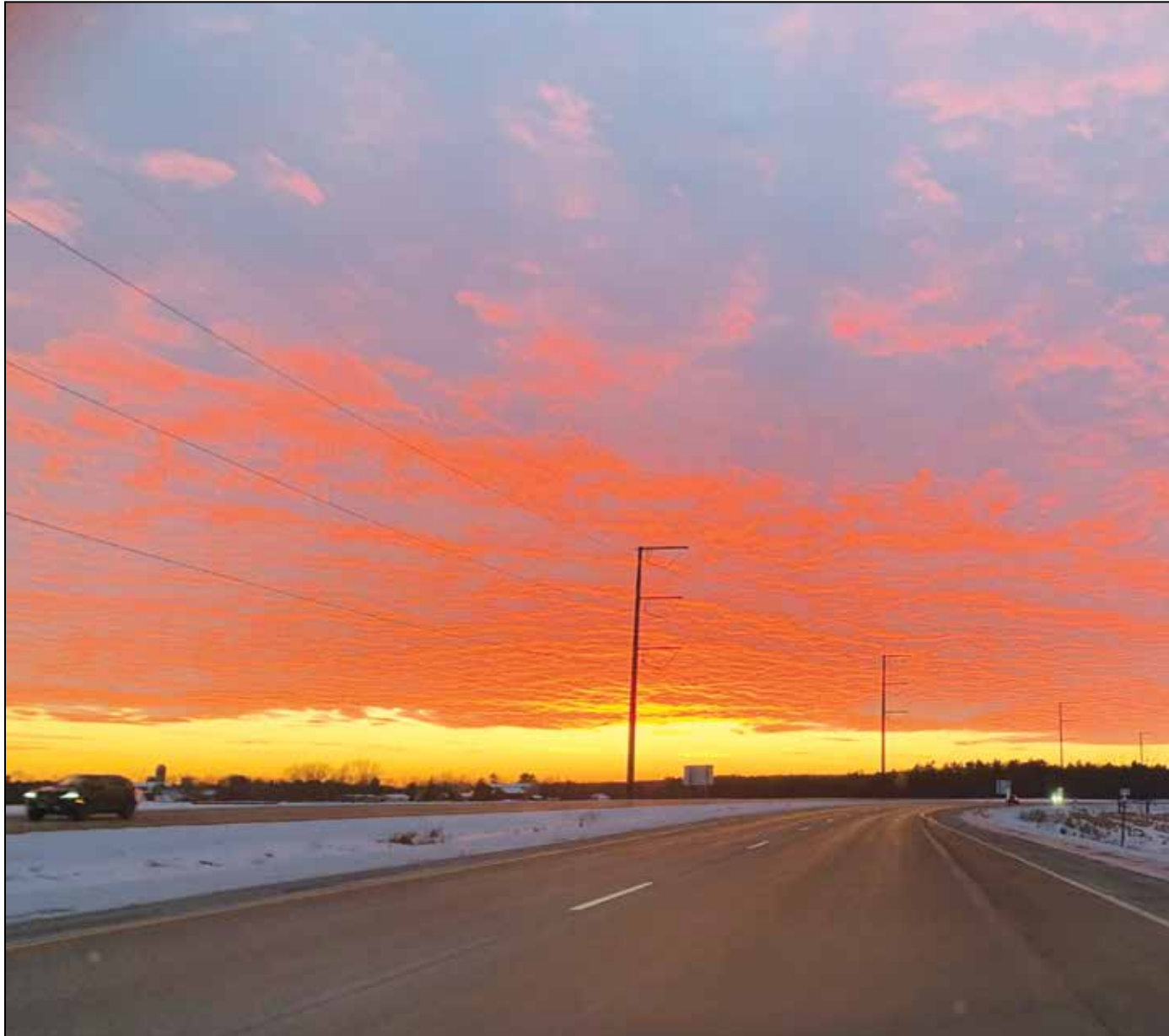

Retzlaff still MIA weeks after warrant issued

Law enforcement has made trips to her property without finding her

The owner of Annie's Campground, accused of felony charges stemming from a police chase in May 2021, is still not in custody, despite a bench warrant issued by Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr.

The body-only warrant was issued for Ann Retzlaff on Nov. 23 after she skipped court. It was the second time Kussel had issued a bench warrant for Retzlaff — the first time took place Oct. 26, with Retzlaff being arrested the next day and immediately posting bond.

However, this time, Retzlaff has eluded law enforcement. According to Shawano County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy George Lenzner, deputies have made multiple trips to Retzlaff's property to serve the warrant and take her into custody, but there has been no answer at the door. Because the warrant is body-only, law enforcement cannot enter any private property to look for her, but she is fair game if she is sighted in public.

"Around the holidays, we were informed that she was out of the area," Lenzner said. "The last time we were out there (at the campground), the gate was shut and locked. You can't even get in there."

Lenzner noted the sheriff's department has received reports that Retzlaff was somewhere in southern Wisconsin. Law enforcement has spoken with relatives, he added, in an attempt to locate her.

"Right now, she doesn't want to be found yet," Lenzner said. "All we can do is keep tracking and keep trying."

He added it's possible that Retzlaff might not be caught until the weather warms up and preparations begin for opening her campground, located west of Gresham, as it's possible she'd need to be available on the premises to run her business.

"Unfortunately, you can't go kicking down doors and stuff," Lenzner said.

"Sometimes, when they don't want to be found, it's a waiting game. You have to wait until you catch them en route or in transit somewhere."

To enter private property, according to

Lenzner, law enforcement has to either have the permission of the property owner or be able to prove to a judge that Retzlaff is in a location to get a different warrant allowing them to enter. Anyone allowing Retzlaff to stay on their property could be charged with harboring a fugitive, he noted.

"If we saw her (outside) and she ran in a house, we could run in after her," Retzlaff said. "It's not a search warrant where you could go inside a residence and search for someone. If you're locked up in your own property, we can't do much."

So far, the sheriff's department has had zero calls from the public indicating Retzlaff had been seen in public, but Lenzner is hopeful that members of the public will step up, as her face has been plastered on news media around Wisconsin.

Retzlaff is facing felony charges in Shawano County for fleeing and eluding officers and two counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, as well as a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer. She also faces misdemeanor charges through Menominee County for resisting and failing to stop.

On May 15, a Shawano County deputy heard on Menominee County radio traffic about a high-speed chase involving a vehicle registered to Retzlaff for failing to stop at a traffic light, according to the criminal complaint. The chase, starting in Keshena on state Highway 47-55, continued through the towns of Wescott and Richmond, where deputies twice laid out spike strips, and ended on state Highway 29 just west of County Road MMM.

Deputies with Shawano and Menominee counties initiated a "high-risk stop," according to the complaint, and shut down traffic on the highway's westbound lanes. A lieutenant advised Retzlaff to get out of the vehicle, but she allegedly said she was a "sovereign citizen" and would not exit. A deputy used a slim jim to open the passenger door, which is when Retzlaff allegedly tried to drive off, nearly hitting two Shawano County officials.

Eventually, the vehicle was stopped again, and deputies pulled Retzlaff out of her vehicle. According to the complaint, as she was being handcuffed and searched, she claimed the deputies were involved with covering up sex trafficking and said she was rescuing one of her employees from a sex trafficking house on "Crow Territory" in Menominee County.

Since then, Retzlaff has delayed court proceedings by first stating on two occasions that she had not found an attorney who was constitutionally sound, and Kussel agreed to give her additional time to do so, outside the usual 10-day period as Retzlaff claimed she was in the busy season for her business.

Then Retzlaff did not appear on Oct. 5, claiming she was ill, and Kussel granted a continuance but stipulated that she must appear in-person on Oct. 26. When she did not do so, Kussel declared her previous bonds forfeited and issued a bench warrant. Retzlaff paid the bonds for the new warrant but then missed court again on Nov. 23, claiming she felt she wasn't safe in the courtroom due to COVID-19.

Retzlaff has had other cases in Shawano County. In April, she had restraining orders against her for harassing Shawano County Supervisor Joe Miller and his wife, Jackie Miller. In November 2020, a guilty verdict due to a no contest plea was entered against Retzlaff for a case where she made a phone call and claimed she was a sheriff's deputy.

Sounds of ABBA coming to WBHS

Cast and crew have practiced for three months in preparation for the winter musical

The music of ABBA is coming to the Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School.

The WBHS theatre club is putting on "Mamma Mia" for their 2022 winter musical from Feb. 4-6. The show will take place at the high school at 7 p.m. Feb. 4 and 5 and 2 p.m. Feb. 6. WBHS senior Alison Olson said that Mamma Mia is inspired by pop songs written by ABBA in the 1970s and the '80s.

"The musical is centered around a young girl who is getting married and doesn't know who her father is," Olson said. "She writes out to her mother's previous boyfriends and asks them to come to the wedding in hopes that one of them can be identified as her father."

Olson said that auditions and practices began in November, right after the fall play. She said that through these three months of practice, the cast has done a good job to perform a great show.

"I think the community will have a great reaction to the musical," she said. "The choreography is great, and there is a lot more dancing and singing in this show than most musicals."

Olson said presenting a show like this to the community takes a lot of time, effort and especially commitment.

"Performing a show in front of an audience gives us the magical feeling of accomplishment that we could come together and make the best of memories," she said.

As the show times get closer, Olson said, the cast and crew is getting more and more excited to put this on.

"The cast typically feels a little overwhelmed at first," she said.

Art of the Quilter coming to Wittenberg

Entries cost \$10 and one person can enter up to two pieces

The WOWSPACE in Wittenberg is preparing to host another art show.

2022's Art of the Quilter will take place during three weekends, including the weekends of Jan. 22-23, Jan. 29-30 and Feb. 5-6. The show is free to enter and donations are encouraged.

Mary Koeppel, who is part of the group that is hosting the show, said holding a quilt show gives the community an opportunity to see quilting performed as an art.

"This is a non-juried and non-judged show," said Koeppel. "I think that keeping this show as non-

judged and non-juried brings more people in to show off their art."

With this being Koeppel's fourth time hosting this show, she said that they look for approximately 40 quilts to put on display.

"We have 24 quilts that are pre-registered right now," said Koeppel.

Last year, Koeppel said that 50 quilts were on display. She also added that last year was down in attendance due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

"We are expecting more people this year," said Koeppel.

She added that out of the 50 quilts that were on display last year, some came from all over the state.

"We had quilts from Green Bay, Wausau, Minocqua and even as far

as Milwaukee," said Koeppel.

Due to this show being non-judged, visitors to the show have the opportunity to place tickets next to the quilts that resonate the most with them. The quilt with the highest number of tickets is awarded the people's choice award. She added that there is also an award of excellence that goes to the most elaborate and extraordinary quilt.

"The people that come to see the quilts are usually people who aren't quilters," said Koeppel. "I think that some people are really surprised to see how elaborate some quilts can be."

Koeppel said that the quilts with the best stories usually are popular, including "rescue quilts."

"Rescue quilts are quilts that were started and were never really finished," said Koeppel. "It might be that a grandparent started a quilt and it was later picked up by a grandchild."

She added that this event is good one for community members and families to attend.

"This is strictly a quilt show," said Koeppel. "We have seen families come and really enjoy this show in the past."

If someone wants to enter the show, it is \$10 for an entry, and one person can submit up to two entries. The sponsors for this show are Walls of Wittenberg, Shops on Grande, Applewood Lane Alpacas and Pinery Patches.

An area man pleaded guilty Jan. 3 to arson in connection with a federal felony for helping set fire to a vehicle on the Menominee Indian Reservation that contained a drug overdose victim.

Emerson K. Reed, 35, was the first to plead guilty of the four people charged in federal court in connection with the August 2020 death of a Green Bay woman whose charred remains were found by a logger in a remote area of the reservation.

According to court documents, Reed, also of Green Bay, was called by Timothy M. Snider Jr. to help dispose of Stephanie Greenspon's body after she fatally overdosed on heroin she obtained from Snider. Reed asked Keith D. Wilber Jr., 27, to help him with a "cold one," which Wilber later said he understood meant an overdose victim.

Wilber, formerly of Shawano, also told investigators that he told Reed and Snider to drive the vehicle with Greenspon's body and meet him on S.E. Bass Lake Road on the reservation where they were to dispose of both. Reed told investigators that on the morning of Aug. 4, 2020, he and Snider drove separate vehicles from Green Bay to the reservation with Greenspon's body still in the passenger seat of one vehicle, and awaited Wilber's arrival. Wilber arrived with Kayla Childs.

Snider was wearing a GPS tracking device since he was recently released from custody in Brown County, so Reed drove Snider to a Shawano restaurant where he met his girlfriend. Snider's GPS tracking data indicated that he had been on S.E. Bass Lake Road and had returned to Green Bay on Aug. 4, 2020.

Surveillance video also showed the vehicles traveling the route that would have taken them from Green Bay to the reservation.

Snider had wanted Greenspon's body cut up and buried but Reed, Wilber and Childs drove to a remote spot and Reed and Wilber set fire to the vehicle still containing the body.

On Aug. 19, 2020, authorities found bone fragments, two spent 9 mm casings and a license plate at the site of the burned vehicle. They contacted the

vehicle's registered owner who said his girlfriend, Greenspon, had been driving his vehicle in early August 2020. He also gave the name of a person he believed Greenspon had

visited at that time.

Her cell phone records and Facebook messages indicated she traveled to Snider's residence on Aug. 3 after arranging to get heroin from him.

Greenspon had Facebook conversations with a number of people on the night of Aug. 2, 2020, and the early morning hours of Aug. 3, including asking Snider if he had "down" slang for heroin. Investigators determined that Greenspon had no other communication with anyone after Aug. 3, 2020.

Others interviewed said they were at Snider's residence the following day and that Greenspon had overdosed from heroin that Snider had given her and she was dead by the evening of Aug. 3, 2020.

In court on Jan. 3, neither Reed nor his attorney, Edward Hunt, disputed the account Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier had given the court. Maier told Judge William Griesbach that Reed did Snider's bidding in exchange for heroin and cash.

Reed faces 10 years to life in prison at his April 4 sentencing, but both Maier and Hunt agreed to ask that Griesbach impose the 10-year mandatory minimum sentence. Any restitution would be determined by Griesbach.

Reed has several felony and misdemeanor convictions and is currently serving a probation revocation sentence at the Oshkosh Correctional Institution, according to online court records.

Wilber died on July 11 and charges of concealment of a felony and arson were later dismissed.

Charges remain pending against Snider and Childs. Snider has pled not guilty to charges of distribution of a controlled substance, using a communication facility in furtherance of a narcotics offense, and conspiring to obstruct justice. Childs has pled not guilty to concealing a felony.

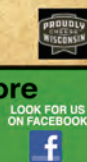

Local 4-H educator wins national award

Suehring honored with colleagues for setting up virtual summer camp program

Megan Suehring, Shawano County 4-H youth development educator, received the Excellence in Camping Award from the National Association of Extension 4-H Youth Development Professionals (NAE4-HYDP) during its annual conference Nov. 16 in Memphis, Tennessee.

Suehring and other 4-H educators were honored for their development of and leadership on the "Lumberjacks: Building Your Future" Camp in a Bag Program in summer 2020.

The purpose of the Excellence in Camping Award is to recognize outstanding effort in youth development through 4-H camping as related to practice, evaluation or research by members as individuals or as part of a team. In order to be eligible for the national award, the "Lumberjacks: Building Your Future" camp program took highest honors first at the Wisconsin Association of 4-H and Youth Development Professionals and then the Midwestern region.

the 2020 summer, due to COVID-19.

To adapt, Suehring and her colleagues worked to develop a hybrid summer camp program featuring written curriculum with project materials, static video instructions and virtual campfires with all needed program materials assembled in a bag. "Lumberjacks: Building Your Future" Camp in a Box served nearly 1,000 youth from 400 families across the state.

A hybridized camp model was created to serve youth with and without internet access. Curriculum at an elementary reading level was

a hallmark of many counties in northern Wisconsin, especially Shawano County. It was evident that a typical in-person camping experience would not be possible for youth during

provided with required materials. To support campers, instructional videos were shared; live "campfires" including guest speakers, interactive games and songs were hosted on Zoom; and a closed Facebook community was created allowing families to share camp experiences. This model enabled participants to form a community of learners.

The program included three camp days. Arts and crafts, astronomy, mindfulness, group and water-based recreation, wildlife ecology, physical education, camp cooking, music and career considerations were included. Families were encouraged to create their own camp space at home for the three days. Photos shared via the virtual community showed families camped in a variety of ways, from utilizing their living rooms to complete tenting setups in the backyard.

One educator contacted the Raptor Education Group, Inc. to ensure their programmatic efforts could be shared with youth statewide. Partnerships with private companies also enriched the educational experience,

from a local maple syrup producer and distributor donating maple syrup samples and invited an educator to record the business set-up, to PONSSE, a family based company who specializes in cut-to-length forest machines and their information systems donating professional booklets that encourage youth to learn about forestry practices and equipment.

Colleagues collaborated to secure funds from local and statewide sponsors to ensure camp kits would be affordable for any youth to participate. At the very most, the camp in a box kit was \$10 per base kit, due to financial support from sponsors such as the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation, the Lincoln County Safe and Stable Families Grant, Wood County Solar Project and several county and community 4-H clubs or committees.

Kits were distributed to youth enrolled at the Mohican Family Center and the Shawano Boys and Girls Club for free. More than 200 youth in Shawano County participated in this opportunity.

Dairy Margin Coverage brings \$47M to farmers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has begun issuing additional payments for dairy producers who enrolled in 2020 and 2021 coverage through the Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC).

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) updated the feed cost calculation by using 100% premium alfalfa hay rather than 50% premium hay in determining the monthly margin, which means an additional \$47 million for dairy producers in Wisconsin.

Payments will be retroactive to Jan. 1, 2020. Dairy operations with 2020 and 2021 contracts will be paid automatically for the applicable months.

"Updating feed cost calculations for DMC to include 100% premium hay will help producers to receive more payments," FSA State Executive Director Gene Schrieffer said. "This update builds on other efforts of the Biden-Harris administration to improve DMC and other key USDA dairy programs."

Most frequently asked gardening questions answered

Throughout the year in 2021, I received many questions from readers and listeners. Below are some of the most popular questions I re-

ceived, multiple times, throughout the year. The fact that I received most of these questions multiple times indicates to me that these are things that are very important to gardeners in our area, and topics that touch their hearts. Enjoy my popular questions of the past year.

How do I get rid of powdery mildew on my plants?

Powdery mildew is an annoying and potentially destructive fungus that appears, often, in late summer. Normally, powdery mildew occurs when there is excessive moisture.

Depending upon the plant variety, one of the easiest ways to prevent powdery mildew is to buy new hybrids that are mildew resistant. Plants such as bee balm, tall phlox, ninebarks and other plants that are especially susceptible to this fungus have all been bred and hybridized into varieties that are mildew resistant. You will find this information right on the plant tag.

Like many garden diseases and pests, prevention is the key. If you wait to treat the disease until after you find it, it is likely already too late. It will be hard to control once you already have it. The key, then, is to prevent the disease from happening in the first place.

There are a number of good, all-natural fungicides and mildew preventives on the market. Follow the label directions and treat your plants from the time they first begin to appear, regularly, every two weeks or so, throughout the growing season to keep powdery mildew in check.

Watering from beneath, rather than from above, is another great preventive measure. Wet leaves are more prone to mildew.

When should I put up my hummingbird feeders? When should I take down my hummingbird feeders?

Depending on the weather, hummingbird feeders should be put out by the middle of April, definitely by May. Strong spring storms with south winds may bring hummingbirds earlier, and they will be looking for supplemental food sources. Typi-

cally, most hummingbirds return the second week in May.

Because of lingering migrants that may still appear in October and November, even into December, hummingbird feeders should be left out as long as possible. It is a myth that feeders entice hummingbirds to stay longer. Hummingbirds are smart enough to know when it is time to leave. The reason many people leave out hummingbird feeders much longer is because there are several rare western species of hummingbirds that actually drift east late in fall and early winter. Many times, they show up at feeders in December, even in January.

What are the best plants to plant for Monarch butterflies?

The best plants to grow for Monarch butterflies include both nectar plants and host plants for caterpillars.

As most people are aware, milkweeds are the only plants that monarch butterflies will host upon as caterpillars. There are several great native milkweeds for our area including Common Milkweed, Orange Milkweed and Swamp Milkweed. Whorled Milkweed is great for sandy areas.

Nectar sources for monarchs include plants that bloom throughout the year. It is important to provide late season nectar sources for migrating monarchs into October. Wildflowers such as New England Aster, goldenrod, Joe pye weed, ironweed and other late bloomers are excellent choices. Purple coneflower, black-eyed Susan, meadow blazing star, bee balm, wild bergamot and coreopsis are also great for our area.

Excellent annuals for monarchs are lantana, zinnia, tall verbena and purple heliotrope.

I want to grow native wildflowers. What are the easiest ones to grow in our area?

The easiest native wildflowers to grow in our area are those that enjoy full sun and relatively dry conditions. Many of these can be grown in sand or clay, as native wildflowers are adapted to many areas once they are established.

Purple coneflower, Joe pye weed, ironweed, Orange milkweed, whorled milkweed, blazing stars of many varieties, black eyed Susan, brown eyed Susan, Rattlesnake Master, wild petunias, coreopsis, native grasses such as little bluestem,

prairie dropseed, big bluestem and Indian grass, and many others, grow well in full sun and dry conditions.

For moist areas, cardinal flower, blue lobelia, Joe pye weed, swamp milkweed, bottle gentian, turtlehead, blue flag iris and others are excellent and easy to grow.

Why won't my hydrangea bloom?

The most common problems for failure to bloom with hydrangeas are purchasing the wrong varieties for our area, as well as incorrect pruning. Incorrect location is another common problem.

Many gardeners tend to go for the big blooming, colorful varieties of hydrangeas in red, pink, blue and purple. Unfortunately, these hydrangeas, known as big leaf hydrangeas, require a little bit of extra care in our area in order to continue to bloom. If you purchase these varieties, expect to give them a little bit of tender loving care in order to keep them happy.

Generally, this means either completely protecting the plants in winter, or, placing in a container that can be stored inside an unheated garage, shed or basement for the winter.

This extra care is required because the big leaf hydrangeas bloom mostly on old wood, or wood that was formed the previous growing season. Because the blooms are already formed by autumn, they are easily frozen off in our cold winters. Therefore, it is necessary to protect the entire plant, even the leaf buds and new buds, not just the root ball.

Pruning is also unnecessary since the blossoms are already formed on the old branches. If you prune the plant back, you are cutting off next year's buds.

This information only applies to the big leaf hydrangeas, as mentioned above.

For most other hydrangea varieties, those that are panicle or smooth hydrangeas, little care is required. However, it is important that the plant is placed in correct light. Old-fashioned hydrangeas, such as Annabelle, tend to prefer more shade, however, most of the newer varieties should be placed in full sun in order to bloom.

Panicle and smooth hydrangeas can be pruned back each year since they bloom on new wood that is formed each season.

The best way to learn how to completely care for your hydrangea is to check the plant tag for instructions or Google the name of your hydrangea for care in our area.

How do I prevent diseases on my tomatoes?

Much like the powdery mildew situation above, the key to preventing tomato diseases is to start early and continue preventive measures throughout the growing season. This means purchasing a good tomato disease preventer and applying regularly, normally every 10 to 14 days, throughout the season.

Many tomato diseases are caused by inconsistent watering. Inconsistent watering means the tomatoes get too dry or too wet for a period of time. While this cannot always be controlled, due to weather, we must do our best to provide consistent moisture. Plants that sit in water for too long or that go dry for too long are hard to get to come back completely and often weaken, showing signs of disease quickly.

This is one reason why it's a good idea to grow tomatoes in containers, where moisture levels can be better controlled.

Another important aspect in controlling tomato diseases is to rotate your crops. Do not plant tomatoes in the same area of the garden each year. Even the tiniest pieces of diseased tomato plants left in the ground over winter, even the seeds,

can spread disease throughout the year as they infect the soil around them.

What are the best plants to repel mosquitoes from my backyard?

Try planting containers filled with lavender, bee balm, scented geranium, lemon grass, lemon verbena, lemon thyme, sweet alyssum, Helio-

trope and Swedish ivy. All of these plants are fragrant and tend to rebel mosquitoes from the area.

What are the best trees and shrubs to grow to attract birds?

In our area, berry producing shrubs are the best. This includes trees also. Mountain ash, crabapple, hackberry, Hawthorne, as well as conifers that produce seeds such as

pinus, spruces, tamaracks and junipers are all excellent.

For shrubs, ninebarks, highbush cranberry, viburnum varieties, serviceberry, witch hazel and others are great choices. Flowering shrubs such as ninebarks, lilac, spicebush and others are great for hummingbirds and insect eaters that are drawn to the blossoms.

Should I cut down my garden plants in fall or not?

My preference, especially for perennials and grasses, is to leave them standing throughout the winter season, for many reasons.

They provide shelter and food for birds and other wildlife, as well as safety and shelter for hibernating native insects and pollinators.

Annuals that provide seeds for birds, such as zinnias and sunflowers, cosmos and others should also be left standing as this is a great source of food for wintering birds.

Vegetable gardens are a different story. Because of the potential for diseases spread in the soil by even the tiniest pieces of plant debris, especially those in the nightshade family, vegetable gardens should be cleaned completely each season and all plant material removed from the soil. This gives the garden a fresh start every year in the spring.

Dodge opened the second half getting fouled on a 3-point attempt and making all three free throws. Bowler sophomore Marcus Malone scored a layup to add to Bowler's 5-0 run to start the half.

After a STAA basket, Bowler ripped off a 14-0 run, aided by eight points from Kietlinksi and six points from Brunner.

As the game came to an end, Brunner added seven more points, including one 3-pointer, and sophomore Tristan Thix got in on the scoring, making a layup.

Dodge said playing in the holiday tournament was fun as well as important to the team.

"It was good energy, and we got to see a lot of different competition," he said.

Adding on to the competition, Dodge said that being able to match up with teams that Bowler doesn't

"You don't get to see these teams much," said Dodge. "You get to see what other teams have from around the state; it will help us to prepare."

Dodge added holding STAA to 11 points in the second half and winning this game is a building block for Bowler.

Those points came off three baskets from Stevens, including an and-one, where she made the subsequent free throw. Welch added five points and Treptow added four.

The prior game, Bowler lost to Gresham 71-26 on Dec. 29. Stevens was the leading scorer in that game with eight points, and Welch added another six.

Even though Bowler lost both games in the tournament, Stevens said that she and her teammates enjoyed the experience.

"We had fun playing together against these teams," said Stevens.

Stevens noted that playing teams from outside the area had an effect on

Davis scores 37 in Badgers' win over No. 3 Purdue

Wisconsin gets 15 from Davison

Wisconsin guard Johnny Davis was hungry Monday night. After skipping breakfast in the morning and spending the afternoon trying to figure out how to beat No. 3 Purdue on the road for the first time in nearly eight years, the Badgers found plenty of ways to feed their sophomore star.

Davis scored a career-high 37 points, grabbed 14 rebounds and made most of the big shots to lead No. 23 Wisconsin past the third-ranked Boilermakers 74-69 on Jan. 3.

"I just went out and played my game," Davis said. "My teammates did a really good job getting me the ball in the right spots."

Davis repeatedly made the Boil-

ermakers pay, too, by going 13 of 24 from the field, 2 of 5 on 3-pointers and 9 of 12 at the free-throw line. He also led the Badgers (11-2, 2-1 Big Ten) with two blocks and two steals.

Davis is the first Division I player to lead his team in all five categories in a road win over a top-five foe since Tim Duncan did it for Wake Forest against Maryland on Feb. 1, 1997.

Davis had plenty of help from other Badgers, too: Brad Davison scored 15 points and made two crucial 3s in the final four minutes and coach Greg Gard took a page out of Purdue's playbook by playing a physical, harassing style and winning inside.

The result? Purdue (13-2, 1-2) lost for the first time since Dec. 9 and had a 13-game winning streak at Mackey Arena end. Zach Edey took advantage of his 7-foot-4 frame by scoring 24 points and grabbing 10 rebounds, while Jaden Ivey added 14 points. It just wasn't enough.

"We just have to grow up and

be tougher, that's it," Purdue coach Matt Painter said. "That was a great lesson for us. You hate to have a loss as a lesson but that's competition."

Gard gambled that his team, which had been short-handed because of COVID-19 protocols, could overcome foul trouble by simply playing a tougher brand of basketball.

It looked as if Purdue had finally taken control when Ivey, Davis' summer teammate with Team USA, scored on a layup with 11:11 left to give the Boilermakers a 49-42 lead.

Instead, Davis feasted on the Boilermakers defense. He scored three straight to give Wisconsin a 57-54 lead and when Purdue retook the lead at 58-57, Davis and Davison almost single-handedly led the Badgers on a decisive 14-5 run capped by Davis 3-pointer with 1 minute to go. That made it 71-63 and Purdue never fully recovered.

"I think it shows our team what we're capable of being. We came in

tonight, we weren't scared they were ranked third or we were playing at their arena," Davis said, explaining how the Badgers celebrated by spraying water in the locker room. "My jersey's soaked right now and it's cold. But they came out and fought tonight."

Big picture

This young Wisconsin team has grown up in a hurry and is playing traditional Badgers basketball. It takes care of the ball, makes free throws and stays in front of opponents on defense. If Wisconsin continues playing this way, they will be a tough matchup for anyone in the Big Ten.

Poll implications

Monday's performance, on the road, should turn any lingering doubters into believers. Expect the Badgers to make a big jump in next week's rankings if they win again later this week over Iowa.

Wisconsin holds off Arizona State in Las Vegas Bowl

Allen rushes for 159 yards

Braelon Allen thought his week in Las Vegas was rather uneventful.

After all, it's hard to really soak in Sin City when you're only 17 years old. He'll have to settle for his MVP award.

Allen ran for 159 yards and Wisconsin drained the final 9:57 off the clock with an 18-play drive that sealed a 20-13 victory over Arizona State in the Las Vegas Bowl on Dec. 30.

Allen, a true freshman from Fond du Lac, had 101 yards by halftime for his eighth 100-yard game of the season. He averaged 6.8 yards per carry this year, falling just short of joining NFL stars Melvin Gordon and Jonathan Taylor as the only Wisconsin

running backs to average 7 yards per attempt over a full season.

"Being able to have the season that I ended up having, I can't thank the guys enough for the support," said Allen, selected the game's MVP. "Keeping my head on straight and keep on encouraging me, just telling me my time was going to come. All the credit goes to the O-line and all the guys in the room."

Graham Mertz finished 11 of 15 for 137 yards and a 7-yard touchdown toss late in the first quarter to senior tight end Jake Ferguson, who caught three passes for 33 yards for Wisconsin (9-4).

"Really proud of this group," Badgers coach Paul Chryst said. "Took a lot of guys to get us that victory. It's really what this season's been. It's a special team."

The Badgers started 1-3 with Big Ten losses to ranked opponents Penn State and Michigan but answered with a seven-game winning streak to earn a 20th consecutive

bowl bid.

"It was all of us just coming together, trusting each other, being confident in our prep and taking that extra step to perfect what we were doing," Allen said.

Clinging to a seven-point lead, the Badgers took over at their own 3 with just under 10 minutes remaining and drove 90 yards to run out the clock in the first bowl game at Allegiant Stadium, home of the NFL's Las Vegas Raiders.

Arizona State quarterback Jayden Daniels accounted for 199 total yards and threw an interception for the Sun Devils (8-5), who are 3-6 in bowls since 2011.

The Sun Devils were held to 219 total yards, including 102 in the first half. Wisconsin entered with the nation's top defense, allowing 240.8 yards per game.

John Chenal had an early 8-yard touchdown run and Collin Larsh kicked a pair of second-quarter field goals to help Wisconsin build a 20-6

halftime lead.

Cristian Zendejas connected on a couple of first-half field goals and Daniyel Ngata scored on a short TD run in the third quarter for Arizona State.

Tough badgers defense

Arizona State allowed just 21 sacks this season, an average of 1.75 per game. Daniels was sacked a season-high four times and Wisconsin held the Sun Devils to 60 yards rushing on 33 carries.

Wisconsin came in with the top-ranked run defense in the country, permitting 65.2 yards per game.

Sophomore linebacker Nick Herbig had two sacks for Wisconsin and finished with a team-high nine this season.

"We knew it coming in, that it was going to be tough. We had a good plan," said Badgers linebacker Jack Sanborn. "Credit to (Daniels), he's a great player. When it mattered, we got it done."

3 dead from explosion near Navarino

Three people have died and one more was injured following an explosion in Lessor, outside of Navarino, on Dec. 31.

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department said its dispatch center received a call at 12:43 p.m. about an explosion in a garage on state Highway 47 by state Highway 156 in the Town of Lessor. Upon respond-

er arrival, four individuals were found; two were dead at the scene and two were transported to local medical centers, with one of them dying on Jan. 1.

The men who died at the scene were Timothy Cook Sr., 52, of Oshkosh, and Kenrick Larson, 49, of Neenah. James Moon, 60, of Keshena, died at the hospital the next

day. Brandi Sprang, 45, of Keshena, is still alive.

Initial investigation into the explosion revealed that a pressurized container had been punctured, which caused the explosion. The investigation is still ongoing.

Scientists, innovators poised to aid U.S. competitiveness

In recent years, Wisconsin’s two public research universities, UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee, have aggressively and strategically built a faculty roster with a wealth of expertise in some of the world’s most cutting-edge and crucial fields.

From biotechnology and genomics to artificial intelligence and quantum computing to advanced manufacturing and sustainability, this broad and deep range of Badger State expertise at UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee is working on significant issues facing our society. At our other UW locations throughout Wisconsin, knowledge in such areas as health care, engineering and logistics add significant value to the state’s research portfolio.

The concept has bipartisan support within the Wisconsin delegation.

The legislation would create research hubs across the country, each with a specific focus and each required to spark collaboration among universities, the private sector and government partners. While these research hubs are worth funding in their own right, they would also position the United States as a global leader in these highly com-

petitive areas, helping secure our country’s economic prosperity and serving as an antidote to aggressive work in similar areas underway in China and elsewhere.

Wisconsin is a perfect place for a research hub to thrive. With our universities and business partners serving as a foundation, Wisconsin has the capacity to co-invest in a way to spark innovation and raise the state’s attractiveness for creating these hubs. And I have no doubt that our private sector partners would be eager to join. In fact, many of them have told me so.

I appreciate the hard work of our congressional delegation on this important legislation over the last few years, and I will continue to partner with them as they near the finish line. The University of Wisconsin System is ready to seize the moment.

Romantic witch thriller bends genres

I'm not a big fan of romance novels. The whole damsel in distress goes against my feminist values, but once in a while I stumble into one. This time it was "Spells and Spirits," a four-book sampler of first novels in Amy Boyles' various paranormal series. I read the first book, "Scared Witchless," but felt the second was too similar.

Silver Springs doesn't look unusual, but it is home to a large population of witches. Sisters Dylan, Sera and Reid were raised by their witch grandmother. Three years ago, she slipped into an almost catatonic state. The sisters then hired Nan as her caregiver/bodyguard. She runs their home and keeps life as normal as a witch household can.

The story opens with sisters Dylan, Seraphina (Sera) and Reid celebrating the publication of an interview about Sera's "Sinless Confections" and Dylan's "Perfect Fit" clothing store. The article emphasizes that customers claim the businesses make them feel special. Sadly, they don't realize that they have opened a serious hornet's nest.

One morning, Dylan and her assistant, Carrie, are dealing with the very difficult Reagan Eckhart and her demands for changes to her wedding gown. The spoiled woman played a hurtful prank on Dylan in high school, and Dylan hasn't forgot-

ten, but Reagan is rich and a customer, so Dylan must deal with her.

After Reagan finally leaves, another woman arrives. She is Queen Witch Emmaline. She claims that the article has announced to the world that Dylan and Sera are witches whose power will peak on the fast-approaching summer solstice.

Roman, Dylan ignores her intense attraction to him. To their great surprise, they learn they have another grandmother nearby. Milly is another powerful witch but has kept her distance. When their grandmother suddenly wakes, the girls must contend with her extremely eccentric behavior and habit of producing everything from unicorns to elves.

All this witch-stuff has their lives in chaos. Somehow, they decide that Queen Em is the culprit. Their oddball trap catches her, and she's hauled off to witch jail. With a sigh of relief, the town turns its attention to the Summer Solstice banquet.

Almost as soon as she arrives, Dylan gets a call from Carrie. She forgot her dress at the store and needs Dylan to let her in to get it. "This allows us to more safely perform the stenting procedure and better ensure a successful outcome for these patients. Our team is proud to be among the first in Northeast Wisconsin to use this advancement in medicine to care

for our patients who are critically ill with heart disease."

When the support of the pump is no longer needed following the protected stent procedure, the interventional cardiologist will remove it before the patient leaves the hospital.

Pack thrilled with top seed, but not satisfied

The goal for the Green Bay Packers every season is to win the Super Bowl. The team took a big step toward that goal when it trampled the Minnesota Vikings on Jan. 2 at Lambeau Field, with the win securing the team the NFC's No. 1 seed.

Now, even with a week 18 matchup at the Detroit Lions still left in the regular season, the Packers know the first half of their playoff fate.

With the top seed, Green Bay receives the only bye week in the NFC postseason. That bye week will come

between Jan. 15-17, when six total Wild Card Round games are happening — three in each conference.

The top seed also guarantees the Packers will host a Divisional Round game the following week-

end. Lambeau Field will also serve as the host of the NFC Championship Game should the Packers win in the Divisional Round.

"We're happy to have it. We're happy to have earned it. We're happy for the chips to fall in our favor," said outside linebacker Preston Smith. "And we're just happy to go out there and keep on working hard and keep striving toward our goal."

"It definitely feels amazing. It's something we continuously (are) working toward, we're striving toward," said running back A.J. Dillon. "We know how important it is to have teams have to come through Lambeau. I say it all the time, we got the best fans in football, we also got the elements as you saw tonight, so combine

those two with all the talent and the team and staff we got (and) it's going to be tough sledding for anybody."

Securing home-field advantage didn't help the Packers during last year's postseason, nor has it helped teams around the league during the regular season this year, but the Packers believe it will aid in their quest to reach the Super Bowl. Green Bay was the only team in the league to post a perfect home record this season.

"The fact that there's fans in the stands is a big deal," said coach Matt LaFleur, referencing the fact there were limited fans in the stands a year ago. "That will definitely play in our favor as we move forward and I really appreciate the energy our fans bring, and we'll continue to express that importance to them and hopefully they'll take that to heart and cheer us as loud as they have all season long."

Quarterback Aaron Rodgers also thought this year's postseason would be different because there would be a full crowd on hand. The QB is also hoping for some more cold weather games, just like the team had against Minnesota, after not getting typical winter weather during the postseason run last year.

Already having the No. 1 seed locked up with a week still to go plays heavily in favor of the Packers.

The team could rest most of its starters against Detroit and not risk injury, although it sounds like the Packers will play their regulars for at least a portion of the game.

In their postgame press conferences, Rodgers and receiver Davante Adams each said they'd like to play next week, and if those two are giving it a go, it's a pretty safe bet that most of the other starters will as well, unless they are dealing with injuries already.

Don't expect the starters to play more than a half, if that, but that one half of football should be enough to keep the team fresh and on its roll when it takes the field again in the postseason.

The next piece to the puzzle is figuring out which opponents the Packers will face, but the Packers like their chances because they'll be sleeping in their own beds before gameday and with a raucous and supportive crowd behind them.

To play or not to play

With the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs wrapped up and a first-round playoff bye clinched, Green Bay Packers coach Matt LaFleur faces some interesting personnel questions for Sunday's regular-season finale at the Detroit Lions.

First and foremost, should LaFleur play his top performers in a meaningless game? LaFleur is leaning toward the "reward" side of that risk-reward dilemma. While Aaron Rodgers, Davante Adams and others might not play the entire game against Detroit, they will play in hopes of keeping them as sharp as possible.

"I'm not comfortable having essentially a three-week layoff for our guys," LaFleur said. "I know that you can look at it a million different ways and there's never a right answer unless it works out. If somebody goes in there and gets injured then, 'Well, why'd you play your guys?' But if you go out there in that first playoff game and you lay an egg, 'Well, why'd you rest your guys?'"

The other personnel focal point is the fate of the team's injured stars. Left tackle David Bakhtiari hasn't played all season and didn't practice the past two weeks, the second time his comeback from a torn ACL has been short-circuited. Outside linebacker Za'Darius Smith hasn't played since week one due to a back injury that required surgery. Cornerback Jaire Alexander hasn't played since week four due to a shoulder injury.

Those are three of the best players in the NFL. If they are unable to knock off some of the rust against Detroit, can LaFleur count on them in a do-or-die playoff game?

That's especially true for Bakhtiari. At this point, what's the better option at left tackle? The five-time All-Pro who hasn't played in more than a year or the former undrafted free agent who has started the past five weeks? Getting Bakhtiari some action against the Lions would provide some clarity because it's not as if Yosh Nijman has been a liability.

With four weeks of practice under his belt, Alexander seemed on track to make his debut this week. However, he was placed on the COVID list on Sunday. At best, he could return in time to practice on Friday. Will LaFleur put him on the field without a full week of work?

Smith hasn't even practiced since his surgery.

"In a perfect scenario, they would get reps in the regular season," LaFleur said when asked specifically about Bakhtiari and Alexander. "We'll see if that comes to fruition this weekend or not. You're talking about two premier players. I think they've shown enough over the course of their career that they can handle it. I know the moment will never be too big for them, and so we've got a lot of confidence, if they're available, they will play."

With veteran receiver Randall Cobb close to returning from core-muscle surgery, the Packers could get a big influx of talent for the playoffs. After the game on Sunday, the tone in Rodgers' voice suggested it was more than just wishful thinking.

"I really feel like there's a possibility to get a few of those guys back for this stretch run, and that's exciting," he said. "We'll see this week where those

guys are at. but it would be fun to get those guys back. Obviously, Randall is going to be back. You think about Z and Jaire and David, that could make things really interesting for us on both sides of the ball."

Adams' record pursuit

Against Minnesota, Adams broke his own franchise record for receptions in a season with 117. Against Detroit, Adams will try to break the franchise record for single-season receiving yards. In 2014, Jordy Nelson set that mark with 1,519 yards. Adams, who will be a free agent at the end of the season, enters this week with 1,498 yards, meaning he needs 22 yards against the Lions' injury-riddled secondary.

"That's why I want to play. Nah, that's not why, but I'd like to think playing a half or whatever it is, what-

ever we decide, I'll be able to take care of that," Adams said. "You never know when you'll be able to have that type of honor later. In 2018, I didn't play in the last game (because of a knee injury) and needed two catches for the record. I would've broke it then, broke it last year and then re-broke it this year. Who knows what will happen in the future, so you've got to take advantage of different opportunities when you're so close."

The big 4-0

LaFleur's first three seasons have been preposterously good.

- He'll pack a career record of 39-9 for the trip to Detroit. That's the most wins in NFL history by a coach in his first three seasons, beating George Seifert's 38 wins from 1989 through 1991.

- The Packers became the first team in NFL history with three consecutive seasons of 13 wins.

- With a victory over the Lions, LaFleur would have a 40th win. That would tie Chicago legend Mike Ditka, who went 40-8 with the Bears from 1985 through 1987, for most wins by any coach in a three-year span.

The Packers are 22-2 at Lambeau Field and 14-0 in December and January. Of course, those are regular-season marks. LaFleur knows those accomplishments will mean nothing without winning a championship, which is why he's continually downplayed his success.

"I think it's a great credit to everybody in this organization, from the top down," LaFleur said. "There's not going to be a whole lot of reflection. There's time for that down the road. We're going to continue to attack this with the same mindset, and that is the mindset that we've got a great game to go play in Detroit. Like I just mentioned, a place that has been a tough place for us to go play."

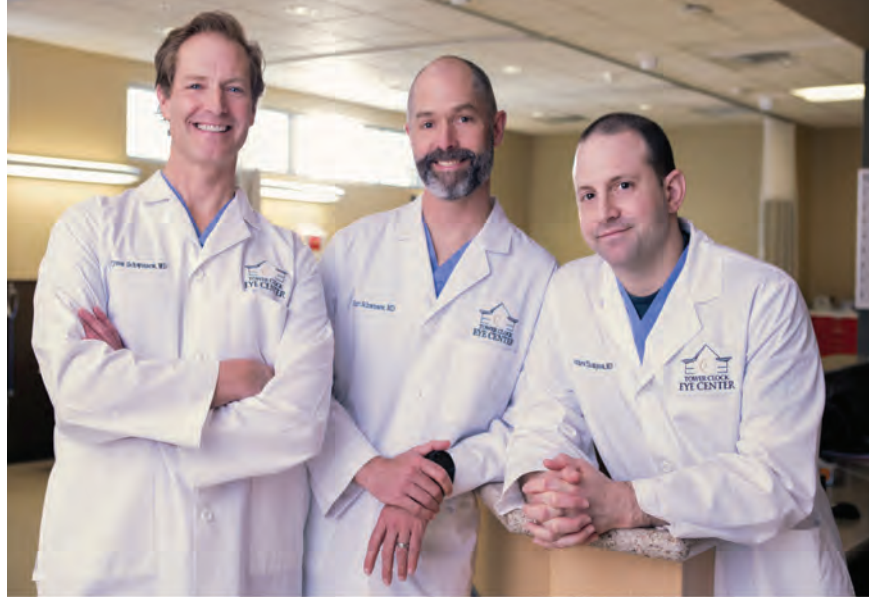

The Green Bay Packers (13-3) will travel to face the Detroit Lions (2-13-1) at noon Sunday at Ford Field in Detroit. FOX will televise the game.

History

The Packers leads the series 103-72-7. It's their most wins against any franchise, one more than they own vs. Chicago. They've also won both playoff matchups. Green Bay is 5-0 vs. Detroit under coach Matt LaFleur.

Coaches

Green Bay – Matt LaFleur, 39-9, third season.
Detroit — Dan Campbell, 2-13-1, first season.

When the Packers have the ball

With its 37-point outburst vs. Minnesota on Sunday night, the Packers have moved up to 10th in scoring with a season-best 26.3 points per game. Aaron Rodgers leads the NFL in passer rating and the Packers have a league-low 10 giveaways.

The Lions had been playing better on defense but gave up 51 points against Seattle on Sunday, the eighth-worst mark in franchise history. The Lions forced a three-and-out punt to start the game, then gave up six touchdowns and three field goals on the next nine possessions. They enter the final week of the season ranked 30th in scoring with 27.3 points allowed per game.

They are in the bottom third of the NFL in every category, including 30th in yards allowed per passing play (7.67), 28th on third down (44.2% conversions) and 30th in the red zone (66.7% touchdowns). It doesn't help that their standout outside linebackers (Trey Flowers and Romeo Okwara), best inside linebacker (Alex Anzalone) and best cornerback (Jeff Okudah) are on injured reserve.

Under defensive coordinator Aaron Glenn, the Lions operate out of a 3-4 base. Michael Brockers, Alim McNeil and Nick Williams form the starting line, with second-round rookie Levi Onwuzurike getting considerable playing time, too. Brockers has been the most active with 51 tackles.

Charles Harris and Austin Bryant are the outside linebackers. Harris is the most disruptive player on the defensive side of the ball with team highs of 7½ sacks and 10 forced fumbles. Bryant has 4½ sacks. Julian Okwara, Romeo's younger brother, has 3½ sacks off the bench.

Rookie Derrick Barnes and Jalen Reeves-Maybin are the inside linebackers. Both players have four tackles for losses, with Reeves-Maybin contributing two forced fumbles.

With 11 touchdowns and zero interceptions in his past three games against Detroit, Rodgers will attack a secondary that lined up against Seattle with Will Harris and rookie Ifeatu Melifonwu at cornerback, Tracy Walker and Dean Marlow at safety, and AJ Parker in the slot.

Harris is a safety by trade but switched positions after the Lions were hammered by injuries at corner that included Okudah, the third pick of the 2020 draft, and Amani Oruwariye, who has six of the Lions' nine interceptions. It's little wonder why the Lions are 29th in opponent passer rating (101.4).

When the Lions have the ball

The Lions are 28th in the league with 17 points per game. Situational football has killed them; they are 31st on third down and the red zone. The Packers, who shook out of a defensive slump vs. Minnesota, are ninth with 20.9 points allowed per game.

The big question to start the week is who will start quarterback. Will it be Jared Goff, who missed the Seattle game with a knee injury, or will it be former Packers backup Tim Boyle? Goff, who was acquired from the Rams in the blockbuster Matthew Stafford trade, is 18th in the league with a 90 passer rating. Boyle has lost all three starts. While he's completed 64.9% of his passes, he's thrown three touchdowns vs. six interceptions for a passer rating of 63.5. Goff is a dink-and-dunker while Boyle is much more willing to press the issue.

With stud tight end T.J. Hockenson on injured reserve, the Lions' best offensive player has been rookie receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown. The brother of Packers receiver Equanimeous St. Brown, he's caught 82 passes for 803 yards and four touchdowns. He's hauled in 43 passes and scored all four touchdowns the past five games, including eight passes for 111 yards and one touchdown last week.

Where the Lions are solid is the backfield with the one-two punch of D'Andre Swift and former Packers standout Jamaal Williams. Swift not only leads the team with 587 rushing yards and four touchdowns, but he's third on the team with 58 receptions. Last month, he had back-to-back games of 130 rushing yards vs. Pittsburgh and 136 rushing yards vs. Cleveland before missing four games with a shoul-

der injury. Williams has contributed 558 yards, two touchdowns and 25 receptions.

The offensive line is in flux with left tackle Taylor Decker and right tackle Penei Sewell landing on the COVID list on Monday. With the revised protocols, they could play on Sunday. Left guard Jonah Jackson, a third-round pick in 2020, is a Pro Bowl alternate. Those three players are the strength of the team. Offensive tackle Matt Nelson played 22 snaps at tight end vs. Seattle to help offset the loss of Hockenson.

Special teams

The Lions are bad on offense and defense but they're good on special teams.

Riley Patterson, the team's fourth kicker of the season, is 10-of-11 on field goals including a perfect 10-for-10 inside of the 50 yards. Jack Fox is one of the top punters in the NFL. He ranks second in average (49.2) and fifth in net average (42.5).

Kalif Raymond, who is fourth on the team with 44 receptions, is averaging 11.2 yards per punt return. Godwin Igwebuike boasts an average of 24.9 yards per kickoff return. He had a season-best 47-yarder last week.

For Green Bay, Mason Crosby has made all 23 kicks over four games since the bye. Aside from his first field goal against Minnesota, in which Bojorquez dropped the ball but got it reset in time, none have been challenging. Still, the field-goal operation has to be feeling more confident heading into the playoffs. David Moore, who was signed to the practice squad last week, had a 23-yard punt return in his debut – the team's longest since 2018.

Packers top Vikings, clinch No. 1 seed

Rodgers, Adams, Dillon star and defense dominates

The Green Bay Packers locked up the No. 1 seed in the NFC after earning a lopsided 37-10 win over the Minnesota Vikings on Jan. 2 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

Quarterback Aaron Rodgers threw for 288 yards and two touchdowns, while receiver Davante Adams caught 11 passes for 136 yards and a touchdown. Running back A.J. Dillon tallied 63 rushing yards and two scores while sidekick Aaron Jones had 76 rushing yards on eight attempts to fill out a balanced attack.

Green Bay started slow against the undermanned Vikings, who played without quarterback Kirk Cousins.

The Packers' offense worked into the red zone on three of four drives to start the game, but only had a pair of Mason Crosby field goals to show for it.

Then, Rodgers connected with receiver Allen Lazard on a touchdown pass in the second quarter, and the Packers' offense was nearly unstoppable the rest of the game.

On the team's final possession of the first half, Rodgers found Adams for a touchdown. At halftime, Adams had 118 of Rodgers' 211 passing yards, while the Packers' defense surrendered just 70 yards, four first downs

and a last-second field goal.

The offense scored on its first three possessions of the second half to run away with the game.

For the first score, Dillon powered in from four yards out to give the Packers a 27-3 lead.

After a third Crosby field goal, Minnesota scored its lone touchdown of the game. Green Bay answered with a touchdown drive, with Dillon lumbering in from seven yards out to cap it.

With the big lead, the Packers were able to pull their starters and coast to victory. Green Bay became the first team in NFL history to win 13 games in three straight seasons.

"I thought it was our most complete game in all three phases and that's what we need moving forward," said coach Matt LaFleur.

Green Bay outgained Minnesota 481-206 in the contest. The Packers held the Vikings' running game to 27 yards and forced three turnover on downs and six punts.

Linebacker De'Vondre Campbell led the defense with eight total tackles. Outside linebackers Rashan Gary and Preston Smith had a sack and two tackles for losses each.

During his monster game, Adams also broke the franchise record for most receptions in a season with 117, breaking his own mark of 115 from last year.

The win gave LaFleur 39 in his young head coaching career, the most ever for a coach in their first three seasons.
