Alleged drug homicide sits at 2; alternate school option, new principals round out top 5

The Hanke family, longtime Wittenberg residents and grocery store owners, decided it was time to hang it up and sell their Hanke's Sentry Foods this year. That decision was chosen to lead the list of the top 10 stories in NEW Media's Wittenberg Enterprise and Birnamwood News coverage area for 2022.

An alleged drug homicide at the

North Star Mohican Casino and Resort, by result of a heroin and amphetamine overdose, and a pending alternate school option in Mattoon help to round out the top three news stories in the area for 2022.

School districts in the area were a major news source this year, as seven out of the top 10 stories are in-part related to the Wittenberg-Birnamwood, Bowler and Tigerton school districts. Two of those stories involve five principal hirings across Witt-Birn and Bowler, including Stuart Russ hired at Witt-Birn High School, Cole Irish hired at Birnamwood Elementary/Middle School, Nick Firari hired at Wittenberg Elementary/Middle School, Brandi Dove hired at Bowler Elementary and Trina Borneman hired

at Bowler Middle/High School.

1. Hanke family sells grocery store

Hanke's Sentry Foods has been owned and operated by Roger and Bernice Hanke, followed by their children, since 1951, when the grocery store was a Red Owl corner store. In 1989, the store became Hanke's SuperValu, after SuperValu purchased the Red Owl name. Under the ownership of the Hanke's children — Dale Hanke, Sherry Hersant, Gary Hanke and wife Sandy — the store moved to the corner of East Grand Avenue and South Mission Street.

Sandy Hanke said that in the time that the family has owned and operated the store, they have not only provided the community with groceries,

but have also built relationships that will last a lifetime.

"I don't see me stopping working with community groups," she said. "I see us doing that, because it is what we do. I have made a lot of friends. I enjoy people, and I enjoy being a part of the community."

Hometown Grocers, a subsidiary of Festival Foods, bought the store; the new company's initial order of business when they took over was to understand and build relationships with the community, according to Vice President Steve Burkhardt.

"When we first go in, our goal is to keep as much the same as possible," said Burkhardt. "We want to get to know the people, get to know the schedule and keep the shelves stocked."

The Hanks' last day in charge of the store was April 26.

2. French charged with homicide

Bond was set at \$750,000 on Feb. 1 for Stephany French, 27, Green Bay, after she was charged first-degree reckless homicide after drugs she had allegedly delivered caused a death at the North Star Mohican Casino and Resort in the Town of Bartleme.

French was also charged with one count each of manufacturing or delivering less than three grams of heroin, manufacturing or delivering less than or equal to three grams of amphetamine, and theft from a person or corpse, as well as one misdemeanor count of failure to aid a victim or report a crime.

According to the criminal complaint, a housekeeper found a man's body in a room at the resort. French was allegedly seen on security cameras entering the room. She later was arrested in De Pere, and a final pre-trial conference is scheduled for Jan. 13.

3. Organization for choice school in Mattoon underway

Mattoon Christian Organization Shepherd's Watch unveiled plans in February to open a choice school in the village. Shepherd's Watch President Wade Reimer, who is helping to spearhead the project, said that income levels in families can determine who attends the school. He added that the school is not limited to low-income families, but families whose income levels exceed a certain amount will not receive free tuition from the State of Wisconsin.

"Parents can decide where some

of their tax money goes, which allows their kids to go to a voucher choice school," said Reimer. "It is designed to work for low-income areas."

He added that there has not been a school in Mattoon since 2016, something that the organization wants to change.

"If they decide to go to a choice school, they are going to Antigo. There is also one in Shawano," said Reimer. "Otherwise, you have to go towards Wausau, or further yet."

Reimer said that the plans are to open doors for the 2023-24 school year and the school will offer 4-year-old kindergarten through fourth grade, and could eventually go up to sixth grade, depending on the interest.

4. Wittenberg-Birnamwood hires three principals

After Bill Hass and Vicky Haas retired from their principal positions in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District and Randy Berndt moved positions, the school district hired Stuart Russ, Nick Firari and Cole Irish to lead Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School, Wittenberg Elementary/Middle School and Birnamwood Elementary/Middle School, respectively. All three principals were hired from outside of the school district, but each shared similar feelings about the new position.

"One of my big things is that I want to be a support — I want to provide services for our students, families and staff," said Firari. "I want to provide an educational experience for these students that is impactful and really makes a difference."

"I have heard really positive things about the district, school and community," said Russ. "This is an opportunity for me to grow as a leader and to work with the team that is here."

All three principals said that their first order of business in their new positions was to get acquainted with the community. Firari noted the strong support that he has received through his first couple of months on the job.

"It has been a steep learning curve, coming in new after being a teacher the last couple of years," said Irish. "It has been a lot to learn, but I am also really lucky, because we have teachers that have been here for while. Stuart (Russ) and Nick (Firari) and I are all kind of in the same spot — it has been fun getting to know how the school runs and getting to know everybody here."

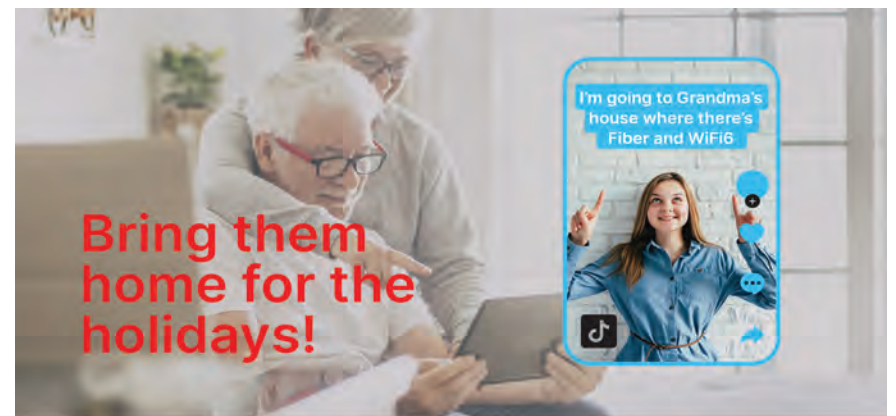
5. Bowler hires two new principals

With two open principal positions in the Bowler School District, Brandi Dove was hired to fill the elementary school position, while Trina Borneman was hired to fill the middle/high

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school role.

Both principals have plenty years of education experience, with Dove spending the last five years as a reading specialist in the Bowler School District. She was also a second grade teacher in the district. Dove, who was a student in the school district from fifth grade to ninth grade, said that she came back because she wanted to make an impact on an area that she knows so well.

"My entire goal of coming back to Bowler was that if I could make a change anywhere, this is where I want to be," said Dove. "As I have grown in my own educational leadership, I now not only impact students, I am impacting teachers. Now I have the opportunity to make the positive change that I originally wanted to make in the place that I grew up."

"In small, rural schools, you know all of the students and their families," said Borneman. "I also love that all of the students are in one building here in Bowler. You can really make an impact knowing everyone."

6. WBHS senior announced as National Merit semi-finalist

Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School senior Taylor Bergner qualified for to be a semi-finalist for the National Merit Scholarship Program. The National Merit Program is an academic competition for scholarships for students beyond high school. Bergner was one of 16,000 semi-finalists who qualified nationwide. Bergner attributed her qualification to her enjoyment and commitment of learning and developing lifelong skills through education.

For her plans after high school, Bergner has a couple of schools in mind that she would like to attend and wants to study engineering.

"I am applying to a couple on the East Coast, one or two in Wisconsin and then a few down south," said Bergner. "I want to go into either en-

vironmental engineering or aerospace engineering."

7. Tigerton operational referendum passes

In April, voters authorized the Tigerton School District to pass an operating referendum, increasing the revenue limit to \$450,000 in the 2022-23 school year, increasing by \$50,000 each of the next five years, up to the 2026-27 school year, when the district

would increase its revenue limit by \$650,000. Kelley Strike, who was the Tigerton superintendent at the time, noted that the student population of Tigerton has decreased from 327 students in 2009 to 253 in 2022.

Tigerton's interim business manager Louise Fischer said that the amount that a school can budget for is based on student enrollment. With declining enrollment numbers, a small school like Tigerton can be very hurt financially, she said.

The successful referendum will be used to pay debt within the operating budget, funding long-range plans for facilities, equipment, safety, technology, infrastructure, curriculum and instruction and fair and competitive staff compensation.

8. Nowak new leader for Tigerton schools

The Tigerton School District welcomed Douglas Nowak to head the school district as the new superintendent after Kelley Strike resigned from the position in August. Nowak, who has roots in Shawano County from being raised in Navarino to graduating in

Bonduel, said he was excited to come back to the area that he knows so well.

"This was an opportunity to come back home, if you will," Nowak said in a phone interview Aug. 15. "I have a familiarity with the Shawano County area. There are a lot of fond memories. My mother is still alive and living in the county, and it feels very homey. I have been here for two weeks now, and people are extremely inviting."

Nowak has spent the last 16 years of his career in education as an administrator, working in the Waupaca, Denmark and the Albany school districts.

9. Bowler breaks ground on new building

In Bowler Superintendent Glenda Butterfield-Boldig's first year in the district, she moved quickly, helping to spearhead a project to construct a new agriculture and technical education building next to the existing school. Ground was broken May 31.

"This had been a goal of our school board for a couple of years," said Butterfield-Boldig, noting that the building should be completed for the start of the 2023-24 school year. "They have really done a great job making some tough decisions as time has gone without going to referendum. We are very proud of that."

"This building is going to open a lot more opportunities for students," said Bowler freshman Derek Schreiber, who is looking at going into engineering after high school. Schreiber pointed out that he and his fellow students will have access to a car lift and high-tech computer numerical control, or CNC, machines. "It adds more avenues in the program here. It is a great time to be a Bowler student."

10. Wittenberg-Birnamwood FFA recognized as chapter of the year

In a busy year for the Wittenberg-Birnamwood FFA program, the apex of it came when the Shawano County Agriculture Ambassadors recognized Witt-Birn as chapter of the year for 2021 among the 10 FFA chapters in the county.

Ag teacher Matthew Christian attributed the recognition to his students' work, as well as the chapter's numerous hours of volunteering to make the community a better place.

"We have been striving to succeed in everything that we do," Christian said. "We do a giving tree over the winter months; we focus on the household goods. We give that back. We always donate 300 or so pounds of fresh produce to the food pantry here in town. We do a farmer's appreciation day where we deliver goods to farms all over the school district."

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Shawano schools strategic plan getting updates

Administrators tweaking goals after many of them were not achieved this year

Shawano School District could be revamping its strategic plan after a review of the latest goals showed many, especially those geared toward student success, were not achieved.

Only one of the six goals laid out under student success was achieved. That goal was to have a four-year graduation rate of 94% or higher as reported on the state report cards, and Shawano had a 94.3% graduation rate.

The other five goals were the following:

- Exceeding or significantly exceeding expectations on the state report card as a district. Olga Brenner Intermediate School exceeded expectations as an individual school, but the overall district score only met expectations.

- Meeting or exceeding the state average in literacy and math as measured by state assessments. Shawano's scores were below the state

average.

- Chronic absenteeism rate for the district of 89 or higher as reported on the report card. Shawano's absenteeism rate was 85.7.

- A score of 85 or higher for being on-track for high school graduation. Shawano's score was 81.4.

- Having 90% of all students meet their growth percentage as measured by the Star Assessment. Shawano was below 90%.

The strategic plan was initially developed two years ago through community groups, according to interim Superintendent Kurt Krizan, with it ending in 2038, when the children born in 2020 would be graduating from high school. That prompted district officials to develop goals for each year to determine whether the strategic plan was progressing. The goals were shared with the Shawano School Board early in 2022, Krizan said.

"We determined that either the goals were not met, or they were written in a way that was not achiev-

able or measurable in a year's time," Krizan said. "We have some baseline data, and we have some areas that we need to improve upon."

He told the board it might be better to set up goals and processes that can be achieved in a five-year period rather than setting goals, especially unattainable ones, on an annual basis.

"Some of the work that we've been doing as a leadership team is a draft of a strategic plan that will take us from 2022 to 2027 and looking at some of those goals as we go through," Krizan said. "We're talking about honoring the work of the previous strategic plan group but also tying in some of the history that we have as well, so that we have something that represents the district for the next five years."

He added that being a school district that overall exceeds state standards or better is a goal Shawano should continue to strive toward.

Board member Karen Smith applauded Krizan's efforts to revise the

plan, noting that it didn't originally come about with all the input from community members who participated.

"Talking with some of the community members who were in that group, they said they felt like their voice was not really represented when the final document came out," Smith said. "The first time I saw the current strategic plan was when it was presented in the board packet. It was a lot of words, and some of it wasn't measurable, like you said. So I applaud you and your team for coming back around and celebrating what had been done, but realizing we need to take some of the good and refine it so it's reasonable."

Board member Mart Grams agreed with Smith's assessment of the original strategic plan.

"The original strategic plan was just babble," Grams said. "It didn't say anything, like most strategic plans don't do."

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Tips to avoid heart attack while shoveling

As big winter storms leave a number of Midwesterners with several inches of snow to clear, many will find themselves removing pounds of snow this year. However, this annual task can put some at risk of a heart attack.

The National Safety Council recommends the following tips to shovel safely this winter.

- Do not shovel after eating or while smoking.
- Take it slow, and stretch out before beginning.
- Shovel only fresh, powdery snow. It's lighter.
- Push the snow rather than lift it.
- If lifting is required, use a small shovel or only partially fill the shovel.
- Lift with your legs and not your back.
- Do not work to the point of exhaustion.
- Know the signs of a heart attack. If symptoms occur, stop immediately and call 911.

Simple home safety solutions for aging-in-place

Dear Savvy Senior:

Falls and fires are the two things I worry most about for my elderly father, who lives alone. Do you have any suggestions on what we can do to help keep him safe and keep an eye on him from afar?

Concerned Daughter

Dear Concerned:

There are a number of small adjustments and modifications you can make to your dad's home to help protect him from falls and fires, both of which cause thousands of injuries and deaths each year. Here are some tips to get you started.

- **Eliminate tripping hazards:** Since falls are the leading cause of home injury among seniors, a good place to start is to pack away your dad's throw rugs, which are common tripping hazards, or use carpet tacks or double-sided tape to secure them. You may also need to adjust your dad's furniture so there are clear pathways to walk through, and position any electrical or phone cords along walls and out of the way.

For hardwood steps, consider attaching a nonslip tread to each one to

provide traction and help him see the edge. And for added protection in the bathroom, buy some nonskid rugs for the floors and use adhesive nonslip treads or a mat with rubber suction inside his tub or shower stall.

- **Improve his lighting:** Good lighting is essential for safe aging-in-place. Check the wattage ratings on your dad's lamps and light fixtures, and install the brightest bulbs allowed. Add supplementary lighting, if necessary.

You should also purchase some dusk to dawn nightlights for the bathroom and in the hallways that light up when the sun goes down. And mount some motion-sensor lights outside the front and back doors and in the driveway that automatically come on when he comes and goes after dark.

- **Get grab bars:** These can significantly reduce his risk of bathroom

falls. Install them where he enters the shower or tub and on a wall inside the stall, but don't use grab bars that attach with suction. Instead, have wall-mounted bars put in by someone who can affix them to the wall studs. It's also best to choose bars whose surfaces are slightly textured and easier to grip.

- **Ensure railings are stable:** Wherever he has steps — stairways, entryways or basements — he needs sturdy railings. Ideally, they should be on both sides of the steps.

- **Prevent cooking fires:** There are several affordable products you can purchase to help your dad prevent home cooking fires. For instance, BurnerAlert discs attach to a stove's knob and will continuously blink or beep after the stove has been in use for a preset amount of time. Ome smart knobs can control a stove's heating settings from an app. Or you can invest in a more expensive iGuardStove sensor that shuts the stove off when it doesn't detect motion for five minutes.

- **Install smoke alarms:** Install a smart smoke alarm in your dad's

house (buy one for each floor) that will alert him when smoke or carbon monoxide is detected. These smart devices will also send alerts to your phone to let you know when a problem is detected. Google Nest and First Alert have both smart smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

- **Add fire extinguishers:** Get portable, multipurpose fire extinguishers for each level of your dad's house and in the garage.

- **Consider a medical alert:** To ensure your dad's safety and provide you some peace of mind, consider getting him a medical alert device that comes with a wearable SOS button that would allow him to call for help if he were to fall or need assistance.

March continues for Menominee independence

Menominee Indian High School students brave cold weather to remember Restoration Day

Walking in the footsteps of those who came before took on a significant meaning Dec. 21 for more than 100 Menominee Indian High School students marching in honor of Restoration Day.

Restoration Day is a very important day for the Menominee people, as it marks the day that President Richard Nixon signed the bill that made the tribe a federally recognized sovereign entity once again after the U.S. government took those rights away in 1954, an attempt at cultural assimilation. It restored tribal supervision over members and property, as well as services granted to Native American tribes.

Dawn Wilber, a Menominee culture and language teacher at the high school, noted that before the tribe was recognized again, the Menominee people marched from the reservation to Madison to make their case.

"This is a representation of that," Wilber said of the 2022 march.

Besides the march, the students also got the opportunity to learn about key moments in the tribe's history that day, according to Wilber. One classroom had a presentation on both restoration and the Menominee Termination Act of 1954, along with the details of when the Menominee Warrior Society took over the Novitiate in 1975 and more.

"We also had some traditional games that the kids were playing," Wilber said. "We have a snow snake outside. We had a moccasin game in the library, and then we had the Indigenous Games from North America in the gym."

Wilber noted the march was originally supposed to be longer, but the subzero temperatures prompted staff to make the walk shorter to protect student health.

"We're already thinking, what can we do next year?" Wilber said.

Wilber said showing these lessons through demonstration and presentation is vital to help students maintain their identity as Menominee.

"Our children, our students need to learn about their identity and who they are, the importance of being Menominee and how special it is to be a Menominee and to give them their own history on this day," she said.

Benjamin Grignon, director for

Kaehkenawapahtaeq Charter School, said he sees the observance of Restoration Day as the Menominee tribe's Independence Day.

"This is about renewal, having our students understand what our people went through to reclaim our status as

Menominee people," Grignon said.

"All of the factions that happened in the past — the DRUMS (Determination of Rights and Unity for Menominee Stockholders), and MEI (Menominee Enterprises Inc.), the Menominee Warrior Society — it took our whole

nation together to bring this idea of being a tribe in the eyes of the government back."

Grignon said the march and celebration remembers what the Menominee people did in the past while also taking note of who they are now.

"Being the elements, being humbled by nature, I think that it's important for us to go through a little bit of a struggle in order to do the celebration," Grignon said.

Myklo Guzman, a sophomore at the school, was asked to carry the eagle staff during the march, which he described as "really cool."

"I care about it because it makes me remember what they went through, what they had to go through," Guzman said.

When asked about his feelings if the federal government ever tried to take away the Menominee's sovereign rights, Guzman was not willing to let such a thing happen.

"I would be mad, because we've already been here, so we shouldn't have to show that we are here," Guzman said. "We've been here already."

Bounceback grants create model for success

As we look ahead to the new year, we're also looking back on the completion of one of Wisconsin's most successful small business development initiatives — the Main Street Bounceback grants.

When Gov. Tony Evers created the program in spring 2021, the idea was to help communities build thriving downtowns by providing \$10,000 grants to businesses and nonprofits that moved into empty storefronts.

The governor initially provided \$50 million in federal recovery funds, or enough to assist 5,000 businesses. As demand for the grants surged, he increased funding to cover another 2,500 businesses, then 2,500 more — bringing total funding to \$100 million for 10,000 grants.

With the program set to end Dec. 31, the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp. staff and our regional partners are closing in on assisting nearly 7,800 businesses in all 72 counties.

Gaining so many new small businesses in less than two years is impressive enough, but what makes

these grants unique are the impacts they're having on communities and on the business owners — and the lessons we've learned making these investments.

From Washburn on Lake Superior in northern Wisconsin to Prairie du Chien along the Mississippi River in southwestern Wisconsin and all points in between, local leaders tell us these grants are bringing excitement to downtowns by filling in the gaps between stores, encouraging people to linger, shop, dine and spend in their own communities.

For the business owners, the grants have often provided that last little boost that allows them to realize their dreams. One of my favorite examples came last fall, when Gov. Evers and I were visiting some of the first Bounceback businesses to open in Fond du Lac.

Monica Lara spotted us walking along Main Street and burst out of her store, with her Bounceback check in hand, so she could personally thank the governor and take a picture with him. Just this month, I stopped back at her store, Argentum et Aurum, and found that not only was her custom jewelry business booming, but she's planning to expand.

We've heard many stories like Lara's, and we've seen what businesses like hers mean to a community.

One unexpected result of the Bounceback program has been that more than half of the grants have gone to women-owned businesses — and over a third of the grants have gone to businesses in rural communities. From these results, we've learned that when resources are available, underrepresented entrepreneurs in every part of our state are ready to jump in and succeed.

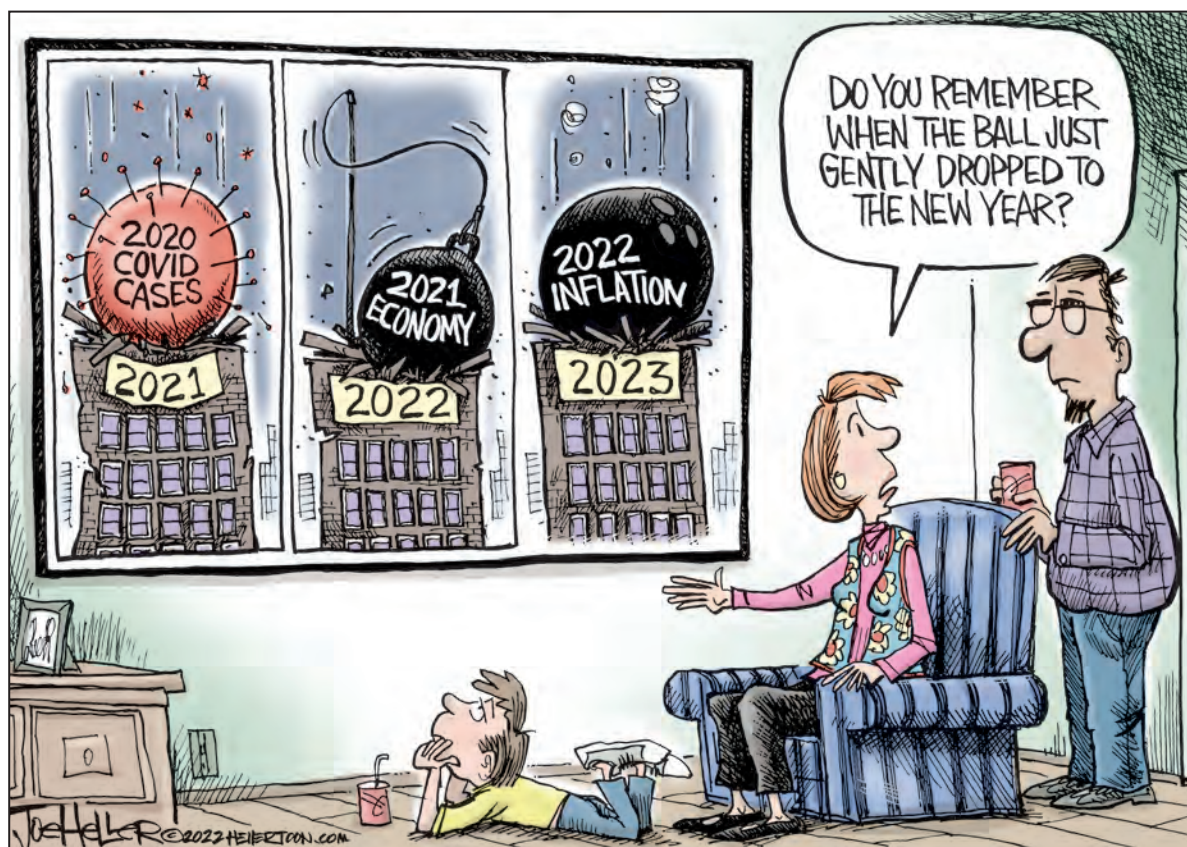
Another key lesson from the Bounceback grants is how important it is to invest in all our communities.

A recent survey found Wisconsin ranked first in the nation in the share of federal recovery funds allocated to business and second in the share dedicated to economic development. Many of these funds went directly to small businesses, often in relatively small amounts.

What we discovered from the success of the Bounceback grants is that you don't have to spend big to show big results. That's because, as one store owner told me, "Small businesses know how to stretch a dollar."

Our state will reap the benefits of the Main Street Bouncebacks for years to come as these businesses celebrate each new year, and our communities continue to flourish. At the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp., we'll keep the spirit of the Bounceback grants alive by continuing to invest in our small businesses, supporting our communities and making sure all Wisconsinites have the chance to fulfill their dreams.

Wausau native is first nuclear engineer crowned Miss America

Stanke is third Miss Wisconsin to earn the title

When people meet University of Wisconsin-Madison senior Grace Stanke, they're often surprised to learn she's a nuclear engineer.

She doesn't fit the stereotypical image in a field where men far outnumber women.

"The first question a lot of people ask is, 'Are you going to build bombs?'" Stanke said.

In her role as Miss Wisconsin, Stanke hopes to change views about nuclear technology through her social impact initiative, "Clean energy, cleaner future."

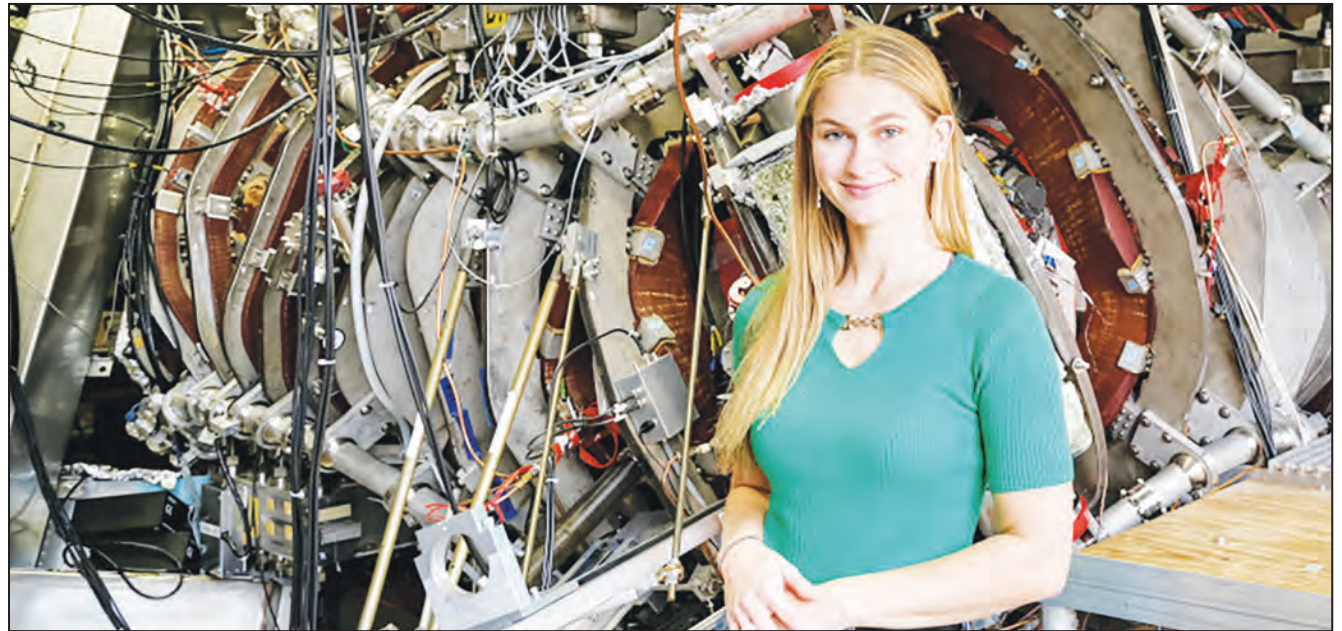
On Dec. 15, the final day of the Miss America competition, Stanke became the first nuclear engineer, and only the third Miss Wisconsin, to earn the Miss America title. She also won the competition's Preliminary Night 2 and took home the top talent award for her violin performance of Vivaldi's "Storm."

While her message advocating for clean energy solutions includes technologies like wind and solar, Stanke focuses mainly on promoting nuclear energy because it faces major hurdles in social and political acceptance.

"My main goal with this initiative is to help change the public perception of nuclear energy and increase awareness of the many benefits of nuclear technology," Stanke says. "So when I tell people that I'm a nuclear engineer, they'll instead think that I generate clean energy or help treat cancer — the highly valuable things that nuclear engineers do. We have the science and technology, but we need more acceptance socially and politically to really advance our use of nuclear energy."

She believes nuclear energy will play a crucial role in addressing climate change.

"Nuclear energy is safe and able to produce electricity no matter what the outside weather conditions are, unlike wind and solar," she said. "It's the kind

of reliable power source that we need to meet our country's energy needs as we transition to a clean energy future."

A native of Wausau, Stanke came to UW-Madison with a plan to study engineering. As she navigated the application process, the nuclear engineering major stood out.

"Honestly, nuclear engineering just sounded really cool, so I selected it and figured I could change my major if it wasn't a good fit for me," she said.

As a freshman, Stanke took the initiative to explore undergraduate research opportunities and ended up working on nuclear fusion research in the HSX stellarator facility. The HSX stellarator is one of three major magnetic fusion experiments at UW-Madison, which is world-renowned for its plasma and fusion research program.

That experience provided an engaging, hands-on introduction to fusion science and research — and confirmed to Stanke that nuclear engineering was what she wanted to pursue.

The experience fueled her passion for science outreach, and she worked on establishing relationships with high schools and revised the HSX website to communicate to a broader audience about fusion.

"Working at HSX was a really great opportunity," she said. "It allowed me to participate in cutting-edge research as a freshman and showed me how nu-

clear technology is evolving and being used right now. It opened my eyes to the capabilities of the nuclear industry and how it can benefit society."

Stanke had an internship lined up for the summer after her freshman year. But then COVID-19 hit, and the internship fell through. She scrambled to apply for other opportunities in the nuclear field and eventually landed a co-op with Constellation, a company that operates 11 nuclear power plants and is the nation's largest producer of carbon-free energy.

Beginning in fall 2020, Stanke spent three semesters with Constellation, where she worked with a team of about 20 on a variety of projects. Stanke contributed to projects ranging from low-power physics testing to creating models of the reflectors used in nuclear reactors to redirect and contain neutrons.

"I learned a lot during my co-op, and one of the things I really enjoyed was seeing my work put to use and have an impact," she said. "It also provided an opportunity to apply what I was learning in my courses to real-world challenges, which was exciting."

In addition to her co-op and engineering coursework, Stanke served as president of the UW-Madison chapter of the American Nuclear Society and has been an active member of the Wisconsin Waterski & Wakeboard

Team. She also plays violin, which was the talent she presented at the Miss America competition.

In June 2022, Stanke won the title of Miss Wisconsin. Being Miss Wisconsin is a full-time job, and she has a busy schedule filled with speaking engagements and public appearances around Wisconsin and beyond. For National STEM Day, she spoke to classrooms about nuclear energy. She also was the keynote speaker at the Women in Nuclear conference in Niagara Falls, New York, and she participated in a panel about nuclear energy at the Wisconsin Energy Cooperative Association's annual meeting.

"As Miss Wisconsin, I feel grateful for the opportunity to get out into many different communities and embrace Wisconsin culture while also promoting my message," she said. "I've been able to meet and connect with a lot of people and talk about clean energy, which has been a ton of fun."

As Stanke prepares for her role as Miss America, she says she's excited to bring her message to an even larger platform.

"In addition to helping change public perception of nuclear energy and technology, I hope to inspire youth, especially young girls, to explore STEM and to see that going into these fields, including nuclear engineering, is an option for them," she said.

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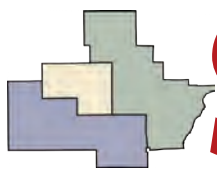

Tigerton boys ease past Gresham

Tigers start fast, cruise to conference win

The Tigerton High School boys basketball team rolled to a 72-9 victory over Gresham in a Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division clash on Dec. 19 in Gresham.

Tigerton scored the game's first 16 points and never looked back after that. The Tigers had nine different players score in the contest and used a balanced attack to run away with the game.

Early on in the game, Tigerton attacked the basket. Ryder Graham led that charge, scoring 10 of the first 16 points.

"A lot of movement," said Graham on what led to the strong offensive night for the team. "We've realized in the past few years, sitting around on the outside of the 3-point line doesn't do anything. So we kind of put it together — screens, run around the court, get open — you're not going to score if you sit still, pretty much."

Graham continued to power Tigerton, tallying 16 of the opening 31 points before sitting the final three-plus minutes of the half. At that point, Tigerton was ahead 31-3.

With Graham on the bench, Maverick Maas took over, knocking down five of his six first-half 3-pointers in the final 2:45 of the half.

After Maas hit the first couple triples, his teammates and the visiting crowd took notice. By the time Maas hit the final 3-pointer — right before the halftime buzzer — he sent the team and fans into a frenzy.

"When our big guys moved out, we had a lot of smaller guys in," said Maas. "That really set the tone for our 3-pointers..."

The sophomore added that he hadn't hit that many shots in a game this season and that it, "felt really, really good. It gave me a lot of confidence to keep letting it fly."

After deploying a full-court press that rattled a young and inexperienced Gresham team, Tigerton backed off in the second half, but

still continued to stifle the hosts.

The team's starters played the first seven-plus minutes of the half, at which point Tigerton led 60-7, before turning to its bench players for the remainder of the contest.

"Our defense pushed them to the point where they just started throwing up random passes, and they weren't sure what they were doing with it," said Graham, who finished with 22 points, 11 rebounds and three assists. "It opened up opportunities for fastbreak layups, it opened up opportunities for postups and simple 3-point shots."

Maas added that it was all effort that led to the defensive showing, highlighting boxing out, hustling and continuing to play hard all game.

Maas finished the contest with 18 points, while Logan Wanta

had eight points and six rebounds. Ethan Carlson grabbed five boards for the Tigers.

Colby Wanta set things up for the Tigerton offense and finished the night with nine assists and six steals.

Gresham had just two players score in the contest, Bryson Nelson and Blade Hoffman.

Nelson hit a couple field goals and also got to the free-throw line several times on his way to a seven-point showing. Hoffman had the Wildcats' third and final field goal in the game.

Hoffman, a senior, said that being a team that plays sophomores and freshmen, the full-court press put on by Tigerton isn't something those guys have faced many times yet.

The senior complimented Tigerton, saying it, "has one of the best

rotations I've seen on defense from the press to (half-court) defense. They do it seamlessly. Everyone knows where to go, so it works out perfect for them."

Being a leader on a young team that's struggled a bit to this point of the season, Hoffman is focused on keeping things positive.

"I really just try and teach them and mentor them as much as I possibly can," said Hoffman.

The high school wrestling career for Oconto Falls' Clayton Whiting was one most wrestlers only dream of.

Whiting finished 3-0 in his state matches at 182 pounds as a senior to win a fourth title on Feb. 26, becoming only one of 22 wrestlers ever to win four titles. All 15 of the points he gave up at state came on free escapes.

"It means a lot that my work is paying off," said Whiting after winning his fourth title. "All those years of blood, sweat and tears finally came to reality, and I ended up getting my fourth one tonight."

He capped his senior year with a 50-1 record. His high school record finished at 163-5, with only two losses after his freshman season. Whiting's first three titles came at 152, 170 and 182 pounds.

Only four of the 22 four-time champs have a title over 152, and Whiting is the only one to have a title over 160 pounds.

Whiting graduated high school as one of four Panthers to ever win multiple state titles and was the only four-time champ.

"I think my legacy is going to stay in there forever, and I think it means a lot to all the wrestlers that are incoming to my high school," said Whiting. "It's going to motivate them that any-

thing is possible, and they can become just like me someday."

Whiting now wrestles for the University of Missouri.

Witt-Birn volleyball team makes state for 1st time

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood volleyball program has enjoyed plenty of success over the past few seasons, but the Chargers made history this fall when they qualified for state for the

first time in school history.

Witt-Birn won the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division title with a 7-0 record. The Chargers then knocked off Coleman and Bonduel to win a regional title. Witt-Birn swept Weyauwega-Fremont before rallying past Edgar in an epic, five-set sectional final.

"It's crazy," said Lilly Betry, one of six seniors on the roster, after qualifying for state. "It's so nice that it's our

last year, too. This is the way we're going to go out. It's just amazing."

"Literally everything, it's crazy," said Kiara Deruchowski, another senior. "Our team has worked so hard for this, and to be a senior and go to state is absolutely amazing."

At state, Witt-Birn was topped 25-13, 25-18, 25-9 by Howards Grove, which went on to win the title for a fourth straight year. That didn't diminish the season in the slightest for the Chargers.

"I'm so proud of all my girls," said coach Becky Rew in a postgame press conference. "They fought the whole way through. They didn't let the nerves of state get to them. They fought and they pushed every point ... I just can't say enough about these girls and how they never give up on each other."

Pulaski boys soccer team returns to state

The same day Witt-Birn's volleyball team punched its first ticket to state, the Pulaski boys soccer team also qualified for state.

The Red Raiders opened the postseason by outscoring its first two opponents 21-1 to win a regional title. Things got tougher in sectional play, but top-seeded Pulaski prevailed, topping West De Pere 4-3 in penalty kicks and then downing Tomah 1-0 in the sectional final to make it to state for the second time in school history.

"It's very special; I honestly couldn't ask for anything better," said senior Ryan Drafz of making state. "We lost last year in the sectional finals, so it feels really nice to even the score and advance to state. We were able to win with confidence, passion and playing the full game. We never let up or gave up; we played our hearts out, and that's why we were able to win and advance to state."

At state, Pulaski put up a great fight against top-seeded Whitefish Bay, but lost 4-2. Corbin Tackmier and Chase Ambrosius scored for the Red Raiders at state.

Pulaski capped the season with an 18-5-2 record, and coach Jeff Schneider believed that season will be just the start of big things for the program.

"For these guys to finally punch through and get it, I think it's going to only help our program, because we do talk about getting to state and it's not a foreign concept," said Schneider. "Now that we've actually been here, we've played a game down here, I think the program in general — it's a bright future. I'm very proud of the team; this was a great opportunity and, I thought, a good showing."

Witt-Birn's Rogowski a star at state

Before helping the volleyball team to state, Witt-Birn's Reese Rogowski capped her junior year with a huge track and field season.

The season culminated at state, where she placed second in the 200- and 400-meter dashes, seventh in the 100 dash and 10th in the long jump.

"It means a lot because I knew I wanted to place higher this year in at least a few of my events, and that's what I did," said Rogowski of her performances at state.

Earlier in the season, Rogowski won CWC-Large titles in the 100, 200, 400 and long jump, doing so in dominant fashion.

Rogowski's big season continued at regionals, where she placed first in the 200 and 400 and was second in the long jump and 100. The junior then placed first in the 200, second in the 400 and third in the 100 and long jump to qualify for state in all four events.

Lena volleyball team goes on magical postseason ride

The Lena volleyball team also made some history during the fall, winning

its first regional title in 32 years.

The regional title wasn't expected, with the Wildcats coming in as a No. 4 seed and needing a furious rally and a couple upsets to advance.

Lena dropped the first two sets against No. 5 Gillett in a regional quarterfinal, but rallied to win 16-25, 17-25, 25-16, 25-16, 15-5 in five sets.

Against top-seeded Suring, Lena pulled off a 25-20, 16-25, 25-12, 23-25, 15-11 road win. The Wildcats won the regional title over No. 2 Gresham by rallying a couple times, 16-25, 25-16, 19-25, 25-20, 15-10.

Lena's magical postseason run came to a close after a loss to Wabeno/Laona in a sectional semifinal.

"We feel very proud that we came this far," said Lena's Makynna Herald. "It is sad that it has to end this way, but we came this far and it was super fun."

Pulaski's Schmidt caps career on state podium

Pulaski's Taya Schmidt was no stranger to the state scene, making the meet as a diver on three occasions. She saved her best for last.

Schmidt qualified for state as a senior after winning the sectional by

more than 35 points. She placed fifth at state with a score of 428.45.

"This year, I thought I did pretty good at state," said Schmidt. "Although a few dives did not go the way I was hoping, I did my best I could've in the moment, and I'm happy with the way I placed."

Earlier in the season, Schmidt was first in the Fox River Classic Conference to earn the Diver of the Year honor. She also broke the 6-dive school record score, with her mark of 269.15 topping the old mark of 251.6.

Bonduel softball team dominant in spring

The Bonduel softball team arguably had the best regular season showing from any area team in 2022.

The Bears were undefeated during the regular season and went on to win a regional title before eventually falling in the sectional semifinal game.

Bonduel flexed its muscles during CWC-East play, outscoring opponents 99-14 to win the title by three games.

Even more impressive was the fact that the Bears' roster wasn't all that experienced, with just two seniors on the roster.

Heartbreak finish caps positive year for Bonduel girls basketball squad

The Bonduel softball team continued where the Bonduel girls basketball team left off in the winter. The Bears tied Amherst for the CWC-East title and finished the season with a 23-5 record.

Bonduel got past playoff nemesis Crandon to open the postseason and then routed Shiocton to win a regional title.

The Bears then defeated St. Mary Catholic in a sectional semifinal matchup, a round that had dispatched the program from the playoffs several times over the past few years.

Bonduel then played in an instant classic against Westfield in the sectional final. The Bears fell behind early and trailed by 11 points with about 14 minutes to play.

Pulaski's Trenton Gibbons placed second, while Mason Wells was third and Ethan Eggert fifth. Witt-Birn's David Gauderman also placed third. Lena's Dylan Comins, Oconto Falls' Cole Bozile and Bonduel's Tyson Bogacz all came in sixth place.

Bonduel's Hailey Berg and Maddy Sokolski and Shawano's Piper Novitski all participated in the first-ever girls tournament. Berg and Sokolski each came in second, while Novitski was fifth.

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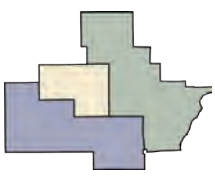

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Hinnefeld's college route has had some turns

After overcoming obstacles, social work graduate aims to help others do the same

Most graduates at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire plan to use their degrees to make the world a better place, and some have had a specific experience that has inspired a career path to make change.

For Finn Hinnefeld, that experience was witnessing widespread homelessness, and the journey of discovery began with a trip to Chicago as a second-year student.

"I was a music education major at the time and was beginning to sort of doubt that was the right path for me," the Shawano native said. "Being in Chicago and seeing for the first time what it looks like when so many people in one place are experiencing homelessness — it just really broke my heart and stayed with me."

Hinnefeld said that reflecting on that trip for a couple of weeks prompted a process of potentially changing majors. After mulling over a well-honed "pros and cons list," changing to a social work major won the inner argument.

After officially changing majors in spring 2019, Hinnefeld enrolled in a 200-level social work course that focused on global issues and human rights and injustice, topics that sparked deep interest in how systemic change can come about.

"The class was SW 290, Human Rights and Global Injustice, and it was my first real introduction to social justice and human rights," Hinnefeld said. "We discussed race and systemic racism in the prison system, for example. That's the class that really fired me up to be someone who seeks change."

Hinnefeld said that just as a true fire was lit by the field of social work, the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown was issued in March 2020, and things suddenly became unclear once again. In addition to struggling academically with online classes, Hinnefeld said that period also was fraught with processing self-realizations about gender identity.

"I came back to school in fall 2020, but issues around my queer identity were hard. My overall mental health was not great," said Hinnefeld, who uses the pronoun they. "Although I had a ton of amazing support from my social work cohort and faculty, as well as Student Health Service and Counseling Services, I hit midterms and

had a hard conversation with my mom about school."

Hinnefeld said that with their mother's support, the decision to withdraw from classes and take some time away from school was best.

"It was a scary decision, and I was disappointed in myself because none of my older siblings ever needed to take a break from school," they said. "My mom just said, 'It seems that this is what you need to do; it will all be fine,' which really helped me."

Spending the rest of the 2020-21 academic year at home, working a new job and focusing on their mental health while discovering and accepting their gender identity turned out to be a tremendous growth opportunity for Hinnefeld.

"I always knew I would be going back to school; that was never a question," Hinnefeld said. "But I took that year to really reflect, think about who I am and what I want. I did counseling — it was a healing year for sure."

Hinnefeld said that returning to school felt great, and what little trepidation there was about jumping back into their social work courses was quickly resolved by supportive faculty and advising staff.

Hinnefeld said they earned all A's that semester and have maintained all A's and B's ever since.

With academics going well, Hinnefeld decided to pursue an internship in social work to complete their pre-service experience in the field. They worked with the organization Western Dairyland, a community action nonprofit serving disadvantaged individuals in Buffalo, Eau Claire, Jackson and Trempealeau counties.

"At this organization, I had opportunities to dive into macro elements in social work, meaning systemic problems and policy change, including homelessness," Hinnefeld said. "I thought that since it was homelessness that got me interested in social work to begin with, it made sense for this internship to bring me full circle by working to make change in that area."

As part of the larger picture of housing in the region, Hinnefeld works directly with people experiencing homelessness in Eau Claire, a population that hovers around the 200 mark, according to recent data.

"One of the things I noticed right away in my internship was that there really isn't a forum for people experiencing homelessness to be heard, for

their voices to make it to meaningful discussions on the topic. One of my projects has been to create a homelessness roundtable, monthly discussions at the downtown Community Haven House, formerly known as the Warming Center," Hinnefeld said.

Hinnefeld said these roundtables offer people experiencing homelessness a place to voice specific concerns, ask questions about services and to simply "be seen and heard."

Hinnefeld's immediate plans after graduation are to find full-time employment.

"There happens to be an opening at Western Dairyland, so I am applying to that," Hinnefeld said. "I do want to get my master's, but first I'd like to work for a couple years."

Hinnefeld acknowledges that a career in social work can be daunting, the circumstances of which can take a personal toll on case workers.

"The work at Western Dairyland has been heavy; it can be a challenge to staying positive," Hinnefeld said. "I've learned things through this internship that will help long term in this field, like taking care of myself and setting good boundaries between work and life."

Rudbeckia named perennial plant of the year

The coming year is going to be a good year for an old-fashioned favorite. Black-eyed Susan, botanically known as Rudbeckia, has been named the perennial plant of the year by two of the gardening industry's most prestigious plant organizations.

Specifically, the garden hybrid known as American Gold Rush, has been named Perennial Plant of the Year by the Perennial Plant Association. Additionally, The National Garden Bureau has proclaimed 2023 as the Year of the Rudbeckia. Quite an honor for such a traditional, longtime favorite.

Black-eyed Susans are one of the easiest to grow garden plants. They are also exceptional for attracting a variety of butterfly species, as well as providing a food source for migrating and

compact size.

All of the Rudbeckia are excellent for beautiful, bright color in the garden; these long blooming perennials begin in late June and continue sometimes into November. This makes them an especially good source of late season pollen and nectar for bumblebees, honeybees, as

overwintering songbirds during fall and winter.

American Gold Rush is a desirable hybrid with splendid branching, rigid stems that don't break, a high bud and bloom count, and a relatively

well as migrating monarchs.

In the garden, black-eyed Susans grow best in full sun, but will tolerate and bloom nicely in a bit of shade. With their bright, cheery, golden yellow blooms and long-lasting season, they are among the favorites of many gardeners. Perfect for a cottage garden setting, a butterfly garden, pollinator garden, prairie or meadow garden, even in containers, there are varieties of black-eyed Susans for all areas of the yard and garden.

Many black-eyed Susan varieties reseed freely, making them an excellent choice for large spaces and wildflower gardens.

Black-eyed Susans may be perennial, meaning they continue to come back and grow larger year after year, or biennial, meaning they form a

rosette of leaves their first year, then bloom the next. There are also many varieties of annual black-eyed Susan that grow and bloom their first year then die back permanently.

In addition to the classic gold with brown center, there are a number of other beautiful color choices. Many varieties are colored in autumn shades of brown, rust and orange. There is also the interesting variety known as Cherry Brandy, which is best treated as an annual, and blooms in a beautiful reddish brandy color.

Enjoy celebrating the "Year of the Black-eyed Susan" this year in your garden, as well as all of the bees, butterflies and birds that will thank you.

Keep an eye out for winter finches

The lakes are frozen over, and the white snow has blanketed the green grass. 'Tis the season to scrape off windshields and don wool socks. We've said our goodbyes to the monarchs, meadowlarks and the ruby-throated hummingbirds. But don't get buried in your winter blues, because something unexpected may be flying your way.

There is a group of birds called "winter finches" that live year-round in the boreal forests of Canada. They include the pine siskin, purple finch, evening grosbeak, pine grosbeak, red crossbill, white-winged crossbill,

common redpoll and hoary redpoll. Although not a member of the finch family, red-breasted nuthatches are often included in this group because of their similar feeding and wandering habits.

Winter finches feed on seeds stored inside the cones of conifer trees including spruces, pines and firs. Each species of finch has its own favorite kind of seeds. When that corresponding type of tree has poor seed production over a wide geographical area, those birds move outside of their normal range to find food. When one to two species move, it is called an irruption. When six or more species move, it is called a superflight.

As part of the Finch Research Network, biologist and ecologist Tyler Hoar, along with the help of more than 50 volunteers across Canada, analyzes the condition of the boreal forests' conifer trees. With the findings, Hoar predicts whether there will be enough food to sustain the birds throughout the winter, or if the finches will have to move to find food elsewhere. The announcement of the forecast is as exciting in the birding world as the commodities forecast was at the end of the movie "Trading Places."

Last year, there was so much

traffic to the forecast website that it crashed. You can read his forecast from the Finch Research Network at <https://finchnetwork.org/winter-finch-forecast-2022>.

Hoar's forecast helps us predict what birds may be heading our way, but what can't be predicted is which direction the birds will go when they reach Lake Superior. Will they head east across the north side of the lake and turn into the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, or will they swing around Duluth and move into Wisconsin? Fortunately, we have resources to help us watch, learn and

listen as the flocks move.

Brothers Ryan and Derek Sallmann created Badgerland Birding, an online resource offering free articles and videos about birds. You can watch a video of them talking with Tyler Hoar and Matt Young about this year's winter finch forecast. The YouTube video is called, "Winter Finch Forecast (2022/2023) What Species Might You See This Winter?"

Another resource is the "Finches, Irruptions and Mast Crops" Facebook group. It is a public group run by the Finch Research Network. Members post sightings and discuss the movements of finches as they make their way to backyards and city parks.

An invaluable resource is eBird. It is a free app from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. When someone sees a bird, they report it on the app so others will know what bird they saw and where they saw it. You can search by location to see what birds are nearby. You can also search by bird to see if a specific bird is coming your way. This is a wonderful resource to track winter finches.

I bet you are wondering what the scoop is for this year. The red-breasted nuthatches were the earliest irruptive species arriving throughout Wisconsin in September. Since then, evening grosbeaks, purple finches and common redpolls have been spotted all across Wisconsin. A few groups of white-winged crossbills have been reported here and there. Pine grosbeaks and red crossbills have arrived in the northern part of the state, and one hoary redpoll was sighted near Washburn. They may not all make it to our backyards, but I am eager to see who just might.

If the bitter wind and frosty ground give you the winter wearies, take a look outside. Perhaps a winter finch, from the boreal forests of Canada, has stopped by to visit your feeder. Now that you know how far they've come, I hope you get as excited as I do when you see one of these special finches, and now that you understand why they've come, perhaps you will provide food and water in hopes of making their lives a little easier. They will surely make ours a little more beautiful.



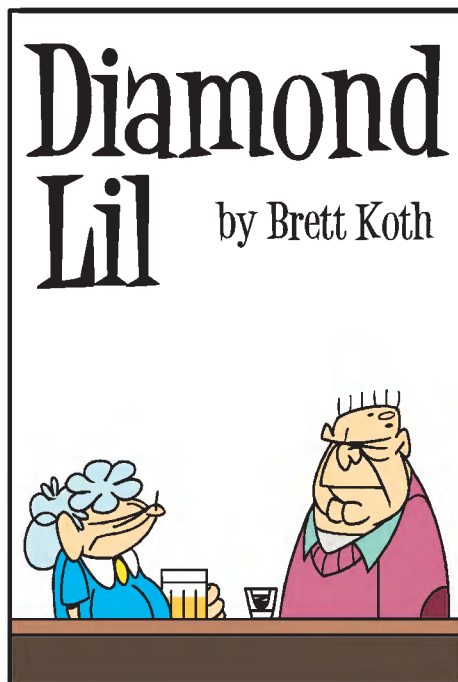
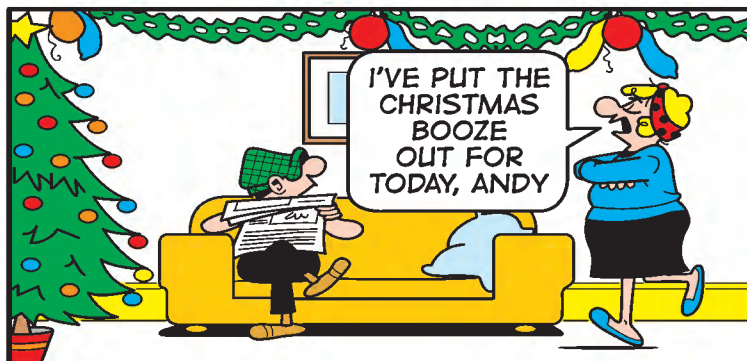
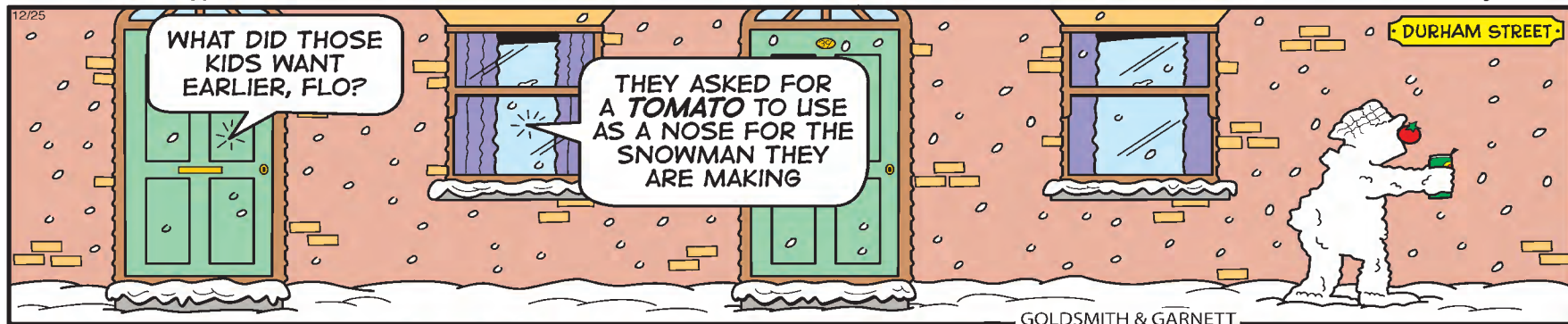

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Packers now up to 30% chance to make playoffs

Green Bay needs 2 more wins, plus a Washington loss to make postseason

A three-game winning streak has kept wind in the Green Bay Packers' sails, as the 2022-23 regular season reaches the home stretch.

That comes after five games went Green Bay's way in week 16, including its own win over the Miami Dolphins.

The Packers still being alive come week 17 may be a shocker for fans, as many wrote off the team during a stretch where Green Bay lost seven out of eight games in the middle of the season.

Those feelings have quickly flipped, as the Packers defense has really kept this season alive. During Green Bay's current three-game win streak, they have beaten the Chicago Bears, Los Angeles Rams and Miami Dolphins.

Beating the Bears and Rams seemed likely as both of those teams are eliminated from playoff contention, but a win over Miami means a little bit more.

Thanks in part to the defensive play on Christmas, the Packers got that win. In the second half of that game against the Dolphins, the Packers defense blanked Miami, forcing interceptions on each of the last three drives.

"This team is just so resilient," said Packers defensive tackle Kenny Clark.

Green Bay's defense was able to seal this victory by causing four turnovers. Even after giving up big plays in the first half, Clark's comment about resiliency is exactly what this Packers defense has shown.

That idea of resiliency will need to be carried through the last two games of the regular season.

Coming up, the Packers will host the Minnesota Vikings on Jan. 1, in a game that should be a slugfest. Green Bay needs to win to keep its playoff hopes alive, while the Vikings are looking to sneak into the top seed in the playoffs and get a first-round bye.

One would have to imagine, too, that the Vikings would love to crush the Packers' playoffs hopes in Green Bay.

With superstars like Justin Jefferson, Dalvin Cook and T.J. Hockenson, the Packers will need to ride

its defense once again to continue its march to the playoffs.

Playing a team like Minnesota or Miami, who both have a flurry of offensive weapons, is something that safety Adrian Amos is accustomed to, and noted that getting turnovers is the way to combat the talent.

"With takeaways, you keep giving offense opportunities and we lessen their opportunities to get down the field," said Amos.

It makes sense — turning over the opposing team limits their opportunities to score the ball. That should be the trick as well to take

down Minnesota, who averages 25.2 points per game this year.

That might be easier said than done though, as Minnesota has only recorded 17 giveaways all season, which is tied for seventh fewest in the NFL. On the other hand, the Packers have recorded 20 takeaways this year, which is tied for 12th in the NFL.

"I think it comes down to all 11 playing the call and doing the best that they can," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur on how the defense can continue to perform well through adjustments.

With the defense playing well and the offense complimenting the defense, the Packers have put together a three-game win streak. More than a three-game win streak though — the Packers have momentum.

After recording 13 wins in each of the last three seasons, the Packers have not needed regular season momentum in a number of years. Similar to the NCAA basketball tournament, a team that can get hot before the playoffs can do some damage once it is there. Think of the Cincinnati Bengals last season.

"We've been in a good rhythm, practice, energy, cohesion, and playing a little better complimentary football," said Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers. "It's a good win for us."

Building off that momentum, the Packers will need to win each of its final two regular season games. That's not it though. Moving forward, the Packers also need either the Washington Commanders to lose one of its last two games, or the New York Giants to lose both of its remaining games.

Washington ends its season with two home games, one against the Cleveland Browns in week 17 and one against the Dallas Cowboys in week 18. The Giants, on the other hand, have the Colts and Eagles on the schedule. It seems more likely for Washington to lose one game — especially since Dallas needs to win that week 18 matchup if it wants to take home the NFC East crown.

Green Bay's offense has made some slow but steady progress. Over its last five games, the Packers are ninth in scoring. They scored 26 points against Miami on Sunday, a rather underwhelming performance considering the incredible field position delivered by the defense and special teams.

Minnesota's defense is terrible. The Vikings are 28th in points allowed with 24.9 per game. They are good on third down (ninth) and decent in the red zone (15th) but 31st in total defense (402.3 yards per game) and yards allowed per passing attempt (7.5).

Can Aaron Rodgers and an inconsistent passing attack take advantage? The health of rookie receiver Christian Watson (hip) to catch those passes and right tackle Yosh Nijman (shoulder) to provide protection will be vital.

The Vikings operate out of a 3-4 scheme. The defensive line consists of Harrison Phillips, James Lynch and Dalvin Tomlinson. It's an underrated group. Tomlinson is the big name and Phillips was a key offseason addition.

The run defense provided by that trio is the key to everything. If they can stop the run, then outside linebackers Za'Darius Smith and Danielle Hunter can attack the quarterback.

Smith, whom the Packers released this past offseason, was picked for the Pro Bowl last week. He has 10 sacks and 24 quarterback hits and, according to Pro Football Focus, ranks third in the NFL with 78 pressures. He had one sack

against Green Bay in week one.

The Vikings are 7-1 when Smith gets at least a ½ sack. Hunter has 10½ sacks and 20 quarterback hits.

The prospect of Smith and Hunter going against Zach Tom (if David Bakhtiari isn't back from his appendectomy) and Royce Newman (in place of Nijman) has to be at the forefront of LaFleur's game-planning. Tom has played well, but Newman really struggled against the Dolphins.

Longtime standout Eric Kendricks and Jordan Hicks are the linebackers. Both players have more than 120 tackles. Hicks has three sacks and 10 passes defended; Kendricks has eight tackles for losses.

The secondary is where there are all sorts of problems. The Vikings shook up the group a bit recently with limited impact last week against the Giants. Patrick Peterson and Duke Shelley are the corners, former Packers player Chandon Sullivan mans the slot, and Harrison Smith and Camryn Bynum are the safeties.

The 32-year-old Peterson, an All-Pro during his days with the Cardinals, has allowed only a 59.4% catch rate, according to PFF. He has four interceptions and a team-high 14 passes defended.

Shelley was on the bench for most of the season before being thrust into a prime role the last five weeks. He's allowed only a 56.3% catch rate, a huge upgrade over the benched Cameron Dantzler's 79.2%.

Smith might not be the all-around menace of yesteryear but

leads the team with five interceptions and is third with 80 tackles. Bynum has two picks.

When the Vikings have the ball

Coming off a season-saving second half at Miami in which they intercepted three passes and pitched a shutout, the Packers will have to contend with one of the best offenses in the NFL.

Minnesota is seventh with 25.2 points per game. The Vikings are only 18th in yards per play, 25th in rushing per carry and 18th in passing per attempt. They're only 15th on third down and 19th in pass protection. That's a lot of mediocrity. But when Kirk Cousins and Justin Jefferson get rolling, look out.

The 34-year-old Cousins has thrown for 4,117 yards with 27 touchdowns. After three consecutive seasons with 100 passer ratings, he's at only 93.3 this year. But he is hot with 425 yards and two touchdowns in a loss to Detroit, 460 yards and four touchdowns in the historic comeback over Indianapolis and 299 yards and three touchdowns in last week's win vs. the Giants.

The Packers allowed more than 100 yards apiece to Tyreek Hill and Jaylen Waddle at Miami. This week, the challenge is the indomitable Jefferson, sidekicks Adam Thielen and KJ Osborn, and tight end T.J. Hockenson.

Jefferson leads the NFL with 123 receptions for 1,756 yards. In three seasons, he has 4,772 receiving yards. He is the total package, and as hot as they come with 35 recep-

tions for 379 yards and two scores the last three games. In week one against Green Bay, he caught nine passes for 184 yards and two touchdowns.

Maybe defensive coordinator Joe Barry will do more to put Jaire Alexander on Jefferson. But that doesn't take into account the veteran Thielen (67 receptions, 692 yards, five touchdowns) or the underrated Osborn, who caught 10 passes for 157 yards and a touchdown in the comeback vs. Indy.

Hockenson was acquired from the Lions at the trade deadline. Against the Giants on Saturday, he caught 13 passes for 109 yards and two scores.

And if that's not enough, Dalvin Cook is sixth in the NFL with 1,109 rushing yards. Cook had 226 total yards and four touchdowns as the Vikings won at Lambeau in 2020 but just 13 total yards on 12 touches as Green Bay rolled at Lambeau last year.

The offensive line consists of left tackle Christian Darrisaw, left guard Ezra Cleveland, center Austin Scholttman, right guard Ed Ingram and right tackle Brian O'Neill. Darrisaw and O'Neill are high-quality bookends.

Ingram has struggled as a rookie. Scholttman has started the last three games for Garrett Bradbury (back). Kenny Clark needs a big game against Minnesota's interior trio.

Special teams

In Football Outsiders' rankings from before week 16, Green Bay was 27th and Minnesota was 30th.

The game could feature two of the NFL's premier kickoff returners. Minnesota's Kene Nwangwu is averaging 26 yards per runback this season and has three touchdowns in two seasons. Green Bay's Keisean Nixon leads the NFL with a 27.5-yard average. He had a 93-yarder vs. Miami, his league-leading fourth of 50-plus yards, but missed the second half with a groin injury.

Vikings kicker Greg Joseph is 19-of-19 on field goals from inside of 50 yards but only 3-of-8 from distance. But he's got a huge leg, as evidenced by his 61-yarder that beat the Giants. Punter Randy Wright has a 42.8-yard net average and a sensational 32 punts inside the 20 vs. only one touchback.

Receiver Jalen Reagor has only a 6.8-yard average on punt returns but had a 73-yard touchdown at Lambeau with the Eagles in 2020.

Packers pick off Tagovailoa 3 times, top Dolphins

Green Bay keeps playoff hopes alive

Packers cornerback Jaire Alexander knew the secondary needed to start playing better against the Miami Dolphins after defensive backs coach Jerry Gray surprisingly yelled at them at halftime.

“That woke us up for sure,” Alexander said. “He doesn’t really yell, but he was yelling at us then. And you see the results. He probably needed to yell at us at the beginning of the game.”

Gray’s motivational effort worked: The Packers intercepted Tua Tagovailoa three times in the fourth quarter to complete their comeback and defeat the Dolphins 26-20 to keep their playoff hopes alive.

The Packers had a season-high four takeaways in the game — three interceptions, one fumble recovery. Alexander caught one of Green Bay’s three interceptions early in the fourth.

“That’s how it is. You get one pick, more are going to come,” said cornerback Rasul Douglas, who caught the game-sealing pick. “Keep catching those, and you keep getting them. I’m just glad we caught them.”

Aaron Rodgers threw for 238 yards and a touchdown and was intercepted once, helping the Packers (7-8) to their third straight win.

After leading by as many as 10, the Dolphins trailed by six points with a chance to take the lead in the final two minutes, but Tagovailoa threw his third interception in three possessions to end Miami’s comeback bid. He threw a pick with about six minutes left that set up a Packers field goal.

Packers kicker Mason Crosby made the go-ahead field goal early in the fourth after turnovers by both offenses.

Undrafted Miami rookie Kader Kohou intercepted a pass by Rodgers intended for Allen Lazard, but the Dolphins gave it right back when Alexander intercepted Tagovailoa on the very next play.

Miami’s defense held the Packers to six points off turnovers in the second half, and also held Green Bay to two TDs and three field goals in five trips to the red zone.

“It wasn’t pretty, certainly,” Packers coach Matt LaFleur said. “I think a lot of times, when you kick a bunch of field goals, that’s usually just enough to get you beat.”

A.J. Dillon led the Packers with 36 yards rushing on 11 carries, and Lazard had 61 yards receiving on five catches.

Tyreek Hill had four catches for Miami to give him 113 for the season, setting a Dolphins’ single-season receptions record previously held by Jarvis Landry. Jaylen Waddle added five receptions for 143 yards.

But Miami spoiled those big receiving days with turnovers. Raheem Mostert fumbled in the first half, and Tagovailoa’s three interceptions were the most he has thrown all season.

Miami committed to the run game early, rushing for 82 yards against Green Bay after a season-high 188 yards against Buffalo in week 15.

The Dolphins ran four times for 38 yards on their opening drive and took a 3-0 lead, and Green Bay countered with a field goal to tie it after Keisean Nixon’s 93-yard kickoff return set up the Packers at the 9-yard line.

Miami built a 20-13 halftime lead after an 84-yard TD by Waddle and 1-yard TD run by Jeff Wilson.

Dillon’s 1-yard touchdown run on Green Bay’s first possession of the third quarter tied the game.

Tight end Marcedes Lewis also had a 1-yard TD catch in the first quarter.

PLAYOFF PICTURE

When the Green Bay Packers lost to the Philadelphia Eagles in week 12, their record was 4-8, their quarterback had broken ribs and the season looked doomed.

The Packers' playoff chances were so remote that one of the country's biggest sportsbooks, FanDuel, no longer listed them in their "Odds to make playoffs" market.

The Packers not only are back on the list, they became the favorite to claim the final spot in the NFC playoffs after beating the Miami Dolphins on Sunday.

Officially, the Packers remain in 10th place in the NFC. As was the case after beating the Los Angeles Rams last Monday night, the Packers trail the New York Giants, Washington Commanders, Seattle Seahawks and Detroit Lions in the race for the final two playoff spots. But, after the Giants, Commanders, Seahawks and Lions all lost on Saturday and the Packers upset the Dolphins on Sunday, Green Bay is just a half-game behind Washington for the final spot.

"I'd like to be, you know, 10-5, 11-4, but, considering where we were a few weeks ago, a lot of has happened in our favor," quarterback Aaron Rodgers said after the game. "All the games that needed to go a certain way went a certain way. Now, there's obviously much left, but we've played meaningful games in December, we won all three of those. Now we're playing meaningful games in January, and we've got to win those."

It won't be easy. Of the five teams chasing the final two spots, the Packers have the toughest remaining schedule with home games against the Minnesota Vikings (12-3) and Detroit Lions (7-8). But with the momentum of three consecutive wins, homefield advantage and a battle-tested team, Green Bay is surging at the right time.

"It means that the work is working and just keep doing the things that we've been doing and things like that happen," tight end Marcedes Lewis said. "We've just got to stay the course. You don't really control wins and losses, but your attitude and your effort and your preparation going into games, you have complete control over that and today, we handled business."

With the Dallas Cowboys having secured one spot, here is a look at the race for the final two spots in

the NFC playoffs.

New York Giants (8-6-1)

Week 17: vs. Indianapolis Colts (4-9-1)

Week 18: at Philadelphia Eagles (13-2)

The Giants need only to win one game to get in the playoffs. They're in good shape with the slumping Colts coming to town next week.

"We control our own destiny," Giants running back Saquon Barkley said. "Win and you're in. At home. That's beautiful."

If they were to somehow lose that game, they'd face the powerhouse Eagles in the finale. Philadelphia might have the No. 1 seed wrapped up, so it could be the Giants facing Gardner Minshew instead of MVP candidate Jalen Hurts, though Minshew almost won at Dallas on Saturday.

Washington Commanders (7-7-1)

Week 17: vs. Cleveland Browns (6-9)

Week 18: vs. Dallas Cowboys (11-4)

Washington is the target. The Commanders are slumping and have no idea what they're doing at quarterback. At one point, Taylor Heinicke led them to six wins in seven games. Now, they're 0-2-1 in their last three games. Carson Wentz replaced Heinicke for the end of Saturday's loss to San Francisco.

On one hand, their final two games are at home and both are winnable. Cleveland is 2-5 on the road and has scored just 33 points its last three games.

If Washington were to lose that game, it would host Dallas in the finale. The Cowboys might be locked into the No. 5 seed. If that's the case, chances are coach Mike McCarthy will rest his key play-

ers with an eye toward a wild-card game the following weekend.

Thus, the Packers' playoff hopes might hinge on quarterback Cooper Rush, running back Malik Davis and rookie receiver Jalen Tolbert.

"We still control our destiny," Washington receiver Terry McLaurin said. "Other teams in contention with us lost, as well, so it's kind of like a stalemate. But we've got to find a way to come back and get a win against Cleveland back at home. These last two at home, you can't really ask for much more to have an opportunity to get into the playoffs. We have two chances at home to do it, and we just got to get back and see what we can do to get that done."

Seattle Seahawks (7-8)

Week 17: vs New York Jets (7-8)

Week 18: vs. Los Angeles Rams (5-10)

The Seahawks are in eighth place because of tiebreakers. Detroit owns the tiebreaker over Green Bay because of its week nine victory, and Seattle owns the tiebreaker over Detroit because of its week four win.

Really, though, Seattle is irrelevant from Green Bay's perspective. If the Packers and Seahawks win out and tie at 9-8, Green Bay would win the tiebreaker based on conference records.

Seattle has fallen apart. A four-game winning streak lifted it to 6-3 and into first place in the NFC West. However, it's 1-5 in its last six games. It does get its last two games at home, where it's dropped three straight.

"These last two games will be enormous for us, obviously," Seattle coach Pete Carroll said following the loss to the Chiefs on Saturday. "We are playing the championship of the season right now. That is how we are going to approach it to get it done and give us a chance to be in it in the end."

Detroit Lions (7-8)

Week 17: vs Chicago Bears (3-12)

Week 18: at Green Bay Packers (7-8)

The Lions were the darlings of

the NFL after winning six of seven games to charge into the play-off hunt following a 1-6 start. But Detroit was upset on the road by the Carolina Panthers on Saturday. The Lions' horrendous defense was torched for 320 rushing yards.

Presumably, Detroit will beat Chicago next week. That would set the stage for a make-or-break week 18 showdown at Lambeau Field. The Lions haven't made the playoffs since 2016 and haven't won a playoff game since reaching the NFC Championship Game in 1991.

For what it's worth, the Lions have played one game on grass all season, a 31-30 win over Chicago on Nov. 13.

"I've been saying it all along while we were winning games, none of it matters if we don't go out there and perform again for the next one," left tackle Taylor Decker said. "And we were kind of in a position to control our own destiny and we kind of fumbled it away. So, all we can do now is go and play these next two games. We got two divisional opponents coming up and whatever happens, happens."

Green Bay Packers (7-8)

Week 17: vs Minnesota Vikings (12-3)

Week 18: vs Detroit Lions (7-8)

With three consecutive victories and everybody else dropping like bowling pins, the Packers have put themselves in position for the most unlikely of playoff berths. They'll have to beat two quality teams, and get some more help, to turn those dreams into reality.

For what it's worth, Mother Nature is going to release her icy grip on the area just in time for two dome teams to come to town. According to Accuweather, the forecast for Sunday's game against the Vikings is calling for a high of

37 with a chance of showers.

For the finale against Detroit, the long-range projection is a high of 26. With the potential of the game being flexed into primetime, the predicted low is 19 with wind chills in the single digits.

"We like our position, but it starts one game at a time with an NFC North opponent, which is Minnesota. (We have to) handle that first," running back Aaron Jones said.

"Before we look past or look forward to anything, you have to handle what's in front of you."

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Q&A WITH DAVID BAKHTIARI

Having worked his way back from a knee injury that sidelined him for the 2020 playoffs, most of the 2021 season and the start of the 2022 season, former All-Pro left tackle David Bakhtiari had an emergency appendectomy a couple days before the Packers faced the Bears on Dec. 4. A few days later, on Dec. 7, he and his wife had a baby girl, Felix Ann Bakhtiari.

Q: Can you take us through what happened?

A: I thought I maybe strained my ab or had a contusion in my ab. I talked to my wife about it and I was like, 'If I feel the same pain, I'll bring it up to the doctors tomorrow.' So, I woke up the next morning, felt totally fine. Came in here and went and saw (team Dr. Pat) McKenzie and I'm like, 'Can you check this out real quick?' He thought I was just messing around. He said, 'Let me bring in Dr. (James) Ebben.'

Dr. Ebben came in, did a couple tests and he was like, 'Let's just rule out the worst-case scenario. Let's

give you a CT scan.' I was like, 'OK, Friday's my big practice day, so as long as I can get it done before so I can practice.' I go in there, I do the test, waiting for the doctor to clear it and she [Ebben's assistant] said, 'The doctor wants to talk to you.' When that happens, you're like, 'OK, what the (expletive) happened?'

They come in and he tells me. Long story short, he said, 'You're a couple days away, from what it looks like, and it's pressing on your abdomen. That's why you're having the pain.' So, I had to go to the surgery. When I woke up, she's like, 'We had to do the big surgery because it was leaking.' She thought I was a week from the CT but she's like, 'If it didn't burst Saturday, you would've burst it Sunday.'

Q: That's scary. If doesn't burst on Saturday, you're playing on Sunday and then what?

A: Then I'm on the field. The scary part for me that people don't understand is when we have adrenaline going, so much stuff gets covered up. I would probably bet I wouldn't even know I would've burst it until postgame. I would've thought I got hit in the

guts and I would have been like, 'Suck it up. Let's finish out the game and then let's figure it out.'

Q: Can you put into words what these last couple years have been like?

A: I think anyone that looks at the journey I've been on the last two years, I've been put under four times in Jan. 7 will be two years. That's not cool. I don't wish that on anyone and I don't enjoy it but that's the road, that's what's written on my life. Tough times don't last but tough people do. I'll keep rolling with it and eventually it's going to calm down and I can get back to what has been my regularly programmed scheduling of my life.

No matter what happens here at work or anything, the moment I walk through the door, it doesn't matter what kind of day you've had. Chest time's the best time. Being with my baby girl, being with my wife and family, it's been a blessing, it's been great and I love those moments.

With what's going on outside of my wife and my daughter, people say, 'You don't you just want to fast-forward through it?' But when
