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Sheriff: More security needed for courthouse

Administrative coordinator says facilities assessment should provide insight

Shawano County Sheriff George Lenzner recommended stronger security for the Shawano County Courthouse during the county's public safety committee meeting April 5.

"We had a courthouse security meeting, and one of the big things that is wanted is how to get a second officer working in the courthouse," said Lenzner.

Lenzner said Shawano County is one of the last counties in the state where the protocol is to take an inmate out of the jail, walk them across the street and into a public courthouse. Bringing inmates from the jail to the courthouse includes walking them through public areas.

"We don't have a policy, because we don't have rules for the courthouse — there is a sign that you can't bring guns in there, but nobody checks," said Lenzner. "I want to go on record and say that (extra security) is needed. It seems like a lot of times we don't do anything in this county until something happens."

Administrative Coordinator Jim Davel said he agreed with Lenzner on wanting a second officer in the courthouse. He added that the facilities assessment that the county is participating in should play a role in solving the issue.

"We are getting briefed on the first part of the facilities assessment right before the (April) county board meeting, and I really think that board members are going to have some big decisions coming up," said Davel. "I think it really relates to some of these topics that you are hearing."

Davel said that the county should plan for a walkway or a connection between the courthouse and the jail.

"It is smart business to do that," said Davel. "I do think with a new facility, that we incorporate and

understand what our court-side of it should look like. What the court looked like years ago in 1957 is drastically different with the problems that the court is dealing with today, in terms of security."

Talking about building a new facility that allows a connection between the jail and the courthouse, Davel said that in a perfect world it would work, but would probably come with a high price. He also detailed an experience where extra security could have helped at the courthouse.

"I called (Capt.) Ty (Raddant), because we had a very disruptive defendant that was outside of the courthouse," said Davel. "We had three deputies tied up with this one individual."

Supervisor Jerry Erdmann said the county looked at constructing an addition to the courthouse in the 1990s.

"Some of the addition would have had both courts in the new part," said Erdmann. "There would have been an elevator at the sheriff's department to a connection to the courthouse. They would have never crossed the street to the public."

Lt. Chris Madle said that there is currently one court security deputy, who covers all courtrooms.

"I would say that every day, I

spend part of my day in court helping who we have there," said Madle. "He can't be with an inmate in branch I, at an injunction hearing, in the court commissioners office and then bringing inmates over to branch II — he can't do it all at once."

Lenzner said that the county should try to get a second officer in the courthouse in spite of whatever the county decides it wants to do after the facilities assessment.

"We don't have the security of the court and I have brought people to the courthouse, Ty has brought people to the courthouse, because we are the last ones here," said Lenzner. "The judges both want more people in the courthouse, too."

Davel said that after the county receives the results from the facilities assessment, the public property committee and the executive committee should hold a joint meeting to find some direction moving forward with security.

The committee did not approve any resolution, but tabled the conversation for future considerations. Erdmann said that he will try to locate the plans of the expansion that were drawn up in the 1990s.

Strassburg Dairy proposes 350 animal unit increase

Other upgrades include new calf barn, expanded feed pad, barn addition

The Shawano County Land Conservation Department held an informational meeting April 5 regarding an expansion of a farm in Wittenberg.

Owned by Ken and Shirley Strassburg, Strassburg Creek Dairy, N7339 and N7400 Regina Road in Wittenberg, is looking at expanding from 2,530 animal units to 2,880 animal units. An animal unit is a measurement of how an animal influences a farm through food and waste. A larger animal, like a fully grown cow, usually has an animal unit that is larger than one. Strassburg Creek Dairy recently expanded from 1,650 animal units to 2,530 in 2021.

Shawano County conservationist Scott Frank opened the meeting explaining the basics, saying that the Land Conservation Department holds the meetings to get input from the public on the potential expansion. He said that those who have comments, questions or concerns about the expansion need to submit them to the Land Conservation Department within 10 days of the informational meeting. With that 10th day occurring on Saturday, April 15, the deadline for comments was extended through April 17.

"We are here, basically, to let people know what is happening and let them know the rules and standards that the farm is following when it comes to manure management and controlling run-off on the farm," said Frank.

Frank went on to say that the land conservation department has 90 days to make a decision on granting or denying the application.

"That 90-day time period would be June 19 and at this point, I do not expect to be anywhere near that time frame," said Frank.

Jennifer Kuening, an environmental consultant representing GHD out of Green Bay, presented the details of the application to those that were in attendance.

"The Strassburgs last were issued a livestock citing licence on May 4, 2021, when they built a new freestyle barn and switched over to robotic milkers,"

said Kuening. "That has been going very well for the farm, and they have been very pleased with that. Here we are in 2023, and there are some additional updates that they want to make at the farm."

Kuening said that the farm is proposing a new 70 foot by 240 foot calf barn. That barn will replace the calf hutches on a gravel road that the farm currently has in place.

"There will be a small gravity waste transfer system in there that is part of the milk-mixing room, that will collect any waste water that needs to be collected," said Kuening. "That will be diverted to the proposed leachate management pond — the dimensions of that are 350 feet by 170 feet, and that is a 16-foot-deep structure."

Included in the upgrades will be an expanded portion of a feed pad to the north. That expansion will be 70 feet by 245 feet. An additional feed pad will be added on, totaling an area of 300 feet by 250 feet, according to Kuening.

"Those expansion pieces are designed such that drainage will go right into the pond for storage, so we think that is a very environmentally friendly option and is certainly going to make that leachate collection system really useful on the farm," said Kuening.

Finally, Kuening said that farm owners hope to add on to an existing freestyle barn.

"There is an 18-foot addition on the south end, and that is for nothing more than to add a bay of fans on that outside wall, so they can tunnel-ventilate the structure a little better," said Kuening. "And then adding a 120 foot by 106

foot addition for 200 cows."

In total, the entire project will take the farm up to 1,650 milking and dry cows, with an additional 900 heifers of various sizes.

"The total animals on the dairy

farm will be 2,550 cows, and the animal units will be 2,880," said Kuening.

In regards to the odor score in the proposal, Kuening said that the farm's odor score comes out to 535. She added that state law dictates that an odor score of 500 or more is a passing score.

"In Strassburg's case, we are using diet manipulation, and diet manipulation basically means that we are feeding a balanced ration and are not overfeeding — we are not generating any extra odor because of the diet that we feed to the animals," said Kuening. "That is an odor-controlled practice. These barns also get frequently cleaned, because they have alley scrapers that run 24/7."

Kuening ended the meeting explaining various laws and requirements and confirming that the farm meets the employee training plan and the emergency response plan.

"We are at this point to let everyone know that we have done our review — it meets all of the current standards and it also meets other requirements that they need for permits," added Frank.

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10 tips can help people avoid most scams

There are thousands of new scams every year, and sometimes, it's challenging to keep up with all of them.

However, remembering these 10 tips will help to avoid most scams:

- Never send money via gift card or wire transfer to someone you have never met face-to-face. If they ask you to use a wire transfer, a prepaid debit card or a gift card, those cannot be traced and are as good as cash. Chances are, you won't see your money again. If someone is trying to convince you to pay this way, stop. Get off the phone or the computer, and file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.
- Avoid clicking on links or opening attachments in unsolicited emails. Links, if clicked, will download malware onto the computer, smartphone, tablet or electronic device, allowing cyber thieves to steal someone's identity. Be cautious even with an email that looks familiar; it could be fake. Instead, delete it if looks unfamiliar and block the sender.
- Don't believe everything seen

in a message. Scammers are great at mimicking official seals, fonts and other details. Just because a website or email looks official does not mean that it is. Caller ID is commonly faked.

- Double check online purchases are secure before checking out. Look for the "https" in the URL (the extra s is for "secure") and a small lock icon on the address bar. Check out the company first at BBB.org. Read reviews about the quality of the merchandise. Look for a brick-and-mortar address listing on the website itself and a working phone number. Take an extra step and call the number if it is an unfamiliar business.
- Use extreme caution when dealing with anyone online. Scammers use dating websites, Craigslist, social media and many other sites to reach potential targets. They can quickly feel like a friend or even a romantic partner, but that is part of the con for people to trust them.
- Never share personally identifiable information with someone who has made contact unsolicited, wheth-

er it's over the phone, by email, on social media or even at the front door. This includes banking and credit card information, birth date and Social Security/Social Insurance numbers.

- Resist the pressure to act immediately. Shady actors typically try to make people think something is scarce or a limited-time offer. They want to push victims to make a decision right now before even thinking through it, asking family members, friends or financial advisers. Sometimes, they'll advise against contacting anyone and just trusting them. While high-pressure sales tactics are also used by some legitimate businesses, it typically isn't a good idea to make an important decision quickly.
- Use secure and traceable transactions. Do not pay by wire transfer, prepaid money card, gift card or another non-traditional payment method. Say no to cash-only deals, high-pressure sales tactics, high upfront payments, overpayments and handshake deals without a contract. Read all of the small print on the

contract and make sure to understand what the terms are.

- Whenever possible, work with local businesses. Ask that they have proper identification, licensing and insurance, especially contractors who will be coming into your home or anyone dealing with your money or sensitive information. Review Business Profiles at BBB.org to see what other people have experienced.
 - Be cautious about what is shared on social media. Consider only connecting with known people. Check the privacy settings on all social media and online accounts. Imposters often get information about their targets from their online interactions and can make themselves sound like a friend or a family member because they know so much about someone. Then, update and change passwords to passphrases on a regular basis on all online accounts.

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Johnson talks debt with business leaders

Concerns about not balancing budget having consequences grow locally

Sen. Ron Johnson visited with business leaders in Shawano on April 5, but much of his discussion surrounded debt in the United States and the consequences.

He claimed that the national debt has more than doubled — from \$14 trillion to \$32 trillion — in the last few years, but he fears that debt will shoot up to \$50 trillion in 10 years with some of the proposals being pushed by President Joe Biden's administration.

"There's not a year where we don't have less than \$1.5 trillion in debt," Johnson said, noting that before the pandemic, the federal government spent \$4.4 trillion maximum, but there's no clear idea now how much is being spent, even among members of Congress.

"We never talk about it," Johnson said. "We have the world's largest financial entity, and nobody — not even the press — talks about it. Well, it's \$6.2 trillion."

Johnson admitted he voted for the CARES Act, which was the first spending bill to provide relief during the pandemic, because no one wanted to see the country collapse as lockdowns were implemented on schools, businesses and most daily life. However, he said he plugged his nose as he voted yes because the cost continued to rise.

"We had to give the financial markets confidence we were not going to let the banks collapse," Johnson said. "We were not going to allow financial contagion. It started at \$750 billion, but then it went up to \$2.2 trillion. We've literally spent trillions of dollars we didn't have to spend."

Johnson noted the recent omnibus spending bill passed by Congress, which had \$1.7 trillion in spending, could have been much less with his amendment that stripped out all the federal earmarks. The amendment failed, and Johnson blamed Democrats, including Wisconsin's other representative in the Senate, Tammy Baldwin.

"My Democratic colleague here in Wisconsin got \$255 million worth of earmarks," Johnson said. "Now, she'll go around the state, and the media will sing her praises, but it's basically a campaign contribution to her that we don't have."

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Johnson also reported that tax cuts for 95% of Americans are due to expire this year, but he is on the Senate Finance Committee to address that and make sure taxes don't go up at a time when inflation is at a 40-year high and people are spending much more than they have before for the basic essentials.

Some of the business leaders expressed concern that China has covered much of the debt that the United States has, and Johnson was

asked when the bill would come due. With the Chinese government working more with Russia, there was concern in the room about how the debt could threaten American democracy.

Johnson said the massive debt and its connection with China and others is concerning, but he didn't believe that China would just call in the marker because of the effect it would have on the world market. However, the United States is currently the world leader in currency, but if the

dollar falls from the top spot, that could spell trouble for the country.

"None of this just happened," Johnson said. "We were not just unlucky. It was all caused by massive deficit spending, all this debt, and a lot worse can occur."

The senator cited as an example that trading of petroleum fuel is done through dollars, but if that ceases to be the case, the high prices Americans are already paying for fuel could skyrocket.

Johnson noted that China has its own debt to deal with, and even said that could be stabilizing for the economy.

"Would you collapse someone's economy because they owe you \$1.8 trillion?" Johnson said. "Would you collapse their financial system? I wouldn't."

The concerns about China extend beyond financial concerns. With the uneasy situation involving Taiwan, there's concern about having to go to war, something Johnson does not favor.

"I don't even want to contemplate, much less recommend, us going to war with China," Johnson said. "Decades ago, when China was a fraction of the size of our economy, a fraction of the size of our military, didn't have nuclear weapons, you could pretty assure Taiwan we could provide them security. They're a third of the world away, and China's growing its military by leaps and bounds, and they have the technology asymmetrically take out our assets. It's very difficult to project military strength across an ocean."

Another suggestion among the business leaders addressed how companies in the private sector are still unable to find workers and that it might be better for the federal government to reduce its workforce to provide people available to work locally.

Johnson questioned whether that proposal would work but agreed the federal payroll is bloated.

"We have to restore the fiscal sanity and function of our federal government," he said. "We're going to use the federal debt ceiling as a tenet and control to prevent a government shutdown. With each agency, we don't shut it down. We just fund it at last year's level."

Senator chats with St. Paul students

Johnson answers questions about politics, business as he promotes patriotism, family values

U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson brought a message of family values and hard work to students from St. Paul Lutheran School during a visit there April 5.

Johnson espoused patriotism as he spoke with the children and answered some of their questions, while talking about the state of society today. Although there are some things happening in the United States that he doesn't approve of, the senator still feels the country is ahead of others.

"This is the greatest country in the world — a land of opportunity because of freedom," Johnson said. "It is important to utilize the opportunities you've been given in this school to utilize those tools to lead a successful life in this great country."

Johnson offered three things that he believes will guarantee people succeed in life. The first was finishing high school, and then he suggested that people become "lifelong learners."

"Being humans, we just have a thirst for knowledge," Johnson said. "If you look at this marvel we call creation, you ask questions. Never stop asking questions."

His second recommendation was to not have children until in a relationship.

"It's not fair to them (the children) if you're not ready," Johnson said. "Having children is a serious responsibility, and you should be prepared for them."

Avoiding drugs and alcohol was the third recommendation Johnson gave for successful living. He noted that in his capacity as both a U.S. senator and a private citizen, he has heard the horrible tales from surviving friends and family members of those who succumbed to their addiction, and he pointed out the fentanyl epidemic where the deadly drug is made to look like candy.

"Life is far too precious," Johnson said. "With fentanyl, too much of it caused you to almost immediately stop breathing, and then you die. This might seem like too serious or sober a subject for young kids, but it is serious, and it's real. Life is a gift in Bonduel, in Wisconsin, in America. Don't blow it."

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One student inquired about how small to medium daily production companies could establish themselves in a system where larger corporate farms are becoming more commonplace. Johnson noted that the foundation of dairy in Wisconsin gives entrepreneurs many ways to break into the industry, but that it shouldn't be at the expense of the families who have a rich history in farming.

"I think it would be terrible to lose traditional family farms," Johnson said. "My parents both grew up on farms — my mom on a dairy farm with 100 cows, and my grandfather painted his barn yellow so that it really stood out. I understand the grace and the lifestyle of a dairy farm, but I also understand the work."

Another student's question about whether he'd voted the day before generated a quick reply about how the election turned out, referring to liberal judge Janet Protasiewicz getting elected to the Supreme Court over conservative Dan Kelly, but he also turned it into a civics lesson

describing the three branches of government.

"There's a real difference in how conservatives view the courts and how the left views the courts," Johnson said. "We want to elect judges who are actually judges and don't go beyond the constitutional mandate. The left, unfortunately wants to use the court as super-legislators, and they want activist judges that don't go by the word of the law but based on their political thoughts and preferences."

Johnson told the students to realize the education they're receiving at a parochial school can be the best thing for them to receive.

"I really do hope that you students truly appreciate what your teachers and your school administrators are giving to you here," Johnson said. "It is a gift to be provided an education that is first grounded in faith, in morals and in values. This type of education will give you the tools to be successful in life."

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U.S. Census: Wisconsin exports set records

Wisconsin food, forestry and agriculture product exports set a record in 2022, according to U.S. Census trade data.

Exports were shipped to 142 countries totaling nearly \$4.22 billion, a 7% increase from the previous record in 2021.

U.S. Census data shows that dairy product exports totaled \$617 million, up 32% from 2021, the highest level on record and more than \$100 million above the previous record year in 2014. Crop products, including grains, wood and vegetables increased more than 5% to \$2.82 billion, a 10-year high. Meat products declined 2% to \$782 million.

In total, U.S. agricultural exports exceeded \$220 billion in 2022, up 10% from the year prior. Wisconsin now ranks 12th in the nation for agricultural exports.

"This record-breaking year again presents an opportunity to strengthen our state as a leader in agricultural exports," said Randy Romanski, secretary for the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. "Building off of last year, this momentum, the investments of Gov. Evers and the work of DATCP's International Agribusiness Center positions Wisconsin agribusinesses well for the next year."

Gov. Tony Evers has advocated for strategic investments in Wisconsin's agricultural exports, and the 2021-23 budget marked the first time that state funding was allocated to the

DATCP's International Agribusiness Center (IABC) to promote Wisconsin agriculture exports.

The funding, which received bipartisan support in the state legislature, supported IABC initiatives that create opportunities, facilitate connections and help eliminate barriers for new and existing exporters. This support helps Wisconsin agribusinesses build on their success and develop pathways to new markets. Evers recently proposed his 2023-25 budget, which proposes further investments in Wisconsin's agricultural exports.

DATCP's IABC is working collaboratively with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to implement the Wisconsin Initiative for Agricultural Exports (WIAE) plan. This plan provides flexibility to respond to exporting challenges and facilitates unique opportunities that connect exporters with international markets and buyers. The latest release of U.S. Census data shows that post-pandemic demand is driving export growth in several markets as logistics challenges decrease. Wisconsin's top five markets, making up more than two-thirds of total exports, are Canada, China, Mexico, Korea and Japan. Canada, Mexico and Korea showed double-digit increases in 2022, while Japan remained unchanged from 2021.

Menasha man believes program essential to protect and preserve Wisconsin's sturgeon

As far as Don Mielke is concerned, spawning lake sturgeon need all the help they can get.

That's why the Menasha man is behind an effort to revive the Sturgeon Guard program, a group of volunteers that helps protect the large fish that make their way up the Wolf and Fox rivers from Lake Winnebago each spring to spawn and are vulnerable to poaching.

After overseeing the program since its inception in the 1980s, state Department of Natural Resources officials announced last year that the program would be discontinued for the foreseeable future due to fewer volunteers and a drop in illegal harvest cases.

That announcement came after the agency canceled the guard in 2020 and 2021 because of COVID-19.

"To me, it gave an open invitation to anyone that was even thinking of the possibility of doing some illegal activity," Mielke said. "I know that we had a great number of people volunteering in the past. I talked to a few of them and they were equally disturbed that the river system was just not going to be watched any more."

Spawning sturgeon — some of them more than 7 feet long — have

drawn big crowds for years, including below the dam in Shawano, at Bamboo Bend in Shiocton in Outagamie County and along the Wolf River Sturgeon Trail near New London in Waupaca County.

"I live on the shore of Lake Winnebago and have been an active sturgeon fisherman all my life," Mielke said. "If somebody would spear a 100-pound fish, people would travel 50, 60 miles to see it. Now, we have such a wonderful population of big fish, and I feel a great part of that has to do with the guard. I know (poaching) is still going on, and I guess (the decision to suspend the program) really struck a nerve with me."

Sturgeon For Tomorrow, a statewide organization that created the Sturgeon Guard with the DNR in the 1980s, is helping fund the program, according to Mielke.

"The Sturgeon For Tomorrow group was adamant about trying to find someone to continue it," he said.

Mielke contacted the group's five chapter presidents, as well as DNR sturgeon biologist Margaret Stadig and conservation warden captain Ben Trembl.

Trembl came to Mielke's home to discuss Mielke's idea.

"He said, 'Don, I came here to your house for one reason: to talk you out

of this,'" Mielke said. "He said, 'After I listened to your ideas, I don't see why it can't work.' With that, we were off and running."

Volunteers will be stationed along the Wolf River from Shawano to New London and along the Fox River in the Princeton and Montello areas.

"What (the DNR) would like to see us do, is we will be their eyes," Mielke said. "We will write down things and take pictures. We are also on a mission to educate. All of these volunteers are going to have information sheets on why the fish are doing this. We are certainly going to continue the tradition of the guard."

Mielke said he wouldn't be able to revive the program without help.

"There's no way one person can do it," he said. "We're dividing the areas up into quadrants. A gentleman named Ed contacted me, and he lives in Montello. He sent me an email and has been involved with the guard for years. He's going to be the leader for the Princeton area, and he has his group of volunteers."

Mielke already has several volunteers lined up for this year's spawning event, which typically happens in mid-to late April, and in the past has lasted from three to 11 days.

"The response I've gotten has been overwhelming," he said. "I'm answer-

ing emails now as I'm sitting at my desk. We have a gentleman from Park Falls, a lady from Stevens Point, people from Bloomer. I have other family and friends that I can tap into. We will contact people via phone approximately two days before we need them at various sites. After they serve their shift, we'll send them a thank you letter and a gift card that they can use for either fuel or food, whatever they choose. It was just an idea that came to me."

"I prefer an email simply because I can print that off," he said. "When you send me an email, also include your phone number because that's the way we're going to be contacting people. I'm not going to turn down any volunteers."

Mielke doesn't want to think about what could happen to Lake Winnebago's sturgeon population without the guard.

"No one has a crystal ball, but I can see the system deteriorating slowly when you take these massive fish — the extremely healthy males and females — out of production," he said. "There are a lot of people that want to abuse this sport, but I have found a lot of people that want to keep the tradition going."

American insanity about guns needs strong cure

To the editor:

Does it bother you that gun violence is now the leading cause of death among children in the United States? What about the fact that there have been 130 mass shootings so far this year with so many occurring in our children's schools?

It has been said: "The definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different result." America has become an insane nation, at least when it comes to guns.

In my personal opinion, the first truly shocking issue with gun violence in America was when John Wilkes Booth discharged a .44 caliber Derringer to the back of President Abraham Lincoln's head. Then, there was President McKinley. Then Kennedy. Then Malcolm X. Then Martin Luther King and Bobby Kennedy. At some point, collectively and individually, we all started to accept the things we cannot change. The nearly 40,000 American deaths and 75,000-plus injuries each year, including 8,000 children and teens, has become a staggering yet non-resonating statistic at this point.

Of course, the National Rifle Association and the gun manufacturers of America have a hand in this. Gun sales soar with each onslaught. So do prices. So do profits.

Follow the money. After the Marjory Stoneman Douglas school shooting, protest marches were held around the country, including Green Bay where one poster listed NRA campaign donations to Wisconsin lawmakers that year: Ron Johnson, \$1 million; Mike Gallagher, \$43,000; Tammy Baldwin, \$0.

It's not about guns. It's about money, and at this point, the thousands and thousands of innocent lives that are lost as "collateral damage" each year. Strict Constitutionalists are big on

the fact that words like "abortion" and "homosexual" aren't in the constitution. Neither are "bump-stocks," "high capacity magazines," "armor piercing bullets," "rapid-fire semi-automatics" and "ghost guns." Why do some words count, and others don't?

In the time period when the Second Amendment was drafted, a skilled marksman with a muzzle-loading musket could get off two maybe three volleys in a minute. Today, the average mentally-troubled 28-year-old can get off three or more dozen — legally.

That's the insanity that America has become on guns. More capacity, more shooting, more killing — accompanied by the tortured logic that with enough guns in enough hands, we'll all be safe. Yeah right, and I've got a bridge to sell you — and guns, too. Buy them now. The price is going up, and the value of our lives?

Gillett approach to misbehavior is better

To the editor:

I read the article about the Gillett School Board meeting, in your March 24 Oconto County Times Herald, with interest and applause. The statement by Gillett Secondary School Principal Shawn Limberg that "the way we do school does not work for some students" made public something we all knew but rarely say out loud. The idea that skills, learned in places other than the classroom, should count as credits toward high school graduation is refreshing. More carrot, less stick.

I would like to contrast this with the new ordinance, 02023-03-02 under Chapter 19 — Offenses against Public Peace and Safety, approved by the Oconto County Board on March 23. This ordinance is seven pages and has several sections.

Section 19.1500 [Truancy] describes a "dropout" as a child who ceased attending school, a "truant"

as a pupil who is absent from school without an acceptable excuse, and a "habitual truant" as a pupil who is absent all or part of five or more days during a semester. The forfeiture for being one of these is: \$50 plus court costs for the first violation and \$100 for each subsequent violation up to a max of \$500 per semester, and these forfeiture cost may be assessed against the parents or guardians.

If a "dropout" has a driver license, the court can suspend it, take possession of it and "the court shall destroy the license." Also, the "dropout" can be ordered to participate in counseling at their or their parents or guardians' expense.

There are several more sections in this ordinance. I will not bore you with all of them, but I want to say a something about one more: Section 19.1600 Bullying. The forfeitures in this section are \$50 plus court costs for the first violation, \$100 for the second and \$250 plus costs for subsequent offences; with no maximum. All stick.

I think this ordinance is unnecessary and draconian. Leave the discipline to the parents and the school. In addition, I think this ordinance has the potential to cause teenagers to distrust, dislike and fear police.

Teenagers are transitioning humans. We all have known teenagers for whom "the way we did school did not work" but they became outstanding citizens, mothers and fathers. So, let's not make it more difficult for teenagers to become outstanding adults by financially burdening them when they are teenagers for being teenagers.

Schools need more guns, users for protection

To the editor:

Six minutes. That's 360 seconds.

This is the average time, start to finish, of a mass shooting.

Coincidentally, according to FBI and other records, it's the same amount of time it takes on average

for a police response.

What does this tell us?

No matter how fast the police drive to the scene or go inside and try to take down the crazy person with a gun, it's almost always too late.

In a Secret Service study of 67 school shootings, no police stopped a single attacker. Zero. The recent Nashville school shooting was over in 14 minutes. The police killed the attacker, but not before she killed six.

This is not a condemnation of the police (although they totally blew it in Uvalde, failing to learn the lesson of Columbine, which was to go inside and confront the attacker immediately), but simply a reflection of the reality of trying to stop a gunman with unarmed teachers and administrators. Some schools have a single school resources officer, but that single cop can't work miracles.

What is the simple solution that most of us can't admit? It's to have firearms in schools. All schools. We need a simple bank of teachers, administrators, janitors and others trained to pick up a gun and stop the threat. It's the same thing I've been teaching more than 1,000 men and women of all ages since 2012. Any adult with basic skills can learn this. It's not a superpower that some police claim it to be.

Wisconsin has an existing law that allows anyone with a school contract (that's most every employee) to carry a gun in school with the district's OK. We just need a state legislator to get a legal opinion from the state attorney general. You can read this law at the Wisconsin Department of Justice website.

More gun laws never stop criminals, who by definition do not obey laws. We teach our school staff to use CPR and the Heimlich maneuver, fire extinguishers and other life-saving basics. We just don't have the time to call for help when there's a gunman in school. Many states have already armed teachers. What are we waiting for? More dead children?

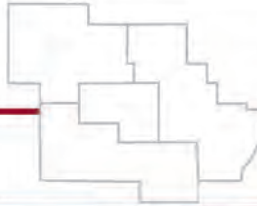

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ThedaCare to merge with Froedtert

Two health care companies seek to expand medical services across Wisconsin

ThedaCare announced a merger with Froedtert Health on April 11 that is expected to provide easier access to health care throughout Wisconsin.

The chief executive officers for both companies announced in a virtual press conference that they have signed a letter of intent to come together formally after starting a quaternary partnership with the Medical College of Wisconsin in October 2022 to form two new health campuses in Fond du Lac and Oshkosh. At that time, Cathy Jacobson, Froedtert CEO, said there was no intention for her organization to merge with ThedaCare.

In the last six months, intentions have changed.

"I would say we got to know each other even better," Jacobson said. "We obviously got to know our organizations quite well and during the times we were having the partnership conversations. We both knew how great we were from the outset with clinical excellence, commitment to community-based organizations, reputation for innovation. We found out just how easy it was to come together and form those partnerships. It just became a natural next step."

Dr. Imran Andrabi, ThedaCare CEO, agreed and noted that there have been no bumps in the road as the groups have executed the quaternary agreement, so it made sense to take the cooperative attitude a step further.

"I can't remember a time that I called Cathy and said: 'This isn't working out,'" Andrabi said. "That tells us something."

Andrabi and Jacobson both agree that the move will make a lasting impact on health care in Wisconsin.

"For some time, the Wisconsin-based leaders of both Froedtert Health and ThedaCare have been asking ourselves a question about how we can have a positive and long-lasting impact on Wisconsin health care and health care for the people who live here in Wisconsin," Jacobson said.

"We are trying to reinvent health care here in Wisconsin," Andrabi added. "These organizations that have long-standing roots in our communities know each other well."

Andrabi noted that the new health campuses were just a taste of what people can expect with a full merger.

He touted ThedaCare's accomplishments, while pointing out that Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin can bring in academic medical care.

"We can take our care to the next level for the people that we are privileged to serve," Andrabi said.

Jacobson emphasized that the merged organization will be operated by people who work and live in Wisconsin. She will be the CEO for the joint organization, which has not decided on a new name, for the next six months until her retirement. Andrabi will become the board president, and once Jacobson retires, he will assume the CEO role, as well.

"We plan to honor the legacies that both of us bring with shared clinical excellence and a commitment to community," Jacobson said. "We really look forward to working with our partners with the Medical College of Wisconsin and expanding that partnership. We have both developed a deep, mutual respect for each other in the last 18 months plus that we've

been working together, and we have a shared vision for what this partnership can do."

Dr. John Raymond, CEO for the medical college, echoed the sentiments of his colleagues about how the merger can increase innovation. He noted that the college has had "deep ties" with both ThedaCare and Froedtert for decades.

"This is really good news for Wisconsin and the people of Wisconsin in the region," Raymond said. "Our hope is that the partnership will allow the Medical College of Wisconsin ... to help further high quality health care to more people in Wisconsin, to accelerate life-changing discoveries, educate more health care providers in Wisconsin and achieve health equity for all."

Jim Kotek, the board chairman for ThedaCare, said the partnership will be guided by four key principles: trust and transparency, community focus and value creation, exceptional quality and innovative transformation and disciplined execution.

"Wisconsin roots run deep in both

Froedtert Health and ThedaCare," Kotek said. "It's important for us to keep it that way. We feel a deep sense of responsibility to come together and build a better future for the communities in which we work and live."

Andrabi noted that the merger will also help health care more easily reach rural communities "beautifully well," with ThedaCare's inclusion of the Rural Health Initiative started in Shawano more than a decade ago.

"At ThedaCare, we've had a long legacy of taking care of our rural communities that are way different than Milwaukee and the surrounding areas," Andrabi said. "It's about the people of our community and getting to understand them and their needs and requirements. I see this as enhancing that care."

ThedaCare is based in Neenah, while Froedtert is based in Milwaukee. It is unclear where the new headquarters for the joint ThedaCare-Froedtert organization will be.

'Victory Street' tells inspiring story

I can't begin to imagine what life must have been like in England during World War II, but Pam Howes painted a vivid picture of life there in "The Girls of Victory Street."

It is 1939, and Hitler has just begun his conquest of Europe. Harry and Mary Rogers are struggling to raise their three daughters, Bella, Molly and Betty. Both work but money is always tight. It is the same for all the families living in the small row houses on Victory Street.

As the family prepares for Christmas, 5-year-old Betty succumbs to diphtheria. The family is devastated but must carry on. Fifteen-year-old Bella and her best friends, Fran and Edie, are blessed with voices that create amazing harmonies.

They all have a crush on their classmate and fellow choir member Bobby Harrison. Bobby's family is well-off so they don't socialize with the folks on Victory Street, but that doesn't keep Bobby from spending every extra minute with the girls. All dream of a career

singing together but accept their realities.

As soon as Bella and Bobby turn 16, they leave school. He joins the air force and she gets a job in the Bryant and May match factory.

Before he leaves for training, Bobby finally declares his love for Bella and they promise to write often, but within weeks Bobby's letters stop arriving.

As the country is plunged into war, most young men enlist, children are evacuated to the country, and those left behind do their best to keep the economy running while enduring frequent air raids.

Bella, Fran and Edie entertain their fellow workers with their Andrews Sisters-style harmonies. Before long, the trio is asked to sing for special events. Soon they are named The Bry-

ant Sisters and asked to join a group that entertains the troops.

When they arrive at the air base where Bobby is stationed, Bella learns that he is engaged. When he finally sees her face-to-face, Bobby swears he wrote every day but never received letters from Bella. Since Bobby's fiancé, Alicia, works at the post office, they believe that she stole or destroyed the letters.

When Bobby confronts her to break off the engagement, she announces that she is pregnant. The ever-accepting Bella returns to the entertainers trying to forget about Bobby. When she meets band leader Earl Franklin, she is smitten and eventually they "do the deed."

About that time, she hears that Bobby's plane was shot down. Bobby survived with severe burns and lost a leg. As soon as she sees him, Bella knows she loves him and no one else. He tells her that Alicia never was pregnant and he's trying to get a divorce. Bella reminds him that his wounds

didn't affect his voice so he should be able to rejoin her and their friends on stage.

He returns to his rehabilitation with renewed energy. They part on a hopeful note, but Bella can't bring herself to tell Bobby that she is pregnant with Earl's baby. Determined to keep her secret, Bella joins her mother and sister in Wales and gives birth to a healthy, mixed race, baby boy.

After a great deal of soul-searching, Bella leaves the baby in her mother's capable hands and returns to Bryant Sisters who will continue to tour and entertain the war-weary troops. As they find their way through the devastation of World War II they will rely on the love and support they get from being part of the girls from Victory Street.

Naturally, the book ends with a neat segue into book two in this long series, "Wedding Bells on Victory Street."

Sometimes we need to remember that "life will find a way" even in the most challenging circumstances.

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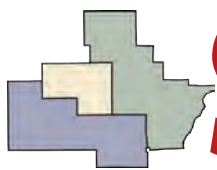

Shawano Speedway ready for green light

Jam-packed schedule lined up

The Shawano Speedway racing season is preparing to kick off its 2023 season and hopes to do so within the month.

The speedway's opening night is set for April 15, but with snow still melting and the track needing to dry out a bit more, speedway and fairgrounds marketing and promotions manager Brad Luepke says they won't rush things.

"We're not going to force a show in," said Luepke during an interview on April 3. "When the track is ready, we'll race, that's the bottom line."

Luepke added that he hopes to get a few practices in before opening night.

Luepke is back in his position after stepping back from the role in February 2022. He was back in the position by the time the Shawano County Fair happened and now is focused on moving forward.

"We have an opportunity to move forward and we have. We got an aggressive schedule, probably more aggressive than we've had special wise since I've been here," said Luepke.

"New victory lanes going in, new concrete slab for that, new victory lane sign.

"Everything is moving forward, that has been the theme and the goal since I came back and the team we have in place is very good and very dedicated."

The Dirt Kings are back at the speedway for two dates this season (opening night and July 29). There's a \$500 to win Mighty 4 Division special on May 22.

Racing for a Reason is back for a 13th season and has raised over \$224,000 for cancer in the first 12 years. That night is scheduled for June 17. That night, there's also a \$4,000 to win IMCA Stock Car special.

The speedway will host two IMCA Modified specials this year. A \$1,000 to win special is set for June 24 and a \$3,000 to win special is marked for July 22.

Fan appreciation night is Aug. 19, with a \$3,000 to win special for the IMCA Sport Mods.

Luepke is also excited for the debut of retro night, which is set for Aug. 12. The night will pay homage to the speedway's rich tradition.

"The goal is to always have something going on every Saturday night," said Luepke. "If it's not a race special, it's a promotion."

A full list of speedway specials

"It's going to be a different environment here," said Luepke. "My first nine years here was good and we grew but I believe that this year, the environment will be even different than what it's been in the past. I'm really excited about it."

Luepke anticipates 40 or so drivers for the specials, which should make great racing for fans to watch. The specials were coordinated with other track's schedules in mind, which should bring some of the area's top talents to Shawano those weeks.

"People really want to see the best of the best race against each other, and this gives them an opportunity to see that," said Luepke.

In terms of drivers lined up to race in Shawano, Luepke said there was over 100 on the pit board, which is a good sign of how many usually show up every week.

Many, if not all of the speedway's divisions — Late Models, IMCA Modifieds, IMCA Sport Mods, IMCA Stock Cars and Mighty 4 — will include some new faces from past years.

In 2022, Ron Berna (Late Models), Jordan Bartz (IMCA Modified), Jeffery Teske (IMCA Sport Mod), Trent Nolan (IMCA Stock Car) and Tanner Westphal (Mighty 4) won track titles.

Bob Schmidt is the speedway's new race director and is a familiar face after serving a number of different roles in Shawano over the years.

"Very dedicated to the sport, very dedicated to this track, so that should be a huge bonus for us," said Luepke of Schmidt.

There's also some new workers around the track, but they also come to Shawano with experience on their side, which should make for a smooth transition, even early in the season.

The workers had what Luepke described as a "productive meeting" and discussed protocol for all kinds of situations that might pop up on race day. "Getting that in line will help a lot, you'll see a lot better flow."

There's also a second Jaws of Life on the safety truck, and although Luepke hopes they never have to use it, it's a great addition for safety.

Even if the speedway cannot open on April 15, the fan fest event that got canceled March 25 in Clintonville is now set for April 15 in Shawano.

Falls' senior hopes to cap track season at state

Oconto Falls senior Brailyn St. Louis is hoping to end her high school career with her best track and field season yet.

In her junior season, St. Louis was the North Eastern Conference's top high jumper, winning the conference meet after clearing 5 feet. She placed third in the 100-meter hurdles in 17.41 seconds.

Turkey season quickly approaching

As the snow melts, ground thaws and temperature rises, my favorite time of year arrives. The spring turkey season is closing in fast.

The season kicks off with youth hunters (under age 16) hitting the woods on April 15-16. The first of six time periods then runs April 26-May 2, with the following five periods also lasting a week.

The spring turkey hunting guide is available online at widnr.widen.net/s/gpssrnsnqg/wm_282_spring_2022_turkey_permit_levels.

This year, I was fortunate enough to be awarded a harvest authorization for Period A in Zone 3, where I do just about all my hunting on public land in Shawano County.

It's the first time in awhile that I've gotten lucky enough to get one of those, and I'm absolutely thrilled that I'll be one of the first hunters in the state to get a crack at taking down a hard-gobbling tom.

After moving to this area five springs ago, and then having my family own private hunting land over two hours away, I had to find different avenues to get my turkey hunting fix. I've always enjoyed challenging myself in life, and public land hunting was the way I determined I could both challenge myself and get more turkey hunting opportunities in the spring.

To get familiar with some of the many acres of public land here — some of which I've never even stepped foot on — there were many hours of scouting I've put in over the years. There are a few places that I instantly fell in love with, and have basically hunted exclusively over the

past several years.

Those are now places I can roam without my phone app onX (which I utilize the satellite imagery for). I could walk you to the exact spots I harvested birds in the past two years and point out the spots I hope to harvest some toms on this spring.

That plays into what I love so much about turkey hunting, the memories.

It's not all about the harvest — and if it were, I should have quit hunting a long time ago. It's about waking up well before sunrise to creep into your favorite hunting spots and hopefully be startled by some close gobblers before working your own magic on a turkey call and trying to trick the ever-elusive toms into close proximity.

Sometimes those close encounters don't even end with you laying eyes on the gobbler, and other teams they agonizingly stand there just out of

shotgun range, almost teasing you.

In the few instances that you get a gobbler into range, it's still not a slam dunk that you'll walk out of the woods with the bird draped over your shoulder — again, been there, done that far too many times than I like to admit.

The close calls and missed opportunities are just part of the reason that makes a successful hunt all that much more sweeter.

For me, I'm satisfied eating tag soup as long as I get plenty of time in the turkey woods, get to hear my fair share of gobbles and have a close encounter or two.

Regardless of how things turn out, I'm going to soak up every moment of it all. I hope you get to do the same and get plenty of memories out of the turkey season.

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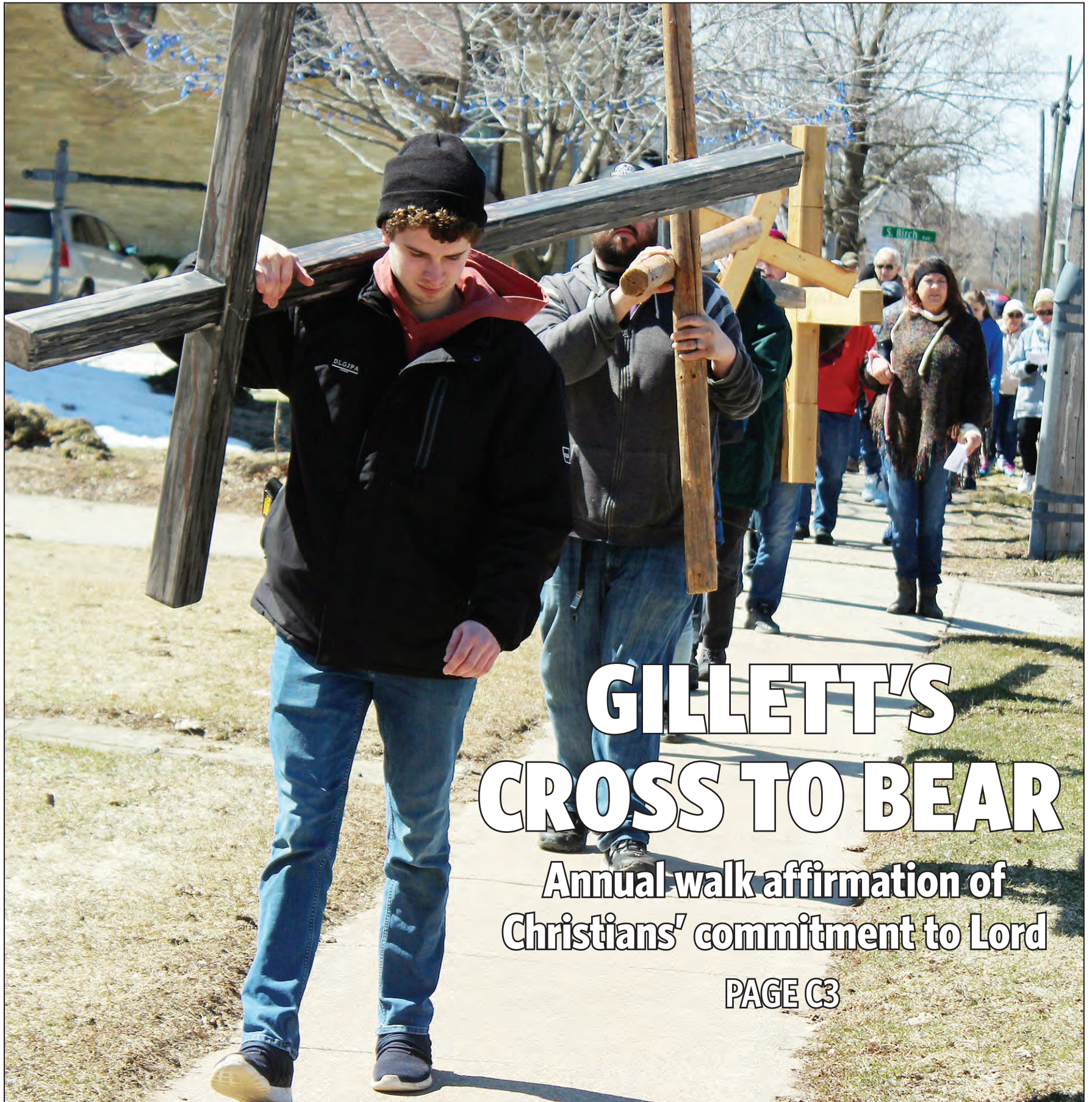
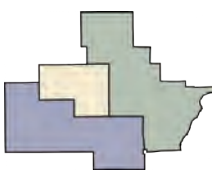

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Gillett residents bear cross at annual walk

Event makes public the story of Christ's crucifixion in preparation for Easter

Many faithful flock to churches on Good Friday to remember the crucifixion of Jesus Christ, but in Gillett, some Christians observed the holiday out on the streets.

For decades, members of the Gillett-Suring Clergy Association have held a cross walk, where several volunteers carry large crosses, some lightweight and others heavy, while others follow behind. Starting at Gillett Secondary School and ending at St. John Lutheran Church, known in the community as the Clock Church, the line of Christians stopped along the way to tell the story of Christ's death and to sing hymns.

This year's cross walk brought out more than 30 people, and for many, it was worth it to demonstrate faith in an all-powerful God and how His son took the world's sins and washed them clean. Chris Byars, pastor for St. John, sees the annual event as a way of reaffirming that churches are still standing and still welcoming.

"It's been at least the last 30 years that it's been a tradition here," Byars said. "It's a great witness to the community that the church still stands. It's a way to show our unity in Christ as we walk in the community together. This is all the center of our faith."

Byars has only been part of the cross walk for the last three years, but he said some parishioners have told him that the walk would extend to a restaurant at the top of the hill near the Gillett city limits in years past, but the restaurant is no more.

Even the pandemic lockdown in 2020 couldn't completely extinguish the cross walk, according to Byars.

"One of my parishioners, Gary Lisowe, did the walk all by himself because it was vital for him as a witness to the community," he said.

When the community could come together again for Easter in 2021, a large crowd gathered to take part in the cross walk, and it has continued since, Byars said. He noted that he wants the community to see that his church and others are praying for them and continu-

ing good work.

"It was a nice walk," Byars said. "People had been gathering and realizing what they'd lost the year before."

Pastor Jonathan Carlson with Hillside Assembly of God feels

the cross walk is a reminder that someone died for the people in the community and well beyond.

"It's really showing the community just a little glimpse of what Jesus went through," Carlson said. "He had to carry a cross, and

reflecting on that and remembering just how much He loves us and that He was willing to do that for us."

Carlson noted the cross walk provides a different way for people to witness the message and experience it first-hand.

"He had to go through a public setting, carrying a cross," Carlson said. "It was humiliating for Him. It was torture for Him. This is a way to really reflect on that more and make it more personal."

Having the cross walk take place with the support of multiple churches in Gillett and Suring shows that, even though they may express their faith differently, they can still work together to spread the word of God.

"This shows that what we believe is real," Carlson said. "If we follow Him, we're showing that we're coming together. It wasn't Jesus dying on the cross. He was calling all of us to die to ourselves daily and live a life committed to Him."

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Sandhill cranes continue to migrate north

Between 1,000 and 1,500 cranes visit Navarino Nature Center during migration

About 20 guests to the Navarino Nature Center were treated with an exciting event April 6, as sandhill cranes continue their migration north.

Led by Navarino Nature Center director and naturalist Tim Ewing, visitors were taken on a guided, half-mile hike up to Pike's Peak as the sun was setting, giving guests the perfect opportunity to see the birds congregate for the night.

Pella resident Patti Luff called her experience "beautiful" and urged others to get out to the nature center to see the cranes.

"I just love watching them fly in and land," said Luff. "It is so beautiful here, and this is one of the things that makes (the nature center) so beautiful — it is just gorgeous."

Ewing said the spring evening with the sandhill cranes is just one of the events that the nature center hosts. There is also a hike in the fall to see the birds as they migrate back south.

"It is kind of a welcome back to the cranes for spring and an opportunity for the public to see all of them as they are returning in mass numbers," said Ewing. "At the nature center, we are all about getting people outdoors and into nature, so this is just like going up and seeing the sturgeon spawning at the Shawano Dam. This is a rite of spring to get everybody out to watch these birds that are flying hundreds of miles to come back to Wisconsin."

In regards to how long the birds will stay in the area, Ewing said those who are breeding will be around all summer, but expects other migrant birds to continue the journey up to Michigan, Minnesota and Canada.

"Some of them are going to be residents and they will be here all summer, but they are not going to be in these large numbers, because once we get to about May they are going start nesting and breaking apart into the breeding groups and the non-breeding groups," said Ewing. "Our cranes that we have in Wisconsin are coming from Florida, the Carolinas, Georgia."

He added that in normal year the

cranes would have made their way to Shawano County by the beginning of March, but with the recent snowstorms, they were delayed to early April.

Shawano resident Ilia Bordiugov said that this is not the first time that he has seen the cranes migrate through Shawano County and that he continues to come to the nature center for the event, and he continues to learn new information about the cranes every time he attends.

"Today was kind of interesting, because I was driving around today and saw a lot of eagles, hawks and cranes and wasn't sure what was up with that," said Bordiugov. "(Ewing) explained that the rodents and the insects are starting to come out because all of their paths are collapsing with snow melting. A lot of birds are hunting right now."

In total, for the nature center, Ewing said that he will see between 1,000 and 1,500 cranes at the nature

center on any given year. For Shawano County in general, Ewing said that number could increase to 3,000 birds.

"They are coming to areas that support that habitat that they need, which is the wetlands at night," said Ewing. "Then they like the farm lands and agricultural area for feeding during daylight hours. We have a nice mix here in Shawano County, so that is why we have a little bit more cranes than in some of the other counties."

Ewing said that visitors can expect to see more of the birds during their fall migration, as they travel back down south. Ewing also noted that the number of cranes continues to increase throughout the years, as the animals have beaten extinction.

"It wasn't that long ago that the cranes were endangered or threatened — this is a species that has made a major comeback," said Ewing. "As far as making the come-

back, a lot of that has to do with when they realized the numbers were on the decline. They were massively hunted in the 1900s, and basically it came to removing the bird from being hunted and giving it a protected status to where it could then come back."

Although this was a guided hike to see the birds, Ewing said that visitors are welcomed to explore the trails on their own and witness the migration without a guide.

"This is a nightly thing through the spring months," said Ewing. "The whole purpose of the guided hike is to help give them information, answer their questions and get them to where they feel comfortable. Anybody can come out here and use the viewing decks to see the wildlife. Anybody can come out any time."

CMN students live their ancestors' prayers

The Menominee word “sawae-nohtawaew” translates to English as “gives hearing to his or her prayer.” The sentiment is one that College of Menominee Nation students and staff reflected on when they attended a gathering for Tribal College and University (TCU) personnel in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The March conference celebrated the TCU movement through the mantra “Living Our Ancestors' Prayers.”

CMN is one of 37 TCUs across Turtle Island dedicated to fostering exemplary scholarship that affirms Indigenous knowledge and culture. The schools are members of the 50-year-old organization known as the American Indian Higher Education Consortium (AIHEC), which was founded in 1973 by the presidents of the first six TCUs “to nurture a common vision” for tribal education. That vision includes hosting the annual AIHEC Student Conference, which drew over a thousand participants in its first gathering since 2019.

Referred to simply as AIHEC by attendees, the gathering enables students to compete against one another's skills and knowledge in disciplines including archery, art, business, hand games, film, math, theater, traditional plants and writing. While the competition is intense, what the more than three-decade-old conference excels at is affirming the wisdom inherent in earning a post-secondary degree grounded in tribal wisdom.

This year, CMN sent four Menominee students to the event, along with two CMN faculty to serve as their coaches. Melissa Wescott won the coveted CMN Student of the Year award, earning the substance abuse counselor major both a scholarship for the following academic year and lauded recognition alongside her counterparts at other TCUs.

Dr. Lucy Fenzl, CMN's dean of academic success and adjunct biology faculty, coached the school's Science Bowl team. Comprised of biological and physical science majors Catishe Grignon, Shawn “Sonny” Pamonicutt and Nichole Verstoppen, CMN's crew took seventh place in the trivia-based game that tested both students'

knowledge of STEM fields and the speed in which they answered each question.

Grignon also shared a scientific poster presentation about her work studying how the medicinal properties of the bacteria that grows on Menominee land are affected by changes in the seasons. Fenzl explained the catalyst for the research: “CMN is a member of Tiny Earth, which is a cohort run by UW-Madison. It is a crowd-sourcing, student-sourcing research initiative aimed at identifying soil bacteria for its antibiotic capability and connecting students and faculty in this initiative throughout the world.”

While Grignon's work was rightfully lauded by the competition's judges, she reserved her own praise for the conference itself.

“It was an amazing experience overall,” Grignon said. “It brought me back into who I am as an Indigenous person. Seeing and meeting so many other Indigenous people from all over Indian Country made my heart happy. It was inspiring to see so many other Native students sharing their knowledge and skills. For once in my life, I felt like I fit in.”

I had the privilege of coaching Pamonicutt and Verstoppen in the speech competition, where they took first place for both their humorous and serious “Duo Interpretation” scenes. The former enabled them to portray an awkward attempt at a powwow courtship, while the latter highlighted the ways in which Native Americans have fought back against colonization and its enduring impact on tribal sovereignty.

Pamonicutt stated: “The whole experience felt empowering. I loved being around so many Indigenous students while representing the College of Menominee Nation.”

Verstoppen added: “It has been a humbling experience. I have never felt more welcomed by so many like-minded people. In a short time, I formed so many amazing new friendships. The whole experience has taught me to be proud to be Indigenous!”

Although the joy the students shared was specific to them, Fenzl noted that the conference resonates because of the opportunities it offers students.

“I have been a part of the AIHEC conferences coaching the science

students since I started at CMN in 2012,” Fenzl said. “It is an incredible way to showcase our students' knowledge, skills and research while helping students to make important connections with other Indigenous students, faculty and other higher education institutions from around the United States.”

In 1856, the famed Chief Oshkosh addressed the Menominee tribal council contemplating Western civilization. He said: “I wish to pursue a course which will be the best for our children who will follow us.” He noted that this included his commitment to “send our children to school.”

In 1993, the Menominee Tribal Legislature created CMN, whose mission dictates that the school “infuses learning with American Indian culture and prepares students for leadership, careers, and advanced studies in a multicultural world.”

The Creator sawaenohtawaew and CMN's students' success at AIHEC is further proof that they're living their ancestors' prayers.

Hunting turkeys in snow good possibility

Turkey season is just around the corner, but you might not notice with all these lingering spring snowstorms.

Conversation in my circle of friends has moved to talk of hunting gobblers in the snow. I try to avoid this in Zone 3 (which includes portions of Shawano County and all of Waupaca County) by applying for the second season (this year, that's April 26 through May 2). Although for some reason, I didn't get drawn at all and had to buy a "surplus" season four permit.

Several of my friends didn't get drawn in the annual lottery. I always buy a Patron license, which provides most hunting, fishing and trapping licenses, including a turkey permit. For the first time in 22 years, I didn't get drawn.

The Patron license allows the applicant to choose up to three seasons for the drawing, but the state claims I only put in for one (why would I do that?) I'm not a conspiracy-theory type, but I keep thinking that because I didn't get drawn, I then had to fork over another \$10 for a turkey tag, in addition to my \$165 Patron license fee. If I had gotten drawn, it would be 10 bucks less for the state.

Hunters tend to request the earlier seasons, thinking that the birds will be less hunted and, therefore, less wary. Maybe it's just a desire to get out there early. When I moved to Wisconsin from Iowa in 2000, I got a first-season tag and soon found myself plodding through 4-6 inches of snow during the season. No thanks. That's why first season is last in my book.

Hunting in northern counties is vastly different from hunting in southern counties. Northern hunters are accustomed to a little (or a lot) of the white stuff when chasing toms. My experience is that the snow seems to make the birds less active and less likely to answer a call, but again, I've avoided this situation whenever possible.

Friend and co-worker Jennifer Schloss, who has been president of the Neenah-Menasha Strutters chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation for the past decade, is an avid turkey hunter who shares the sport with her husband, Trent, and son, Caleb.

Caleb was just 11 years old when winter snowstorm Evelyn struck the state during the youth turkey season April 14-15. While Shawano dug out from just under 30 inches of snow, Caleb and his dad were trudging through knee-deep snow on public land in Marquette County.

After missing one gobbler, and with Caleb's hand warmers failing, the duo was shivering, cold and miserable. They spotted some turkeys near the edge of their own property on the border with the public land and set some decoys. With 12 minutes left of the season, a huge 26.1-pound gobbler strutted to within 20 yards, and Caleb put it down with his 20-gauge Mossberg pump. It was a hunt they'll never forget and proof positive that persistence, even in a historic snowstorm, can pay off.

Turkey and Turkey Hunting magazine, a publication once owned by Krause Publications in Iola and

now based in Waupaca, offers some great tips for hunting gobblers in the snow.

You've already done at least one of these just by driving around the backroads in winter: Noticing where the birds hang out when there's snow on the ground. I literally drive by my hunting land almost every day, and see the birds clustered in two or three distinct areas. Will they be there when the snow is gone? Not necessarily, but it's a place to start. Two aging, wooden deer ground blinds are conveniently located near these two spots, and they make it easy for me to stay dry and comfortable while waiting for birds to show up in the open field.

Author Jason Houser recommends looking for travel routes between feeding and roosting areas. Set up your blind or ambush spot in a field that is uphill from a roosting area (if possible; in my area, there is no uphill area).

Set your blind up three or four days before you hunt, if possible. This isn't legal on public land, as you must take your blind down when you leave.

Don't be afraid to use a white sheet on your blind to help it blend in with the landscape, Houser said.

Crunchy snow makes walking into and out of your hunting area difficult, especially if the birds are roosting nearby. Plan out a quiet entrance route, if available. Perhaps a weedy creek bank, cattle trail or other natural path will quiet your approach.

Most of us turkey hunters also deer hunt, and we are used to cold-weather conditions. You may need to abandon your lightweight spring camo clothing in favor of the insulated bibs and parkas this year. Bring some handwarmers and a pair of heavy gloves.

By the time this story reaches you, let's hope the sun is shining and the snow is all melted.

I will not put any money on that wish, however.

Steve makes about 110 gallons of syrup a year. He also makes maple syrup pops.

Sugary drinks linked to heart disease

Those who drink a sugar-sweetened beverage every day may be significantly increasing their risk for heart disease or a stroke, according to a 2020 study reported in the Journal of the American Heart Association.

"Sugar has several negative effects on the heart and arteries," said Dr. Oleg Chebotarev, ThedaCare cardiologist. "Eating foods or drinking beverages that contain added sugar can lead to high blood pressure, chronic inflammation and higher cholesterol and triglyceride levels, all of which can contribute to heart disease."

The most common sugar-sweetened beverages Americans consume include regular soda (not sugar-free), fruit-flavored drinks (not 100% fruit juice), sports and energy drinks, pre-sweetened water, and coffee and tea with added sugar.

These drinks are sweetened by the addition of a number of different types of added sugars, including brown sugar, corn sweetener, corn syrup, dextrose, fructose, glucose, high-fructose corn syrup, honey, lactose, malt syrup, maltose, molasses, raw sugar and sucrose.

One 12-ounce can of regular cola contains nine teaspoons (36 grams) of sugar — the American Heart Association's limit for how much added sugar men should consume each day. Women and children should only consume six teaspoons (25 grams) of added sugar per day.

Chebotarev said sugar affects the heart in several ways.

"Excess sugar adds extra calories to our diet, which are stored in the body as triglycerides," he said. "High triglycerides are a risk factor for developing atherosclerosis, a narrowing, thickening and stiffening of the arteries that can cause poor blood flow to the heart."

Food and drinks with added sugar also increase low-density lipoprotein levels (LDL — bad cholesterol) and decrease high-density lipoprotein levels (HDL — good cholesterol).

Chebotarev said that while bodies need cholesterol for cell development, high cholesterol levels could create fatty deposits in our blood that can block arteries over time and restrict the flow of blood to hearts. Another threat is that the fatty deposits can break loose and pass

through the blood stream to the heart or brain, causing a heart attack or stroke.

A follow-up study of descendants of the famous Boston University Framingham Heart Study noted

that drinking more than 12 ounces per day of sugar-sweetened beverages is associated with a 53% higher incidence of high triglycerides and a 98% higher incidence of low HDL cholesterol compared to those who drank less than one serving per month.

Chebotarev added that sugar also contributes to chronic inflammation throughout the body, which is also linked to atherosclerosis.

"Caffeine and heart disease can be related as well, with caffeine acting as a stimulant to the heart, which can affect one's heart rate," he said.

With an estimated 70% of Americans adding sugar to their coffee, it also can be a hidden source of added sugar in one's diet. In addition, unfiltered coffee can raise blood cholesterol levels because of certain natural oils that coffee contains, suggesting that one should limit the drinking of espressos, French press and other unfiltered coffee drinks.

Chebotarev offered these suggestions for reducing sugar intake and improving cholesterol levels:

- Eliminate sugar-sweetened drinks from a diet.
- Drink more water.
- Follow a Mediterranean diet.
- Learn to recognize the names of added sugars, and read food/drink labels carefully, noticing how many grams of sugar are in the product. Four grams of sugar equals one teaspoon.

• Get adequate exercise on a weekly basis.

• Have cholesterol levels checked yearly.

"It is possible to lower our risks for developing heart disease," Chebotarev said. "Eating a diet that's low in added sugar is important in that regard. Working toward eliminating sugar-sweetened drinks is a great first step in that direction."
