Students from western Shawano County learn about stream ecology, invasive species

Fifth grade students on the west side of Shawano County took a little different approach to learning on May 11.

The Shawano County Land Conservation Department hosted its 2023 Youth Conservation Field Day, where fifth grade classes from Marion, Wittenberg, Birnamwood and Tigerton were given the opportunity to learn about different aspects of conservation from professional presenters at Wilson Creek Orchard, W16836 Wil-

son Creek Lane, Wittenberg. This is the second year that the orchard has hosted this event.

"I am a very strong environmentalist," said Wilson Creek Orchard owner Terry Nillissen. "(The students) need the exposure to the conservation of the environment. It is a good learning experience, where the kids have fun and the presenters are great."

This year, topics that were covered were renewable energy, dirt and soil, insect species, invasive species and stream ecology, among other conservation topics.

According to Shawano County

Land Conservationist Scott Frank, the youth field day started in eastern and central Shawano County, before making its way to the western side of the county last year.

"I met Terry (Nillissen) over 20 years ago doing a farm nutrient management plant on his farm and have been friends ever since, knowing how important conservation and educating our youth was to him," said Frank. "He said 'Scott, I think we could have something like this out at my farm.' Then he bought the orchard and we thought that we could do it out here."

Nillissen said that hosting the event

at Wilson Creek Orchard gives the students a plethora of different wildlife and conservation areas to explore and learn about.

“There is a lot of diversity and you actually have an agriculture business here,” said Nillissen. “You have old woods growth along the creek and the prairie grass. It is just kind of a balance of nature.”

With students starting to be introduced to a career path in the fifth grade, Frank said that part of the reason that the county hosts this event is to present careers in land conservation to the students.

“We incorporate that into the event, so it meets the state’s standards for education and we want to give the students an idea of what careers are out there in natural resources and/or just have them gain an interest in the outdoors — just to peak their interest,” said Frank. “Maybe that creates a hobby or an activity as they get older, or maybe they end up working in it as a job.”

Frank also said that this experience gives the students a chance to use what they have learned and pass that to friends, family and other community members in an effort to keep the information and knowledge circulating.

“We have a stream ecology station here, which is my favorite station on the day,” said Frank. “They get to learn about what critters and what fish species are in Wilson Creek. It is a native habitat for trout as it is a trout stream.”

The day is broken up into nine different sections spread across the entire Wilson Creek Orchard. Each station contains a presenter who’s profession deals with whatever topic the students are learning at the time. The students spend 20 minutes at each section, learning as much as they can. Presenters come from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, the Waterways Association of Shawano and Menominee County and Timberland Invasives Partnership, among other organizations.

“I draw from co-workers and colleagues of mine that have an education component to their job,” said Frank. “We ask them to lend their expertise on their profession.”

The Shawano County Land Conservation Department also hosts a similar event in September, but that event is at the Navarino Nature Center. Part of the reason why Frank wanted to expand the youth conservation field day to the western side of the county was to teach about the landscape, which has its differences from Navarino.

“Out here, just the landscape is different — Navarino is its own entity, because the wildlife area is over there,

so you are kind of submersed in nature,” said Frank. “Agriculture is a little more prominent in that part of the county, where forestry is the higher land use out here, with agriculture being second. Our presenters are little different too. We don’t have a stream ecology portion (in Navarino), we have fisheries. Those trout habitats are one of the biggest differences that you will see out here as well.”

With this being the 11th year that he has had a part in hosting the event, Frank said he still enjoys it every time.

“To be able to provide a fairly inexpensive field trip close to home and to be able to have such a variety of topics to cover and share with them — that is the biggest for me,” said Frank. “We maximize the day. We are here at 9 a.m. and they get the full day until 2:30 p.m. That is another big thing — to get them a full day, local field trip to learn about and see natural resources first hand.”

Nillissen said that he hopes when the students leave that they take away the important ideas of conservation.

“You have to take care of the planet and you have to do your share,” said Nillissen. “We all get caught up in fast-paced life, so we just need to plant some wildflowers, pick up litter, or just pay attention to the butterflies.”

Wittenberg woman arrested for allegedly pointing gun at kids

Her daughter was reportedly bullied at Pond Park

A Wittenberg woman is in custody after allegedly pointing a firearm at a group of children on May 9 in Wittenberg.

Mindy S. Leeder, 35, was charged May 10 with one count of first-degree recklessly endangering safety and one misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct.

If convicted, Leeder faces \$25,000 in fines and 12½ years in prison for the first-degree recklessly endangering safety count and \$1,000 in fines and 90 days in jail for the disorderly conduct count.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano County sheriff deputies were dispatched May 9 to 401 S. Mill St. in Wittenberg for a report of a weapons offense. The caller stated

that a woman was at Pond Park and was pointing a firearm at multiple kids. When arriving on scene, one deputy was shown a video of Leeder as she allegedly pulled a gun from her waistband and pointed it at one

of the children, who was recording the video.

The deputies were informed of the house that Leeder entered, at 301 E. Front St. When police officers pulled up to the residence, Leeder walked out of the house with her hands in the air, complying with law enforcement officials' orders. The firearm that Leeder had allegedly pointed at the children was found inside the residence, where she told law enforcement it was.

When talking to the children who were at the park at the time, they told law enforcement that Leeder came to the park to yell at them because they were allegedly bullying her children. The children said that they were not

bullying. They stated that Leeder was pointing the gun at them and waving it around in the air.

The children reportedly told Leeder that they were going to call the police. From there, the criminal complaint states that Leeder put the gun in her pocket and went to the Front Street residence, where law enforcement arrested her.

In an interview with Leeder, deputies claim she stated that she could hear her daughter yelling when the daughter was at Pond Park. Upon hearing the yelling, Leeder stated that she wanted to walk over to the park to see what was going on. She also stated that it is common for her to take a concealed firearm with her when leaving the residence, as she has a valid concealed carry permit. She also confirmed that the firearm was loaded.

Leeder went on to say that when she was leaving her residence, her daughter came home and reported the bullying, but did not specify what the bullying was. Leeder told law enforcement that her children have experienced bullying at Pond Park in the past.

When addressing the group of children at Pond Park, Leeder said that the children became argumentative and began to form a semi-circle around her. She allegedly told the children that she had a firearm and, when asked if it was real, she allegedly pulled the gun out of her pocket. She reportedly pointed the gun in the air without putting her finger on the trigger, saying that she did not point the gun at any of the children and was being situationally aware of her surroundings. She said that the children got scared and that she put the gun back into her pocket after holding it in the air.

When questioned by law enforcement whether presenting the firearm was necessary, Leeder reportedly said: "It probably wasn't; I was probably just nervous and scared. I don't like confrontation, to be honest."

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. set a cash bond of \$10,000 and a signature bond of \$15,000, and he scheduled a preliminary hearing for May 18.

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Suit claims hay company wasn't paying OT

Two former employees claim working a lot of OT but not getting paid higher rate

Two ex-employees of a rural Wittenberg hay company alleged they weren't paid overtime during the weeks that they worked more than 40 hours, according to a lawsuit filed last week in federal court in Madison.

The complaint alleged that Adriana Gonzalez Saldana and Pedro Garcia, both of Waupaca County, went to work for Harvest Moon Hay LLC on May 1, 2020. Garcia earned between \$13 and \$15.75 per hour and Saldana earned between \$11.25 and \$13.25 per hour.

While they worked for HMH, Saldana and Garcia consistently worked more than 40 hours a week but never

received the overtime 1½ wage rate proscribed by state and federal law.

HMH is owned by Jonathon Bushman and is located on state Highway 49, southwest of Wittenberg.

The company, which does more than \$500,000 in annual sales, receives hay from out of state and processes it by cutting it and adding other materials, and then packages it for sale.

Examples of when Saldana and Garcia worked more than 40 hours a week without overtime compensation included between March 27 and April 9, 2022, when Saldana worked 144.5 hours, of which, 64.5 hours were on overtime. HMH paid her \$1,914 but failed to pay her the overtime rate which would have added \$427 to her paycheck.

Also, between Jan. 20 and Feb. 11, 2022, Garcia worked 145 hours, of which 65 hours were on overtime. HMH paid him \$2,285 but failed to pay him an additional \$512 in overtime compensation.

HMH is not exempt from paying its employees at overtime rates when they work more than 40 hours a week. Failure to do so violates state statutes and the federal Fair Labor Standards Act.

Bushman had and continues to have control over HMH's daily operations including setting pay rates and determining that Saldana and Garcia wouldn't be paid overtime when working more than 40 hours a week.

A phone message left for Bushman wasn't returned by deadline.

A message left for Saldana's and Garcia's attorney also wasn't returned by deadline.

Whether Saldana's and Garcia's attorney intends to seek class-action status for the civil lawsuit and sue HMH in behalf of other similarly-situated employees remains unclear, although there was some preliminary paperwork filed with the suit that is used in class-action litigation.

The suit doesn't state the last day that Saldana or Garcia worked for HMH or the circumstances under which they ended their employment.

The suit also doesn't state the amount of overtime the plaintiffs are owed but seeks a court order in the amount of unpaid wages at applicable overtime rates, other damages, civil penalties and attorney fees.

Wittenberg accepts quote for sidewalk repair

The Wittenberg Village Board unanimously approved quotes to repair a sidewalk in the village during its May 15 meeting.

The quote from Pro-Paving came in at \$19,780 to repair the sidewalk at the corner of Howard and West Vinal streets, along with West Vinal Street all the way to Webb Street.

"It will include the sidewalk from the post office and up," said Traci Matsche, village clerk.

Repairing the sidewalk should have a positive impact for those who use it, according to Public Works Director Joel Yaeger.

"We are going to make that a little wider where that curb is — about 2 feet will make all of the difference in the world," said Yaeger. "Maybe we can get parking in there better in the winter."

Yaeger added that the current state of the sidewalk near the Wittenberg Post Office, 101 W. Vinal St., has made it dangerous to walk upon, adding that a repaired sidewalk will

solve that problem.

"A lot of that bid is curb work and gutter," said Yaeger. "I didn't realize how bad it was; that is ankle-breaker down there."

In a related story, Yaeger also brought an estimate to the village board regarding road repairs on Howard Street from West Reed Street to West Vinal Street for approximately \$38,000.

"It is \$38,000 for the whole block, or we pay almost \$9,000 to patch," said Yaeger.

The village has currently been

patching holes in the road, but if it were to accept a bid, a company would tear up and redo the entire road.

"I am going to redo a catch basin on there," added Yaeger. "I am guessing that will be between \$4,000-\$5,000. That will make the water flow from the post office down the road."

That project still needs to be put out for bids, which the board is planning to open on June 19.

Marcia V. Tellock, 95, died on Monday, May 8, 2023, at Rennes Health and Rehabilitation Center in Weston under the care of Aspirus Comfort Care and Hospice Services.

Kevin Hermening as a shy young man, who was one of the youngest held hostage, and was one of the speakers she saw and heard speak.

New diner approved for Memorial Park site

The former Home Plate Cafe site will soon be spreading the tasty aromas of food around Memorial Park and adjacent sites after the Shawano City Council approved a new lease for the site May 10.

Popp's Diner will be housed in the restaurant building owned by the

city and will be operated by Justin and Katie Popp, who own Shawano's Cafe just outside the city limits near the junction for state highways 22 and 29. Both are Shawano Community High School alum.

"We wound up having two very serious proposals for the use of the Home Plate Cafe," said City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

He noted that the second restau-

rant would be in a different style than Shawano's Cafe but did not elaborate.

The lease approved will charge the Pops \$1,500 per month to lease the facility for the next five years. Two additional two-year extensions to the lease are available.

"One of the things we were happy about was that they were willing to take on the maintenance of all of

their equipment," Sheppard said. "We won't have unforeseen bills for stoves and vents and other stuff that could start to accumulate. The \$1,500 per month will basically be the base rent, and all the other costs — aside from a roof leak or something structurally — will be their responsibility."

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Housing costs high, choices few in Shawano

Real estate broker tells council that housing sales averaging \$245K, with few homes currently available

There are properties for sale in Shawano, but not many, and not all of them are in the price range needed by some to become homeowners.

John Miesbauer, broker for the Coldwell Banker Real Estate Group, spoke to the Shawano City Council on May 10 about the housing market, noting that there have been 27 sales on homes in the city just in the first four months of 2023, according to a multi-market search he did.

"Right now, there are 24 properties for sale," Miesbauer said. "Eleven of them have offers on them, meaning we have 13 properties for sale in the city of Shawano right now."

Miesbauer noted that four of those properties are currently under construction, which leaves about nine homes built that are waiting for someone to buy them. The price range for those properties start at \$175,000 and go up to \$459,000, he said.

"That's the available market right now," Miesbauer said.

Of the 27 properties sold this year so far, the price range has been from \$60,000 to \$425,000, according to Miesbauer.

The former site for Shawano Medical Center, where homes are being built, has seen five of the 13 available spaces sell so far, Miesbauer told the council. Three of those were purchased by retirees, he said, and two of those buyers are coming to

Shawano from out of the area. One more home is being completed at the old hospital site, and two more are slated for completion in the fall.

"The properties that are being built are bringing people into our community," Miesbauer said. "There is definitely a need for more housing. I don't know what is going on over at S.C. Swiderski (an apartment development in the south part of Shawano), but I can tell you that I get anywhere between three and 10 calls per day from people looking for housing."

The average sale price in Shawano right now is \$245,000, which is good for those who are selling their homes, but for people who are in need of housing, the trend is going the wrong

way, according to Miesbauer. He noted that Clintonville is selling more homes, but the listing price is higher here.

"The average price point down around Clintonville is about \$155,000," Miesbauer said. "The numbers are going the right away."

Miesbauer said he got his real estate license in 2003, and the average sales price then was \$85,000, which means the cost of housing has almost tripled in the last 20 years. The average number of properties available during that time period has been 80 to 90, he said.

"Is there a demand for housing? Absolutely," Miesbauer said.

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School board green-lights Smart Labs

SCMS getting two labs to be used next year for STEM projects, video production

Shawano Community Middle School will be home to two new Smart Labs next school year after the Shawano School Board unanimously approved purchasing them, albeit at a higher price than before.

Both classrooms would be outfitted with items that target the subjects of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). In one classroom, students would be learning about robots, wind experiments, bridge design and more. In the other, a studio would be created to allow for video production, where students could develop commercials; record video yearbooks; produce music albums, news segments and podcasts; and even film feature-length movies, all with the help of professional-grade equipment.

The Smart Lab equipment would help achieve the district's efforts to get students ready for college and careers, and it would do so in an earlier period of development, instead of students having to wait until high school to explore various technological and engineering careers.

SCMS principal William Traber told the board that the price has gone up for the Smart Labs since he first presented to the board in April. Originally priced at \$235,000 with a \$7,000 per year subscription to help replace lost or damaged materials to get tech-

nical support, the price jumped up to \$270,000. Traber said he was able to negotiate the price down to just over \$250,000.

"I am meeting next week with a community group that wants to help Shawano School District and hopefully have an ongoing discussion, and they would support the \$7,000 so the district didn't have to pay that," Traber said.

Traber and others in the district went to Minocqua to see how schools in the Lakeland Union School District were utilizing the Smart Labs they've had for four years, and most of the Shawano delegation was impressed.

Board member John Arens was among those who went and learned about the Smart Labs, and he saw that students in second through eighth grades were using them. Currently, SCMS only plans to use the labs for its students, but Arens suggested it might stimulate education at Hillcrest Primary School and Olga Brenner Intermediate School, too.

"I'm telling you, it totally changed the way I was thinking about this," Arens said. "At first, I thought, 'Great — more Tinkertoys; more Connex.' It was not that at all."

The top thing that won Arens over was that he didn't see one student disengaged in the Smart Labs classes.

"Every one of these kids wanted to talk to us," he said. "We were total strangers. Every one of them wanted to come up and tell us about what they

were doing in their projects. They were seven-week rotating modules, and there were a number of them."

Arens saw second grade students working on electric projects and was impressed to see children that young handling those things with ease.

"You're talking solar. You're talking wind. You're talking architecture, electrical, air movement," Arens said. "There were so many different types of things they were working on, but the one thing I did see was communication. Those kids could communicate among themselves with their instructor."

Mike Homan, who teaches career and technical education at the middle school, said he liked the Smart Labs, but he wanted to be sure it wasn't something that replaced the existing programs at SCMS.

"Nowhere will I ever support something like this when it takes over a tech ed lab, and that was proven by the (Lakeland) instructors," Homan said. "They're actually making their woods area bigger for next year. They are expanding a traditional tech ed lab."

Homan added the elementary and middle school students were engaged in problem solving, one of them working for three weeks on a robot.

Michelle Koehler, who teaches eighth grade at SCMS, said the delegation saw zero behavioral issues among the students. She also liked that the students were using common sense to resolve any snags in their work.

"I saw a couple of girls working on circuitry with a light bulb," Koehler said. "As a girl in the science area, that made my heart happy. This is something we should strive for — to get more girls engaged."

Even Greg Brown, a tech ed teacher who is usually not sold on programs like Smart Labs, was impressed when he saw Lakeland students at work.

"I think we saw a very well-oiled machine," Brown said.

Board member Mart Grams said he wanted to be certain that the Smart Labs were utilized by all the students at SCMS and not just reserved for the "elites."

"I want to see every single person get in, or we don't do it at all," Grams said.

Traber said the Smart Labs would be an enrichment class at SCMS. He wants to start off with two classes in the 2023-24 school year during the mornings. The goal is to eventually have it for all students in all grades.

"They might be in there a whole week straight for half of their day. We're calling them mini courses," Traber said. "Right now, the focus is on ground level enrichment opportunities and then seeing what growing pains we have, and then working through that with my teachers. I can attest that they've been part of this conversation this whole time. I wouldn't be standing here if they didn't."

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"I'm telling you, it totally changed the way I was thinking about this. At first, I thought, 'Great — more Tinkertoys; more Connex.' It was not that at all."

Attorney for Ingold waiting for discovery

Michael Ingold, 58, Shawano, was back in court May 15 on a status conference, in relation to a first-degree intentional homicide charge.

Ingold faces one count of first-degree intentional homicide, after an autopsy showed the 59-year-old victim, his girlfriend, died from manual strangulation last summer.

He was charged Aug. 1; if convicted, Ingold faces life in prison.

During his status conference, Ingold appeared in court with attorney Julianne Lennon, who took the case over from Christopher Froelich.

"This is attorney Julianne Lennon taking over this case for attorney Froelich," said Lennon. "I sent an email to attorney Froelich on April 28. I then also sent him a letter, I believe on May 6. I have not received a response from him or any file for discovery."

Lennon said that she saw that the state of Wisconsin had given discovery.

"My client has been in custody for quite some time and actually

requested that I file a speedy trial demand," said Lennon.

Due to not having all of the discovery paperwork, Lennon said that she is reluctant to request a speedy trial demand.

To give more time, Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. scheduled another status conference for June 9 at 10:30 a.m.

Community wants to see more in schools

Final listening session from Hoffman reveals people want bigger, better facilities even as funds sparse

The Shawano School District has been teaching fewer and fewer students, but community members and employees attending a listening session May 8 are wanting to see more from their schools.

Those in attendance sought more space for athletics and recommended doubling, possibly tripling, the size of fine arts facilities, but they also acknowledged it can be difficult to show the schools' best foot forward when dealing with a mass exodus of staff, student attendance issues and not doing enough to get the word about the positive things going on inside.

The May 8 session was the last one that Hoffman Planning and Design conducted to look at the possibility of asking voters to approve referenda in 2024 that would update aging infrastructure and allow the district to override state-mandated spending caps.

Former school board member Ken Shingler pointed out that many of the programs in the Shawano School District are award winning. He pointed out that Shawano Community High School has a good program for students to obtain dual credits for college courses during their high school years.

"This is a school that has a variety of programs," Shingler said.

Tom Dechant, the district's pupil services director, pointed out that Shawano can offer programs neighboring districts can't because they're the largest in the area.

"In my background with special education, I actually had a parent moving here from another nearby school district because of their student being in special education, and we can offer more than their home district currently can with their resources, because we're the biggest school district in the area," Dechant said.

Shawn Mathwich, the district's

buildings and maintenance director, pointed out that the school facilities also were used quite frequently by the community, showing they're not only important to children.

"If someone saw the community calendar and how many use these facilities on a daily basis, it's really incredible," Mathwich said. "This really is the rec center for the community."

Sheila Aumann, a parent who became heavily involved in school affairs last year when issues with former superintendent Randi Anderson surfaced, suggested that the schools could only succeed if more parents got involved on a regular basis and not just when the schools are in trouble.

"Increased parent involvement and active PTOs (Parent Teacher Organizations)," Aumann said. "I would love to see a community-wide PTO where it's not just parents at each individual building but something community-wide. They'd be support-

ing the teachers and the educational experience and all the special things the schools bring. I feel like some of the core foundational things are being missed."

Superintendent Kurt Krizan said that hearing from as many people as possible was vital to make sure the things planned for the future are things the community, especially taxpayers, want.

"A lot of times, when we've been part of these in the past, we would probably have gone out and collected a couple of people from each stakeholder group from across the community," Krizan said. "What I appreciate, working with Hoffman, is that they really talked with us about getting the voice of the community. Instead of picking handpicked people, we opened these sessions to everybody."

Jody Andres, a Hoffman consultant, said the goal was to look at the broad strokes of what the community and schools want and to debate specific solutions later. He said all options were on the table, including the possibility that one of the schools might have to close if it meant making the other schools stronger.

Two men charged with felonies on reservation

Two men were indicted recently in federal court for allegedly committing felony offenses on the Menominee Indian Reservation.

Edmund Broeffle, 29, of Keshena, was indicted Wednesday with assault and faces up to 10 years in prison, three years supervised release and a \$250,000 fine if convicted.

Broeffle was alleged to have punched a woman on March 12, resulting in bleeding on the brain, broken teeth and lacerations, according to the indictment.

Broeffle was charged with assault resulting in serious bodily injury.

He is scheduled to be arraigned on May 23 before U.S. District Judge William Griesbach.

As of May 12, Broeffle didn't have an attorney, according to online court records.

Broeffle is currently in tribal custody.

Gerald B. Diamond II, of Hayward,

also was indicted Wednesday on drug and gun possession charges.

Diamond, 25, was indicted for allegedly possessing with the intent to distribute methamphetamine, possessing a firearm in furtherance of a drug offense, and felon in possession of a firearm.

The indictment alleged that the three offenses occurred on March 6, that the gun involved was a .22 caliber Ruger pistol but the amount of methamphetamine wasn't specified.

Diamond is to be arraigned on May 23 before Griesbach, and as of May 11, no attorney for Diamond was listed in online court records.

Diamond faces maximum penalties of 20 years to life in prison if convicted on the methamphetamine charge, five years to life for possessing a firearm in connection with a drug crime and up to 15 years on the felon in possession of a firearm.

Diamond has prior felony convictions for heroin possession and escape and pending cases in Sawyer County for heroin possession and bail jumping. He is in tribal custody.

Royce Larock waiting for attorney in stabbing case

A Shawano man charged with attempted first-degree intentional homicide was in court May 10 for his preliminary hearing.

On May 1, Royce E. Larock was charged with one count of attempted first-degree intentional homicide, one count of aggravated battery, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer and one misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct. These charges come after Larock allegedly stabbed a victim in the abdomen following a disturbance in Shawano.

During his preliminary hearing, Larock appeared in court without a public defender. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. said that Larock is eligible for a public defender.

"I have good news and bad news for you," said Kussel. "The good

news being that you are eligible for an attorney in this case, because of a short turn around though, they don't have one for you yet."

Kussel gave Larock two options on how he wanted to

proceed with the preliminary hearing. Those options included postponing the preliminary hearing until he has an attorney, or waiving his right to have an attorney and represent himself.

"I don't want to waive my rights," said Larock. "I would rather wait for an attorney."

Kussel obliged with Larock's request and set a status conference for June 6 at 1:30 p.m.

Bill to fix records problem deserves support

A unanimous voice vote by the Wisconsin Senate on a piece of legislation is a rare occurrence. But that's what happened on April 19, when state senators approved a bill to undo a decision by the Wisconsin Supreme Court regarding public records.

Senate Bill 117, sponsored by Sen. Duey Stroebel (R-Saukville) and Rep. Todd Novak (R-Dodgeville), would allow a judge to decide whether a records requester is entitled to attorney fees regardless of when a stalled request for public documents is finally fulfilled.

In an opinion issued last July in a case called *Friends of Frame Park v. the City of Waukesha*, the state Supreme Court held that if a governmental entity releases records after a suit has been filed but before a court has acted on the case, the requester is not entitled to recover attorney fees and costs.

The court based its decision on a

narrow interpretation of the word "prevail" in the public records statute. It ruled that a judge must affirmatively order a unit of government to turn over public records for a requester to prevail. This effectively allows government actors to hold onto records until a requester files a lawsuit, knowing they face no penalty if they turn over the records before a judge has a chance to act.

Prior to the decision, a broader definition of "prevail" was used, allowing for fee recovery in cases where the filing of a lawsuit was deemed a substantial factor in securing the records' release. By codifying the previously used broader definition of "prevail" in

Wisconsin statutes, SB 117 will remove the perverse incentive for governments to hold on to records until a lawsuit is filed.

The Wisconsin Newspaper Association believes that transparency in government is essential to a democratic society. It helps ensure that government business is being conducted fairly and ethically. The new standard created by *Friends of Frame Park* threatens the ability of the public, including the media, to access information about the workings of government.

Newspapers are the eyes and the ears of the communities they serve and accessing public records is an integral part of the reporting process. In most instances, public records are readily available. In those cases when access is denied, newspapers often turn to the courts.

Litigation over wrongfully denied records can be expensive. Raising the

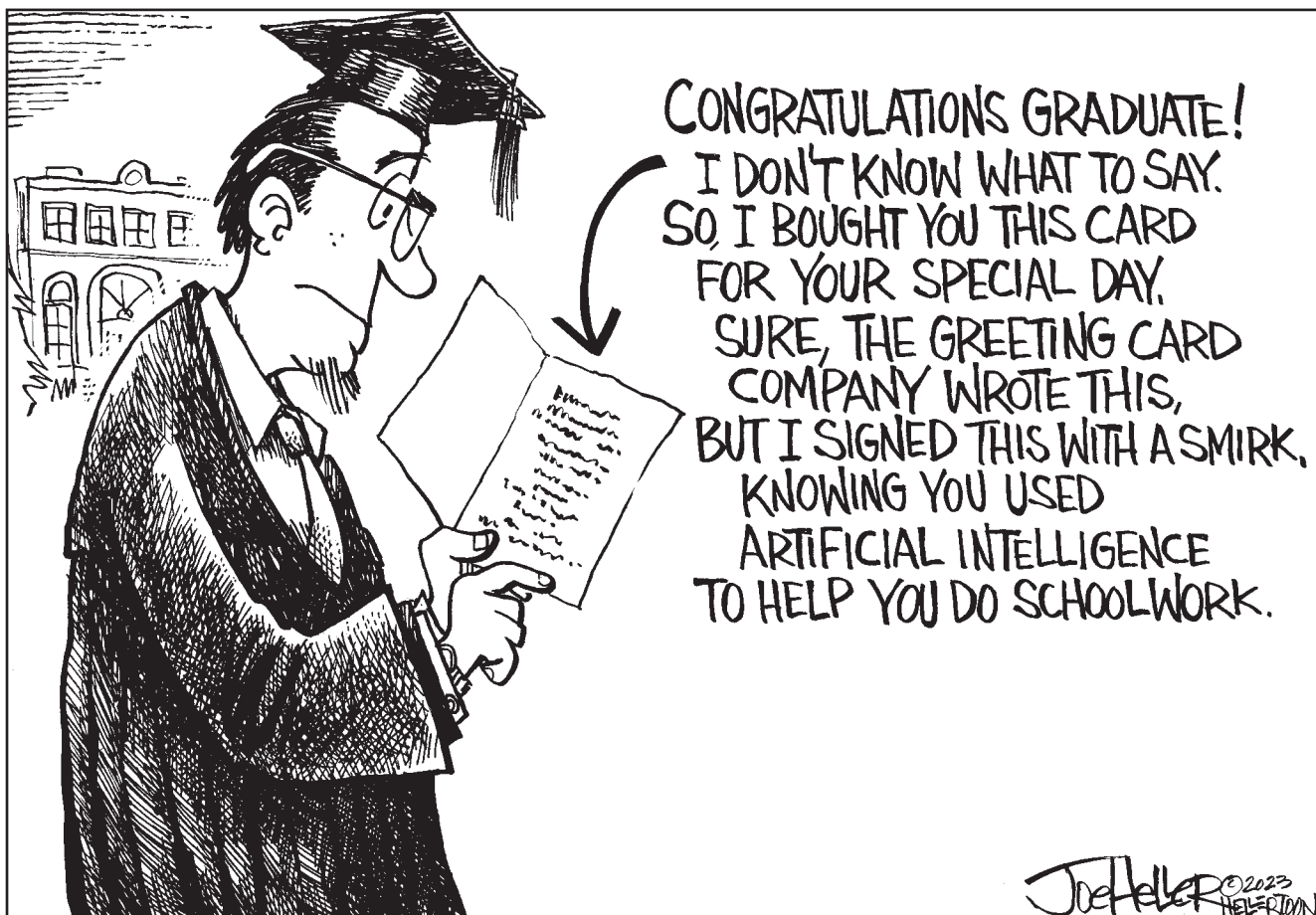
bar on when requesters can recover attorney fees will have a tremendous chilling effect on the media and the public's ability to pursue public documents. If left to stand, this decision will make it financially difficult to keep government agencies accountable.

SB 117 now heads to the state Assembly, where it will be assigned to a committee for consideration. Citizens who support the public's right to access government information should urge their state representatives to support this bill. While they're at it, they should also thank their state Senators for helping ensure that Wisconsin's rich history of transparency in government is upheld.

Wittenberg Fire Department unveils new vehicle

New water tender to hold 3,500 gallons

The Wittenberg Fire Department unveiled its new piece of equipment on May 12.

The fire department received the delivery of a 2022 3,500-gallon water tender, built by S&R Truck of Marshfield and mounted it onto an International chassis, built by Mid-State Truck Service in Marshfield. The price of the new truck came in at \$228,368, which was paid for through donations from the village and town of Wittenberg, Wittenberg Fire and Ambulance Protective Services District, Kolbe and Kolbe, Wausau Chemicals, Remington Foundation, Wittenberg Whitetails Unlimited and Meverden Excavating.

The new water tender was an obvious need for the fire department, as the current water tanker truck is 39 years old, well past the useful life span.

"We bought the old tanker used," said Wittenberg Fire Chief James Sterk. "We used the tanker for about 8-10 years and then we decided that it needed to be replaced, because there were things going wrong with it. We have another tender that is already pushing 30 years."

The water tender will be used to transport water from sources like a fire hydrant, lake or stream to bring to

the scene of the fire.

"Water sources are very important to our rural areas," said Sterk. "We will be shoveling water from our water source to our engine on a structure fire or wildland fire. We set it up with the capability of using it to help with wild land suppression, too."

In terms of the impact on the fire department, Sterk said that it will be much easier for the firefighters to use.

"The older trucks are not as friendly to our backs, because of the way that they were designed back in the day," said Sterk. "Our portable tank that is on the side of the truck actually comes down to where we are not lifting things up over our head — where as with our old tanker we are lifting it up over our head. So, it will help prevent injuries. It will help to make our lives a lot easier."

For those wanting a glimpse of the new vehicle in person, Sterk said that the truck will be on display throughout the summertime community events and parades, including Wittenberg Community Days and Birnamwood Community Days.

The Wittenberg Fire Department covers the village and town of Wittenberg, the village of Elderon, the town of Franzen and other surrounding communities.

Teenager's tale is wrapped in the supernatural

I discovered "Wake the Bones" by Elizabeth Kilcoyne while looking through the InfoSoup. Overall, it was intriguing though it took some work to find some of the backstories.

Laurel Early deeply loves her family's farm tucked into the hills just outside of Dry Valley, Kentucky. It doesn't take long to learn that teenaged Laurel is a bit of an outcast. Long ago the vicious rumor mill of Dry Valley labeled her mother, Anna, a witch because she seemed to have a special bond with the soil. They insist that her death was a suicide.

There is no mention of Laurel's father, but we know that she was raised by her hard-working Uncle Jay Early. She knows he loves her even if he's a taskmaster when it comes to raising their touchy tobacco crop.

Through dreams Anna has told Laurel that she died trying to kill an entity that threatens to consume and destroy the entire valley. She calls it 'devil.'

Her emotional life is tangled up with her best friend, Isaac Graves, and brothers Garrett and Ricky Mobley. They all work on the farm, but their bond goes much deeper. Both Isaac and Garrett are gay and attracted to each other but while Garrett is content to remain in Dry Valley, Isaac is desperate to get away. Laurel and Ricky have one of those love/hate relationships common in their age group. Neither is willing to acknowledge their true feelings.

One other character figures prominently in the book. Christine Maynard has always been an oddity.

Laurel has recently returned to the farm after a failed attempt to become a veterinarian. While figuring things out, Laurel makes a few dollars selling her 'bone art' creations online.

Now middle-aged, she works long hours at the local convenience store. People of Dry Valley have labeled her a witch and avoid her when they can. Christine doesn't deny her abilities.

More than anything, she longs for the images and voice to leave her alone to live a 'normal' life. She doesn't understand it yet, but she will soon become a major player in the lives of Laurel, Isaac, and the Mobley brothers.

Lately Anna Early's messages have become urgent. Suddenly, other-worldly, gruesome creatures begin to threaten Laurel and Isaac. I must abbreviate the events and dialogue in order to get to the meat of the story.

Laurel knows that 'devil' is determined to suck dry her essence and inhabit her body, but she's sure that her mother will help her destroy him instead. When the confrontation comes, Isaac is near death and Laurel is forced to see that her mother is in league with 'devil.'

While Garrett and Jay rush Isaac to the hospital, Laurel remains in the woods hoping to put an end to 'devil.' When Ricky is killed by 'devil,' Laurel remembers Christine's words. She digs her hands deep into the soil and coaxes the dormant plants to emerge and overwhelm 'devil.' After nature prevails it tries to take Ricky's bones down to decompose, but Laurel refuses to let him go.

Months later Garrett and Isaac are together and making plans for the future. During a visit Ricky injures his hand. Despite offers of bandages, he and Laurel rush to leave. That is when we learn about the aftermath of the battle. Laurel called upon the earth to save the man she loves and it complied with one hitch. As part of the living earth, Ricky's injuries now sprout plants instead of blood. One of these days they'll tell Isaac and Garrett, but not right now.

Sometimes we need a little fantasy in our day-to-day lives.

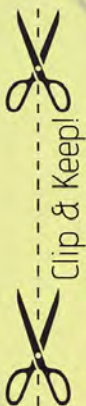

Bonduel wins another CWC meet behind Luepke

Witt-Birn pleased with 2nd place finish

The Bonduel High School boys golf team continued its big spring season with a first-place finish at a May 9 Central Wisconsin Conference meet at Maple Hills Golf Course in Wittenberg.

Bonduel posted a team score of 350. Wittenberg-Birnamwood grabbed second with a 356. Marion placed ninth with a mark of 466, while Gresham/Menominee Indian took 12th with a score of 584.

Reed Luepke led Bonduel on the course, posting an 18-hole round of 81 to finish as the meet medalist.

Waupekenay earned the win on the mound after pitching the first three frames. He struck out four batters while surrendering just one hit and one walk.

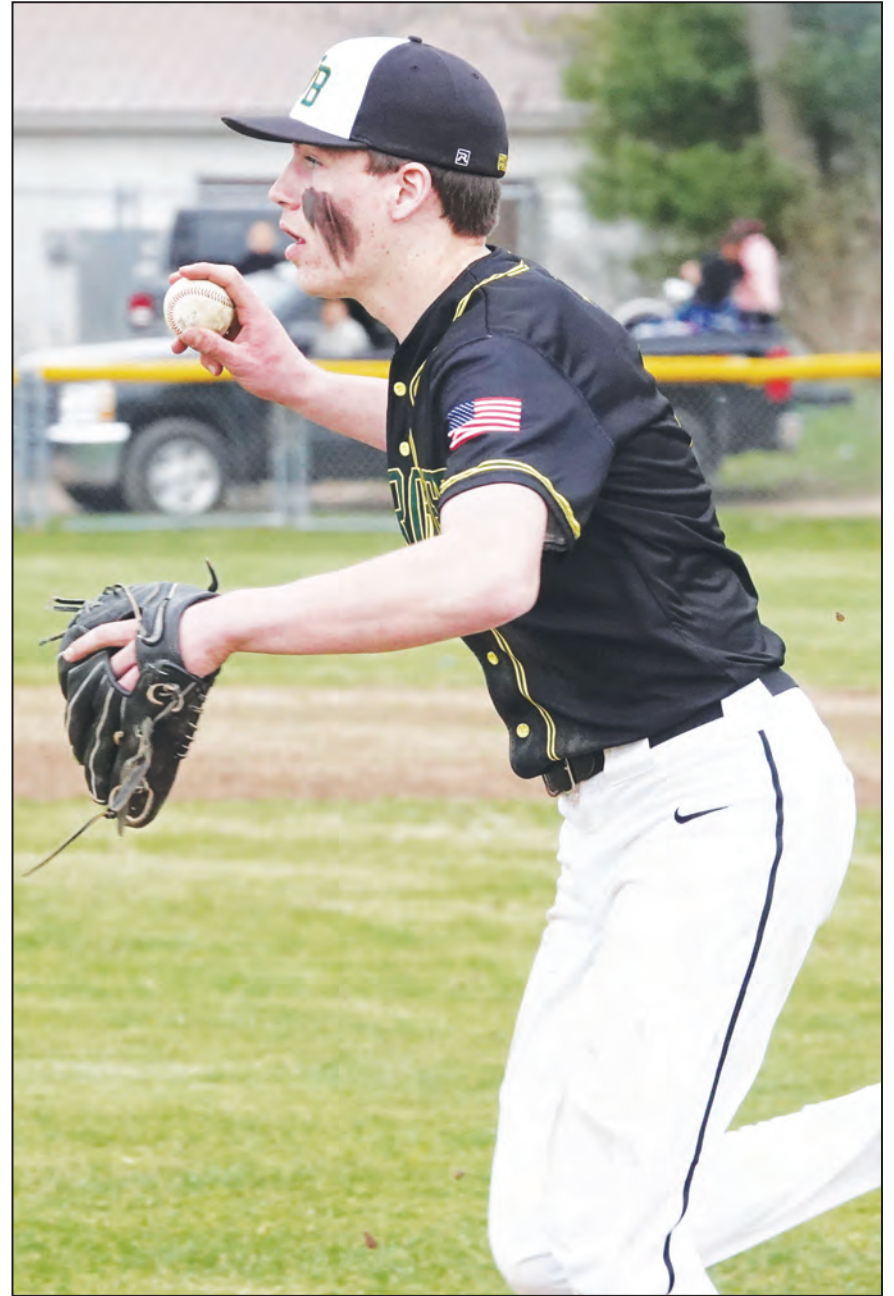
Evan Meverden got the final six outs, striking out three and allowing an unearned run on three hits and two walks.

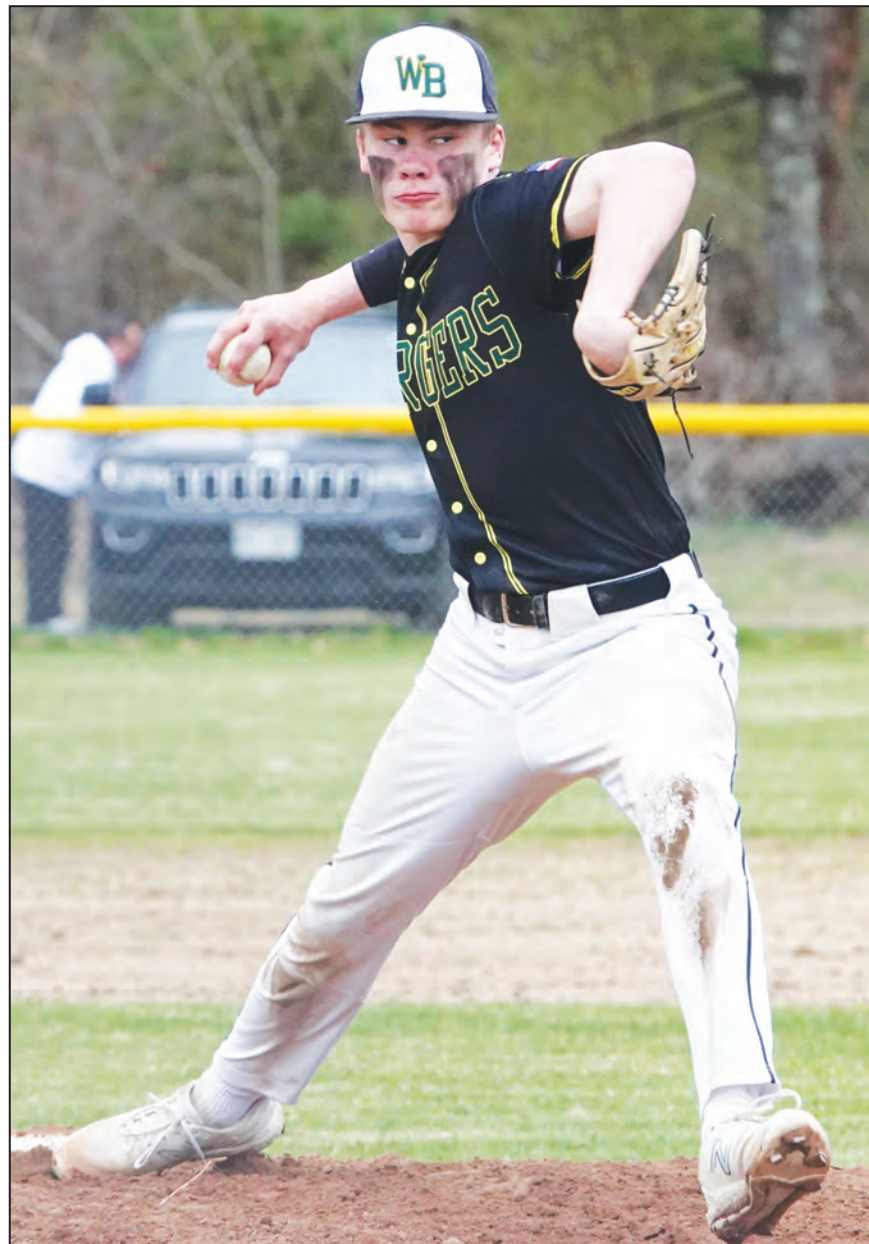

Logging camp in Lakewood recreates lumberjack history

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Logging camp carves its way into history

Lakewood museum provides insight into state's logging history

Handing children a saw near a golf course might not seem like the wisest decision in the world, but in Lakewood, it's hands-on learning for students to understand Wisconsin's logging history.

The Holt and Balcom Logging Camp No. 1, surrounded by McCauslin Brook Golf Course, is considered to the oldest logging camp still on its original site. Created in 1881, the logging camp was used in many different ways until 1929. The camp was given to the Oconto County Historical Society in 1949 but was passed to the McCaslin Lions Club, which restored the building and offered tours.

The historical society was given ownership of the camp again in 2007, and the following year, massive renovations were started and then completed in 2013. Since then, volunteers have conducted tours for school groups during the spring months and opened it up on Saturdays during the summer for residents and visitors alike to learn more.

"I've been involved with the camp since 2005," said Bob Brown, curator for the museum. "I just started out as a volunteer, and then the previous director of the camp recruited me to be the new director. Since that time, Kathie (Marsh, the current director) got involved, and I stepped back to be the curator."

Brown likes to be the curator because he is in charge of the artifacts, what he likes to call "things," and each piece and room tells a story about the men who came out to a remote part of the state and cut down trees so they could be used to build things in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

"We have an educational mission," Brown said. "Fourth graders learn about logging; they learn about Wisconsin history."

Brown can often be seen wearing an apron when giving tours, and that's because he talks inside the cook shack and explains how massive amounts of food were prepared daily for the lumberjacks who went out six days a week to cut timber in order to give them energy to work 12 hours a day or more.

"The cook happens to have been

the most important person in the camp," Brown said. "A guy knows that if he wants to be a logger, he can go to any logging camp in the area, and he will get the same benefits, which is \$1 a day to work and all the food he can eat. So what's the difference between one camp and another? The quality of the food."

Brown enjoys seeing school children come to the camp because they not only get to hear about the lumberjack experience, but they get to have a go at sawing logs themselves and using a stamp hammer to brand the logs with the company's stamp.

"The biggest fun for a kid doing a school tour is sawing the logs," Brown

said. "They love it."

Brown said a lot of the credit for the latest restoration effort goes to Marsh. He pointed out that she raised \$13,000 for the roof, which was the most pressing need in 2007, and then she raised another \$130,000 for additional renovations.

"She sweet talked a whole lot of the local tradesmen into donating their time at either no cost or reduced cost," Brown said. "We got it done. The original buildings were built right on the ground, and the logs were rotting from the bottom."

Brown said he enjoys conducting the tours because it keeps him involved. When he sees a face light up, he knows he's accomplished something that day.

"I'm a retired trust officer, but I am also a fan of history — always have been," Brown said. "If it involves history, I'll be somewhere involved."

(Editor's Note: The Shawano Area Community Foundation, in conjunction with NEW Media, has staged a Celebration of Giving Volunteer of the Year promotion for more than 10 years. Each year, select area volunteers are presented \$1,000 cash grants for their efforts to improve the quality of life in the Wolf River Region. The awards, sponsored by area businesses, are then reinvested into area nonprofit organizations at the direction of the award winners. This is the fourth in a series profiling outstanding volunteers in the community.)

Brandon Reed has a lot more on his plate than the average high school student.

The Shawano Community High School senior, when he's not working on building community in the school as a member of the student council, is a mentor for the Goody Triathlon, helps with holiday food drives and reads to younger children during the holidays and other times of the year.

It's because of all that selflessness and caring that Reed is this year's recipient of the Youth Volunteer Award from the Shawano Area Community Foundation's Celebration of Giving. The award is sponsored by the Shawano Optimists and Shawano Rotary. The \$1,000 gift they gave Reed will go toward Lakeland Industries, which works with individuals with developmental disabilities.

One specific way Reed has given back to the Shawano School District includes spearheading an effort to read "The Polar Express" to elementary students as part of celebrating Christmas, according to Sienna Eimmerman, one of three people who nominated Reed for the SACF award.

"He even dressed the part to spread joy to students," Eimmerman wrote. "Since the positive interaction the high school students had with the young students, Brandon has signed up to participate in Junior Achievement, which takes high school students into elementary classrooms to teach various lessons. He has also worked with National Honor Society to try and find ways to work with the elementary schools in various ways,

including reading during the month of March."

"The Polar Express" event had long been a tradition at SCHS, but it was Reed's idea — at the suggestion of his mother — to take it to the elementary schools in Shawano and bring the story to life for younger children.

"One of my friends and me thought, 'Wouldn't it be funny if we dressed up as characters from the movie?'" Reed said. "It brought a lot of fun to school and a lot of fun to Christmastime. We were able to

not only read but bring cookies and hot chocolate over. We also went to Sacred Heart, as well as the middle school, and that was awesome."

The Goody Triathlon, which just celebrated another successful year in Pulaski, also takes up much of Reed's time as he mentors one of the athletes, according to Erin Cornelius, another nominator.

"Brandon is an exceptional individual that has been participating in the Goody Triathlon mentorship program for five years," Cornelius wrote. "Brandon enjoys creating friend-

ships with students with exceptional needs. He has built a strong bond with one individual. He takes interest in the student and completes activities and conversations that engage that student."

Reed noted that there was one year, 2020, where he worked with the student but did not get to do the triathlon because it, like all other activities, were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He is one of those people who helps out anyone, regardless of who they are.

"I've always had classmates that have been participants," Reed said. "Once I learned there'd be an opportunity to help out, I jumped on it right away."

Being athletic was a benefit for Reed, as he's been on the track, basketball, football and soccer teams. He said a triathlon was not a big deal for him.

Elizabeth Alexander emphasized in her nomination letter how much Reed has worked to bring people together at SCHS, and that it won't be easy finding someone to fill the void.

"Brandon has strengthened the culture and community at SCHS both in and out of school," Alexander wrote. "He has a natural drive to organize and create events to not only financially enrich the community but to develop and strengthen school culture. Brandon truly cares about finding ways to share his talents and serve others. This service will be greatly missed after he graduates, but the work he has done will continue to strengthen our school and community for years to come."

Reed noted that, in general, high school students get a bad reputation from the community because some do not make the best decisions during that time of their lives. He feels that showing that some teens can do good in the community and give back helps to dismiss the "menace to society" moniker they get collectively.

As one of several examples, he mentioned the food drives that the National Honor Society has held to benefit Shawano Area Matthew 25.

"We've made meals for them," Reed said. "We've delivered cards to the nursing homes, and last year we were able to plant some trees."

Dumplings and sauerkraut and my mother-in-law

Kindhearted and loving, my dear mother-in-law left behind a legacy of caring and nurturing and not to mention, wonderful recipes which her children have taken great pains to continue. One daughter makes mean prune kolaches and raised donuts. I make her dumplings, one of her specialties.

"Kay, you have to pack them tight," she'd advise, and "serve them with pork roast and sauerkraut."

These fist-sized potato and bread dumplings could be used as a weapon. One whack upside the head and you'd go down like

David's Goliath.

Beginning with a half loaf of stale bread broke into pieces and saturated with water to make them mushy, I grate a large potato; add two eggs and stir in enough flour to get the stickiness out. Squeezing them together by hand over and over to form firm balls, I add more flour and then a little more. Finally satisfied with the density I carefully drop them into a large pot of bubbling salted water, boiling them for about an hour. The meal is complete with pork roast, gravy and steamy sauerkraut. Prep and clean-up is challenging so this meal is special-occasion serve.

In October 1988 we switched houses with my in-laws. We had together arranged for a time (to be determined) when my husband and I would move to the big farmhouse and they'd move into our smaller Wausau home. Before moving, I caught her one day on her hands and knees, wiping down the floorboards. She was not going to leave behind any dust mite or speck or mess for me to deal with. Precious lady.

She was hard-working, the embodiment of a farm wife and mom. Feeding a big family three meals a day, she'd bake desserts, can and freeze garden produce, keeping a huge vegetable garden alongside raspberry and strawberry patches. On top of that, raising a family of six kids along with her in-laws living upstairs, she'd kept the farm house tidy, laundry day every Monday and help in the barn each morning and evening. She was a superwoman.

When my husband and I were dating, he brought me home to meet

his parents. That supper she brought out pickles, not unusual. Their meals were not complete without a Mason jar full of her pickles. These pickles, however, were arranged on a small ornate pickle plate just because I was there. Years later, we'd "remember the pickle plate" and got a good laugh out of it.

After my husband and I married, she was there for me when I was in the depths of despair during the trials of our infertility years. One day I was at work when again, after thinking this time for sure I was carrying a child, realized with a crushing weight, I was not. At the time I had been carpooling with my sisters-in-law and falling apart at the seams, called my mother-in-law, could you please come take me home?

Meeting me with moist, compassionate eyes, she didn't say much. We cried silently together on the way home, her quietness comforting me more than words. What could she say, truly? Being a tough farmwoman, while softhearted, she was not prone to tears. Sharing soundless tears that day was balm for my soul and I never forgot it,

even when years later, God answered my heartfelt prayers with two adopted sons and a biological daughter. Joyfully, she had greeted each one.

When she became a grandma, she'd dote her love on each and every kid, dishing it out across the board to all with no favorites. She'd have a Christmas love-party every year for the three youngest at that time, our daughter being one of them. They'd have a lunch, giggle through Royal Rummy playing with pennies, all three going home with full bellies and a small present from Grandma. Her and one of our sons shared a birthday and he loved her homemade apple pie so my son got a pie. She loved so well.

Babysitting all her grandchildren at one time or another, occasionally she'd take my daughter to her piano lesson. One day (we had recently switched teachers), she readily agreed to run my little girl to her lesson. I had thought she knew where and our daughter, being young, didn't. I was in the tractor cab when the piano teacher called.

"Kay? Is Jessica coming for her lesson today?"

Immediately my mind went to they were upside down in a ravine somewhere between here and there. Hopping in the car, I scanned the ditches expecting around every corner, to see red and blue lights flashing. Getting back home they were waiting for me, Grandma heartsick she could not find the teacher. Laughing with relief, we rescheduled.

A woman of deep faith, she prayed earnestly for her whole family. As her health declined her children honored her request to stay at home, all of us taking turns caring for her right up to July 9, 2016, when God sent His angels to take her gently home.

Crab apples key source of food for birds

It is just about time for spectacular flowering crab apple trees to come into full bloom. From late April into May, flowering crab apples put on a spectacular show, loaded with masses of colorful blossoms that decorate our yards and landscapes for weeks.

Wherever you plant them, flowering crab apples perform well, as long as they are in full sun to part shade. There are many varieties to choose from. Some of the flowering crab apples grow in a columnar form,

while others grow in a standard tree form.

Flowering crab apples are not just beautiful to look at. They also serve many important purposes for pollinators and other wildlife species. The masses of blooms attract a wide range of pollinating species, such as bees and butterflies. These insects attracted songbirds such as orioles, wrens, tanagers and warblers that feed upon the insects that are drawn to the blooms.

In fall and all throughout the winter season, the fruits of flowering crab apples are an important source of food for migrating songbirds. Often, late in the fall or during the winter, large flocks of cedar waxwings and American robins will descend upon flowering crab apples and literally strip the tree of its fruit in a matter of hours. These flocks roam throughout the area, seeking out fruit trees such as flowering crab apples and others to provide a source of food during the winter season.

Even in the spring, when these birds return, flowering crab apples are an important source of food — especially when heavy snows arrive, as we have seen recently, covering their food sources on the ground.

There are many choices when it comes to flowering crab apples. There are varieties that bloom in pristine, snow white, along with those that bloom in light pink, darker pink and magenta. There are some that bloom in near red.

Foliage of flowering crab apples can vary widely, as well. From

standard green, oval-shaped leaves to purple leaves that are cut, almost like a maple leaf, flowering crab apples are found in a variety of leaf

styles and colors.

The fruits themselves may vary, as well. From tiny, red fruits to those that may be as large as a

quarter in bright yellow or orange are all available.

Flowering crab apple trees make great companion plants or specimen plants in the garden. They can be underplanted with just about anything. Flowering crab apples and bridle wreath spirea, which blooms about the same time, or slightly later, are an excellent pairing. Spring bulbs are also excellent companion plants for flowering crab apples. Tulips and daffodils and hyacinths planted beneath the flowering masses create a spectacular spring garden showpiece.

Any number of perennials that prefer shade to part shade also do well beneath flowering crab apples.

Visit your local garden center or nursery to see the selection of flowering crab apples on display and plant one for years of garden beauty and benefits.

Long-forgotten people get rediscovered

Rededication of Potter's Field includes identifying unmarked graves

Hundreds of long-forgotten individuals buried in an Oconto cemetery will be remembered in a special way on Memorial Day weekend.

Among those to be memorialized are a cigar maker born in Russia, a prize fighter, a survivor of the Peshtigo Fire, a hired man, the wife of a man who died in the 1937 Polish uprising, and two sisters who were daughters of a migrant family that lived and worked seasonally in the Oconto community for over 40 years. All of these individuals and nearly 300 more will soon be getting the long overdue respect they deserve, courtesy of the Oconto County Historical Society.

A monument honoring them will be dedicated on Memorial Day weekend at Evergreen Cemetery in Oconto. The dedication of the Evergreen Cemetery

Potter's Field Memorial will take place at 10 a.m. May 27, at the cemetery, 325 Cook Ave., Oconto.

The term "Potter's Field" refers to the burial sites for individuals who had no family or whose families did not have money to pay for a burial plot. Current records indicate that about 300 people were buried in the Potter's Field areas of Evergreen Cemetery, beginning in the 1850s and continuing into the 1900s. Very few of their names were engraved on markers, but most of the names have been recorded in the cemetery's record books.

One individual buried in the Potter's Field is a distant relative of Peter Gabrielson. Gabrielson serves on the board of the Oconto County Historical Society and Evergreen Cemetery. He stumbled upon records of Potter's Field burials while searching for the burial site of his grandfather's sister. She died as an infant shortly after the family arrived in America in 1893.

In 2017, Gabrielson started recording the names of the deceased buried in Potter's Field and researching their lives using genealogical websites and digitized newspapers to find information about the deceased. As a result, he published the Oconto Evergreen Cemetery Potter's Field Research Project.

"It's been a project that's been so fascinating for me," Gabrielson said.

Over hundreds of hours, Gabrielson tracked down the names and tidbits of information about the individuals buried in the unmarked graves. The plaza is a lasting tribute of respect for the individuals buried in the Potter's Field.

The plaza, located on the south side of the cemetery, features a granite boulder with a bronze plaque, which reads in part, "This monument is dedicated to ensure that the final resting place of these departed souls will remain forever consecrated and their names will be forever remembered."

The plaza also features 36 granite paver stones engraved with the names and interment dates of 287 individuals buried at the cemetery in unmarked graves. In addition, two marker stones have been placed on the north edge of the cemetery which identify that section as another Potter's Field burial area.

The May 27 dedication ceremony is sponsored by the Oconto County Historical Society. The ceremony will not only recognize the deceased but also the living who contributed their time and resources. The Leon H. and Clymene M. Bond Foundation is a major

supporter, providing a \$20,525 grant.

Other contributors include Brian Vandenlangenberg of Oconto City Monument Company; Scott and Brandon Tousey of Scott's Concrete; Jeremy Wusterbarth and the city of Oconto Department of Public Works; Greg and Lilly Mortier, Creative Curbing and Design; Carl Liegeois, Carlie's Landscaping; Jeff and David Lane, L2 Custom Engraving; Laurie Wusterbarth, Oconto County register of deeds; the Oconto County Genealogical Society, especially Kitty Werner and Vern Mortier; and Peter's wife, Patty Gabrielson, whose support from the beginning never wavered.

Gabrielson encouraged individuals to attend the dedication to honor the people who made the memorial possible, to honor the deceased, and to acknowledge the empathy, compassion, and fair treatment that all people are entitled to.

"The time has come for us to give these individuals the recognition and respect that they deserve; in fact, have deserved for a long time," Gabrielson said.
