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Seymour man faces sex assault charges

Rudnick allegedly met two victims online and then assaulted them at park in Lessor

A Seymour man is facing a second set of charges involving sexual assault two months after the first case was brought against him.

Jacob D. Rudnick, 29, is being charged with two counts of third-degree sexual assault and one count of second-degree sexual assault for an attack that allegedly took place in a park in the Town of Lessor on Halloween last year. The Seymour Police Department initially took the victim's statement and collected evidence from her before handing it over to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

Rudnick is facing another case involving a sexual assault that reportedly took place in July of this year in Lessor. In that case, he faces two

counts of second-degree sexual assault.

Rudnick was free on a \$100,000 cash bond from the July case when he was arrested Sept. 12 in Seymour. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma assessed a \$200,000 cash bond against Rudnick, even though the district attorney's office requested a \$1 million bond.

According to online court records, Rudnick remains in the Shawano County Jail.

Criminal complaints allege that both incidents occurred after Rudnick first encountered the victims online via Snapchat. The first victim told law enforcement a friend had been messaging a guy who "became freaky." She said she talked with the guy whose screen name was "cuddlebug" and that he "wanted to be friends."

The victim told law enforcement that she rode with Rudnick to the park at 1 p.m. Oct. 31, 2022, according to the criminal complaint. She claimed that Rudnick forcibly attempted intercourse on a park trail, in a vehicle and in the women's restroom at the park. The complaint states that the victim, who has disabilities, allegedly stayed with Rudnick at his home for a couple of days before going to the park.

The second victim reported the sexual assault on the same day it happened and told law enforcement she initially met Rudnick on the dating site Hily on July 17. After a day, the two switched to communicating on Snapchat, and this time Rudnick allegedly went by the screen name "nightrider165."

The victim's in-person encounter with Rudnick took place July 19 at a park in Black Creek. The victim had

a female friend who drove her to the park. After chatting and walking around for a bit, Rudnick allegedly suggested going to another park and that the victim should ride with him, with the friend following.

On the way, the two vehicles were separated by distance, and the friend tried to text the victim, but Rudnick allegedly took the phone away and started to grope the victim. Rudnick allegedly drove the victim to Moeller Ridge Nature Park and assaulted her before taking her to her mother's house and dropping her off.

Rudnick faces up to 40 years in prison for each of the second-degree assaults, along with \$100,000 in fines, and the third-degree assault charges each carry 10-year prison sentences and \$25,000 in fines.

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Annexation approved for Kolby project

Matter comes back later in September so permanent zoning can be approved

A housing project in the southern part of Shawano has received the green light to become part of the city.

Kolby Construction, based in Birnamwood, purchased 31.25 acres in August and plans to develop the lots within the next two years, which includes paying for roads, utilities and other necessary infrastructure. The total cost for this project is expected to be more than \$2.2

million, so Kolby Muscha, owner of the company, asked the city to help offset some of those costs. The council approved a \$750,000 loan in July from funding for Tax Increment Financing District 7 to help build 31 lots just south of Northeastern Wisconsin Technical College's Shawano campus.

The property being purchased is in the boundaries of the Town of Waukechon, so Muscha submitted a petition to the city for annexation. Currently, the road to be used to reach the development, Thomas Avenue, ends at the NWTC campus, so it will be extended once the lots begin to develop.

The annexation petition cleared its first hurdle as the Shawano Finance Committee gave its recommendation to proceed Sept. 7. The petition received final approval from the Shawano Common Council on

Sept. 13 to become part of the city, now nestled in the 6th Aldermanic District.

The land is temporarily zoned single family residential. The city's plan commission will make recommendations on the permanent zoning following a public hearing later in September, which must be brought back to the council for final approval.

City Clerk Lesley Nemetz and City Administrator Eddie Sheppard met with Waukechon town officials in August to inform them of the annexation. Nemetz said the town officials seemed to be in agreement, not wanting to lose the property from its tax rolls but realizing the action would bring more people to the area. "We will submit this to the state and the county for recording, and then we will be able to move on," Nemetz said.

Sheppard noted that Waukechon

Street south of County Road B will be utilized during the construction period for development traffic so that there isn't so much traffic on Thomas Avenue around NWTC and Shawano Community High School, but it would not be part of the annexation, as there would be some property in the area that will remain part of the Town of Waukechon and would have become an island, something not allowed under state law.

Sheppard said that the deal was struck when talking with town officials.

Kolby Construction has closed on the property, according to Sheppard, and there are plans to develop the land during the winter months so that utility and road work can begin in the spring, followed by home construction.

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Over 2,000 bookings at county jail in 2022

Sheriff's office releases annual report that shows number of incidents down from last year

Shawano County deputies made an average of 1.77 arrests each day last year and booked more than 2,000 people into the county jail throughout the 12 months of 2022.

Those numbers and more are part of the 2022 sheriff's office annual report filed last month with the Shawano County Board of Supervisors.

Crimes against persons, property and society generally ran between 40 and 80 each month, with a low of 37 in March and a high of 81 in November.

Crime against property include burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, forgery, fraud and vandalism. Of these crimes, there were 48 arrests made and 55 of 266 cases cleared.

Crime against persons included assaults, sex offenses, and one non-forcible sex offense. Of these, there were 61 arrests, and 73 of 119 offenses cleared.

Crimes against society include weapons and drug violations. These resulted in 186 arrests, with 281 of 321 offenses cleared.

All told, deputies made 647 total arrests, which included 572 adults and 75 juveniles.

Arrests of adults included 139 driving under the influence and 81 disorderly conducts. Juvenile arrests included 39 disorderly conducts and three trespassing.

Law enforcement incidents across all of Shawano County included 13,044 by the sheriff's office, down from the 14,987 reported in 2021.

City of Shawano police incidents were reported at 8,236, also down from the 8,498 of 2021. Stockbridge-Munsee police reported 1,720 incidents, up from the 823 of 2021.

Total incidents numbered 23,090, down from the 24,308 reported in 2021.

In addition to courtroom security, general patrol duties, and tickets and paperwork, deputies also spend a lot of time transporting prisoners to and from the jail across the street to the courthouse for hearings. It is estimated three to six prisoners are transported daily for these hearings.

Criminal summons cases are held Tuesdays, and between three and 10 inmates are taken to these each week.

Each inmate stays with a deputy

at all times, and a deputy is present for the entire court hearing. On special occasions (high profile hearings) the protocol is to have multiple deputies with one inmate.

When an inmate is transported to court for a jury trial, the courthouse security officer spends the entire time with the inmate, and this could be days. There is at least one of these per week. Transports are scheduled for out-of-county prisoners and those sentenced to the state prison system.

The sheriff's office also honors numerous special requests from departments in the courthouse. These include family court for a divorce hearing, an unruly person in child support, all restraining order hearings and firearms surrender hearings, and bank transports.

In the jail, there were 2,229 bookings of which 65% were male and 35% female. Also, 51% of those booked were white, 42% were Native American and 4% were Black.

The average inmate spent 15 days and seven hours in the jail.

Harvest season means more risk to power lines

As the annual fall harvest season gets underway, Alliant Energy is reminding farmers of the importance of staying safe when operating farm equipment near power lines.

Contact incidents with electric power lines significantly increase this time of year, according to Alliant. The fall harvest season is riskier for several reasons. More equipment is deployed in the field; the equipment tends to be larger, such as combines, wagons and tractors; and farmers often work in the dark when it's difficult to see poles and wires.

In addition to the risk of an injury or fatality, contact with power lines

can interrupt electric service. That can halt work and slow electricity-dependent farm activities such as grain drying.

To help keep farmers safe and the power on for all, Alliant Energy offers the following safety steps:

- Maintain a safe distance. Always stay at least 10 feet from all power lines and power poles. Look up, down and all around before moving or raising your equipment. Conduct a thorough visual check of your surroundings.

- Know your equipment's height. Do not drive under power lines if any part of your equipment is too

tall to clear them. Consider the additional height of antennas and GPS receivers. If you purchased new equipment, don't assume it has the same clearance as your old equipment.

- Do not attempt to raise power lines. Never try to elevate power lines to allow passage of tall equipment.

- Be aware of your turning radius. Make sure your tractor and anything you tow does not swing into poles or overhead lines when you turn. Pay special attention at the ends of rows and field entrances. If you hit a power pole, it could break, dropping a live line. Assume it's energized and call 800-255-4268 immediately.

- Remain vigilant during grain handling and storage. Be cautious when you set up and move equipment, particularly when you use booms, augers and grain bins. These operations can bring you close to overhead lines. Keep grain augers in their lowest position and lower truck bed boxes before moving.

- Stay alert, especially when it gets dark. Know where poles and overhead lines are at all times.

- Know what to do if an over-

head line contacts equipment. Stay on the equipment. Do not step to the ground. Call 911 and wait until a qualified person tells you it is safe to exit the vehicle. If you must leave the equipment because of a fire or other danger, jump away from the vehicle to avoid touching the equipment and the ground at the same time. To the best of your ability, land with both feet together and then quickly shuffle away — keeping your feet together and on the ground.

- Report damage to wires and poles to avoid power disruptions during harvest season or disruptions down the road.

Never assume a power line is safe to touch. If work requires you to be near a line, call 800-255-4268 and explain the situation. Alliant Energy will discuss options with you or go to your site to make the area safe. If an individual or equipment contacts a power line, do not touch the victim or item. Call 911 and inform the dispatcher of the electrical accident. Always seek medical help for an electrical contact accident, as some injuries might not be visible or can appear several hours later.

NWTC alum now paralegal due to scholarship

Returning adult students like Sacheck could benefit from proposed college \$2M endowment

Stephanie Sacheck is a single mother who was working hard to make ends meet.

The Shawano resident said she was working in a “dead end job” and was more interested in being a paralegal, so she found out that Northeast Wisconsin Technical College might be a good option to pursue a degree.

However, seeing as she was the only parent to her children, and all the money was going to pay for food, rent and other basic life necessities, setting aside some money for tuition was not an option. Sacheck initially tried for federal loans, but her ticket to higher education came when she earned a scholarship from NWTC.

“I heard a lot of good things about them,” Sacheck said, noting NWTC’s Shawano campus was close to home for her. “My brother had gone to NWTC, and I wanted to be close to where I lived. I had two kids to think about.”

Sacheck had to write an essay explaining what she was going to school for, and her words earned her the scholarship. With money no longer being an object, she could now focus on her studies, and in 2022, she earned her legal studies/paralegal degree. She now works out of the Heritage Law Firm in Shawano helping with estate planning and other issues.

“The first year was hard, because you don’t know how much to pour your heart out,” Sacheck said. “After that, it just got easier.”

While NWTC has a number of scholarships available, the NWTC Educational Foundation is looking at establishing a \$2 million endowment that would provide up to \$100,000 in scholarships annually for adult students in the Shawano area. Jeannie Otto, director for NWTC’s Shawano and Oconto Falls campuses, said that \$258,000 has been raised for the endowment, but the college still has a long way to go.

“We’ve seen a greater need in the community, specifically to help returning adults in the Shawano area, with some extra financial support,” Otto said. “Because of that, instead of going out every year asking for additional help, we’re trying to start a scholarship fund to make college possible through an endowment, and all the funds will stay in the greater

Shawano area and help students here.”

According to Otto, there are about 1,700 students from the Shawano area attending classes at NWTC, whether it’s at the local campus, the one in Green Bay or in other locations. The endowment fund would be open to all Shawano County residents and a few communities near its border, she said.

NWTC has won some money from the 100 Women Who Care program in Shawano to help returning adult students, but that was used up in a short period of time. With the endowment, the funding is expected to be available in perpetuity, with the expectation that 100 students could receive \$1,000 scholarships, according to Otto, although some students could get higher amounts. In 30 years time, the foundation’s endowment could help produce 3,000 more graduates, she said.

Currently, the average cost of one year of tuition at NWTC ranges from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

Shawano has a Dollars for Scholars program, but its primary focus is on students graduating high school, although it has a limited number of scholarships available

for adults, Otto said.

“This fund would be a legacy for our community,” Otto said.

Michael Maas, Sacheck’s supervisor, noted that Sacheck started with his firm as an intern as a requirement for the paralegal/legal studies degree.

“It helps both ways, for the employer and the student to fulfill their requirements,” Maas said. “This returning student thing is so attractive to me, because it took me 10 years to complete my bachelor’s. You start out at one school and go to another school, and you’re not focused. I was also in the military and took a four-year break. In that four years, I got married and had my first child, so coming back to school was a shock to the system.”

Returning students have more incentive, in Maas’ view, to be focused and complete their studies.

“It’s something they’re choosing,” Maas said. “It’s not something they’re doing right out of high school. Stephanie fit that mold, obviously, as a single mom.”

With a background in finance, Maas agreed that the endowment is

the best way to help adult students, because it is not a situation where money goes in, money comes back out, and the college is stuck back at square one. With \$2 million potentially in the fund at a given time, the college won’t always be working on fundraisers or other campaigns to bring money in, he said.

“You’re actually just taking money in,” Maas said. “You’re not giving it out until you have enough with a guarantee that only 5% will come out for scholarships, and then you don’t need another dollar. You’re not depleting your funds.”

Library expansion work begins in Lakewood

Community dream begins lengthy process with groundbreaking ceremony featuring dignitaries

The Town of Lakewood and neighboring communities broke ground Sept. 13 on a \$1.5 million expansion of a beloved public library that has an abundance of patrons but not of space.

More than 100 people from northern Oconto County joined town officials, Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Assistant Superintendent Darrell Williams and representatives at the county, state and federal levels as they tossed dirt to make a longstanding community dream a reality.

Tom Thielke, co-chairman for the expansion project, talked about the history of the land where the current Lakes Country Public Library sits and the adjacent land off state Highway 32. He noted that the area used to be farm fields before progress came to the northern area, which included the library first being built in the 1980s after elementary schools in Lakewood and Townsend closed and left the area without a place for books.

However, even after an expansion was done in the 1990s, it was clear the library was still too small, and more needed to be done, according to Thielke.

"It's a big day," he said about the groundbreaking, noting that the summer reading program had 88 children that participated.

Among the funds already pledged are a \$500,000 grant U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin was able to get the library through federal earmarks, as well as \$300,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funds that Oconto County has approved.

Kathleen Marsh, co-chairwoman for the project and the driving force behind the fundraising, noted that much of the money for the expansion has been raised in the last 18 months. That surprised her, she said, as she figured she'd need five years to raise the funds.

"Many people told us this day would never come, that we could never raise enough money for this project," Marsh said. "Here we are, \$1.37 million later, and well on our way to our goal. It took more than a village. It took more than a community. It took more than Oconto County to do this."

Marsh noted that she's received

a lot of comments from people who love the library, including, "I don't know what I would do without the library," and "I would have lost my mind or killed my husband during the pandemic if it wasn't for the library."

That resulted in many people expressing their gratitude with their wallets, Marsh said. She noted one man donated as he resides nearby at Lakewood Assisted Living. She said there was also a woman who donated \$5,000 on her own.

"She took her savings at the age of 21, making \$7.25 an hour, and gave it to us so we could put soundproofing and other amenities into our telemedicine room and the adjoining one for kids who grew up with sensory disabilities. It touched my heart," Marsh said. "There are so many people I could thank, and 'thank you' doesn't do it anymore. I wish they would find a new word for this."

Williams, who oversees libraries as part of his work with the DPI, noted that the groundbreaking was a much more positive thing than when he'd last been in Oconto County. He was with the state's emergency

management and had to deal with some flooding issues around Oconto, so he expressed gladness that his latest visit involved expanding a library and not contending with people's misery.

Williams noted the 10 minutes spent recognizing all the people who have been involved with the library groundbreaking, from the town board members who have supported efforts to the county board members who signed off on the ARPA funds.

"I know it takes a lot, but it's well worth it," Williams said. "We want to make sure that we don't forget anybody, because everybody who has had a hand, come in, or made any kind of effort to this project, we want to make sure you're recognized."

Williams noted that the place where he grew up — Abbeville, Mississippi — was a tiny community of over 300 people with no library. Anyone who wanted to go to the library in nearby Oxford had to ride their bicycle or, in lieu of wheels, hitchhike.

"It was at that library that I was exposed to all of the opportunities that was there," Williams said. "This

is what I tell people all the time — the library is the most important place in any school and in any community. It is the only place where you can go everywhere without going anywhere. While you may not read every book that is in the library, there should be a book for everyone in the library."

Libraries are not possible without community support, Williams noted as he acknowledged Katie Essermann, the library's director, and others involved in planning for the expansion.

"All of that effort, all of that energy, whether it be in front of the camera or behind the scenes, it all plays a big piece in the puzzle of why we're here today," Williams said. "Libraries are truly the heartbeat of this community, and I will tell you that they are the vessels for which kids get a chance to be exposed to the world."

The library expansion is expected to be completed in summer 2024. Marsh noted the library is remaining open during the construction work.

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Investigation of swan, heron kills continues

An investigation continues into the illegal shooting of three swans and a great blue heron at a state wildlife area near Navarino.

Clark Delzer, a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources conservation warden based in Shawano, is leading the investigation of the shootings, which were reported in late August at the Navarino Wildlife Area.

"We're still working leads, still working on the investigation," he said. "There's not a lot that we can really disclose, as it is a pending investigation."

The DNR received a report Aug. 27 of three young trumpeter swans that had been found dead in the wildlife area, a state-owned property that covers nearly 15,000 acres in southern Shawano and northeastern Waupaca counties.

The heron was found the following day, and Delzer believes the shootings are connected.

"It's not uncommon to have illegal shootings across the state," Delzer said. "Stuff like this happens. Anything pertaining to a federally protected species like a trumpeter swan is more uncommon. I'm not familiar with this happening in Shawano County before."

Tim Ewing oversees the Navarino Nature Center, which is adjacent to the Navarino Wildlife Area.

"There have been things that have happened in the past," he said. "There have been poaching and other issues before. It is unfortunate that this incident has happened and that we're having issues again."

Delzer said calling the DNR's Violation Hotline — 800-TIP-WDNR — is the best way to provide any information about the case.

"We have 24/7 dispatchers that can relay information to me," he said. "Informants can remain anonymous if they choose to leave their information."

"I know they are trying to get everybody to keep their ears open and, if they hear something, to call it into the tip line," Ewing said. "You can remain anonymous, and that's how they're hoping to get the information that leads to a break in the case."

The nature center doesn't have a reward program, he said.

"We're not set up to be able to do anything like that as a nonprofit," he said. "I know there have been people that have come forward that would be willing to donate to that."

The shootings have become a hot topic of conversation at the nature center, according to Ewing.

"A lot of people are upset because we've had a lot of bird watchers, photographers and wildlife individuals that have been coming to the wildlife

area and watching these birds nest," he said. "This year, they had seven over the course of the summer. They did lose three to natural selection and that kind of stuff, but they had four that were of decent size that basically made it past that point that they may lose any more."

The three swans were born this year, Ewing said.

"The parents are still around on the flowage, and people are still watching them," he said. "It was the young cygnets that were shot. We're probably talking four to five months old at the max. We've had trumpeter swans nesting on the wildlife area, and we do believe it is the same pair that has been setting up shop for the last several years."

Ewing noted the swans set up at

the same location on the McDonald Flowage along McDonald Road and were unsuccessful with raising cygnets. This year, the swans and their cygnets could be sighted in the water 20 feet from passing vehicles.

"That's why this hits so close to home for everybody," Ewing said. "People were really watching them, and they were able to get a good view of them. I had one guy call from Appleton, and he had been up here week after week after week trying to document the growth of the babies. He was really upset about it."

Delzer is confident the case will eventually be solved.

"We work as hard as we can on cases like this, especially these high-level ones," he said. "We are hopeful that we'll be able to solve this case."

Reconstruction underway on Waukechon Street

Waukechon Street in the city of Shawano is closed to through traffic until Oct. 20. The street reconstruction project began Sept. 11.

The closure will be from Green Bay Street to Lieg Avenue. The intersec-

tion of Richmond Street will remain open as much as possible to allow traffic to cross to the other side of Richmond. There will be a short period of time that this intersection will need to be closed for paving.

Access will also be given to businesses on Waukechon Street for the duration of the project. The detour will be from East Green Bay Street to Lincoln Street to Lieg Avenue.

This project is being funded with

an 80/20 Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Grant, meaning the federal grant will cover 80% of the costs, and the city must pay for 20% of the costs. The city was awarded \$1.3 million toward this project.

Stand up to prevent justice's impeachment

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Meating the challenge at the state fair

Pingel Processing gets third place for dried/smoked beef; other entries in top 15

Although Pingel Processing LLC didn't actually bring home the bacon at the 2023 Wisconsin State Fair meat competition, its entry in the Dried or Smoked Beef category brought home an honorable mention third-place ribbon. This was quite an accomplishment for owners Dallas and Dani Pingel and their full-service meat market and wild game processing plant in Red River, as it was the first time they entered products into competition at the annual fair.

Dallas Pingel's efforts last June to submit his house-made meat products to the Wisconsin State Fair 2023 meat competition turned out to be a winning move. The third-place submission was a whole muscle round out of beef that was injected, brined, smoked and shaved.

"We always wanted to do it," Pingel said. "But the deadline always snuck up on us. This year, we were committed and did it."

Pingel Processing also entered five other products in other categories, with the Pingels noting all of them placed within the top 15. The other products they submitted were bratwurst, olive loaf, ring bologna, jalapeno cheddar snack sausage and bacon.

Considering they were competing against 100 other meat plants, this is a significant showing for a first-time competitor. Pingel said that he was familiar with some of the other meat plants that competed.

"There are some that we watch win other awards, like federal awards, and they go to Germany and win awards," he said. "There is some big competition there, bigger companies."

The dried beef entry was sold at the Governor's Blue Ribbon Meat Products Auction. A meat market in Middleton, UW Provision, placed the winning bid of \$1,900. The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation was the recipient of the auction's total proceeds, which was more than \$105,000. The foundation supports 4-H activities, conferences, teaching materials and workshops, and more.

All of the products that Pingel submitted to the fair are sold in the retail area of the plant, which has been in Red River for about four years. Previously, it was on Main Street in Shawano.

"Everything we sell is made here," Pingel said. "We make over 40 different flavors of brats; we have a huge variety of snack sticks, summer sausage, jerkies, bacon. Everything is made on site. Everything is processed here. We do make homemade pizza, with homemade sausage, pepperoni, bacon."

The fresh meat case includes a variety of beef, including steaks, roasts, ground chuck and brats. Chicken, stuffed pork chops and other products are also for sale.

"We have meat bundles; those are really popular heading into the winter," Dani Pingel said. "The cool thing about that is that Dallas is very good in that, even if you order a bundle and you're not really a big fan of chuck roasts and want more ground chuck, he'll make the bundle exactly what you want."

Dallas Pingel said that the plant processes a lot of wild game, including deer and bear. He employs three to six workers, depending on the time of year. They work on venison trim all year-round. During winter, they are in a crunch to process deer, so the venison trim may get backed up.

"We're the only processor that is still taking whole deer," Pingel said. "When a deer is brought in properly field-dressed, we skin it, cut it, grind it, wrap it. Everything is vacuum sealed. We make over 50 kinds of venison sausage, bacon, snack sticks,

bologna, hot dogs."

"The venison scraps that a customer may have in the freezer after processing a deer can be brought to us any time of the year," Dani Pingel added. "If it's off-season, it's like a two week turn-around."

In addition to the meat products in the retail store, Dallas Pingel explained that most of what they sell is made in Wisconsin.

"We sell local maple syrup. We have a variety of soups that are made locally," he noted.

Other items in the store include barbecue sauce, seasonings, cheese and even locally made buns for hamburgers and brats.

Winning at the fair puts Pingel Processing on the way to future wins and becoming known throughout the state for its products and services. Although they didn't bring home the bacon, the company's bacon entry came in 13th.

On a personal level, I love writing. My husband, like so many of my students, considers it torture. I have the gift; he does not. Oh, he has many talents — knowing how to live compatibly with me chief among them.

Then there's bowling. He loves bowling; he's still very good at it. Some years ago, we bowled in a couple's league at Rusty's Wabeno Bowl. I went only because he wanted me to. I'd rather have stayed home to read a good book, but the bright spot is that my performance on the alleys was so pathetic that it gave everyone else comfort. Compared to me, they didn't look so bad. So there's that.

Wait, a philosophical question

suddenly occurs to me. Are we good at something because we love it, or do we love it because we're good at it? Hmmm.

I like good food, and I'm a good cook. I enjoy baking, yet I rarely eat the breads and desserts I make. Jon also likes good food, but he definitely does not know his way around the kitchen. In 36 years of marriage, I can't recall him ever baking anything, but he never turns down a brownie or a cookie or a piece of pie that I, or anyone else for that matter, bakes and sets in a place he can reach.

So back to that philosophical question. I love the fact that Jon loves my cooking. It gives me pleasure to please him with a delicious meal or favorite dessert. I enjoy writing this column. When people say they enjoy reading it, I savor their compliments. So whether it's writing, bowling, cooking or anything else, I think we love doing things we're good at, and good at doing things we love. What really rocks is doing something we love that we are good at for those we love who love us all the more for doing it.

The many varieties of panicle



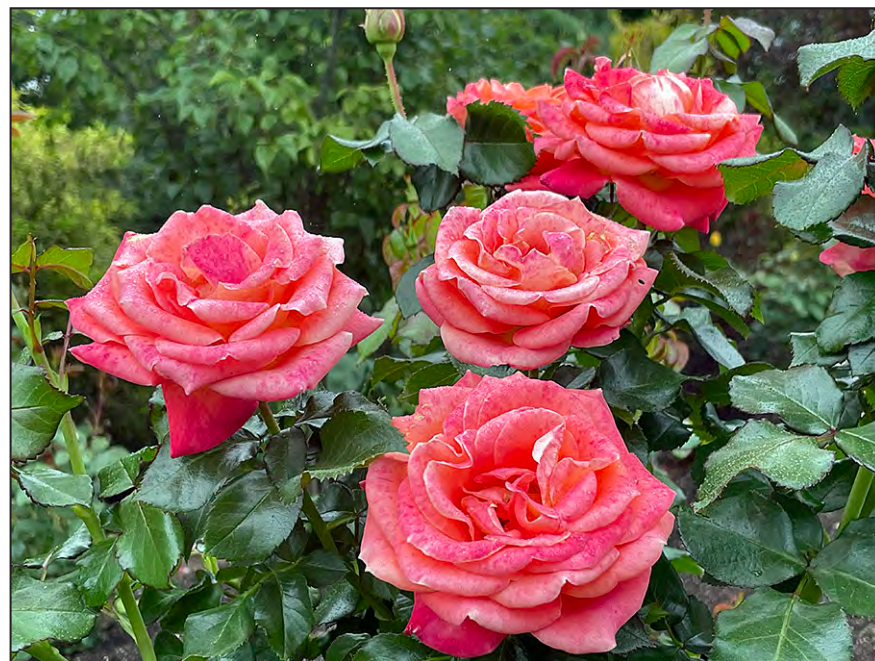

hydrangeas are exceptional for September beauty. As the season goes on, many of the panicles begin to transform into shades of pink and red. Vanilla Strawberry, Strawberry Sundae, Quick Fire, Little Lime and others are exceptional examples of hydrangeas that look their best in the cooler days of September.

Bottle Gentian is a beautiful fall wonder in stunning cobalt blue. This native wildflower is an excellent choice for damp places, such as ditches or shorelines.

Native turtleheads are also beautiful, as are their garden companion hybrids in bright pink. These are also excellent for migrating hummingbirds that move through during September.

Flowering shrubs such as dogwoods, viburnums, ninebarks and others also look stunning as they begin to transform into their fall colors. Many

of these feature clusters of berries that are wonderful choices for migrating songbirds during the month.

Menominee tribe gets HRSA funds to combat opioids

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) recently announced over \$1 million in awards to rural communities in Wisconsin to support key strategies to respond to the overdose risk from fentanyl and other opioids.

Among the recipients are the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, which received \$289,231. The funds will be earmarked for prevent-

ing and addressing neonatal exposure.

Across the country, more than 100,000 people die each year from overdose, according to an HRSA press release. Individuals who call rural communities home and who are experiencing opioid use disorder — including from fentanyl, heroin or other opioids — can face challenges in accessing treatment and recovery services.

Geographic isolation and trans-

portation barriers can make finding treatment particularly challenging, and limited mental health and substance use disorder health care providers in the community can further complicate access. The stigmatization of substance use disorder and its treatments are additional barriers to access. HRSA's funding is targeted to helping communities address these critical needs and expand access to services.

"Far too many rural families have

faced the devastation of overdose, and these deaths are felt deeply across rural communities — where often everyone knows someone lost too soon," said HRSA Administrator Carole Johnson. "That's why the investments we are announcing today are targeted to rural communities and tailored to the unique challenges of helping rural health care leaders expand access to treatment and build recovery pathways to prevent overdose."

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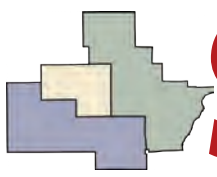
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Pulaski blanks Shawano with a pair of second-half goals

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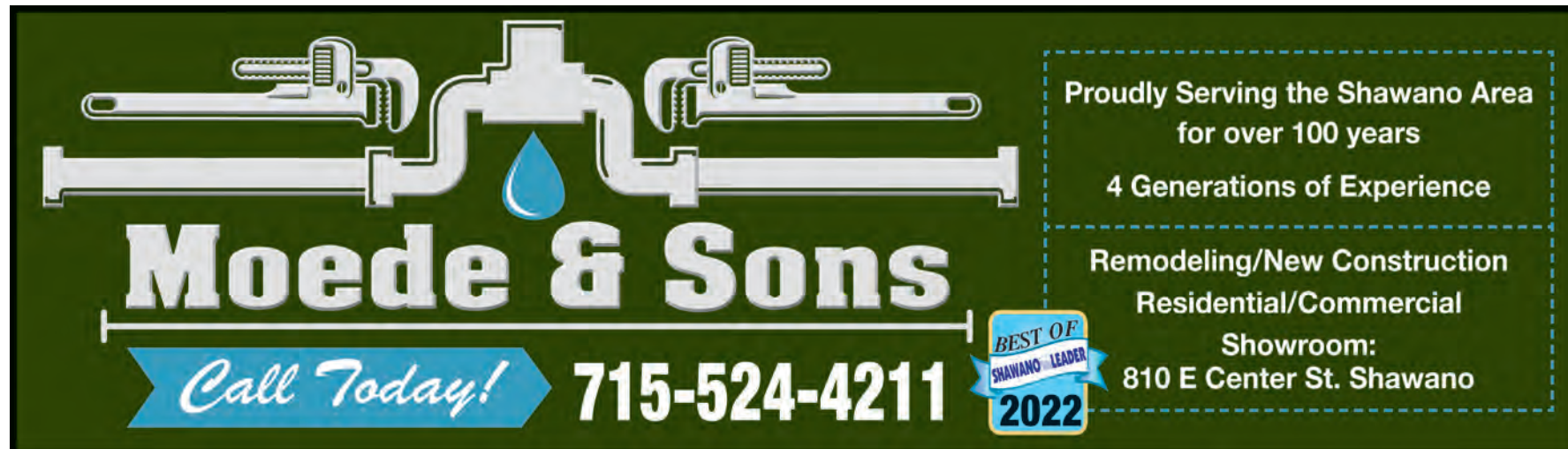

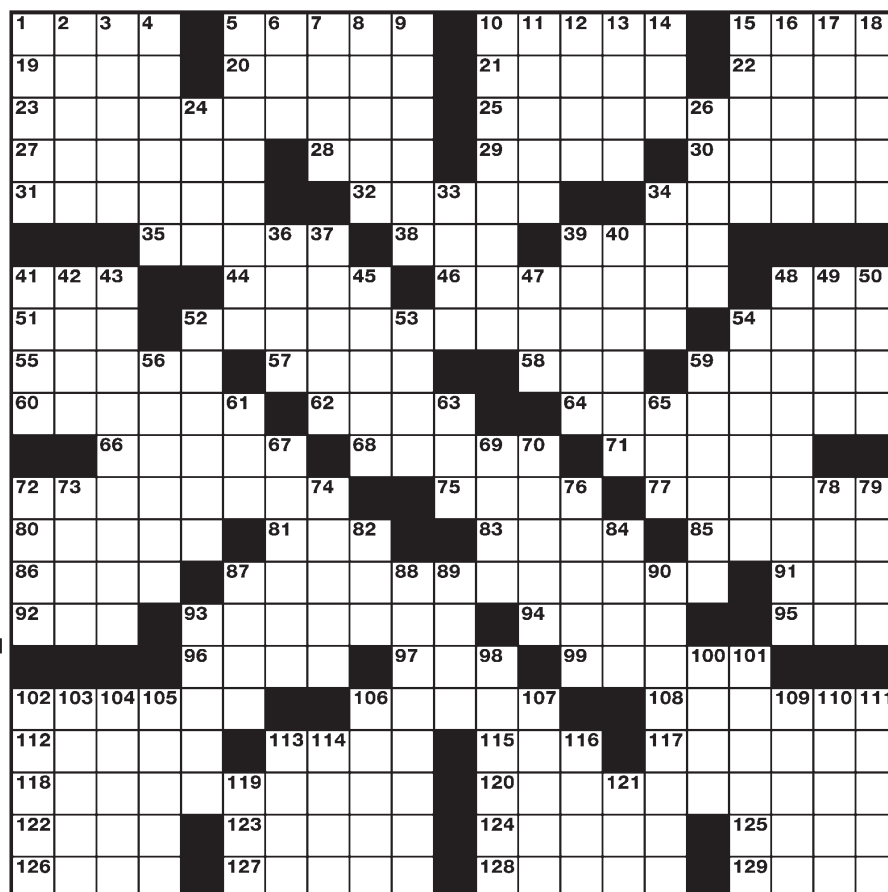

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Kasper pleads guilty to Jan. 6 crimes

Pulaski man used pepper spray on Capitol law enforcement officers during riot

A Pulaski man charged with pleaded guilty Friday to assaulting, resisting or impeding police officers during the Jan. 6, 2021, breach of the U.S. Capitol.

Riley D. Kasper, 24, faces maximum penalties of up to eight years in prison if the offense involved physical contact with the assault victim.

Kasper was at the Capitol when a vast number of persons were attempting to disrupt a joint session of the U.S. Congress convened to certify the electoral votes cast in the 2020 presidential election.

Authorities gathered evidence against Kasper after obtaining a search for his Facebook account.

Kasper was arrested in Ashland in March 2022.

According to court documents, on Jan. 6, 2021, at approximately 1:50 p.m., Kasper sprayed an aerosol canister of what is believed to be pepper spray toward law enforcement officers attempting to secure the Capitol building and grounds.

Kasper also was communicated on social media with a person identified by initials N.L. stating, "I pepper sprayed 3 cops so bad they got undressed and went home," and "As you can see in that video, it was my group that busted the first gate and kept chasing the cops down and pushing them back at the capitol."

Kasper communicated on social media the following day with another person identified by initials, S.B., stating, "You charge that line and start spraying they start running for cover like you're coming at them with an

ak" and "there is definitely something satisfying about pepper spraying cops in riot gear ..."

N.L. replied (edited for profanity), "That's nuts you were right there when they pushed that

fence back lol," Kasper responded, "F—k yeah bro! I didn't [sic] drive 14 hours for nothing."

Other private messages Kasper sent on Jan. 6 included:

"We got inside the capital then they started shooting rubber bullets at peoples (sic) heads, even when me and another guy were carrying a barely conciliatory dude with blood dripping off his knees from his head to the ambulance they kept shooting at the back of the 3 of us."

"I basically organized my own little militia and we f—king took over Congress"

Kasper's sentencing date and custody status were unavailable Sept. 15.

His case is being prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia and the Department of Justice National Security Division's Counterterrorism Section. The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Western District of Wisconsin assisted the prosecutors.

To date, more than 1,100 people from nearly all 50 states have been charged for crimes related to the breach of the U.S. Capitol, including more than 398 charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement. The investigation remains ongoing.

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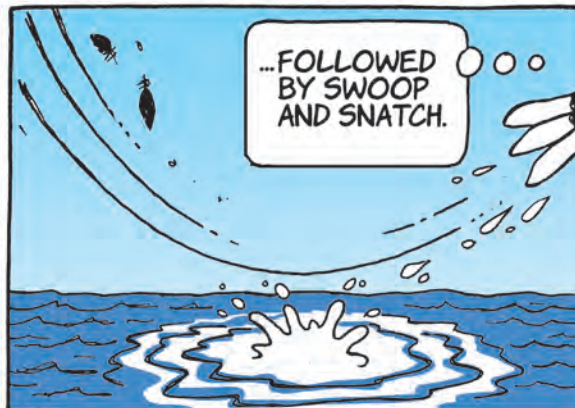
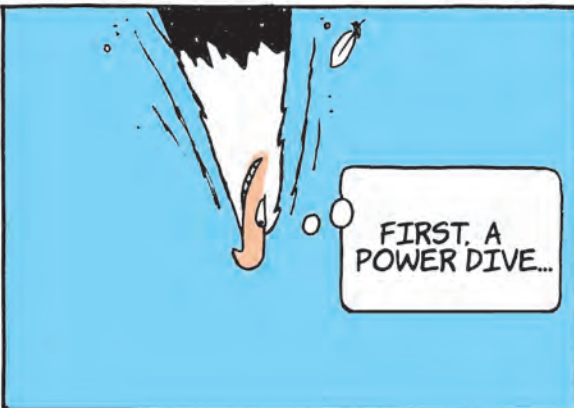
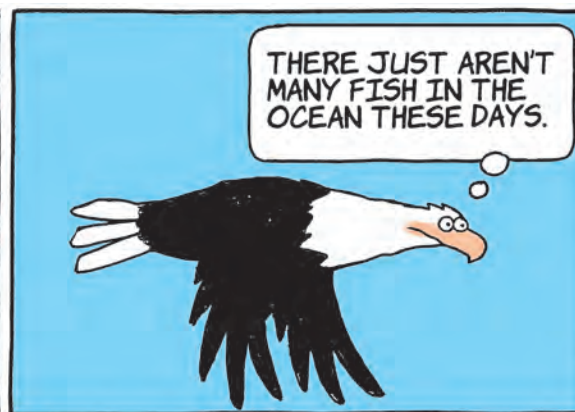
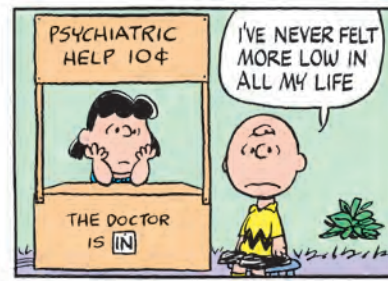
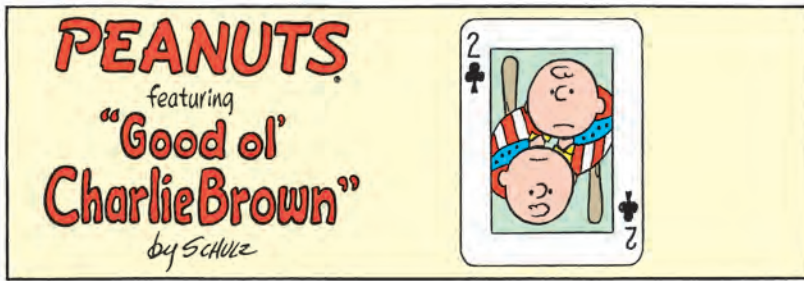

Packers give up 4 field goals
in 25-24 loss to Atlanta

Packers blow 12-point lead

Falcons gash Packers for 211 rushing yards

A 12-point fourth-quarter lead was not enough for the Green Bay Packers, as the Atlanta Falcons ripped off 13 unanswered points to hand Green Bay its first loss of the season.

The 25-24 Sept. 17 loss drops Green Bay to 1-1 on the season, but with the Minnesota Vikings, Detroit Lions and Chicago Bears all losing this week, the Packers stay atop the division.

Quarterback Jordan Love once again did his part, throwing for 151 yards and three touchdowns, with rookie wide receivers Jayden Reed (two) and Dontayvion Wicks (one) on the receiving ends of those scores. It was the rookie on Atlanta who was the X-factor of the game, though. Running back Bijan Robinson gashed Green Bay for 124 yards on 19 carries. The Texas alum added another 48 yards through the air.

In total, the Falcons picked up 211 yards on the ground, with quarterback Desmond Ridder scoring a 9-yard rushing touchdown.

"You guys saw; they shredded us," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur, when asked about Atlanta's rushing attack. "Consistently."

Even with running back Aaron Jones, left tackle

David Bakhtiari and wide receiver Christian Watson out of the game, Green Bay was able to march down the field on its first drive of the day. Facing a third-and-seven from the Falcons' 28-yard line, back-up tackle Rasheed Walker jumped offsides and Green Bay was called for a false start. Pushed back to a third-and-12, Love missed Reed on a pass attempt and the Packers saw fourth-and-12 from Atlanta's 33. That fourth-and-12 turned into a fourth-and-17 after a delay of game on the ensuing field goal attempt.

In what would have been a 56-yard field goal attempt, LaFleur marched the punting unit onto the field, giving the ball to Atlanta on its own 20-yard line. LaFleur's decision to punt the ball was a curious decision, as rookie kicker Anders Carlson hit

a 52-yard field goal last week against the Chicago Bears.

"It was just a really long field goal," said LaFleur, on his decision to punt. "I mean, that was a silly penalty. We can't have that. Those are penalties that get you beat and, obviously, when you lose a game by one point, that is one of the critical points of the game."

The major turning point in the game came though in the middle of the fourth quarter. Up two points and facing a third-and-one from the Packers' own 34-yard line, Love audibled the play call to a quarterback sneak, which would have given Green Bay a first down and kept the clock moving. Instead, Love ran the play before the ball was snapped and was called for a false start, pushing Green Bay back to a fourth-and-four and forcing them to punt the ball back to Atlanta.

"If (Love) thought that he could get it on the sneak, then it is on him to check to it," said LaFleur. "I think he did and nobody heard him. I mean, it was loud and it was an unfortunate situation."

While the loss for Green Bay hurts, given that the team was up 12 in the fourth quarter, what may hurt even more is guard Elgton Jenkins being forced to leave the game with a knee injury. That injury turned out to be an MCL sprain. Jenkins was not the only Packer to leave the game, as rookie pass rusher Lucas Van Ness was also forced to leave the game with an apparent elbow injury.

With injuries all over the team, Green Bay will look to bounce back in its home opener against the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24.

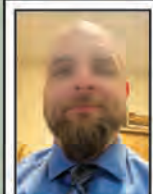

Packers' offense, defense look to rebound against Saints

Packers offense vs. Saints defense

Jordan Love backed up his debut in Chicago with another strong performance on the road against the Atlanta Falcons. Love was only 14-25, but threw three more touchdown passes to get the team a 24-12 lead. Unfortunately, Love's first sign of growing pains surfaced as he and the offense failed to pick up a first down in the fourth quarter, and the Packers squandered a double-digit lead.

The Packers' offense is averaging 31 points per game on the young season. Love has thrown three touchdown passes and posted a quarterback rating over 100 in both games.

He's done that in spite of getting zero snaps from Christian Watson, and Romeo Doubs being limited.

Jayden Reed has been a nice story early in the season. He scored two touchdowns on Sunday in Atlanta and made two big catches in the season opener. He's quickly growing into one of Love's favorite targets.

Dontayvion Wicks leads the Packers' receivers in snaps on the young season. He didn't have a target or catch in the opener but caught his first career touchdown on a nice in-

breaking route.

He made two men miss before getting into the end zone as well.

Luke Musgrave hasn't had quite the impact that seemed possible coming out of training camp.

The team, however, clearly keeps him involved in the game plan, and he could have an opportunity for a

big day against the Saints linebackers Zach Baun and Demario Davis, who can struggle in coverage. He's a weekly mismatch problem for opposing defenses.

The picture in the run game is a little muddier. Aaron Jones did not play against Atlanta due to a hamstring injury suffered in the third

quarter against the Chicago Bears. AJ Dillon took 15 of the 19 carries in his absence. There's a clear hierarchy in the Packers' backfield, where Dillon is the complement to Jones.

If Jones can't go, there's little reason to believe that much would change in terms of who takes the majority of the snaps in the backfield.

The offensive line situation is murky with David Bakhtiari missing Sunday's game and Elgton Jenkins leaving with a knee injury that's likely to sideline him for a short period of time.

The Saints' defense, led by Dennis Allen, has traditionally been stout. Cameron Jordan is one of the better pass rushers in football, but they are in a bit of a transition around him. Sheldon Rankins and Marcus Davenport are both gone.

Carl Granderson, Nathan Shepherd and Bryan Bresee are working their way into the rotation along the Saints' front.

Their linebackers are led by Demario Davis and a former Wisconsin Badger, Zach Baun. Paulson Adebo has been solid across from standout corner Marshon Lattimore. Lattimore typically draws the opposing team's best receivers, which will make it interesting as to who the Saints will match him up with, assuming all of their preferred starters are healthy.

Marcus Maye was signed to a free agent contract in March 2022 to help run the back end of the defense. He's now joined by Louisiana legend, Tyrann Mathieu, who has a nose for the football with 29 career interceptions.

This secondary is probably the biggest test of Jordan Love's young career.

Packers defense vs. Saints offense

After a sparkling debut in Chicago, the Packers' defense had a flat tire in Atlanta, helping blow a double-digit lead in the second half.

The main reason is the same issue that has plagued the Packers every year since Brian Gutekunst took over as the general manager.

The Packers were gashed by the Falcons run game, giving up more than 6 yards per carry to Bijan Robinson. The Falcons as a whole were able to gain 211 yards on the ground, including 172 by their two-headed monster in the backfield.

The Falcons as a team were able to run 78 plays due to their ability to control the football with their run game. That kept the Packers' pass rush at bay. They only sacked Desmond Ridder once and forced one punt.

Sunday's theme was missed opportunities. Rasul Douglas intercepted a pass, but the Packers' defense missed three more on the day. Jaire Alexander dropped what was probably a touchdown. Quay Walker dropped what would've been his second interception of the season. Darnell Savage misplayed a ball that

could have been an interception, that instead was an explosive pass play for the offense. The Falcons would score on that drive to cut the Packers' lead to 24-19.

The Saints' offense is going through a bit of a transition with Derek Carr taking over for Jameis Winston as the team's starting quarterback, their second quarterback in as many seasons after Drew Brees provided stability at that position for more than a decade.

Their backfield has a familiar face in it, as Jamaal Williams returns to Lambeau Field. He led the league in touchdowns a season ago, but was allowed to leave in free agency as the Lions opted to sign David Montgomery.

Williams is the team's starter as Alvin Kamara is suspended for the first three games of the season. Kamara will miss this game as well, giving the Packers a bit of a reprieve.

Chris Olave and Michael Thomas form what is one of the better duos at receiver in football, if Thomas is healthy. Thomas being healthy has been difficult to come back for the last two years. He's played in four games since the end of the 2020 season.

Theoretically the Packers defensive backs match up well with these receivers. Rasul Douglas tends to fare better against bigger, more physical receivers, which should have him drawing Thomas.

Alexander can cover anyone, but he's best suited against twitchier athletes, which describes Olave.

Rashid Shaheed provides a wrinkle in the passing game, and

he caught five passes in the season opener.

The Saints' offensive line is excellent, and should have a good battle with a Packers' front that has been able to get after opposing quarterbacks in the first two games.

Special teams

For all the concerns about breaking in a new kicker, Anders Carlson has been excellent to begin the 2023 season. He has yet to miss a kick in two games. He's made all eight extra points, plus both field goals.

Daniel Whelan is coming off a strong performance. He's averaging just under 50 yards per punt through two games. He's shown off a strong leg with good hangtime, allowing the Packers' coverage team to limit opposing returners.

Keisean Nixon has yet to break a kickoff return this season, but he's always a threat once the ball is in his hands. A

s the temperature starts to drop, kickoffs should be shorter, which will give Nixon more opportunities to put the ball in his hands.

The Saints finished 20th in Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings a season ago, which was about even with Green Bay's ranking of 22nd.

Like the Packers, the Saints are breaking in a new field goal operation with a new kicker and holder.

Blake Grupe did not miss a kick in his NFL debut.

Rashid Shaheed is the Saints kickoff and punt returner. He was dangerous in the season opener and is the best kickoff returner the Packers will have faced this season, to date.

Injuries, mistakes plague the Packers

Add score of Saints MNF game Tuesday morning

The Green Bay Packers are 1-1 after a disappointing loss to the Atlanta Falcons, in a game where they led by 12 points in the second half.

After taking a 24-12 lead, the Packers would not gain another first down, and the Falcons outscored them 13-0 in the fourth quarter.

Instead of winning and getting to 2-0, the Packers are now entering their home opener at 1-1 against a Saints team that EDIT AS TO WHETHER THEY WON OR LOST ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL.

The Packers and Saints have locked horns frequently during the Aaron Rodgers era, where he was often opposed by Drew Brees.

Now, both teams are going through a transition. Jordan Love is the starter in Green Bay and will be making his first start at Lambeau Field.



The Packers' defense had trouble all day against the Falcons, but it looked even worse in the fourth quarter when the team squandered a 12-point lead, gave up a touchdown and two field goals, and lost the game by a point.

Derek Carr is at the controls for the Saints now. He is their second

opening-day quarterback in as many years since Brees retired.

Both teams are looking to be play-off contenders, and this game could be one that matters at the end of the year for tiebreaker purposes.

Here are the keys to Green Bay getting to 2-1.

PACKERS' DEFENSE VS. SAINTS RUN GAME

This portion of the game is likely to make the list every week until the Packers prove they can consistently stop the opponent's run game.

Matt LaFleur was visibly displeased with his team after Sunday's loss to the Atlanta Falcons.

"You saw what happened; they shredded us, consistently," LaFleur said.

He was right. After slowing down the Bears' run game, the Packers reverted to their usual form against the Falcons dynamic duo of Bijan Robinson and Tyler Allgeier.

The Saints don't have the same running back duo that the Falcons do, but they have capable guys in their backfield.

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Jamaal Williams should be familiar to Packer fans as the former Packer is now on his third team in three years. Williams led the league in touchdowns last year, but was allowed to leave via free agency. He's the lead back with Alvin Kamara missing time due to a suspension.

Williams is a tough, physical runner who tends to lean on opposing defenses as the games get longer.

The Packers saw last week what happens when they don't earn the right to rush the passer. Derek Carr can be rattled when he is pressured, but like Desmond Ridder, his life is made easier if his run game is productive.

Packers' offensive line vs Saints' pass rush

David Bakhtiari missed Sunday's game against Atlanta with a knee issue that has plagued him for nearly three full years at this point. His availability is going to be questionable on a weekly basis moving forward.

Elgton Jenkins sprained his MCL in Atlanta and missed most of the game. He's unlikely to play on Sunday.

If Bakhtiari can go, that mitigates

some of the loss of Jenkins, but if he can't, the Packers will be down two starters against a Saints front that is stout.

Cameron Jordan, a veteran, is still a good player. Khalel Saunders is a solid run defender, and the Saints have the ability to use some exotic blitz packages with head coach Dennis Allen at the controls.

Those packages would include former Wisconsin standout Zach Baun.

The Packers have allowed two sacks through two games, and Jordan Love has operated mostly from a clean pocket through his two starts.

If he has time to throw, he should have another solid day. If he doesn't, the Saints' secondary could feast led by former All-Pro Tyrann Mathieu.

CHRIS OLAVE VS. JAIRE ALEXANDER

Jaire Alexander is coming off a game that he's unlikely to be proud of. Drake London caught a touchdown with Alexander in coverage. Alexander had a change to make a game-changing play when Desmond Ridder threw a ball right into his breadbasket.

Alexander had his eyes on the

end zone, but he forgot to secure the catch first. Had he caught the ball, he didn't have anyone in his way. He could have scored and broken the game open for the Packers. Instead, it was a drop.

That was one of several miscues by the Packers' defense on the day.

Alexander has openly talked about relishing the challenges of facing opposing teams' top receivers.

There aren't many better than former Ohio State Buckeye Chris Olave.

Olave caught eight passes and had more than 100 yards receiving in the season opener. He's quickly emerged as one of Derek Carr's favorite targets in his young Saints tenure.

Michael Thomas still has some gas left in his tank, but he's not the same player he was a couple of seasons ago.

That makes Olave the go-to guy for Carr, and he's likely to see a lot of Alexander. The winner of this matchup could go a long way toward who wins the game.

PACKERS VS. INJURY REPORT

Every player in the NFL talks about having the next-man-up mentality whenever a player gets injured.

That might be the way players think, but there are certain realities that set in whenever a starter is injured.

For example, Elgton Jenkins is likely to miss Sunday's game. That means Royce Newman needs to play. Newman has struggled to find his footing since a solid rookie season.

Christian Watson hasn't played yet this season; that makes a young Packers receiving corps even younger.

Aaron Jones didn't play on Sunday, that means AJ Dillon and Emanuel Wilson need to pick up the slack.

All of the players and situations mentioned for Green Bay are less than ideal.

The Packers have been solid on offense through two games, but there's no question they could use more explosive players. Watson is the only receiver on the roster with the ability to score anytime he touches the ball. Jones is a dynamic player who changes the dynamics of the run game.

The offensive line has a chance to be solid or in shambles with very little in between.



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Inexperience shows in Falcons loss

Packers currently have youngest roster in the NFL

One of the positives surrounding the Green Bay Packers this year has been the youth on the team.

The average age of the team currently sits at 25, and while that is exciting for the future, there can be growing pains. Those growing pains reared their ugly head in Green Bay's 25-24 loss to the Atlanta Falcons in week two. The quarterback and the center not being on the same page, defensive breakdowns and untimely penalties proved to be major turning points for the Packers, as the team blew a 12-point fourth-quarter lead against Atlanta.

That is to be expected though. Players with limited experience are going to have mental lapses, but what is concerning in Green Bay regarding

the inexperience is the lack of veteran leadership on the team. Players like De'Vondre Campbell, Preston Smith and Kenny Clark have been around for years on the defense and can help in certain spots, but they have jobs that they need to focus on as well.

Take Quay Walker for an example. The second-year linebacker was kicked out of two games last season and that can only be blamed on mental lapses. In Walker's case, that seems to have been cleaned up so far this year, but can the same be said about the offense?

Nobody has been kicked out of the game on the offensive side of the ball this year, but as we saw in the Atlanta Falcons game, penalties have caused Green Bay to blunder in big spots. From jumping on third-and-long to Love running a play without the snap, what we have seen from the offense has been encouraging — but it has come with its rough spots.

"I just messed up the operation with the cadence on that one," said Love, about his false start penalty against Atlanta. "Not everybody got the call to get the sneak, so I just

messed that operation up right there."

The snap and the cadence seem like it should be first day work, and it is. However, when put into a high-pressure situation, something as easy as relaying a play can be very difficult. Having Aaron Rodgers under center for the last 15 years helped to cover up those mistakes, but now with Love, who only has three career starts, are situations like this to be expected in the future?

With little to no experience at the quarterback position, players in other positions are going to have to step up. It is hard to believe that that will come from the pass catchers though, as other than Josiah Deguara, no pass catcher on the Packers has more than one year of real NFL experience. If you look to the running backs, Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon can both be considered "veterans," but with Jones out with an injury, that is one less veteran presence on the field.

The Packers may see a similar lack of veteran-presence on the offensive line as well moving forward, as All-Pro tackle David Bakhtiari sat out the game against Atlanta, due to what

is assumed as his ongoing problems with playing on turf. Green Bay's other Pro-Bowler on the offensive line, Elgton Jenkins, will also have his status up in question as he is now dealing with a knee injury.

With all of that being said, where does the voice of the offense come from? It probably has to be Love, as the fourth-year quarterback will now have to keep his team motivated — especially without Jones, Bakhtiari and Jenkins.

"(These are things) that we definitely expect to get right," said Love, on the growing pains showing in the Atlanta game. "We have a chance to win that game, and I think we hurt ourselves more than anything. We lost it for ourselves."

Love's comments seem to indicate the growing pains excuse is not going to be tolerated. Based on that, the big question moving forward is going to be how can a young Green Bay team answer adversity and tough situations like the ones it saw in the fourth quarter of the game against Atlanta.

Kenny Clark received a game ball following the Sept. 10 victory over the Bears. His father, who was released from prison this summer after spending 19 years behind bars, was at Soldier Field to see his son.

What did it mean to have your dad at the game?

It was a special moment for me and my family, and it was cool just to be able to get a win and share that moment with my teammates. I appreciate them for that. Yeah, it was my first time playing in front of him so, yeah, it was a surreal moment for me.

So that was a new experience for both of you?

He went to my first couple games when I was 8 and then he went to prison right after that. That was the first time he's seen me play in person in the league.

What did he think of the game?

It was awesome, man. He loved it. He was smiling the whole time. The atmosphere, just being up there. It was his first time getting on the plane; first time going to an NFL game. He was just shocked the whole time.

How much time did you get to spend with him?

About 30 minutes before we got on the buses.

Did he give you any feedback on your performance?

Nah, he was just happy. He was just so happy to see us out there playing. He's seen some of my teammates, too. Just had a lot of good words for them. He was just taking it all in.

That must have led to some different emotions than normal.

Yeah, in the beginning at first, I had a lot of emotions, especially during the national anthem and all that. But it's football. Yeah, definitely hit me early on in the game.

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Did it live up to what you were hoping it was going to be?

Y'all see me smiling and stuff all the time, but I don't really get too emotional and stuff like that.

In the beginning of the game, it for sure hit me.

The way you played in front of him, are you proud of it?

I'm just blessed, man. I've been through a lot in my life, good or bad. I'm just happy that we were able to go out there and play how we did. It was a special moment, and it was special to share that with him, with my teammates.

How did your side of the ball do?

I think we handled it well. A lot of people sleeping on us. I think we came out there and we were very disruptive up front no matter who we had in there and what positions we had them in there. Everybody was playing hard, being disruptive, getting up field, getting off blocks. Mad that we gave up those garbage points and those garbage yards at the end, but I love how we played.

The coaches talked about the need to play consistently. Is that the next step?

Yeah. I literally just told the D-line today: "It's fun to win. It's fun to be able to see us out making plays." It's no secret of why that happened. It's about the work that we put in. It's about the work we put in at practice and how we prepare. That's how you

perform on Sunday. If we want to keep winning and we want to keep feeling good about ourselves going into Monday, then we've got to keep on preparing how we prepare and coming out and doing our job.

Rashan Gary played only 12 snaps, but what did you think of his impact?

He had like seven pressures or something like that. Every time RG out there, you're going to feel him - his energy, his effort, how he rushes. He's disruptive. His effort alone is contagious for us. Anytime you've got RG out there, it's great for our defense.

"Everyone is sleeping on us" is something a lot of players have mentioned. Where does that feeling come from?

It's been all year. I know everybody heard, everybody's been sleeping on us. I don't know. I just feel like ever since Aaron's been gone, everybody think that we don't got a lot of really good players in this locker room. Yeah, we're young and all that but it's all about the process and how we practice and how we prepare at the end of the day. A lot of those young guys didn't look too young yesterday and that's a credit to them and how they prepared. That's a credit to them and how they work throughout the week and throughout camp and the preseason. They were able to come out and perform on Sunday.



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
