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Kautza pushes for repairs at library

Mold issues not as severe as originally believed

The sky is not falling at the Shawano County Library, reiterated Shawano County Board Chairman Tom Kautza during his monthly report to the board Nov. 15.

A recent study of the mold issues at the library revealed less of a problem than originally was believed.

"Yes, there is mold in the building, and it's the same thing that I found on the website of the EPA; there really is no standard for how much mold is bad," he said of an email from the firm that studied the situation. "There's always going to be a certain amount, no matter what you do. In short, his email kind of summed up that the sky is not falling at the library."

The study revealed there is no

toxic black mold in the building.

Kautza said the issues of cracks in the foundation and other leaks still need to be addressed to prevent water from entering the building.

"What I'm going to propose at the next public property meeting is we look at and we fix the building we have," he said.

Mold in the building will mostly affect those with allergies or respiratory problems.

Kautza said there were earlier estimates of about \$100,000 to have a remediation company remove all the carpeting, clean all the walls, strip the walls down and then paint the floors.

"If there is anything coming in again, it's not hidden underneath the carpet to start generating mold," he said. "It would be out in the open and easy to see and clean up."

Kautza said Grant Bystol, highway commissioner, and Jim Davel, administrative coordinator, also reviewed the building's leaks and cracks.

"They thought, on the outside of the building in the areas where there's water issues, they could take that out and clean the wall up,"

Kautza said, "and they'd be able to seal the walls back up and then pour a nice cement cap over the top to get the water out and away from the building, so the water isn't such a problem there."

Bystol was said to have claimed the work could be done for around \$30,000, but Kautza said more issues could be discovered after the work begins, so he suggested an estimate of \$50,000.

During the last two months when the library board was discussing moving to a temporary location after closing the existing building and waiting for construction of a new library as part of a new courthouse complex, the best alternative for a temporary home would cost \$88,000 a year to rent, plus moving costs.

The \$150,000 in repairs is a marked difference from the \$12 million figure batted around as the cost to build a new library.

"I can't see moving the library out and paying \$88,000 a year in rent when we can fix the building we have, and they can stay right in there, and it would be less money," the chairman

said. "In not even two years, we'd be saving money."

Supervisor Jeremy Gretzinger urged Kautza and the public property committee to consider using a base-ment solution company for another review of the building and suggestions on how to repair it.

"I do know that there is a dye that they put around these structures, and they can tell where the water's coming in," he said.

After seeing the water flowing into the library on a recent visit, he said staff members get no response from the county maintenance department when they call.

"I went over there in the middle of the torrential rain, went downstairs. I could actually see where the water was coming in," Gretzinger said. "There were some cellar doors where the water was just coming in pretty good where the carpet was getting wet about 2 or 3 feet back."

Kautza said that both concerns would be brought up at the public property committee meeting.

Final pre-trial delayed again for Wilson

Defense attorney: Letters from defendant's doctor need to be reviewed

Justice will have to wait a little longer in a circuit court case involving a 65-year-old Pulaski man who is facing a charge of first-degree child sexual assault with a child under age 13, in relation to an incident in the Town of Angelica in July 2022.

Jeffrey Wilson faces up to 60 years in prison if convicted.

Quinn Jolly, Wilson's attorney, asked for a delay during a final pre-

trial hearing Nov. 17, telling Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma that he received letters from Wilson's doctors that need to be reviewed and entered into evidence. Sloma agreed to the request and set a new final pre-trial hearing for 10 a.m. Jan. 10 in Shawano County Courthouse Branch 1.

That prompted an outburst from someone in the gallery, asking, "How many final pre-trials can there be? Isn't it supposed to be final."

To that, Sloma replied, "As many as it takes."

According to court records, Nov. 17 was Wilson's third final pre-trial hearing, with delays requested each time. The first final pre-trial hearing was May 24, and the second Aug. 25.

Wilson was charged July 26, 2022, in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court.

According to the criminal complaint, one deputy was notified and met with the victim's mother, who reported that her 6-year-old daughter had possibly been sexually assaulted. The mother alleged that her daughter had been to a family friend's house and said that she did not want to go back, because Wilson had touched her "private area."

The mother also alleged that her daughter had been to Wilson's residence on numerous occasions, including spending the night. The mother then stated that she did not want to answer any more questions.

In a supplemental report, a deputy

reported that after talking with the mother, they learned that Wilson is a family friend and is known to the family as "Grandpa Jeff."

In a Child Advocacy Center interview July 14, 2022, the victim told the interviewer that she was lying on Wilson's lap with a blanket on, when Wilson put his hand on the victim's private area and started to rub.

In a one-party consent phone call between the mother and Wilson on July 22, 2022, Wilson allegedly denied the sexual contact at first. According to the criminal complaint, the conversation went back and forth before the mother allegedly asked for the truth.

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Hearing on motions for Ingold case delayed

District attorney takes leave due to health issues; ADA filling in needs time to review

Plans to present motions in the first-degree intentional homicide case for Michael E. Ingold had to be delayed after it was announced Shawano-Menominee County Assistant District Attorney Laura Nelson will have to prosecute the case due to District Attorney Greg Parker taking an unspecified leave due to health issues.

Ingold, 59, is being held at Shawano County Jail on a \$1 million bond in the strangulation death of Sheila A. Laudon, who was 59 at the time of her death. He faces life in prison if convicted.

Nelson told the court during a Nov. 17 hearing that she only received the case two weeks ago. She said that when she became aware of Parker's health issues, which were not revealed in court, she asked Shawano County Clerk of Courts Ethan Schmidt what other dates were available, and Dec. 5 and Dec. 11 had been made available for a motion hearing and final pre-trial hearing, respectively.

"I need time to review everything," Nelson said. "I've done some work on the file ... but I'm not prepared today to move forward on the motions."

Nelson noted that the only other option was to dismiss the case without prejudice and start the process all over again. Ingold has been in custody since July 2022.

Defense attorney Julianne Lennon said she was unaware of Parker's health issues when she replied to a motion to extend the time to file the DA's motions and adjourn the Nov. 17 hearing, noting that the dates had been established after considerable effort to make sure attorneys and witnesses were available.

"The state did not call me and say Attorney Parker had health problems and were going to ask for an extension," Lennon said.

Lennon said four officers had been subpoenaed to be present Nov. 17, many of them present at the hearing, and would have to be served again to be present on either Dec. 5 or Dec. 11.

A number of motions have been filed in the case that need to be sorted out, with Lennon noting that many of her motions have been "on file for a significant amount of time." According to court records, one of those was from Lennon for a change of venue, and the prosecution had filed a response dated Nov. 15, but when Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. asked Nelson if she could discuss any of the motions on file, she reiterated she could not.

The district attorney's office filed a motion on Nov. 6 for forfeiture by wrongdoing, which applies to statements of absent witnesses. In this case, the witness is deceased.

Another DA motion requested the admission of prior bad acts involving Ingold and Laudon. Court records show that Ingold was arrested after a previ-

ous incident with Laudon on June 29, 2020. Ingold was charged in Waukesha County with strangulation and suffocation, second-degree recklessly endangering safety, battery and operating a firearm while intoxicated.

In that case, Ingold had allegedly strangled Laudon and threatened to kill her. Bail conditions restricted Ingold from having contact with the victim. Prosecutors said they could not locate her, and on Oct. 5, 2021, Waukesha County issued a witness warrant for the victim. The charges were dismissed in January, with prosecutors saying they could not proceed to trial.

Ingold allegedly told detectives that the two moved to Shawano County because he allegedly wanted to protect her, according to the new complaint.

Lennon objected to the DA's motions, noting that the original deadline for motions was Oct. 2.

"You can't extend something that has already lapsed," Lennon said.

Other motions Lennon has filed, according to court records, include excluding designated testimony of one of the detectives and for underlying data, excluding prior statements from the deceased witness, excluding prior bad acts, and sealing Ingold's statements at the time of emergency detention, as well as his statements to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department in general.

Kussel granted the request for the motion hearings to be rescheduled for the two December dates, with Nelson and Lennon agreeing to discuss privately which motions would be addressed on which dates so Lennon could send revised subpoenas. Currently, Ingold is scheduled for a five-day trial

beginning Jan. 8, 2024, in Shawano County Courthouse Branch 2.

A 57-year-old Shawano man is facing a charge of first-degree intentional homicide in relation to the death of a woman in the Town of Wescott on June 25.

During an initial appearance in Shawano County Circuit Court on Aug. 1, Judge William Kussel Jr. set bond for Michael E. Ingold at \$1 million cash. If convicted, Ingold faces life in prison.

The criminal complaint states that at 4:13 a.m. June 25, the Shawano County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call from Ingold, where he stated that he woke up and checked on his girlfriend, only to find her deceased.

An autopsy showed that Sheila A. Laudon, 59, was strangled to death.

Ingold told the deputies that he got home at 6:30 p.m., talked with the victim, turned on the television and fell asleep on the couch, the complaint said. He stated that he woke up around 2:30 a.m. and heard the victim in the kitchen saying that she was getting a beer. He then claimed that he woke up again at 4:01 a.m. and found her deceased in the bedroom.

Detectives received the autopsy report of the victim's death on July 21, stating that the cause of death was manual strangulation.

On July 27, two detectives interviewed Ingold at the sheriff's department, told Ingold that the victim died from strangulation and that the detectives believed that he caused it. Ingold responded, saying, "No it's not, no it's not, I didn't touch her," according to the complaint. Ingold acknowledged he and Laudon were the only two people in the house but continued to deny touching her, the complaint said.

Bonduel urged to better maintain parks

Survey brought forth dozens of suggestions for improvements

Bonduel village officials were provided with dozens of suggestions to improve their parks when people responded to a survey about the parks as part of updating the village's comprehensive outdoor recreation plan.

The suggestions ran the gamut and including more seating, a splash pad, more and safer side-walks for residents to access the parks, new playground equipment, and trails for walking, biking and running.

"Add a walking/biking trail on the outer edges of the village, perhaps incorporating the new community trail behind the elementary school," a survey respondent wrote. "It would be safer than what we have now, with so many people walking in the streets in town every

day."

Four out of five respondents said they would support vacating and removing the portion of Park Street that dissects Village Park to accommodate new facilities and improve safety.

The October survey gathered results from 207 people, including 175 residents of the village. Also, 40% of the respondents use the village parks weekly, with another 37% using the parks monthly.

Of 200 responses, 157 said dogs should be allowed in the parks if they are on a leash.

The four most important needs at the parks were listed as upgrading or replacing playground equipment, constructing new restroom facilities, replacing the kitchen and other updates to the concession building, and replacing or refurbishing the bleachers area and overhead shelter.

"The Village needs top notch facilities to attract new residents and retain existing residents," one respondent wrote. "The Village needs to put growth as a top priority. Expanding our tax base with new housing development/neighborhood and new businesses is important. Expanding and improving youth programs is a key to attract-

ing and retaining young families."

More and more people – and municipal parks – are in favor of pickleball courts. Of the 203 who responded to whether they would use the courts if they were constructed in Bonduel, 102 said yes and 101 said no.

Of course, no improvements can be done without money to pay for the work and equipment.

Fifty-nine percent of respondents agree or strongly agree when asked if they favor allocating tax dollars for future park projects. Another 30% were neutral, with 4.41% disagreeing and 6.37% strongly disagreeing.

Also, 59% of the respondents said they would consider making an outright donation for park improvements if the money was used for particular projects.

Respondents were also asked to rank three options about where the village should focus its efforts regarding the parks.

Improving or expanding existing parks was No. 1, with two-thirds of the people making it their first choice. Creating new bike and pedestrian trails was ranked second, and creating or preserving new parks and natural areas in third.

One respondent urged officials

not to make any changes; rather, they simply wanted the village to better maintain what is already in place.

Another respondent appreciated the efforts the village is taking to improve the parks but also urged more work to be much sooner.

"I wish we could create more ball fields and the Village understood the financial asset they are to the community. Every weeknight in the summer, extended family members and friends come into our Village to watch their friends' children and grandchildren play and participate. Then they stop at local businesses to eat, etc.," the respondent wrote.

"I wish the Village took care of what we have (cut the lawn more regularly, etc). Did something to the 'river' that runs through the park most springs/early summer. It is a hazard and an eyesore. I am happy improvements are in the works. I have been hearing about them for years and haven't seen the work yet."

Officials will now weigh the survey results and all comments before drafting the updated comprehensive plan.

Committee to vote on contingency funds

Most requests no longer need to go before full board

Shawano County supervisors agreed Nov. 15 that requests for the use of contingency funds will no longer need to be brought before the full board, starting in 2024.

Instead, such requests will continue to be brought before the appropriate home committee and, if approved, be forwarded to the executive committee for final approval.

That change was notably the most significant of the proposed rule changes that govern board operations.

Requests for the use of contingency

funds now require a two-thirds majority of the county board for approval. The original rule change that transferred that authority to the executive committee did not specify how many committee members needed to approve of using the funds for it to be valid.

Supervisor Arlyn Tober said that in years past, a two-thirds vote of the board was needed to use contingency funds.

"When a department comes to a committee and says, 'Hey, we need to use this,' it still needs a committee two-thirds vote to get that action to take place," said Jim Davel, administrative coordinator. "And that would be the same thing for the executive committee to use the contingency fund."

Tober noted that, although that may be the standard in Robert's Rules of Order, it does not explicitly say that in the board rules.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said there are two reasons for using the executive committee instead of the full board. First, the committee oversees the operation of the county's finance division and the expenditure of funds. Second, it would save time in allocating the use of the funds, which are generally sought for emergency situations, by not having to wait for the next board meeting.

Davel said he and Carrie Buntjer, finance director, asked for the change.

"The reason, quite frankly, as Tom (Kautza) alluded to, these are usually emergency action requests that we have to get after quickly," Davel said. "There's a lot of time we are executing the work before there's a vote, because it's that dire, and we need to use the funding from the contingency fund."

In 2024, there will be \$250,000 in

the contingency fund.

Davel said that in approving the budget, the board already approved of the contingency fund and its use for emergency situations.

The vote to require a two-thirds majority of the executive committee to release the funds was approved on a 13-11 vote, with two members absent.

Executive committee transfers from the contingency fund shall not exceed the amount set up in the contingency fund as adopted in the annual budget, nor aggregate in the case of an individual office, department or activity in excess of 10% of the funds originally provided for such office, department or activity in such annual budget. Transfers in excess of 10% must follow the budget amendment process and be approved by the full county board.

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School club dedicated to human rights

Students caring for Bittersweet Winds exhibit, pushing for changing name of high school

Many school clubs focus on academics, arts and athletics, but there is one club at Menominee Indian High School with aspirations that go beyond what they learn inside the building.

MIHS has a human rights club that formed in 2021. It started when the school inherited the traveling display “Bittersweet Winds” from Richie Plass, a Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee who collected items that showed Native Americans in racist and stereotypical contexts.

Megan Willard, a civics teacher and the club’s adviser, said she was asked by administrators to see if there were any students interested in caring for the display and utilizing it to educate people as Plass did in his life.

“Four students helped with that first setup at the casino. It was a regional meeting of all the superintendents, principals, athletic directors and assistant principals,” Willard said.

Club member Leo Kinney said seeing Bittersweet Winds woke him up to a lot of issues happening with Indigenous tribes, including the use of Native Americans as mascots, which still exists at a few Wisconsin schools today.

“There were so many things in the exhibit,” Kinney said. “It was kind of mind blowing.”

Club member Kaylee White also described her first impression of the exhibit as shocking.

“My first reaction was like, ‘Whoa.’ I’d never realized that this was happening,” White said.

While the exhibit was the main focus of the group in the beginning, the students soon realized there were other changes they could make in their school, the community and surrounding areas.

“We started a petition to remove the word ‘Indian’ from our name, because we’re Menominee Indian High School,” club member Colt Denny said.

The students gathered over 180 signatures and presented the

petition to the Menominee Indian School Board, which was accepted. Now, the club is gathering input on what the new name for the school should be, according to Denny.

“We kind of wanted to ask the community how they feel, what their reaction is and if they wanted to suggest a name,” Denny said.

The name change does not currently impact the name of the school district or Menominee Indian Middle School, but White noted it’s something the human rights club might pursue in the future.

“I feel like that’s sort of an action we want to take,” she said.

Willard said she’s not aware of other schools that have human rights clubs, but there are human rights organizations in Minnesota that are willing to provide funding for school clubs that focus on equalization and fairness for all, regardless of their skin color or ethnicity.

Club member Francis Dodge believes there’s a lot that people off the reservation may not understand about Native Americans and their culture. He noted that long hair for boys and men is one of those things.

“I’m Native American, and this

is important to me,” Dodge said.

“It’s part of who we are. It’s part of our identity, our culture. It’s part of our spirituality. Hopefully, this is something we can pass down to the younger generation. We’re not going to be here forever. We’re going to pursue our own careers and do our own thing.”

Club member Ravena Arlequin said she doesn’t see upholding human rights as a career in adulthood, but she wants to do as much as she can to help future generations rise up.

“It’s kind of disappointing to see how we’re portrayed,” Arlequin said.

The club has sold T-shirts and concessions at sporting events, according to Willard. Students have also participated in a number of events and conferences addressing Native American issues where they learned about the obstacles other tribes are facing. One example is the Hopi Nation, which wants to keep its traditional homes, made from sand, clay and stone that keep the interior cool in the summer and warm in the winter.

White noted that many other

tribes are experiencing what the Menominee are in terms of language and culture. She said that many tribes are looking to make such classes a requirement in their schools.

“Our culture is dying,” White said, noting that it’s important to care for human rights issues going on beyond the boundaries of the Menominee Reservation, too.

The club will be participating next spring in the Youth in Government program facilitated by the YMCA. The program includes arguing judicial cases before a mock supreme court and trying to pass bills in a mock congress. Willard said she hopes to make participation in Youth in Government an annual thing.

Willard said she believes any of the club members could easily pursue human rights in a variety of ways, whether it’s being an attorney or exposing human rights violations through art or music.

“They have lots of aspirations and lots of options open to them,” Willard said.

Holiday stroll, Santa parade coming up

There will be plenty for families to see and enjoy starting Thanksgiving weekend

It's the most wonderful time of the year for many, and Shawano's downtown is amplifying the holiday cheer with plenty of shopping and festive activities for families to enjoy.

First on the holiday lineup is Small Business Saturday on Nov. 25, with local merchants carrying on a nationwide promotion that recognizes the importance of mom-and-pop shops to the economy. Downtown businesses will be offering specials from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"Our small businesses will have stuff going on all day long on that Saturday," said Lindsay Johnson, coordinator for the Shawano Business Improvement District. "I remind people how important it is to shop local during the holidays. Our small businesses support so many activities and events throughout the year — somebody's baseball team, the hockey league, all kinds of fundraisers. They are so supportive, so it's important during the holiday season to support those who support us."

Johnson noted that many of the businesses offer one-of-a-kind items to purchase as presents for loved ones, and some of them even gift wrap. The number of businesses has grown significantly in the last five years, she said, and so that provides more enticement for patrons to shop the stores.

"People see us as a destination and are coming here because they can go to a variety of shops in downtown," Johnson said. "They know what they get here."

For those who wish to ride through downtown in style, the BID is bringing the Holly Jolly Trolley to town for the first time this year, with rides being free courtesy of the city of Shawano. Trolley stops include Bottle House Antiques at 701 S. Main St., The Naberhood at 214 S. Main St., GENEX parking lot at the northeast corner of Green Bay and Main streets, and Glas at 511 N. Main St.

Family activities kick off in earnest at Franklin Park, 235 S. Washington St., at 3 p.m. where hot chocolate and sweet treats are available as visitors can check out the decorated Christmas trees via the holiday stroll. Santa Claus and his reindeer will be there, as will the St.

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Jakobi Lutheran Church Choir as it provides some Christmas caroling. Shawano County Library will also be the park to provide a story time for children, and the Shawano Optimist Club is handing out holiday goody bags.

"Park and rec has fire pits throughout the park where people can roast marshmallows," Johnson said.

There will also be free horse and wagon rides sponsored by Wolf River Dental and Shawano Family Dentistry. Johnson noted that this year there will be two wagons to allow more participation by locals and visitors.

"They are such a popular activity that we had to put two of them in here," Johnson said.

The day of holiday cheer will conclude with the lighting of the trees at 5 p.m. at Franklin Park, with 100 trees in all at the park and continuing through the Naberhood Plaza on

South Main Street.

"What started as 'Can we put a few trees in here?' and I think we had 30 trees at the time has grown to 100 trees," Johnson said. "They're all sponsored by area businesses and nonprofit organizations. They get a sign, and then they come in and decorate it."

She added that the BID hopes to someday fill the full plaza, including the main segment by Stubborn Brothers, with trees.

This is the sixth year that the holiday stroll and tree lighting has taken place. The trees will remain on display through the beginning of 2024.

The fun doesn't end on Nov. 25, however. On Dec. 1, Shawano's Santa Parade returns for its 29th year. The parade begins at 6 p.m. with the lineup on Elizabeth Street at 5 p.m.

"The theme for this year is Classic Christmas Movies," Johnson said. "It runs along Main Street from Eliz-

abeth Street to Green Bay Street."

Santa will be greeting the community on a fire engine with his wife, Mrs. Claus, and then he will hold court for the children at Coldwell Banker Real Estate Group, 105 S. Washington St.

Johnson sees all the holiday events as something out of a Hallmark movie, especially the holiday stroll.

"It really continues to bring the community and families out and is a great family event to kick off the holiday season," she said. "Because it starts Thanksgiving weekend, we see a lot of people who are home for the holiday and who will be out and about with grandparents and parents with their children and grandchildren, checking out shops, stopping at the candy store and participating in activities. These are great events to bring people together."

Blue jays raucous, colorful and interesting

Now that the trees have shed their fall leaves and winter is on the way, I have a new appreciation for the blue jays that visit our feeders. They are a welcome splash of color as they fly boldly about, their feathers a flash of blues, blacks and white. Look closely and you will see a beautiful blue and black mosaic pattern on the wings along with a striking white wing bar. Their bellies are a bright white, and they sport a cocky blue crest on top of their head. A rather wide black necklace encircles the head, and a black streak extends from either side of the eye. Their bill is long, strong and straight.

The blue jay's common raucous call which to us sounds like "jay, jay, jay" alerts us to his presence. According to the book, "Jewels of Nature, Delightful Birds I Have Known" by Alan Haney, this bird has a wide range of calls. Some are quiet songs composed of gurgles, whines, clucks and clicks probably used for communicating among themselves. Another is described as a "gate hinge" call that sounds like a gate swinging open on rusty hinges and used when a parent perceives a threat near the nest.

Some songs are loud and insistent. You may have heard their loud belligerent "thief, thief, thief" call when they are mobbing (swooping toward, chasing and sometimes striking) larger animals such as owls, squirrels, snakes or other perceived threats, according

to Haney.

Blue jays are great mimics as well and can learn to mimic the call of a red-shouldered hawk, a cat's meow and human speech according to The Cornell Lab All About Birds website, or AAB.

It's the year-round residents that grace our yards all winter. According to AAB, blue jays are considered resident or short distance migrants. Their range extends from northern Saskatchewan, Canada, to southern Florida and from the east coast to the Rocky Mountains, but it is likely that less than 20% of jays migrate north to south and back across this range.

Haney notes that blue jays are more important than squirrels in spreading plants that produce nuts and seeds. Their expandable throat pouches along with mouth and beaks allow them to carry off 20 or more sunflower seeds or up to five acorns at a time. According to AAB, six birds with radio transmitters each cached (hid for later retrieval) 3,000-5,000 acorns in one autumn.

The nuts and seeds are cached in litter or soil, often in fields, and this, according to Haney, accounts for "the steady march of oaks or hickories into abandoned fields, far from the forest edge."

Blue jays also eat insects, grains and dead or injured small vertebrates. They sometimes raid nests for eggs and nestlings, but research has shown this to compose only a small amount (1%) of their diet, according to AAB. We know they also like fruit as we watched in amazement one day as a jay carried off a large plum from one of our trees.

The jay's emotional well being is signaled by its crest. The higher the crest, the higher its aggression level, according to AAB. When a blue jay "squawks," its crest is almost always up — watch out.

An article linked to the AAB website by Lauren Smith explains an interesting behavior of the blue jay called "anting." With wings spread and tail tucked between its legs, the jay gently picks up an ant in its beak and rubs it on its feathers before eating it. Research as to why revealed that the bird is likely ridding the ants of a bitter-tasting formic acid that the ant sprays behind it as a defense mechanism. Once the acid is rubbed off, the jay can enjoy a more delectable meal.

Blue jays may appear aggressive at your feeders; their size and raucous calls contribute to this perception.

However, there are several birds that can dominate the jays, including red-bellied and red-headed woodpeckers, common grackles, mourning doves and northern cardinals, according to AAB. Then, of course, there are the squirrels that are all over our feeders scattering every bird looking for a meal.

Blue jays are still common, but their populations have declined by about 0.6% per year with an estimated 27% cumulative decline between 1966 and 2019, according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey. One of the biggest threats to the species is predation by cats and dogs, according to AAB. We have the power to control this threat by keeping pets indoors or leashed when outdoors.

To attract blue jays to your yard, use a tray or hopper feeder; they work better than a hanging feeder, according to AAB. Provision it with peanuts and sunflower seeds, add suet and you have a blue jay feast. It's great to see these brightly colored and vocal birds at our feeders; enjoy them throughout the year — especially this winter, when their bold colors can lift our spirits.

Townsend fire chief: 'You are my why'

On Oct. 17, rural Wisconsin had one of its finest moments. What was on display was a magical tribute to one of Townsend's most treasured residents — Dawn Herlache, Town of Townsend fire chief.

Named First Responder of the Year for the 35th Assembly District, Dawn received her award at the state capitol that day. Friends and supporters treated her to a limousine ride to and from Madison, then surprised her with a parade as eight area fire department trucks escorted her from Riverview to the Townsend Town Hall where a celebration was held in her honor.

I've admired and appreciated Dawn for over two decades, watching as she shattered the glass ceiling again and again. Candid, collaborative, cheerful and courageous, Dawn embodies the best qualities of so many other trendsetting female entrepreneurs, public servants and volunteers who make Townsend an extraordinary place to live. Her story is inspiring and empowering, especially for girls and women who sincerely want to make a difference in their little corner of the world.

Born and raised in Green Bay, Dawn attended Preble High School, lettering in swimming, basketball and golf. She earned a degree at UW-Green Bay in business administration and public administration, working her way through college teaching scuba diving classes. When she graduated in 1990, she entered a

weak economy which forced her to take employment in a variety of small businesses.

"Looking back, I now realize I was putting my education to use, acquiring skills I'd need later in life, always moving closer to a goal that hadn't quite come into focus yet," she said.

Dawn's quest to find her destiny brought her to Townsend, where she and a partner established Sheer Lawn Care. Building the business took time, so Dawn took side jobs to pay the bills. She worked on the Town of Doty's road crew, cleaned Markuby's (Topsy's) Tavern, even delivered mail.

"I found myself working every single waking hour," she said. "I was beyond exhausted, but I didn't once consider giving up."

Her perseverance paid off. Soon the sight of Dawn trailering her John Deere mower and lawncare equipment appeared everywhere, and she attracted enough customers to fully concentrate on Sheer. Still, she made sure she had the time and flexibility to keep her place on the Townsend Fire Department, which she had

joined in 1997. No one seemed to care that she was probably the only female firefighter in the Northwoods. What impressed the guys were her quick wit, physical strength and mental toughness.

In 2007, Dawn partnered with Renee Kosch to buy Birch Hills Resort. They updated the resort's rental units, remodeled the tavern and renamed it My Bar. Within a year, business was booming. Dawn laughs as she recalls a conversation she had with Renee.

"I'm really glad the business took off like a rocket," Dawn said. "I just wish somebody had told us to put on our seat belts."

When Renee passed away in 2019, all of Townsend grieved. She was a popular personality in her own right, also serving as a volunteer firefighter. Dawn decided the business was too much for one person, and she sold it in 2021.

Through it all, Dawn continued her service at the fire department, progressing through the ranks from firefighter to lieutenant, then captain, followed by assistant chief, and finally fire chief, taking over in 2019 when long-time Chief Rick Opelia retired.

An unexpected bonus of her service, Dawn forged a 25-year friendship with Dacon Franzen, currently assistant fire chief. There wasn't a dry eye in the town hall as Dacon choked up while praising Dawn during the celebration.

"Most important, Chief Herlache is

my friend," he said. "She has my complete trust. I would follow her into a burning building."

Dawn is quick to emphasize that fire service requires serious commitment.

"We have to look out for each other, work as a unit," she said. "To do that, we must form a family of brothers and sisters who may not always agree but must always hold a high level of respect and caring for one another."

Looking toward the future, Dawn sees major changes in the way fire service will be delivered in the Northwoods. As the number of volunteers dwindles, there will be more consolidation, more cooperation, more collaboration. In preparation, she earned her Fire Instructor Certification this year and envisions establishing a Junior Firefighter program at Wabeno High School. Her goal is to recruit young people into a life of community service by teaching basic firefighting.

"People often ask me why I do this," Dawn said as she thanked everyone who made her day so extra special. "Why? I do it because I have the sincere desire to be there for others in difficult circumstances. You are my why," she told the cheering crowd. "You will always be my why."

That learning came from finding the more things I was ungrateful for, the more I found myself complaining and the more, and more, unhappy I became.

On the flip side, when I was grateful for even the little things — yes, even those things that were not so pleasant — and proceeded to express my thankfulness for them, the more joy and happiness I experienced as a result. Was that always easy to do? No.

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Lymph node testing easier to test deer for CWD

Chronic Wasting Disease is a threat to deer herds in Wisconsin and many other states, but also a threat to our entire deer hunting culture.

I have to admit that I haven't taken the disease too seriously as a hunter, in part because I felt there wasn't much I can do about it, but I can.

I can help researchers stay on top of its spread, first primarily in captive deer and now in wild ones. Shawano County recently discovered two more cases of CWD in wild deer this season, with two previous wild deer cases in 2020.

Although I live and hunt in Waupaca County, where CWD has existed for many years, I've never had any of my deer tested, mainly because I would have to travel many miles to a CWD testing station or kiosk to leave my deer's head. It simply wasn't convenient, and although that may sound selfish, after days of gun hunting and a long day in the field, I was ready for some hot food and a warm bed, not a long drive with a deer head in my van.

Many other hunters probably feel the same way, but we just lost another excuse to avoid testing and potentially useful research data.

More and more meat processors and taxidermists are learning how to collect deer lymph nodes that researchers can use to determine the presence of CWD, an always-fatal disease that manifests in a deer's brain, bones and spinal cord. This process allows the hunter with a trophy buck to have his deer tested and still retain the rack and neck for a shoulder mount.

At the same time, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is adding self-service kiosks (often at the same sites with lymph node collection) so hunters can remove their own deer heads for testing and leave them in a freezer.

Such is the case for Northwoods Sausage in New London, one of the area deer processors that I often take my deer to (when I finally manage to bag one, anyway). Northwoods has a variety of delicious sausage, deer stick, bratwurst and jerky options, and it's a small family operation that seems to go the extra mile with both meticulous meat handling and customer service. Kay Trewin, co-owner of the business with husband Mike Trewin, told me just before the gun deer opener that they could now collect lymph nodes after DNR staff came and showed Mike how to do it.

Jacob Fries, a DNR wildlife biologist at Hartman Creek State Park in

Waupaca, helped set up the self-serve kiosk at Northwoods as part of his CWD kiosk "route" in Waupaca and Waushara counties. Also included are places for hunters to dispose of deer carcasses.

The prions found in CWD-positive deer (prions are abnormally folded proteins that concentrate in bones and brain, but are shed through bodily fluids) can contaminate the soil for years and spread the disease to other deer, so leaving carcasses in the woods is another way to spread CWD. This is another reason why I prefer to take my deer to a processor. This is one of the better explanations I have found about prions and their

spread: <https://dwr.virginia.gov/wildlife/diseases/cwd/what-are-prions>.

Fries and his counterpart in Shawano County, DNR wildlife biologist Jaqi Christopher, will be kept busy checking their respective kiosks roughly every other day during the nine-day gun season that ends Nov. 26. The bonus for deer hunters who submit their deer heads is that they will also find out the age of their deer through tooth examination.

Hunters fill out a form and are given a six-digit number to track their deer through the process, Christopher said. When testing is complete, typically in 10 to 14 days, hunters receive an email and can also see results in their Go Wild account.

Shawano County lymph nodes and heads are collected at the Navarino field office before they are shipped to the Wisconsin Veterinary Lab in Poynette for testing. Fries and Christopher also will go to hunters for testing upon request. Christopher can be reached at 715-853-2952, while Fries can be reached at 920-420-0384.

Christopher noted that the lymph nodes are located where the neck meets the jaw line, and require cuts to the spine. The nodes can be collected from caped heads by going under the skin, so that trophy is in no danger of damage, she explained.

Shawano County kiosks include the Navarino (Shiocton) and Shawano DNR field offices, Pingel Processing in Shawano, Kropf's Meat Processing in Bowler, the Marion Plaza Shell station, village of Tigerton, Breaker Taxidermy in Tigerton and Jim's Venison Processing in Wittenberg.

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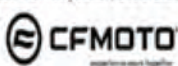

Journalists can't save journalism, but you can

Not long ago, a group of retired, has-been editors got together in Madison for golf, burgers and beer. Let's just say, the burgers and beer were good.

It was an interesting collection of career journalists who ran newsrooms in several Wisconsin cities — Milwaukee, Madison, Eau Claire, Watertown, Wisconsin Rapids, Janesville and Beloit.

There were plenty of old war stories to banter about, but a recurring theme revolved around the tough times facing news organizations in Wisconsin and around the country. Lots of questions. Lots of laments. Damn few answers.

That conversation was high on my mind last week when I spoke to a great group of ladies over lunch. The Beloit Intermediate Women's Club, for some unfathomable reason, asked me to come and talk about the state of journalism in our modern era.

Allow me to pause and give the same disclaimer I said in the speech. I'm just an old retired guy. I do not speak for the Beloit Daily News, Adams Publishing, the Lake Geneva Regional News (where my wife and I do a tourism column) or the Wisconsin Newspaper Association, which regularly circulates my ramblings across the state. My thoughts are purely my own.

There may be some value, however, in encouraging readers to ponder what has been happening not only to newspapers large and small, but also to radio and television news

operations. To that point, may I suggest the issue isn't just important to the folks who own, operate or work at news-related companies. Rather, it's a critical issue for Americans as they tiptoe around the divisive minefield that is modern politics and collectively chart a future path that will preserve freedom and democracy — or not.

I won't go into the long list of statistics and anecdotes covered in the speech — no sense boring readers too much. It's illustrative, though, to cite a few:

- About three years ago, for the first time, digital advertising spending surpassed for the first time ad buys in newspapers and television.
- Google and Facebook pocket more than half the country's ad spend.
- In the past 20 years, newspaper advertising revenues have dropped more than half.
- Regular, subscriber-based readership has declined as well. In 1984, more than 63 million Americans subscribed to a daily paper. By 2020, that was 24 million. Mind you, when online readership is consid-

ered along with readers who pop in here and there and buy single-copy papers, many millions still consume newspaper journalism. It is, however, a much more volatile base than the days when almost every household subscribed for home delivery.

- One sad consequence has been the disappearance of newspapers, often those in relatively isolated geographic areas. About 2,000 have closed over recent decades, spawning the term "news deserts" where no reporters or editors routinely cover news, sports or anything else.

- The net result has been a significant reduction in journalism jobs across the country. In 2007, about 115,000 journalists gathered news in America. By 2020, the number had dropped to 85,000.

- Even the biggest players — New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post — have been impacted. For example, the Washington Post recently announced it will cut 250 jobs.

Bear with me, while I mount the soapbox for a couple of minutes. I'm a big believer in the theory embodied in the words of that old song that goes something like this, "Shin bone's connected to the knee bone." What's happening to news reporting is also happening to our civic lives.

Community clubs struggle to keep up membership. Church attendance is way down. Most people never attend a city council meeting, a school board meeting, a booster club meeting. Heck, neighbors don't even know

neighbors. The fabric that binds communities together has frayed and become ragged, on a good day.

I always believed good journalism was a connective tissue, reflecting a community's deep reality. The best journalism is practiced, in the old saying, without fear or favor. That means the good, the bad and the ugly. It means telling the truth even if nobody wants to hear it.

Today, lots of people reject uncomfortable or inconvenient facts. So-called "news" organizations — think MSNBC for lefties, FOX for righties and even more deeply biased outlets online — make sure users' preferred story lines are never challenged. That's not news. It's propaganda.

I give all the credit and cheers I can muster to today's journalists, who continue to forge ahead in an unforgiving business climate, where it's not only tough to make a buck but it's also likely they'll be subjected to insults and abuse just for telling the truth.

I'll pose a question I presented to the ladies in my audience: "Who calls out the abuses of the powerful if the watchdog is dead?"

This, in closing: "The people in this room, their families, friends, strangers and everybody, will decide how it all turns out. Journalists can't save journalism."

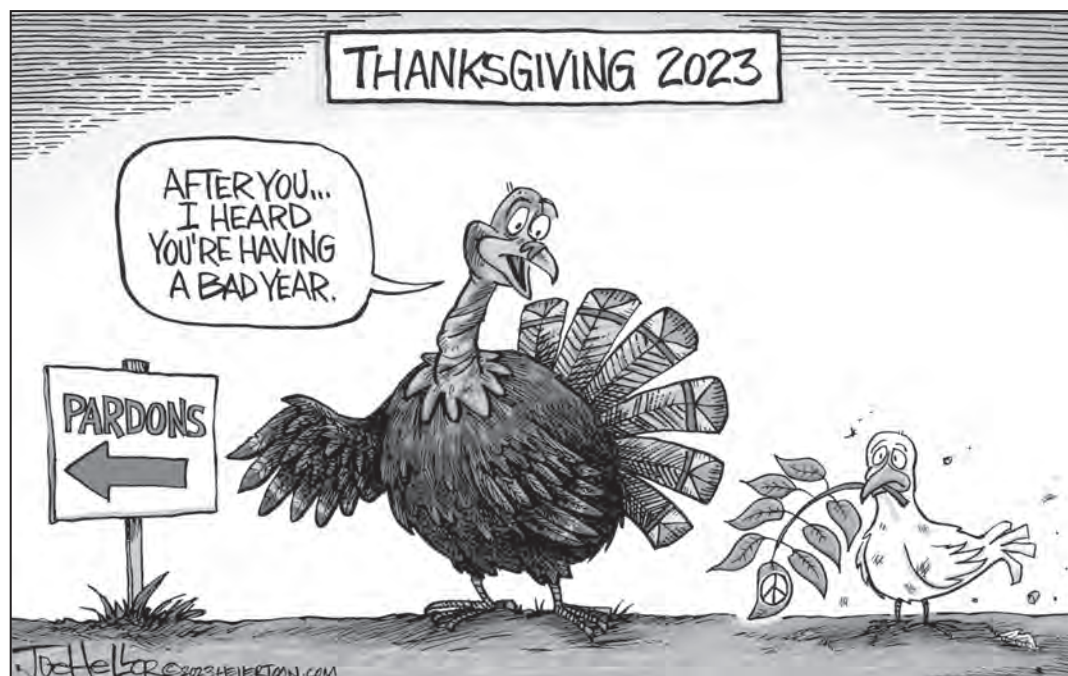
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Defense sets the tone in season-opening win for Chargers

The first game of high school basketball season is an exciting time but one that also comes with a lot of question marks.

When it comes to this year's Wittenberg-Birnamwood girls basketball team, things couldn't have gone much better for the Chargers in their non-conference game against Peshtigo. The defense not only set the tone early but throughout the game, as well. After allowing just 16 points in the first half, Wittenberg-Birnamwood turned it on in the second half and allowed only seven points to cruise to an easy 60-23 victory.

"I am very proud of the girls for how they came out and played tonight," head coach Nick Mechelke said. "It's always nice to get the first win out of the way, especially when that can happen on opening night."

A lot of times, it takes teams a little while to figure things out in their first game, but not so for the Chargers; they came out swinging and sent a message right from the start. It was the combination of Kit Stewart and Melaina Granquist that got things rolling as they combined for 37 points on the evening. Stewart, in particular, had a hot hand as she scored the first six points of the game for the Chargers and helped Wittenberg-Birnamwood race out to an early 8-0 lead.

"Kit (Stewart) got us going quickly and scored all of her points in the first half," Mechelke said. "She gave us a good spark, and the team seemed to thrive off of her early efforts."

Leading 10-2 after Peshtigo finally got on the board, Granquist started to have her way on the inside. Not only did she lead the way with 27 points and eight rebounds, but she single-handedly outscored the Bulldogs in the game.

Basketball is a game of runs, and the Chargers were all about putting together big runs throughout as they opened the game 8-0, then followed that up with a 10-2 run to bust the game wide open at 18-4. They never

looked back as they managed to close out the first half by outscoring the Bulldogs 15-12 to take a 33-16 lead into the break. That came after Peshtigo tried to mount a bit of a comeback as Holly Pesch was finding ways to get to the basket with Maysen Brisette knocking down some jumpers. Fortunately, the Chargers were able to stop the bleeding as Brie Ladika connected on a pair of late first-half triples to push the lead to 17 at the break.

Already with a lead in hand, the Chargers continued to rely on their defense to begin the second half, while Ladika and Granquist took over on the offensive side. In total, it was the Chargers going on a 12-0 run to begin the half as they pushed their lead out to 45-16.

It took nearly nine minutes for Peshtigo to grab their first points of the second half, but they were unable to get much more than that as Wittenberg-Birnamwood outscored the Bulldogs 27-7 in the second half.

While the win is nice, it was the young guns who stole the show, as Granquist wasn't alone in having a great game. Fellow sophomore Ladika was second on the team with 11 points with Stewart adding 10. Throw in six from junior Faith Resch and three each from freshmen Harper Rogowski and Nora Bushman, and it could be the young players who lead the Chargers this season.

"Of all the things we did well tonight, I was very pleased with how our youth played," Mechelke said. "For most of our underclassmen, this was their first varsity game, and they did a fantastic job holding their own. If they can continue to play this way all season, we are going to be a very good team."

Bonduel hangs tough but falls to St. Mary

Any time you test yourselves in non-conference play, it can be used as a benchmark to gauge where your team is at as you prepare for the postseason later on. When it comes to the Bonduel Bears girls basketball team, not only were they put to test Nov. 16, but they passed that test with flying colors to prove they are a very good team.

Squaring off against the No. 8 ranked St. Mary Catholic Zephyrs on the road is no easy feat, but it was a feat the Bears didn't shy away from as they gave SMC their best shot. No matter the deficit, the Bears continued to battle back and even held the lead early in the second half. It was the midway point of the first half when the Bonduel defense started to sink their teeth as they put the clamps down on the Zephyrs and held them scoreless for several minutes. That allowed for the Bonduel offense to chip away with Hailey Zernicke (10 points) finding ways to get inside and Hailee Thompson (14 points) knocking down some jumpers from deep. Throw in an Ashlyn Kurey runner, and the Bears battled back to claim a 16-15 lead.

Unfortunately for Bonduel, their lead didn't last long as a pair of triples from Norville sparked an 8-0 SMC run and pushed their lead to the largest of the game thus far, 23-16. Not to be out done, Bonduel continued to take the Zephyrs' best shots only to bounce back as the size of Weier on the inside mixed with the outside touch of Thompson was an issue as Bonduel closed out the first half on an 11-4 run to pull even 27-27.

"Early in the game, we were playing a little faster than we'd like against their pressure," Reinke said. "The few times we used our press break, we were successful, which led to some easy buckets and started to get us in a more of an offensive rhythm."

In what was suddenly a ball game to begin the second half a quick strike from Vogel put the Zephyrs back in front only to have Weier answer with four straight to give

Bonduel their second lead of the game. Weier continued to do her thing down low in the early stages of the second half, which helped open things up for Zernicke and others as the Bears continued to battle and held a 35-34 lead.

That was the last lead of the night for Bonduel with Norville knocking down another triple to put SMC back in front before Nolie Anderson gave SMC the lead for good.

Like in the first half, whenever it seemed as if SMC was about to pull away, it was the Bonduel defense bouncing back as they refused to go down without a fight. Ella Hischke kept the Bears within striking distance, 44-42.

"Defensively, we played very well for about the first 25 minutes, but they beat us up in the paint in the second half," Reinke said. "They are a very physical team. and they showed that throughout the game,

That was until the final four minutes of the game when the action not only picked up, but all of a sudden, buckets were falling and both offenses started to come to life. All that led to an extra four minutes as a Keira VandeHei layup with 6.5 seconds to go in overtime handed Pulaski a tough 39-37 defeat.

"We needed to hit some of our wide-open looks, and we haven't been doing that," head coach Doug McElrone said. "When you have an open look, you have to knock it down. It's hard to win games when the shots don't fall, especially ones that we know we should make."

Defense was the theme all night for the Thunder, especially during the first half as they held Pulaski without a field goal for nearly six minutes. Alayna VandeHei and Natalea Hill managed to put the Thunder on top 6-1 early as the Red Raiders were searching for answers. Leave it to Maggie Lardinois to put an end to the field goal less drought of four minutes, but that was the only field goal Pulaski would make for nearly 10 minutes as they trailed 7-6.

In desperate need of an offensive spark, Pulaski started to work the ball inside as Olivia Sprangers gave Pulaski their first lead before converting on a steal shortly after. Following another defensive stop on the other end, Lardinois was left alone in the corner as her 3-pointer gave Pulaski the 14-7 lead.

That was the largest lead of the game for Pulaski as the Thunder offense picked up five quick points from Salem Boyd to pull within 14-12 before two big buckets late in the half had Pulaski in front 18-12. While the offensive numbers weren't pretty, it was the defense that McElrone was happy about as that was the reason for the early first half lead.

"Our defense was great but we need to capitalize on turnovers," he said. "If the stats are correct,

we forced 25 turnovers, which is a very high number, but only managed to come away with 37 points. That can't happen. It's tough to win that way, and we need to do a better job converting on more of those turnovers."

Hoping for more offensive sup-

port in the second half, it was more of the same for both sides as a mix of poor shot selection and pressure defense continued to make life difficult on the offensive end. Even with Lardinois and Sprangers maintaining that six-point lead, Boyd took it upon herself to keep things close

while Hill managed to tie things up 22-22. Things would remain tied for the next several minutes before Ellie Mangold knocked down a free throw to put the Red Raiders back in front 25-24.

With the lead again, Pulaski continued to rely on their defensive pressure as they came away with a few more turnovers leading to four quick points for Sprangers to build the lead back up to 29-24. On the verge of letting this one get away, VandeHei connected for one of her biggest shots of the game as a triple from the left wing pulled the Thunder back within two. Seymour continued to chip away from there, grabbing a late lead before seeing things tied back up at 33. With the ball in their hands and a chance to end the game, Pulaski chose to play for the last shot as the Mangold fade was off the mark sending things to overtime 33-33. That was the kind of night it was offensively for Pulaski as they had the looks but couldn't knock them down.

"It was just one of those nights where the shots wouldn't fall for us," Lardinois said. "If we hit some shots, we open up our driving lanes for our guards, it's a completely different game offensively. Credit to Seymour for keeping the pressure on us early and taking us out of our rhythm and then making sure we would only get one opportunity at the hoop. The season is still young, and we know we are going to get better."

Set to begin the overtime period, it was the Thunder striking first as Boyd wasted no time getting going, so much so that she scored the first four points of the overtime period to give the Thunder their biggest lead since early in the first half 37-33. Not to be out done, Pulaski got more aggressive on the offensive end, which led to a pair of free throws from Sprangers and an easy lay up from Mangold to tie things up at 37-37.

Still tied and under 30 seconds to go, Seymour had the ball in their hands with a chance to finish things off. Credit the Red Raiders defense for making life difficult, but all it took was a minor breakdown defensively that allowed VandeHei to get to the rim and put home the go-ahead shot with 6.5 seconds remaining. Needing a bucket to tie things up, Pulaski had a chance, but couldn't get a shot off in time.

Thanksgiving meal costs drop in 2023

The price of a traditional Thanksgiving meal in Wisconsin is 1.36% less this year, according to Wisconsin Farm Bureau's annual Marketbasket survey that rang in at \$58.86.

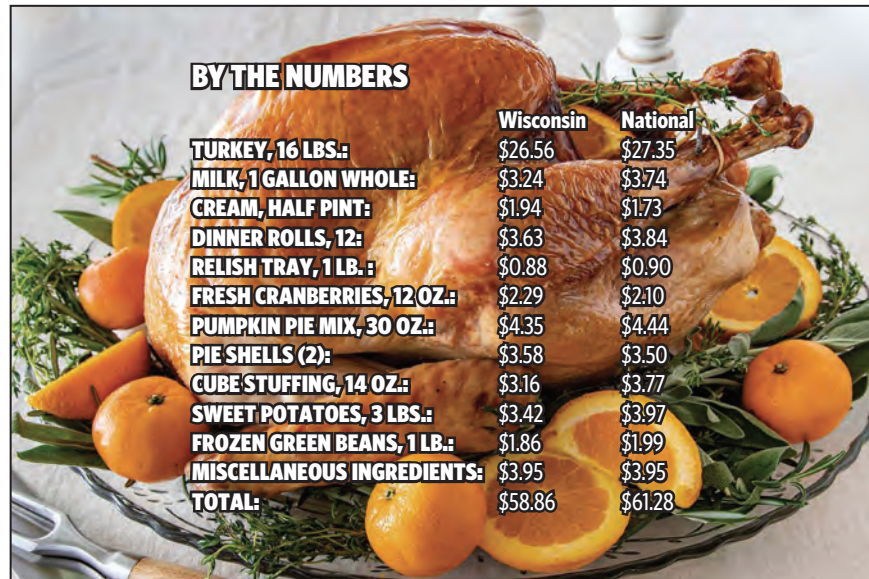
"After several years of steep inclines, it is nice to see prices come down, even slightly," said WFB Director of Media Relations and Outreach Cassie Sonnentag. "Here in America's Dairyland, we have some of the most affordable food options, making our Thanksgiving meal 3.9% less than the national average."

The Marketbasket survey looks at the price of popular food items used to prepare a Thanksgiving meal sufficient to serve 10 people. This survey allows for Wisconsin food prices to be compared with food prices from across the country. Comparatively, the American Farm Bureau Federation's survey of the same items showed an 4.5% decrease from 2022 with prices nationally at \$61.28.

Wisconsin's Thanksgiving Marketbasket survey is an informal, annual review of food price trends in relation to changing farm prices, weather and wholesale and retail food marketing. Wisconsin Farm Bureau members collected price samples of 15 Thanksgiving food items in November.

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers were asked to look for the best prices, without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase deals.

The center of the Thanksgiving meal, the turkey, is the biggest contributor to the change, as it rang in 21 cents less per pound than a year ago in Wisconsin. This is largely due

to the decline in the spread of highly pathogenic avian influenza in the past year.

While turkey prices largely contribute to the change in price overall, produce items across the board saw marginal increases statewide. Continued inflation paired with a summer-long drought are the biggest contributors to these increases.

While prices in food fluctuate year over year, the farmer's share of the food dollar remains near just 15%. According to the United States Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service, a food dollar represents a \$1 expenditure on domestically grown and raised food by U.S. consumers.

Many contributing factors continue to impact the price of food including input costs, transportation, trade, energy, advertising and workforce.

"The bottom line is farmers are

price takers, not price makers," said Sonnentag. "Despite changing prices in the grocery store, the farmer's share of the food dollar tends to track very closely to 15 cents on the dollar."

While making decisions in the grocery store, shoppers can be rest assured they are purchasing from a sustainable food supply.

According to Gather Wisconsin, preserving and protecting natural resources has always been and will always be a priority in every aspect of food production. 2023 bear season results show drop in total harvest, hunter success rates

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced preliminary results for the 2023 bear season. The 2023 bear season harvest is well below the recent annual average of about 4,000 harvested bears, representing the lowest yearly bear harvest since 2008.

Wisconsin bear hunters harvested 2,922 bears during the 2023 black bear season, a marked decrease from the 4,009 bears taken by hunters last year. This decline was observed across the state, as the bear harvest fell short of respective targets in all management zones.

Similarly, statewide hunter success dropped to 23%, down from the recent five-year average statewide hunter success rate of 32%. Hunter success rates in individual zones varied from about 60% in Zone A to about 5% in Zones E and F.

"This fall saw a remarkably high acorn crop across much of the state, and this abundance of natural food typically results in reduced hunter success rates as hunters' baits are less effective," said Randy Johnson, DNR large carnivore specialist. "Almost all of the anecdotal reports I heard from bear hunters this fall mentioned the incredible abundance of acorns and other natural foods in the woods. It is difficult to predict when these bumper acorn crops will occur, but when they do, the impact on bear hunting is unmistakable."

Harvest data indicates Zones A and B, in the northern and north-eastern parts of the state, were less impacted than other areas, with hunter success rates closer to average

at 59% and 50%, respectively. Zone C, located in the central part of the state, fell well short of its harvest target, with below-average hunter success rates as well.

Similarly, in the northwestern area of the state, Zone D saw well below-average harvest and hunter-success rates. The drop in Zone D is likely due, at least in part, to recent management actions intended to reduce bear populations in this area, combined with the abundance of natural foods available this fall.

Finally, Zones E and F, encompassing most of the state's southern areas, saw declines in average hunter success rates and total harvest.

The 2023 bear season ran from Sept. 6 to Oct. 10. Hunters were awarded 12,760 bear hunting licenses through the license lottery system. Nearly 138,000 people applied for a bear hunting license or preference point for the 2023 season, setting a record for the number of applicants. A full breakdown of the 2023 bear license drawing and license wait times is available on the DNR website.

"Interest in bear hunting continues to grow in Wisconsin and across the nation," said Johnson. "We encourage hunters to review management zone boundaries, season frameworks and license wait times as they make their hunting plans for the coming years."

Hunters wanting a license or preference point for the 2024 season are encouraged to apply through Go Wild before the Dec. 10 deadline.

Wisconsin has a thriving and expanding bear population, estimated at about 25,000.

Schmidt votes for bill allowing Baby Boxes

State Rep. Peter Schmidt, R-Bonduel, voted in favor of legislation that will provide parents a way to confidentially give up their newborn infants without facing charges. Assembly Bill 369 would allow mu-

nicipalities to install newborn infant safety devices. "I am pro-life from conception to natural death," Schmidt said. "We need to do everything possible to protect life, which this legislation does." Wisconsin's current safe haven law allows parents to anonymously surrender a newborn infant believed to be under 72 hours old to designated

authorities. However, the law does not explicitly address or permit the use of newborn infant safety devices, limiting relinquishment to in-person exchanges only. Under this legislation, a newborn infant safety device, also known as a Baby Box, would be allowed at a hospital, fire station, or law enforcement building that is staffed around

the clock. Since 2016, 14 states have adopted policies to allow for the use of Baby Boxes. "There have been too many stories lately about newborn babies being abandoned and left to die," Schmidt said. "In many communities, stigma often is attached with surrendering a baby, and this legislation will address that. Bottom line, this will save lives."

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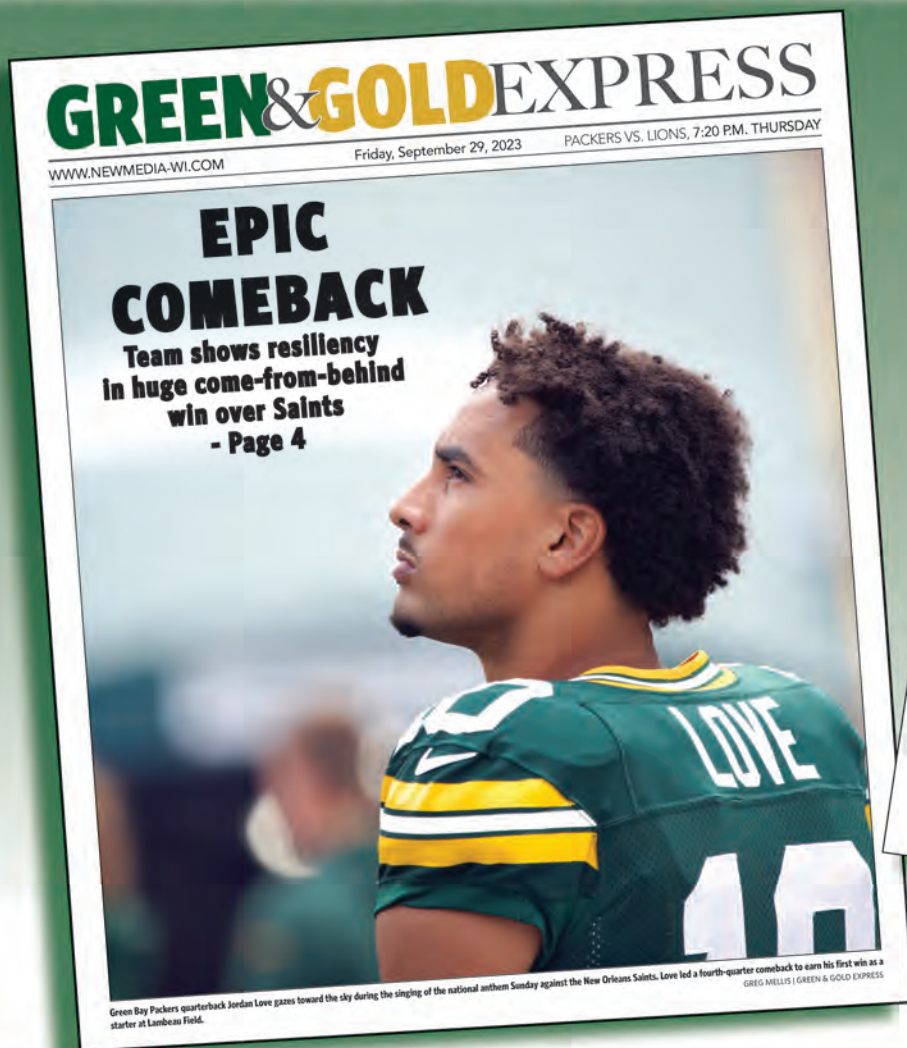

Cozy detective gets some ghostly assistance

After the grim aspects of my last book, I was ready for something “fluffy,” so I selected Eryn Scott’s “Chai, Chai Again.” It is number four in her Pebble Cove Teahouse cozy mystery series, but did well as a stand-alone.

It is early winter in Pebble Cove, Oregon, and the small fishing community has just survived one of the biggest snowstorms in decades. Rosemary “Rosie” Woodmere is happy. She is finally on her own. Though she has a great relationship with the librarian mother, Rosie has never felt adequate.

After inheriting her grandmother’s rambling cliffside house, Rosie set up a small tea shop, “Tea by the Sea,” and it has become the place for fishermen and locals to gather and share gossip. This morning they are discussing the “fan fiction” writers workshop being held by the reclusive Alistair Grande.

Locals don’t welcome outsiders. Their comments make Rosie and her best friend, Asher, smile, though no one can see it. Asher is a ghost. After the car accident that killed her father and nearly killed her, Rosie could see and communicate with ghosts.

When she moved to Pebble Cove, her ghostly contacts helped solve

a murder as well as a centuries-old case. That helped a ghost to “move on” and made Rosie very popular with the ghosts that still inhabit the area.

Ghosts can enter any property that they visited during life, so Archer can go almost anywhere as he grew up in Pebble Cove. Now he and Rosie are meticulously combing old records and journals hoping to find out who killed Archer and why.

That search gets put on hold when they get the news that Zack, one of the writers, has been found dead down by the old bridge. Rosie’s regulars all wonder if Zack was actually Alistair Grande.

Police Chief Clemenson knows about Rosie’s previous investigations and warns her to stay out of this case. Then Rosie’s mother pops in asking to store some boxes. She says she’s hoping to move to Pebble Cove. Rosie can’t freely converse with Asher when others are around, so she is doubly concerned when her mother asks to stay “a few days.”

Rosie hasn’t begun digging into Zack’s death when she learns that Poe Barker has been killed. Both men were poisoned. Suddenly, no one dares eat or drink anything made at Tea by the Sea or her friend Jolene’s bakery. Now Rosie must

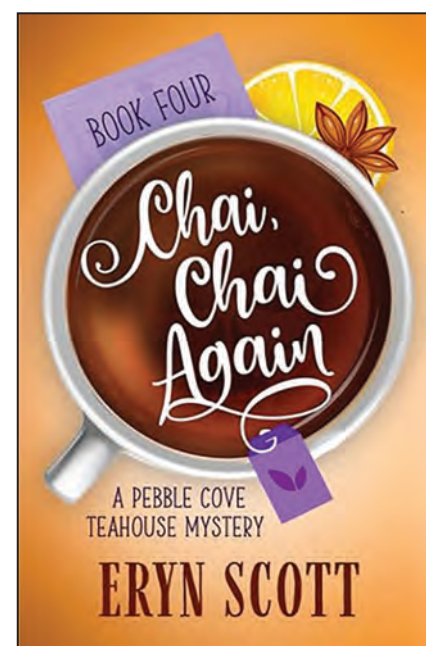

solve the crimes of go broke.

The only link between the dead men is that fact that they were middle-aged men with thinning brown hair going grey at the temples, so Rosie latches onto that. Naturally, she enlists the aid of her ghostly friends. Their tips help Rosie investigate but also force her to tell some improbable lies, and she’s very bad at lying.

Little by little she teases out the truth. The writer’s retreat was set up by someone who wanted Alistair Grande dead. Killer didn’t know Grande but did know that he was middle-aged with brown hair going grey at the temples. So, anyone with that description became a target.

With a little help from her mother, Rosie learns that Eric Knight had unsuccessfully sued Alistair Grande for stealing the plot of one of his books. She deduces that the newest fisherman, Eric, was actually Knight and they had planned the workshop hoping to find and kill Grande.



Between Rosie and the ghosts, Eric is prevented from killing the last potential victim, who turns out to be the real Alistair Grande. Though safe, the man will confess to stealing Knight’s stories before locals force him to leave town.

Finally, Rosie and Asher can return to digging into his life and untimely death. That just might be in book five or six or somewhere in the future.

Schmidt votes for farmland preservation bill

State Rep. Peter Schmidt, R-Bonduel, said in a press release that he was proud to support farmers by voting in favor of updates to the Farmland Preservation Program, which provides tax credits for good conservation practices.

“As a lifelong dairy farmer in Wisconsin, I strongly support the preservation of our precious farmland,” Schmidt said. “Preserving our farmland will ensure the security of our food supply while protecting Wisconsin’s farming industry.”

Wisconsin’s Farmland Preservation Program incentivizes the adoption of sound conservation practices by enabling farmers and eligible landowners to earn a per-acre tax credit, the size of which depends on the farmland preservation agreement and land zoning. Assembly Bill 133 decreases the length of the Farmland Preservation Program

contract between the farmer or landowner and the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection from 15 years to 10 years.

The bill increases the rate of the per-acre

tax credits:

- From \$7.50 to \$10 per acre for acres located in a farmland preservation zoning district but not subject to a farmland preservation agreement.

- From \$5 to \$10 per acre for acres that are subject to a farmland preservation agreement but not located in a farmland preservation zoning district.

- From \$10 to \$12 per acre for

acres that are located in a farmland preservation zoning district and are subject to a farmland preservation agreement.

“This legislation will help our small family farms, and that’s a

good thing for Wisconsin,” Schmidt said. “The Farmland Preservation Program gives farmers and landowners added incentives while keeping land available for future generations.”

Love's big day leads Packers to victory

Packers score more than 20 points for first time since Week 2

Green Bay Packers quarterback Jordan Love reached 300 passing yards for the first time in his career, as the Green Bay Packers took down the Los Angeles Chargers 23-20 on Nov. 19 in Green Bay.

Love finished the game with 322 passing yards and two touchdown passes. Green Bay's passing offense was the story of the game as both Aaron Jones and Emanuel Wilson exited the game with injuries. Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs both recorded touchdown receptions, but it was rookie wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks who led the team in receiving with 91 yards.

"I think it was one of our better games in my career as a starter so far," said Love, when asked if he thought this was his best game. "I mean it is everybody, like the receivers making the plays and getting a lot of (yards after the catch) on those drives was huge. It takes everybody, as you can see."

Thirty-five of Wicks' yards came on Green Bay's game winning drive. Down 20-16 and facing second-and-10 from the Green Bay 39, Love connected with a wide open Wicks for that 35-yard gain. After a two-yard gain from A.J. Dillon, Love connected with Doubs for 24-yards, to ultimately score the winning touchdown.

Green Bay's defense held the dynamic Chargers offense to 20 points on 394 yards. Chargers quarterback Justin Herbert passed for 244 yards, with Keenan Allen recording 116 receiving yards on 10 receptions. Allen also scored a touchdown.

As for the run game, Herbert was also the leading rusher, recording 73 yards. Chargers running back Austin Ekeler, who led the NFL in touchdowns last year, was held out of the end zone and recorded just 64 yards on the ground.

Down three near the end of the game, both teams exchanged punts, before the Chargers took over at its own 20-yard line. With no timeouts, Herbert connected with Ekeler for a gain of six yards. Herbert then threw a pass that landed incomplete intended for Allen. On the play, Packers defensive back Keisean Nixon was called for pass interference and Los Angeles was given a first down.

The Packers defense then buckled down, as it forced an incomplection and tackled Allen after a four-yard reception.

With 31 seconds left and facing a third-and-six, Herbert threw deep down the left side of the field to a pass intended for rookie wide receiver Quentin Johnston. Johnston had a step on Packers defensive back Carrington Valentine but dropped what would have been the go-ahead touchdown. From there on fourth down, Herbert's pass was batted down by Packers defensive tackle Kenny Clark and the Packers took

over to kneel the clock out.

"It was huge at the end of the game. I would say our defense bailed me out for the conservative calls at the end of the game," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur.

Even though the Chargers had the lead late, the turning point of the game may have been early in the fourth quarter. The Chargers, starting at its own 25, drove down to the Green Bay 2-yard line on four plays. On first-and-goal, Herbert's pass intended for Allen landed incomplete, and then on second down, Packers linebacker Rashan Gary recovered a

fumble from Ekeler to stop the Chargers from taking a two-score lead.

"That fumble recovery down there in the red area was absolutely critical to keep points off of the board and to give us an opportunity to go down," said LaFleur.

With the win, Green Bay now moves to 4-6 on the season and with the Chicago Bears losing to the Detroit Lions, the Packers are now a game and a half up on the Bears for the third spot in the NFC North. The Packers also now hold a 17% to make the playoffs, according to the New York Times Playoff Simulator.

Can any Packer have a breakout game?

Packers' offense vs. Lions' defense

The Packers' offense has been a mixed bag throughout the course of the season.

That was to be expected with as many young players as they've been relying on. The number of young players has grown since the last time these two teams played. The Packers found out just before the team kicked off against the Lions that David Bakhtiari would be placed on injured reserve and would miss the rest of the season.

The offensive line, as a result, has struggled. Rasheed Walker and Yosh Njiman have both played left tackle this season. Neither has taken firm hold of the job. Njiman has been injured each time he's gotten extended action.

They'll need that group to play better this time than they did the last time these two teams met.

The Lions' defensive front has been stout against the run all year.

That could present a problem for the Packers, who have not been able to run the ball as well as they'd hoped at this point in the season.

Aaron Jones has been in and out of the lineup. AJ Dillon has struggled, even if he has played better recently. Overall, the Packers do not have an individual rusher that has gone over 100 yards in a game on the season.

Regardless of how the running backs are performing in the passing game, the Packers need to be more productive in the run game.

The offense isn't going to be successful without a competent rushing attack against this Lions defense.

The pass catching group has been a mixed bag for the Packers. Jordan Love has spread the ball around to a variety of receivers all year. Romeo Doubs has been effective in the red zone but inefficient elsewhere. Jayden Reed was a big part of the team's offense against Pittsburgh. He had two big catches and 84 yards total on the day.

One of the disappointing aspects of the season has been Christian Watson. Love's passer rating when he's targeting Watson is below 38. For comparison's sake, throwing the ball in the stands on every play would give him a passer rating of

39. It has not been a good season for Watson.

Luke Musgrave is starting to come on of late. He hit an explosive play against Los Angeles and Pittsburgh. He's likely to be a big part of the offense between now and the end of the season.

Packers' defense vs. Lions' offense

The Packers' defense looks to be a bit of fool's gold at this point of the season. They've done a good job at limiting points for opposing offenses.

They also have only faced three offenses in the top half of the league in scoring to date.

One of those was Detroit, who is ranked sixth. The Lions scored 34 points, and likely could have had more if the score was closer.

One potential pressure point for the Green Bay defense is the cornerback situation. Jaire Alexander has been in and out of the lineup all season, so his status for the game will be unclear.

That's likely to be the case for the rest of the season.

That leaves the team with three healthy cornerbacks – Carrington Valentine, Keisean Nixon and Corey Ballentine.

The potential shortage at cornerback comes at a time where the Packers are facing one of the more dynamic passing offenses in football, an offense that is ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in scoring.

Jared Goff is often looked at as a failed draft pick for the Rams, but he's been excellent for the Lions. Goff has shed the label of draft bust and become a player the Lions believe can lead them to a Super Bowl.

He distributes the ball to all of his playmakers, but his go-to guy is Amon-Ra St. Brown.

St. Brown has caught at least 90 passes in each of his first two seasons as a pro.

He operates primarily in the slot, where he'll be met by Nixon.

Nixon has struggled this season;

his passer rating against him when he's targeted is over 100.

Apart from St. Brown, Sam LaPorta has emerged as a weapon for the Lions' offense. He is one of their top receivers in the passing game and makes an impact as a blocker as well in the run game.

Speaking of the run game.

The Lions have the 12th overall pick in the backfield. Jahmyr Gibbs is one of the more explosive young players in the NFL. He's also the style of back that typically gives Green Bay fits. He did not in the first matchup of the season, but David Montgomery had plenty to say about the first game's outcome.

Special teams

The Packers' special teams has started to wobble a little bit. Anders Carlson is starting to struggle, and has missed a kick in every game except for one since the bye week.

Nixon, however, is finding his groove. He had more than 100 yards

What's a week look like with limited to no reps?

It's a lot of mental preparation. I'm taking all the scout team reps, but sometimes the card is a completely different concept that you just have never seen before, and it's something specific for the defense. For me, it's usually trying to be really precise in going through progressions and just staying within the game plan.

Whenever 10's up, just being behind and going through my own footwork and saying, 'OK, I'm throwing here. Perfect, he did the same.' Or, 'He threw here, and I was thinking I would go there. Why am I having a different thought? Who's right? Let's have a conversation about it so that way we can both grow.' In practice, it's a lot of that. And then outside the facility, it's a lot of tape and trying to text ideas to Matt and the coaching staff and get everybody as prepared as possible and cross every 'T,' dot every 'I.' Just making sure that everyone's ready. Through that process, it keeps me in the game. So if, God forbid, I had to go, I'm prepared, as well.

How do you stay in rhythm running cards when the wide receivers might not have seen those concepts either?

Football is football, at the end of the day. Certain things you just kind of look at the card and, 'All right, I'm going to go one, two, three. I'm going to here vs. one-high or here vs. two-high.' It's really just the thought in my mind of going through progressions and reading defenses, seeing the contours change so, if I did have to go out, I feel super confident that I'd be able to do the same. It's the same game that we've been playing for a long time. It's just having that confidence and really that confidence in the game plan and knowing that down cold.

Sounds like it's more work

in the return game against the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The weather turning colder should allow him to return more kickoffs. It will be interesting to see if Detroit simply elects to kick the ball

to get ready if you're not taking practice reps.

I think it's different work. He's working as hard as anybody, same as me. I think it is a little bit different work, where he might get the reps in practice, so that means that I've got to stay after practice and I've got to go through the footwork on specific plays that I didn't get the rep at. I use a lot of time on the Friday and Saturday to get the extra mental reps.

Alex McGough and I on Saturdays will run through the call sheet, and he'll call it to me, and I'll stand there act like I'm in the huddle the same way I would be in the huddle. Not just say it but actually put myself in there and say, 'All right, here we go. We're going to go da-da-da on blank' and then go up and go through my

keys. It's different work. That's probably the best way to put it, because everyone's working hard, but I just have to work a little bit differently to put myself in the game.

Is it weird to not play? The last time was 2018.

It's been good, honestly. I think it's always nice to take a step back and see, watch, observe another quarterback or other guys play, just because you learn so much by watching – as long as you're willing to watch and listen and learn. That was one thing I told myself early in the year is, 'All right, let's try to soak up as much as possible and get better every single day. One percent better every single day, no matter what.' I feel like I've accomplished that so far. Obviously, we have a long season

to go, lots of wins to get, so there's a lot more work to be done. But, all in all, I feel like I've progressed and continued to make strides in the little things I want to get better at.

Are you as prepared now as you would have been Week 1, after taking all those reps and in the flow?

I'll be better than I would've been. For sure.

How?

Just the confidence that I have that every week, every day, really, I've gotten 1% better. From 10 weeks ago, I've gotten that many days better, in my opinion. Every single day, I've made a stride in some regard. Sometimes it's a mistake that I'm learning from and I've learned from. I'd be ready to play my best ball.

He's caught at least 90 passes in both seasons of his young career. The Packers could be short-handed at cornerback with Jaire Alexander in and out of the lineup with injuries.

Carrington Valentine has put together some solid games since being elevated to the starting lineup when Rasul Douglas was traded to Buffalo.

Keisean Nixon has struggled in his transition to full-time starter this year. His passer rating when he is

Corey Ballentine is the next man up if Alexander can't go. He's done some nice things since being elevated from the practice squad, but St. Brown is a different animal than some of the receivers they've been matched up against.

He can dominate a game. The Packers need to make someone else beat them.

Packers vs. Lions' run game

The Packers have given up 200 yards rushing in three games this season. One of those came earlier this year when the Packers and Lions met on Thursday Night Football in late September.

David Montgomery and Jahmyr Gibbs ran all over a Packers' defense that looked lost for a vast majority of the night.

There's no reason to believe the Lions should have a different game

plan when the two teams meet up Thanksgiving Day.

The Lions have a dynamic passing game, but their identity is within their physicality. They run the ball. They stop the run. The Packers need to be prepared for another physical game.

Packers' offensive line vs. Aidan Hutchinson

Aidan Hutchinson has not been in the NFL for long, but he has already become a thorn in the Packers' side.

Hutchinson was picked second overall by the Lions a year ago to boost their pass rush and help change their culture.

He has done both.

He had 9.5 sacks as a rookie with three interceptions.

One of which came on an ill-advised pass to David Bakhtiari when the Packers were in Detroit last November.

Hutchinson followed that up with two sacks at Lambeau Field in the season finale.

The Packers' offensive line has struggled with the top-tier rushers in the NFL. Hutchinson has been one of the best rushers in all of football as well, and he's even better on the fast track in Detroit.

The last time the Packers and Lions met up, Love was under siege for a vast majority of the game.

Hutchinson was the one who spearheaded that operation. He had a sack and eight pressures against Green Bay. He completely took over the game.

The Packers were able to limit Aaron Donald and T.J. Watt in recent weeks but have struggled throughout Hutchinson's career against him.

For the offense to have any chance at Ford Field, they need to keep him quiet.

Green Bay loses running backs Jones and Wilson in Week 11 win

It wasn't a running back that led the team in rushing last week; rather, it was rookie wide receiver Jayden Reed, who recorded 46 yards on three carries in Green Bay's Week 11 win over the Los Angeles Chargers.

As the Packers lost running backs Aaron Jones and Emanuel Wilson, fans may see a little bit more of Reed (or others) running the ball against Detroit. Given the short, four day turn-around, it seems likely that both running backs will be inactive on Thanksgiving, and if they are active, probably won't see a lot of work. That means that A.J. Dillon will start, but who will back him up is unknown. With that unknown behind Dillon, plays like Reed's jet sweep touch-down are probably going to have to be instituted this week in practice.

"That's a great question," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur, when asked how he gameplans with-

out having a certain answer at the back up running back position. "It is another great challenge."

The good thing for Green Bay is the athleticism that the team has on offense. What the team lacks in difference-making talent, it more than makes up for in speed. It will be about how the team can get those players, like Reed and Christian Watson, the ball in space, so that they can make those plays that fans are used to seeing from Jones.

Getting those players going will only help Jordan Love against a very good Detroit Lions team.

"They are playmakers," said Love, when asked about rookies Reed and Dontayvion Wicks. "They are two explosive guys, I mean when you get the ball in their hands, they are able to make guys miss and just make those plays. Reed was in the run game a lot today, so they are just play makers."

The concern coming into the season was how can these young pass

catchers positively affect the game. While that is still a concern, it seems like this coming week is a week that LaFleur on the coaching staff can experiment a little bit. Whether that means more jet sweeps or double

passes, Green Bay is probably going to have to pull out all of its tricks to beat the Lions.

"This league has a way of humbling you and like I have said a million times, every week is a new challenge, but it is also a new opportunity," said LaFleur. "We have a great task in front of us - a team that has really gotten after us the last four times. (We) have a lot of respect for Dan (Campbell) and what he has been able to establish. We are going to need our best effort. No doubt about it."

Like LaFleur said, that effort is going to be desperately needed if the team wants a chance to knock off the top dogs in the division. With the Packers win over the Chargers, the playoffs are not out of the water yet, so everyone is going to need to be on the ball in order for Green Bay to crawl back out of its hole. That may start with getting the ball to Reed and Wicks as much as possible on Thursday.



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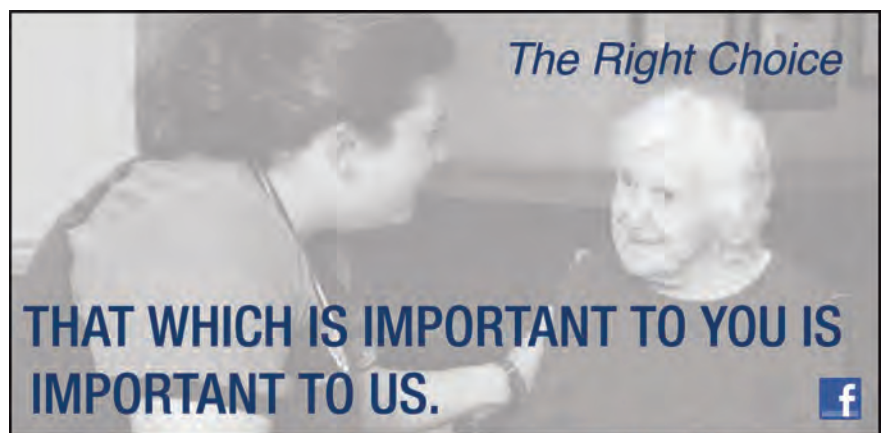
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
