Hovde fights back against attack ads

GOP Senate candidate talks about inflation, southern border woes during Irish Greens campaign stop

U.S. Senate candidate Eric Hovde told a group of Oconto-area supporters July 8 his staff was building a section of his campaign website, tentatively called “Truth Matters,” to address the various claims he said Sen. Tammy Baldwin and her supporters have been making about him in their TV ads.

“Senator Baldwin, the day I announced back in February, prior to me even announcing, she has been playing the politics of personal destruction and trying to portray me in ways that are just fundamentally wrong,” Hovde said during a campaign stop at Irish Greens Golf Course.

Baldwin spent \$4 million to \$5 million telling everyone in the state that Hovde is a Californian, he said, when in fact he is a fourth-generation Wisconsin native who went to UW-Madison.

“I’ve spent more time in Wisconsin than Tammy Baldwin has by a long shot, but that’s what she told everybody,” Hovde said.

Farmers market could move next summer

Popular Tuesday afternoon market seeks new home at Memorial Field

The wheels are in motion to move the Oconto County Farmers Market to a new home in 2025.

The Oconto Falls City Council on July 9 approved continued conversations with coordinator Sophie Ford about moving the weekly market from its current location at Highland Plaza to Memorial Field next summer.

Ford approached the city about the need to move to a bigger location, City Administrator Peter Wills told the council.

“The great news is the success has grown, and she has the need for parking and she could have even more vendors,” Wills said.

The farmers market is currently in its fourth year at Highland Square, open 4-8 p.m. Tuesdays from June through August and featuring a variety of vendors, food trucks and live music.

Wills said he told Ford the market will have to work with other groups that use the park during the summer, such as youth baseball and football leagues.

“I wasn’t looking at all to say, you

know, ‘Here’s the dates you can have your farmers market.’ I mean, we’re saying: ‘Here’s where you can be, but make it work with the other groups,’” Wills said. “I just wanted to get feedback early enough that she can begin to plan for next year.”

with the idea — as is the fire department, which recently moved into its new home at the south end of the park.

The council unanimously agreed to let Wills continue to pursue the idea with Ford.

The 59-year-old Madison businessman made the remarks in response to a question about a current attack ad that says Hovde wants to raise insurance premiums for overweight people, doesn't think older people should vote and is being sued for elder abuse.

Hovde said the insurance allegation was drawn from a snippet of a comment he made 14 years ago about finding ways to motivate people to take better care of themselves. The suggestion about elderly voters was extrapolated from a passing reference he made, while answering a question about election integrity, about the Racine County sheriff's investigation that found people were stealing ballots and voting for nursing home residents with dementia or at end of life, he said.

The elder abuse lawsuit was just recently filed, attached to a year-old lawsuit against a nursing home to which Hovde's bank had made a loan, he said.

"They won't serve us with the lawsuit ... because we would immediately go to the court and have it dismissed," Hovde said. "We don't run the nursing home; we have nothing to do with it."

He said Democrats have

no issues to run on, so they are resorting to lies and gaslighting.

"Democrats are very good at gaslighting you, accusing you of doing something when they're the ones doing it," Hovde said. "'We're defending democracy' — How are you doing that? You've turned our court system into political theater; you've weaponized our justice system. They've tried to deny President Trump from being on the ballot, illegally; fortunately that got shot down."

On the issues, Hovde said President Joe Biden and the Democratic Congress created the worst bout of inflation in 40 years.

"Inflation is caused first and foremost by printing too much money. What is inflation? Too much money chasing a fixed amount of goods and services," he said. "Second, inflation is caused by all the regulations, because you mandate that and you're selling one product at a loss, you have to subsidize it on your products that are making money."

He said the influx of people entering the country illegally at the southern border has strained the U.S. health care system

and brought criminals and at least 350 people from the terrorist watch list into the country.

Troubles at the border have exacerbated the fentanyl crisis, and as many as 100,000 children who crossed can't be accounted for, Hovde said.

"The only beneficiaries

of the open border are the drug and human trafficking cartels," he said.

Still, Hovde said one of his top priorities is finding a way to heal the division in the country.

"We all play a role in this division, but we've got to come together as a country. We really do,"

he said. "We have major obstacles and problems that we have to face, and we can't fix it by being at war."

He cited a campaign ad that the Hovde campaign ran around Independence Day calling for people to come together to get things done.

"I didn't want to turn the campaign into just smear. I think people are tired of all of this nonsense, and I'm trying to talk about issues," Hovde said. "I'm trying to get more positive messages out so it's not just going into the gutter like she has done."

The weekly summer community market in Gillett is really getting popular this year, the Gillett City Council was told July 11.

"We have to have at least 30 vendors now every Thursday," said Shannon Stoner, director of the Gillett Public Library. "They sell everything from homemade crafts to soaps to homemade signs. It's really amazing how well that has grown."

The community market is held from 5-7 p.m. Thursdays at Ebenreiter Community Square, between the library at 200 E. Main St. and the community center in the former bank building next door. Plans are for the market to run weekly through Oct. 24.

We're having Eagle III (rescue helicopter). We're having our EMS vehicles, and we're also having our raffle, and all proceeds this year are going to our wonderful Gillett Fire Department."

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Children's bodies found; search continues for father in sailboat tragedy

The bodies of two children from Little Suamico were found July 15 in the waters of Green Bay near Fish Creek, but the search continued for their father, who was piloting the family's sailboat when they failed to return from an outing the night of July 13.

Door County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Pat McCarty told reporters that searchers found the missing sailboat at about 6:23 a.m. just south of Chambers Island. The children's bodies were found in the water around 11:21 a.m., about a mile south of where the capsized boat was found.

Personnel were back on the bay of Green Bay at the break of dawn July 15, searching for Bill Salmik and his two children, who were 3 and 5 years old. They went sailing from Oconto near the breakwater the evening of July 13 and were last seen near Egg Harbor and Green Island.

They were supposedly headed for Rileys Bay, an inlet on Green Bay just west of Sturgeon Bay, before the storms hit. A family member posted on Facebook they were last seen at Green Island

around 5 p.m. Saturday.

McCarty said the U.S. Coast Guard, sheriff's department and other emergency agencies were still looking for Salmik, 32, at the time of the press briefing around 2 p.m. July 15.

Two injured in truck, motorcycles crash

Manitowoc woman lost both limbs on left side of her body

A Manitowoc couple well-known in their community for their efforts to make a positive impact were critically injured when the motorcycles they were riding were struck head on the afternoon of July 6.

A Cecil woman faces five felony charges for her alleged role in the crash.

Shawano County sheriff's deputies, Shawano Ambulance and the Cecil-Washington Fire Department responded to County Road R and Lily Pond Road in the Town of Washington at about 3:18 p.m.

Jason and Tina Prigge were transported by helicopter to local hospitals. Tina Prigge, 52, lost her left leg from the knee on down as well as her left arm. Jason Prigge, 50, suffered a shattered leg.

Lt. Chris Madle said Tina Prigge is in critical but stable condition, while Jason Prigge is in stable condition.

The driver of the pickup truck, Kaitlynn F. Cress, Cecil, was uninjured. According to the sheriff's department, Cress, who has since turned 29, was northbound on County

Road R when she reportedly crossed the center line and struck the Prigges' southbound motorcycles. A 22-year-old man driving behind the Prigges said was almost struck by Cress after she struck the motorcycles.

On July 9, Cress was charged with two counts of reckless driving causing great bodily harm, two counts of first degree recklessly endangering safety and one count of second degree recklessly endangering safety. Combined, the charges carry maximum penalties of \$95,000, 47 years in prison or both.

A cash bond of \$12,000 was set by Judge William Kussel Jr.

A preliminary hearing was set for 8:15 a.m. July 15 in front of Judge Katherine Sloma in Shawano County Circuit Court Branch 1.

Amber Daus, a friend of Jason and Tina Prigge, has set up a GoFundMe page to help pay for the couple's medical expenses.

As of July 10, \$121,443 of a \$100,000 goal was raised.

According to Daus, Tina Prigge serves as president of the Manitowoc International Relations Association and is a board member of the Manitowoc Symphony Orchestra.

Jason Prigge is the board

president of Grow It Forward Inc., an accomplished artist, and a member of the NOAA Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council.

Daus wrote in a July 9 update on the GoFundMe page that Jason Prigge successfully underwent corrective surgery with placement of a rod to repair his crushed left leg.

"Tina underwent an additional surgery on the loss of her limbs," Daus wrote. "The doctors are likely to perform additional surgeries down the road. Today Tina's breathing tube was removed, and she is now breathing on her own. They had to give her another blood transfusion today. In addition to all that she has undergone, she is also dealing with a fractured pelvis and broken vertebrae."

County Road R was closed for about three hours during the investigation of the crash.

Also assisting at the scene were the Wisconsin State Patrol, Shawano County Highway Department, Oconto County Highway Department, Thedastar Air Transport and Eagle III Air Transport.

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Extended fall absentee voting hours OK'd

The Oconto Falls City Clerk's Office has been granted permission to extend its office hours during the run-up to the Nov. 5 election to accommodate voters who want to submit an in-person absentee ballot.

Deputy Clerk Jenny Friedman asked the city council July 9 for the OK to keep the office open until 6 p.m. in an effort to put the city on somewhat more equal footing with bigger municipalities that have enough staff for much longer hours.

"This would give us a little bit more of a window

for citizens," Friedman said.

Normally the office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The City Council approved Friedman's request to keep the doors open until 6 p.m. from Oct. 22 through Nov. 2.

Kurtz recently completed the Law Enforcement Academy at Mid-State Technical College and holds a bachelor's degree from the University of

Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

"Both of these ladies possess a strong appreciation for small town America and a desire to creatively serve the public," Breitenbach said.

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Fire station dedication, open house dates set

The City of Oconto Falls has set the dates for the dedication and a public open house for the community's new fire station. The dedication is set for 11 a.m. Aug. 7 at the new home of the Oconto Falls Fire Department, 431 Union Ave., at the south end of Memorial Field. The Oconto Falls Area Chamber of Commerce is planning to stage a ribbon cutting. During the July 9 city council meeting, City Administrator Peter Wills said Gov. Tony Evers has been invited, along with state Department of Administration (DOA) officials, state Assembly and Senate representatives, employees of Zeise Construction and Wendell

Architects, as well as local residents. The new facility was built with the help of a \$7 million infrastructure grant funded through the federal American Rescue Plan Act and administered through the DOA. The public open house has been scheduled for 3-5 p.m. Aug. 25. Fire Chief Tim Magnin told the city council he expects the department will be able to close out the grant ahead of schedule, although some minor problems are still being worked out in the new building. "There's little stuff — some of the heating and air conditioning units, some of that stuff we're tweaking a little bit," Magnin said. "There's certain things in the building that I consider wasting

energy, because things are working more than they should. So we're trying to tweak all that stuff — lighting, air." It will take awhile before the department is fully acclimated to the new facility. The department moved from its old home at 98 Jackson St. starting June 1.

Fun in the Falls returns again Aug. 17

The Oconto Falls City Council gave its preliminary blessing July 9 to a second edition of the Fun in the Falls festival. Troy Fowler told the council the event is scheduled for Aug. 17 and is not affiliated with the group that staged the first

revival last year. Years ago, Fun in the Falls was part of the annual City-Wide Rummage Sale Weekend; for the second year, the festival is scheduled for the following Saturday. "We're basically looking to do the exact same concept," Fowler told the council, including family activities such as a dunk tank, bounce houses and a petting zoo. Fowler said he has been talking with S&S Hometown Bar and Restaurant about putting together a tournament of some kind, involving pool, darts or corn hole, as part of the celebration. "Everything will be at Memorial Field, minus the outlying thing like the

tournament," Fowler said. A smoker competition is also in the mix, and possibly a street dance along Central Avenue, he said. For this year, the group is not pursuing a temporary license to serve alcohol. "Pretty much everything right now looks like it will be more centered around kids," Fowler said. "Maybe if it's a success this year, next year we can get some more adult-themed stuff." The council normally would give final approval to such an event at its regular monthly meeting the second Tuesday in August, but this year the meeting was moved to Aug. 20 to avoid a conflict

with the Aug. 13 primary election. The City Council Chambers at Oconto Falls City Hall are part of the polling place. Aldermen voted to conditionally approve Fun in the Falls, as long as proper permitting and other arrangements are made with city officials.

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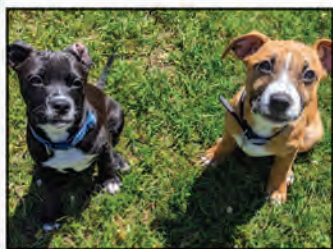
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Woodworking a family affair for Golies

Quillwork, beadwork also keep dad, mom and three sons busy

Golie's Woodworking is a true family business, involving Matt Golie; his wife, Terri Golie; and their three sons, Josiah, 12, Quinn, 9, and Micah, 5.

In fact, the most commonly-used word heard in the Golie household is "we." According to Matt Golie, "we" means all of his choices and decisions involve the whole family. He said that their sons are brought up with a sense of responsibility and a joy of learning by being involved with wood-working projects.

Matt Golie is the pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Keshena. He previously served with the Assembly of God locations in Shawano and Gillett.

"We've been connected to our community for quite some time," he said. "Before the reservation, I had a business where we did cell phone, computer and tablet repair, Gadget Gurus. When we transferred to Keshena, the workload got to where I didn't have the flexibility to fix devices on a tight timeframe."

Matt Golie decided that woodworking would be a better fit for the family.

"The Menominee tribe is known for

lumber, and we figured that that would be a business format that would actually speak the language of our community," he said. "So, we started playing around with lumber and began with small signs and cutting boards and have been adding and developing as we go."

"It started by word of mouth," Terri Golie added. "People would request family signs for their houses."

They also started crafting one-of-a-kind cutting boards that they showed at a craft fair at Menominee Casino Resort in Keshena.

"The 'I love you more than fry bread' boards were a big hit," Matt Golie said, smiling at the memory.

The variety of wood items the family crafts is extensive. They are currently creating a pulpit for an Ojibwe church in Milwaukee. Matt explained that they are incorporating the Ojibwe greeting term "bozhoo" into the pulpit. The design includes animals that represent the different clans of that tribe.

The family carefully includes language from indigenous tribes into some of their other creations.

They also make plaques for the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin's human resources department to honor employee longevity milestones.

Other items that they craft are tic tac toe boards, wooden coffee mugs and wood-wrapped insulated mugs. One of their items is a business card holder, crafted to look like a canoe. Josiah helps to paint the holders to look like birch bark. They also do quillwork and beadwork.

"We really love and appreciate our community, and we've learned a lot from our community," Matt Golie said.

He said the family received a lot of help from Paula Waukau, a Menominee elder who taught the Golies how to do quillwork.

"With the quillwork and the beadwork stuff, we've intentionally taken time to learn from people in the tribe," he said. "Especially with the quillwork, I really feel like that was a really important piece to learn from someone within the tribe."

Describing how they start new projects, Matt Golie said, "We learn as we go, look at things and kind of make it up as we go. For example, I have a friend who has a catering business, and he asked me if I could make a

tortilla press. I've never made one. But since I work with wood, we just played around with it and came up with one."

Matt Golie said there are a couple of different methods when it comes to quillwork.

"There's birchbark quillwork, where you're actually going through a piece of real birch bark," he said. You lay out your design before you start and then you work your quill through it. I know of one person on the reservation that can do it. The other method is a wrap, that's more common. An example is dangling earrings or circle earrings, with the quills wrapped around."

The Golies harvest the quills from dead porcupines.

"We have friends who'll call us to say they've found a dead porcupine on the

Beltran is a black belt under the lineage of Carlson Gracie Jiu Jitsu.

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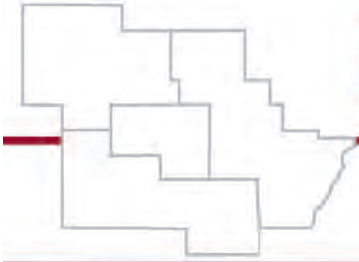

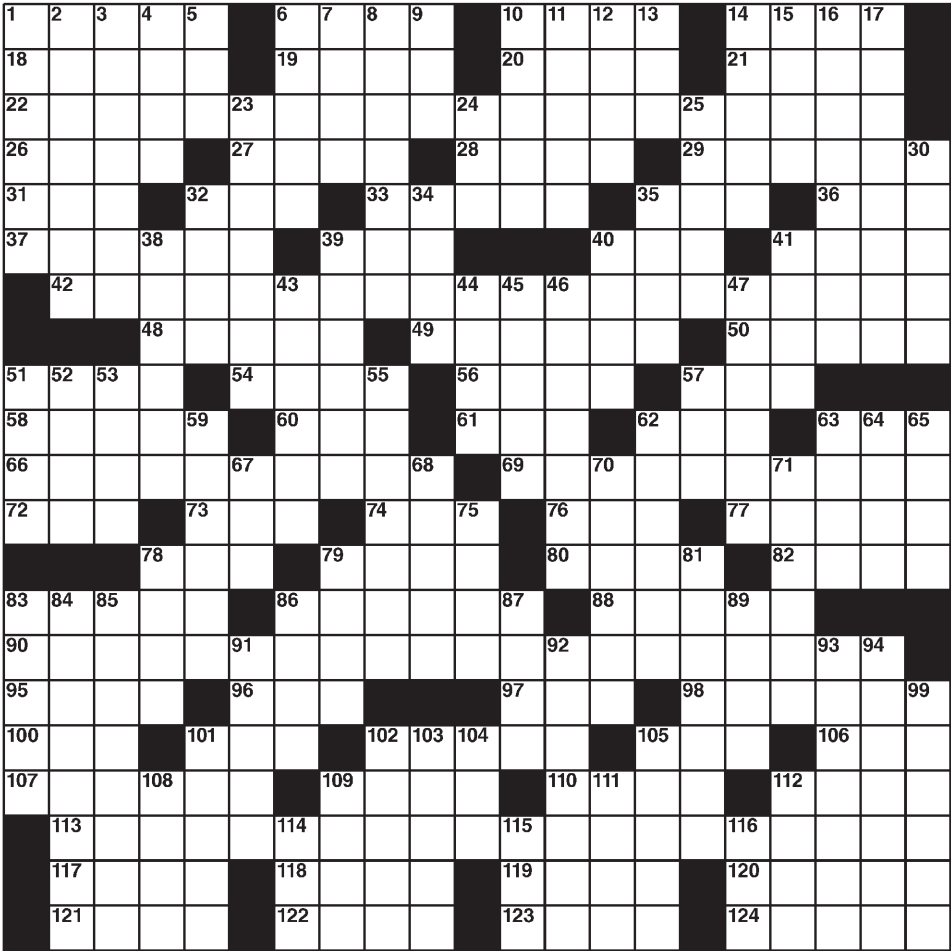

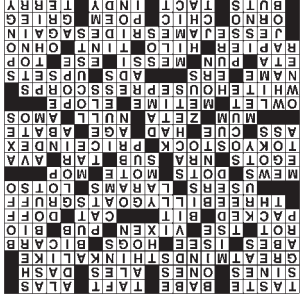

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Menominee forest story focus of statewide fall conference

“The Beginning of Change: Tribal History, Tribal Treaties and the Menominee Forest Story” is the theme of the 2024 Forest History Association Of Wisconsin (FHAW) Fall Conference, slated to be held in Keshena in October.

Registration is underway and will end in September for the Oct. 11-12 conference, which will be held at the Menominee Casino Resort and Convention Center.

“We want to bring attention to and tell the story of the Menominee Forest, which is so large it can actually be seen from the space station,” said John Grossman, FHAW board president.

The Oct. 11 activities will include tours of the Menominee Logging Museum, the largest and most complete logging museum in the United States, and the Menominee Cultural Museum, the focal point of Menominee culture, history and language.

In the afternoon, there will be a forest tour followed by a visit to the College of Menominee Nation for a tour of the Applications in Sustainable Development Institute Program, Forest Gardening

and Phenology Trail. “The Friday tour will be limited to one busload of attendees, about 50 people,” Grossman said. Jennifer Gauthier, director of the Sustainable Development Institute at the College of Menominee Nation, will be the Oct. 11 evening speaker. She will talk about “Building Connections and Relationships through the Menominee Theoretical Model of Sustainability.”

Multiple lectures are scheduled for the morning of Oct. 12.

These will include “Menominee Before European Contact” presented by David Overstreet, “Ancient Gardening” by Jeff Grignon and “Termination and Restoration of the Menominee Tribe” by Doug Cox.

The final lecture, planned for after lunch, will be “Applying Chief Oshkosh’s Vision to Modern Forest Management Practice” by Ron Waukau.

Then, a panel of speakers will provide a closing discussion about “The Beginning of Change-Tribal History, Tribal Treaties and the Menominee Forest Story.”

“We are planning to limit overall attendance to an announced 125,” Grossman said.

The goal of the FHAW



The blacksmith shop at the Menominee Logging Museum is among the buildings used to tell the history of the Menominee Forest and the people who worked in it. Construction of the first building of the logging camp museum complex started in 1969 when ground was broken for the bunkhouse and cook shanty. Afterward a wood butcher’s shop, blacksmith shop, saw filer’s shack, horse barn and old-time camp office were constructed.

FOREST HISTORY ASSOCIATION OF WISCONSIN

is to educate residents on the history and importance of Wisconsin forests in the continued growth of the state. In that vein, the association’s website (<https://www.foresthistoryassociationwi.com>) has archived material about the Menominee story (click on Publications tab, then the Finding Aids link).

“Part of our mission to archive involves developing a collection of materials that K-12 kids can access for National History

Day projects, and for now, we’ve picked up a few documents on the Menominee story,” Grossman said. “One is a 125-page report generated from a meeting in Neopit in 1951, prior to termination, that involves leaders from the Indian Service at the time, some USFS researchers, and MTE leadership. There’s another report generated by a nonprofit in 1958, post-termination, that poses questions about the merit of what is being

proposed.”

Leading up to the conference will be a pair of webinars, one by Carol Cornelius, a professor at University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, and the other by Grignon.

Cornelius’ webinar is set for Sept. 11. She will address the removal of New York Indians to today’s lands of the Menominee. She will also discuss her book “A History in Indigenous Voices - Menominee, Ho-Chunk, Oneida,

Stockbridge and Brother-town Interactions in the Removal Era.”

On Sept. 18, Grignon, the tribal historic preservation officer, will offer a review of Menominee treaty discussions with the New York tribes and the federal government.

Further details have yet to be announced.

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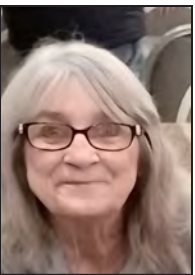

• When appearing before the BOR, the person must specify in writing, his or her estimate of the land value and improvements that he or she is objecting and the person must specify the information that he or she used to arrive at that estimate.
• No person may appear before the BOR, testify to the BOR by phone or object to a valuation; if the assessor or objector made the valuation using the income method; unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the manual under state law (sec.73.03(2a), Wis.Stats.), that the assessor requests. The municipality or county must provide by ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses provided to the assessor under this paragraph and provide exceptions for persons using the information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determines that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under state law (sec.19.35(1), Wis.Stats.).
