Safe Kids Oconto County alerts
caregivers to hazards of hot cars

With much of the country still suffering under record-high temperatures, Safe Kids Oconto County is reminding parents that the space inside of a car can quickly rise to deadly temperatures —and that caregivers should never leave children alone in a vehicle, even for a minute.

Doing so puts children at serious risk of heatstroke, which has resulted in seven deaths so far this year and at least 1,132 hot car deaths since 1998. In more than half of these cases, the parent or caregiver unknowingly left the child in the vehicle.

Lower temperatures do not take away the risk. Many times, people are surprised to learn that deaths in hot cars have occurred on days with temps as low as 57 degrees.

Intentionally leaving a child in the car isn't always the case in these tragedies. Children sometimes gain access to a vehicle without their caregiver knowing, people

forget children when their normal routines are disrupted, or a quick errand takes longer than expected.

"Our goal is to make sure that heatstroke doesn't claim the life of another child," said Mary Rosner, Safe Kids Oconto County coordinator. "Many people are shocked to learn that the temperature within a car can rise 20 degrees in as little as 10 minutes and keep getting hotter with each passing minute, and cracking the window doesn't help. With temperatures rising to dangerous levels, we're calling on everyone to be part of the solution and help save lives."

Heatstroke sets in when the body can't cool itself quickly enough. A child's body heats up three to five times faster than an adult's, making them more susceptible to heatstroke. When a child's internal temperature reaches 104 degrees, major organs begin to shut down; when that temperature reaches 107 degrees, the child can die.

Safe Kids Oconto County is asking everyone to help protect kids by remembering to ACT:

- A: Avoid heatstroke-related injury and death by never leaving your child alone in a car, not even for a minute. And make sure to keep your car locked when you're not in it so children don't get in on their own.
- C: Create reminders so you don't forget to take your child from the car. Put something next to your child that you will need at your final destination, such as a briefcase, a purse or a cell phone. This is especially important if you're not following your normal routine
- T: Take action. If you see a child alone in a car, call 911. Emergency personnel want you to call.

• Michael Myron Laroque, 33, Seymour, pleaded no contest July 8 to fleeing an officer in his vehicle. Judge Michael Judge withheld sentencing and placed him on one year of probation with conditions.

NWTC restructures academics to create 6 colleges

Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC) is announcing an academic restructure, marking a significant step forward in how the college delivers education and workforce training across the region.

As of July 1, NWTC will recognize its academic affairs and workforce development divisions into six newly established colleges. This change is designed to create stronger pathways into and beyond the institution — aligning programs with industry needs, expanding student opportunities and ensuring long-term success for graduates and the communities they serve.

"This is about more than reorganizing departments — it's about making it easier for students to start, stay and succeed," said Kathryn Rogalski, NWTC's vice president of academic affairs and workforce development.

"By aligning programs into six focused colleges, we're creating clearer pathways through NWTC and into meaningful careers — while strengthening the connection between education, workforce and community."

The six new colleges will include: the College of Advanced Manufacturing

and Skilled Trades; College of Allied Health; College of Business, Communication and Social Sciences; College of Nursing; College of Public Safety; and College of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math).

This academic restructure reflects NWTC's commitment to delivering career-focused education that is evolving with the needs of students, employers and the region.

At NWTC, STEM is among the most common transfer areas to four-year universities. Previously, programs like engineering technology were housed within the trades and engineering department, while much of the supporting coursework was spread across different academic areas. This sometimes made it harder for students to see how their courses connected or to navigate a clear academic path.

With the launch of the new College of STEM, students will have a more connected and supportive experience — with well-defined course plans, coordinated guidance from faculty and advisers and better access to transfer opportunities in their areas of study.

"This kind of alignment will now be possible across

every college — helping students make informed choices earlier, connect more deeply with industry and graduate with the confidence and credentials to succeed," Rogalski said.

For students currently enrolled at NWTC, this transition will not affect tuition, financial aid eligibility, program-specific accreditations or transfer agreements. The change is designed to enhance — not disrupt — their academic journey. Students can expect clearer guidance as they move through their programs, as well as stronger connections to future careers through more focused academic and industry alignment.

Community and employer partners will also benefit from the change. By more closely aligning academic programs with workforce demands, NWTC is unlocking new opportunities for collaboration, talent development and regional economic growth.

"It's a strategic investment in our future — one that positions NWTC to continue delivering exceptional education, strengthening workforce readiness and driving regional progress for years to come," said Kristen Raney, NWTC president.

ThedaCare offers new cancer treatment option

ThedaCare is the first health care system in Wisconsin to offer a new, minimally invasive procedure to help treat soft tissue cancers.

The treatment, the Aliya Pulsed Electric Field (PEF) with the INUMI Flex Needle, uses an electrified needle to direct high voltage, high-frequency electrical pulses into cancerous tumors.

The procedure is performed by a bronchoscopy — that is, through the use of a thin, tube-like instrument with a light and a lens.

"We use an image-guided technique to insert a needle into the target area and deliver the electrical pulse," said Dr. Harsha Poola, ThedaCare oncology and hematology specialist. "The pulse destabilizes the target by essentially poking holes into the cancerous cells. This tactic helps keep healthy tissue intact while helping to kill the targeted cancer cells."

ThedaCare performed the first Aliya procedures for patients in April 2025. The organization is using the Aliya System to help treat certain patients with advanced soft tissue cancers such as pulmonary, prostate, urinary and other cancers. Soft tissue cancers are those originating in the body's tissues — muscles, fat, tendons, nerves, blood vessels and more.

"This new option helps illustrate our continued efforts to evaluate and incorporate innovative technologies that help enhance the quality of medical care we provide the people in and around the communities we serve," Poola said.

"It is another tool we can use to support identified patients as they undergo treatment for soft tissue cancer."

Dr. Scott Parrish, pulmonary medicine specialist with Fox Valley Pulmonary Medicine, said incorporating such new technologies helps the health system continue to provide patients treatment options that are tailored to them as individuals.

"It is a concerted, ongoing effort to help provide the individualized care our patients need and deserve," he said.

Parrish envisions the technology becoming a standard part of care for certain patients needing treatment for advanced soft tissue cancers.

"A long-term goal is to make the Aliya System a regular part of our cancer treatment options," he said. "This is another tool that our team can access as a treatment option for those who have been diagnosed with cancer."

Early studies suggest an added benefit to this new treatment option, Parrish said.

Permit OK'd for animal shelter

An animal shelter in business for more than a year finally has a conditional use permit

The Shawano County Planning, Development and Zoning Committee approved the permit for Joy's Place Animal Rescue in rural Gresham at its July 2 meeting.

Sarah Magee said she was under the impression from former county staff that a permit was not needed when she opened in the spring of 2024. She said she did a little more digging and found out she did indeed need a permit, so she applied for one this spring.

Animal rescue services will be limited to 50 cats and up to five dogs at any one time.

The Town of Herman approved the request in April. Magee's conditional use permit expires May 29, 2028.

"We would like to operate an animal rescue to serve the Shawano County area," Magee wrote in her permit application. "The Shawano County Humane Society no longer accepts stray cats or helps community members get them fixed. We want to serve the needs of the community and help control pet overpopulation. In our first year of operation, we helped over 300 cats. This is a significant number of animals in need."

"In addition to rehabilitating and rehoming cats, we help community members get their cats fixed at a reduced rate. We schedule, organize and transport 600-700 cats per year for this service from Shawano County."

The animal rescue business, located at N6750 County Road A, Gresham, will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

Shawano County room tax up 0.92%

2024 'record-breaking' year could yield to even bigger 2025 for tourism

Room taxes and other economic indicators had a modest increase in 2024, according to the tourism director for the Shawano County Chamber of Commerce.

Michelle Eron told the Shawano Common Council on July 9 that the total room tax was \$216,189.13, an increase of almost 0.92% from the \$214,208.82 collected in 2023. The room tax was collected from Shawano, Cecil, Pulaski and the towns of Belle Plaine, Wittenberg, Wescott and Washington.

Eron's room tax report noted that visitors to the county generated \$7.1 million in local and state taxes in 2024, a 1.5% increase from 2023. The total economic impact was up for the county at \$116 million, she said, and direct visitor spending increased to \$77.6 million, up 1.5%, as a result of the chamber's tourism

and marketing efforts.

"This was an increase from 2023, solidifying that the marketing being completed is creating an interest and awareness to tourists to visit and vacation to Shawano Country," Eron said.

About \$25.2 million in total labor income through tourism, up 1.2%, added to the economies for Shawano and Menominee counties, although that number is estimated because tribal tourism data is private.

Eron called 2024 a "record-breaking year."

"Shawano Country Tourism is the official destination marketing organization that promotes the area as a recreational destination to increase travel with overnight stays and expenditures to both Shawano and Menominee counties," Eron said.

Lodging, including short-term rentals and summer homes, make up the largest portion of the increases, according to

Eron, followed by food and beverages, retail, transportation, and recreation and entertainment.

When it comes to marketing, the room tax made up 72% of the tourism bureau's revenue in 2024, while another 27% comes from advertising dollars generated through the chamber's annual visitor guide, Eron said, with design and implementation done in house.

"This community resource is a powerful advertising tool that strongly promotes the activities in all of Shawano Country," Eron said. "Fifty thousand of these guides were printed and distributed to local businesses, organizations, events and festivals, etc. Thousands of these guides are also distributed via outside contracted vendors at the various sports shows and events that I attend during the year."

The tourism bureau's Facebook page saw visits almost double from 125,263

in 2023 to 240,513 last year. According to Eron, the bureau's Instagram page saw 6,800 followers, an increase of almost 2,500 from 2023.

Eron noted that social media advertising was created to promote events and activities in the area.

Eron is estimating that 2025 tourism indicators could blow the previous year's numbers out of the water due to the NFL Draft, which took place in April in Green Bay. She noted that the barn quilt program, which has been in existence since 2010, got exposure on a much larger level as the chamber collaborated with the NFL to build two quilts that looked exactly the same. One was on display at the draft, while the duplicate is on display in the chamber office.

"This brought national exposure to this project and to this regional area," Eron said.

RFID tags available again for cattle, bison

Wisconsin is again accepting orders for no cost 840 radio frequency identification (RFID) official identification tags provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Currently, there is a limited supply of these tags, and they are anticipated to be available until Sept. 30 or while supplies last. In Wisconsin, these tags are available for markets and dealers, directly to producers and to veterinarians for use with their clients' animals; they are intended for use in cattle and bison only.

Tags can be ordered in multiples of 1,000. Currently, there is a 5,000-tag limit per order due to limited supply. Other important details include:

No cost 840 RFID official identification tags can be ordered by markets, dealers or producers at <https://wi.accessgov.com/datcp/Forms/Page/dah/tagorders> or by veterinarians at <https://datcpservices.wisconsin.gov/vetcatalog/index.jsp>.

Tag orders require a premises identification number (PIN). If you do not have a PIN or are not sure, contact the Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium at 888-808-1910, or visit wiid.org and select "Premises Registration/Renewal."

Tags may take several weeks or months to ship. Purchased tags may be available more quickly.

For producers, tags are for use only with your own animals. Tags should not be shared, sold or used at other farms. For markets, dealers and veterinarians, RFID tags are available to apply to customers' and clients' animals. Note that records are required. For markets, dealers and producers, white button tags are available.

For veterinarians, white button tags are available, as well as orange button tags used for identification when vaccinating against brucellosis. Although 840 RFID tags are required for brucellosis vaccination, orange tags are not required; however, the orange tags can only be used for this purpose.

Taggers are the responsibility of the person ordering the tags. Taggers can be ordered directly from the manufacturers or their distributors. It is recommended to use a tagger from the same manufacturer as the tags.

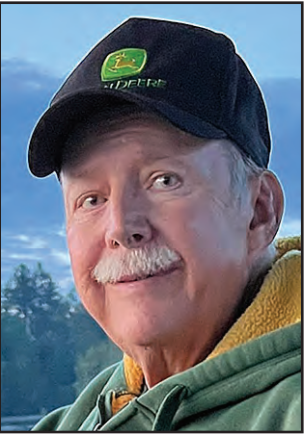

Music festivals help to aid community well-being

Aurora expert recommends music, whether inside or outside, to ease mood

Communities have concerts and music festivals to attract people to town and to entertain them, but it turns out they also have health benefits.

That turns northeast Wisconsin into a giant treatment facility, as communities have music nights and weekend festivals regularly throughout the summer. Shawano held its annual Sun Drop Dayz the first weekend in June, bringing out thousands of people to witness area bands crank up the noise. However, the music continues throughout the summer with Thursdayz at Franklin, regularly filling up Franklin Park, as well as smaller concerts on Saturday nights during the Naberhood Block Parties.

Shawano also has performers at Arlington Park on Sundays, a tradition that precedes the block parties and Thursdayz. This summer, a touch of jazz was added as the NEW Jazz Ensemble is popping up at multiple times during the summer to add even more music to Franklin Park. In August, the Shawano County Arts Council will hold its folk music festival at Mielke County Park.

Of course, Shawano is not the only place to get a musical booster shot. Wittenberg has concerts on the second Tuesday of the month in the art park next to the WOW-SPACE, while Oconto Falls brings musicians to the water on select Friday nights. Even at festivals designated for other purposes, such as Bonduel's Independence Day, musicians can fill parks and other venues with good feelings.

There are also a number of Indigenous powwows filled with unique music. The Menominee Nation Contest Powwow comes up the first weekend in August, and

the following weekend has the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans playing host to singers and dancers.

Stacy Luedeman, behavioral health nurse practitioner with Aurora BayCare Medical Center, says she has seen the benefits of people listening to music, whether it's at a big event or just sitting back at home and listening to some tunes.

"Music is a non-pharmacological treatment option that can affect mental and physical health in many positive ways," Luedeman said. "Studies have found that listening to music, even just 11 minutes per day, can positively impact mental health by reducing anxiety, depression and stress."

Listening to music can trigger the release of endorphins, natural mood boosters, Luedeman said. It all depends on what kind of music a person likes, or performers that are considered to be favored.

"The key is to choose genres of music and artists you enjoy and love," Luedeman said. "Music can be a powerful way to motivate someone to exercise, improve focus and even help heal in times of loss and grief."

While music festivals can be a great place to feel good and help deal with mental and physical health, Luedeman recom-

Panfish don't get the credit they deserve

Ask 100 anglers what they think of when the term "gamefish" is mentioned, and you'll probably get one of four answers. Nationwide, it's going to be the largemouth bass. Ol' bucketmouth has more than his own cheering section. Ray Scott founded the Bass Anglers Sportsman Society, and about a half million members spend most of their free time chasing bass. Maybe it's a guy thing, but men had to take an otherwise relaxing sport and turn it into a competition. Competitive bass fishing has created well-paid, well-sponsored tournament anglers who fish for cash and bass boats.

Speaking of pro anglers, there are folks who also fish for walleyes and earn a good living doing so. If you like to eat fish, the walleye is a good choice.

In Wisconsin and on other northern waters, the next two heavy hitters are northern pike and muskies. I am grouping these two together, partly because they are related, have sharp teeth, grow to frightening size and can require enormous time, patience and gear to catch.

Trout are in a class of their own. There are wild, native trout and the put-and-take stocked variety. We also have two types of trout anglers: Those who want fish to eat and show up with a can of corn to meet the DNR stocking trucks, and those who hope to land a trophy native trout and prefer fly fishing or finesse spinning tackle to find hidden streams and solitude a la "And a River Runs Through It."

Yet chances are good that the first fish you ever caught weren't bass, walleyes,

While it is a good thing to learn more about history, particularly the history of our country, it is puzzling that there is no white history month. One interesting chapter in American history is the story of the American West, with its exciting tales of cowboys, Indians, cattle barons, settlers and outlaws, is fascinating. COWBOY BEANS

6 cans assorted beans (kidney beans, butter beans, pinto beans, Great Northern beans, pork and beans)
1 bottle Sweet Baby Ray's (hickory and brown sugar flavored) barbecue sauce
1 lb. ground hamburger or pork
1 lb. bacon
Ketchup and mustard, optional
Cook the bacon until well done. Cool, and cut into small pieces. Drain any beans that need to be, reserving some of the liquid. Brown the ground meat. Mix in the beans and bacon pieces, adding some of the reserved bean liquid if needed. Mix in some of the barbecue sauce until desired flavor; adding a little ketchup and mustard if desired. Heat through, serve with bread or biscuits.



ever beans you have in the house, bacon, and hamburger or ground pork, or a mixture of the two. I have

had cowboy beans without bacon before, but obviously it tastes better with the bacon included. The kind of barbecue sauce is also optional. I grew up on Sweet Baby Ray's hickory and brown sugar flavored barbecue sauce, so that is the kind that I use. I like to add a little ketchup, for flavor,

and mustard, to cut the sweetness, to my individual portion, but that is entirely optional. Also, I like to eat cowboy beans with a slice of bread, or a biscuit on the side. This dish is so hearty and rich that something plain is needed to fully enjoy it. If you are looking for a quick dinner that uses

COWBOY PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1/2 cup butter, softened
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 cups unsifted flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 1/2 cups quick cooking oats
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup brown sugar, lightly packed
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 package chocolate chips
Cream the butter, peanut butter, sugar, and brown sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs and vanilla. Combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt; stir into the creamed mixture. Mix in the oats and chocolate chips, the mixture will be slightly crumbly. Chill the dough for about 30 minutes (optional). Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease baking sheets. Roll cookie dough into 1-inch balls, place on the baking sheets, and flatten slightly with a fork. Bake for 7-9 minutes or until lightly browned.

ingredients that you most likely have in the house, Cowboy beans are the way to go. Cowboy peanut butter cookies are also delicious. I have no idea why the word "cowboy" is attached to these cookies, as this recipe is from a rather old cookbook of mine. This recipe starts out as a standard peanut butter cookie, but changes into something different with the addition of chocolate chips and oatmeal. These cookies are so good, and you

can feel less guilty about enjoying them as they have oatmeal in them — adding both heartiness and fiber. The original recipe did not call for vanilla, but as I feel that almost every cookie could benefit from a little vanilla, I added it. The amount of chocolate chips is optional, use as much or as little as you like.

trout, pike or muskies. If they weren't bullheads, they were panfish.

My first memories of fishing with my dad in northern Illinois involved cane poles, worms, bobbers and bluegills, with an occasional bullhead tossed in. My dad had a giant, metal possum-belly tackle box full of oddball tools, terminal tackle and lures, but I never once saw Dad use a lure. We bought or caught nightcrawlers, and that was a given when we went fishing.

A small kid doesn't need a giant fish to produce a giant smile. Those first tugs at the bobber and then seeing it disappear below the surface are magical, and both the fish and kid are instantly hooked.

Dad helped my younger brother, Brent, and I remove the fish from the line, put them on the stringer and cleaned them. As I grew older, I enjoyed removing my own fish from the hook. Brent and I often wanted to keep every fish, and Dad would groan as he added another small fish to the stringer.

I don't know of any formal panfishing organizations, but I think there should be. This may be because panfishing is just fun,

mends lyrical healing at home, too.

"It really doesn't matter where or how you listen to music," she said. "You can have it quietly playing in the background when driving or blasting loudly in the kitchen when cooking or cleaning. Just listening to and enjoying music during your daily activities is just as beneficial as going to a concert or a festival. If you don't mind crowds, a summer festival can be a great way to also get some fresh air, listen to live music and connect with others."

For many people, the musical medicine of choice can change, with jazz music one day giving way to country the next and pop the day after that.

"All music can be beneficial. Your mood on any given day can dictate your music choice," Luedeman said. "Upbeat music may help someone feel a bit more positive or happy. Listening to slower, softer music may help someone process and express their feelings, which can decrease anxiety or insomnia."

Luedeman recommends making playlists when listening at home or while exercising outside.

"Making a playlist for different moments can be a fun activity," Luedeman said. "Once created, you can enjoy it over and over alone, or

with family and friends."

Music events, especially those taking place outside in a park or along the water, are a good thing to have in the summer, as winter can sometimes negatively impact people's health. Being isolated and a lack of sunshine makes it necessary to find musical support elsewhere, according to Luedeman.

"Especially living in Wisconsin, winters can be long and harsh," she said. "Getting outside to enjoy a festival, music at a restaurant, or sitting in a park with your own music can be a great way to connect with nature and enjoy time with family and friends. Being in this type of atmosphere can boost overall well-being and uplift our spirits."

The warmer weather makes it easier for people to get out and exercise, which has long been a standard for good health, and adding music to the routine just ups the potential.

"It has been shown that music can even lower blood pressure and heart rate, which can be just as helpful as low impact exercise," Luedeman said. "So, when you are looking at making positive changes to your health, consider a walk in the park with your headphones or sitting in the grass at a festival."
