County guide sentenced for bear baiting

Collar banned from entering national forests for one year

An Oconto County guide was fined \$3,000 and banned from hunting on federal land for illegally placing bear bait in the Nicolet-Chequamegon National Forest.

Timothy J. Collar, 64, of Shiocton, received a one-year ban from entering a national forest and hunting with a firearm, including this year's bear hunting season that runs through Oct. 25.

According to the plea agreement, Collar faced a maximum of six months in jail, a \$5,000 fine and five years' probation after a state conservation warden received tips in July 2023 that two 55-gallon barrels were dumped near a U.S. Forest Service road in northern Oconto County.

Warden Jamin Leuzzo located the tipped over barrels about 20 feet from the road, animals had apparently worn paths to them. The barrels contained a primarily red substance that Leuzzo believed was used for bear bait.

Days later, Leuzzo found two more barrels near another USFS road that contained a substance similar to the other barrels he found. Animal trails also lead to the barrels.

Leuzzo placed a trail camera near the first barrel site he found and returning to the site days after, he saw that the original barrels had been removed and replaced with two others which contained a red substance.

During August 2023, trail cam images depicted a truck licensed to Collar returning to the first bait site with more barrels and buckets. Leuzzo recognized Collar as the driver of the truck as the warden had had prior contacts with him.

A trail cam placed at the second bait site also recorded Collar driving to it and carrying a hollowed-out bear bait stump and a bucket of bear bait.

On Aug. 29, 2023, Leuzzo saw Collar's truck near the second bait site and talked to him about illegal bear baiting. Collar became vulgar and said someone else must have placed the bait. About two weeks later, Leuzzo seized two trail cams he found near a third bait site that contained images of Collar resetting a bait stump with an illegal concrete cap.

Behnke bill seeks voter input on wheel taxes

Assemblyman
sees measures as
taxation without
representation

Rep. Elijah Behnke is supporting those who are not happy with wheel taxes with legislation that will add some hoops for municipalities to approve them in the future.

However, he's not optimistic that the Wisconsin Legislature will pass his bill by the time the current legislative session ends next year.

Currently, counties and municipalities can pass a wheel tax through an ordinance. The city of Shawano passed one in 2024, while Shawano County rejected plans to implement its own in March. The money collected through the wheel tax can only be used for street-related measures, which frees up general fund money for other needs in the government, officials have argued.

That has not set well with some, including one

of Behnke's election rivals last year. Shawano resident Shirley Hinze, who was the Democratic candidate, took the Shawano Common Council to task last October after the council approved a \$40 wheel tax one month earlier.

"As long as you're going to assess this on people that

live in the community and not address the tourism that comes into the community with the other private ownership, I don't think you have really a good base for putting a \$40 fee on this residents of this community until you present some very good specifics as to why," Hinze said. "These fees will

bury you until something is changed in Madison. This is a stop-gap measure."

Behnke's legislation would require a referendum take place during a regularly scheduled election to get voters approval for any future wheel tax plans. However, current wheel taxes in place are not immune, as

the bill requires counties and municipalities to call for a referendum within 18 months or be forced to repeal the taxes.

Behnke noted that the bill originally was written by Rep. Dave Maxey from Waukesha County, but he wanted to be part of the effort to implement it based on what he'd heard earlier this year while doing listening sessions around the 6th Assembly District.

"My community feels like they don't have a say," Behnke said. "You could be going in April to vote for a judge, and then you can vote on a wheel tax. It's just moving it from a local ordinance to the actual taxpayers that have to pay the wheel tax. I see this as a basic taxation with representation. Taxation without representation is not OK."

While Behnke wants to see it passed, he's not convinced it will happen due to the Wisconsin Senate. Currently, the Senate is planning to only meet three more times between now and February, and then the new election season begins.

"They didn't meet at all in September, whereas we met several times and passed some bills," Behnke

said. "It's rumored that the Senate's only going to meet once in October, once in November and once in February. They are just so spineless to help the state move forward, because they're afraid of losing the majority."

Behnke has another bill that's expected to be voted on in the Assembly next month that would provide fleet plates for truck companies, similar to one already passed for cars, but he expects that to go nowhere with the Senate, as well.

"I'm doing my job on my side, but I don't think leadership in the Senate side is moving much along," Behnke said.

Behnke attended the February meeting of the county board at the suggestion of former Rep. Peter Schmidt, and he noted "the mood of the room" indicated folks didn't want to pay more for their vehicle registration.

"I feel like I'm over-taxed," Behnke said. "We're not just living this gravy life. Gas is still reasonable, but groceries are super high, and property taxes are getting out of control."

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Schools have measures to deter weapon incidents

Physical barriers, encouragement of students help, leaders say

School safety came to the forefront again recently as a 16-year-old was arrested Sept. 9 after a loaded handgun and ammunition were found in a backpack at Preble High School in Green Bay.

The school quickly moved to require students to bring only clear and colorless backpacks and bags into school. The policy took effect Sept. 22.

With concerns about weapons easily getting into a school, NEW Media checked in with school district superintendents in Shawano, Oconto and Menominee counties to see what they do to prevent incidents like what happened at Preble from taking place.

Kurt Krizan, superintendent for the Shawano School District, noted that the schools have locked doors and controlled access points with protocols about who can come in or out during school hours. He said that regular safety drills take place to ensure preparedness for potential school shooters or other violent incidents.

The school district has two school resource officers in partnership with the Shawano Police Department to monitor safety and respond to concerns. There's also an anonymous reporting system that allows students or anyone in the community to confidentially share concerns.

"At Shawano School District, we take school safety very seriously and have implemented multiple layers of prevention and support to protect our students and staff," Krizan said.

Besides the physical safety measures, the school district tries to defuse any incidents attributed to students' mental well-being, including social-emotional learning programs integrated into the curriculum that provide healthy coping strategies, along with peer mentoring. Krizan said the district partners with local organizations to expand access to mental health resources.

"We believe that fostering a safe and supportive environment requires ongoing collaboration between schools, families and the community," Krizan said.

He added that the district has not considered requiring clear backpacks like Green Bay has, but he noted that students are not allowed to carry backpacks in between classes.

Other school district

superintendents had similar comments.

All doors are locked from the outside during the school day at Gresham School, according to its superintendent, Newell Haffner. During the day, the front doors provide a detour to the main office for students. Gresham shares a school resource officer with the Bowler School District.

"At Gresham, we try hard to foster a collaborative culture and a safe environment for students," Haffner said.

Other measures Gresham utilizes to deter violence and weapons in schools include a school counselor who provides students with support, along with a telehealth service to cater to mental health needs.

"At Gresham, we believe that relationships matter," Haffner said. "All of our teachers take time to make relationships with students. We have had a number of students talk to staff when a classmate is struggling during their day. Gresham staff prioritize spending quality time with all students."

Besides locked doors, Bowler School District also has staff present at the entrances before and after school to greet students and monitor them, according to Superintendent Glenda Butterfield-Boldig.

"This allows us to monitor students as they come into the building and notice if anyone is behaving unusually or is attempting to conceal something in their clothing," Butterfield-Boldig said. "We currently do not have metal detectors, but we do have a handheld metal detecting wand that can be used when we have reason to suspect something is being concealed."

Besides the shared school resource officer with Gresham, Bowler also continuously goes through training for school critical incidents with the sheriff's department and neighboring school districts to be prepared in case the worst happens.

"Just as important as these reactive measures, though, is working to build a school culture and climate of respect and belonging," Butterfield-Boldig said. "The Bowler School District continues to engage in work around developing systems where every student feels seen and heard, is connected to at least one caring adult at the school and feels safe to report any unsafe

or concerning activity. When students feel connected, supported and valued, they are less likely to engage in behaviors such as bringing weapons to school or harming themselves and others."

Gillett School District also has secure entry protocols, school resource officers and safety drills and training in place to provide security, according to Superintendent Nathan Hanson. Creating an environment of support is also important, he said.

"Just as importantly, we believe in and are working toward fostering a supportive environment for our students," Hanson said. "We believe that a truly safe school is one where students feel supported and connected. Our districts have invested in resources that address the social and emotional health of our students. We provide access to school counselors and allow families to choose and work with mental health professionals on campus as families need and choose."

Lena School District Superintendent Ben Pytleski listed similar resources, saying prevention is important.

"While we will never be fully immune to these sensitive issues, I believe we continue to put a premium on building positive relationships with students and families," Pytleski said. "We know our kids and make it a point for everyone to stay vigilant with any concerning behaviors. We continue to be a welcoming place for law enforcement and continue to increase our law enforcement presence in the schools."

Wittenberg-Birnawood School District Superintendent Garrett Rogowski noted that having plenty of participation options available for students and their families provides a supportive environment expected to deter anyone from resorting to violence.

"We provide multiple family nights to engage our district families in positive activities that allow parents to get to know our school staff and develop relationships that foster positive school experiences," Rogowski said. "We try to offer multiple extra- and co-curricular opportunities for our students at all levels to provide them with a positive outlet beyond the academic experience in school. These connections create a sense of belonging and ownership."

brecht; and his siblings-in-law, Irene (John) Ferroly, Roger (Bess) Gardebrecht and Dennis Gardebrecht.

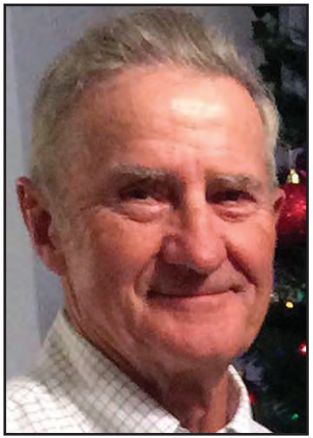
There will be no formal funeral service in accordance with George’s wishes. Burial will be in St. John the Baptist Cemetery.

Seymour man charged with child sex assault

Victim a Belle Plaine 6-year-old child

A Seymour man remains in the Shawano County Jail on a \$25,000 cash bond after being charged earlier this month with first-degree sexual assault with a child under 13 and exposing his genitals.

A preliminary hearing had been scheduled for Sept. 17 for Lawrence J. Fields, 63, but he did not yet have an attorney. When he initially appeared in court, it was questionable whether Fields qualified for a public defender. Fields told Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma that some of his relatives are working on finding a lawyer for him, and he'd be hiring one once he got paid Sept. 26.

The criminal complaint alleges that he touched the 6-year-old victim around Labor Day at a home on

County Road Y in the Town of Belle Plaine. The victim's mother said she asked Fields, her uncle, to watch the victim while she went to Clintonville to clean a house. The mother, who said she was gone about 90 minutes that day, said Fields is one of the few relatives still speaking to her, and he'd watched the victim on previous occasions.

While away, Fields allegedly touched the victim around her breasts, buttocks and private parts, according to the complaint. When Fields allegedly exposed his genitals, the victim became scared and ran outside, coming back inside later, at which point Fields allegedly told the child that she could not tell anyone about what happened.

The home had two cameras, but one was off because the mother did not turn it on via her cellphone, and the other was disconnected, but the mother told a deputy she had not disconnected the camera and neither had

her daughter.

The mother said she would not be in contact with Fields anymore, and that she'd blocked him on all social media, according to the complaint.

Two days later, a Shawano County Sheriff's Department detective interviewed the victim and found her to be credible. A monitored phone call was made to Fields after that, according to the complaint, where he denied any sexual contact or exposure but offered to help pay for any counseling for the victim.

Fields was later arrested by Outagamie County Sheriff's Department officials and transferred to Shawano County's custody. According to the complaint, Fields immediately asked for an attorney and denied a request for detectives to examine his phone.

A status conference has been scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Oct. 7 in Branch I of the Shawano County Courthouse.

Menominee get funding for overdose prevention

In 2024, the U.S. saw an almost 27% reduction in overdose deaths, and early data indicates Wisconsin experienced a similar decline in overdose deaths.

Hopeful improvements are not reaching all communities. Rates of fatal overdose remain high among Indigenous populations, in Wisconsin and in the U.S. overall, and resources are difficult to access in rural areas of the state.

To address the gap in critical resources to address overdose risk, public health organization Vital Strategies is awarding \$1.3 million in targeted grants across the state.

The grants are being awarded to local governments and local health departments in rural areas, and to tribal governments and other tribally designated entities.

The grantees have committed to match the awards through investments from their own local or tribal opioid settlement funds, which will be allocated toward establishing or expanding evidence-based and health-oriented overdose prevention interventions, such as medications for opioid use disorder and safer use supplies programs.

Through an application process, 17 grantees were se-

lected to receive up to \$100,000 each in funding to implement community-based solutions to overdose, including culture-based Indigenous harm reduction initiatives.

With its grant money, the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin will establish a syringe service program within the community, offering a range of harm reduction supplies and services. In addition, it will expand access to evidence-based treatment and support for pregnant women with substance use disorders, and provide harm reduction training and education for the broader community.

Gillett man dies in Highway 22 crash

A two-vehicle crash on Sept. 20 on state Highway 22 near the intersection of state Highway 22 and County Road P has killed a Gillett man.

Deputies and other first responders immediately responded to the scene of the accident in the Town of Gillett after getting the call at about 10:26 a.m. and observed a gray Volkswagon SUV in the west ditch that had extensive damage and a Chevrolet pickup truck in the southbound lane with extensive damage. A

preliminary investigation revealed the pickup, operated by a 22-year-old man from Sobieski, was traveling south and a gray SUV driven by a 24-year-old man and occupied by a 2-year-old child, was traveling north.

The SUV operated left of the centerline and came in contact with the front of the truck, according to a sheriff's department press release. As a result of the impact, the truck started on fire, and other motorists on scene were able to

suppress the fire and assist the driver out of the truck.

The SUV driver died at the scene as a result of injuries sustained in the crash. The child and the truck driver were transported to a hospital in Green Bay for treatment of injuries sustained in the crash.

An ongoing investigation is being conducted by the sheriff's department and the Brown County Medical Examiner's Office. No other information is being released at this time, according to the press release.

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Flowers thrive at Bloomed on Dairy

New floral shop outside Bonduel to hold its grand opening Oct. 4

Flowers and more are thriving at Bloomed on Dairy, located at N4863 County Road F outside of Bonduel. Owner Kaci Wolf has flowers for just about every occasion, noting: "Flowers fill the void when words fall short."

Wolf offers a semi-full service floral shop, with her focus leaning toward custom florals designed to fit her customers' needs. Her storefront also serves as a place to stop in for everyday bouquets and arrangements and will also feature a gift shop filled with perfectly curated gifts and goods, including some from local crafters.

The Bloom Barn will hold its grand opening from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Oct. 4. Guests can expect fresh blooms, coffee, shopping and sparkle. The Mill, The Mill's Closet, Knotted Chain Permanent Jewelry and Endlessstyle, a custom-hat bar, will be onsite as well.

The Wolf family — husband Allan, wife Kaci and their four children, who range in age from 2-8 — live on a third-generation farm. They began purchasing the farm from Allan's aunt and uncle and have plans to add more cows in the coming year. Currently, they milk about 250 cows and farm approximately 575 acres.

Kaci Wolf attended college for business and worked in corporate human resources for several years before the pandemic prompted the family to step back and reevaluate their priorities. Taking a leap of faith, the Wolfs decided Kaci would stay at home.

"Being a stay-at-home mom married to a farmer has made me a stronger woman. It's hard. Yet I realize the best place to raise a family is on a farm," Wolf said.

Originally, Wolf considered a small food stand selling cut flowers, hamburger, beef, eggs and vegetables as a way to get their children involved in gardening. That idea quickly shifted when she began offering floral drops for events out of her garage — a venture that turned out to be highly successful.

Social media helped her efforts grow quickly. Wanting to test the market, Wolf

offered a Mother's Day bouquet of flowers paired with six chocolate-covered strawberries.

"People preordered and picked up the day before Mother's Day, and we sold out almost right away," Wolf said. "Then we sold graduation bouquets out of The Mill in Bonduel, which exploded. In June, we offered a Father's Day bucket, which included local products from the area such as Pingel's beef sticks, Laney Cheese and cookies from Fannita's Bakery in Sha-

wano. That went over very well. We were feeling out the market, and our intuition paid off."

This past year, Wolf also started a social media account called Raised on Dairy to showcase life on their dairy farm and highlight how technology is changing agriculture.

"My husband is incredibly progressive. We are on a path to get robotics and have an automated calf feeding system — not something a person typically

sees on a smaller dairy farm. I wanted to share what it's like raising a family on a farm," Wolf said. "Our whole family brand at this point is Raised on Dairy, but after we started the flower thing I wanted to connect to that because it is about family. I wanted my kids to witness that we can do hard things even though we're busy, and we can all be involved. That's where Bloomed on Dairy came from."

Considering herself less than an expert, Wolf promises to give her best to the community.

"I'm not a trained florist, but I feel confident that I'll give it my best ability and effort to make something beautiful," Wolf said. "I ask people to be patient while I catch my footing because I've been so busy in the best way possible. I'm not really sure what to expect moving into this."

Wolf credits family, friends, neighbors and her community for a large part of her success.

"I wouldn't be able to do this without my village of people," she said. "Being involved in happy moments, embracing the sad and to be able to find joy in those places that might not necessarily have it, is why I do what I do."

She also acknowledges her faith as a guiding part of her journey.

"I've trusted God to lead me down this path, and I pray that every bouquet, every arrangement and every moment shared through this business carries that same light," Wolf said.

Becoming a florist has deepened that connection. Any walk of life is welcome at her shop, but kindness is what matters most. To Wolf, it feels like a blessing to be able to build a business right on the family farm.

"The flowers I create are not just arrangements. They're made in the same home where I raise my children, teaching them right from wrong, showing them what it means to walk in faith, and reminding them that love, compassion and community are what truly matter," Wolf said.

At the heart of it all is her commitment to custom florals — arrangements that are as unique as the people and moments for which they are created.

Bobolinks among most impressive songbird migrants

Birds are on the move, so we are, too.

Recently, my husband and I took a trip to Whitefish Point to learn what birds are migrating south from their northern climes this time of year. Here we found the Whitefish Point Bird Observatory (WPBO), one of the best migration hot spots in Michigan. It is located at the end of apeninsula that juts out into Lake Superior and acts as a natural migration corridor for thousands of birds. It provides a shorter north-south route for them when crossing Lake Superior.

Whitefish Point provides important resting and feeding habitat for migrants that touch down here. It is also a Globally Important



Bird Area, home to many rare breeding birds with more than 340 bird species recorded from the area.

Michigan Audubon conducts research at WPBO to learn more about bird migration, raise public awareness of birds and the environment, and promote bird conservation. Learn more about their interesting work at <https://wpbo.org>. When we learned that they gave free birding tours every Saturday and Sunday mornings from

Aug. 16 to Nov. 15, we were in.

We joined our birding group Sept. 13. Birds are mostly quiet, not singing, and also not in their breeding plumage this time of the year, so they're harder to see and identify. Thankful for an experienced guide who was able to bring birds close by mimicking their calls, we were able to see several species including warblers and shorebirds.

Our guide also pointed out birds flying well above us, black specs in the sky until you could focus in more closely with binoculars to make them out. He could also identify birds by their calls; he had a good

GARDENING WITH MELINDA MYERS

Plant this fall for beautiful spring bouquets

This fall, plant an array of spring flowering bulbs to brighten your garden and bouquets. There are plenty of daffodils, tulips, hyacinths and alliums that will delight with an assortment of flower colors and sizes that will bloom throughout the spring.

Include animal resistant double, bicolor and split cup daffodils that provide unique beauty and impact in floral arrangements. Create a simple bouquet with just a few stems of daffodils or an elegant arrangement of single and double flowered varieties.

Harvest daffodils when the buds show color and are perpendicular to the stem like a goose's neck. Don't worry about the sap daffodils exude, shortening the life of the other cut flowers in the arrangement. Properly conditioning the daffodils will eliminate the risk to your other spring favorites.



Consider wearing gloves as some people report itching or rashes when handling these plants. Use your hands to harvest daffodils for the longest stems possible and to reduce sap released from the stem.

Reach into the base of the flower stem, thumb pointed down and pull up. Cut the stems of freshly picked daffodils to the desired length for conditioning. Place them in a clean container of cool water and floral preservative. Leave them in the water for three to six hours when the sap stops flowing. Do not recut the stems before adding them to mixed flower arrangements.

Tulips have long been

a favorite of gardeners and floral arrangers. Grow some taller varieties like finola, foxtrot, silver parrot tulips and negrita double (longfield-gardens.com).

Gardeners growing tulips strictly for cutting will plant the bulbs in trenches and treat them as annuals. The first-year bloom is always the biggest, but you can enjoy them cut and try for a second and third year of flowers. Just cut the stems short and leave at least two to three leaves on the plant to create and store energy for next year's bloom.

Harvest tulips when the buds are just starting to show color for the longest vase life. Wait for double and parrot type tulip buds to be fully colored but not yet open. Remove the whole plant, bulb and all, if you do not plan on saving the plants for the following year. Store the tulips upright with the bulbs attached. Cut

and rehydrate the stems in water just before arranging. Wrap the stems in brown paper if they are cut in the garden or when you rehydrate the stems and set them in several inches of cool water for 12-18 hours. Keep in mind tulips continue to grow after cut so plan for this when creating your arrangements.

Harvest hyacinths for cutting as you did tulips. Pull the whole plant, bulb and all, out of the ground if you are growing them as annuals for cutting. Otherwise, cut only the stem and leave all the leaves behind if you want the bulbs to bloom again next year.

Include a variety of alliums in your planting plans this fall. Alliums' long and sturdy stems make them easy to harvest and arrange.

Paranormal scolding derails judgement train

I've gone to a lot of funerals this year. Jon's a member of the Legion Honor Guard, so he has attended more.

This may be an unpleasant topic, but when a person is closing in on 80, certain things get your attention. Remember the commercial where an old lady cries, "I've fallen and I can't get up"? That used to put me in stitches. Now if a fall means just getting a few stitches, I consider that a blessing.

Funerals in the Northwoods are a bit different than in the city. They are less formal, though memorial services in general do not bring out the "proper" in some people.

Instead of suits or dress shirts, male attendees often wear T-shirts, and if they do lean a bit to proper, clean jeans. Most women still wear dresses, skirts or dress pants, but some feel visitation venues are good for showing off skin in con-



spicuous places. The display is hard to ignore, especially if it includes extensive body art.

I admit this lack of what I consider proper dress for a church service used to summon my judgmental side. After all, this is an occasion giving a loved one a solemn and sacred goodbye. I held but would never openly express the opinion that what some people wore was not only inappropriate; it was disrespectful, even shameful.

At a funeral I attended recently, I had my comeuppance and experienced an unexpected epiphany.

At the visitation, it was impossible not to be a bit shocked by a woman wear-

ing a very low-cut dress. Her shoulder-to-shoulder tattoos were, shall we say, eye-catching, which I assume was her intention.

Just as I was tut-tutting to myself, I swear I heard the voice of the deceased in my head. "That's my daughter's friend. She came to visit me in the nursing home several times — which is more than you did, and she's here."

I felt my face getting red. I didn't even know my old friend had been in a nursing home until I read the obituary. Shame on me for not keeping up on what was once a very close relationship.

I am an inveterate people-watcher, so as the service began, I couldn't help but notice a woman chewing gum. When she accidentally popped a loud bubble, she sheepishly looked around to see if anyone noticed. Luckily, I managed to stifle my in-

stinctive reaction to chuckle derisively. In church? Good grief.

Then came that same voice: "That woman was one of my home health care workers. She may be a little irreverent, but she was very good to me. She made it possible for me to live at home a lot longer than I might have, and she's here."

I was feeling an increasing unease at this paranormal scolding when to my left I noticed a guy wearing a baseball cap that was long-past-needs-washing. My first thought ordinarily would have been that he should be embarrassed. Couldn't he at least have worn a clean cap?

By now, I wasn't surprised by the voice that said, "That young man did yard work and fixed things around the house after my husband died. And he's here."

Now I was the one who was embarrassed.

To assuage my increasing discomfort, I forced myself to concentrate on the service. I honestly couldn't help it when my attention was drawn to a teen wearing a pair of those popular ripped jeans. Not only would I never have been dressed like that in a house of worship, I'd have run away from home if my mother made me wear something like that in public.

No surprise, there was that pesky voice again.

"That's my great niece. She sent me a lot of handmade cards, always saying how much fun she had at our family get-togethers. No, I never much liked her wardrobe choices, either, but she's here."

As the homily began, a time-worn man who needed a shower, shave and haircut came in late and plopped down in the opposite pew. His T-shirt proclaimed his support

for a certain political viewpoint, his jeans were soiled, and his hands were calloused. I was repulsed by the tell-tale odor of cigarettes. Good Lord. What next?

"Will you just stop already?" the exasperated voice said. "That's my nephew by marriage. He worked the night shift and drove straight up from the (Fox) Valley. He may be a little rough around the edges, but he's here, and if God and I don't care, why should you?"

"OK, OK, you made your point. I get the message," I replied silently. "Thank you for reminding me what really matters, sweet lady, and just so you know, I'm really glad I'm here. See you on the other side."

birding ear. Mine is not so good.

At one point, our guide excitedly pointed to two dark specs in the sky, exclaiming "bobolinks." Really? That got me wondering about bobolinks. I know a lot of songbirds and shorebirds migrate long distances, but what about the bobolink?

The only time I have seen bobolinks in the last several years has been in the spring at Horicon National Wildlife Refuge in Wisconsin. There we heard breeding males singing and touting their breeding colors. The male is easy to spot this time of the year

with its striking black and white feathers and its head topped with a large patch of light yellow.

According to the Cornell Lab All About Birds (AAB) website, bobolinks have a bubbly rambling song heard during the breeding season. During migration they are likely using their pink call to communicate within the flock. This must be what our birding guide heard.

Like many other songbirds, as summer ends and bobolinks molt, the male loses his bright colors, replacing them with buff and brown plumage much like the females. Interesting though, he will molt

again when on his wintering grounds with his new feathers all having yellowish tips, his appearance still similar to that of a female. By spring, the yellow wears off revealing once again his striking breeding colors.

So how about migration? They excel at it. According to AAB, the bobolink is one of the world's most impressive songbird migrants. They travel from their breeding grounds in the northern U.S. and southern Canada to southern South America every year, an about 12,500 miles roundtrip. During its lifetime, its annual journeys may amount in miles to

traveling the equivalent of four or five times around the circumference of the earth.

Bird migration is fascinating. Birds find their way across hundreds to thousands of miles using magnetic cues, the stars and land forms to help them navigate. What especially helps the bobolink navigate, according to AAB, is that it can orient itself with the earth's magnetic field due to iron oxide in the bristles of its nasal cavity and in tissues around the olfactory bulb and nerve (involved with the sense of smell). They also use the stars at night

to guide their journeys.

Unfortunately, like many songbirds, bobolinks are declining in numbers. AAB reports that it is listed as an "Orange Alert Tipping Point species, meaning that it has lost more than 50% of its population in the past 50 years and has shown accelerated declines within the past decade."

Loss of habitat, especially meadows and hay fields where they breed, remains a main reason for their decline. They are also shot as agricultural pests in the southern U.S., eaten in Jamaica and sold as pets in Argentina. To help in their conservation, people can

mow their fields after nestlings have fledged and use fire and mowing outside of the nesting season to manage natural prairies.

I feel richer for having seen those two fleeting bobolinks on their journey south, such small birds in a large world on a great journey with many obstacles. They are amazing, and I wish them all safe travels.

Guests had the opportunity to meet Tiki 5000, a green-cheek conure parrot, which is the 5,000th animal surrendered to the rescue.

"Tiki's story represents the thousands of animals we've helped, and we're excited to celebrate him on such a special day," said Megan Anderson, J&R's education specialist.

Anderson has been a zookeeper since 2018 and was working for the Brown County Zoo before joining J&R. Anderson cares for the animals at the Neenah location and regularly travels across Wisconsin leading these community education events.

Events like these are used by J&R to educate the public and increase awareness of the organization's services.

"Releasing exotic pet species into the environment can disrupt the natural ecosystem and pose a potential threat to people," Anderson said.

J&R was founded in 2020 by John Moyles, after he noticed a growing need in Wisconsin.

"I've been working in the pet industry since 1994," Moyles said. "I began to notice that too many pets were being released into the wild or abandoned."

J&R also hosts exotic pet surrender events. These events take place in a different city every two weeks, and allow community members a safe option to parting

with unwanted pets. "Our mission is simple but powerful," Moyles said. "We provide a safe surrender option, ensure quality care and find new homes for unwanted exotic pets, all while educating the public about responsible ownership and the environmental impact of pet releases."

J&R also receives exotic pets obtained by law enforcement.

"Since our start in 2020, we've found homes for over 8,000 animals and become Wisconsin's number one exotic pet rescue and turtle rescue," Moyles said.

The nearest exotic pet surrender event is scheduled for Oct. 18 in Milwaukee. A complete listing of surrender events and animals available for adoption can be found on J&R's website, www.jraar.org.

"We take in so many pets that arrive in poor condition or with no other safe options, and to see them recover and thrive in a new environment, that, is what keeps this organization going," Moyles said.

Collar regularly guided hunts on federal property in northern Oconto County.

Leuzzo determined that Collar had violated Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources regulations that prohibit placing bait uncovered and accessible to deer, placing bait within 50 feet of

a road, and placing bear bait in a plastic container.

Collar was charged in April. He pled guilty to an illegal baiting count and was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Byron Conway on Aug. 15.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Alexander Duros recom-

mended a \$1,000 fine, a sentence of two years' probation and a ban on hunting anywhere and from entering any national forest.

Instead, Conway imposed a higher fine but restricted Collar's hunting ban and forest access just to federal land.

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Mistakes on the Lake

Packers late game collapse gives Browns 13-10 victory

Cleveland Browns kicker Andre Szmyt booted a 55-yard field goal through the uprights as time expired to give the Green Bay Packers its first loss of the season Sept. 21 in Cleveland.

Leading a large majority of the game, it looked the Packers were going to come away unscathed, even with how sloppy the offense looked. Up 10-0 with 3:38 left in the game, the Browns got its first points of the game on a Szmyt 35-yard field goal.

Needing to run the clock out to ice the game, Green Bay ran two receiver sweeps to Matthew Golden to pick up seven yards and force Cleveland to use timeouts. On the ensuing third-and-three, Jordan Love dropped back and attempted a quick slant to Dontayvion Wicks. Browns safety Grant Delpit stepped in front of the pass and intercepted the ball, taking it back to the Packers 4-yard line.

From there, a pass interference call gave the Browns a first-and-goal from the 1-yard line, where rookie running back Quinshon Judkins plunged into the end zone. With the extra point, the Browns tied the game and as a whole scored 10 points in 37 seconds.

Green Bay was not out of it yet though, as taking over on its own 35-yard line, Love quickly worked down the field with a pass interference and an 18-yard catch and run by Tucker Kraft moved the ball to the Browns' 22-yard line. In an effort to milk the clock and set up the game-winning field goal after the two-minute warning, running back Josh Jacobs appeared to fumble the football and

simultaneously recovered it with Browns linebacker Devin Bush. Jacobs was ruled down before fumbling, which ultimately stood as the call after review.

After a penalty and two runs, the Packers were set up with a 43-yard game-winning field goal attempt. The kick was blocked and recovered by the Browns at its own 47-yard line. Five plays later, Browns quarterback Joe Flacco worked the team down to the Packers' 37-yard line, setting up Szmyt's game-winning kick.

"To be in a position to win the game at the end of the game and have the script totally flip on you with a block and then

them getting into field goal range – it's tough, it's tough to deal with," said Packers head coach Matt

LaFleur.

While the last 3:38 seconds of the game provided excitement, the same

cannot be said about the rest of the game. It was a sloppy offensive game for both sides, as the teams combined for 451 yards, both averaging about 3.9 yards per play. On top of that, both teams combined for 165 penalty yards on 22 penalties, with 14 of them coming by way of Green Bay.

Love finished the game completing 18-of-25 passes for 183 yards, one touchdown and one interception. In one of the offensive lines' worst games since he became the starting quarterback, Love was sacked five times.

With the poor game from the offensive line, Green Bay saw injuries to Zach Tom and Aaron

Banks again in this game, which led to some shuffling that saw Jordan Morgan and Anthony Belton receive the majority of the snaps at left guard and right tackle, respectively.

"You know, there was definitely things that happened, you know (Tom) getting injured right there, Banks going out, so we were shuffling guys around, but the first two games, I think that is kind of how it has been. Guys have shuffled in and have done some good things," said Love, about the offensive line. "It is one of those things. It is the next man up mentality. Everybody that suits up, be ready to

Self-inflicted wounds still an issue

Penalties, mistakes keep Packers from reaching full potential

Stop me if you have heard this one before. The Green Bay Packers lost a very winnable game after errors, including turnovers, penalties and special teams disasters set the team back.

Over the past couple of seasons, the Packers have

been employed the NFL's youngest team and while that certainly calls for excitement for the future (especially after back-to-back playoff appearances), one thing that is common for young teams and rings true for the Packers since Jordan Love took over the quarterback duties, is there is going to be mental errors.

Coming into the 2025 season, Green Bay still rolls out the youngest roster in the league, but through two weeks with two dominant wins over last season's NFC playoff teams, it looked this Packers team was finally able to put some of those mental errors at bay.

While it is hard to base it off of one game, it ap-

Packers' offense vs. Cowboys' defense

Green Bay's offense had been a mixed bag through two games to start the year.

There was nothing mixed about the Sept. 21 performance in Cleveland. The Packers' offense was downright terrible.

Their passing game was poor. Their run game was inept. They could not protect their quarterback, and their quarterback turned the ball over.

Other than that Mr. LaFleur, how was the play?

Jordan Love had not turned the ball over coming into the game against Cleveland but threw an interception that turned the tide in Cleveland's favor.

He'll need to be much better against Dallas. The good news is the best game of Love's career came in Dallas, for his first postseason start.

The rest of the group around him has questions to answer as well.

Tucker Kraft tweaked his knee late in the week last week and was not nearly as impactful in the passing game as the offense struggled to find its way throughout the day in Cleveland.

Matthew Golden caught four passes and made one big play down the field. Dontayvion Wicks is off to a good start this season but only caught two passes in the loss.

Josh Jacobs ran for 30 yards on 16 carries, and the run game as a whole has been woefully inefficient to start the season.

Zach Tom returned to

the lineup and lasted all of one snap before having to go back to the sideline. They would play seven different offensive linemen with Aaron Banks also leaving the game with an injury. They've played eight different offensive linemen this season.

The Sept. 21 game was their worst performance of the season.

They did not protect Love as he was sacked five times and under pressure throughout the day.

There was no bigger reason for the offense to sputter than the poor play from the offensive line.

To be fair, Cleveland's front is vicious, and they are one of the best defenses in football.

This week, the Packers will be facing a defense

not nearly as good, with the Cowboys set to line up across from them.

Of course the Packers are familiar with some of the situation in Dallas. Their best defender, Micah Parsons, came from there in a trade that was consummated in late August.

In return, the Cowboys received two draft choices and Kenny Clark.

Clark suffered an injury in the Sept. 21 loss to Chicago, and it's unclear if he'll be able to play against the Packers.

If he is, Dallas' run defense has been very good to start the year. They slowed down Saquon Barkley and D'Andre Swift in two of their first three games.

The pass defense? That's a different story.

Russell Wilson and Caleb Williams both had their way with Dallas' defense that has had little to no pass rush in the absence of Parsons.

They're coordinated by Matt Eberflus, who has been more prone to being conservative in calling a defense, which could play in Green Bay's favor as they attempt to rebound from Sunday's disaster.

Packers' defense vs. Cowboys' offense

Green Bay's defense continues to play well. Yes, they lost, but almost all of Cleveland's points can be attributed to blunders on offense and special teams.

Love's interception to Grant Delpit gifted the Browns seven points, and a blocked field goal gave the Browns great field position to kick a game-winning field goal.

Rashan Gary had two more sacks Sept. 21, bringing his season total to 4.5.

He's on pace to surpass 10 sacks for the first time in his career.

Parsons was not as impactful on the stat sheet but was a big help on Gary's first sack of the day as three people blocked him, and nobody blocked Gary.

One thing to watch on Green Bay's defense is the depth on the defensive line.

Devonte Wyatt left the game with a knee injury, and his status could be uncertain for Sunday's game.

If he's unable to play, they'll be down to two defensive tackles that have played extended snaps.

That will mean bigger roles for Nazir Stackhouse and Warren Brinson, the latter of which has been a healthy scratch in each of the first three games.

On the other side of the ball, there are some familiar faces in Dallas with Dak Prescott still running the show in Dallas.

He's flanked by a talented group of receivers with George Pickens, CeeDee Lamb and Jalen Tolbert at receiver. Jake Ferguson is a talented tight end as well, and he caught 13 passes in the team's 31-14 loss in Chicago.

The big question mark on offense for Dallas is whether one of their best players will be available.

Lamb exited Sunday's game with an injury, and his status for this week is in doubt.

If he's unable to go, it's a break for Green Bay's defense, who could focus more of its resources elsewhere.

Dallas' run game has had a good start to the season. Javonte Williams averaged more than seven

yards per carry against Chicago last week, and scored a touchdown in each of the first two games of the season.

The interior of Dallas' offensive line is undergoing some shuffling as Cooper Beebe was placed on injured reserve, and he will miss Sunday's game.

This should be a battle that is fun to watch.

Special Teams

Dallas has the best kicker in football with Brandon Aubrey doing the field goal kicking for them.

Their return game has been solid as well with KaVontae Turpin handling return duties for the Cowboys.

Green Bay's special teams is coming off a disastrous performance, but there were a few bright spots in Sunday's 13-10 loss.

Daniel Whelan has been excellent all season and continues to be an asset as the punter, and the return of Bo Melton and Zayne Anderson had Green Bay's coverage units handling the Browns' return game.

Savion Williams has had nice moments as the kick-off returner, and he looks like a potential asset in that phase of the game.

Matthew Golden has been the punt returner but has not looked comfortable since Jayden Reed went down with a broken collarbone.

The Packers could elevate Mecole Hardman from the practice squad to return punts, but they've shown no interest in doing so through the first three weeks of the season.

The kicking game also was a disaster last week. They had one kick blocked and nearly had another earlier in the game.

blamed for a mental error on one of the sacks for sure, having eight lineman recorded at least one snap throws off the chemistry.

What isn't excusable though is the 14 penalties that the Packers racked up in that game.

Committing 14 penalties in a game is a big reason why superior teams like

the Green Bay Packers lose games to inferior opponents like the Cleveland Browns. Those penalties get magnified, too, when it affects scoring drives, as against a good defense like the Browns. Green Bay had a total of 10 drives.

"Obviously (Cleveland) has a really good defense, but you know we had a

lot of long drives. We had a 15-play drive, 16-play drive, 14-play drive, and we didn't come out with points because of things that we did," said Packers running back Josh Jacobs. "Whether it was false starts or penalties or whatever. (Cleveland) has a really good defense, but I felt like a lot of that was on us,

so we have to look in the mirror."

There seems to be some stability in the special teams room as of late as Brandon McManus and Daniel Whelan look like two of the best players at the kicker and punter positions in the entire NFL. Things seemed to run smoothly, until the blocked

field goal, which adds to the last of special teams errors that Packers fans have had to endure for the last decade.

It is easy to say that Love's interception late in the fourth quarter was the reason why Cleveland was able to mount the comeback, but when it boils down to it, it is close to im-

possible to win in the NFL committing 14 penalties.

On offense, those penalties lead to long downs, which are obviously much harder to pick up than short downs, and on defense, penalties allow opposing offenses to get second chances, something that can't happen in the NFL.

Clark helps anchor a run defense that has been really strong each of the last two weeks, especially on Sunday in Chicago.

If Clark is able to play, he'll be facing a makeshift offensive line that really struggled in Sunday's loss to the Cleveland Browns. Clark has a chance to perform well in a revenge game for him.



3.) Defensive Backs –

The Packers' defense has passed all of its tests early in the season, but this week could be a big test for a group that was seen as Green Bay's biggest weakness. If CeeDee Lamb is able to play, Dak Prescott will have his full complement of pass catchers at his disposal.

5.) Six in a Row? – Remember

back in the 1990s when it felt like the Packers would never beat the Cowboys, and that those games were always in Dallas.

All of the members of the Packers' teams of the 1990s insist they would have beaten the Cowboys had any of those games been played at Lambeau Field, but since they were not, the victors get to write the history.

That role has reversed.

The Packers have won five games in a row against the Cowboys, and four of those have come in Dallas. That includes a 48-32 wallop in the 2024 postseason, where Jordan Love played the best game of his

career.

If the Packers win Sunday, that would make it six wins in a row, which would match the longest streak in the history of the rivalry since Dallas won eight in a row from 1991 until 1997.



6.) Prime Time

Pack – Three of the first four games of the season have been in a prime time slot, either as game of the week, or a night game.

This will be the second night game the Packers have played this season, the first of which was a 27-18 win over the Washington Commanders.

The Packers and Cowboys have not played a game on Sunday Night Football since the Packers won 45-7 at Lambeau Field, highlighted by Clay Matthews' interception return for a touchdown.

The Packers would win the Super Bowl that season.
