Ludford compares military sacrifice to biblical teachings

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Davel, Kautza urge master plan for county be created.

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Master plan urged for county buildings

Studies continue to show millions needed for repairs to courthouse, sheriff's department, jail

Shawano County Administrative Coordinator Jim Davel and Shawano County Board Chairman Tom Kautza are again urging county supervisors to create a master plan to guide maintenance and new construction for county buildings.

"The building (courthouse) is not what we need today," Davel said at the May 22 county board meeting. "Our court system has changed dramatically. We've got to do better. These are some tough decisions. We don't know the cost of what this could look like, because we haven't formulated our plan yet."

Davel's comments followed a report by Kurt Berner, vice president of The Samuels Group, Wausau, which was contracted to review the county building plan studies over the past 40 years.

The Samuels Group is a management firm that helps with the pre-planning through construction phases.

"Historically what I found with counties is the same situation which you have here today," Berner said.

He said space issues get studied, a report is created, and then it is shelved only to have the process repeated in a couple of years.

Space needs studies from 1985 to 2024 were reviewed.

Davel asked supervisors whether they wanted to continue making Band-Aid repairs or move ahead and build something new.

"When you look at the history here in Shawano County, it is absolutely ridiculous to go back and do more studies," he said. We spent over a million dollars on studies, and nothing was ever built."

Somerville Architects and Engineers completed the most recent study in 2023 of the courthouse,

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heating plant, sheriff's department and jail.

"As you look through the suggestions in regards to what should be addressed on both of these buildings (courthouse and sheriff's department/jail), the list is pretty significant, and the dollars add up real quick," Berner said of the recommendations in the Somerville report.

According to the report, several million dollars in repairs and upgrades are needed.

"Based on that information, you're at a point where you as the board will have to give some consideration as to what do you invest in your infrastructure here and what is the best way to invest in the infrastructure," Berner said.

For the sake of his report, Berner said the work release center, located across town from the jail, was also reviewed.

Berner recommended the formation of an ad hoc committee focused solely on creating a master plan for the county.

"It's better for you to look at something from a master plan perspective,

and what I mean by that is look at all the needs that you, the county, right now have for building infrastructure, get them on the table, then start to prioritize them," he said. "Put them in a master plan or road map that you as the board can then make decisions that are attainable, things that you can afford to be able to step to the final solution of addressing all of the needs that you have for your facilities."

Then, he said, the county can decide whether to continue to invest in the existing buildings or put together a game plan to replace them.

"I've been here 12 years, and there was going to be a master plan written when I got here," Kautza said. "That never happened. Everything just keeps happening. A new board comes in. Everything goes around in a circle, and nothing really happens. Sooner or later, something does have to happen, or the place just keeps coming apart."

Berner acknowledged there will be challenges regardless of the decision made. There is a matter of

what the county can afford. Constituents will wonder whether the decision was the right one or not. At a certain point in a remodeling project, the Americans with Disabilities Act compliance requirements will kick in and require more dollars.

He reminded supervisors to also consider the properties west of the courthouse the county purchased for possible expansion plans as well as the needs of the public library on South Sawyer Street.

The Samuels Group report also included three conceptual options, which Berner said are not recommendations. Rather, they will give officials an idea of what a master plan phasing concept would look like.

Finally, he said the county's financial adviser would need to be consulted to discuss borrowing and tax impacts.

Supervisor Joe Miller asked whether Berner and his group had considered new buildings in a different location.

Berner said those discussions were held, pointing to conceptual plans involving

the work release center. He also reminded officials that by law, the courthouse must be located in the county seat.

As a point of interest, Davel said Waushara County, with half the population of Shawano County, recently bonded for \$89.5 million at 2.1% interest to build a new government center, highway shop and EMT building. The cost to taxpayers was about \$83 per \$100,000 of property value.

Current interest rates are 4.5% to 5%, he said.

"Get your homework done while our rates are higher," he said, noting that when rates drop, the county would be ready to move forward with any necessary borrowing.

He reiterated the costs in the Somerville report are only to maintain the current buildings, not making any necessary improvements.

"1956 plumbing in this building," Davel said. "1956 wiring in this building. We still put fuses in around here."

He said the cost to make courthouse repairs would be between \$40 million and \$50 million.

"That would be to maintain what we have here, but the would not get you the build to connect this building with the sheriff's de-

partment ... and that would not bring this building up to ADA code," he said.

"We are one of eight (courthouses) in the state that is open. We don't have security when you walk in this courthouse, and we have issues here every single week."

With the sheriff's department and jail across Third Street, deputies must walk inmates across the road for court appearances. Once inside, there is not private entry area, so inmates are walked down the hallway in front of visitors, employees, witnesses and victims.

Supervisor Matt Pleshek is also the city engineer in Shawano. He said it's important the city be aware of county plans in the neighborhood.

"We're not ignoring Third Street. We're not ignoring Washington Street," he said. "These were all right in the queue, but I'm not going to put in a ton of money on these streets without knowing what's going to happen here."

He said the city would work with the county to ensure the project, including infrastructure, is done right without investing funds only to see them wasted if plans change in a couple of years.

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The Shawano County Sheriff's Department and Jail were the subject of a recent facilities assessment that indicated significant repairs and improvements are needed. Also, inmates are routinely walked across the street and through the hallways of the courthouse when they need to appear in court, creating a safety issue for the inmates, staff and the public.

Ten former Shawano County supervisors were recognized and thanked for their combined 125 years of service when the County Board gathered May 22.

Jerry Erdmann, Mart

Grams, Steve Gueths, David Heideman, Devin Krizan, Milton Marquardt Jr., Dick Olson, Grant Staszak, Mike Stupecky and Arlyn Tober did not return to the board at the start of the 2024 term, whether by choice not to seek another term or by the voters who cast bal-

lots for someone else.

Tober, who served on the board for 50 years, was the only former member to attend. He was presented with a \$150 gift card through the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce; other former members will have gift cards

mailed to them.

Tober said he enjoyed every year of serving on the board. He also said he served on nearly every board committee, some for several terms.

"You get to see the county as a whole," he said. "If you just get on certain

committees and stay there, you don't get to see what's happening. It's so good to be able to see the whole picture."

Tober said he attended between 70 and 120 meetings a year when serving, averaging about 90 every 12 months. That translates to

about 4,500 meetings.

In addition to Tober's 50 years, Marquardt served 21, Erdmann served 20, and Gueths served 16.

At four years each were Krizan, Olson and Staszak. Grams, Heideman and Stupecky each served two years.

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Graduation marks more than simple success

Salutarian looks back on tribe's status after decades of strife

Over 80 students walked across the stage May 22 to get their diplomas during Menominee Nation High School's graduation commencement at the Omaeqnomenewak Wetohkatikamek Center, many of them proud of a revived heritage that just a few decades ago was in danger of extinction.

Tiarra Latender, salutarian for the class of 2024, spoke of how the Menominee have worked hard to recapture their heritage for all stages of life, including for high school graduates. She noted that salutarians talk about the future at graduation, but she noted that didn't seem quite right for a Menominee graduate.

"If I'm going to talk about the future of our people, I also need to talk about our past," Latender said. "At the beginning of the year, our Menominee language class received a writing prompt: 'If the government were to show up and tell you this isn't your home anymore, what would you do?' At first, I thought this was a ridiculous question, but as our teacher delved deeper into the topic, I realized this wasn't just a hypothetical scenario. It was our history."

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It was learning the history of her people's past that Latender came to realize what they'd gone through, and her desires to give back became clearer.

"Our great-grandparents endured endless lies from the government, forced relocation and assimilation. Despite their resilience, the trauma continued," Latender said. "The youth were transferred into residential schools, where their identities were systematically stripped away, fueling intergenerational trauma. The loss of our culture and language was not a choice. It was assimilation."

Latender pointed out that assimilation has made it difficult for Indig-

enous people to figure out where they belong in the world. She said there are many dealing with mental health stereotypes, while entire cultures are "enduring stereotypes" along with suffering from substance abuse, bullying and a lack of public representation.

"There have been times when I've questioned whether this life was made for me," Latender said as her voice trembled and tears filled her eyes. "Though I've never received a direct answer, I've found the strength to overcome each battle."

The salutarian has seen a shift in the trauma of her tribe and seen that more is being done than

ever before to reclaim the Menominee identity.

"I hope that, by witnessing our community's efforts to reclaim our heritage and identity, it shows everyone, especially the next generation, that it's possible to turn your passion into impactful change," Latender said. "I see MenominiyoU teaching the next generation of speakers. I see Medicine Fish covering our land in buffalo and mentoring the next generation of Menominee men. I see Kaehkenawapahtaeq guiding our language while providing the kids with a curriculum that is culturally and land based. Your calling is here. You just have to find it."

Menominee Indian School Board President David Miller also spoke of the importance of Menominee heritage as the graduates, who make up the 47th graduating class in the district, embark on their "big transition in your life."

"There were times in the last 500 years where we about disappeared," Miller said. "Those old ones thought of you, the same way you should think of the old ones. We're going to ask that you go ahead with your lives and full of love, full of understanding and help one another."

Superintendent Wendell Waukau, who will be retiring in June, recounted how his mother had to drop out of school at 18 because she was pregnant with Waukau's older brother, but then she found a way to get her diploma 18 years later, joining that older brother at his graduation, showing that overcoming adversity is possible for anyone.

For 28 years, Waukau has been part of high school graduations on the Menominee Reservation, with the district handing out diplomas for almost 2,600 students in all the years of its existence. Nowadays, high school graduates are graduating simultaneously with dozens of credits from the College of Menominee Nation, Northcentral Technical College and Northeast Wisconsin Technical College, which he sees as a sign that the Menominee

people are better than before.

"We know that it shows our community values education, but what it should do is give our students hopes and dreams and opportunities," Waukau said.

Meshaen Zhuckkahosee, class valedictorian, acknowledged that he and his fellow graduates were celebrating both an end and a beginning.

"To my fellow graduates, look around you," Zhuckkahosee said. "These faces represent countless hours of hard work, determination and resilience. We have faced numerous challenges both academically and personally, but we have persevered. We have grown not only as students but as individuals, ready to take on the world with passion and purpose."

Latender noted that there were some people that made an impact on the graduates who could not be at the ceremony.

"Your spirit and influence are deeply felt, and we hold you in our hearts as we celebrate this milestone," Latender said. "About five months ago, when I found out I was going to be the salutarian, I was beyond excited and incredibly proud of myself for reaching this goal. However, that excitement quickly turned into a mixture of nerves and anxiety when I learned that being a salutarian meant I also had to write a speech, a good one at that."

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Bonduel grads encouraged to live life to the fullest

Class described as strong leaders, good at overcoming obstacles and willing to help each other succeed

The spirit of a little sister watched over the Bonduel High School graduation on May 24.

Chloe Zernicke, an eighth-grader at St. Paul Lutheran School in Bonduel, lost her life in an ATV accident May 15. Nine days later, her sister, Hailey, graduated as salutarian with the class of 2024.

Hailey Zernicke said in her salutarian speech that success is defined by the positive impact we have on others.

"If you remember one thing from tonight, let it be this: Live life to the fullest, take opportunities given to you, and never take life for granted, because you never know when it will end," she said in closing. "Have fun and live every day as if it were the last. Live like Chloe."

Valedictorian Lila Pleshek also mentioned Chloe at the close of her

own speech.

"This girl was so close to many of our hearts, and we will never forget the memories we made with her," Pleshek said. "On behalf of Chloe and her family, the class of 2024 are wearing blue bows on our tassels to represent her beautiful life."

In his opening remarks, Superintendent Joe Dawidziak did not directly mention the accident but referred to the way the senior class, and the community in general, rallied around one another.

"Seniors, very recently we've all been reminded that there's something very

special that happens here, a spirit, hope, enthusiasm, family, love, a pride in where you came from, a pride of who you are now and who you will be in the future, which will be so awesome, whatever that is," Dawidziak said. "You take care of your own, and everyone else here will be taking care of you. You look out for each other, and everyone else here will be looking out for you. You stand up for each other, and I can guarantee you, everyone here will be standing up for you."

The main commencement speaker, middle school math teacher and coach Mark Margelofsky, said he was struck by these students when he taught them as sixth-graders, describing them as strong leaders, good at overcoming obstacles and more than willing to help each other succeed.

Margelofsky said he will be telling the story of this class for the rest of his time

coaching, about how they overcame injuries, supported one another and handled adversity.

He recalled one particular student who struggled to master sixth-grade math.

"Every day the math would come back and it looked like it had been through a war," Margelofsky said. "There were eraser marks everywhere, because somebody sat at home with that student and they worked over and over on those problems, and this student wouldn't quit. They wanted to know; they wanted to learn this stuff."

Hailey Zernicke said the class stuck together through ups and downs, celebrating successes and being there for each other in challenging times.

"We watched each other grow and develop, not just academically but as people," she said. "From staying up late to finish an assignment or group project that was due the next morning, to school

events or extracurricular activities, we've been there for each other every step of the way."

School board member Dave Bohm, who represented the board at the speaker's podium and handed his daughter, Joselyn, her diploma, encouraged the group to have a list of 10 things they want to accomplish and keep that list in the forefront, making necessary adjustments as life throws them curveballs.

"Always try to be generous. Give what you can, no matter what it is — time, talent, or treasure," Bohm said. "And finally, stay humble, stay hungry — you will always be a Bear."

Schmidt seeks to accomplish more in 2nd term

Incumbent quashes rumors being spread, vows to be for constituents

Rep. Peter Schmidt is seeking a second term in the 6th Assembly District, running on a platform of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness as he feels he's accomplished a lot for Wisconsin as a freshman legislator.

Schmidt, a farmer in the Town of Hartland, has a primary face-off in August against another Republican legislator, Rep. Elijah Behnke, who plans to move to western Oconto County if elected, since the latest legislative maps edged out several communities in Outagamie County and incorporated Menominee County and portions of Oconto County. The primary winner will go up against Shirley Hinze, a Democrat from Shawano, in the November election.

Schmidt gathered about 560 signatures for his nomination forms, almost triple the 200 required to get on the ballot, and he will not be running as an independent, despite rumors cir-

culating around Shawano County to the contrary.

"If you go online to Badger Voters (www.badgervoters.wi.gov), that's where the Wisconsin Election Commission's got all the public information," Schmidt said. "What's sad to see is I gave everyone the opportunity and said, 'Let's run a clean campaign.' Folks in the boundaries of District 6 are tired

of the lies and distortions and disillusion. They want to hear the truth, and I'm not afraid to speak the truth, and I have a track record of telling the constituents, 'Here's where we are.'

"It's very discouraging to see local leaders already playing dirty campaigns, especially with this election cycle, where election violence is expected to be up 40%."

Schmidt attributed his election to his first term to be the result of him not engaging in mudslinging. He noted that the party-change rumor is not the only one he has heard.

"It just boggles my mind that people abuse their First Amendment right to free speech where they intentionally lie to score," Schmidt said. "I'm expecting more rumors and more mudslinging as things move forward."

Schmidt noted he has been pushing for a lot of things in his first term in office to help ease his constituents' lives. One of those issues was cannabis, and even though the bill didn't get to the governor's desk, he's hoping to push it through next year, especially with the federal government changing the classification of the drug.

"I have met many different constituents and responded to their inquiries and brought forth bills that reflect their beliefs," Schmidt said. "Medical

cannabis was one bill that a bunch of constituents wanted me to advocate for because a lot of people are tired of driving to other states to get their medicine."

Schmidt is also running on the necessity of upping school districts' funding for special education programs. He also wants to allow retired teachers to return to education to address the shortages that schools throughout the state are experiencing.

"It's not fair for firefighters, law enforcement, police officers to be able to do that, but not our teachers," Schmidt said. "I want to get rid of that loophole. They are as equally important as law enforcement and firemen and EMTs, and there's such a shortage of teachers."

Another goal for another term is to address funding for fixing roads. Schmidt said constituents are appreciative of his efforts to get more funding for local and county road projects but urge him to tell the legislature to do more to address the roads in the northern half of the state and not let Madison and Milwaukee get priority.

"The people in Madison, they understand that we're very good with natural resources, but they don't always understand the needs of the roads," Schmidt said. "They like the scenery, but they're so hypnotized by the beauty that they don't see how the roads are."

Constituents are also telling Schmidt to look into issues involving agriculture and election integrity, as well as improvements to state parks. Schmidt noted he also wants to look at better regulations for immigrants, noting that many farms utilize immigrants to grow the food that people eat.

"We are a nation of immigrants," Schmidt said.

"Immigrants bring new perspectives to our community, and that's something that's going to get attacked."

Schmidt plans to do like he did two years ago and campaign door to door, feeling that voters like the approach where candidates come to them to listen to their issues. He said that his purpose is to represent the people, not the political party.

"I have kept true to my word, and I have not taken any lobbyists' money," Schmidt said. "That's something that is a rarity in politics. A lot of people are tired of representatives being bought out."

As an example, Schmidt pointed out the medical cannabis legislation. The view of many Republicans is that marijuana in any form should remain illegal, even though it's legal in medical and/or recreational uses in Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois and Michigan, leaving Wisconsin as an island, and the incumbent feels the legislature should be listening to the people who need the cannabis for health reasons.

"That shows I'm listening to the constituents," Schmidt said. "A lot of people are not in favor of big pharmaceutical companies monopolizing the medical field, and this gives constituents that needed option, but there are too many people afraid to say that they need medical cannabis, especially in my district."

Schmidt said that to be a free society, there should be fewer restrictions, not more.

"I shouldn't force someone else, based on what I believe," Schmidt said. "People should have the freedom to make their own best decisions to get the medicines what they seek."

While some committee members are elected by fellow supervisors and others are appointed according to county board rules, many are at the discretion of the board chairman.



JOE MILLER

Supervisors are asked to submit their requests for committee assignments, which are then reviewed and debated by the Committee on Committees and Kautza. Miller wanted to serve on the public safety committee but was denied a spot.

"I will not put a county board member on a committee where they were an employee. I'm not going to take a member and purposely put them on public safety because they were a deputy in the sheriff's department," Kautza said. "You don't know exactly what that

person's motivation is going to be. Not saying that it's going to be bad, but you can get someone who's going to be just a rubber stamp, or you can get somebody who worked at the sheriff's department and they have a vengeance against someone else that worked there."

Miller has 30 years of experience with the Stockbridge-Munsee Reservation and Shawano County. Supervisor Mike Wizner is retired from the sheriff's department after 30 years.

"I had put public safety down as No. 1 four previous times, I think Mike had

listed it No. 1 twice now," Miller said the day after the meeting. "Tom, as chairman, has final authority for all committee assignments, when it comes to selection. Why have a Committee on Committees?"

Wizner did not respond to a request for comment.

Miller said he asked the question as he did so new supervisors could hear for themselves Kautza's viewpoint.

"We just wish we would be shown a bit of respect so our talents and experience would be put to better use for all the residents of the county," Miller said. "I disagree with Tom's viewpoint that he thinks we may have a 'hidden agenda' or be a rubber stamp for the sheriff. Our

experience speaks louder than that."

Kautza said experience doesn't necessarily mean a supervisor should be on any particular committee. Sometimes, those without prior knowledge, may ask more questions and serve better because of it.

"I think you can understand our frustration with that," Miller said. "Sixty years between us, and we don't know nothing."

"I'm not saying you don't know nothing," Kautza said.

Miller said he would probably make the same case again in two years.

"I'll give you the same answer, Joe, as I did last year when this came up," Kautza said. "If you don't like the way I did it, next time it comes around, throw

me out. Elect someone else."

Kautza said many supervisors want to serve on the executive committee, public safety committee, and the highway and parks committee. County rules dictate some restrictions on the appointments.

For example, the chairman can pick two supervisors at large to serve on the executive committee. Because rules dictate the public safety committee, the highway and parks committee, and the human services board each elect a representative to be on the committee, no one else from those committees can be chosen by the chairman to serve on the executive committee.

Ludford noted that fallen veterans remained true to what they were fighting for and didn't falter.

"They were ordinary people, just like you and me," Ludford said. "They chose to do something extraordinary. They chose to put their lives on the line for the sake of others, for the sake of us. This is the kind of bravery that is not born out of a moment's decision but out of a deep-seeded conviction, a profound sense of duty, an unwavering love for others."

Ludford stressed the importance of remembering those who sacrificed themselves for the freedom that America enjoys today.

"They didn't just fight for their own lives, they fought for ours," Ludford said. "This sacrificial love is a reminder of the love Christ showed us."

Ludford said the parallels were not coincidence but a "divine design."

"It's a reminder that bravery is not just about physical strength or military prowess. It's about love," he said. "This is the kind of bravery that we remember today. We find ourselves standing on sacred ground, the price paid for our liberty to speak, a debt we cannot repay, but one we must strive to honor in our daily lives. The cost of freedom is not merely a historical fact but a living reality that continues to shape our world and our

lives."

The loss of even one life leaves a wound that cannot be healed, Ludford said, and the bravery of the United States Armed Forces cannot be measured by numbers and statistics. It's measured by the support of the communities and the people within them.

"Freedom is not a static state, but a dynamic process that requires ongoing effort and sacrifice," Ludford said. "It's not enough to simply



win freedom. It must be maintained, defended and nurtured. This is a responsibility that falls on all of us as members of the human family. We must be willing to stand up for our freedoms, to speak out against injustice, and to work toward a more equitable and just society. This is a cost we all bear, a responsibility

we all share."

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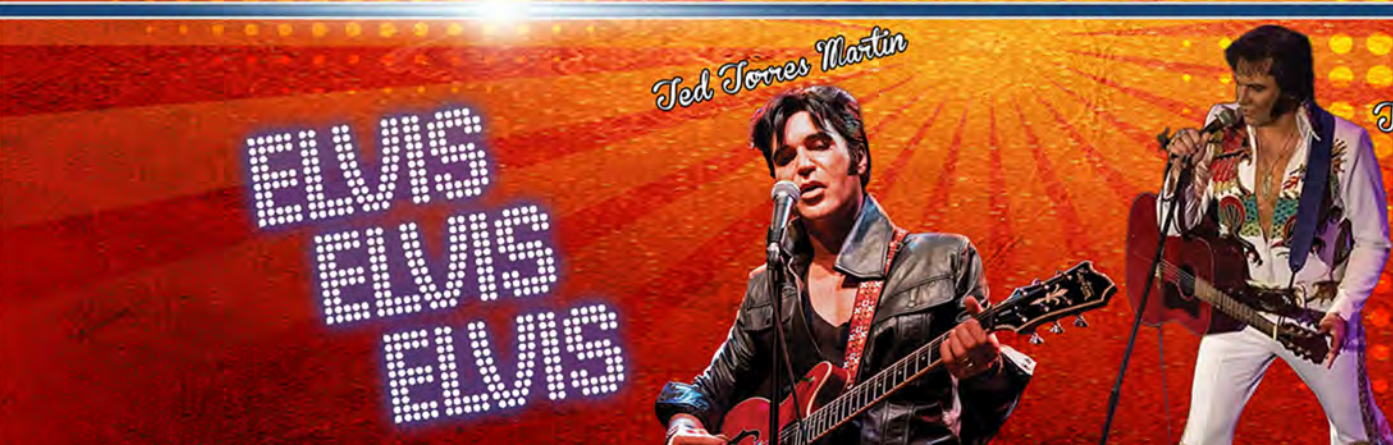

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Spring migration brings more birds to Wisconsin

It's amazing to realize that while we sleep, thousands of birds are migrating overhead, winging silently through the night, heading to their summer breeding grounds in the north. Some will stop here in Wisconsin to raise their young, and others fly on to Canada and even the Arctic to reach their breeding grounds.

We've learned much about bird migration but that knowledge is rather recent. While some ancient cultures and even early naturalists suspected that birds spent winters in warmer climes, the first real evidence of bird migration, writes Rebecca Heisman in her 2023 book, "Flight Paths," was when an unfortunate stork was shot outside a German village in 1822. When picked up by the hunter, he found that a large spear had been impaled clear through its neck. Analyses of the spear showed that it was from Africa.

The history of unraveling the mysteries of bird migration is fascinating and well researched in Heisman's book. She leads us through the use of various devices used to determine the movement of birds, starting with bird banding followed by the discovery of what weather radar can reveal about bird movements.

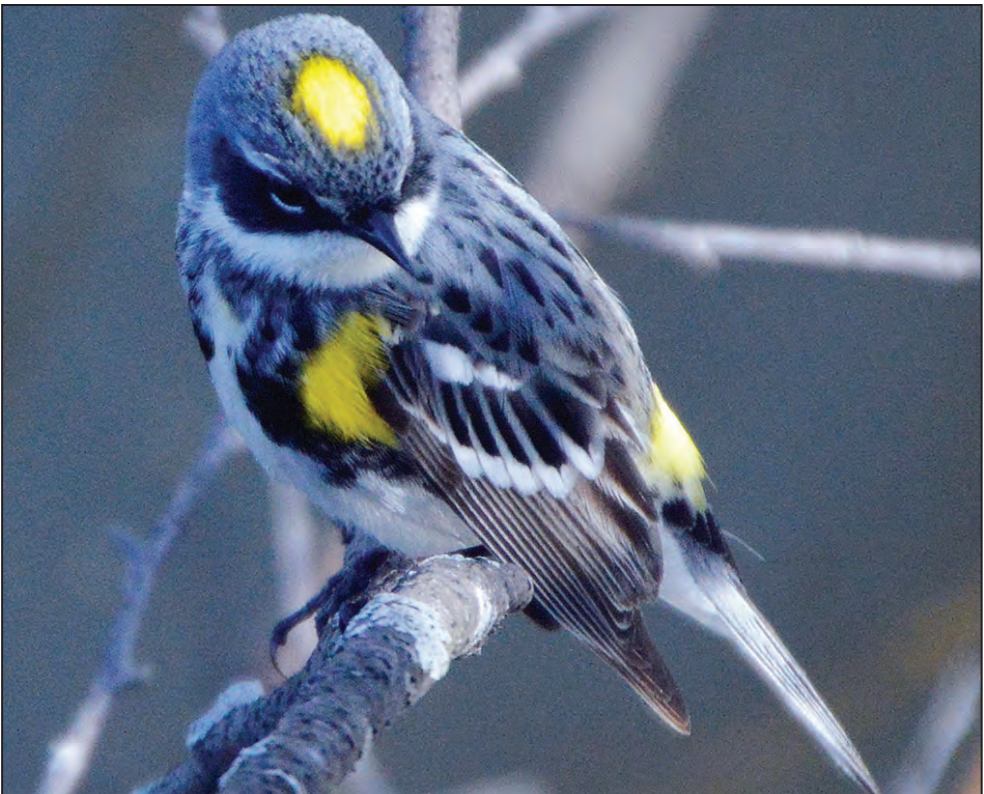
Some of the newer tools used to track birds include



tiny radio transmitters which are attached to birds, the signals from the transmitters tracked first from the ground, then from satellites. Light level geolocators (that track the sun's position and the time) also attached to birds can identify the bird's location. Now very sophisticated analyses using stable isotopes from bird feathers, and DNA analyses, are revealing more and more about the movement of our avian friends — many of whom travel widely (some up to thousands of miles) during migration.

These tracking devices winging their way around the world are playing a key role in bird conservation; they are identifying wintering, breeding and stop-over habitats. It's these areas that are important to protect in order to conserve our bird populations, especially as so many of them are on the decline.

I digress; now back to spring migration. Among the millions of birds winging their way north are warblers, sparrows, finches, shorebirds, raptors, waterfowl, hummingbirds and songbirds. It's the warblers

I'm working on learning more about this spring. According to one of our favorite bird field guides, "Kaufman Field Guide to Birds of North America" by Kenn Kaufman (Kaufman), there are more than 50 species of warblers in North America. To learn more about 32 warbler species you can see in Wisconsin, check out the Bird Advisors website at www.birdadvisors.com/warblers-wisconsin. Most warblers are com-

ing to us from their wintering grounds in the tropics (Mexico, Caribbean and Central and South America). They are a beautiful group of birds, many, especially the males, sporting bright color combinations and patterns. Some of the warbler names reflect their coloring. Consider the black and white warbler, yellow warbler, black-throated blue warbler, cerulean warbler, yellow-rumped warbler, chestnut-sided warbler

and common yellowthroat. These names alone are alluring; you want to see them and learn more about them. Warblers can be elusive. Many spend their time in forest undergrowth, making them hard to see. Many of them flit high up in the tree tops, always on the move. Patience is a requirement while birding, as is a good pair of binoculars, a birding field guide and/or the Merlin App on your phone. You can train your ear to pick out some of your

favorite warbler songs to help identify them. Kaufman describes them as high-pitched, with thin clear notes, buzzes and trills. You may also hear their "chip notes;" listen for "chip" or "tsick" to see if they are nearby. The Merlin App is especially fun and helpful here, as it can identify birds by their songs and calls. Warblers mostly feed on small insects and some, like the yellow-rumped warbler, also eat berries and therefore, according to Kaufman, arrive earlier in the spring and linger later into fall. The yellow-rumped warbler is a favorite with its overall gray, black and white feathering highlighted with bright yellow patches on top of its head, its sides and on its rump. It is easier than some to identify on the wing. Bring some joy to your spring by keeping an eye and ear out for the birds. They have traveled far to get here, using their amazing navigation instincts and skills to guide them north. They will reward you with their beauty and songs. 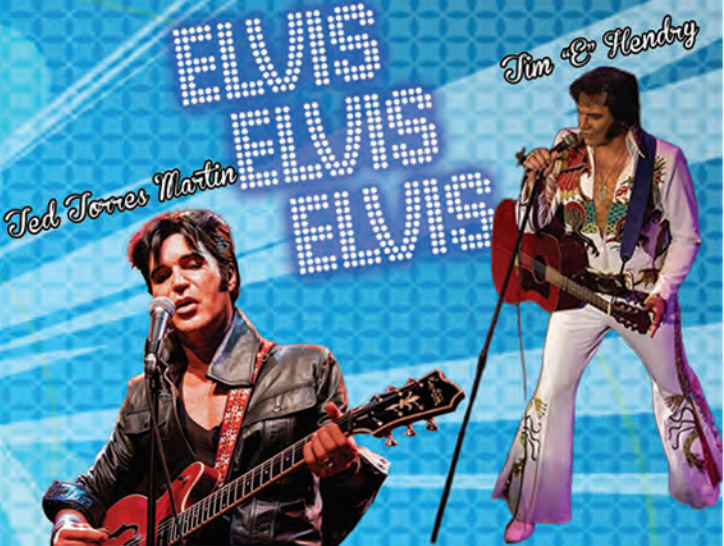

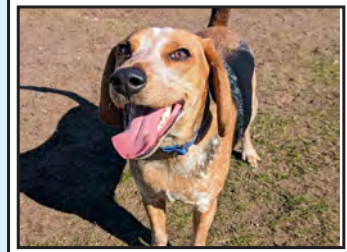

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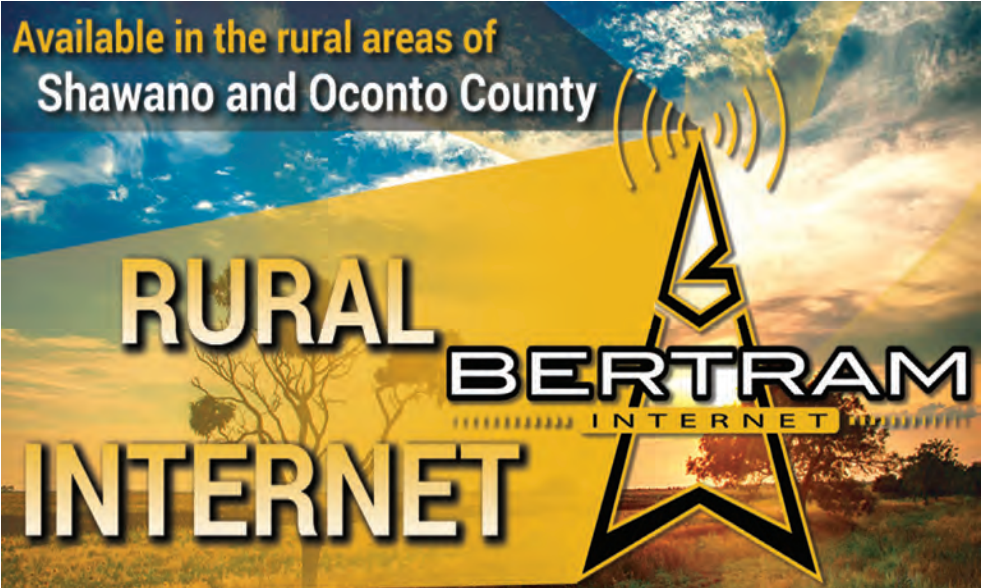
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Track and field athletes advance to state

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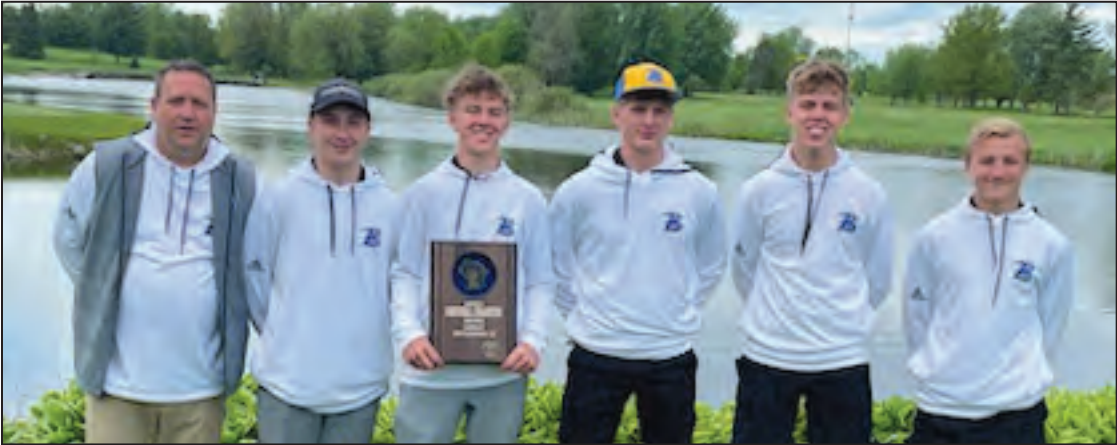

Bubolz gets honorable mention in Ford contest

The Gerald R. Ford Presidential Foundation has announced the winners of its 2024 Student Writing Challenge, and a Shawano teen is among them.



Makenna Bubolz, a junior at Shawano Community High School, received an honorable mention for her essay, which included a \$500 cash award. After graduation, Bubolz plans to study rehabilitation science at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, with a goal of earning a doctorate of physical therapy. The foundation's annual Student Writing Challenge encourages students throughout the nation to reflect on the values that the nation's 38th president exemplified as he answered the United States' call to public service, and how those values are applicable today.

This year's contest was grounded in Ford's humanitarian relief for America's Vietnamese allies in 1975, dubbed "Operation Baby-lift" and "Operation New Life," which evacuated more than 100,000 Vietnamese refugees fleeing the Communist North Vietnamese Army's advance. This year's writing prompt asked students to reflect on what the words "American citizen" mean to them.

"It is so heartening to see how many of our young students are engaged with their communities and public service," said Gleaves Whitney, the foundation's executive director. "We received more essays from more places this year than ever before, and they were truly inspiring. We thank the students' families and teachers for implanting such virtue in our young people. They are our future, and it gives us hope."

Nearly 840 students from the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands and American families serving in the Armed Forces overseas submitted essays in this year's competition.
