Full house comes out for Empty Bowls fundraiser

Event helps remind community of the need for SAM25

Shawano Area Matthew 25 is prepping for its 10th season of providing shelter to those in need, and having hundreds of people come out Sept. 7 to its Empty Bowls, Caring Hearts fundraiser at Shawano Community High School gave a boost to the organization's ability to provide a helping hand.

This is the first year since the coronavirus pandemic where SAM25 has been able to bring the full fundraiser back, with musical performances, 50/50 raffles and basket raffles tacked onto the sale of hand-painted ceramic bowls. In the last

Sheriff: There isn't 5% to cut in budget

County facing tight 2025 budget with borrowing strong possibility

Shawano County Sheriff George Lenzner is adamant when it comes to his department's budget for 2025. He and other department heads have been told to trim 5% from their requests for next year.

"Our budget is basically wages and fringe benefits," he said. "That 5% we have left is \$230,000, and we're supposed to cut \$366,000. It's impossible to be done."

Administrative Coordinator Jim Davel told all department heads they needed to review their budget requests and either trim 5% or the executive committee would do it.

The county is facing a \$3 million deficit with its projected 2025 tax levy. If all departments trim 5%, the county would still have to borrow \$2 million to balance the budget.

Wages, benefits and positions were not eligible for the cuts.

"We've put together a realistic budget the last few years," Lenzner said, while acknowledging the few cuts that were made.

Among them was \$4,000 to grade the uneven ground at the firing range.

"We've had a couple injuries out there," he said. "We had somebody with a twisted ankle."

He also trimmed \$10,000 for a new dive trailer. Instead, they will continue to repair and maintain an old ambulance to haul equipment.

Another \$2,000 in office supplies, including paper calendars, was trimmed.

"Our stuff has been dwindled through the years," Lenzner told the public safety committee on Sept. 4. "We don't have any more to cut. Please don't cut our training expenses."

He said the county averages \$360 per officer for annual training. The Shawano Police Department averages more than \$800.

"Training is expensive nowadays. Any type of leadership training is through the roof," Lenzner said. "If we continue to

Smith steps down as city finance director

Shawano’s finance director, Greg Smith, will be leaving in October to take a finance position with the Menominee tribe.

The news broke during a Shawano Common Council work session on Aug. 28 and was presented to NEW Media during a meeting Sept. 4 at Shawano City Hall.

“We’re all very excited for him,” said City Clerk Lesley Nemetz. “He was able to take on a different position, but obviously we’re very sad that he’s leaving. He’s done some amazing things for the city and our budget process and all of those things. We’ll be working through that process as we continue.”

City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said he talked with Smith about the move and learned it would be a promotion to a better position. Smith took the city position five years ago.

“He’s sad that he had to make the choice, but in the end, that’s how it goes,” Sheppard said. “We keep rolling, but he’ll be here with us for the next few weeks (on the budget).”

With this move happening during the city’s budget season, Nemetz noted that Smith has been integral in the process, but other department leaders have worked together and communicated to make sure the budget is clear and solid.

“As a team, we are really, really good, and we are blessed to be able to work so well together, and obviously he helped to simplify a lot of things we’ve done over the last several years, and that’s only going to make things easier going forward,” Nemetz said.

“This is one of those situations that we’re lucky to have in that he’s leaving on really good terms. This is very beneficial to him and his community and all of those things.”

City’s 2025 budget talks underway

With small bump in levy limit, Shawano looking at alternatives

The city of Shawano is getting closer to the finish line on its 2025 budget but still has to navigate some things for the Shawano Common Council to approve the final document in November.

The levy limit for the city set by the state is increasing \$116,691 next year, a 3.1% bump. By comparison, inflation is estimated to be only 2.5%, which means this could be the first year in a while that the levy limit has kept pace with the rate of inflation.

This year, the levy limit only increased 1.58%, compared to 3.4% for inflation. In 2023, the limit was increased 2.3% while inflation had soared to 8%, and in 2022, the state raised the levy limit by 3.41% while inflation went up 4.7%. All told, the city’s levy limit is 8.21% behind the rate of inflation in recent years.

State funding has yet to

be finalized, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard, but that should be cleared up later this month.

“There’s still a lot we don’t know yet as far as state revenues like general transportation and all that,” Sheppard said. “It’s been generally flat, but we’ve been hoping there’s going to be slight increases this year.”

Numbers on insurance rates are also in flux, but Sheppard is hoping that the city’s potential for rejoining the League of Wisconsin Municipalities insurance group could mitigate the amount of increase.

“We jumped out about eight years ago because, at the time, the only option we had locally — Network Health and ThedaCare — were having a divorce, so we were going to be on an insurance plan where our local provider wasn’t going to be covered, so that’s when we went out to market,” Sheppard said. “We’re investigating going back into the pool because, when you’re in this big pool, the increases tend to be a little tempered because you have a larger pool, but when you’re in

by yourself, it depends on your organization’s experiences.”

Because of the levy limit increases not keeping up with inflation, the city is looking at alternative revenues, including a wheel tax of \$40 that could provide an additional \$320,000 next year that could be used on street needs like snowplowing. That funding would not be subject to the state revenue cap.

“A lot of communities are looking at it,” Sheppard said. “Most communities would prefer to just address rising costs through the levy and manage it that way, but you really can’t. They have a hard-capped number for operations, and that’s all you can (do), so you’re in a position where either you have to figure out how you can scale back, which I think we’ve really done over the last two or three years. However, when inflation was at 8% and our increase was 2%, that, over time, just really starts to build.”

The wheel tax is not the only thing the city is pursuing, however. According to City Clerk Lesley Nemetz, Shawano is also chasing after grants

to fund projects or even positions.

“We’re working on some nice grants through the state and the federal for street projects,” Nemetz said. “That’ll help offset some of those costs we’re looking at having so we can maintain those services for the public.”

One grant helped to fund a detective position for the Shawano Police Department, which Sheppard said has been an immense benefit. The city is hoping to renew that grant.

“Since we brought that position on, the amount of proactive enforcement on drugs in Shawano has been awesome,” Sheppard said. “Obviously, that’s something we want to keep. Bringing people in while your revenues are limited is a challenge and so we were able to do that through a grant. If we don’t get the grant, we have to pay for that position in full.”

Sheppard noted that the city is very cautious about grants like that because the funding is one-time versus the cyclical funds used to pay for other employee positions.

Eggs recalled by Milo’s Poultry Farms

Milo’s Poultry Farms LLC of Bonduel is recalling all Milo’s Poultry Farms and Tony’s Fresh Market branded eggs, because the eggs have the potential to be contaminated with salmonella.

Salmonella is an organism that can have serious and sometimes fatal infections in young children, frail or elderly people, and others with weakened immune systems.

Healthy persons infected with salmonella often experience fever, diarrhea

(which may be bloody), nausea, vomiting and abdominal pain. In rare circumstances, infection with salmonella can result in the organism getting into the bloodstream and producing more severe illnesses such as arterial infections (such as infected aneurysms, endocarditis and arthritis).

Milo’s Poultry Farms’ eggs were distributed in Wisconsin, Illinois and Michigan through retail stores and foodservice distributors.

This recall includes:

- All carton sizes and all egg types labeled with Mike’s Poultry Farms, all expiration dates.
 - All carton sizes of Tony’s Fresh Market branded eggs, all expiration dates.
 - All cases of eggs for foodservice distributors, all expiration dates.
- This recall was initiated after the U.S. Food and Drug Administration informed the company that environmental samples tested positive for the bacteria. The FDA also conducted whole genome sequencing

and found that the samples were related to an ongoing salmonella outbreak investigation.

Milo’s Poultry Farms has ceased production and distribution at this time and will undergo appropriate testing and sanitizing of farms and processing equipment.

Consumers who have purchased Milo’s Poultry Farms or Tony’s Fresh Market eggs are asked not to consume them. Consumers with questions can call the company at 715-758-6709.

Sheriff K-9 handler training authorized

Shawano County Sheriff’s Deputy Jacob Ostrowski has been chosen as the new K-9 handler for the department.

He will travel to Canada later this year for a two-week training session with his new dog.

The Shawano County Public Safety Committee authorized his trip at its Sept. 4 meeting.

Lt. Nick Prey said

the county has already purchased a couple of dogs from the same vendor, Tony Pallotta, of Toronto. Exact training dates have yet to be set, but Prey said they will probably be in early to mid-November.

“They will do all the training for the dog and the handler,” he said. “SOS (Supporters of Shawano K-9) will handle the hotel or arrangements for living. Meals usually are provided one meal a day by the

trainer, and we’ll pay for the dog and the training. As a county, we don’t have a lot of investment other than his wage.”

With the retirement of Arres this summer, the sheriff’s department found itself in the market for a second K-9.

SOS K-9 is a nonprofit, community-run organization dedicated to the continued existence and advancement of the sheriff’s department K-9 division. The group is accepting

donations to assist with the purchase of equipment, training opportunities and supplies needed to successfully assist the sheriff’s department’s two law enforcement K-9s.

few years, the bowls were sold at SAM's House on East Richmond Street, but the fundraiser was limited to the bowls and selling goodies.

According to Muffy Culhane, president of SAM25's board of directors, it was time to bring the expanded fundraiser back.

"It's been wonderful," Culhane said. "We've had such great donations from the community, and so we're feeling very blessed with the support for SAM25. It's fun to be back in person again."

Culhane appreciated all the donations, which included soup and chili, but she said she was very pleased to see all the people come out and support SAM25 and its programs. Final attendance numbers were not available by press time.

Culhane noted that the need for SAM25's services is increasing.

SAM's House tallied 2,502 bed nights from Nov. 1, 2023, to April 30, serving 94 individual people. Of those, 51 were male, 42 were female and one identified as non-binary. About 39% of the people

given shelter were white, 34 were Native Americans and 12 were multi-race, with the remaining 11 being Black, Hispanic or Hawaiian. Two of the people served were U.S. veterans.

Of those 94 people who came in for shelter, 19 of them were children. Only 18 of the people were able to find permanent housing by the time they left SAM's House, about 19% of the people who came in for help.

Currently, SAM's House is only available to the homeless six months out of the year. A recent discussion at a Shawano Plan Commission meeting reiterated the point that some homeless people are sleeping on the streets the other six months of the year.

Culhane said that having a year-round shelter would be ideal, but there would need to be much more money coming in to SAM25 for that to happen.

She noted the chilly morning temperatures in the 40s the day of the fundraiser and pointed out that the need is there.

"We think about that every year," Culhane said. "Today was a really cold day. I think we should look at making the six months go into seven or eight months to start with and see what happens from there. You don't want to start something until you know it's going to be sustainable."

SAM's House served 7,506 meals to the 94 people, which is made possible by the help of the Shawano community.

"We have a very generous community that signs up each night to bring in a meal," Culhane said. "That's a need. We need at least two or three volunteers each evening, and if they'd like to stay there overnight, we'd be glad to have them, and then one or two volunteers each morning."

Besides the shelter, SAM25 operates other programs for those who are down on their luck. The organization runs a resource center year-round that helps people find work, medical care and more, and 891 people were served through the center in the 12-month period that began July 1, 2023.

SAM25 also operates a free community health clinic, and 76 people were helped with medical and/or optometry visits. The clinic also logged 521 hours by volunteers.

SAM25's thrift store and clothes closet also provided 760 people with clothing at no charge.

"It's been great to think back and see the growth of SAM25," Culhane said. "From the shelter and adding the resource center and then moving into our permanent building and adding the thrift store and, a couple of years ago, adding the free clinic."

Culhane noted that the lack of affordable housing in Shawano County is a problem, and she's hopeful that SAM25 will work with government officials to address the issue, as she sees the number of homeless increasing. Most of the people who come into SAM25 want to work and have a permanent roof over their heads, she said, but they're needing a little help and guidance.

Empty Bowls is a world fundraiser addressing the issue of hunger around the world, and Culhane said she hopes the local event shines a light on how there are some in the community who might not appear to be in need, but they are.

"We kind of expand that to hunger and homelessness, just to remind us all that not everyone is as fortunate," Culhane said.

our training, I'm telling you the guys are going to leave and go to other jobs, because they want to be trained. We need the tools to do our jobs."

He said the sheriff's department tries to do as much in-house training as possible.

Lt. Nick Prey said a survey of patrol officers indicated training and mental health services are their biggest concerns.

"If we cut that, now we're putting ourselves back in this game of not having qualified people coming here," he said. "We have to replace people and train them and all that kind of stuff."

"That sends a poor message to our people," Supervisor Steve Natzke said.

Lenzner said some officials have suggested eliminating the dive team or holding fundraisers to offset expenses.

"That's not my job to raise money," he said.

He said funds continue to be raised through a nonprofit group to benefit the K-9 program so the county has no expense for the dogs' upkeep. A K-9 program is not required by state law.

"It is in the statutes that we have to recover bodies and we have to do dive rescue," Lenzner said. "So we need a little bit of money in there. If we deplete the budget and take it out, we're going to have to contract with other counties to come in, and it's going to end up costing us more money than what we're saving."

He's also heard sugges-

tions of eliminating the recreation patrols.

"We're already cut to the minimum there," he said. "We only have the minimum hours budgeted to perform ATV, boat patrol and snow patrol. You have to have so many hours in to get the reimbursement (from the state)."

Lenzner said some elected and appointed officials don't understand the rules for these and other programs.

"If they're going to take \$1,000 out of boat patrol, then you're going to have to cut the whole thing, because we're already set at the minimum," he said. "Then the county board or whoever is going to have to explain to the public why we don't have water patrol out there, because that's one of the biggest complaints we have in the summer."

He said the sheriff's department used to patrol Shawano Lake every Friday, Saturday and Sunday in the summer. Now, they are lucky to make it out on the water one of those three days each weekend.

"There's nothing that can be cut in my opinion," Supervisor Tess Serrano said.

"It's taking more money to run a successful county," added Supervisor Jeremy Gretzinger.

Lenzner said all that remains to be cut are positions, and, again, the County Board can explain that to the residents. He said the first position to go will be the school resource officer, because

others are needed for patrol of county roads.

"We are doing everything we can," he said. "We don't have money stashed away somewhere to spend. It's a realistic budget. It's what we were asked to do. It's pretty much what we need to operate efficiently."

Prey said the department is limited on how it can generate revenue.

"The only place we can generate revenue is by bringing in other inmates (from other counties) for the jail. Our jail is full, so that's not an option," he said. "We could try and do the meals (for the Meals on Wheels program), but our kitchen is too small. It's not like we can go out and write 500 more tickets that we're going to get more revenue. It doesn't work like that. We're stuck."

Lt. Chris Madle said cuts to the emergency management budget will be a step backwards for the county.

"Technically, there is 5% that we could cut," he said. "But, if you want to cut that 5%, all that 5% are those capital outlay projects that we're trying to get done. The big thing that we pushed here the last two or three years is our tower sites, trying to move forward, get them updated, get them fixed, so that we have reliable tower sites."

He said if those projects get cut, the county is going backwards.

"We get it. We know. We will fight for you," Serrano told department officials. "I don't think

that 5% in the budget for any department is realistic. We all go to the grocery store. We all pay

our bills. Everything has gone up."

She noted the county is heading into 2025, and it's

a different landscape than it was 50 years ago.

Coroner reports 3 suicides in August

Brian Westfahl, Shawano County's coroner, reported three suicides in August, nearly one-third of all so far this year.

His monthly report indicated there have been 10 deaths by suicide in the county in 2024.

Westfahl also reported one traffic fatality in August, making a total of three for the year.

He also noted there

were 15 hospice deaths (139 for the year) and 21 cremations (181 thus far in 2024).

One organ procurement was also performed.

With approval from the Shawano County Public Safety Committee earlier this summer, the coroner's office can now recoup some expense incurred from organ procurement.

The company Versiti handles tissue recovery, and Westfahl learned at a seminar earlier this year, counties can get reim-

bursed from Versiti for administrative costs and records collection.

Up to \$300 can be reimbursed for administrative fees and donor preparation. Another \$300 can be collected for transportation services of donated organs, and up to \$150 can be reimbursed for the return of requested records, including investigative reports, toxicology reports and autopsy reports.

Goat auction raises for teen's memorial fund

The Chloe Zernicke Memorial Fund was the beneficiary of \$40,000 from businesses at the livestock auction at the Shawano County Fair.

Chloe died May 15 from an ATV accident. She was 13.

Her goat Oreo, which she was going to show at the county fair, was

shown by her sister, Georgia. Initially sold for \$5,000, the goat was returned to the auctioneer and sold again for \$5,500. After that, 53 businesses stepped for-

ward, each donating \$500. Another business gave \$1,000, and a final business offered \$2,000.

Chloe loved horses and goats and was active in 4-H. Her team won first place in the state last year. She was proud to have made the Shawano County Drill Team for the first time.

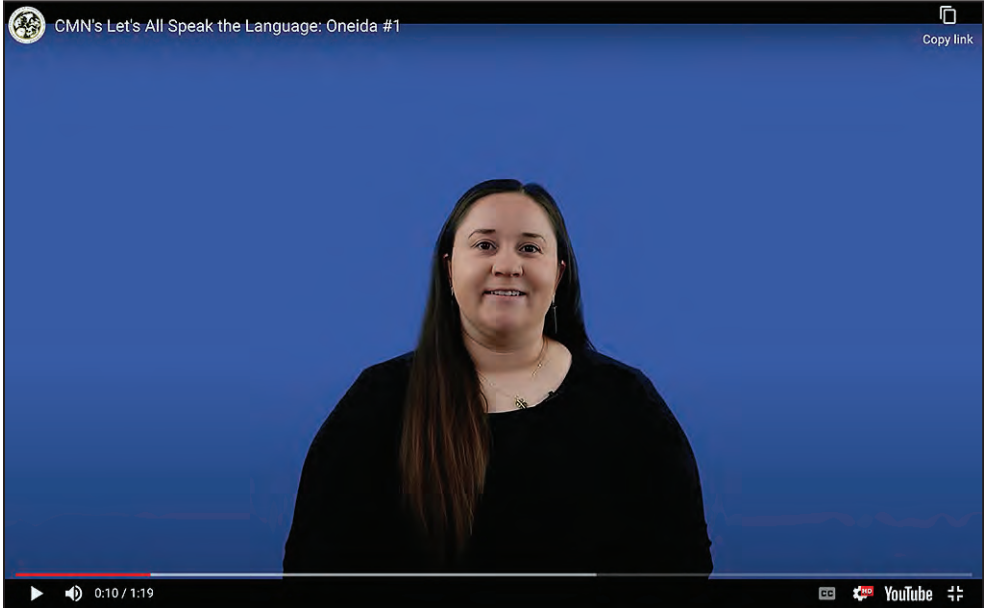

Watch your language on CMN video series

College of Menominee Nation's "Let's All Speak the Language" video series entered its second phase this month. Through partnerships with Menomini-You and Speak Mahican, the first iteration of the multi-year project shared some classroom conversational words in both the Menominee and Mahican languages. This academic year, the series will offer learners a chance to master conversational terms in Oneida and Ojibwe.

Imagined as a way to help turn every classroom into a language classroom, each of CMN's series entries begin preproduction with a similar script in English. A recognized community language teacher then translates the terms and phrases into one of Wisconsin's First Nations' languages. Each teacher is then filmed speaking the words in their Native tongue before offering the English translation. A text version of the Indigenous words then appears on the screen, enabling learners to both hear and visualize what is being taught.

Each series will have eight videos that run between one and three minutes each and cover a logical progression of classroom conversation. Beginning with a self-introduction and moving through phrases a teacher will likely share during any lesson plan, plus probable answers students will offer, the series takes learners through a typical class meeting from start to finish. Optimally shared throughout a single semester, the course instructor can play the videos in-class and assign them as homework, reinforce them during lesson plans, and ultimately normalize the use of language



during class meetings.

Since the summer of 2023, 90 CMN students answered anonymous survey questions that captured their collective thoughts on the series being utilized in their classes. Sixty-seven percent of respondents reported they watched the videos both during and after class meetings, and 64.4% stated they would use the language taught in the videos outside of the CMN classroom. Three out of five stated that the video series should be used in all CMN classes, and 73.3% stated they would be interested in partaking in a similar video series with a different Indigenous language.

One student also shared that using the videos "is a great way to learn some of the language to use in the classroom. Because the teachers speak in the videos you know how to say the words and are not embarrassed about saying them wrong. I think if the videos were used in all classes there may be more students that use the words and could interact with each other that way."

A student who identified as an education major wrote, "I really enjoyed the videos! I have shared them with my coworkers and would like to implement them in my future classrooms."

This past spring, the Scott Zager Venture Fund agreed to sponsor the 2024-25 phase of the series. Beginning this September, Dr. Rosa King's series of

Oneida language videos is both debuting in CMN classrooms and being released to the public through the school's social media on a biweekly basis.

King, CMN's Oneida language and history instructor, offered a message for language learners, "We have to start. We have to speak. We have to learn. Whatever we can do. I always tell learners, whatever you can do. Whether it's taking a class here at CMN or attending a community class at the library or being involved in an immersion program. All of that is so necessary. It's all helpful. It all strengthens the language and really influences its ability to thrive into the future."

Over the spring 2025 semester, CMN will continue down the tried-and-true path by utilizing its Ojibwe language series and releasing them to the public simultaneously. Taught by Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe University faculty member Dr. Michael D. Sullivan Sr., the videos will mark another collaboration between the two tribal colleges in Wisconsin.

Sullivan shared one of the reasons why the series is important for language learners. "No matter what we do, the next hundred years are going to pass. As we move into the future as a people, what are we going to bring with us? If there's anything worthy of bringing along on this ride in life and into the future it is our language."

CMN's "Let's All Speak the Language" video series is one way to help get conversations started.

Iron pot lives on long after most of its owners

Untimely death came calling on a regular basis in the 19th century, especially for women. Pregnancy and childbirth were a common method of culling the human herd. Many men lost their wives to the rigors of labor and delivery, and if a woman survived the ordeal, her child could easily fall victim to a fatal illness or accident. My great-great-grandmother Anna Maria Holzschuh was very familiar with the Grim Reaper's cruel customs. As a Catholic, she most certainly prayed to the Virgin Mary to keep her family safe.

Astonishingly, I learned that Anna Maria had back-up; she dabbled in astrology, an ancient pagan practice designed to thwart Death's wicked ways. I thought that was impossible. Doesn't Catholic doctrine preach that using any form of divination such as horoscopes or astrology

is a mortal sin? Yes, but the evidence is right there in her prayer book: a list of each child's name, birth date and sky sign.

Now I read my horoscope occasionally, but I don't take it seriously. I have faith and science. Modern medicine says the key to human longevity is heredity — what happens in your genes, not what happens in your jeans. Good news for me. Anna Maria died at 69, but most of her 11 children, including Great-grandpa Casper, made it way past that. My great-aunt Katarina Jospheha, whose English version of her name is the same as mine, lived to 102.

Now the fact that Anna Maria was into astrology is in itself amazing, but why on earth publish that in your prayer book, of all places? Was she hedging her bets, or was it a mini-mutiny against male-dominated institutions that controlled her life? Whatever, neither prayer nor astrology prevented Death from doing its dirty deeds. In a span of eight years, she lost three daughters, two as infants and her adopted niece, Margaretha.

Even if Anna Maria sinned grievously by secretly consulting the zodiac calendar, she did not deserve what occurred on Sept. 13, 1890. The day began ordinarily enough. She and John George were empty nesters by then, doing very well for themselves. They ate a light breakfast and headed out to pick corn. They worked until noon, then went back to

the farmhouse for dinner. Perhaps she used my iron pot to cook that meal.

As they were eating, Anna Maria noticed John George was unusually animated. He laughed loudly as he talked about their long life together and expressed his deep affection for her. Then suddenly, he fell silent. The change was so dramatic she asked him if he was ill. He said no and got up to leave, explaining he wanted to feed the pigs before going back to the cornfield. When he didn't return, she went searching.

The Sheboygan County News of Sept. 17, 1890, reported the rest: "John George Holzschuh, a well-known and well-to-do farmer of the Town of Lima, committed suicide on Monday last by hanging himself in a small workshop back of his house. No cause can be assigned for this taking of his own

life. His son Casper, who is engaged in cheese-making near Sherwood, was notified of his death and left for his home on Tuesday."

Like Anna Maria, I couldn't make sense of it. What made John George do such a thing? Apparently, he too had secrets. How did Anna Maria carry on? She had to supervise preparation of his body for burial, sit through the wake in her parlor, attend his funeral Mass filled with holy water, incense and songs of lamentation, and accompany his coffin to the cemetery, all the while believing her husband had condemned himself to eternal damnation. What emotions prevailed during those dreadful days and the 11 years she lived as a widow — rage, despair, loneliness, guilt?

I didn't learn this part of the story until after my father died. I wanted

to ask him if he thought I was strong enough to carry such burdens. Then I remembered something he said to me that day in the attic when he shared the story of my golden pot made of iron. "Anna Maria's fortitude was forged in the furnace of life, the same way a blacksmith fashioned that pot you are holding. You come from a long line of gritty women, Katrina Maria. Remember that."

How could I forget? Each time I take out Anna Maria's kettle, I recall that day in Aunt Annie's attic when the past merged with the present in the form of one old discarded cooking pot. People always say things don't matter. Well, I say — sometimes they do.

Trump has attracted some good allies

I try to avoid writing about politics and government here, because I believe the world could use a lot less of each. I try to focus on the plain fact that our lives are better when we stop looking for the right ruler and work on running our own lives. The dirty little secret is that when we cry “Freedom,” we usually are talking about freedom from government or something that government is trying to impose on us.

Since 1992, it has been my firm belief that the U.S. government has been run by the worst president of my lifetime — each occupant of the White House progressively worse than the previous one — but the last four years have been so bad, I have had to re-assess my opinion because I realized things got marginally better under Donald Trump.

I think Trump is an unpleasant man who too often turns needlessly to insulting his political adversaries, and I’m not sure he fully understands how some of his initiatives can backfire and hurt us, like tariffs. The Joe Biden-Kamala Harris administration has been a catastrophe and a threat not just to democracy but to the world with its saber-rattling and incitements to war.

Trump has recently earned the respect of three of the rarest humans in the world — people whom I deeply respect even though they travel in political circles. So I have to take note.

- Long before she was a member of Congress or presidential candidate, Tulsi Gabbard was deployed to Iraq in 2004 as a National Guard specialist with a medical company attached to the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team. “Every day we were confronted with that high human cost of war and that sadness, as we boarded the plane when we left, that we were leaving some of our brothers and sisters behind — only to lose others when we got home to suicide,” Gabbard said recently to a hushed room full of National Guard Association members as she endorsed Trump for president.

She said Trump takes seriously the commander-in-chief’s responsibility for every soul in the military — “We saw this through his first term in the presi-



dency, when he not only didn’t start any new wars, he took action to de-escalate and prevent wars.” She praised Trump for “having the courage to meet with adversaries, dictators, allies and partners alike in the pursuit of peace, seeing war as a last resort.”

That commitment to peace resonates with me. You’ve probably noticed by now that I consider the wholesale slaughter of adversaries as the most insane of all human institutions and have written a book called “War IS the Crime.” Gabbard is one of my few heroes in contemporary politics, and so I have to take note.

- Then there’s Robert Kennedy Jr., who wrote a horrifying and meticulously researched book called “The Real Anthony Fauci” that exposes much of the darkness that has happened since 2020.

When Kennedy suspended his own presidential campaign and endorsed Trump, he eloquently outlined his disenchantment with the political party of his father and uncles, which he said has become “the party of war, censorship, corruption, Big Pharma, Big Tech, Big Ag and big money.”

As a liberal Democrat, Kennedy admitted he was a “ferocious critic” of Trump on many policy issues and approaches, but “we are aligned with each other on other key issues, like ending the forever wars, ending the childhood disease epidemics, securing the border, protecting freedom of speech, unraveling the corporate capture of our regulatory agencies, getting the U.S. intelligence agencies out of the business of propagandizing and censoring and surveilling Americans and interfering with our elections.”

Did you notice what was the very first “other key issue” that Kennedy mentioned? I sure did. Kennedy is one of my few heroes in contemporary politics, and so I have to take note.

Border crisis brings wave of fentanyl to Wisconsin

To the editor:

“Over the last year, synthetic opioids, primarily fentanyl, were identified in 91% of opioid overdose deaths. Data shows the number of fentanyl overdose deaths in Wisconsin grew by 97 percent from 2019 to 2021. The impact of substance use in Wisconsin is devastating ...” (Wisconsin DHS, Sept. 15, 2023)

The Aug. 26 edition of the Menominee Nation News had an article about fentanyl. The article said: “In 2021, we lost 16 tribal members to overdoses, 17 in 2022 and 19 tribal members who died from drug overdoses in 2023. These issues are what led to the tribe declaring a state of emergency.”

The U.S. House Committee on Natural Resources, Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations, “Biden’s Border Crisis” April 10 report stated that “The mass migration crisis instigated by the Biden administration’s irresponsible immigration policies has caused incalculable harm to American communities, including those in Indian Country.

“These policies have facilitated the entry of illegal drugs. The result has been a huge spike in deaths, overdoses and poisonings.

“The cartel routinely send large groups of migrants over the border in certain areas to bog down the Border Patrol while they move drugs through the other unguarded areas ...”

The Republicans in Washington passed a bill to gain control of the border. Democrats opposed it.

Why did the president and the Democratic Party create this migrant crisis, which precipitated the fentanyl crisis? I asked a poll worker what it takes to register to vote. She said a

photo ID (driver’s license) and something showing their current address.

States like Minnesota issue driver’s licenses to undocumented migrants. The Republican House passed a bill requiring voters to show proof of citizenship. Democrats opposed it.

The census of each state is used to calculate the number of House of Representatives seats it gets and the number of Electoral College votes it gets. The Republican house passed a bill requiring that only citizens be counted in the census. Democrats opposed the bill. More migrants, more Democratic votes, more power.

Students’ mental health needs support from all

As summer winds down and Wisconsin families, educators and staff head back to school in the coming days, I am reminded of the amazing opportunities our public schools provide.

Our public schools are places where every student — regardless of their background, abilities or needs — should have equal access to education and opportunity. Classrooms in Wisconsin are often the most diverse communities in our state. It is critical we understand and work to meet the needs of all students. Our schools must be places where every child feels safe and included.

The unfortunate reality is that not every child feels like they belong.

Survey data my agency released in July gives us a snapshot of our kids’ mental health. It tells us that our kids continue to

struggle tremendously with the magnitude of their mental health challenges. Nearly six out of every 10 Wisconsin high school students told us they dealt with at least one mental health challenge within the past year. Put that into the full context for a minute — nearly 60% of Wisconsin high school students are telling us that at least some of the time, they feel anxious, depressed or suicidal.

These kids carry with them an incredible burden, and this leads to not just social and emotional disruption, but also compromises their ability to succeed academically. Imagine yourself in their

place. If you feel like you are struggling, it’s hard to feel like you belong at school or in your community. Without that stability, it’s extremely difficult to prioritize learning.

How can we expect our kids to be ready to learn when they are telling us that they need help, and do not feel like they belong?

Just one in five Wisconsin students who participated in our Youth Risk Behavior Survey last year said they received the help they needed, when they needed it. We, collectively, need to promote positive mental health and increase access to these valuable resources and services.

We need an all-hands-on-deck approach to help our kids navigate the challenges they face. They cannot — and should not — do this alone. We need further

investment into our kids. We need more trained student mental health practitioners in every school — rural, urban, suburban. It shouldn’t matter what ZIP code you’re in or what resources your family has. Every child should get the mental health care they need.

Creating and growing a positive school culture is also extremely important to a child’s sense of safety and belonging. We need to implement inclusive policies in our schools — policies that support our kids instead of isolating them.

School should be a place of freedom — a place where everyone feels like they belong, where they can learn, become critical thinkers, expand their skills and gain more confidence in themselves. A place where they have every opportunity to

achieve and are set up for success.

We, as Wisconsinites, need to do better for our kids.

That is why, as we enter the new school year, I want to get a message across to every student in Wisconsin — you matter.

To every parent, grandparent and guardian, we know that your student matters to you. They matter to their teachers, to their community and to this great state we call home. Let them know that, every day. Be a listener for your student. Ask open-ended questions about their thoughts, feelings and concerns. Let them know they can trust you to help them.

If you listen and care about the “little things,” it’s more likely they’ll come to you when the “big things” are on their minds.

To our teachers and

staff, we know that to prioritize kids’ mental health needs, we need to help you prioritize your own. We will continue to support you not just because you do important work, but because you are important, too. We cannot say that enough.

Schools have a critical role in supporting our students’ mental health and belonging. We need you as partners. Our call to action can no longer go unheard.

Every student in Wisconsin is welcome in our public schools, and it must remain that way. We owe it to our kids and to let them know that they belong. Public education is education for everyone.

Public education is good because it is a public good. It belongs to us all, and we all belong in public schools.

Ohio Sen. J.D. Vance to serve as his vice president. I was completely unfamiliar with Vance but intrigued enough by his obvious sharp intellect and calm demeanor that I borrowed his memoir, “Hillbilly Elegy,” from the library. It’s an amazing story about a man who survived a childhood of poverty and deprivation — aided by a crazy grandmother and a stint with the U.S. Marines — to reach and graduate from Yale Law School.

The book, published in 2016, is so honest and real that it’s clear he did not intend a life in politics. He went to Iraq with the Marines, and it also seem clear that he also sees war as a last resort. I found myself thinking it would be good to have this man, who knows what it’s like to rise from an unimaginably hard life, in that position of being “a heartbeat away

from the presidency.”

It’s hard not to notice when people of the stature of Gabbard, Kennedy and Vance are willing to align themselves with Trump. I still have little use for politics and government

in general, but it’s also clear that Trump has gathered a diverse group of very capable supporters.

Don’t get me wrong, if you held a gun to my head and forced me to vote for one of these people,

I would pick Gabbard, Vance and Kennedy long before I would choose Trump. On the other hand, if you told me the only choices were Harris, Biden or Walz, I’d take one last deep breath and

tell you to shoot.

Let my last word on the subject be one I’ve repeated before: Freedom is not about choosing the right ruler. Freedom is recognizing that I am the boss of me. Of the

two main choices on the ballot, it feels like peace and freedom have a better chance under Trump.

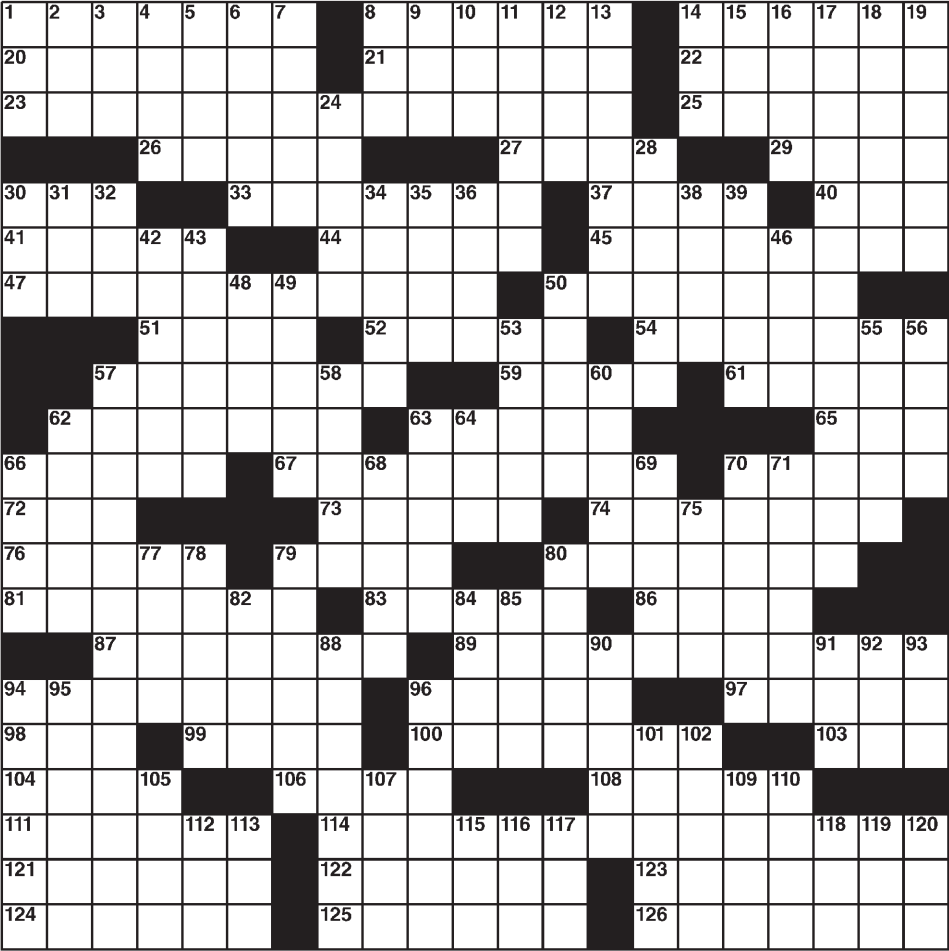

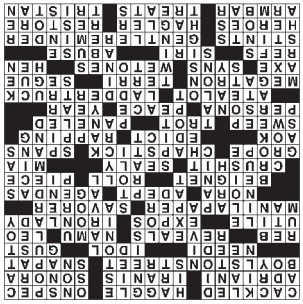

Dejon Lou Polzin

Dejon Lou (Goddake) Polzin, 92, passed away Saturday, Sept. 7, 2024, at Care Partners Assisted Living in Clintonville, where she had resided for nearly four years.

Born in Bowler on June 13, 1932, Dejon was the youngest child of the late Evan and Gladys (Cronce) Goddake. She attended Bowler schools and was very involved in school and community activities, including 4-H and Future Homemakers of America. Her claim to fame as a high school student was winning the Shawano County cherry pie baking contest and placing fourth at the district contest in Green Bay.

After graduating from Bowler Union Free High School in 1949, Dejon attended Langlade County Normal School in Antigo to pursue a teaching career. She graduated in 1951, and because she was an “overachiever,” she also graduated twice from Wisconsin State College in Stevens Point. In 1957, she earned her diploma in three-year rural education, and in 1962, she received her bachelor’s degree in intermediate – upper elementary education.

On Aug. 9, 1958, Dejon married John A. (“Jack”) Polzin at Zion Lutheran Church in Shawano. It was just the second wedding held there, and they were lifelong members of the church. After celebrating nearly 61 years of marriage, John passed away in June 2019.

Both Dejon and John were teachers in the area for many years. Dejon de-



voted 35 years to elementary education, teaching at several area schools in Caroline, Birnamwood and Cecil, along with Lincoln and Sacred Heart schools in Shawano. Eventually, she joined the staff of Gresham School and spent more than 20 years there.

She taught every elementary grade except kindergarten, but she loved her third graders and stayed with that grade the longest. Dejon really enjoyed the multiple generations of family members she got to know over the years. It was amazing that she remembered nearly all of her students long after she retired and that they remembered her, too.

Dejon’s initial attempt at retirement in 1991 was short-lived. She had planned to use her free time to train a new Bichon Frise puppy (“Count El Cid”), but she found that was much harder than teaching elementary students and handed doggie daycare over to John. Then she began a new career — volunteering with what was then known as the Shawano Medical Center Auxiliary.

She joined the auxiliary in 1994, first participating in various fundraisers and then being recruited to manage the Auxiliary Gift Shop (later known as Wolf River Boutique) at the old hospital. As manager, she often recruited and trained new volunteers, including her husband and also her grandson Ian, who helped out with everything from moving boxes to unpacking and labeling new products. Even after her retirement from the gift shop in January 2012, she continued to schedule volunteer workers there for many years.

In 2011, Dejon received the Health Care Volunteer of the Year Award sponsored by ThedaCare Physicians and Shawano Medical Center. It was part of the Celebration of Giving awards presented by Shawano Area Community Foundation Inc. From 1994 to 2010, she had volunteered well over 10,000 hours just with the auxiliary alone.

Along with her full-time volunteer position in the auxiliary, Dejon was one of the Monday morning offering “counters” for Zion Church for about 20 years. She also was active in the Shawano County Area Retired Teachers’ Association (SCARTA), volunteering as treasurer and also serving as membership chair from 1997 to 2005.

To get away from it all, Dejon enjoyed traveling with John, even when it meant long road trips with three dogs in the car and their daughter Mary driving. While there were

many historical sites that John enjoyed, it’s no surprise that Dejon’s favorite stops were at the many gift shops they found along the way. No matter how tired, she was always anxious to see what new treasures she could find and what ideas she could take back to the hospital gift shop — potential vendors, new ways to display things and new products to sell.

Dejon will be remembered by many as fun-loving with a big heart, an unusual first name (pronounced Dee-on) and a loud laugh. Always the teacher, she wasn’t shy about telling people how to go about doing things. She became an expert at word search puzzles, completing hundreds a year until her eyesight weakened. She also was an avid reader (Danielle Steel was her favorite), watched all the Hallmark movies more than once and loved birdwatching from her window. Unlike many friends who had converted to Facebook and email for keeping in touch with their networks, Dejon enjoyed sending and receiving notes and cards the old-fashioned way — through the mail. She was thrilled when so many friends and family members helped deliver 180 greetings in a surprise card shower for her 90th birthday.

An avid sports fan, Dejon often found connections to family members she had as students when watching area games. She enjoyed hearing about Ian’s golf outings, followed the Shawano and Gresham teams, cheered on the

Wisconsin Badgers — especially boys basketball — and tuned in for Green Bay Packers games.

Although Dejon missed her neighbors and gardens when she moved into assisted living, her daughter Priscilla and son-in-law Paul continued to coordinate and manage everything back home so she could maintain her connections to the community she loved. At the same time, Dejon was blessed with a new neighborhood of wonderful caregivers and friends who became her extended family.

Dejon is survived by daughter and son-in-law, Priscilla and Paul Zahn, of Shawano; daughter, Mary Polzin, of Minneapolis; grandson, Ian Zahn, of Green Bay; and grand dog, Ruby Rose, of Minneapolis. She also is survived by nieces, Sharron Schoenike and Sandy (Dan) Block; nephews, Wesley (Robert) Salzmänn and Bud (Bette) Goddake; along with sister-in-law, Kathi Polzin; brother-in-law, Jim Hoffmann; and many nieces and nephews from her late husband John’s family.

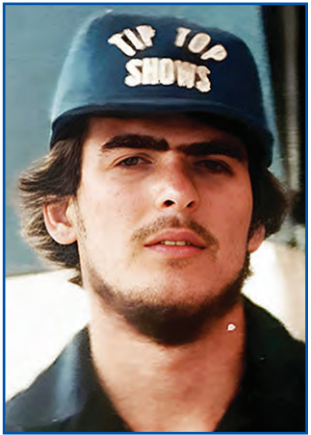

rig and became an independent owner/operator, pulling several different trailer types. Floyd drove semi until he suffered a major heart attack in 2016. Young guns: Find ideal hunting bows, crossbows, firearms for youth hunters

Brock Smejkal still remembers the sting of the 20-gauge single-shot shotgun he used to fire the slug that killed his first deer.

"I was afraid of reco
when I was a kid, too,"
Smejkal said.

He later switched to a 243 rifle after Wisconsin deer hunting laws changed to legalize centerfire rifles in all counties, and that bolt-action didn't pack quite the same wallop.

Now he's 21 and co-manager (along with Jesse Ketterhorn) of Butch's Archery and Outdoor Sports in Embarrass, helping youths and adults alike find just the right firearms, bows and crossbows to fit their bodies and needs.

On Sept. 3 and with less than two weeks to go before the Sept. 14 archery and crossbow deer opener, both staffers were helping a steady stream of customers and replacing strings, cables and other equipment on bows and crossbows.

Up at Lena Swamp Archery in Oconto Falls, owner Wade Jeske and his son, sales manager James Jeske, were doing the same thing.

Both Jeskes shared their expertise on finding the ideal hunting tools for young hunters. Many youth compound bows are also ideal for some women, who also have shorter arms (and therefore draw lengths) and less strength (so less draw weight).

Butch's also carries a wide selection of firearms and ammunition, including youth guns. Lena Swamp Archery does not carry firearms.

When it comes to a mild recoil (more commonly called “kick”), the .243, 7mm-08 and .350 Legend are top choices for youngsters, Smejkal said.

Several gun makers offer low-cost, bolt-action rifles with stock spacers that

can be removed or added as the child grows, accommodating arms of different lengths. Most youth guns are also suited to more petite women. Smejkal showed off a Winchester XPR bolt-action youth gun in the straightwall .350 Legend, a relatively new cartridge recently allowed in some states (like Iowa and Illinois) that previously only allowed shotguns.

Savage offers Axis 2 and 110 Models with removable stock spacers, and includes a scope for \$650. Many makers are offering such value-priced "package" guns with a scope for those on a tight budget.

If Dad or Grandpa wants to hand down a time-worn .270 or 30-06, there's the option of reduced-recoil ammo. Several ammunition manufacturers offer these softer loads that won't beat up the delicate shoulders of a child. Just make sure the length of pull — the distance from the trigger to the buttplate of the stock — fits the young shooter well. A stock that's too long won't allow the user to get a firm fit in the pocket of the shoulder, and that leads to painful recoil.

Children and some women who are recoil-sensitive have another option, too. With the statewide legalization of crossbows for all ages in 2014, pro shops have seen a huge increase in crossbow sales. In most cases, archery shops are selling more crossbows than compound bows. The compact crossbow is a perfect choice for anyone who doesn't like the noise and kick of a rifle, Smejkal said.

Wade Jeske said the crossbow is also perfect for young or female bowhunters who are struggling to shoot more than 35 or 40 pounds of draw weight, which could lead to more wounded deer. Most crossbows, even the compact ones, are shooting faster than 300 feet per second,

which typically will shoot all the way through a deer's chest and create a quickly fatal hole.

Young archers have never had a bigger selection of compound bows than now. Ever-advancing technology has seen compact marvels that are as short as 27 inches axle to axle (compound bows use cams and cables to create a reduced hold weight similar to a pulley). Leading the way among youth bows is Bear Archery, one of the oldest bow brands that was founded by Fred Bear in 1933.

Are young hunters ready for hunter ed class?

When is your son, daughter, grandson or granddaughter ready take a hunter safety class so they can carry a firearm, bow or crossbow on their own?

This is a simple question that often has no easy answers, but patience and empathy are the keys.

I've taught hunter education classes since the mid-1980s, first in Iowa and then in Wisconsin, with more than 20 years

in Iola and Waupaca.

I've had the privilege of working with one of the largest volunteer instructor groups in the state, led by the capable and award-winning chief instructor, Paul Piencikowski.

I sought out the expert advice of Pienckowski and our Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources outdoor skills trainer, Kayla Sasse of the Green Bay office, who coordinates the paperwork and equipment needed for our Waupaca Hunter Safety Group to

field train and test as many as 120 students at a time.

Piencikowski, now in his 15th year as a volunteer instructor, has coordinated more than 100 classes with more than 4,800 students. His group has won Hunter Education Group of the Year honors several times, and the class draws students from as far away as Illinois and Michigan because of its reputation (hunter ed classes have reciprocity in all 50 states).

When I first taught Wisconsin traditional classes in Iola, our group there was under the false impression that we couldn't fail any student, so we didn't. If a youngster had clear attention problems or otherwise did something wrong, we'd tell the parent about it but then send him or her on their way with a passing grade. This was not only a disservice to the child and family, but also a potential safety issue as this immature or inattentive charge now went afiel with a loaded firearm.

Piencikowski's group, which teaches the internet field course, typically fails about 10% of their students. There is a minimum grade on the written test, but the most likely culprit for failing is either sweeping someone with the muzzle of a gun or putting their finger on the trigger. TAB-K is drummed into students' heads throughout the day, and is a simple way to remember four fundamental gun safety rules that would prevent most mishaps if obeyed.

The internet field course is the hands-on portion of the DNR's online hunter ed course, available to anyone for free on their website. The \$10 field course teaches safe fence crossings, zones of fire, types of firearms actions, loading and unloading, tree stand safety and overall safe gun handling under the watchful eye of many instructors.

The students then test one-on-one to prove what they've learned.

Piencikowski became an instructor shortly after taking a traditional course with his daughter in 2009.

"During one of the teaching sessions, the instructor placed an overhead on the projector and said, 'You can't see this, but if you could ...' These were the exact words I heard nearly 30 years earlier when I had attended hunter education," he said. "I felt that there had to be a more effective way to instruct."

The internet course alone is enough to obtain a hunter safety certificate for those age 18 and up, but it's recommended that everyone takes a field

course. During COVID, the state briefly allowed even youngsters to take the online course alone, and Piencikowski's group rallied in Madison to argue against what they felt was an irresponsible and unsafe practice.

Although there's no minimum age limit to take a class, "Curriculum is written at a sixth grade level, and your student will need to be able to comprehend the material and read and pass a written exam," Sasse noted.

Piencikowski puts it this way: "Students under the age of 12 have huge challenges to overcome as the program is designed for the comprehension and physical capabilities of a 12-year old. However, safety is not

a factor of age but rather responsibility. Students must understand the magnitude of the responsibility it takes to handle a firearm safely under all circumstances from the moment they pick it up until they set it down."

It's not just about pulling the trigger, he added. "They need constant awareness of what is in their hands, where their hands are and where the muzzle is pointed at all times," he said. "The moment a person loses focus, they create an unsafe situation."

Mentor hunting — hunting with an adult hunter safety graduate — is an option for anyone who is both too young and immature for a class or even

for an adult who hasn't yet learned the safety basics, Sasse noted.

"You can still hunt with your young kid even if they haven't taken hunter safety," she said. "They're required to be on a mentor license until they turn 12 anyway, so there's no need to rush it. And even at 12 and 13 years old, they need to be accompanied within sight and voice distance, so they can't go out truly on their own until they're 14."

This explains the mentor hunting program in detail: <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/Education/OutdoorSkills/mentor>.

Parents or other adults can start their youngsters well before an official class to learn TAB-K and carry a BB or toy gun.

"It's never too early to start working on firearm safety at home. Have them start memorizing TAB-K and make them recite it every time you do any shooting," Sasse said. "Practice not only target shooting with a BB gun (or toy gun), but also walking around 'hunting' with it, reinforcing how to keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction at all times."

Parents sometimes force their kids to take a class before they are ready, and this contributes to the failure rate, Piencikowski noted.

"This results in myself personally guiding students and parents through the unsuccessful experi-

ence," he said. "At best, it is emotionally devastating for the student. At worst, the student is turned off to anything relating to firearms. We do not experience joy in failing any student, but if we have to make a choice between keeping people happy and keeping people safe, we will default to safety every time. Parents, if your child fails, please do not take it as a personal attack on you. Rather, recognize that instructors want to keep you and the public safe."

The failed test can become a positive "teachable moment" that a parent can use to work on until the next class.

If your child is constantly misplacing things or has difficulty staying focused on tasks for long periods, they may not be ready for a class, or the more important responsibility of carrying a loaded firearm, he advised.

Avoid tree stand tragedies with safety tips

Tree stand accidents are a leading cause of hunting-related injuries, with 300-500 fatalities annually in the U.S., according to the International Hunter Education Association. As archery and cross-bow deer hunting season begins this fall, prioritizing safety is essential.

“You’re much more likely to get injured from a fall than a gunshot wound,” said Dr. Michael Clark, EMS medical director with Aspirus MedEvac. “It’s a concern that we should definitely take precautions to avoid.”

Falls from tree stands can lead to severe injuries, including fractures and potentially life-threatening conditions.

“Many of these injuries are orthopedic, including wrist, ankle and femur fractures,” Clark said, while also emphasizing the risk of head, neck, chest and abdominal injuries. “The higher up you go, the more likely you are to sustain a significant injury.”

Falls from heights of more than 10 feet, which is common with most tree stands, tend to result in more severe injuries.

To ensure a safe hunting experience, Clark and Joseph Mulrooney, a recreation warden with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR),

provide the following tree stand safety practices:

- Stay connected. “Every year, we have dozens of people falling out of trees, which is why we highly recommend staying connected to the tree with a tree strap,” said Mulrooney. A tree strap will provide stability while climbing to prevent falls.
- Wear safety harness-

es. Wearing a safety harness is critical when using a tree stand. “Not wearing a safety harness is one of the most common reasons we see people falling out of tree stands,” Mulrooney said.

- Inspect gear. Inspect your tree stands and related equipment before the season for any wear or damage. “I highly recom-

mend people go out in August or September to make sure your straps are in good shape,” said Mulrooney, noting that straps can develop tears or bites from rodents in the off-season. “Straps are cheap. A broken leg isn’t.”

- Use haul lines. Avoid carrying gear while climbing. Instead, use haul lines to lift equipment safely.

• Know your location. Using a GPS app can provide precise coordinates if needed in an emergency.

They also offer these emergency preparedness tips:

- Develop a safety plan. “Make sure your family knows where you are and when you plan to be back so if something were to happen and you don’t re-

turn, they know where to look for you,” said Clark, stressing the importance of having a clear safety plan before heading out to hunt.

- Prepare for communication. Keep your cell phone fully charged and be familiar with key landmarks. “Many times a text message can go through when a regular phone call can’t,” Clark said. Text someone and have them make the 911 call for you.

- Bring a first aid kit. Equip yourself with a comprehensive first aid kit, including essentials like a tourniquet and wound-packing materials.

- Assess your situation. If you find yourself injured and alone, Clark advises performing “a quick head-to-toe assessment of yourself.” Understanding the severity of your injuries can help you communicate your condition effectively to rescuers.

- Stay in place. In the event of an injury, remaining in place may be your safest option. Conserve energy and avoid worsening your condition while waiting for help to arrive.

By following these safety guidelines and expert recommendations, hunters can significantly reduce the risk of injury and ensure a safe hunting season.

“Fred Bear (Archery) is in a league by themselves,” Jeske said, referring to their extensive youth bow offerings.

One way to determine an archer's draw length is to measure the "wing-span" from outstretched fingertip to fingertip, then cut that distance in half. Jeske noted that for every two inches of vertical growth, a child typically gains one inch of draw length. A pro shop will use a calibrated arrow for an exact measurement.

Both Jeske and Smejkal recommend the Bear Royale for younger kids (ages 5-7 or so) and the Bear Legit for kids a bit older. Both bows are extremely adjustable (the Royale has draw lengths from 12-27 inches and five to 50 pounds of draw weight, while the Legit boasts 14-30 inches of draw and 10-70 pounds of draw weight). Both could easily be used by adults for deer hunting.

Both models represent great value because their low price (the 27-inch Royale is about \$300 and the 30-inch Legit is about \$400) includes an arrow rest, sight, stabilizer and quiver, which all are often extra on adult bows.

The elder Jeske also noted that these youth bows hold their value, because they fit so many shooters and are top-sellers with his female

customers, too.

Other good choices for youngsters include the Diamond Pro 305 (a pro shop only model), Elite Ember, Mathews Image and Prima, and Bow Tech, Smejkal said. The latter brand is among the easiest to adjust, too, he noted.

Youth models typically have cams (wheels) designed for smooth shooting, with slightly less speed than more expen-

sive adult models, Smejkal added. But set to higher weights, they can still shoot an arrow around 300 feet per second or more.

Both shops have indoor ranges for fine-tuning a bow. The elder Jeske said he's catered to youth archers since his shop opened in 1998, with free shooting for kids up to age 18 indoors and a nearby outdoor range with two el-

evated platforms. His shop has more than 400 kids enjoying April and May leagues, and he supports archery programs for Boy Scouts, middle and high school kids in Oconto Falls, the Shawano County 4-H Shooting Sports program and special needs youths.

"You've got to keep them shooting," he said.

Some fall hunting seasons already open with more to follow

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds hunters to prepare for the opening of several hunting seasons in September. Hunters can once again head to Wisconsin's wild spaces as these seasons open across the state.

There are six dates throughout September when seasons open. Hunters are encouraged to double-check season dates and that they have acquired all necessary licenses and stamps before going out for a hunt.

Already open as of Sept. 1 are seasons for the common gallinule, early Canada goose, early teal, mourning dove, rail and snipe.

Bear season opened
Sept. 4.

Coming up and set to open Sept. 14 are seasons for cottontail rabbit (Northern Zone), deer (archery and crossbow), ruffed grouse (Zone A), squirrels, turkey and you waterfowl.

Regular goose season
opens Sept. 16.

Seasons for duck in the Northern Zone and woodcock open Sept. 21, while duck season in the Southern Zone will open

Sept. 28.

The DNR also reminds hunters of mobile-friendly online resources — including hunting regulations, season dates, hunting hours and more — available on the DNR's hunting webpage.

Hunters can find information on species population levels and hunting opportunities on the DNR's fall hunting forecasts.

A list of public lands open to hunting is available using the public access lands webpage. This web resource lets hunters plan their next adventure from the comfort of their home.

The fields and forest lands interactive game bird hunting tool provides hunters information on managed dove fields, as well as habitat for hunting ruffed grouse and woodcock.

Anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1973, must have a hunter education certification to purchase a hunting license unless hunting under the Mentored Hunting Law.
