Conservation poster contest winners honored

Annual event draws 176 local entries

The 2025 Shawano County Land Conservation Poster Contest drew 176 entries from eight schools, with the 15 winners recognized at the March 26 meeting of the Shawano County Board.

“Home is Where the Habitat Is” was the theme.

Several winners also saw their posters advance to the Lake Michigan Area contest, and one earned statewide recognition.

“We appreciate the opportunity to

recognize our area K-12 students for their creativity, artistic talent and dedication for our seventh annual Shawano County conservation poster contest,” Scott Frank, Shawano County conservationist told supervisors.

The 176 entries is the second most for the county, and the eight participating schools are the most ever.

The contest is part of a national contest, broken down to state contests, and in Wisconsin divided into eight areas. Shawano County is part of the Lake Michigan Area.

Olivia East, a student at Sacred Heart Catholic School in Shawano, won first place in Division 1 (grades K-1) at the county level and first place at the Lake Michigan Area level.

“She also got a third place at the state

competition, which is our first state place winner for Shawano County in seven years,” Frank said.

Local winners in Division 1 (grades K-1) were Olivia East, Sacred Heart Catholic School, first in the county and first in the Lake Michigan Area; Kamryn Consiglio, Sacred Heart, second in the county; and Elli Farley, Sacred Heart, third in the county. Winners in Division 2 (grades 2-3) were Kayla Consiglio, Sacred Heart, first in the county and first in the Lake Michigan Area; Sylvia Deleon Anhalt, Sacred Heart, second in the county; and Evelyn Peeters of Bonduel Elementary School, third place in the county.

Division 3 (grades 4-6) winners were Colton Farley, Sacred Heart, first in the county and third in the Lake Michigan

Area; Raelyn Krueger, St. James Lutheran School, second in the county; and Holly Gee, Sacred Heart, third in the county.

In Division 4 (grades 7-9), winners were Cristel Gutierrez, Tigerton School, first in the county and second in the Lake Michigan Area; Coraline Kropp, St. James, second in the county, and Ivy DuQuaine, St. James, third in the county.

Winners in Division 5 (grades 10-12) were Paige Treptow, Bowler School, first in the county and first in the Lake Michigan Area; Pamela Martinez-Avila, Bowler, second in the county; and Joshua Lange, Wolf River Lutheran High School, third in the county.

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Mielke Arts Center privatization proposal questioned

Not all family members reportedly on board with plan

Not everyone is on board with a proposal to privatize Mielke Arts Center and Mielke Park.

Shawano County Board Chairman Tom Kautza reported at the March 26 board meeting that at least two Mielke family members have come forward in opposition to the plan.

NEW Media first reported about the proposal after it was discussed at the March 13 public property committee meeting.

“That flushed out a few members of the Mielke family,” Kautza said of the newspaper story. “One side says that the Mielke family was supportive of it and all for it, and now two members of the Mielke family said they don’t support it.”

Jim Davel, administrative coordinator, was scheduled to hold a conference call with family members to determine who was in favor and who was not.

“We’ll see if they really do have support for it or if they don’t have support for it,” Kautza said.

Kelli Penfold, from Sakom Netanak

LLC, and Lori Mathwich, from Fire Fitness Camp Shawano, established Mission 1st Event Management LLC with plans to reform the Mielke Arts Center into a private venue for local groups and individuals.

The 31.5-acre park hosts a 250-seat theater, picnic area, playground, outdoor amphitheater, shelter with restrooms, and parking area.

Mission 1st Event Management is proposing a two-year lease of the site, during which it would assume all responsibilities and upkeep costs of the theater and park.

All profits during those two years would be reinvested back into the property and used for maintenance and improvements.

Upon successful completion of these

two years, Mission 1st Event Management would obtain complete control over the property.

“I was told from the beginning the Mielke family was all behind this,” Kautza said. “If they (Penfold and Mathwich) don’t have support for it, we’ll probably just let it die then, but if they do support it, and they do want to make a change, we’ll most likely pursue the matter again.”

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Bahr back in Shawano County court system

Cecil man facing 100 charges from seven cases in 2020 to 2022

A career criminal from Cecil with a number of convictions from Shawano, Oconto and Brown counties has finally returned to Shawano County's court system after almost a year navigating through some Brown County court cases.

Tracy Bahr, 41, appeared March 25 via Zoom before Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. for a status conference, where he is facing 100 charges from seven separate court cases from 2020 through 2022.

In the latest case, Bahr is facing one count of failure to comply with an officer's attempt to take

a person into custody, nine counts of possessing a firearm by a convicted felon, one count of possession of methamphetamine, one count of possession of THC greater than 1,000 grams with intent, 22 felony counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer, three misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and seven misdemeanor counts of bail jumping.

Defense attorney Christopher Froelich told Kussel that Bahr is "anxious to resolve these cases" and said he wanted to schedule a trial for the most recent case. Bahr's trial was scheduled for June 26.

Before that, however, he'll have a preliminary hearing at 1 p.m. April 3 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse.

A final pre-trial is currently scheduled for 11:15 a.m. June 10 in the same location.

According to the criminal complaint, on Aug. 4, 2022, at 7:35 a.m., a Shawano County sheriff's deputy responded to a complaint in the Town of Angelica, where Bahr was allegedly contacted by another deputy, as he was allegedly washing a piece of equipment in the driveway. Eight minutes later, Bahr allegedly fled from the residence on a three-wheeled ATV. While searching, another deputy allegedly found one firearm in a vehicle at the residence.

When law enforcement asked residents if they have seen Bahr, one neighbor allegedly said that they saw Bahr leaving a field edge on County Road S with a shotgun across his lap, according to the complaint.

Before noon that day, Bahr's mother was leaving to the residence where

Bahr was spotted. She allegedly told law enforcement, according to the complaint, that Bahr told her he planned to commit suicide, or was going to "shoot it out with the cops." She then allegedly gave law enforcement two spots where Bahr could be.

On Aug. 7, Bahr was located and brought into custody at Motel 6 in Green Bay. When searching Bahr's residence, deputies found seven firearms, one box of meth smoking drug paraphernalia with two digital scales, THC drug paraphernalia, 667.8 grams of THC, four Mason jars with green, leafy substances, a plastic gallon sized bag with a green, leafy substance, aluminum foil with several cut straws and six shotgun shells that were on a sling.

Bahr faces up to 3 1/2 years in prison and \$10,000 in fines for failure to comply with an officer's attempt to take a person into custody, 10 years and

\$25,000 in fines for each count of possessing a firearm by a convicted felon, 3 1/2 years and \$10,000 in fines for possession of methamphetamine, six years and \$10,000 in fines for possession of THC with intent, and six years and \$10,000 in fines for each bail jumping count.

Bahr could also face nine months in jail and \$10,000 in fines for one count of resisting or obstructing an officer, 30 days and \$500 in fines for each misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia, and nine months and \$10,000 in fines for each misdemeanor or bail jumping count.

According to Wisconsin Circuit Court Access, Bahr has six other open cases in Shawano County, with the first coming from October 2020. The first case is a misdemeanor disorderly conduct with a domestic abuse repeater.

Things accelerated from there when, in December 2021, Bahr was

charged with intimidating a victim with the threat of force with a domestic abuse repeater, along with another disorderly conduct charge and two bail jumping charges. A second case in that year involves another charge of intimidation, as well as battery and disorderly conduct charges and four more bail jumping charges. Another disorderly conduct charge and two more bail jumping charges are included in a third case.

In January 2022, Bahr was charged with nine counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, three counts of resisting an officer, three counts of hit and run, and 12 counts of bail jumping. In February 2022, Bahr was charged with theft of movable property, criminal damage to property, six counts of felony bail jumping and five counts of misdemeanor bail jumping.

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USDA ends program that helps schools get food

One school district about to partner with local producer

The Local Food Purchase Assistance program that helps entities to get fresh, healthy food from local farms has been discontinued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, producing a mixed bag among area schools.

The program has bought local food primarily from socially disadvantaged farmers and distributing it to underserved communities via schools, food pantries, tribes and more. The announcement came in mid-March that the USDA is stopping this practice as federal programs in general are being

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shut down by President Donald Trump.

The Bowler School District had begun to explore the potential of participating in the program, according to Superintendent Glenda Butterfield-Boldig, and officials had even

found a producer to partner with. The cancellation of the program has put the district in limbo.

"We were in the process of engaging with local farmers for meat and fresh fruits and vegetables, but now will need to recon-

sider if we have the funds within our food service budget to support local producers," Butterfield-Boldig said.

The district's food service director, Karen Rades, has always tried to practice scratch cooking when preparing school meals as opposed to using pre-packaged food, according to Butterfield-Boldig. The director prefers using whole foods whenever possible to avoid exposure to preservatives and unhealthy ingredients.

"Elimination of this funding will have a negative impact on our ability to help students develop healthy eating habits and their ability to experience foods that may not otherwise be available in their homes," Butterfield-Boldig said.

Another problem is that the farm to school program

would have helped the district come into compliance with the USDA's Buy American Provisions.

"Among other things, these provisions require school food authorities to limit the percent of total commercial food costs from non-domestic foods over the next seven years," Butterfield-Boldig said. "This percentage is less than 10% beginning July 1, 2025, and gradually reduces to a cap of 5% by July 1, 2031. The ability to buy locally, reducing transportation and processing costs could help us reach these goals, but the elimination of funding to initiate and solidify these partnerships puts that at risk."

Tigerton School District is not currently part of the USDA program this year, but it did receive a grant two years ago, according to Superintendent Doug-

las Nowak. He said the \$14,000 received went into purchasing fresh fruits and vegetables and made it easier to access seasonal goods during the short growing season, getting more food than what the district could acquire with its own funds.

"Through this, we built a relationship with a local farmer, Terry Mares, and an apple orchard, Wilson Creek," Nowak said. "Now, we purchase directly, but the funds were not offered again this year."

Gillett School District also is not receiving funds from the food program, but when it received money in the 2023-24 school year, the first year Gillett received the money, \$3,000 worth of free produce was able to be funneled to the schools for their meals.

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Disabled American Veterans volunteer drivers needed

The Shawano area Disabled American Veterans (DAV) is accepting applications for volunteer drivers to transport Shawano area veteran patients to and from their medical appointments at the VA clinics in northeast Wisconsin.

The DAV recently had two outstanding volunteers retire from their driving roles and are short staffed.

The DAV, in partnership with the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs (VA), offers daily complimentary trips for veterans with appointments at the John

H. Bradley VA Outpatient Clinic in Appleton, the Milo C. Huempfer VA Health Care Center in Green Bay and the Clement J. Zablocki VA Medical Center in Milwaukee.

The DAV program is operated entirely by volunteer personnel, and drivers

volunteer on their time, and even one trip a month would be helpful for the 70-plus veterans transported on a regular basis.

The DAV will supply all vehicles, fuel cards, supplies and training for the drivers.

Volunteers do not need

to be veterans but must have a clean driving record. Volunteer drivers can usually expect to work four to eight hours on days they commit to drive, depending on the number of patients and the destination of the appointment. The DAV operates exclusively to

VA facilities in Appleton, Green Bay, and Milwaukee only.

Antlers Supper Club sold to former employees

It turned out to be an opportunity that Harlow Arndt and his wife couldn't pass up.

Arndt and his wife, Tia, recently purchased Antlers Supper Club in Bonduel from Lance and Vicki Olson, who ran the popular business at 120 E. Green Bay St. for 17 years.

The Olsons will operate the supper club until the close of business March 30. They'll serve their usual Sunday breakfast before closing the doors one last time as owners.

"We will be open for breakfast as normal," Lance Olson said. "I am looking forward to it, but I am also very emotional about the people that I probably won't see."

"At 2 o'clock, we'll shut the doors and ride away in the sunset," Vicki Olson said.

Two days later — April 1 — the Arndts took over as business that has been in Vicki Olson's family for almost 25 years.

"We bought the place from her parents on April Fool's Day of 2008," Lance Olson said. "It'll be 17 complete years."

Vicki Olson's parents ran the business for seven years before turning it over to their daughter and son-in-law. Her parents helped the previous owners find a buyer.

"He was in real estate, and the buyer needed help financing," Lance Olson said. "They basically were financing it for this couple who were attempting to buy it. After about four years, it just wasn't working for them and they decided to walk away and go back to Florida where they were living. That's how her parents ended up with it."

"I worked here the whole seven years and we actually met here," Vicki Olson said. "We met because of the bear."

The dining area includes a full mount of a black bear that Lance Olson shot in Manitoba, Canada, in 1999.

That bear is part of the supper club's outdoor-related theme. One of the walls

of the dining room features several white-tailed deer shoulder mounts.

"A good chunk of the mounted heads are from her parents," Lance Olson said. "They had a deer farm. All of the sheds (in the bar area) are from the deer farm. Over the years, we contributed some of our own, and our son had a couple of the mounts."

Each supper club is different and has its own theme, according to Lance Olson.

"Ours is more of a hunting and outdoors theme," he said. "It's more of an experience, it's not just the dining. You're coming out, taking your time and enjoying social time with friends, a cocktail or a soda. When you order, it's a multi-course meal. At other restaurants, it's like here

it is. Here, you have your salad, a freshly baked loaf of bread and a garnish tray followed by a cup of soup and your full entree. We always come out with a dessert of cookies and stuff. It's more of a destination than just come through and eat."

The supper club's patrons include local residents and others who travel a long distance.

"Every day, I get to work with my best friend, and our children also worked here ever since they were 10-year-olds," Vicki Olson said. "Not many moms get to work with their kids and their husband every day."

Alexandra and Remington are now 27 and 23, respectively.

"Our customers have seen our children grow up, and a lot of people have given me hugs these last

couple of weeks and said, 'Gosh, we watched your kids grow up here,'" Vicki Olson said. "Remington is now a welder, and our daughter works for Homeland Security. They both have their own careers, and this was not something that they had a passion for. We wanted them to pursue whatever their calling was."

Supper clubs offer their customers a unique dining experience, something the Olson family was happy to provide over the years.

"It gives you a chance to slow down and enjoy the food, company and atmosphere," Vicki Olson said. "We do a little of everything. Friday fish fries are very popular, prime rib and tenderloin tips on Saturday, chicken specials on Sunday and made-to-order omelettes on Sunday morning."

"We had a person contact us and ask us to open a little bit early and have the dining room set up so he could propose to his fiancée because they had their first date here," Lance Olson said. "Just to be such a part of these peoples' lives and their anniversaries and birthdays. Year after year, people come back for their birthday, and this is their request to come here. Just to know that they value us so highly, it is very rewarding."

"It's the personal service," Vicki Olson said. "(Lance) will remember peoples' drinks when they walk in. It's very personable."

The Arndts are very familiar with the supper club.

"Vicki and Lance hired me for my first real job," Harlow Arndt said. "I was 16. I started as a dishwasher and learned to bus tables and all that stuff. I moved up to cook and helped wait tables. I worked here about eight years total."

He gave up a job with the Green Bay Post Office to purchase the business.

"I've been looking at owning a place probably since I was 20," he said. "About five or six years ago, I stopped in here to see if they were interested in selling. They weren't ready yet, which is fine. When it became available, I thought it was perfect, because my wife and I met here. We got married while we were working here. It's near and

dear to my heart in a lot of ways."

Arndt is looking forward to the career change.

"I'm more excited than nervous," he said. "They built up a really good business. All I need to do is step in and follow their model. The wait staff that they train is way up here, far and above better than anywhere else. (The staff) is staying on for the most part. There are a couple of people that are leaving after April, but they wanted to get me going, which again, says a lot about the character they hire."

Tia Arndt will help out at the supper club, but she also farms with her parents.

"It's a lot of work and a lot of long hours, but people do like supper clubs," Arndt said. "They like having a drink or two before supper. There are people that have literally sat here for four hours talking to patrons."

He started in the middle of February, so he'll have about one and a half months of training.

"There are going to be some hiccups," he said. "I know that. Lance has shown me a lot of preventative maintenance stuff."

He said he and his wife didn't want to purchase a business that needed a lot of improvements.

"That was a big thing with us," Arndt said. "We didn't want to come in and do too much building work right away. Lance is very particular, so he maintained it very well. It's the perfect place, but then I had the post office, which is a career job. I really had to look at what I wanted. It just came down to what makes me happy."

The Arndts don't plan to make any major changes at first.

"I've always wanted my own place," Arndt said. "I probably looked at 12-14 restaurants that were up for sale around the area. It just didn't seem like the right fit. I looked at a couple of diners, but that wasn't something that I really wanted to do."

Vicki said she and her husband aren't retiring.

"We have a lot of irons in the fire," she said. "We have some property that we would like to develop. We want to take a little break, stop and smell the roses, and maybe do a little traveling. We live not too far from Bonduel, so it's not like we're going too far. It's just time to pass the torch to someone else."

Asbestos abatement, demolition on the horizon

Shawano County supervisors adopted a resolution March 26 to approve additional uses of residential rental property funds.

The original 2013 resolution approved the carry-over of the funds for future property acquisition, and ongoing maintenance and repairs at rental properties owned by Shawano County and maintained by

the building maintenance department.

The new resolution clarifies the use of the funds, which can now be used for decommissioning, demolition and lawn landscape of the residences.

The county will pay nearly \$12,900 to remove asbestos at 205 and 221 W. Fourth St., Shawano. The two homes are west of the courthouse and are part of the block of homes that could one day be used for

a courthouse expansion project.

Demolition could soon follow.

An estimate to have the highway department raze the two homes is \$51,000.

As of Dec. 31, 2024,

the account has a balance of \$220,161.31, about \$1,000 less than what was reported at the Jan. 9 meeting of the public property committee.

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Conservation Congress hearing panfish limit proposals

Springtime in Wisconsin means the first sightings of robins and sandhill cranes, emerging spring flowers — and statewide DNR/Conservation Congress public hearings.

On April 14, the Department of Natural Resources and the grassroots Wisconsin Conservation Congress hearings in every county give sportsmen and other wildlife lovers the chance to weigh in on hunting, fishing and other conservation management questions.

All meetings start at 6 p.m. In Shawano County, the meeting is at Shawano Community Middle School, 1050 S. Union St., Shawano. In Oconto County, it's at Suring High School, 411 E. Algoma St., Suring.

Residents can also vote and comment online from 7 p.m. April 14 through 6 p.m. April 16.

Although the public votes do not directly translate to rule changes, the DNR and the Natural Resources Board look closely at the opinions to make future management decisions.

This year, some of the most far-reaching questions include reduced limits on panfishing at Shawano Lake and connected waterways, an extended lake sturgeon hook-and-line season and extending



fall turkey season to the northern Zones 6 and 7.

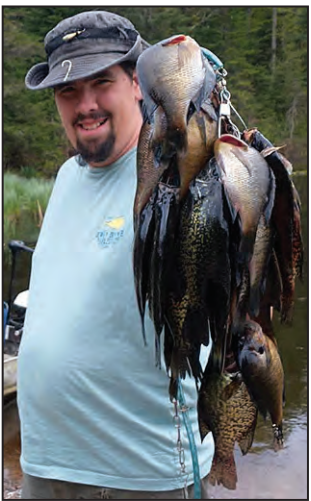
DNR netting and electrofishing surveys have shown a long-term trend of smaller black crappies and other panfish in Shawano Lake.

Under the DNR proposal, the total daily panfish catch limit would be reduced from the current 25 to 10 fish. This would include a combined catch of black crappies, pumpkinseeds, bluegills and yellow perch.

The restriction would cover a total of 22 lakes statewide, including Shawano Lake and connected waters, as well as Crooked, Bass and Gilkey lakes in Oconto County.

The 2023 survey results showed moderate to fast growth of crappies in Wolf River Pond, with fish of 8-8.9 inches aged 3-5 years (representing the 80th percentile when compared with growth of other crappies statewide) and fish of 10-10.9 inches aged 5-8 (representing the 41st to 51st percentile of growth).

For comparison, crappies captured in Shawano

Lake, Washington Lake and the Shawano Outlet never exceeded 8.9 inches and were mostly 4 or 5 years old, representing moderate growth. Loon Lake crappies also remained under 9 inches but were 5-13 years old, representing slow growth.

One goal with the reduced daily limit is to allow some panfish to achieve a larger size. Biologists noted a few larger fish can produce as much meat as many smaller fish.

The DNR began a

25-panfish limit (with a 10-fish limit per species) or two other experimental limits (15 aggregate limit including five of each species, or the same limit during May and June with 25 aggregate the rest of the year) on 94 lakes statewide in 2016 as an experiment. Results showed a general increase in size. These regulations will expire on March 31, 2026.

Other fish and game regulations changes on the hearing ballot include:

- A catch-and-release season for lake sturgeon from the first Saturday in June through the first Sunday in March on selected waters. Current law only allows hook-and-line lake sturgeon fishing from the first Saturday in September through Sept. 30.

- One inland trout fishing limit statewide on a county basis of five fish and no size limit. Currently, there are two regulations: either a five-fish bag and no size minimum or a three-fish bag and 8-inch

minimum. Surveys show most trout anglers release smaller fish regardless of regulation.

- Allow disabled hunters to hunt deer during the two-day October youth hunt. Because the nine-day disabled hunt (first Saturday in October for nine consecutive days) overlaps with the youth hunt, the new regulation would allow disabled hunters to hunt their own land during the youth hunt.

They must continue to hunt in designated areas during the rest of the disabled season as is current law.

- Allow non-edible parts of a deer, bear or elk to be left in the field after harvest.

- Allow trappers to check traps using technology such as cellular trail cameras.

- Allow fall turkey hunting in northern zones 6 and 7.

- Require bear baits on public land to be labeled with the name and address

or license number of the person placing the baits.

- Elimination of lead ammunition and fishing tackle.

- Allow county deer advisory councils to extend the archery deer season until Jan. 31 without approving a holiday hunt.

The state's Conservation Congress will hold statewide delegate elections at the meeting. Two of each county's five delegates are up for election to two-year terms.

How do I want her to be? Do I want her to be sassy? Do I want her to be cool? Do I want her to be funny?"

Stuewer said she likes the fact that there isn't just one lead role in the play.

"We have a trio that kind of mimics the trio in the Potter world. We also have a narrator," she said. "Harry is in the show; he's not quite as prominent as he is in the book series, but he's still there. You'll recognize a lot of characters from the wizarding world."

She said the show is best for anyone 12 and older due to mild language and innuendos.

Evie Kuehl, a freshman, plays the role of Harry Potter. She, too, auditioned for her specific role.

"I watched the play 'Puffs,' and he's kind of more of the obnoxious char-

acter, and I'm kind of better at being an obnoxious little kid," she said.

Being obnoxious is also the easiest part of her participation in the play.

Kuehl has been in musicals before, but this is her first play performance.

Stuewer, Walby and Kuehl each identify with a different Hogwarts House.

Gryffindor, Hufflepuff, Ravenclaw and Slytherin each represent distinct personality traits and values: Gryffindor (courage, chivalry), Hufflepuff (hard work, loyalty), Ravenclaw (intelligence, wit) and Slytherin (ambition, cunning).

Stuewer identifies with Hufflepuff.

"They're very loyal, they're a little bit goofy. A lot of people think of them more as the oddballs, maybe

not fully fitting in," she said. "Not to speak for all theater kids, but I think that a lot of theater kids have maybe felt that. One of the underlying tones of the show is the importance of having a sense of belonging, and I think that theater provides that for a lot of kids."

Walby describes herself as a Ravenclaw.

"Every time I've taken the Harry Potter test, I've gotten Ravenclaw," she said. "I've always been on honor roll. I'm very smart in school — book smart, street smart."

As for Kuehl, she's a Gryffindor.

"I'm very outgoing, and the character's that way, too," she said. "They're very out there, not afraid of just sticking out of the crowd."

Quick breads rise as snow continues to fall

As spring progresses, and snow continues to fall, I find myself gravitating toward quick breads. Quick breads require no yeast, and, as their name indicates, are quick and easy to make.

Pumpkin bread is one of my favorites to make because it uses some of my favorite spices — bringing to mind the cozy days of Thanksgiving and pumpkin pie. I’m going to spill a little secret of mine. Although I use the name pumpkin bread, I rarely actually use pumpkin.

Since my family plants a fair amount of butternut squash in the garden every year, I use butternut squash instead. Butternut squash is a perfect substitute for pumpkin, and honestly, I think it tastes better. However, “squash bread” simply doesn’t have the same appeal as “pumpkin bread.” Thus, I continue to call it pumpkin bread.

I have tried many pumpkin bread recipes over the years, but I think I’m going to stick with this one for now. What attracted me to this recipe was that it allowed you to use fresh or canned pumpkin. As I often make pumpkin bread after my mom cooks up some butternut squash, the squash is fresh.

Many pumpkin bread recipes, however, call for canned pumpkin. This always made me uneasy, as I wasn’t sure if using



fresh squash would make a difference. Also, pumpkin bread recipes sometimes call for a 15-ounce can of pumpkin. Does that mean almost 2 cups of fresh pumpkin or not? It is so confusing.

Of course, I deviated from the original recipe, as I often do. The original recipe called for 3 cups of sugar, which I reduced. The recipe also called for ½ cup of walnuts. I am not the biggest fan of nuts in baked goods, so I omitted them. However, if you like nuts, fold ½ cup of nuts into the batter as a last step before putting the batter in the pans.

Also, the original recipe called for a teaspoon each of cinnamon and nutmeg. I like cinnamon, ginger and cloves. So, I simply doubled the amount of cinnamon, omitted nutmeg, and added a little ginger and cloves. Feel free to add any kind or amount of spice as you like. Also, use whatever loaf pans you wish, just keep in mind that the baking times may vary.

The first time I made this bread, I knew it was a keeper. It is moist, slightly sweet, and with a hint of spice; while the squash flavor still peeks through.

It is delicious plain or spread with butter.

Granola bars are great as a quick breakfast or snack. What is nice about making them homemade, is that you know exactly what is going into them. I like honey-oatmeal granola bars as they are very simple and easy to make, with only a few ingredients. Also, they allow you to use either quick-cooking or old-fashioned oats. Some recipes are very strict on what kind of oats

to use; and, there is usually only quick-cooking oats in the pantry.

Also, there are some recipes that call for nuts, chocolate, seeds, and/ dried fruits. However, sometimes simple is best, at least for the beginning. Once you get the basics down, the sky’s the limit.

PUMPKIN BREAD

3 1/4 cups flour

2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. ginger

2 cups pureed fresh (or canned) cooked pumpkin or butternut squash

2/3 cup water

1 cup white sugar

1 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. cloves

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 cup oil

4 eggs, mixed slightly

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Line the bottom of three 7-by-3-inch loaf pans with parchment paper, grease and flour the sides. Whisk the flour, sugars, baking soda, salt and spices together until well blended. Push the flour mixture to the sides of the bowl, leaving a well in the center. Add the pumpkin, eggs, oil and water. Mix well with a wooden spoon. Divide between prepared pans. Bake for 40-60 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center of each loaf comes out clean. Allow the bread to rest in the pans for 5-10 minutes. Remove from pans and cool completely on a wire rack.

HONEY-OATMEAL GRANOLA BARS

1/4 tsp. baking soda

1/4 cup honey

2 1/2 cups quick-cooking or old-fashioned oats

A little less than 1/4 tsp. salt

1/4 cup sugar

1/4 cup coconut oil

1 tsp. vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line an 8-inch square pan with parchment paper, leaving a few inches of overhang on 2 sides. Place 2 cups of the oats in a bowl. Add the remaining oats to a blender or food processor; pulse into a rough flour. Add the oat flour to the bowl of oats. Add the baking soda and salt; stir. Melt the coconut oil on the stovetop or the microwave. Stir in the honey, sugar, and vanilla. Add oil mixture to the oats, stir well until oats are completely coated. Press firmly and evenly into prepared pan. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until golden. Cool on rack for 10 minutes. Remove bars from pan and cut while warm. Cool completely — the bars will crisp up as they cool.

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Is stem cell therapy legitimate or scam?

Scientists discovered ways to extract stem cells from early mouse tissues nearly 40 years ago. The initial study of mouse stem cells led to the discovery of a method to derive stem cells from human tissues and grow the cells in the laboratory. The exciting theory that research scientists are working on is that stem cells can be guided into becoming specific cells that can be used to regenerate and repair diseased or damaged tissues in humans.

Currently, researchers are investigating the use of adult, fetal and embryonic stem cells as sources for specialized cell types, such as nerve cells, muscle cells, blood cells and skin cells that can be used to treat various diseases.

In theory, any condition in which there is tissue degeneration can be a potential candidate for stem cell therapies. Examples include spinal cord injury, blindness, stroke, burns, heart disease, type 1 diabetes, osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, muscular dystrophy and liver diseases.

However, to date, we do not have good scien-



tific evidence that this can occur in humans.

Although stem cells offer a compelling promise for future therapies, they currently face significant technical hurdles that can only be overcome through years of intensive medical research.

Unfortunately, because the promise for benefit is so large and for so many serious conditions, numerous desperate patients are seeking help at almost any cost. As a result, the number of commercial cell clinics is expanding rapidly.

According to Leigh Turner, associate professor at the University of Minnesota, there are over 1,000 commercial stem cell clinics in America.

Unproven cellular therapies are big business — generating about \$5 billion annually.

Commercial cell clinics often make claims of benefit and safety that are not supported by scien-

tific medical research. Technically, these clinics are required by federal regulations to submit stem cell therapies for review as “drugs” and to provide evidence of their safety and efficacy. But the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not enforced these rules. So, these businesses are essentially unregulated.

Additionally, stem cell clinics operate under less robust oversight of infection control measures, including injection safety and medication preparation and testing, which potentially amplifies the risk to patients. In December, the CDC received reports of blood infections in 12 patients from various commercial cellular clinics in three states: Texas (seven), Florida (four) and Arizona (one).

Currently, we do not know whether these treatments are even effective.

Reports are rampant that many patients do not benefit from these treatments, and there are numerous lawsuits against commercial cell clinics.

The gold standard for evaluating any new treatment is an adequately

sized, randomized controlled trial in which the new treatment is compared against a placebo. To date, there have been no such human trials, despite the fact that many thousands of people are lining up to get these treatments.

The commercial cell clinics are charging very high fees that are not reflective of benefit and safety. A procedure such as an injection into a joint might take about 10 minutes and cost between \$5,000 and \$20,000. For systemic diseases such as lupus, some clinics also administer cells intravenously, which can cost more than \$10,000 per session.

Patients should beware. Before paying any clinic thousands of dollars, go to the FDA website for information. Demand that the commercial cell clinic provide you with published medical human research that specifically lists their cellular product by name and demonstrates that product's safety and effectiveness.

Learn to Hunt Bear program seeks applicants, instructors

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and conservation partners are encouraging novice hunters who want to learn about bear hunting in Wisconsin to apply for the Learn to Hunt Bear program.

The program is intended to promote awareness and understanding of bear hunting in Wisconsin, particularly for those who are interested in hunting bear on their own in the future.

The program includes multiple classroom and field sessions, culminating with a bear-hunting experience. Participants will learn about bear biology, population management, habits, habitat, hunting techniques, regulations and safety.

Anyone who has not previously participated in the Learn to Hunt Bear program or received a bear harvest authorization is encouraged to apply. Participants must be at least 10 years old, and there is no maximum age.

The number of Learn to Hunt Bear programs offered varies annually and will influence the number of participants selected. Applicants will be notified of the status of their ap-

plication by June 1.

Interested participants should complete the on-line application by May 1. The application, program guidelines and more information can be found on the DNR's Learn to Hunt Bear webpage.

The DNR is also looking for experienced bear hunters interested in becoming Learn to Hunt Bear program instructors. The number of participants in the program is dependent on the number of volunteers who can instruct novice hunters. Potential instructors need at least five years of bear

hunting experience and must consent to a background check.

The DNR will work with instructor groups to develop a Learn to Hunt Bear program in their area or help individual volunteers find an existing group to work with. 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COURT NEWS

Eric R. Vanroy, 46, Schofield, pleaded no contest March 26 to felony bail jumping. Judge William Kussel Jr. withheld sentencing and placed him on two years of probation with conditions.

He subsequently was charged March 27 with battery and disorderly conduct as a domestic abuse repeater, three counts of felony bail

jumping and three counts of misdemeanor bail jumping. Kussel set a \$1,000 cash bond and scheduled a preliminary hearing for April 2.

Joel L. Lehouillier, 42, Bowler, was charged March 24 with felony bail jumping. Kussel set a \$750 cash bond and scheduled a preliminary hearing for March 31.

Nickolas D. Kunchick, 39, Shawano, was charged March 24 with possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine, possession of drug paraphernalia to produce methamphetamine and misdemeanor counts of use or possession with intent to use a masking agent, possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of THC. Kussel set a \$10,000 cash bond and scheduled a preliminary hearing for March 31.

Ingold ponders becoming his own attorney

Defendant frustrated that he can't access discovery evidence

It has been months since Michael Ingold and his last attorney have parted ways, and the effort to get Ingold another attorney through the public defender's office has been slow and not borne much fruit.

With that, the Shawano man accused of first-degree intentional homicide could be taking an unusual step — being his own attorney.

So far, almost 800 contacts have been made to find Ingold an attorney, Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court Judge William Kussel said during a March 24 status conference, but there has been no success. Kussel said the number of available attorneys has slowed down justice for many who cannot afford to hire their own counsel, but it is particularly difficult finding attorneys to take on homicide cases.

"It's a somewhat complicated matter, so they've always got to make sure that they have an attorney who is able to take these kinds of cases," Kussel said.

This is the third time an attorney has been sought for Ingold. Julianne Lennon took on the case for Christopher Froehlich, who withdrew May 9, 2023, after being appointed Oct. 18, 2022. Lennon withdrew from the case Nov. 21, 2024, after Ingold refused to come to court with her or appear via Zoom on the eve of the trial. Ingold

has been in the Shawano County Jail since July 2022, held on a \$1 million bond.

Ingold, 60, wrote a letter to Kussel asking to go pro se, meaning to be his own attorney. Kussel brought up the letter during the status conference.

"Is that something you want to do?" Kussel asked Ingold.

Ingold told the judge it was not a step he had planned to take.

"In all reality, no," Ingold said in response to Kussel's question. "However, it's the only way I can get my discovery (evidence). Since my previous attorney had to back out, I'm not able to get in contact with her, and I can't get discovery from her."

Kussel provided Ingold with a form he would need to fill out if he decided to waive his right to having an attorney. The judge noted that Ingold could always reconsider and ask for an attorney again, but he urged the defendant to think long and hard about his decision, because of the specter of a life imprisonment sentence if Ingold is found guilty.

No decision was made on Ingold's attorney status at the hearing, as Ingold opted to wait and think on the possibility. Another status conference was scheduled for 1:30 p.m. May 6 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse. However, an earlier hearing could be scheduled if Ingold decides to move forward without an attorney.

The criminal complaint against Ingold states that at 4:13 a.m. June 25, 2022, the Shawano County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call from Ingold, where he stated that he woke up and checked on his girlfriend, only to find her deceased.

An autopsy showed that Sheila Laudon, who was 59 at the time, was strangled to death.

Ingold told the deputies that he got home at 6:30 p.m. the day before, talked with the victim, turned on the television and fell asleep on the couch, according to the complaint. He stated he woke up around 2:30 a.m. and heard the victim in the kitchen saying that she was getting a beer. He then claimed that he woke up again at 4:01 a.m. and found her dead in the bedroom.

Detectives received the autopsy report of the victim's death on July 21, 2022, stating that the cause of death was manual strangulation.

On July 27, 2022, two detectives interviewed Ingold at the sheriff's department, told Ingold that the victim died from strangulation and that they believed that he caused it. Ingold allegedly responded, saying, "No, it's not; no, it's not. I didn't touch her," according to the complaint. Ingold acknowledged he and Laudon were the only two people in the house but continued to deny touching her, according to the complaint.

Social Security enhancing security

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is taking proactive steps to enhance the security of its services by implementing stronger identity verification procedures.

The updated measures will further safeguard Social Security records and benefits against fraudulent activity. Over a two week period, SSA will carefully transition to stronger identity proofing procedures for both benefit claims and direct deposit changes.

Individuals seeking these services who cannot use their personal "my Social Security" account, which requires online identity proofing, will then need to visit a local Social Security office to prove their identity in person. At the same time, the agency will expedite processing all direct deposit change requests — both in person and online — to one business day. Prior to this change, online direct deposit changes were held for 30 days.

"Americans deserve to have their Social Security

records protected with the utmost integrity and vigilance," said Lee Dudek, acting commissioner of Social Security. "For far too long, the agency has used antiquated methods for proving identity. Social Security can better protect Americans while expediting service."

The agency's two-week transition plan includes training frontline employees and management about the new policy and careful monitoring of policy compliance. At the conclusion of the transition period on March 31, SSA will enforce online digital identity proofing and in-person identity proofing. SSA will permit individuals who do not or cannot use the agency's online "my Social Security" services to start their claim for benefits on the telephone.

However, the claim cannot be completed until the individual's identity is verified in person. The agency therefore recommends calling to request an in-person appointment to begin and complete the claim in one

interaction. Individuals with and without an appointment will need to prove identity before starting a transaction. Individuals who do not or cannot use the agency's online "my Social Security" services to change their direct deposit information, can visit a local office to process the change or can call 800-772-1213 to schedule an in-person appointment.

SSA recently required nearly all agency employees, including frontline employees in all offices throughout the country, to work in the office five days a week. This change ensures maximum staffing is available to support the stronger in-person identity proofing requirement.

SSA plans to implement the Department of Treasury's Bureau of Fiscal Service's payment integrity service called Account Verification Service. This service provides instant bank verification services to proactively and timely prevent fraud associated with direct deposit change requests.
