First set of Swiderski apartments opening in May

More apartments in Wittenberg to be completed in summer, fall

The first wave of S.C. Swiderski's Wittenberg apartments are nearing completion, and the housing company opened up some of them for the public to check out March 12.

It didn't take long for the open apartments to fill up with interested people, and applications are already coming in, according to managers on the site. The first eight units, all single-level apartments, are expected to open in May.

"The first eight units are our Rockwell buildings," said Allison Menebroeker, area manager. "Those are the single level living, so there's no one above you, no one below you."

Menebroeker said she anticipated leases would be sent out to prospective tenants in the near future. Even in the first 20 minutes of the open house, several applications had been filled out, she said.

Attorneys ready to move case forward

Preliminary hearing on horizon for Radford after status conference

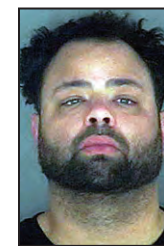
James C. Radford, who has been charged with first-degree homicide in connection with the shooting death of his wife nearly 10 years ago, finally has counsel to represent him, but it will take a little time for the attorneys to get up to speed.

John Swimmer and James Schoenecker represented Radford in a March 9 status conference and asked for time to get caught up with the details of the case. Another status conference is scheduled for 9 a.m. March 31 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse, where it's expected that the court will set a date for a preliminary hearing. The preliminary hearing determines if a case has enough evidence to warrant going to trial.

Radford had previously reported during multiple court hearings, including one held Jan. 20, that he needed more time to hire an attorney. Originally, online court records indicated Radford did not qualify for public defender services. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr., however, said he did, as the defendant — who has been incarcerated since May 2025 at the Shawano County Jail — is not employed and does not have any property to put up as collateral to hire an attorney himself.

According to the criminal complaint, deputies responded April 11, 2016, to a residence on County Road J in the Town of Fairbanks for a report of a woman who had sustained a gunshot wound. The caller, identified as her husband, reported that his wife, Sabrina Radford, had shot herself.

At the time of the initial response, investigators were unable to conclusively determine the cause of death. However, due to the suspicious circumstances

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Magee receives 20-year school board award

For more than two decades, Laura Magee has quietly and consistently helped shape the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District while continuing to contribute to many areas of the community.

Magee, who has served on the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board for 21 years, was recognized in January with the Wisconsin Association of School Boards 20-Year Service Award, marking an important milestone in her long-standing commitment to education and local leadership.

While the recognition highlights a significant achievement, Magee’s impact reaches far beyond the board table. She has served as a local EMT since 2012, providing critical service to the community, and remains

actively involved in several local organizations.

Magee volunteers as a board member and serves as secretary of the Wittenberg Area Historical Society. She is also a committee member and volunteer with the Walls of Wittenberg.

Through her work on the school board, Magee has also served on several committees supporting district initiatives, including the nature center committee and the Darwin E. Smith Community Aquatic Center committee, helping guide projects that enhance educational and recreational opportunities for students and the

broader community.

During Magee’s tenure on the board, the district has experienced growth in open enrollment, expanded opportunities for students through academics, clubs and co-curricular activities, and added 4-year-old kindergarten and early childhood programming. The district has also maintained strong financial stability, reflecting careful oversight and responsible leadership.

Magee has played an active role in key leadership decisions within the district, including participating in superintendent searches and the hiring of new principals. She also previously served on the CESA 8 Board of Control, contributing to regional educational leadership.

Fellow school board member

Richard Olson describes Magee as someone who is “not afraid to ask questions,” noting that her approach encourages strong discussion and thoughtful decision-making at the board table.

Magee’s connection to the district is also personal. She and her husband, married 38 years, raised two sons who graduated from the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District. During those years, she was actively involved in parent-teacher organization leadership and sports fundraising, supporting students both in and outside the classroom.

Before retiring from a career in the dental field about 15 years ago, Magee balanced work, family and community involvement. Today, she

continues to stay active in the community and works seasonally at Nueske’s, while also supporting several nonprofit fundraising efforts.

A lifelong learner, Magee recently completed level two certification through the Wisconsin Association of School Boards, continuing to strengthen her role in educational leadership.

In communities like Wittenberg, progress is often shaped by individuals who quietly give their time year after year. Through more than two decades of service on the school board and continued involvement across the community, Magee’s steady leadership has helped support the students, families and organizations that make Wittenberg-Birnamwood such a special place.

Counties sought to host Alice in Dairyland finals

Crawford County, the most recent host county for the 78th Alice in Dairyland Finals in 2025, recorded a boost of more than \$2 million in economic activity in their county over the three-day finals.

The planning process for hosting finals begins at least a year in advance, including scheduling the current Alice in Dairyland

to attend monthly events in the county to promote the finals and learn more about the impact of agriculture on that county. In mid-March, the host county holds a press conference to officially announce the top candidates for the next Alice in Dairyland.

The event includes agribusiness tours, media interviews, individual

interviews, candidate presentations, a public commodity showcase and impromptu question-answer session, an Alice in Dairyland finale banquet and program. These are both open to the public as ticketed events and include opportunities to showcase local businesses, agritourism and other county highlights.

The Rockwell apartments all have vaulted ceilings and stainless steel appliances, as well as in-apartment washers and dryers. There is also a one-vehicle garage included. Rents for the complex range from \$1,125 for one bedroom up to \$1,550 for three bedrooms, and all utilities are included in the price.

“We provide heat, water, sewer and trash removal, along with a Wi-Fi cable package,” Menebroeker said. “We will also have keyless entry into the apartment. Nobody wants to deal with a key.”

Having inclusive rents helps to create ease for customers. Menebroeker noted that it’s easier to pay one bill instead of several each month.

The high interest shows the apartments have been needed in Wittenberg, according to Menebroeker.

“We had this open house starting at 11 o’clock, and we’ve already had 30 people in 20 minutes,” she said. “I would say there’s some demand.”

There are still plenty of apartments under construction, and Menebroeker anticipates some will be done in the summer, with the remainder expected to open in the fall.

“We’re aiming to have this done by the end of 2026,” she said.

On-site maintenance is another thing that the Swiderski team expects will attract people to the apartments.

“They’ll take care of

anything and everything that goes wrong in the apartments,” Menebroeker said. “That’s a huge selling point to a lot of people. They can move in, and they don’t have to worry about anything.”

David Marshall will be the on-site property manager, and during the open house, he said he’s answered a lot of questions about the apartments.

“It’s exciting,” Marshall said. “We’ve already got people coming and sending their applications. We’ve had a good turnout today. I’m ready to move forward and get them all filled up, help people find their new homes. I have a feeling these will fill up real quick.”

surrounding the incident, a formal investigation was initiated.

Over the course of nine years, investigators dedicated significant time and effort to this case, according to a sheriff’s department press release. Numerous interviews were conducted with James Radford and other individuals connected to the case, and previously collected evidence was reexamined. With the aid of advanced investigative tools, evolving forensic technology and

the involvement of expert witnesses, investigators determined the death of Sabrina Radford was not the result of suicide.

James Radford was taken into custody in 2025 in Waukesha County. He was subsequently transported to Shawano County, where he was booked into the jail and has since been held on a cash bond of \$800,000.

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Proposed Kenosha casino project moves forward

BIA publishes environmental assessment

The U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs has released the draft environmental assessment for the proposed Hard Rock Casino in Kenosha.

The EA analyzes the potential effects of acquiring land in Kenosha for the Menominee Indian Tribe and its proposed development of the property as a casino-hotel, offering class III gaming pursuant to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, consistent with other tribal casinos in the state.

The BIA's comprehensive review – which took more than a year and covered numerous studies – analyzed the environmental impacts of the project. Both the city of Kenosha and Kenosha County have approved agreements supporting the project.

“This is a long-awaited opportunity, and we are excited to have arrived at the next phase in this process,” Menominee Tribal Chairman Joey Awonohopay said. “This project will deliver significant, local

economic impact, create more than 1,000 permanent jobs in the final phase of the project, and support families and businesses across the region. The project’s benefits will directly benefit the members of our tribe, as we address urgent needs in health care, infrastructure and education.”

The EA evaluated a broad range of environmental considerations, including air quality, water resources, traffic, public services and biological resources.

With respect to air quality, the EA concludes that construction and operation of the proposed project would result in insignificant impacts and would comply with applicable federal and state air quality standards, including requirements related to vehicle emissions and operational controls.

The EA also finds that the project has been designed to avoid impacts to jurisdictional wetlands and other protected aquatic resources, with no filling or alteration of wetlands anticipated, and that implementation of best management practices and mitigation measures would ensure continued protection of

water resources and floodplain conditions.

In addition to environmental effects, the EA examined socioeconomic and economic considerations associated with the proposed project.

The analysis concludes that the Kenosha project would generate substantial economic benefits, including significant employment during construction and permanent jobs during operations, and that these effects would be beneficial to Kenosha County and the surrounding region.

The EA further determined that the proposed development is not expected to result in significant adverse economic impacts and that overall economic effects associated with the project would be positive when considering employment, income generation, and related economic activity.

“We thank the BIA for thoroughly reviewing the plans for the proposed Kenosha project and ensuring that all applicable regulations have been met,” Awonohopay said. “The EA provides the Department of the Interior with the detailed information needed to determine

that this project strengthens both the tribe and the broader Kenosha community. We are confident the record demonstrates the benefit without any significant impact to the environment.”

The Kenosha casino approval process has moved to the next phase with the BIA officially publishing the EA for public comment, offering an opportunity for input and transparency.

“This approval process is decades in the making, and the people of Kenosha have consistently supported the project,” Kenosha County Executive Samantha Kerkman said. “I’ve followed and supported the project for years. I encourage citizens to continue to make their voices heard throughout the comment period.”

Upon completion of the proposed Kenosha project, the facility will provide hundreds of millions of dollars to the state of Wisconsin and the city and county of Kenosha and will provide the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin revenue to help address the significant unmet needs and persistent economic hardship affecting the tribe and its more than 9,000 members.

Officers recognized for saving teen’s life

Two Shawano police officers were recognized March 11 during the Shawano Common Council meeting for saving a teen’s life just after Christmas at Sturgeon Park.

Sgt. Michael Pecore and Officer Dillon Frechette had gone to Sturgeon Park on Dec. 27 to talk to some people when they saw a 15-year-old standing on the edge of the bridge connecting the Wolf River with the Mountain-Bay Trail ready to jump into the river, a situation that Police Chief Mike Musloff described as “very scary.”

“Their actions reflect the very best of the Shawano Police Department,” Musloff said. “If they

hadn’t stopped out (to the park), we don’t know what would have happened in this situation.”

Musloff described Pecore and Frechette’s actions as calm and decisive, getting the teen away from harm without violence.

“They were able to prevent what could have been a very tragic outcome,” Musloff said. “Their professionalism, their compassion and commitment exemplify the core mission of our department and the trust the community puts in us.”

Lt. Dan Conradt presented Frechette and Pecore with their commendations and said that saving a life is the highest action that law enforcement officers can take on.

“On this occasion, your

identifying of and quick response to a citizen in distress prevented harm,” Conradt said. “Through your calm demeanor and empathy, you were able to de-escalate a critical situation and provide the individual with safety and the help that they needed.”

Conradt said the happy outcome came as a result of the officers utilizing their training and choosing to help someone at the risk of their own lives.

“Your conduct has brought great credit to yourself, your co-workers and the Shawano Police Department,” he said. “It serves to show the positive law enforcement officers have with our community.”

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“Hosting the Alice in Dairyland Finals has been an incredible experience for Crawford County,” said Carol Roth, chairwoman of the 78th Alice in Dairyland steering committee. “Our committee not only helped others learn more about the Alice in Dairyland position and its legacy, but they also brought attention to the diversity and importance of agriculture throughout the county and state.”

Although Crawford County can boast three former Alices, 2025 was the first time the county hosted the event.

Marathon County will host the 79th Alice Finals on May 14-16.

Cash bond lowered in stalking case

Behling's attorney asks to reduce bond from \$50K to \$5K

A \$50,000 cash bond for Aaron Behling was reduced during a hearing March 10, but it may not be enough for the suspect in a stalking case to get out of jail.

John Swimmer, representing Behling in Joe Furnstahl's place, reminded the court Behling has been in jail since Oct. 12. Swimmer said Behling could be able to produce \$5,000 in cash and recommended that the bond be reduced to that, claiming the defendant did not have any priors or any failures to appear in court.

"We don't really believe we need that high bond," Swimmer said. "Five thousand should suffice."

That was disputed by Shawano-Menominee County Assistant District Attorney Edward Burke, who noted the \$50,000 bond was determined because Behling has committed previous crimes, including a couple in Shawano County. One was resolved with a no-contest plea in 2024 for disorderly conduct with a domestic abuse repeater. The other case, resolved in 2018, resulted in a three-year prison sentence with three years probation for amphetamine possession, burglary, felon in possession of a firearm and taking and driving a vehicle without consent.

Behling also has criminal convictions from other counties.

"The victim was consulted in this case," Burke said. "She is very frightened of Mr. Behling."

Behling has been charged with stalking by intercepting an electronic communication, misuse of a GPS device, possession of THC with a repeat offense and possession of methamphetamine with a repeat offense.

According to the criminal complaint, the victim told police she found a tracking device, later identified as a Logistimatics

Mobile 200 4g GPS tracker, on her vehicle after having an oil change completed. The mechanic doing the oil change had discovered something unusual near one of the tires and asked to do a tire rotation.

The victim told police she and Behling, 36, had broken up recently and that he had accused her multiple times of cheating on him. Behling allegedly said that was not the case when he was initially interviewed by police.

An Act 79 search, which allows law enforcement to conduct searches without a warrant for people on probation for felony crimes, was executed. Police reportedly found in his basement another Logistimatics GPS tracker, along with five empty syringes, a vape cartridge that tested positive for marijuana and a syringe with white residue that tested positive for meth.

"I don't know what (Behling) had in mind," Burke said. "I'm certain that he's very possessive of this individual."

According to the complaint, the victim said she and Behling had been in a relationship since September 2022. The pair had a son together, and the victim alleged that the accusations of infidelity began when she was pregnant. Behling was arrested for domestic violence and served one year in prison.

The victim also detailed instances when Behling allegedly parked down the road and watched her workplace. One such incident included when she started a training session in Antigo. Behling allegedly called her and accused her of going to Antigo to meet someone.

Another incident took place in Shawano at a local gas station where Behling allegedly arrived and caused a scene. The victim told officers she had not told Behling she was going to the gas station.

Another incident took place at a Shawano fast-food restaurant where Behling allegedly grabbed the victim's cell phone and started looking through it, later driving her back to work but not returning the phone.

Other erratic behavior

the victim alleged includes when the victim met with her boss to express her concerns about Behling's controlling tendencies, and he called and demanded she send a photo of her in her office to prove she was at work. Behling also allegedly purchased semen tests to test her underwear.

Behling was initially taken by police to ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano, according to the complaint, because he claimed he'd taken a lot of suboxone and was then transferred to another hospital in Neenah. While at the Neenah hospital, according to the criminal complaint, Behling allegedly called the victim and begged her to drop the charges.

A ThedaCare employee requested Behling be placed in the hospital's psychiatric unit, according to the complaint, but because of the severity of the charges, police opted to arrest him and bring him back to the jail in Shawano.

Swimmer, in his argument to reduce the bond, said he understood the safety concern, but he feels that 4 1/2 months in the Shawano County Jail has changed him.

Judge William Kussel Jr. agreed to drop the bond to \$35,000 cash, but he said dropping it to \$5,000 was not wise due to the existing charges.

"The allegations are significant with the stalking," Kussel said.

During the hearing, Behling also waived the right to a preliminary hearing and asked to proceed to an arraignment.

If convicted, Behling faces up to six years in prison on the stalking charge. However, he was convicted on felony drug charges in Fond du Lac County, so his sentence could get an additional four years.

For the misuse of a GPS device, it could get him another nine months imprisonment. He also faces another 3 1/2 years on each of the drug counts. The drug charges could also add four years to his sentence because of the Fond du Lac County case.

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Weight limits begin on county roads

Seasonal weight limits on select county roads in Shawano County went into effect March 11.

Haulers will need to watch for the signs restricting load limits. A list of the posted roads

is available at www.co.shawano.wi.us/.

The weight restrictions are 6 tons for a single axle and 10 tons for a tandem axle, with a maximum gross weight of 26 tons.

Seasonal weight

restrictions are placed on specific highways during the spring thaw period. The restrictions are placed to prevent damage to the pavement structure and extend the life of the pavement.

Board to set max borrowing amount for building

Supervisors' decision will be made March 25

It's not the actual green light needed to build a new courthouse in Shawano County, but it's close as you can get until then.

Supervisors will meet at 3 p.m. March 25 to vote on a maximum amount to borrow to build a new courthouse — a decision that will guide them when any future borrowing votes are taken.

Last month, consultants unveiled a base plan of \$88.5 million for a two-story courthouse west of the current building at 311 N. Main St.; this also included some auxiliary areas for the jail and a secure connection between the jail and the courthouse.

Also unveiled was a \$32.5 million alternate for a 150-bed housing pod at the jail; this would allow the county to close the work release center on Engel Drive and increase operational efficiencies within the jail.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza stressed the

importance of the meeting to supervisors last month.

"Next meeting is very important," he said. "That vote, it's an awful big vote, and hopefully everybody can attend. If you can't attend and you still want to vote, there is the option to call in and do it remotely."

Three times in the past week, supervisors and other officials had the chance

to share information about the projects with the community and collect feedback. Informational meetings were held in Shawano, Bonduel and Wittenberg.

If supervisors approve of a borrowing limit and later approve the actual borrowing to build, a few other pieces will likely fall into place.

First, a new courthouse

will have space for three circuit court judges: courtrooms, judges' chambers, rooms for judicial assistants and jury rooms. The Wisconsin Senate is expected to pass a bill later this month to add a third judgeship to Shawano County, effective in August 2028.

"The Assembly voted and, in the vote, passed a

third judge," Kautza said to supervisors in February. "It passed by a pretty good margin. So the only steps left with that would be it goes to the Senate next, possibly in March for their vote, and then it gets to the governor's office. That'll tell us, too, what we'll have to get ready for space needs in the future."

Second, a new jail pod, according to the plans, will require the county to purchase the home at 217 W. Third St.

The purchase has already been approved by the public property and executive committees. The full board needs to give approval for it to move forward.

"There's no use in buying a house over there if everybody decides not to borrow and not to do any project," Kautza said. "We'll decide that all next month."

The county would pay \$300,000 for the house, and the owners would have to move out by fall.

According to Shawano County online tax records, Amber Hetzer owns the Third Street property, which has an assessed value of \$82,400 and an estimated fair market value of \$96,700.

Third, after a new courthouse and jail pod are built, there are long-range plans to build a new sheriff's department and another housing pod, which would lead to the razing of the current sheriff's department and jail.

Kurt Berner, of The Samuels Group, suggested the county consider those building plans in 2036.

The current county tax rate is \$3.76 per \$1,000 of equalized value. Building the new courthouse alone would result in a decrease in the rate due to increases in valuation of properties across the county.

For the \$121 million project, the \$3.76 would increase to \$3.81 in 2027 and peak at \$3.87 in 2028. After that, it would decrease.

Berner said that in 2036, the rate would be down to \$2.97, which would be a good time to take on the additional debt.

The new sheriff's department and jail pod are estimated to cost \$50 million to \$60 million in today's dollars.

Sheriff's deputy on leave after shooting man

A Shawano County deputy is on administrative leave following the shooting of a man in the Town of Green Valley on March 10.

About 1:41 a.m., deputies with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department were dispatched to a disturbance at a residence in the 2300 block of state Highway 22. Upon entry, deputies located a man locked inside a bathroom.

The man refused to exit the bathroom, and

the subject announced that he had a gun, according to a press release. Initial attempts to resolve the issue were not successful.

The man then advanced toward the deputies with what they reported was a firearm. One deputy discharged a firearm, striking the subject. The incident was captured on body cameras.

EMS was contacted, and life-saving measures were attempted. The subject was transported to a local hospital where he was later pronounced

dead.

No one else was injured during this incident.

The Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation is conducting the investigation.

All involved law enforcement are fully cooperating with DCI during this investigation. DCI is continuing to review evidence and determine the facts of this incident and will turn over the investigative reports to the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney's Office when the investigation concludes.

County officials eye purchase of 4th St. home

Shawano County officials said they have finally resumed contact with the owner of a Fourth Street home the county is interested in purchasing.

Nick Hesse, Shawano County's facilities management director, told the public property committee March 12 he recently talked with Meshan Latender, owner of 211 W. Fourth St.

"We got the deed straightened out," Hesse said. "It's just her name on the deed now."

The late Pedro Guerrero

Jr.'s name had been on the deed, and Latender signed appropriate documents to remove his name from the deed.

Now, the two sides are haggling over the price of the house and 0.0185 acres of land.

If the county purchases the house, it would be razed to make way for a new courthouse and jail, assuming the county board gives the OK to that construction project.

Hesse said Latender has no money to put toward closing costs.

"She says \$120,000 is what she wants for it, but

she's \$31,000 in the hole for taxes (and other assessments)," he said. "I told her \$110,000. You look it up — it's \$95,000-\$110,000 is what it would go for."

Attorney fees and closing costs would run about \$5,000, Hesse said.

He also noted Latender is two years behind on paying her taxes on the property.

According to online tax records, the property has an assessed value of \$67,300 and an estimated fair market value of \$79,000.

Serving up more than just hot dogs and burgers, JDoggs has tucked within the restaurant a fun, family-oriented environment geared toward kids of all ages.

Offered at 136 S. Main St. in Shawano — along with various menu items — are simulated golf courses, cornhole games, Frisbee and much more.

On the menu, patrons will find Chicago-style hot dogs, burgers, homemade pizza, fresh-squeezed lemonade and chili, all offered in a casual, family-friendly place, serving beer and wine, no liquor. Takeouts and DoorDash are provided.

License fee hikes, deer, wolf issues on the ballot

As sure as the arrival of robins, rain and green grass, the statewide combined Wisconsin DNR and Conservation Congress hearings are another sign of spring.

Some of the 44 conservation questions may touch most of us, including the topics of deer hunting and possible license fee increases, while others may be specific to a distant lake or river, and not interest us at all.

You have a chance to vote in person for any or all questions that interest you at the public hearing in your county, or the county you most often hunt or fish in, if you choose.

Many will take the easiest way and vote online from 6 p.m. April 13 through 6 p.m. April 15.

All results serve only as an advisory tool to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Advisory Board but frequently are used to help them make lasting decisions regarding hunting, fishing, trapping and other activities. A few of the questions would require legislative action to fulfill.

Questions 12-18 could potentially affect everyone who hunts, fishes and traps. The questions seem to be a feeler for how much sportsmen are willing to bear for license increases.

These include proposals to increase hunting, fishing and trapping licenses by 25%-75%, a one-time license fee increase with smaller increases later, based on inflation, or a \$6 increase in the inland trout stamp fee from \$10 to \$16.

Questions 19-22 propose a 0.125% sales tax increase to fund conservation programs, spending about \$20 million in general fund taxes to cover reduced or free licenses, charging a user fee (similar to that charged at state parks) for using all public lands, and requiring registration fees for all non-motorized watercraft, such as kayaks and canoes.

One question that most bow and crossbow deer hunters in this area will likely appreciate is the suggestion to allow the archery (bow and crossbow) deer season to be extended to Jan. 31 in all Farmland Deer Management Zones.

In the past, this extension was left up to the individual County Deer Advisory Councils, although former DNR senior deer biologist Jeff Pritzl said the state never intended for CDACs to make season decisions. Many hunters prefer to avoid the bitter cold of late season, but this would give archers and crossbow hunters nearly an additional month to harvest a buck or doe.

Another question recommends allowing tree stands and ground blinds

Wildlife lies in wait out in those wintry woods

Dangling my feet off the end-gate of our old white farm truck parked along our ridge, I was waiting for the wand pump to inhale the sap stored in the tote. The totes, placed at the bottom of a south-facing ridge, is the perfect set up for sap collecting and convenient to unload. It's a hobby my husband and I enjoy. Early spring, as soon as the weather cooperates, we're up in the woods as often as the trees release their ambrosia.

So as I was daydreaming that one mild spring day – the sky cloudless, the wind speechless – I noticed an industrious ant making its way through dry leaves and twigs. It hadn't warmed up very much, we were only in the mid-40s, so I was surprised to see insects. This ant was on a mission, intent on going somewhere and doing something.

Totally engrossed in the little bugger, I asked my husband, "Where do ants go in the winter?"

"They burrow

underground. Remember we see them in the wood we cut sometimes?" says he.

As we split wood in the winter, at times I'd see a bunch of ants looking dead as a doornail. They're not in every hunk, just some of the ones that are hollow. (We call them dozy and those quickly burn.) The ants looked like they burrowed right into the wood, sort of calcified, and had gotten stuck there as the weather abruptly turned cold.

Because I'm naturally curious, I double-checked with Siri and she informed me: "Ants don't hibernate but enter a dormant state called 'diapause,' retreating deep underground below the frost line where temperatures remain stable. The queen stops laying eggs, workers stop foraging, and the colony seals its entrances to conserve heat until spring."

Aren't they the clever little things? They take a winter hiatus.

Along with creepy crawling insects, our

woods is alive with motion. Before we'd put up trail cameras, we had little idea of the vibrant, busy night life of our forest.

Now with multiple trail cams in our woods, we capture, not those creeping insects but much larger wildlife. We have discovered to our great amazement that we have a remarkable variety: bear, fisher, bobcat, fox, coyote, woodchuck, raccoon, opossum, squirrel, deer, skunk and turkey – all caught one time or

another on our trail cams. Those seem to be the regulars. We then discovered a very different one on camera that completely floored us – a badger.

Our state animal resides in our Leopolis woods? It's rather flattering.

Our good buddy, Tim, who is a lover of all of God's woodland creatures, laughed when we shared that trail cam picture with him, retorting, "Oh, those things are grizzly bears with short legs!"

We indeed discovered

they are aggressive, or can be, and 80% of their diet is earthworms. No wonder they have those long claws.

From www.woodlandtrust.org.uk, I found that, "Badgers can eat several hundred worms each night, but being omnivorous, they will eat almost anything, from flesh and fruit to bulbs and birds' eggs to slugs and insects. They also have a keen sense of smell."

Along with collecting sap and harvesting wood to keep our farmhouse warm and toasty (there's nothing like wood heat), my husband likes to hunt.

One night as dusk was hunkering down, he was walking the trail from his hunting stand to the four-wheeler, parked a ways down. All of a sudden along Highway 29, about a quarter mile from our woods, an ambulance came screaming down the highway toward Green Bay, sirens blazing.

Just then, my husband heard a sound that made his blood run cold.

Coyotes – provoked by the sound of the siren – started howling. He realized then that he was encircled by a pack. He never even saw them and didn't know they were there, but

after he heard them, and that close, he scrambled to the four-wheeler as fast as his legs could carry him.

Afterwards he told me, "It was pretty spooky."

If I'd have been there, "pretty spooked" was the least I'd have been. I'd have had goosebumps reproducing along with cold chills down my spine.

"Did you feel like the hunted instead of the hunter?" I asked, eyes wide, reliving it as he explained.

"Ya."

While our busy and beautiful woods produces for us in so many ways, I rather prefer to visit during daylight when the wildlife is snoozing.

("Four things on earth are small, yet they are exceedingly wise: the ants are a people not strong, yet they provide their food in the summer; the badgers are a people not mighty, yet they make their home in the cliffs." Proverbs 30:24-25, English Standard Version)

on public lands to be left overnight from September through January. Currently, the state only allows leaving stands and ground blinds overnight on public lands north of state Highway 64, an experiment that started in 2017.

Prior to that, the law required all stands and ground blinds to remain only during daylight hours. That law created two problems: the noise

and hassles of removing stands and blinds at the end of the hunt and then returning them the next morning (almost absurd if you've hunted in a state without such a law) and a very dangerous hazard, as studies show most tree stand accidents occur when a hunter is setting up or taking down a stand.

Another deer hunting question recommends extending the registration

deadline from 5 p.m. the day after harvest to 11:59 p.m. This new deadline would align with neighboring states and help eliminate unintentional law violations, according to the questionnaire wording.

One law that is probably long overdue is specifying that only centerfire cartridges larger than .22 caliber be allowed for deer hunting. Currently, any rimfire .22 cartridge could

also be used legally for deer hunting, including a .22 Long Rifle, but virtually anyone knowledgeable about ammunition would agree that rimfire cartridges are not a humane option.

Other topics on the questionnaire include:

- Reauthorizing the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program for funding conservation grants.
- Allowing the use of

trained dogs to chase or "harry" and track specific wolves that are causing livestock or other issues.

- Eliminating the north and south zones for waterfowl hunting.
- Allowing placement of mineral supplement blocks in the woods to help deer fight CWD.
- Allowing underwater spearfishing for catfish.
- Increasing the turkey stamp fee to \$10.

- Creating a youth muskrat and mink trapping season.

Buttermilk, cinnamon-raisin bread ideal for blessed feast

March 19 is the Feast of St. Joseph. St. Joseph is the spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster father of Jesus. He is also the patron of the Catholic Church.

The tradition of having a St. Joseph's Day table originated in Sicily in medieval times. Loaded with many kinds of breads to share with everyone, this is a tradition that many Catholic churches and private homes still follow to this day.

Buttermilk bread is yet another recipe from "The New Artisan Bread in Five Minutes a Day." As with every recipe in this book, this recipe does not require any kneading and is very simple and quick to throw together.

If you do not have buttermilk, a homemade substitute works great. Simply place a tablespoon of lemon juice or vinegar into

a liquid measuring and add enough milk to make 1 cup. Stir gently and wait at least 5 minutes before using.

While there are many ways to "correctly" use yeast when baking bread, I've found that sprinkling the yeast lightly over the surface of the warm water works best for me. This ensures that the yeast is evenly distributed on the water, and it gets moistened evenly. I don't stir the yeast into the water unless the recipe specifically calls for it.

Because this bread uses sugar, which reacts with the yeast, you may notice a slightly sour smell. This is completely normal and will disappear as the bread bakes and cools.

Cinnamon-raisin bread, a simply delicious classic, is also really easy to make. You can use whatever bread dough you wish, even frozen bread dough.

It is very customizable

as well. You have to adjust the amount of sugar to personal preference or use brown sugar. You can add other spices. You can even add other dried fruits such as dried cranberries.

Soaking your raisins is optional. Ever since I learned about soaking raisins to reconstitute them a little, I try to soak my raisins whenever I have time. Soaking them just ensures the maximum amount of juiciness. Although it sounds a little counterproductive, just make sure to drain the raisins well. If your raisins are dripping water, this will probably make your bread bake

unevenly – it may not bake completely.

Bread pan size is also optional. You can use normal size pans or large pans or mini loaf pans. Just remember that baking times will vary. Remember to let the bread cool completely. Bread continues to bake as it cools and it may not appear done if you slice into it too early.

CINNAMON-RAISIN BREAD

2 lbs. buttermilk bread dough, or other plain bread dough

Sugar	Cinnamon	Approx. 1 cup raisins
If desired, soak raisins in water for about 10 minutes or until plump. Drain well on paper towels. Divide dough in half and using enough flour to prevent sticking, roll into a long rectangle. Sprinkle on desired amount of sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle on drained raisins. Starting at a short end roll dough up jelly-roll style. Pinch edges and ends together, and tuck the ends under to form an oval loaf. Place in greased loaf pans and let rise for 60-90 minutes. Brush with melted butter. Bake in a 375-degree oven for 35-45 minutes or until golden. Brush with melted butter. Let cool in pans for 10 minutes then remove from pans and let cool completely on a wire rack.

Small lifestyle changes may help with nutrition

Nutrition experts at ThedaCare are offering advice to help people eat healthier amid a range of dieting options, conflicting social media messages and an updated food pyramid.

Nicole Havlichek and Carlissa Spreeman, registered dietitians with ThedaCare, provide science-backed guidance for people seeking to improve their nutrition.

“It can be a challenge for someone to know what to put in their grocery cart and on their plate,” Havlichek said. “It’s not uncommon for us to hear patients tell us that when it comes to healthier nutrition, they are confused and don’t know where to start.”

A first step in deciphering nutrition fact from fiction is to consider the source, Spreeman said.

“Chances are the person on your social media feed or your favorite celebrity hasn’t completed the necessary credentials to be deemed an expert in nutrition, like a registered dietitian,” she said. “A registered dietitian holds a bachelor’s degree and master’s degree and has completed a post-graduate internship to fully learn the complexities of nutrition.”

Both experts encouraged people to fact-check the nutrition information they may be considering to determine if it is

evidence-based and has supporting research.

“Nutrition is individualized. No one online knows your personal health needs, especially if you have medical conditions or specific nutrition-related goals,” Spreeman said. “Consider asking your primary care physician or advanced practice provider for a referral to a dietitian so they can help personalize recommendations to your needs.”

There are several considerations that may help inform people about what they should eat or avoid, Havlichek said.

“From food preferences to lifestyle factors and medical conditions, many considerations come into play,” she said. “Multiple factors may influence what people can and should eat. A registered dietitian can provide recommendations specific to your individual needs.”

Common considerations include:

- Medical diagnoses like heart disease, diabetes, eating disorders and gastrointestinal conditions such as irritable bowel syndrome, Celiac disease and Crohn’s disease.

- Budget and food preferences.
- How much time a person has for meal planning, shopping and cooking.
- Cultural foods.
- Religious restrictions.

Improving one’s nutrition should be a lifestyle change, not a diet, Spreeman said.

“The word diet can have a lot of baggage. It may imply we’re making short-term changes, seeking a quick fix and that we may not be enjoying ourselves while doing it,” she said. “Rather than following any one diet, it’s best to consider making lifestyle changes. A lifestyle change may help promote long-term success and satisfaction.”

A good place to start is with people choosing wholesome and nutrient-dense foods to help nourish their bodies and minds, Havlichek said. She shared additional tips including eating regularly throughout the day, along with consuming a variety of foods in balanced proportions (for example: 1/2 plate produce, 1/4 plate grains/starches, 1/4 plate protein).

People should include protein with each meal but include other foods, too. Most Americans get enough protein but not enough fiber.

People are also encouraged to eat whole grains, fruits, vegetables and plant-based proteins such as beans, lentils, legumes, nuts and seeds.

“Eat whole foods when possible,” Havlichek said. “It’s OK to eat some packaged and processed foods as well. We encourage people to avoid extremes.”

Another important step in embracing healthier nutrition is for people to identify their nutrition goals and write them down, Spreeman said.

“However you set goals, you want to ensure they are SMART: specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and time-bound,” she said. “Writing down your SMART goals encourages improved prioritization and higher success rates.”

Both experts recommended making small changes that may be easier to build upon and said nutrition is only one piece of the health picture.

“Look at ways to improve your stress level, sleep, relationships, medication adherence, exercise pattern, and smoking or drinking habits,” Havlichek said. “Your primary care team is a great place to start if you need help with addressing any of these concerns.”

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Right to information remains under attack

Good journalism is usually unpopular, because it drags into the sunshine things those with vested interests prefer to either keep secret or spin into a favorable narrative.

Yet our framers believed news reporting was so important they made it a foundational building block of the republic.

Journalists either learn to live under attack or get out of the business. Those are the only options.

In a career spanning 50-plus years, I've experienced death threats, bomb threats at our building, assaults on our reporters, and had liberals call me a right-wing fascist and conservatives call me a lefty communist. Goes with the territory.

Journalists make mistakes. Plenty of them. Criticism is often deserved. The only time I saw journalism under this kind of relentless attack, though, was at the height of the Watergate crisis. Let's look at some issues facing journalism today.

Start here. What's the difference between news and opinion? The lines have been blurred, and we're all the worse off for it. This piece is opinion, not news, because I am expressing my own views, which are no more or no less important than yours. The purpose of opinion writing is to spark discussion and debate. It should be clearly identified. Real news should be presented without opinion.

That model is turned on its head with how many people consume information. Examples abound. Talk radio slants left or right. FOX News and other outlets on the right always support the conservative narrative. MS Now (formerly MSNBC) and other liberal outlets always take the progressive line. Podcasts look to persuade based on political points. This is not journalism. It is advocacy. If that's where you get your news, well, you are not getting news. Don't get me started on the unreliability — and worse — prevailing on social media.

Challenges in reporting today can be blunt and rough. Consider the arrest of Don Lemon for accompanying demonstrators into a Minneapolis church. I am not a Don Lemon fan. His record is mostly as an advocate, not a journalist. Yet he was recorded telling both protesters and congregants that he was not part of the group invading the church but rather was there

to ask questions and report.

Should he have stayed outside the church? Probably. We always made sure our reporters understood the difference between reporting from a public space and entering private property without invitation,

and the risks involved. Lemon may have exposed himself to a trespassing charge. Being accused of more serious crimes — and the risk of prison — seems not only absurd but intended to

intimidate. Expect a judge to throw out the charges at the earliest opportunity.

Likewise with execution of a search warrant for the home and devices of a Washington Post journalist, accused of obtaining leaked information from government officials. That's how journalism works, whether in Washington or Beloit. Many of our most successful and award-winning investigations relied on leaks from inside local government organizations. Officials never like it, yet the public is usually better off for knowing than not knowing.

The White House press-room removed privileges for a number of legacy media and replaced them with friendly, often obscure, agencies unlikely to ask unwelcome questions. The Pentagon told reporters they had to sign a document promising not to release information without permission or lose their access to the building. All legacy media refused — including FOX News — and their space was reassigned to friendlier reporters. Think about this. Would the Pentagon Papers have been reported under this restriction? The My Lai massacre?

Back to the part about journalists being unpopular. Good journalism steps on toes. Indiscriminately. To the left. To the right. The best journalists do not want or need your love. They do want you to have facts, including the facts you might prefer not to see or read. The framers thought that was how self-governing people could preserve their liberty. They were right then and they're right now.

Be a smarter news consumer. Start by accepting that your own narrative is an opinion, not a fact, and open your mind to the possibility that your side — left or right — can be wrong.

State newspapers urge passage of legislation to protect free speech

State Sen. Eric Wimberger (R-Oconto) and Rep. Jim Piwowarczyk (R-Hubertus) have introduced Wisconsin Senate Bill 666/Assembly Bill 701, which would adopt the Uniform Public Expression Protection Act (UPEPA), bringing long-overdue free speech protections for citizens and journalists in Wisconsin.

The Wisconsin Newspaper Association and this newspaper applaud Wimberger and Piwowarczyk for introducing SB 666/AB 701 and enthusiastically urge its passage. Designed to protect free speech and the right to petition the government, SB 666/AB701, will allow the courts to quickly dismiss lawsuits that are filed not to win on the merits, but to intimidate, silence or financially exhaust critics. So-called SLAPPs

— Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation — are often used against individuals who speak out on matters of public concern, such as government accountability, tax and spending decisions, consumer protection, environmental impacts or workplace conditions.

Even when these cases are weak or baseless, the cost and stress of litigation can be enough to deter people from speaking at all. Anti-SLAPP laws are intended to stop this abuse of the court system.

Under UPEPA legislation, which was developed by the nonpartisan Uniform Law Commission, a person who believes they are the target of a SLAPP lawsuit could ask the court to dismiss the case if it arises from their exercise of free speech

or their right to petition on a public issue. If the court agrees, the lawsuit would be dismissed, and the party who filed it could be required to pay the defendant's attorney fees and costs. The fee-shifting provision is critical, as it discourages the use of litigation as a weapon rather than a legitimate means of resolving disputes.

Wisconsin is currently behind much of the country in providing these protections. According to the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press, 31 states have anti-SLAPP laws in place. As a result, journalists, activists and ordinary citizens in Wisconsin are more vulnerable to retaliatory lawsuits than their counterparts in other states.

Passage of Senate Bill 666/Assembly Bill 701 will address this disparity.

SLAPP lawsuits are powerful tools for silencing dissent, not because they are likely to succeed in court, but because they impose crushing legal costs and risks. For many people, the mere threat of such a lawsuit is enough to discourage them from speaking out, even when their speech is lawful and important to the public.

The good news — both SB 666 and AB 701 have passed committee with unanimous, bipartisan support. We urge legislative leaders to ensure SB 666/AB 701 receives votes in the full Assembly and Senate so that Wisconsinites can feel free to express their opinions on public issues without fear of being subjected to a costly lawsuit.

Bonduel boys top Marathon, Kewaunee in D4 sectional

Thanks to the Bonduel boys basketball team, two No. 1 seeds for this season's WIAA state tournament aren't in the mix for a state title.

The Bears, however, are heading back to the Kohl Center in Madison for the second time in a row and second time in program history after a 78-68 win over Marathon March 14 in a Division 4 sectional final at D.C. Everest High School in Weston.

The win came two days after Bonduel knocked off previously undefeated Kewaunee 73-62 in a semifinal.

Bonduel improved to 26-3 and is the No. 1 seed among the four remaining Division 4 teams. The Bears will face No. 4 Cambridge at 6:35 p.m. March 19 in one of two Division 4 semifinals, while No. 2 Milwaukee Juneau and No. 3 Regis will meet in the other semifinal. Winners will advance to the championship game, set for about 1:30 p.m. March 21.

Bonduel 78, Marathon 68

Senior Griffin Uelmen, who came into the game with the Red Raiders averaging fewer than eight points a contest, scored 19 of his game-high 26 points

in the first half that helped the Bears take a 41-25 lead into the locker room.

Marathon cut the lead to 64-60 with just under five minutes remaining, but the Bears answered Marathon's rally with a 10-3 run that pushed the lead back to 11. Bonduel's final eight points came from the free-throw line.

While most teams focus a lot of their attention on Ryan Westrich, the Red Raiders had problems with Uelmen, whose 19 points in the first half included four 3-pointers and a 3-point play.

"Griffin's a really good player," coach Duke Copp said. "He's a senior, he's been to state in cross country and track, he's a great athlete and he hit some huge shots in the first half."

Quinn Wesenberg added 22 points for Bonduel to go along with Westrich's 14.

The Bears advanced to the Division 4 championship game last season before falling to Aquinas in the team's first-ever trip to state.

That experience, as well as making it to a sectional final two seasons ago but falling to Marathon, helped the Bears this season, according to Copp.

"Our kids have been there," he said. "Making this run last year helps a lot. Today, getting a good start was key. We almost gave it away, but we hung on."

Bonduel 73, Kewaunee 62

The Bears spent most of the first half trailing the

Storm at Kaukauna High School, but a 13-2 run to start the second half gave Bonduel a lead it never lost.

Bonduel trailed by as many as six points in the first half before Uelmen's buzzer-beating 3-pointer for the Bears sent the teams into the locker room tied at 30-30.

"That was huge because we were struggling," Copp said. "We weren't playing that well in the first half, and we knew it. To tie it up was awesome."

The Bears took the lead for good by scoring the first seven points of the second half. Kewaunee's Connor Kilgore ended the run with a basket to cut the lead to five points, but the Storm never got any closer the rest of the way.

Westrich later scored 12 straight points for the Bears and ended up leading all players with 27 points.

Four 3-pointers helped the Storm cut the Bears' lead to 68-62 with less than a minute remaining. A turnover gave Kewaunee an opportunity to get even closer, but a carrying violation on Kilgore with 35 seconds to go gave the ball back to the Bears.

Bonduel then sealed the win with two free throws from Westrich and Uelmen and one from Carter Moesch.

Moesch and Uelmen finished with 19 and 11 points, respectively, while Wesenberg and Jack Zernicke added eight each.

Diesel Bosdeck led four Kewaunee players in double figures with 15 points, while Kilgore, Mason Kovacs and Dane Harrell added 12, 11 and 10, respectively.

"It came down to gritty, tough basketball plays,"

Copp said. "What a great team they are. There's a lot of talent on that floor. They play so hard and play tough defense, but I thought we did at times, too."

Bonduel's postseason has included wins over a pair of No. 1 seeds — Marathon and Kewaunee — as well as a come-from-behind win over Iola-Scandinavia in a regional final in which the Bears trailed by a point with a minute to go, but ended up winning 70-65. The Bears had opened tournament play with an 82-40 win over Oconto.

"We had a tough run through the tournament and the season," Copp said. "We played a lot of good teams this year, so we felt we were ready for this, but you never know how it's going to go."

"This is exhausting, but this is what it's all for. It's great to see our community out here and Marathon. What a great atmosphere. This is what high school basketball's about."

Shawano hockey team to join GNC in 2027-28 season

The Shawano/Bonduel boys hockey team only has one more year of an independent schedule before joining the Great Northern Conference in 2027-28.

The WIAA board of control voted March 10 to approve Shawano's request to join the conference.

"We're excited about it," said Adam Gafner, Shawano/Bonduel head coach and president of the Shawano Hockey League. "There is a lot of value and purpose in joining a conference."

"This is 15 years in the making," he said. "We are finally in a conference we belong in."

"They voted based on what they thought was the best interests of their students," he said. "I understand that."

As conference members, the team can now compete for a conference title, and players can compete for conference awards, both of which are lacking when teams play an independent schedule.

The move could also generate some rivalries for the Hawks.

"We sort of have one now against Antigo," Gafner said. "We could develop one with Rhinelander, with even more over time."

Adding Shawano to the mix isn't the end of the realignment, though.

A fast-track application placing Merrill in the Great Northern Conference for boys hockey will be addressed by the WIAA board following the completion of the realignment process in April.

Merrill currently is part of a co-op team called East/Merrill United with Wausau East and Newman Catholic.

Next season, Merrill will have its own independent team.

Once the Panthers had the lead, they began milking the clock and ran off more than two minutes on one possession.

"I know this has been a debate for a couple of years now, but should we or shouldn't we have a shot clock," Hoffa said. "They started pulling it out with about 13 (minutes) to go when they were only up by 2 or 4. We talked about if we get down, that's exactly what's going to happen. Sure enough, that's what happened."

Another Brady basket cut Reedsville's lead to 45-41, but the Panthers closed the game with an 11-4 run and scored their last five points from the free-throw line after the Tigers needed to foul to get the ball back.

Brady scored 18 of Tigerton's 33 points in the first half and 10 of the team's 12 in the second half to finish with a game-high 28. Brody Miller added 10 points, but no other Tigerton player scored more than three.

Schwahn led the Panthers with 21 points, including five 3-pointers. Arden Strenn and Ben Prochnow also finished in double figures with 15 and 13 points, respectively.

Besides Brady, the Tigers' defensive effort also led to the win, Hoffa said.

"That defense is so

tough," he said. "(Wabeno/Laona) is guard-oriented, and they live and die by that 3. Kudos to these guys. They played awesome."

Although the season ended with a loss, Hoffa hopes his players will remember the most successful season in program history.

"It was a magical season for our boys, for the school, for the town," he said. "I can't be prouder of what we've done and accomplished. Unfortunately, we fell one short. Local deer hunting chapters counting on annual banquets

A statewide organization based in Shawano that wants to promote deer hunting and other outdoors-related activities is looking for new members and new chapters.

Chuck Dallas, of Shawano, is president of the Wisconsin Deer Hunters Inc. board of directors and is past president of the group's Shawano chapter.

"The old-timers, when they created this thing back in 1988, they were all involved in White-tails Unlimited, wild turkeys and all that," he said. "They were disappointed that they would work really hard as volunteers at these banquets and see the money leave the community."

Wisconsin Deer Hunters Inc. was originally known as Wisconsin Whitetails Inc. until a name change in 1998.

"Most of what our six chapters are doing is helping promote things within our own communities," Dallas said. "A lot of this is youth organizations, trying to get youths involved in shooting sports, hunting, fishing. It's kind of the same with veterans and disabled individuals. We're funding food pantries, homeless shelters, you name it. I think it's very impressive that the six chapters have given out over \$132,000 to their local communities."

Dallas said it's important for organizations like Wisconsin Deer Hunters to get new people interested and involved in the outdoors.

"In this area, we have trap-shooting teams at the high school level," he said. "We have shooting sports through 4-H."

The organization also provides financial support to Raised at Full Draw, a youth camp for hunters and bowhunters that has been held in Shawano

County since 2020.

Dallas said the six chapters include about 1,200 members. Four of those chapters are located in Shawano County.

Dallas is involved with the Shawano chapter's banquet and estimated about half of the organization's members are deer hunters.

"It's our major fundraiser for the year," he said. "Some (chapters) may have other events, but

this determines how much money we have to support the communities. It can be as high as 300 people and as low as 80."

Two of the chapters – Shawano and Woodland – are fewer than 20 miles apart, and several WDH members attend both banquets.

"Both of them are very successful with about 180 people showing up," Dallas said. "Back in the day, the old-timers had different thoughts on what the banquet should look like. We run things a little differently, and our banquets are about a month apart. We have some members that go to both, which is fine, but some that are just a member of

one (chapter) and not the other."

Raffle and door prizes such as firearms attract many people to each banquet.

"Some of us will bundle raffles so you can be in more at a cheaper cost," Dallas said. "There are youth guns, things for the ladies like apparel or jewelry."

The Shawano chapter has added exhibitors to its banquets.

For the most part, banquet attendees are WDH members.

"We'll have members come and go depending on what happens with family activities," Dallas said. "We have a fun activity where there's a gun (prize) for every table. We have round tables with eight people, so you have a one in eight chance of winning, and people love it."

Many of the raffle and door prizes are purchased at a discount, while others are donated.

"In Shawano, we moved to Scheels, and they supply us with guns all tied to a gift card," he said. "You win a \$500 gun, and you get a gift card that night. You can go get that gun within 10 days if you like, or you can buy anything you like in the store. Some of our chapters are still doing the registration right at the banquet, but the vendors we work with are pretty open. If you don't want this Ruger 10/22 that you just won, but you're shopping for a shotgun, come on down and we can work with you."

WDH is currently open to the idea of adding additional chapters throughout Wisconsin. A chapter in the Appleton area recently folded after running out of volunteers, and Dallas said ideal areas for new chapters include the Fox Valley, Madison, La Crosse and Eau Claire.

Trail advocate wins AARP statewide volunteer award

Matty Mathison has been selected to receive the 2025 AARP Wisconsin Andrus Award for Community Service.

AARP Wisconsin selected Mathison for the award based on her career of service, which has benefited her community, reflected AARP's vision and mission, and inspired others to volunteer.

As part of her award, Mathison could select an organization to receive

a \$1,000 donation from AARP. She will donate the entire amount to Shawano Pathways. An awards ceremony for her will be held in Shawano on March 31.

"I grew up in a small town where everyone helped everyone," Mathison said. "My parents taught all nine of their children to play fair, learn to share and show you care. I carry that motto yet today."

She recalls fondly how her involvement began with Shawano Pathways.

"When I was still coaching and teaching, Greg Sturm hounded me to join what would turn into Shawano Pathways," she said. "Friends of the Mountain Bay Trail-Shawano is an offshoot of that."

A resident of Shawano since 1969, Mathison, 79, taught health and physical education (and coached two state volleyball championship teams) at Shawano High School for 37 years before retiring and turning much of her time and attention to improving

the county's trails, pathways and parks.

Mathison said her family played outside all the time.

"I think that's where I gained my love for winter," she said. "Twenty-eight degrees and snowing is my favorite weather."

The family was one of 110 in her hometown.

"After we did our chores in the morning, we'd run outside," she said. "We were active in ballgames, skating, 4-H, church. If we came home before supper, we were given more chores, so we played outside as long as we could."

Because of all those outdoors activities, Mathison was one of the children who recruited others for team sports, a skill she continues to use to this day.

"I've been successful in recruiting people to help," she said. "We repaired 11 of the 20 bridges that cross the Mountain Bay Trail last year."

Mathison grew up watching her parents help others. That's the way it was in a small town.

"In 1984, a tornado hit my property causing lots of damage and the loss of 57 huge trees," she said. "Friends, neighbors and many Shawano people I didn't even know helped with the cleanup for days and days. Volunteering is my way of thanking this community and giving something back."

Mathison said she is honored to receive the award from AARP.

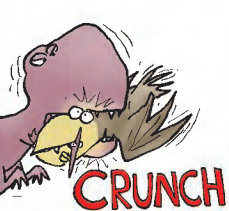
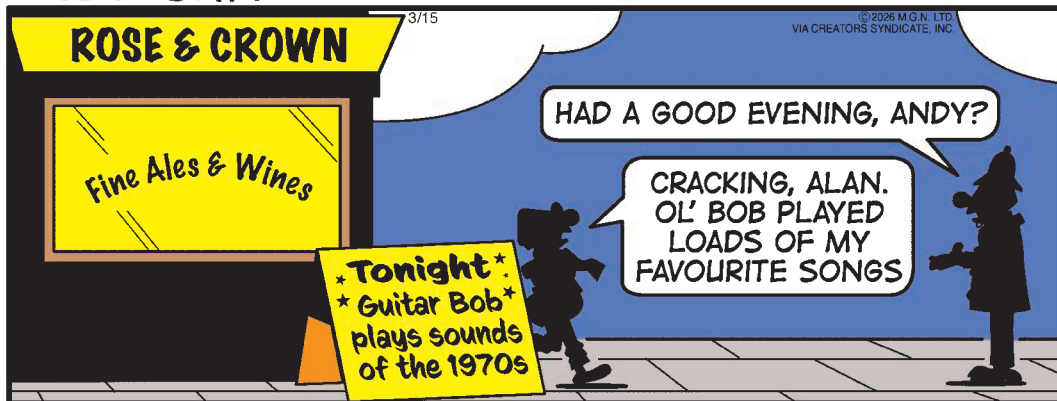
Additional Health Information	
Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10 ppm is a health risk for infants of less than 6 months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rainfall or agricultural activity. If you are caring for an infant you should ask advice from your health care provider. Females who are or may become pregnant should not consume water with nitrate concentrations that exceed 10 ppm. There is some evidence of an association between exposure to high nitrate levels in drinking water during the first weeks of pregnancy and certain birth defects. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services recommends people of all ages avoid long-term consumption of water that has nitrate level greater than 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L).	
Lead can cause serious health effects in people of all ages, especially pregnant people, infants (both formula-fed and breastfed), and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and parts used in service lines and in home plumbing. Wittenberg Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing in your home. Because lead levels may vary over time, lead exposure is possible even when your tap sampling results do not detect lead at one point in time. You can help protect yourself and your family by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Using a filter, certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead, is effective in reducing lead exposures. Follow the instructions provided with the filter to ensure the filter is used properly. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and making baby formula. Boiling water does not remove lead from water. Before using tap water for drinking, cooking, or making baby formula, flush your pipes for several minutes. You can do this by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. If you have a lead service line or galvanized requiring replacement service line, you may need to flush your pipes for a longer period. 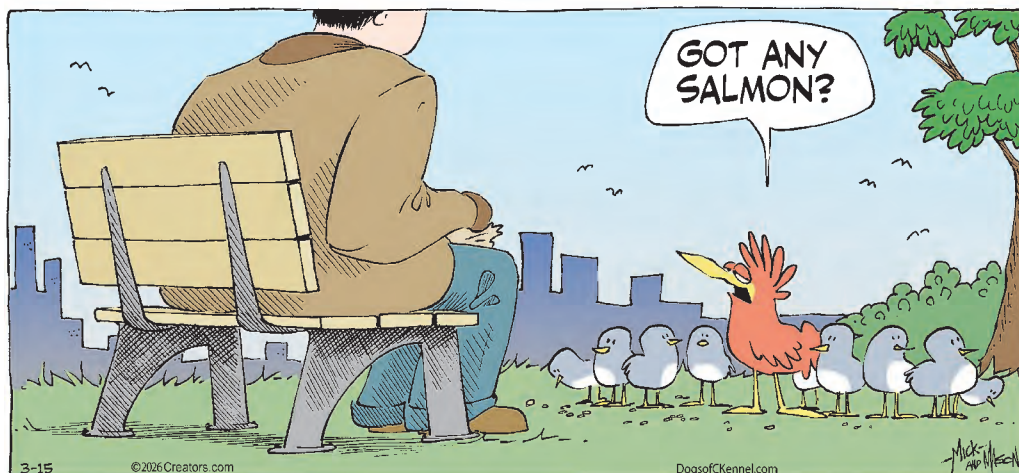
