Incumbents keep seats on county board

Four Shawano County Board supervisors turned back challengers in the April 7 election.

District 9 incumbent Ken Capelle defeated challenger Charles Fritsch 187-157.

In District 14, incumbent Matt Pleshek defeated challenger Timothy Novitski 188-109.

District 20 incumbent Rick Giese beat back a challenge from Roy Martin, 277-87.

Also, District 25 incumbent Dennis Knaak defeated challenger Steven Steinke 184-97.

In District 2, in which incumbent Heather Pahl did not run, Collin Pomplun received 145 votes. Aaron Gilling, running as a write-in, did not receive any votes.

In District 5, vacated by Curtis Naja's decision not to run, did not have a candidate on the ballot or an official write-in candidate. However, Charles Anderson received four write-in votes.

District 7 incumbent Jeremy Gretzinger won another term with 14 write-in votes. Initially not seeking another term, neither he nor anyone else was on the ballot, but he later opted to run as an official write-in.

District 22 also had no candidates on the ballot as incumbent Michael Trunk did not run. James Radtke ran as an official write-in and received 59 votes.

In Cecil, Steve Bartz, Casper Wallrich and Mark Hendricks won trustee seats with 97, 87 and 83 votes respectively. Pat Westcott placed fourth with 73 votes.

Tigerton voters favored Shawn Much, Jeff Koepke, and Stephanie Dobrinska for trustee positions. They garnered 120, 105 and 81 votes, respectively. Jessica Hammons collected 77 votes in her losing bid.

In the Antigo School Board race, Mike Parizek, Daniel Nicholson and Bobbie Braun won in Shawano County, with Christina Grant, Dawn M. McCann and Jean Adams losing. Overall, it was Parizek, Nicholson and Adams claiming seats on the board.

In the Bonduel School District, Greg Borowski defeated Nina Rouse 649-596.

Representing the Stockbridge-Munsee Community in the Bowler School District will be Roberta Carrington, who defeated Chenoa Martin 250-178.

In the Clintonville School District, David Battenberg and Laurie Volrath won in Shawano County, but both lost overall. The winners were Jason L. Moder and Glen Drew Lundt.

Ingold murder trial underway

The trial of Michael Ingold, charged with the 2022 murder of his girlfriend, started April 8 with the state painting the Shawano man as someone so sick of her physical and financial issues that he decided to kill her.

Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker gave his opening statement on why Ingold should be in prison for the first-degree homicide of Sheila Laudon. Parker said that when Ingold contacted dispatchers about Laudon's death, he was claiming she had health issues due to weighing 285 pounds, smoking and taking a lot of medications.

Ingold allegedly said that Laudon drank two beers and two wine coolers the night before her death, and that he had woken up at 2:30 a.m. June 25, 2022, to find Laudon in the kitchen and very much alive. He allegedly said he woke up again on the couch in the living room after 4 a.m. and found his girlfriend dead and cold to the touch, according to Parker.

The district attorney said the medical examiner's report told a different story, with a finding of death by strangulation. Parker noted that deputies who were helping the coroner to put Laudon in a body bag noted that force was necessary because rigor mortis was setting in.

"Some of his findings that were

significant with respect to the cause of death were that there were hemorrhages in two areas of her neck, petechial hemorrhages to her right eye and her left eyelid," Parker said.

Parker said he would be calling witnesses who heard Ingold claim that he was "going to kill" Laudon. Among them was a paralegal who allegedly heard Ingold say there was a life insurance policy and that he used a comforter to kill Laudon to avoid any ligature marks on the body.

Parker noted that a witness claimed Ingold "was irritated with Sheila, started complaining about her, saying that she was a fat bitch and that she was spending all of his money."

The prosecution has the burden to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that Ingold killed his girlfriend, and Parker expressed confidence that his office has a strong case.

"We believe, after all of the evidence you hear in this case, that we'll be able to find that Michael Ingold caused the death of Sheila Laudon and that he also intended to kill her," Parker said.

Albert Moustakis, Ingold's attorney, said Laudon's story is going to be front and center through various witnesses that medical experts, neighbors and others would vindicate his client and lead to a not-guilty verdict by the jury by the time the trial ends.

"There is a witness that wasn't talked about (by prosecutors), and this witness is going to be giving you information throughout the entire trial, and that's Sheila," Moustakis said. "She's going to talk to you through the eyes of the other witnesses, and she's going to talk to you through the medical records. She's going to talk to you through the autopsy."

Moustakis noted that there's an amended autopsy report dated April 7 of this year indicating that the marks on Laudon's neck were likely caused by a scalpel when the autopsy was conducted, even though the legal cause of death remained strangulation and suffocation.

Laudon's medical records show a history of health problems, according to Moustakis, and neighbors are expected to testify about her health condition in the days prior to her death. He said Laudon had about 16 different prescriptions strewn through the home she and Ingold shared.

A conversation between Ingold and a neighbor will indicate that Ingold expressed concern about Laudon's health the day before her death and that "she looked so unwell, he wanted to take her to a hospital."

The medical records include reports that she'd made complaints about chest

Panel urged not to forget about library needs

Fundraising, site, floor plans discussed

Last month, Shawano County supervisors approved a maximum of \$121 million that could be borrowed to build a new courthouse, jail housing pod and jail auxiliary services.

While the construction of a new public library was not part of the building plan, some supervisors urged their colleagues not to forget about the needs of the library, housed at 128 S. Sawyer St.

Kurt Berner, of The Samuels Group, reminded members of the public property committee April 8 that the library plans should continue to move forward.

In March, library board members met with a fundraising campaign manager to discuss funding options

for a new library. Among the recommendations was to conduct a feasibility study to fund part of the project. The cost would be between \$25,000 and \$40,000.

"The feasibility study is basically identifying within the community what it looks like for potential donors to donate or fundraise for the library project," Berner said. "He suggested that a 24-month period for that fundraising effort would be realistic."

If the county wants to keep the library component moving forward, Berner suggested hiring a consultant to conduct this study. Then, he said a site would need to be determined.

The Genex building at East Green Bay and South Sawyer streets will be on the market April 16, which may be too soon for the county to act on.

Berner said earlier this year the site would be large enough for ample parking and a small building addition.

Another option is to build in the current library parking lot, then raze the existing library for use as a parking lot. This could also entail purchasing some properties south of the library, because Berner said he is concerned that the parking lot would be a tight fit for the new library.

Venture Architects would develop a floor plan and building elevations that would be used in conjunction with the capital campaign, Berner said.

"What you will need is that when (finance director) Nichole (Zuehl) goes to apply for grants for that, in order for those grants to be awarded, you would have to have a shovel-ready project," he said.

By the end of those 24 months, donations and grant monies would be determined, and officials would know how much money county taxpayers would have to put up to finish the project.

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Council approves \$30K in bids for sidewalks

The city of Shawano has about 41 miles of sidewalk, and there's only so much that can be fixed in a single year. This year, however, the city will be able to make improvements in more areas than usual.

The Shawano Common Council voted unanimously April 8 to accept a bid from Sommers Construction Company, based in Shiocton, but the motion also included working with Safe Step LLC from Hortonville to saw down

buckling sidewalk segments instead of replacing them this year or putting them on a waitlist.

The city had budgeted \$30,000 for sidewalk replacement this year, but Sommers was the low bid with \$28,000. With Safe Step asking for \$10,000 for the sidewalk milling, that would have put the total expenses at \$38,000. Public works director Mike Mahloch worked with the two companies and got Sommers to shave off \$6,000 from its bid and Safe Step \$2,000.

"This is another annual

program we do," Mahloch said. "There's a company we've been working with, Safe Step, that does sidewalk grinding. We did this process last year through the downtown area. So any sidewalks that have shifted, they're not at the point of needing replacement, but if there's a trip hazard, we will grind those trip hazards down. It's a way to spruce up your sidewalks without spending the full amount for replacement. It's more convenient, and you get a lot more done."

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No Mow May now permanent in Shawano

Council ends review of program

A program set up four years ago to help with pollinators is now a permanent part of the city of Shawano after the Shawano Common Council voted April 8 to hold No Mow May indefinitely.

The initiative was originally suggested in 2022 by Alderman Kevin Barkow. He had learned about a similar program in place in Appleton, which saw three times as many bees in the area with No Mow May than before. It protects pollinators during a critical period of emergence and survival, while providing a habitat for those pollinators in early spring foraging.

May tends to be a time when more flowers bloom, Barkow noted four years ago, so allowing homeowners to leave their grass to grow during that month would avoid disruption as bees, butterflies and others

that help to pollinate plant life can provide a better ecosystem.

The initiative came shortly after the city had voted to increase citation amounts for property owners who didn't maintain their lawns during the other months of the year. At the time, the council had decided to have an annual resolution about the matter in the event that the city decided not to participate in the program one year.

Concerns were raised in 2024 about whether the program was making a difference, with some on the council noting there weren't any studies out there that indicated whether No Mow May was actually making a difference. However, the council agreed to give it one more year in 2025.

Fast forward to 2026, and Barkow recommended that, instead of continuing to bring No Mow May back year after year, they make it a permanent initiative in Shawano. The move allows property owners to voluntarily take part, and the city agrees not to cite property owners whose grass is

growing haphazardly.

"Is this something that communities are still doing?" Mayor Bruce Milavitz said. "Are you interested in it?"

Barkow said he wanted to see the program continue and felt that, after four years, it was unnecessary to annually review whether the city wanted to continue.

Public works director Mike Mahloch said there were not any issues his department dealt with in May, but he noted that some property owners decide to extend the lack of mowing into June, and that's when problems come up. No Mow May only suspends mowing rules from May 1-31.

"People are complaining because neighbors have done the No Mow May and then, after that, they still haven't mowed," Mahloch said. "It has not been that big of an issue."

The vote does not prevent the council from ever reexamining the issue, but it ends bringing up the matter every spring.

On a normal day when the shelter closes and the lights go down, the animals inside are still awake. What happens overnight is often witnessed through cameras in the humane society.

Many dogs and cats sit quietly for hours, staring toward the door, waiting for someone to walk through it.

They wait for footsteps in the hallway; they wait for

voice they recognize.

Many of the animals pace their kennels over and over again.

Some become so overwhelmed with stress that they become physically sick. They are frightened, confused and trying to cope.

Cats often meow throughout the night.

“We currently have eight people committed to spending the night and are

prepared to host up to 12 participants,” Kelliher said. “Volunteers are actively working to secure donations for food, drinks and other needs to help make the event a success.”

Residents can support the slumber pawty through monetary donations; meals for participants and staff; donations of prizes, merchandise or giveaways; and in-kind donations for the shelter.

Davel cleared of wrongdoing in Kronenwetter

Workplace allegations continue to dog Jim Davel, former Shawano County administrative coordinator.

Kronenwetter officials announced on the village Facebook page March 31 that an outside investigator cleared Davel of any wrongdoing based on a workplace allegation there. No details were provided.

“The investigator has now finished his review and, although the specific findings are subject to the attorney-client privilege, the Village Administrator was cleared of any wrongdoing,” according to the social media post. “The Village is looking forward to putting this matter

behind it so it can continue to focus on improving the community and addressing its taxpayers’ interests. If the Village is able to share more information in the future, it will do so.”

Davel, who resigned from Shawano County in fall 2025, was hired to be the new village administrator in Kronenwetter in Marathon County effective Nov. 3. During his last year with Shawano County, Davel and others were repeatedly involved in public debate over allegations of workplace behavior, missing funds and ethics violations with then-Supervisor Lowel Hammett.

Any ethics complaints against Davel were never publicly verified, as the ethics committee usually met in closed session. However, a letter from a former employee to the county’s human resources department accused Davel of “unprofessional and inappropriate behavior.”

Davel’s ethics complaints against Hammett were aired in open session. Hammett was eventually found guilty of violating the county ethics code; while he was removed from his position on the ethics committee, a vote to remove him from the county board failed.

Detectives can't find missing man

The case of a missing Marion man continues to be investigated by the Shawano County Sheriff's Department, but officials are not having any luck with new leads.

"The Jason Bell case is still very much active," said Detective Brad Schultz. "As of right now, I do not have any new leads to share."

Bell was 48 when he was

reported missing by family members on the evening of Oct. 22, 2024.

Bell was last seen at home Oct. 8, 2024, but the last ping of his phone was on Oct. 10, 2024, away from his home on Stony Hill Road. Bell is white, has hazel eyes, is 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighs 215 pounds.

The sheriff's department does not believe Bell had any means of travel. He has friends and family

in the Fox Lake area, as well as Henderson, Nevada.

"We would, as always, welcome any new tips from the public to assist us in locating Jason and bringing some answers to his family," Schultz said.

Communication rates decline for inmates

Inmate welfare fund revenue to drop \$8,000 per month

Inmates at the Shawano County Jail are now paying less for communicating with friends and family members.

Rates were decreased April 1 in accordance with the federal Martha Wright-Reed Act. While the news may be good for inmates, Shawano County officials said the local inmate welfare fund will take a substantial hit because of the lower rates.

"Revenue from the communications system assisted with offsetting costs back to the inmate welfare — for example, mental health counselors, hygiene items, uniforms, mattresses, etc.," said Troy Beyer, jail

administrator. "The jail will still receive revenue from the inmate commissary program to assist with the inmate welfare revenue. However, the jail will not receive the same of amount of revenue prior to the Martha Wright-Reed Act."

The loss of revenue will total about \$8,000 per month, Beyer said.

How that shortfall will be made up or how services will be affected has yet to be determined.

Previously, inmates paid 16 cents per minute for emails and texts, 21 cents per minute for phone calls and 39 cents per minute for video visitation.

"Rates are now 13 cents per minute for all communication (phone calls, emails, texts) and 21 cents per minute for video visits," Beyer said.

The jail receives 2 cents per minute to be used for supervision, security and infrastructure of the inmate communication system. The

remaining amount is charged by the vendors for them to operate the services.

Inmates use kiosks and tablets to communicate with friends and family. Phone calls with attorneys remain free of charge.

The Martha Wright-Reed Act was approved by Congress and the Senate with broad bipartisan support before being signed into law by President Joe Biden on Jan. 5, 2023.

Because the bill was passed using procedures for non-controversial legislation, there was no recorded roll-call vote listing individual "yea" or "nay" votes for each member of Congress.

In the Senate, the bill was passed by unanimous consent, which means no senator present objected to its passage.

In the House of Representatives, the bill passed on a voice vote.

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Uniform muskie season will take effect this year

Will anglers head to the northern half of Wisconsin – including Shawano and Oconto counties – to fish for muskies almost a month before the previous season opener? That remains to be seen, but anglers will be able to target muskies in the Northern Zone on May 2 instead of waiting until the last Saturday of May. The season will end Dec. 31.

Currently, the state is divided into Northern and Southern muskie zones. The dividing line is U.S. Highway 10, which runs from Prescott on the Wisconsin/Minnesota border to Manitowoc. The change creates a uniform state-wide season.

“Anytime we can simplify regulations, that’s definitely a positive,” said Jordan Weeks, a member of the DNR’s muskie management team. “Making things easier for folks is something we’re definitely interested in. We’re not going to make something simple just to make it simple. It has to make sense biologically as well, and this really does.”

Weeks isn’t sure how many anglers will take advantage of the opportunity and said the DNR will come out with more information on the change before the season gets underway.



The Northern Zone muskie season will begin May 2 instead of the Saturday before Memorial Day. That means muskies like this one from Sawyer County’s Round Lake can be targeted in Shawano and Oconto County waters in early May instead of at the end of the month.

According to the DNR, Shawano County’s muskie waters include Grass, Lower Red, Pine, Round, Shawano and Upper Red lakes; Wolf River Pond; and a 22-mile stretch of the Wolf River below the Shawano Dam. Oconto County’s muskie waters include Anderson, Archibald, Bear, Boot, Munger, Waubee and White Potato lakes; Chute Pond; and Caldron Falls Reservoir.

A DNR muskie

management plan for the state that came out in 1979 listed harvest as a major concern at the time, Weeks said. “They wanted to shorten the amount of time that people could fish for muskies,” he said. “At that time, they projected the harvest was 66,700 muskies a year. Back then, almost every muskie went home.” That’s not the case anymore, as very few muskies are harvested, because the

vast majority of anglers release any fish they catch. Muskies will not begin spawning on a water body covered in ice, Weeks said. “It really depends on weather and lake and river conditions,” he said. “Their peak spawn time is (a water temperature of) 50 degrees. It usually starts around 50 (degrees) and you could see spawning through 60.” Spawning areas in rivers include backwaters, islands and current breaks,

while areas in lakes and reservoirs include creek inlets and shallow bays with vegetation. Weeks said the DNR doesn’t anticipate the change to have a negative impact on muskie populations. “If we did, we wouldn’t have put it forward as an advisory question,” he said. “We will continue to monitor these populations, and if we discover that there are reasons to change again or get rid of

this rule, we would certainly do that. We want to make all of our decisions using data. We’d rather use data than feelings, because you can’t really defend feelings, but we can defend our data collection. That’s where we hang our hat.” The change will not be in place for Green Bay’s spotted muskie fishery, which will keep its season opener on the last Saturday of May. “Originally, we included that in our advisory question, but in talks with the Michigan DNR and our Eastern District fisheries folks, they said it was not going to be feasible to open that up,” Weeks said. “That is different than northern Wisconsin and is actually a restoration project.” Wisconsin’s muskie population is in good shape, according to Weeks. “The number of big fish – 45 inches and larger – is increasing over time,” he said. “That’s our inland and Great Lakes fisheries. Our average length, while it’s not super-large, has been increasing over time, about 2 inches over the last 20 years from 36.7 inches up to 38, 39 inches. “Across the board, fishing is better than it has ever been. We have more lakes with muskies, we have larger fish and fewer fish are being harvested, which are all positives when you consider a fishery.”

‘Harvey’ helps characters deal with an unseen friend

Show about eccentric man with invisible rabbit for a friend arrives at Mielke

There will be plenty of actors on stage when “Harvey” debuts April 17 at the Mielke Arts Center, but the runaway star could be what the audience doesn’t see.

The play, written by Mary Chase in 1944, follows an eccentric man named Elwood P. Dowd who claims to have a friend named Harvey. The 6-foot, 3½-inch púca, a benign yet mischievous creature based in Celtic lore, takes on the form of an anthropomorphic rabbit that nobody can see — except for Elwood.

His friends are accepting of Harvey’s existence, but his family members are not — including his older sister, Veta Louise Simmons, and niece, Myrtle Mae Simmons, who have become social outcasts due to Elwood’s oddities.

After a high society party is ruined by Elwood’s insistence on introducing Harvey to everyone, Veta and Myrtle Mae decide to have Elwood committed to a sanitarium because, after all, what sane person would claim there’s an invisible rabbit that’s as tall as a human?

However, the commitment becomes more difficult than anticipated when Veta claims that she has seen Harvey, too, and is committed in lieu of Elwood, who wanders off to drink with his friends in town.

First-time director Jennifer Maglio said the classic tale was a perfect one for her to direct, and the last time the Box in the Wood Theater Guild brought “Harvey” to life was back in 2012.

“They wanted to do ‘Harvey’ because, obviously, a play with a giant invisible rabbit seems a little bit Easter-y,” Maglio said. “It was a good choice for spring.”

However, “Harvey” was also pitched by Maglio to the guild because it’s one of her favorite plays. She noted that she’s read the play several hundred times and seen the 1950 film starring Jimmy Stewart

dozens of times.

Every day in my chiropractic practice, I talk with patients about moving more and moving better. The reason is simple —

physical inactivity is hurting and even killing us.

It leads to at least 250,000 deaths annually in the United States, as over half of Americans fail to meet recommended physical activity levels. Shockingly,

therisk of heart disease from being inactive is about the same as smoking cigarettes.

Regular physical activity decreases total mortality rates as well as the incidence and mortality from cardiovascular disease, diabetes and some cancers. It improves control of diabetes, hypertension and lipid levels; decreases the risk of cardiovascular events; helps prevent osteoporosis; and, especially in older patients, sustains mobility, reduces disability and decreases the risk of falls.

A study of aerobic exercise, also called cardio exercise, found that patients who perform aerobic exercise receive significantly fewer pain medication prescriptions. This study also found that aerobic exercise is a safe therapy for patients with chronic low back pain. General exercise is also associated with less neck pain.

Guidelines for adults suggest weekly targets for aerobic activity, muscle strengthening activity and stretching activities. Most efforts can be focused on moderate-to-vigorous intensity physical activity. The minimum weekly moderate-to-vigorous intensity physical activity target for adults is 150 minutes for the week. This translates to 30 minutes per day, five days per week.

A person has achieved a moderate intensity if they can talk, but cannot sing while performing that activity, and vigorous intensity if they cannot say more than a few words without pausing for breath.

Before starting any new physical activity, consult with your doctor. Once you have clearance to begin your new plan, here are some helpful tips for getting started:

- Do what you enjoy. Figure out what type of exercise or activities you’re most likely to do (e.g., walking, bicycling, running or swimming). Think about when and how you’d be most likely to follow through.

- Set reasonable goals. You don’t have to train for a marathon. Walk around the block the first day. Then try to do a little more each day. Within a short time, you will have made significant progress toward your goal.

- Go easy on yourself. You might not be able to handle a lot of exercise at first, so start small and increase your activity gradually. Remember to thoroughly warm up and cool down before each exercise session.

- Make it social. Try to find a friend with whom you can exercise. This will give you a little extra motivation to stick with your exercise routine.

- Go outside. A little spring sunshine and fresh air can enhance your mood.

The most important tip? Don’t give up — be consistent and persistent.

everyone great, but his best friend is a 6-foot invisible rabbit who is driving his family crazy," she said. "The decision has to be made — do you institutionalize him because of it, despite the fact that he's a wonderful person?"

An interesting piece of trivia that Maglio noted was that Jimmy Stewart played Elwood four times. He wasn't Elwood when the play first debuted on Broadway in 1944, but he filled in for the original actor for six weeks. After his film portrayal in 1950, he played Elwood in the Broadway revival in the 1970s, as well as a made-for-television movie in 1972.

"It's really pretty funny, because you can see pictures of him playing Elwood from a young man to an older, gray-haired man so many times over the years," Maglio said.

It's the whimsy of the show that makes it a favorite for the director, who was wearing rabbit ears at one rehearsal.

"It's very much a warm

cocoa play," Maglio said. "It's very comforting, it's very fun, but it's also touching. It's also surprisingly deep. There are things that we had debated for this play that we just don't think about, like is Elwood the main character of the play? I have argued he is not."

Maglio said the play, in her view, is more of a critique on Elwood's sister, Veta. She noted that Veta goes through more a change over the course of the show, while Elwood remains very much the same.

Alex Konen, who is portraying Elwood for Box in the Wood, has a slightly different take on who the main character is. He believes it's Harvey himself, even though there's no stage time or lines for Elwood's buddy.

"I've gone and seen other productions, and I've directed the show once myself," Konen said. "Harvey is the main character, but no one actually sees or hears Harvey. It's more of a catalyst with all of the other problems. All of Veta's problems

are because of my association with my friend, and all of Myrtle Mae's problems are because of my association with my friend, and then the doctors have problems because of Elwood's association with Harvey."

Konen said his mother worked as a stage manager when he was in elementary school, and the performance "Harvey" gave him a lot of time backstage to be able to experience what theater was like. Today, the English teacher also teaches theater and produces shows at Shawano Community High School.

"My principal was actually Elwood P. Dowd, which was a really cool thing in the sense of, 'Hey, there's a guy you wouldn't think did theater, but he's up there doing a part and doing a decent job of it,'" Konen said. "I think part of it was the magic of theater, as well. Even though I was backstage, I saw how it all unfolded and creates that story. It's something that's always stuck with me."

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Timing everything during spring turkey season

Timing is everything. For example, writing an every-other-week outdoors column can get tricky with hunting and fishing seasons, state and county meetings and providing enough advance notice for readers to react without giving them too much notice so they forget.

Hopefully you were able to buy a bonus turkey license or two if you either forgot about the Dec. 10 initial application deadline (in today's computer age, this is still a silly and random deadline) or if you just wanted a few extra chances at a gobbler.

Because I always buy a patron license, I am applying for a 2027 turkey tag when most of you are checking your mail for one of those yellow DNR postcards that signal you drew a 2026 tag. This is one nice feature of buying a patron license, which includes most hunting, fishing and trapping licenses, stamps and even a state parks admission sticker voucher.

I usually apply for season C (April 29 through May 5 this year), and that's what I got in the drawing. I also bought a bonus tag for season D (May 6-12), because getting a bird with

one tag is never a sure thing (the more tags, the better, in theory).

Then again, timing is everything. In 2018, when I luckily avoided the earlier seasons, Mother Nature dumped a weekend blizzard on us April 13-15, with up to 35 inches of snow in some areas (Green Bay had about 2 feet).

Turkeys don't go indoors, of course, but many

of those early-season hunters found conditions more like late deer season.

Trying to fool a tom by imitating the calls of a hen is the game in spring, when only bearded birds (adult gobblers, jakes or even bearded hens) can be harvested.

After about 40 years of turkey hunting in two states, I'm a better-than-average caller, especially with a diaphragm call, but my Old Trusty box call (usually my made-in-Davenport Ol' Hess) works just fine. Never forget that turkeys are birds and their

brains are tiny, but their eyes are sharp, so keep movement to a minimum. Ground blinds are great for turkey hunting, especially if you have young or new hunters with you who are sure to fidget.

Some gobblers come in readily to calling while others come in silently. In nature, the hens typically come to the strutting toms, so it takes persistence to wait out a gobbler that may initially gobble, then hang up out of range.

I know several successful hunters, including my older brother,

Brian, who never use a decoy, but I think decoys do work most of the time. If you can add real feathers to your decoy, or even bring a mounted bird afield, go for it. Just be sure to carry your decoys in an orange or camo bag so some careless hunter doesn't take a pot shot at you as you walk through the woods.

Speaking of safety, never wear red, white or blue while turkey hunting, because these are the colors of a tom. Tuck your bird in an orange bag when you carry it out (the same as the one used for decoys). My friend, Darrell Bartell, of Flatline Your Bird Decoys makes a dandy turkey carrier from heavy orange rope and a pool noodle that I hope to try this season.

I've never been a morning person, but turkey hunting is almost always best in the first few hours of the day. In some states, it's even illegal to hunt them in the afternoon, which is crazy.

I have a hard time sitting much past 10 a.m. After the birds fly down from their roosts and head for open cornfields and pastures for early breakfast prior to 8 a.m., I've noticed that a second wave of turkeys sometimes shows up around 9 or later. Late sleepers? Distant visitors? It's hard to say.

I almost never hunt the

afternoons, mainly because they don't seem to call much after 10 a.m.

If I could sit all day in my blind, I'm sure I could increase my success rate, but when it stops being fun, it's time to go home. I don't love wild turkey meat much anyway (all that running and flying makes wild birds much tougher than the fat barnyard variety), so just seeing and hearing turkeys is most of the fun. Time in the woods is time to think, unwind and bask in the calls of spring warblers and the welcome sight of blossoming trees and flowers.

Be sure to share your hunting knowledge with a new hunter this season. There are plenty of kids and even older folks who may not have a place to hunt. You can call or otherwise mentor for a young hunter as long as they have a valid tag.

Snowstorm morphing into blizzard created havoc

The snow on either side of the trail I was traversing was higher than my four-wheeler. My husband, bound and determined to open a path to reach our sap totes and pickle barrels, had gotten the skidder buried in the drifts.

I'd advised him not to undertake this thing, thinking it was too hard, too much snow. Everything was covered. He couldn't be swayed, convinced he could get to our totes. Resignedly sending him off then, he'd advised me to stay close to my cell.

"Just in case," says he.

A few days before, snowstorm Elsa had morphed into blizzard status. I had never ever seen so much snow. A week before, we had spotted robins and every inch of our lawn. Now everything was blanketed like an unblemished, white linen tablecloth. Where do the robins go?

Our trail cam had caught pictures of deer struggling to walk with snow up to their bellies. Going down the trail that day, three of them were standing in the lane not 15 yards from me. Approaching them slowly, they looked back and twitching their ears as if to say, "Thank you," darted ahead of me, staying on the trail. They could run.

Watching them whisk away, their white tails high above their back — as if frolicking — made me laugh out right loud, forgetting for a moment exactly what I was there for.

Driving up to him, we hooked the four-wheeler's winch to the arm of the skidder. Easing back to take up the slack, I put my foot on the brake and ran the line

in. Slowly, slowly the skidder moved out of its white tomb and got upright on solid ground.

Thumbs up, he sent me on my way.

Getting home, I'd barely hung up my outer clothes. Turning to go into the kitchen, my cell phone jangled. I didn't even want to look.

"I'm stuck again. Sorry."

This man has the patience of Job to accomplish something he sets his mind to do. How could I get mad, although I admit I was. Praying all the way down there, I asked God to give me a gracious spirit.

"Father, You grant me grace and mercy every single day. Help me to be gracious to

him."

Greeting him with a smile when he expected a frown, he must have thought I'd lost my marbles, but it made the work easier.

We tried the same tactic and this time the skidder didn't budge. He'd give it gas and it just slid sideways, moving in the opposite direction. Finally, admitting defeat, he took the four-wheeler back to the farm to retrieve the tractor, leaving me behind, waiting in the skidder for him to return.

While I was up there by myself, it dawned on me that weeks before when we'd started collecting sap, we were walking on dried leaves and twigs and watching bugs scurry. Oh, what a difference two days can make.

Back during the brunt of the storm we'd had to feed our animals housed here two big square hay bales, weighing

approximately 1,000 pounds and with a 3 feet by 3 feet by 8 feet berth. We had them stored in our barn mow for emergency feed. My husband maneuvered those monstrosities out of the mow, down the snow-covered barn hill and plowed yard, and over to both pens of animals.

Our skidder is a piece of machinery that is extremely versatile. My husband also uses it to plow snow, clean barns, feed animals, pick rocks and poke into round soybean or cornstalk bales used for bedding. With different bucket

attachments, it handles just about every job we throw at it.

Now apparently handling a new job — forging a trail through our woods to continue our sapping journey.

So that day my husband backed the tractor up to where I was waiting in the skidder. Hooking the chain up to the bar, I got instructions.

"It might give you a jolt, and drive forward as soon as I start pulling."

For over 40 years I've accomplished jobs with my husband that I thought seemingly impossible and highly uncomfortable. This was right up there near the top of the list. We had to hook up twice and — yes, a jolt is an apt description of what happened — but he got me out.

All told, it took him 2 1/2 full days of sheer grit and determination, but he got it opened up — close to a half-mile. I'd be remiss if I didn't commend my husband on this. If it were up to me, we'd have closed up shop due to snowdrifts up to our waist in the woods, cut our losses and called it a day. His optimism and can-do attitude has garnered us the best sap harvest we've ever had, and at this writing, we're not done yet. I'm very proud of him and told him so.

We've seen it all — and so far endured — during this year's sap collection.

Even through snowstorm Elsa. ("The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in mercy." Psalm 103:8, New International Version)

Dispose of unused medicines during Drug Take Back Day

The semiannual Drug Take Back Day will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 25.

Residents with unused or expired drugs can take them to a variety of drop-off sites for safe disposal.

"We'll have three location that they can come and drive up and give us your prescription medicine," Shawano County Sheriff George Lenzner said. "It's very important to get those off the street, out of the house so that they're not misused or flushed down the toilet, which can be bad for the environment."

Officers will set up at the Bonduel Police Department, 205 S. First St., Bonduel; Stockbridge-Munsee Public

Safety, W1344 Camp 14 Road, Bowler; and Siga Funmaker Community Center, W17634 Radke Road, Wittenberg.

"We collect about 600 pounds of prescription meds every six months," Lenzner said about the medicines collected during the Drug Take Back Days and at the permanent drop-off locations.

The collected medicines are taken to Wausau for disposal.

Permanent sites are at the Stockbridge-Munsee Health and Wellness Center, Shawano County Sheriff's Department, ThedaCare-Shawano and the Bonduel Police Department.

Lenzner said he's amazed at what is dropped off by residents.

"It's amazing when we see some of the stuff that is so expensive," he said. "I wish it could be reused."

"Some of it's not even opened; it's not out of date," added Chief Deputy Ty Raddant.

Needles are not supposed to be turned in at either the temporary or permanent drop-off sites.

"We're not supposed to take needles, but people still put them in there," Lenzner said. "We do dispose of them."

People have been known to put other things in the drop-off boxes. Lenzner has seen bottles of shampoo and pill bottles filled with baby teeth.

"That's why we glove up before we open that thing," he said of the disposal boxes.

pressure and also that she drank heavily, according to Moustakis. He noted that the blood-alcohol level for Laudon at the time of her death was 0.144, almost twice the legal limit for being able to operate a vehicle. He said witnesses would testify that Laudon had even stopped doing simple tasks the week before she died.

Other diagnoses through the medical reports also indicate she had high blood pressure, sleep issues and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, something primarily caused by long-term exposure to irritants like cigarette smoking and air pollution.

Moustakis told the jury that Ingold, who works several hours away from Shawano as a truck driver five days a week, was co-operative when deputies from the Shawano County Sheriff’s Department arrived after he called

dispatch about Laudon’s death. Ingold supposedly told deputies to go inside the home and take whatever they needed, according to his attorney.

“Michael cooperated fully with the police,” Moustakis said. “He allowed entry. He allowed searches. He talked to them whenever they wanted to talk to him. He even talked to them after they arrested him. His interviews are going to show that he consistently denied harming Sheila or having anything to do with her death. He even offered to take a lie detector test. The evidence will show that more than once.”

Moustakis claimed that a deputy’s body camera shows a report being filled out and initially indicated Laudon’s health was good but later changed to poor. He said the deputy also indicated in the initial report that Laudon appeared to have died from natural

causes. Other testimony expected to be addressed includes the comforter that prosecutors claim was used to strangle Laudon. Moustakis said that crime scene photos indicate the comforter was being held in Laudon’s left hand, and there is expected to be testimony that nothing seemed out of place at the time law enforcement was documenting the scene.

“The evidence that you’re going to see in this case, at the conclusion of this case, I’m going to ask that you find Michael Ingold not guilty because the state will not have met its burden,” Moustakis said. “There will be a reasonable explanation based on the evidence that you hear and see during the course of the trial that will prove his innocence.”

The trial is expected to continue until April 30.
