Ball of the Badge planners form nonprofit

Behind the Badge hopes to help organizations that aid first responders

Most of the original organizers of the annual Ball of the Badges have formed a new nonprofit organization to keep the local celebration of first responders going strong.

Behind the Badge Inc. will be a supporting mechanism for law enforcement, fire departments, ambulance services and other agencies that respond when tragedy strikes in the community. The organization officially formed in April, and the hope is that it can go beyond the ball when it comes to helping those who help local people.

Previously, organizers like Jody Johnson and Kayla Williams had worked with Safe Haven in Shawano to set up an event that would honor first responders. Williams said the original idea had been to hold a cookout, but then it shifted to holding a gala that allowed first responders a night of fun and celebration, as well as award outstanding people in their fields.

“The idea came about – why don’t we make it something bigger?” Williams said. “What if we did a formal event? Shawano County does not have a formal event. The closest formal event we had was when Dollars for Scholars did their gala.”

There was apprehension about doing the ball at first, as Shawano County tends to be more laid back and casual, Williams said. However, that first year exceeded expectations and momentum is still going strong today.

“The buzz about becoming a nonprofit started in year two,” when COVID-19 derailed plans for the ball and hundreds of other local events in 2020, Williams said. “We wanted to continue it for a handful of years to make sure we were solid and really had our footing.”

Because Safe Haven was taking the risk and paying for much of the infrastructure, it would receive any proceeds from the ball. Now, with the new nonprofit forming, anything raised from the

Panel puts brakes on data centers

County Board to make final decision at June 24 meeting

Members of the Shawano County Planning, Development and Zoning Committee voted unanimously June 3 to halt development of data centers for the next 12 months.

The moratorium on the siting, construction, establishment and operation of data centers affects only those towns in the county that are under the county’s zoning rules. It does not affect any cities, villages or the towns of Almon, Bartelme, Belle Plaine, Hartland, Hutchins, Lessor, Pella, Richmond and Wescott, all of which have their own zoning laws.

The matter will go in front of the county board June 24 for final approval.

“At that time, we’re going to study, analyze and look over ordinances or whatever needs to be done,” said Kathy Luebke, committee chairwoman, in describing what’s next if the county board gives the OK. “We want to keep the public involved and informed.”

More than 100 people attended the public hearing, and several dozen addressed the panel.

“Once these data centers come in, it is

damn near impossible to get rid of them,” said Bonduel’s Gracie Waukechon. “We really need to take a year and figure out how this will impact us economically, how this will impact us ecologically and how it will impact everyone in Shawano County seven generations ahead.”

She noted that large data centers can require up to 5 million gallons of water each day to cool the infrastructure.

“I would rather our water goes to supporting our farmers,” she said. “This is going to pollute our waters. It’s going to pollute our air.”

Marion’s Sarah Brewer cited several issues, including noise pollution; water usage; water discharge that is warmer than before, which can harm fish, aquatic life and drinking water; high electrical costs for the community as infrastructure updates are needed; and misleading job promises.

Spencer Gauthier, of Gillett, is a gaming professional working spent years analyzing data and metrics. He said he can’t perform as efficiently as his younger

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peers if he does not use AI. “We have beautiful land here,” he said. “We have farms. We have timber. We have loggers. We have farmers. We have dairy. We’re neighbors. This is our community. We love it here.”

Gauthier said pollution from data centers would harm fishing and other water sports. “This is the best place in the world to live,” Gauthier said. “This (moratorium) needs to happen all throughout the state, because we’ve seen what happens. They don’t care about us. They don’t care about our land. They don’t care about our water. All they care about is their profits. We can do better. We deserve better. Let’s not let this happen. Let’s push back on this.”

Kyle Waelchli, zoning administrator, said no company has approached officials about constructing a data center in the county.

Sarah Zarling, a state-wide activist from Watertown, congratulated the committee on taking action before it is too late. “I really commend you for even considering the moratorium,” she said. “In the data center space, I believe it to be the most important issue to address.”

She said that in Beaver Dam in Dodge County, where a data center is being built, there are reports of wells drying up, water contamination and cracked foundations of nearby properties, with no protections in place to help those affected.

“It’s very vital that, moving forward, we need to pause new data center approvals and take a step back and get protections in place for residents and communities,” Zarling said.

Shawano’s Lori Hayes said any data center should be required to be a good community member like any other business.

“Rules can be put into place that make them give money back or provide energy back to the county that they’re actually living in, so that they’re not a user, they’re now part of the community,” Hayes said.

In May, residents packed the Pella Town Hall for a discussion about data centers and solar farms, with several residents noting they have been approached by firms interested in their land.

“The impact of data centers does not stop at the edge of the town,” Pella resident Marcena Neil said. “It doesn’t stop at a property line. We share groundwater. What affects one absolutely affects the other.”

ball goes toward first responder agencies and the needs they have to help protect the community.

Johnson noted the committee had received questions over the years about where the money raised during the ball was going.

“When Safe Haven received the funds, first responders benefited from it,” Johnson said. “Safe Haven is a great partnership with our community first responders.”

According to Williams, Safe Haven will still remain a partner with the Ball of the Badges. One of the reasons Behind the Badge was formed was because Safe Haven had to cut a community service position. That employee had done much of the planning and preparation for the ball, but it’s clear that the domestic violence shelter’s close relationship makes sense to keep it involved.

“It’s a few full-time jobs to put this on,” Williams said, noting that volunteers with Behind the Badge will handle what the Safe Haven employee handled previously. “If we didn’t step up, the event wouldn’t happen. Most of us have full-time jobs, but because we were successful in doing this last year, we thought now was the time.”

Behind the Badge is also partnering with VFW Post 2723, with Williams noting that many who serve in the military often move on to careers in law enforcement and other first responder agencies.

The 2026 ball will take place Nov. 13 at North Star Mohican Casino Resort, with a red carpet theme planned. An addition to this year’s ball is that award winners will receive \$1,000 each to be donated to the organization of their choice.

“Imagine a room full of 400 people, and you hear these stories about what happened or why they’re getting the award or the little things that happened during the workday,” Williams said. “Now to actually hear it in a room full of your peers, it is a different energy.”

Behind the Badge is looking at opening the opportunity for additional nonprofits to benefit from event proceeds beginning in 2027 and working with the group to develop other ideas.

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County Road BE reopens to traffic

Crews continue working on Hwy. 29

Slow-moving motorists and getting cut off by others are two major pet peeves of drivers, but they probably don't compare to the sight of orange barrels and detour signs.

For anyone driving around Shawano County the past several weeks, it's enough to make you want to stay home.

Around the city of Shawano, state Highway 29 is down to one lane, and the exits in and out of Bonduel switch between open and closed. Even the thought of taking County Road BE between the communities was ruled out for several weeks.

Then, just to make matters worse on Highway 29, a semi trailer full of wood chips caught on fire a few weeks ago, forcing vehicles to detour through the city for several hours.

Along Highway 29 between County

Road M and Highland Road, crews are repairing concrete joints, replacing sections of deteriorated concrete pavement, milling and overlaying the asphalt shoulders and replacing the guardrails, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

Workers are also removing old concrete pavement and placing new concrete pavement on the state Highway 117/47 ramps, milling Highway 29 inside shoulders and placing new asphalt shoulders, and installing new guardrails and gravel shoulders.

Traffic is reduced to one lane in each direction, but the ramps by Bonduel are both expected to be open for good before the month ends.

In both directions along Highway 29 from County Road J to County Road M, crews are replacing existing guardrails, repairing the concrete pavement, replacing the concrete pavement in five areas and replacing a culvert under westbound Highway 29.

Watch for lane closures and crossover traffic patterns.

Work is scheduled to continue through Nov. 5.

Also on Highway 29, from County Road D to County Road OO, crews will complete concrete pavement joint and crack repairs, replace concrete pavement, resurface the existing asphalt pavement, replace existing guardrails, install shoulder rumble strips and complete rehabilitation work on the Highway 29 (eastbound) structure over the South Branch Embarrass River.

Again, watch for lane closures and crossover traffic patterns. Speeds will also be reduced. Work will continue until July 31.

A project along state Highway 22 from County Road BE to the Oconto County line will include asphalt replacement, culvert repair and intersection improvements.

Crews began replacing a cross culvert starting south of County Road C and progressing toward Cecil. They will also work on smaller areas between County Road R and County Road C in preparation for guardrail improvements. Watch for road closures and a signed detour.

This project will continue through Oct. 1.

Hockey league proposes Crawford Center addition

Officials cite need for locker rooms, showers, storage space

Officials with the Shawano Hockey League are proposing an addition to the Crawford Center, their home rink, with intentions of paying for the project themselves.

Adam Gafner, hockey league board president, offered several options at a June 4 public property committee meeting.

"One of the things that was never implemented into the building was showers," he said.

A new addition would include larger locker rooms, showers, storage, training areas and a community conference room.

"We could use it for hockey for film with our older levels of teams, but

I also think it could be an add-on facility for the community to use throughout the year as a gathering space," he said of the conference room.

Suggestions included an addition to the west side of the building facing the Huntington building. The roof in this area drops, so an addition would most likely be one level only.

An addition to the north side was offered, although Gafner admitted most people would not like this as it would touch up against the sidewalk and infringe on the area used by the horse show during the county fair.

Another suggestion was made for the east side of the building.

"The actual original kitchen area was supposed to be built on that end of the building," Gafner said. "For whatever reason, it got put on the other end. If this building was ever wanted to be used more as for weddings or events or something like that, that might be

a better area to put a new kitchen. Then we could use the current kitchen area, bathroom area, lobby area, that could actually be remodeled into showers, locker rooms, etc."

An addition could also be put on the south side of the building that would allow for even more storage space.

A fifth option is to remodel space inside the existing Crawford Center for a larger locker room and showers.

"Regarding any of these ideas, we would not be looking to the county to fund any of it," Gafner said.

Gafner said it would take two or three years to execute the plan, but they want to know if the county is OK with the concept before investing time, effort and money into the project.

County bidding rules would be followed in the construction phase.

Tanya Anker, hockey league board secretary, noted that in the 2025-26 season, Shawano Hockey

League hosted four two-day tournaments that brought 55 teams to the community. One concern they heard centered on the capacity of the building.

"We are going to spread that tournament out over three days instead of just

two so that we aren't filling so many people in the building at one time," she said.

Also, in 2026-27, a fifth tournament will be added, which will also be three days.

League had three teams compete at the state tournament in 2025-26.

Committee members agreed to consider the building plans and discuss them further July 2.

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Experiment with GovAI ends for county

An experiment with GovAI will end later this month for Shawano County.

Matt Hietpas, technology services director, said after using the program since January, the county won't renew its contract for another six months.

"The use is there. It's saved hours of time," Hietpas told the executive committee last month. "Actually, Kyle (Waelchli) in zoning saved days on his ordinance changes, comparing them. But, yes, the interface just isn't the greatest. I've had some hiccups with the interface."

He added the biggest reason to not continue is the cost.

"I don't see the need for everybody, every user account in Shawano County, needing it, or even the majority of them," he said. "We will end up paying more if we go with this solution compared to if we would just go with a license per individual user."

The cost for each six-month period in the pilot stage is \$9,500. After that,

time would be an annual expense incorporated into the county budget.

Hietpas said department heads were in agreement to go with a different solution that charges per user.

AI can benefit the public through interactions such as calls to government offices and chatboxes on the website, while also benefiting employees through the use of data gathering, data management, analytics, resource planning, real time data-driven insights and drafting documents.

Examples include a sheriff's deputy using AI to review body camera and dash camera footage to create incident reports, or officials analyzing documents for duplicate information or cross-referencing.

All AI-created documents still need to be reviewed by staff to ensure accuracy.

Hietpas pointed out that no AI program, including the commonly used Copilot and ChatGPT, are error-free.

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Courthouse plans advance behind scenes

Approvals still needed from chief judge, DOC

The Samuels Group and Venture Architects continue the preparation phase of a \$121 million courthouse, jail pod and jail accessory space building project for Shawano County.

Kurt Berner of The Samuels Group provided the latest update at the June 4 public property committee meeting.

Officials have met several times with the district court administrator to review the codes and the layout of the court suite. The chief judge must approve the final plans.

"We've had three or four changes and tweaks to the court suite," Berner said. "I think we're getting closer to having those finalized."

A similar situation occurs with plans for the 150-bed jail pod and the jail accessories space — including the kitchen,

pre-booking, sally port, etc. The next meeting with the Department of Corrections is set for June 15.

Berner and others have met with contractors about moving the sheriff's department evidence building, first temporarily but then permanently.

"There's been a new idea brought to the table about utilizing the space at the work release center (temporarily)," he said. "The only caveat to that is we got to get the DOC to sign off on that."

Also, Venture Architects is devising interior colors and finishes, as well as exterior colors.

"What they're going to work through is develop a palette, and then we will present it to you guys for review, and we'll bring it to the board," Berner said.

A survey of all the lots to be used for the building project was completed, so officials now have exact measurements to determine utility connections, setback areas and exact dimensions of the buildings.

Soil boring tests

revealed some high water areas as expected, but as there will not be anything built below grade level, measures can be taken to mitigate the water levels from affecting construction.

Berner reminded committee members a decision on the site for a new library will need to be made in the next several months to aid in any future fundraising efforts.

"There's a lot of work going on behind the scenes to make sure that we're putting all of the small pieces together that, when it does come time to put it out for bid, we're being very responsible in getting numbers that are going to come back in underneath that approved \$121 million amount," said Julie Hasser, human resources director and interim administrative coordinator.

Floor plans of the building project will not be made public for security reasons, although committee members are expected to eventually review them in a closed session.

tennis doubles team; baseball seniors Anderson Schmidt, infield, and Ayden Bystol, utility and designated hitter.

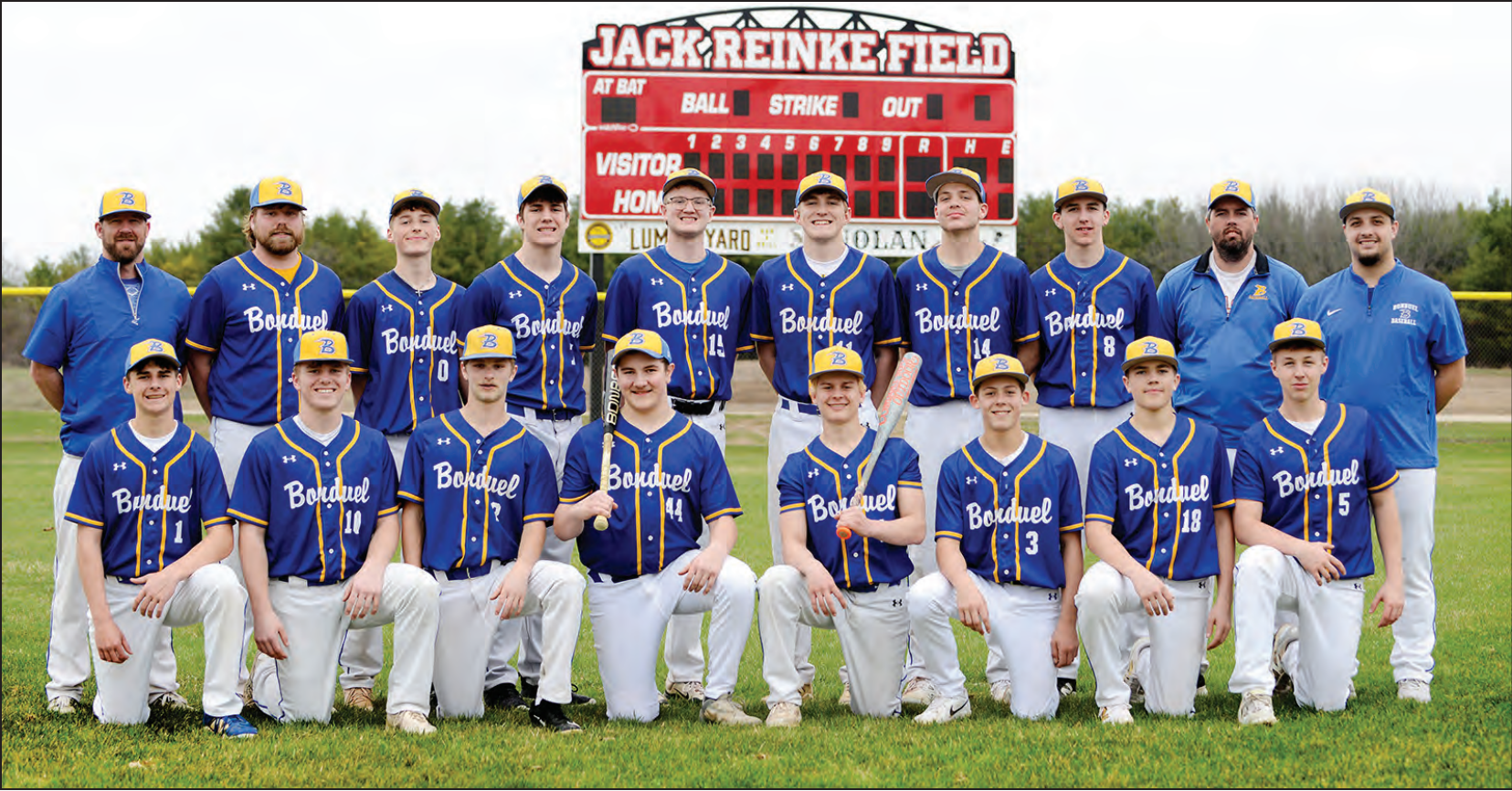

Rocky Top Greenhouse offers variety of flowers, vegetables

Leopolis business flourishing in 10th year

Rocky Top Greenhouse in Leopolis offers various hanging plants, bedding flowers and several types of vegetables.

Owner Donny Fehrman is celebrating his 10th year at Rocky Top Greenhouse.

“I’ve got large and medium hanging baskets, bedding plants such as petunias; marigolds; wave petunias; dahlias; straw flowers, which are very pretty; geraniums; non-stop begonias; bedding begonias, which are smaller; impatiens; alyssum; and unique black petunias,” said Fehrman.

Offered as well is a unique flower called heliotrope, which is a fragrant flower that attracts butterflies.

“Some growers classify the heliotrope as an annual, but others insist it is a perennial, which is a plant that comes back the next year,” said Fehrman.

The vegetable greenhouse holds tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, cauliflower, kohlrabi, broccoli, cucumbers and squash, both acorn and buttercup.

Also included in the vegetable greenhouse are various types of specialized pumpkins – blue, jack-o-lanterns, baby boos and peanut.

“Warm-up came fast, and those pumpkins took off it seems, in one day, in the heat. All they need is warmth

and moisture to jump start them,” said Fehrman.

All flowers on sale, as well as tomatoes and peppers, are purchased from a supplier, but the rest of the vegetables offered for sale are grown from seed by Fehrman.

He said he learned the art of horticulture from his mother.

“We were raised on a farm,” said Fehrman. “My mom was a big gardener and I helped her all the time, planting a large farm garden. She was my inspiration. We also had about an eighth of an acre planted in pickles. Us kids had to pick, and that was our fair money. We’d take our No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 pickles to Pella and sell them. They paid us per size.”

As an adult, Fehrman worked for a landscaping company for a number of years, planting flowers, landscaping and putting in lawns. He then worked part-time for a couple of local greenhouses, learning the ins and outs of the business of growing and selling.

It jump-started the notion that he’d perhaps like to go into business for himself.

“I really liked it, and I thought, ‘I’m going to start one of my own.’ So in 2016, I opened my doors,” said Fehrman. “I bought the flower greenhouse and built a smaller one strictly for vegetables.”

Fehrman’s wife and son both work outside the business, but in their spare time they help him in the greenhouse.

“If I have to run an errand, I call my sister who lives just down the road and she’ll run the store for me. Otherwise,

I’m pretty much on my own,” said Fehrman.

Depending on the weather, the growing season usually buttons up the end of June and after that, it wanes off. In September, Fehrman sells tri-color mums, ranging in sizes anywhere from 8-inch to 16-inch tubs.

Married to wife Penny, they have three adult children, four grandchildren and two step-grandchildren.

“I love talking to people. I could sit all day and talk to people. That’s a big part of this business, just a connection with folks. It’s enjoyable,” said Fehrman. “A big part of my business is shared by word-of-mouth.”

Red oak tree witness to nearly 300 years of history

Just east of the Shawano Recreation Center is a large red oak tree growing.

There are several oak trees in this family, and this one is a northern red oak.

The first interest in this large tree began in a 1983, when Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources forester Tom Albrecht wrote an article about it in the Oct. 21, 1983, Shawano Evening Leader. Albrecht had measured the tree, and at that time, it was 2 inches shy of 5 feet in diameter. It was also believed at that time, to be the largest northern red oak tree in Wisconsin.

In June 2000, the city of Shawano was improving Division Street, and they had plans to widen the street some. The reconstruction of the street was going move the sidewalk to the south to a point where this large tree was going to be in the way. The big tree would have surely been cut down had it not been for the activism of John McCormick, who lived in the apartment building where the large oak was growing.

“The tree is a symbol of Shawano’s history,” McCormick kept telling the city officials.

In the June 1, 2000, Shawano Leader reporter Amy Weaver wrote an article about the threat to the tree and McCormick’s fight to save it. Weaver took a photo of McCormick by the massive oak. McCormick’s interest in this magnificent tree was successful in saving it.

Since the 2000 article in the Leader, a bigger red oak tree was located. It is in Dane County near the Eagle Effigy Mounds. It is 241 inches in circumference and 6.4 feet in diameter. But it has been hit by lightning and hard telling how long this tree will last.

On May 6, 2026, Mike Homan and I measured the Division Street red oak. It came out to 232 inches in circumference, and that equates to 6.15 feet in diameter.

This tree grew 1.33 feet in diameter since Albrecht measured it in 1983, 42 years ago.

Through the years, arborists have come up with a formula to determine a tree's age. Not all trees grow at the same rate each year, so they are given a species-specific growth factor. The growth factor for red oak in Wisconsin is 4. According to the formula, we multiply the tree's diameter in inches by 4 to get the age. 73.9 times 4 equals 295.6 years old.

This is not exact. For example, this tree could have germinated in a dense forest setting, which would be minimal growth for who knows how long, even decades. Then it could have been smashed down by a falling tree. There is no real way of telling, besides maybe doing a core boring with an increment borer.

I think we know enough about this big tree to say that this red oak has been around

much longer than the city of Shawano or Shawano County. Maybe it will survive long enough to become the largest northern red oak in Wisconsin.

In the fall of 2012, I stopped by the big red oak and picked up a handful of acorns. I took them home and put them in water. Two of them sank to the bottom, which were the good ones. I put them in the ground Oct. 24, 2012, about an inch or so deep and covered them up (You have to think like a squirrel).

The trees grow steadily to this day.

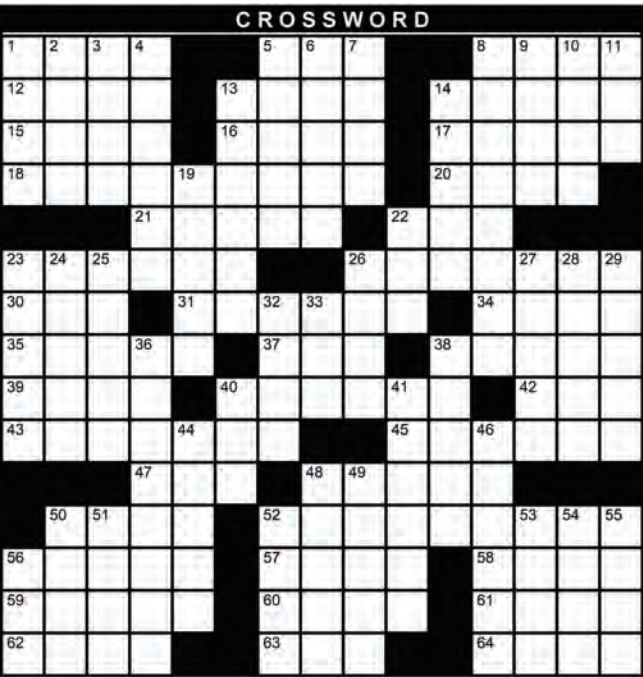

Perusing old scrapbooks and photo albums has been essential to the task. Phone pictures are no substitute for printed snapshots in an album. Precious memories recorded digitally can be erased with a few clicks. Consider what will happen to your photos when you pass. Ah, yes.

Taking my own advice, I recently downloaded and saved my photos. Some were from summer 2016,

pictures that captured events I'd forgotten. It was the year of Townsend's centennial. Oh, the memories.

That year, I organized and chaired the centennial celebration committee. We started in January, ambitiously planning one event a month from April to October. Our first was a reenactment of the township's founding.

I'd written and published three volumes of Townsend history, so in May we did a Powerpoint presentation and quilt show. Local ladies stitched a beautiful keepsake quilt

that proudly hangs in the town hall foyer. In June, we drew an enthusiastic crowd for a rollicking Old-Time Tent Revival.

Famous for our July 4 celebration, the parade and fireworks were spectacular that year. Dressed in 1916 garb, our committee marched alongside a Conestoga wagon. I drove Lucy Holt's 1911 Waverly Phaeton electric buggy, a thrill of a lifetime.

In August we hosted a pie social and suffragette rally to honor the women who courageously fought for women's voting rights. In September, it was Can Tombstones Talk, featuring residents telling notable townspeople's stories while standing by their

gravestones.

I will never forget the inexplicable phenomenon that occurred as we ended the presentations at dusk. Suddenly, a mist arose on the horizon and drifted toward us, slowly enveloping the cemetery. Someone shouted, "Look! Their spirits are here!" It was flat out magical.

Our finale was We Believe in Happy Endings, the final Red Light Saloon in a series of musical comedies I wrote and directed to raise money for Holt and Balcom Logging Camp. We packed the house for two shows, definitely a happy ending.

Townsend has a hundred miles of town roads, so a popular activity was

the Centennial Walking Warrior Road Challenge. Participants registered, got a map and recorded their progress on a log sheet. It took me months, but I finished, though several times I had to walk the distance twice because the road dead-ended.

I rarely ran into other walkers, except for 83-year-old Emmett Exferd. He was first to finish, earning serious bragging rights. Emmett's 93 now, but he still remembers he walked faster and farther than I did. We both cherish our souvenir T-shirts.

Walking alone, I communed with nature. It's the ideal way to experience the Northwoods. Too bad most people choose off-road

vehicles these days. They might be missing out on the very thing they come here for.

One thing I loved was walking past homes, able to focus on details I'd never noticed riding in a vehicle. Most people kept their places neat and nicely landscaped. Many sport a welcome sign, complete with engraved family moniker. Some were so inviting I wanted to knock on their doors and thank them for putting in the time, talent and treasure.

Unfortunately, walking by some places was off-putting, to say the least. These folks blared out hostile messages meant to intimidate. Signs like "Keep out; you are being watched," and "We shoot trespassers; survivors are shot again" may offer a modicum of reassurance.

If they'd seen me walking by, they would probably have considered it mission accomplished. I always picked up the pace to get the h-e-double hockey sticks on down the road. As it happens, cameras have mostly replaced such threatening signs.

Back then, I never would have thought Townsend would change so dramatically in a single decade. We long-termers acknowledge we are in a transition cycle, and it's no longer a poor man's paradise. I believe one thing will never change. You don't change Townsend; Townsend changes you.

Vande Corput named CMN's Faculty of the Year

For Sarah Vande Corput, the classroom is place to find a sense of belonging.

The College of Menominee Nation's 2026 Faculty of the Year honoree has been drawn to ways to connect learners to concepts throughout her career, creating a throughline that led to her being honored by CMN at its May commencement ceremony.

After earning her bachelor of science in communication processes, Vande Corput began her career working in the business sector.

"I started off mainly working with sales, in customer service or billing. I began working in corporate training, educating others and speaking in front of audiences. From there, I switched to working in education in 2007," said Vande Corput.

Following the completion of a master of arts in education from Silver Lake College, Vande Corput caught the attention of her eventual employer.

"I started teaching at CMN in 2015. A dean recruited me by telling me they thought I would work well with the students," Vande Corput said.

When I asked her what has kept her at CMN for more than a decade, Vande Corput stated that the school collectively holds values she admires.

"CMN has a unique close-knit environment that is grounded in the culture. There are numerous activities and opportunities to grow. Caring about the students keeps me here, and also, our faculty is a passionate group to be a part of. The staff is supportive, and I feel our administration is leading us in a good way," she said.

Having since added credentials that include an Indigenous Research Methodology Graduate Certificate from Sitting Bull College and a doctorate in higher education and leadership studies from Edgewood University, she has earned the rank of

associate professor at CMN.

Vande Corput's dissertation is titled "Circle of Courage: Native American Higher Education Student Success Experiences," and it highlights strengths-based approaches to supporting Native students. Her work stems from her time teaching the school's foundational course, student success strategies and her research is something she strives to put into practice both at CMN and beyond.

An active participant in the national dialogue on Native American higher education, Vande Corput serves on the American Indian College Fund Faculty Advisory Council and co-leads its First Year Experience and Mentoring Community of Practice. This spring, she was also named the recipient of the 2026 Excellence in Teaching First-Year Seminars Award, becoming the first tribal college

faculty member to achieve that recognition.

Listing Vande Corput's merits for CMN's annual honor, Dean of Academic Success Lucy Fenzl shared the rationale behind Vande Corput's latest accolade with those assembled at commencement.

"Through her teaching, scholarship, and service, Dr. Sarah advances student-centered, culturally responsive education while strengthening communities across higher education," Fenzl said. "As a first-generation college student who earned a doctorate in higher education and leadership studies, she is committed to supporting students as they transition to college and to helping them find their voice and build confidence in academic spaces."

When I asked Vande Corput for her advice for new faculty and staff, she said, "Learn the intricacies of your job, do it well, and then get involved. Learn about the culture and the students and lead with your heart."

Vande Corput's advice to

students echoes her own engagement with the school.

"I like to encourage students to get involved and participate in workshops, clubs and activities," she said. "Know that everyone at CMN is supportive and wants you to succeed. Don't be afraid to ask for direction or try something new."

Looking ahead to the fall, Vande Corput said she is most excited about the new students.

"Each class has its own personality," she said. "Even if it's a class I've taught numerous times, it always has a unique dialogue based upon the experiences and backgrounds of the students enrolled. It's great to see new students start their educational journey."

To put it another way, this fall will be another opportunity for CMN's 2026 Faculty of the Year to encourage new students to find a sense of belonging.

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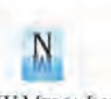
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Hospital, schools partner to expand health care opportunities
