Zeeman named Fairest of the Fair

Sophia Zeeman emerged victorious from a crowded field of candidates June 28 to become the 2026 Fairest of the Fair for Shawano County.

Five young women competed to become this year's Fairest, the most that the Shawano County Fair has had compete for some time. Zeeman, as the winner crowned during the Shawano County Brunch on the Farm, will represent the county for the next 12 months as she attends other county fairs and various farm events and parades, as well as preside over the local fair when it's held over Labor Day weekend.

"The girls are promoting our fair, and they're promoting it throughout the year," said Kerry Danley, one of the coordinators for Fairest of the Fair. "We have it so they can learn a little more self-confidence, public speaking, everything else."

Zeeman expressed delight that she'll be able to showcase Shawano County and its fair as the official ambassador at other fairs and participate in parades, her first coming up as Bonduel kicks off 250 years of United States independence.

"I'm really excited to do this," Zeeman said. "I'm really excited to go to all of the events and get to promote the county fair."

Zeeman and the other contestants were interviewed June 27, and the winner was selected from those interviews.

Zeeman said she has lived in Shawano County her entire life, and she has shown animals at the fair growing up.

"I just always saw the girls around, and I wanted to help promote the fair and do stuff like that," she said.

The county fair, in Zeeman's view, is "one big community event" that brings the entire county together and helps to promote pride in what Shawano County has to offer.

"It's just like a big family reunion, and it's one of the best parts of the summer for me," Zeeman said.

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Free speech sparks fly at county board meeting

Supervisor pushes for vote on Steffen appointment for Distirct 27 vacancy

Filling a vacancy on the Shawano County Board has spiraled into arguments of free speech, citizens' rights and issues of discrimination.

"I don't understand what it would hurt to allow the people to speak," Supervisor Jeremy Gretzinger said after Chairman Tom Kautza refused to allow two residents to address the board at the June 24 meeting. "You're only giving them two minutes. I'm 100% against that. It violates the right of a citizen, in my eyes."

Jackie Miller and Tim Steffen both asked to address the board regarding the minutes of the June 17 executive committee meeting, in which Kautza said he is still working on a replacement supervisor for District 27. The vacancy follows the resignation of Tess Serrano. Steffen

expressed interest in the position.

"Because the role is intended to remain strictly nonpartisan, Kautza is carefully evaluating all interest and potential candidates with a focus on preserving the impartial and nonpolitical nature of the office and its responsibilities," the minutes read.

Steffen is chairman of the Shawano County Republican Party and has been critical of Kautza in the past.

When Miller began to address to the board about the minutes, Kautza cut her off.

"No. That's not an agenda item to speak on," he said. "We're not going to have a bunch of haggling around. That's the whole point of this."

"The approval of those minutes is on the agenda," she responded.

"No. I'm not going to allow you to speak and start a disruptive deal

again today," Kautza said. "You're done. Your time is up."

A few minutes later, Steffen asked to speak to the board.

"That's in the consent agenda," Kautza said. "The board would have to vote to take it out, to remove it. And that is not really a ... that's not a ... no."

"It's published in the agenda for today's meeting," Steffen pointed out.

"Yup. And you're going to want to start an argument," Kautza said.

"No. I want to state my case," replied Steffen.

"No. We're going to move right on with the agenda," Kautza said. "It's that simple. We do not need any more controversy here. That's what this is about."

Later in the meeting, Gretzinger raised the issue of residents wanting to address the board.

"If they're not allowed

to speak here, where do they address that issue?" he asked.

Kautza said they could, for example, write a letter to the clerk, send Kautza an email or write a letter to the editor of the local newspaper.

The board rules limit comments to three minutes or at the discretion of the chairman. At the meeting, Kautza limited comments to two minutes per speaker with a limit of five speakers. Kautza pointed out to Gretzinger that he was among those who voted for the rules.

"How come all of a sudden now we're just enforcing it?" Gretzinger asked.

"Because I was being polite before and letting people speak," Kautza said. "And all that's done is cause a lot of drama, and we don't need drama in the courthouse. It's nonsense."

"Just let them talk,"

Gretzinger said. "If we did nothing wrong, we should have nothing to worry about. Let them speak."

Supervisor Joe Miller asked Larenda Maulson, corporation counsel, if political affiliation is a protected status when it comes to a discrimination case.

"I don't have the answer for that off the top of my head," she said. "I'd have to take a look at it."

"I asked you that question via email last week, so you had some time," Miller responded.

He also noted no one but Steffen has expressed interest in the position.

"Those residents deserve representation," he said.

Miller then referred to the minutes of executive committee meeting.

"I believe those comments were blatant discrimination ... based on a political affiliation," he said.

Miller said supervisors have a duty to collectively represent what is in the best interests of the county.

"I have a solution to end this so you don't have to hear the chair tell the people that you need to be constructive when you come up here and talk," he said.

Miller said either Kautza can nominate Steffen or supervisors override that authority and nominate him themselves. He noted that the rules about public comment are only finally being enforced because Kautza doesn't want to be criticized anymore.

"The public put each and every one of us in these seats," Miller said. "We are, as elected officials, open to any public scrutiny, criticism, support, whatever. That's our responsibility to accept that."

"I really enjoy seeing everyone outside in community settings," Zeeman said. "I feel like it's a really special year, and I'm going to have a lot of fun."

Besides the Shawano County Fair, Zeeman said she's most looking forward to participating in the Outagamie County Fair, which was wrapping up during her coronation but will be an event she gets to visit in 2027 as her reign comes to a close.

Zeeman attends Fox Valley Technical College, where she is pursuing a degree in the culinary arts. She is also currently a member of the Landstad 4-H.

The four other contestants were recognized during brunch, as well. Hannah Yeager was named first runner-up, while Faith Posbrig, Matti Koehler and Kendall Wilcox were named fair ambassadors.

The 2025 Fairest of the Fair, Olivia Danley, spoke briefly about her experience before crowning Zeeman as her successor and giving her an idea of where her life will be going over the next year.

"This journey has been nothing short of incredible, and it is something that I will carry with me for the rest of my life," she said. "The number of people I have had the privilege of meeting, the events I have had the honor of attending and the lessons I have learned along the way have shaped me in ways I never expected."

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Construction underway on Highway 47/55 in Menominee County

As of June 22, state Highway 47 in Menominee County was closed to through traffic from County Road VV (West) to the Langlade County line. The closure is anticipated to continue until the middle of August. Northeast Asphalt held an informational meeting on the project June 23 at the Wolf River Development Company, W2828 Go Around Road, Keshena.

Access by local traffic and emergency services will be maintained throughout the closure.

Local traffic may experience wait times when

encountering work operations along the roadway.

Traffic will travel on gravel surfaces for portions of the project.

The first week of the reconstruction project included:

- Removing the guard-rail from Crow Settlement Road to Wheelock Road.
- Sawing asphalt and stump grubbing from County Road VV (West) to the Langlade County line.
- Pulverizing pavement at culverts from County Road VV (West) to Camp Road 26.
- Culvert replacement from County Road VV (West) to Crow Settlement Road.

When the culvert work on Highway 47 is completed, it will be reopened and state Highway 55 will be closed to through traffic from Highway 47 to the Langlade County Line for about 55 days.

The contractor plans to place new asphalt pavement on Highway 47 this fall as well, with the remaining asphalt paving for the project finishing in 2027.

Traffic will be reduced to a single lane with a flagging operation during paving.

All operations, locations and durations are estimated and subject to change.

The top individual was Rieth.

To qualify for the state inals, Wolf and her competitors had to compete in several other contests

including district contest, sectional contest and the state semifinals.

The Extemporaneous Public Speaking LDE is designed to allow students to showcase their agricultural knowledge and ability to think on their feet by giving a speech and answering questions with limited prep time.

The State FFA Extemporaneous Public Speaking LDE is sponsored at the state level by Wisconsin FFA Convention Partners.

Wolf will represent Wisconsin at the 99th National FFA Convention in Indianapolis in November. The national winner will be selected from a group of state finalists and will receive a plaque and additional scholarship money.

Through the Agricultural Communications Career Development

Event Team contest, participants work as a team of communication consultants to develop a written media plan, present the plan to a panel of judges and, as individuals, apply what they have learned during practicums, a quiz and editing exercise.

Oconto Falls will also compete at the national convention.

The Agricultural Communications CDE is sponsored at the state level by CNH Capital.

The Agricultural Communications Career Development Events help students prepare for careers in journalism, radio and TV broadcast, web design, marketing and more.

All CDEs engage students in developing their communication, decision-making and teamwork skills to promote future career success.

As the founding president of CMN, Fowler spent years building an institution for the people of the Menominee Nation and other nations surrounding our tribal lands.

Early on, Fowler

understood the importance of philanthropy. By creating an endowment in honor of her sister, Daly, she hoped to apply funds wherever the need is greatest, providing scholarship opportunities and funding initiatives to increase access to Native scholar role models. Bearing her name, the endowment recognizes (former Menominee Legislator) Daly's role in establishing the college that has served the Menominee People and their neighbors since January 1993.

Vegetables now growing at public library

For years, the Shawano County Public Library has been known as a place for more than books, videos and educational resources.

There's the free Wi-Fi, an escape room, free state park passes and the Library of Things that offers luggage, fishing poles, small kitchen appliances, puzzles and more.

Now, it's home to a hydroponic farm that grows varieties of lettuce, bok choy, basil and more to be given away to patrons and other visitors.

The hydroponic farm, located in the front entry of the library at 128 S. Sawyer St., was paid for with a grant from Sanford Health-Marshfield Clinic.

"We didn't just want to put fresh veggies on the pantry shelves," said library staff member Tabitha Pierce, who wrote the grant with Staci Rubenzer, library director. "We wanted to meet the current needs of our community and expand on that with programs focused around topics like sustainability, food waste, nutrition and composting." Pierce is now coordinating the project and related programming.

Flex Farms are vertical hydroponic farming systems that produce significant quantities of fresh food and are designed to fit small indoor spaces. The units include an energy-efficient LED light tower, submersible pump, grower tool kit and starter

supply kit. Each unit enables the owner to grow more than 3,400 plants annually.

Rubenzer said the library received an email about the grant opportunity from the clinic.

"Some of our staff who work on the little food pantry project here at the library thought that this could be a good opportunity to pursue," she said. "As we looked into it, it did not seem like a grant that would provide direct funding of the existing little food pantry, but it seemed like it could be something more. Sustainability and community education were large components of the grant that we submitted."

The library board approved the grant plan in January, and the grant cycle runs through 2026.

"With the grant funds, we purchased the Flex Farm hydroponic tower and supplies for the first year," Rubenzer said. "We intend for it to be a sustainable educational piece in the library from which the harvest can be shared with our patrons."

The library's first crop of romaine and green star lettuce was harvested the week of June 8-12. More than 70 bags of fresh greens were given to community members.

A second crop of butterhead lettuce, summer crisp lettuce,

tatsoi, bok choy and basil is currently growing in the hydroponic tower.

"We anticipate a harvest the week of July 6 or 13, as it takes about one month from planting to harvesting in the hydroponic system," Rubenzer said.

Feel free to peek inside the hydroponics farm, but staff requests you not touch the plants in the tower.

According to Pierce, the system itself does most of the work after the initial setup, which took about an hour to put together and another hour to get the water tanks filled, pH and TDS levels tested, nutrients added and

water tested one more time.

Cleaning the system between plantings took some time, but that should get quicker as staff members become more familiar with the process.

"I've tried gardening before, but it didn't go well," Pierce said. "This is my first successful crop, and I'm so pleased to see the excitement in the patrons and the community."

Part of the grant proposal was building community partnerships around this system.

Rubenzer said the library is partnering with Fork Farm staff and the county's Extension Office 4-H leadership to present programs on sustainable and nutritious food sources and our relationship with the environment.

On June 24, a Fork Farm representative spoke on how sustainability and food waste prevention can help people save money and the planet.

"Working with our county's 4-H youth development educator, Megan Suehring, has been very exciting, and we think that partnership is a natural match to this project," Rubenzer said. "We are also hoping that community partnerships lead to groups 'adopting' the hydroponic tower (planting, water testing, harvesting, etc.) for short periods, so we are interested in creating more partnership opportunities and having more groups come to the library to check out what is growing here."

The Sanford Health-Marshfield Clinic had been working with Fork Farms in Green Bay to place about 35 Flex Farms in community locations where the food can be used by school children, seniors and other community-based organizations.

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Tribe wins lawsuit from Legend Lake owners

Supreme Court upholds tribal sovereign immunity claim

The Wisconsin Supreme Court on June 23 ruled 4-3 in favor of the Menominee Tribe of Wisconsin against the Legend Lake Property Owners Association, upholding tribal sovereign immunity and dismissing the association's lawsuit.

"Today's decision provides finality to the parties and acknowledges that factual circumstances have changed since the filing of the complaint," Justice Susan Crawford said. "We acknowledge that a fundamental commitment of Indian law is judicial respect for Congress' primary role in defining the contours of tribal sovereignty."

In 2018, the Legend Lake Property Owners Association sued the Menominee

Tribe and tribal member Guy Keshena alleging that Keshena acquired title to more than 30 parcels, totaling 21.35 acres, in 2017 within the Legend Lake development. Keshena acquired the properties with tribal authorization to place them into federal tribal trust.

The association argued that the parcels were bound by restrictive covenants — agreed upon in 2009 — which prohibit properties from being removed from the county tax rolls and require the land to be governed by association bylaws.

The tribe asserted tribal sovereign immunity and argued that placing the land into a federal trust was protected under the Menominee Restoration Act, rendering the association's restrictive covenants unenforceable on sovereign tribal land.

"We are pleased with the Wisconsin Supreme Court's decision confirming our sovereign immunity," the tribe posted on

social media. "Tribal sovereign immunity is a well-established principle of federal Indian law and a vital aspect of tribal sovereignty. The Tribe appreciates the Court's careful consideration and confirmation that dismissal of this case is the appropriate course of action."

"For generations, the Menominee people have worked hard to protect our homeland, our rights and our future. We are glad our rights and these core principles have been recognized and respected."

The justices took issue with the apparent intent of the restrictive covenants.

"The association unilaterally imposed the restrictive covenants on the Legend Lake parcels in 2009 in an effort to prevent the tribe from restoring any of the property to its reservation," Crawford said. "The tribe never affirmatively agreed to waive its sovereign immunity in state court actions regarding the restrictive covenants."

In her dissent, Justice

Rebecca Bradley accused the majority of handing the tribe a sword with which it can "seize property with impunity."

The Wisconsin Supreme Court found that sovereign immunity protects the tribe from being sued in state court to enforce these covenants, legally recognizing the land's transition into trust status.

Keshena knew about the covenants when he purchased the property. The tribe also knew about the covenants but still petitioned the Bureau of Indian Affairs to take the properties into tribal trust, which the BIA did.

In 2018, the BIA's Midwest regional director authorized the transfer of the properties into tribal trust status. The association appealed that decision, which was later upheld by the Interior Board of Indian Appeals.

The association contended that its members' property values would be reduced if the interior board decision stands and

the owners would be left without the protections of the covenants.

When the tribe was stripped of federal recognition in the 1960s, it sold thousands of acres to reduce its debts — including property that would later be used for the Legend Lake development.

The association was created in 1972, and membership is mandatory for all property owners.

When federal recognition for the tribe was restored in 1973, Congress' Restoration Act allowed the tribe to recover its lost land.

Since restoration, the tribe has gradually returned much of the land — including parts of the development — to federal trust status, reestablishing most of the county as a modern reservation.

Today, about 99% of the land in Menominee County is held in trust, and those living on that land do not pay property taxes. That means the 1% of land owned by others supports

county operations, as well as the Menominee Indian School District.

With fewer and fewer landowners, the tax burden is rising for those who remain, the property owners association contends.

The association argued Congress' Restoration Act abrogated the tribe's sovereign immunity and that the Menominee Nation waived its immunity in several ways, including when Keshena accepted deeds to the properties after the association updated its bylaws with restrictive covenants.

The justices rejected the association's arguments.

"Tribal sovereign immunity is the rule, not the exception," the court said. "A litigant can overcome tribal sovereign immunity if Congress abrogates it or if a tribe clearly waives it. Neither occurred here. Nor does the Association persuade us that ... exceptions defeat a tribe's sovereign immunity from suit."

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Ingold bond reduced from \$250K to \$10K

Judge believes
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warranted
due to threats

Michael Ingold's bond in a case involving the threat to public officials was reduced June 29 from \$250,000 cash to \$10,000.

Christopher Restemayer, Ingold's new attorney, argued for a \$250,000 signature bond, noting that at the time the bond was set Ingold was still charged with first-degree homicide in the death of his live-in girlfriend. Ingold was acquitted by a jury at the end of April.

Ingold has been in the Shawano County Jail for almost four years, since the homicide charge was made in 2022, and Restemayer noted that Ingold did not have any criminal record prior, with his only encounter with courts being a traffic ticket. Ingold had a case in 2020 where

he was charged with strangulation and suffocation, second-degree recklessly endangering safety, battery and operating a firearm while intoxicated, but those charges were dismissed.

Restemayer told Portage County Circuit Court Judge Louis Molepske Jr. that Ingold has never had any issues showing up for court and said that should be a factor in deciding bond.

"My client has no interest in seeing any of those people (in the indictment), much less taking them out," Restemayer said. "I think no contact would be sufficient to protecting the victims in those cases. I would ask to reduce bond given the amount time he's been in jail to a signature bond."

Ingold, 61, faces five counts of threatening prosecutors, three counts of threats to law enforcement officers and two counts of threatening bodily harm to people involved with the court or legal system.

Because of the threats involving people with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department and the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney's Office,

the case is being managed by special prosecutor Eric Sparr with Winnebago County. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. recused himself.

Each of the charges face maximum prison sentences of six years and maximum fines of \$10,000.

Winnebago County District Attorney Eric Sparr admitted the risk is less now that Ingold has been acquitted in a capital crime, but the threats that comprise the current case are still serious and do not warrant a signature bond. He noted that Ingold had been informed that he should not be making threats against public officials but allegedly did it anyway.

"The threats were explicit, and they were repeated to multiple individuals," Sparr said.

The evidence comes from seven phone calls made at the Shawano County Jail from January 2025 to July 2025, as well as a couple of in-person conversations at the jail in June 2025 and December 2025, according to the criminal complaint.

A detective monitored the recorded jail calls and reported that, in one call made Jan. 28, 2025, Ingold allegedly said he wanted to hang two of the victims.

Two calls in March had Ingold alleged saying that, if he got out of jail, he was going to do something terrible to three of the victims and that has has no problem killing someone, according to the complaint.

During a call made April 18, 2025, Ingold allegedly told the person he was calling: "I'd kill (the third victim). I'd kill all of them. I'd beat 'em with a baseball bat, and I'd enjoy every (expletive) second of it." According to the complaint, Ingold allegedly went on to say he was having dreams about torturing the victims, going so far as to mention a drone and explosives.

When the person on the other end of the line allegedly warned Ingold not to talk like that for fear that it could be taken seriously, Ingold allegedly said "Let 'em take it seriously," according to the complaint, and claimed the victims were "crooked."

Following a court

hearing June 20, 2025, Ingold returned to the jail and spoke with the booking officer, and during the course of the conversation, he allegedly said that he'd like to skin one of the prosecutors alive.

A jail inmate allegedly told detectives on Dec. 15, 2025, that Ingold had been making threats against the detective, claiming that Ingold said he used to run drugs for the Magnetos biker gang, serving as a truck driver, and that the gang "owed him favors," according to the complaint.

Detectives looked at jail videos from three days earlier, where Ingold allegedly said he was going to break one of the detective's bones and "give him a lobotomy," according to the complaint. Ingold allegedly said when all the things were going to happen, he would be in Arizona.

Sparr said that the fact that Ingold walked out of the holding area at the jail at his previous hearing without permission from the judge should be a factor when deciding bond.

Ingold told Molepske during the hearing that he

sold his home and vehicles to pay for expenses related to the homicide. All he would have as collateral is his property, which is about a half-acre and has a garage on it, but he owes back taxes for the last two years and the Internal Revenue Service has a lien on the property.

Molepske said that the allegations are serious enough that having some cash was warranted and ruled \$10,000 for the case, although he may revisit bond after a preliminary hearing. He also dismissed the contempt of court sentence of 10 additional days in jail, expressing dismay that Ingold has already been held in jail for almost four years.

"Long and short, he is already in custody so he has served the 10 days, so I'm not going to require an additional 10 days," Molepske said.

The preliminary hearing on the current charges will take place at 3 p.m. July 27 at the Shawano County Courthouse, courtroom to be determined.

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Board adopts moratorium on data center development

Members of the Shawano County Board on June 24 adopted a 12-month moratorium on the siting, construction, establishment and operation of data centers in the unincorporated towns in Shawano County that have approved the county's zoning authority.

It does not affect any cities, villages or the towns of Almon, Bartelme, Belle Plaine, Hartland, Hutchins, Lessor, Pella, Richmond and Wescott, all of which have their own zoning laws.

Shawano resident Nancy Cramer expressed concerns about potential environmental problems as well as nationwide societal issues.



The Port Washington data center is a \$15 billion-plus artificial intelligence campus under construction by Vantage Data Centers. Known as the Lighthouse campus, the 672-acre site will host four centers spanning 2.5 million square feet with almost 1 gigawatt of IT capacity, creating up to 4,000 construction jobs and 300-plus permanent positions.

She touched on issues such as water shortages, pollution, heated water discharged back into lakes and rivers, noise pollution affecting people and wildlife, decreases in property values and increases in electric rates.

"I do not feel that we can let them come to Shawano County and destroy our water, our hunting and fishing land, our tourism,"

Cramer said.

She suggested the proposed one-year moratorium be extended to five years. Board Chairman Tom Kautza told her state law limits the length of a moratorium to one year.

Fellow city resident Shirley Hinze said big tech companies are suing communities that adopt moratoriums.

"These corporations

like Microsoft have billions of dollars to come back after smaller communities like ours to force their issue," she said.

Hinze said Shawano County also needs to be concerned about what could happen in nearby Langlade County.

"If you do a data center to the north, it will deplete the water that then comes down through us,"

she said. "As this water is restricted, it heads down to Lake Butte des Morts, where, of course, the sturgeon come out of to head north to Shawano dam to spawn."

Hinze said Shawano County may not have the resources for a mega data center, but residents still need to be aware of the issues and be concerned about what others might do.

"I am totally against these data centers, because I do know what the impact will be on the environment," she said.

Supervisor Kathy Luebke urged residents in the cities, villages and other towns in Shawano County to push their local officials to adopt a similar moratorium.

Assets belonging to Shawano’s Newcap location are now up for sale in accordance with the court-ordered liquidation decision. All of the contents in the Newcap building at 504 Lakeland Road are now available through Titledown Auction Company. The auction began June 24. Bidding is open to the public and takes place exclusively online through Titledown Auction Company’s website. Nearly 600 items are on the auction block. Items include medical clinic equipment and supplies, office furniture, tools, Smart Boards, weatherization tools, HVAC testing equipment, small and large kitchen appliances, bed frames, park benches, a gas grill, computer equipment and more. All items are sold as is and are presumed untested unless otherwise noted. Titledown Auction Company does not test items for genuineness. Every lot opens with a \$2 starting bid and will sell to the highest bidder regardless of price, with no reserve. A 15% buyer’s fee and Wisconsin sales tax of 5.5% will be added to all purchases. All bidding will end July 7, starting at 6 p.m., with one lot closing every 15 seconds thereafter. Successful bidders must pick up their purchases between 11 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. July 8 at the Shawano location. Any items not picked up during that time will be considered abandoned and forfeited without refund. The auction is the latest event in the saga that led to the company closing its doors at the end of March and then filing for bankruptcy. For more than 50 years, Newcap operated in 10 counties, including Shawano,

Delinquent taxpayers face new penalty

Shawano County delinquent taxpayers will soon be assessed a new penalty on their back taxes. Members of the executive committee gave the green light to Emily Kazik, county treasurer, to help prepare an ordinance that will assess a 0.5% monthly penalty on all back taxes going back the last decade. It is anticipated the penalty will go into effect Jan. 1, 2027. Kazik said 64% of Wisconsin’s counties already assess the penalty, and some have been doing so for a couple decades or more. “Right now, there is only 1% interest,” she said. “The state allows any county to apply the

half percent as a penalty charge. They label it differently people who file for bankruptcy. If you file for bankruptcy, we do not collect for that penalty charge.” Kazik’s report for May showed the county is due more than \$803,000 in delinquent taxes and special charges, not including interest. In 2025, the county assessed interest at about \$200,000 on the delinquent bills. Based on the same amount of taxes due, the county would assess another \$100,000 in penalty charges. “It’s definitely a revenue maker,” Kazik said. “It’s something we can do without having to increase taxes, and only the people who are going to be delinquent are going to

get the extra charge.” The committee briefly wrestled with when the penalty should go into effect. “I would start it as far back as you can,” Supervisor Terry Tipton said. “It costs everybody else money.” Kazik said that at the end of 2026, she would be writing off delinquent taxes that are 10 years old, which prompted the committee to agree to charge the penalty on all taxes going back 10 years, effective Jan. 1. An ordinance will be drafted for the committee to consider at its July meeting; if approved, it will be forwarded to the county board later in the month.

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Baldwin wants details on Iran War deal

Senator
dubious about
lack of details
from president

President Donald Trump has declared victory in the Iran War and said the memorandum of understanding between the two country confirms the months-long war is over.

U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin said she'll only believe that when she and other members of Congress get to see that deal.

Baldwin held a virtual press conference with Wisconsin media June 17 and said Trump has repeatedly claimed victory in recent months in a war she said has cost taxpayers more than \$30 billion, even as attacks had continued on both sides. Besides the loss of 13 members of the

military, she noted that gas prices for both standard and diesel fuel have shot up, making life difficult for farmers and non-farmers alike.

"From his trade wars to his peace negotiations, President Trump often claims victory without any work to show for it, and this

time is no different," Baldwin said. "The truth is that President Trump has not reached a deal with Iran. There's no agreement to end their nuclear program. We have no assurances that war won't continue, no evidence that Americans are any better off today than they were before all this

started."

She added that the only thing she's seen on paper is that Trump plans to keep talking about a final deal.

Some details were revealed by the White House shortly after Baldwin's press conference. The deal calls for opening the Strait of Hormuz to oil tanker traffic and keeping it open, according to The Associated Press. There is also a plan for the U.S. to provide at least \$300 billion for Iran's reconstruction and economic development, and the U.S. will try to terminate all sanctions against Iran, including ones implemented by the United Nations and other countries.

Baldwin said full details are needed, as Trump and Iranian officials cannot even agree publicly on what's in the deal.

"Peace is unequivocally a good thing and something that I have been fighting for since this president launched this unnecessary war. In fact, it's something

I've advocated for my entire career," Baldwin said. "We need to make sure that whatever is in this agreement is real and also good for the American people, because so far this war has just been a disaster for Wisconsinites."

People in Wisconsin have spent \$877 million more on gasoline since the war first began earlier this year, according to Baldwin, equating to an additional \$378 per person. Diesel fuel hit record highs in May, she said, which struck a blow to farmers getting their fields planted for 2026.

"One farmer told me his fuel costs skyrocketed from \$120,000 to \$200,000 over the last year," Baldwin said. "Nearly 70% of farmers reported not being able to afford the fertilizer they needed this year."

Baldwin pointed to polls showing the low popularity of the Iran War and said that citizens need more than just assurances that they can trust Trump when he says the deal is a good

one.

"Donald Trump's wink-and-nod promise is not enough," Baldwin said. "Wisconsin families need details and guarantees that this unnecessary war is over once and for all."

Baldwin noted that there had already been a deal with Iran that limited its nuclear capabilities, but that deal was terminated by Trump during his first term in office. She said she plans to continue to push Congress to vote on war powers acts until the deal is formally presented to Congress.

"Now, the president is seeing that this is not a situation that you can bomb yourself out of," Baldwin said. "Here's what he needs to do. He needs to show the American people what is in this agreement, what we need to do to reach a long-term peace deal and explain how any of us are better off now compared to 3 1/2 months ago."

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Number of Shawano County housing units on the upswing

SCEPI leader says
more work needed
on inventory, costs

Single-family and multifamily housing units have recently been built in Shawano, Bonduel and Wittenberg, but Peter Thillman said more work still needs to be done for supply to meet demand in Shawano County.

Thillman, executive director of Shawano Community Economic Progress Inc., provided an annual update to the Shawano County Board on June 24.

He thanked the board for investing in a 2022 housing study.

"It is now paying dividends," Thillman said. "We are having projects opening in Bonduel, and Wittenberg later this year. We still need to build more multifamily and single-family housing, so we're addressing the housing shortage."

Bonduel and Shawano both completed single-family subdivisions, and both communities are actively working on more.

"Unfortunately, housing prices are not going down," Thillman said. "That's something we would like to address. I am still having a hard time with starter homes at \$450,000."

Shawano has approved a multi-unit

"twindo" (a style of duplex housing where two adjacent units share a single continuous structure, but each is individually owned) project to add more owner-occupied, zero-entry options to the market.

Outreach continues with developers and builders, especially for the single-family builders.

Thillman is working with Marion and Pulaski to develop housing and other commercial activities.

Countywide, supply still lags behind demand by about 2,500 units.

Thillman said a Thrive Rural Wisconsin project closed in Bonduel, after the village established a redevelopment authority and received three grants for \$150,000 total to get that going.

A Thrive Rural Wisconsin project in Wittenberg is now getting underway.

"(The intent is) to establish a redevelopment authority and redevelop their downtown and get things moving in the right direction," he said.

Communities that participate in Thrive Rural Wisconsin receive project management, financial support and technical assistance to advance local and regional initiatives and connect them to the resources they need to be successful.

SCEPI is part of a consortium of regional economic development

organizations New North and Centergy that will have a Hiring Heroes program. It will be based in Shawano County.

"It's a program where they go out and they recruit those leaving military service to ... come to northeast Wisconsin, primarily Shawano County, for open job opportunities," Thillman said.

The program grant was for \$250,000.

Thillman also noted that employment remained relatively flat between 2024 and 2025 with the labor force staying consistently above 20,000. The unemployment rate remained steady at 3.1%, which is considered full employment.

Finally, Shawano County has been experiencing an overall decline in population that accelerated after the 2008 Great Recession. That trend appears to be over as the county's population is now on the upswing.

"For the first time in about 40 years, Shawano County is actually growing in population," Thillman said. "We're making a turnaround, and we're growing the community once again."

Since the COVID era, the county has added nearly 2,000 new residents, and that trend looks to continue going forward.

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Adkins named Bonduel parade marshal

Dianne Adkins is the parade marshal for the Bonduel Independence Day parade, announced Celebrate Bonduel.

On May 26, 1962, she married Mark Adkins. Together they had two daughters, Sally and Penny, both of whom attended Bonduel schools. Mark Adkins worked at the Bonduel Times and later the Shawano Evening Leader, where he put his skills to good use creating the calendar class photos that students gave as Christmas gifts to their parents each year.

Throughout the years, Adkins followed area Little League and Dairyland League teams, and she rarely missed a high school football, basketball,

"It's pretty good to have a place like this in the family," Mueller said. "The other day when he helped me, I paid him in ice cream." LYNN ZAFFRANN

Charter fishing trip adventure for all ages

When it comes to outdoors hunting and fishing adventures, you tend to remember the toughest ones almost as much as the best ones. That was the case on a family fishing charter in the Atlantic Ocean out of North Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, on June 15 as part of an 11-day trip to the Carolinas.

It's hard to find shared activities that allow a 20-year-old active woman, a mostly sedentary 66-year-old marketing man and a columnist, and an 87-year-old

retired phone company gent who walks with a cane, but that's the beauty of a charter trip. It's all aboard, and most kids and adults will be fine.

Unless you are my daughter, Kalispell, and the Bonine doesn't work.

I booked this morning trip with Fish Hook Charters, North Myrtle Beach, because I had such a successful trip with them in June 2023, boating both a huge Spanish mackerel and multiple Atlantic sharpnose sharks (you can only keep one shark, and they are delicious).

I fished alone in 2023, but this time I had my father-in-law, Roger Nitschke, of Oshkosh, and Kali, who was on her first ocean fishing trip. Nitschke was an old salt at this, spending two months a year fishing Gulf of America waters south of Tampa, Florida, out of John's Pass on the Friendly Fisherman.

Those Florida boats are much larger, but with more anglers, you get less personalized attention than in the Carolinas. We only had six anglers on board this trip, plus deck hand Roger Lemke and Capt. Carson.

Lemke was working hard for us from the time we left the dock (7 a.m.) until we arrived back to shore (noon). He baited our hooks with cut squid, untangled snarled reels, pulled fish up the side of the 46-foot Fish Hook II and swabbed the decks and fish cleaning/baiting area with detergent and a brush when we were done so the boat was ready for the 1 p.m. trip.

Carson was a friendly, young fellow, but the trip to our first stop about 5 miles out between North and South Carolina was the roughest I've ever experienced. A front had come through the day before, and

Anguish flooded my heart as my brain registered what I saw. There, on the road just past our driveway, lay my sweet kitty, Fred. Lifeless.

My husband and I were on our four-wheeler, and immediately I felt the need to get Fred off the road.

“Let’s go back and get a guinea sack,” my husband suggested quietly.

Returning immediately, he gently placed Fred in the sack I had opened and, crying, I crumbled back into the four-wheeler.

Back in the day when I was a small girl on my home farm, we had a bunch of cats. They were there for a purpose – the circle of life – keeping mice at a minimum. One older one was the grandma of every cat on our farm, and she procreated regularly, keeping our mice at bay. Her offspring became our playmates, and we dressed them up in doll clothes when they were old enough.

Later, when I married my husband, we had cats on our farm, too, strictly for mice control.

Our cats were skittish, and I never considered them pets, really. They were just there.

When we sold our cows, the cats we had on the farm disappeared, one by one. We started noticing mice, and that got my husband’s attention.

“We need some cats,” he proclaimed one day.

I heard of a gal named Sarah Magee who rehomed cats. Contacting her through her organization, Joy’s Place Animal Rescue in Gresham, she brought out two spaded cats in a crate complete with food, blankets,

barn mow, I saw two beautiful yellow puff balls nestled there with eyes as wide as saucers and their mama – Fred. Who quite obviously was not a Fred but a Freda.

This old cat, whom I assumed

was male, turned out to be the very best mama. I’d pick them up, their bellies round as pumpkins and eyes clear as crystal. Fred – that was what we’d named “him” and it stuck – had a patch of fur

on her jawline gone, she was deaf and had barely any peripheral vision.

Her kitties were approximately 6 weeks old when we found their mama on the road that day. My first thought after seeing her there was of her twin orphan babies. How in the world would they survive?

That afternoon, I brought a saucer full of warm milk up to the barn. In tears I tried to show them the bowlful of milk. They would not drink; they were simply too little.

Confirming my perception of her compassion – and to calm me, I’m sure – later that night she texted: “The babies are fed and are sleeping.”

While I’m sorely missing Fred, I wait with anticipation when her offspring will again be home, thanks to sweet Sarah and her helpers at Joy’s Place Animal Rescue.

Vitamin K shots for newborns vitally important

Vitamin K is an essential vitamin that the body requires for normal bone development, vascular health, and – most pertinent to this topic – a healthy blood clotting system.

Vitamin K is found in abundance in green leafy vegetables, many fruits and berries, chicken and oils such as soybean, olive and canola oil. The body also produces its own vitamin K with the help of normal gut bacteria once babies begin eating a balanced diet beyond breast milk or formula.

Thankfully, vitamin K deficiency is quite rare – except in newborns. Very little vitamin K crosses the placenta during pregnancy, so all infants begin life with very low vitamin K stores.

These stores remain low for several months, especially in exclusively breastfed infants because breast milk naturally contains only small amounts of vitamin K. Infant formula contains more vitamin K than breast milk, but it is still not an adequate amount for several days, which is why supplementation at birth is recommended regardless of feeding method.

Although persistent vitamin K deficiency can contribute to long-term health problems, the most immediate and dangerous consequence is bleeding. Before routine vitamin K prophylaxis, early and classic Vitamin K Deficiency Bleeding occurred in approximately 0.25–1.7% of newborns (roughly 1 in 400 to 1 in 60 births), depending on the population studied.

Intracranial hemorrhage was among the most devastating complications, often occurring without warning and carrying a high risk of death or permanent neurologic injury. Since universal vitamin K administration at birth became standard practice, VKDB has become exceedingly rare in countries with high uptake of the newborn vitamin K injection.

Hemorrhagic disease of the newborn, now known as VKDB) was first recognized in the late 1800s, but the cause was not understood until the 1930s when a Danish biochemist identified vitamin K’s critical role in blood clotting.

Shortly afterward, a Swedish researcher conducted a study

involving more than 13,000 newborns demonstrating that vitamin K supplementation immediately after birth dramatically reduced hemorrhagic disease. That study included both oral and intramuscular administration.

While both reduced early-onset VKDB, oral vitamin K proved less reliable because it requires multiple doses and was significantly less effective at preventing late-onset VKDB.

As a result, in 1961 the American Academy of Pediatrics officially recommended a single intramuscular vitamin K injection for every newborn shortly after birth, and it has remained the standard of care ever since.

Although oral vitamin K protocols exist for parents who decline the injection, they require multiple doses over several weeks, depend on perfect adherence and still do not provide the same protection against late VKDB. We also know that maternal vitamin K supplementation during pregnancy does not prevent VKDB because only minimal amounts cross the placenta.

VKDB is classified into three forms:

- Early onset: within the first 24 hours after birth.
- Classic: from 24 hours through the first week of life.

- Late onset: from 2 weeks to 6 months of age.

This distinction is important because the risk does not end when a newborn leaves the hospital. Babies who do not receive the single IM dose remain vulnerable for months.

Unfortunately, these life-threatening bleeds rarely give warning signs before they occur. Approximately one in five infants with VKDB dies, and about half of late-onset cases involve bleeding into the brain. Among survivors of intracranial hemorrhage, approximately 40% suffer permanent neurologic injury or developmental disabilities.

Another early bleeding complication that is sometimes overlooked is elective newborn circumcision.

Vitamin K deficiency significantly increases the risk of serious bleeding following newborn-circumcision, which is why many hospitals and nurseries will not perform an elective circumcision unless the infant has received the vitamin K injection.

Since this has been the standard of care for more than 60 years and has prevented countless cases of severe bleeding and death, why are we still discussing it today?

Much like vaccines, concerns

about the vitamin K injection increased after a small study published in England in 1990 suggested a possible association with childhood cancer. Numerous larger, better-designed studies conducted since then have found no evidence that the vitamin K injection increases the risk of childhood leukemia or any other childhood cancer.

Unfortunately, the original claim continues to circulate on social media despite being thoroughly disproven.

Thankfully, deaths from VKDB remain rare, because most newborns still receive vitamin K at birth. However, as more parents decline this simple, safe and highly effective intervention, preventable cases continue to occur.

The newborn vitamin K injection is one of the safest and most effective preventive interventions in modern medicine. A single injection provides protection during the months when babies are naturally most vulnerable to vitamin K deficiency bleeding, preventing a rare but potentially devastating condition that can cause lifelong disability or death.

the swells were at least 5 feet high, maybe more. We seemed to be going very fast, and the boat bashed and tossed with every wave. I sat up close to the cabin with Nitschke, but some of the swells splashed over the railing, and my right leg was soon drenched.

Kali headed into the cabin, as she was already getting queasy, despite taking two Bonine (I always take one, and they work

great for me). I told her she was better off to stay outside the cabin and look at the horizon, but she hates listening to Dad. I soon saw her holding a wastebasket, and she quickly made three contributions.

About the time we stopped for our first attempt, she was looking pretty chipper and said, “I feel better now.” She grabbed a rod and soon everyone was catching sea bass as fast as we could

reel them in. Unfortunately, the length limit was 13 inches, and the biggest of the 40-plus fish caught was about a half-inch short. Still, we had a ball catching them sometimes two at a time (one on each of our two hooks).

We made a few more sea bass stops before baiting up with cut bait and heading for shark waters, also on rocky structure.

Lemke put out at least four rods, and we waited

for about 20 minutes, then moved to a second spot. One rod finally twitched, and after setting the hook, he handed the saltwater rig to me.

I kept the line tight, reeling as fast as possible. I felt the weight of the shark (Atlantic sharpnoses are smaller than the sharks of movies, and a big one is about 3 feet long), but when the line got close to the boat, it was gone.

Nitschke caught two of

the most unusual saltwater fish I’ve ever seen: a lizard fish (long and narrow as the name implies) and a sea robin, which has wing-like fins and even feet to walk on the bottom, the deck hand explained. Both went back to the ocean.

We tipped our deck hand \$70, because he had worked hard, and we still had an ocean adventure, although we did have to make a stop at Platt’s Seafood to buy some red

snapper and halibut.

If you are looking for a family adventure that won’t break the bank (we paid \$122 each), I highly recommend a fishing charter, whether it’s on an ocean or Lake Michigan. A bouncy trip fishing beats a good day working every time.

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Bat tests positive for rabies

The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department reports that a bat in Shawano County has tested positive for the rabies virus, which is transmitted from infected mammals to humans (typically via a bite) and is nearly always fatal once symptoms appear.

This is the first confirmed case of rabies in a bat in Shawano County this year. While it is not uncommon for Shawano County to have at least one rabid bat a year, this positive rabies result is a reminder that this fatal disease is present in the community's wildlife.

Rabies is contracted by exposure to a rabid animal. The exposure is nearly always through

a bite, but rabies can be transmitted if a rabid animal scratches a person or it is saliva is exposed to broken skin. If a person has had any physical contact with a bat and the possibility of a bite or scratch cannot be ruled out, rabies preventive treatment may be necessary.

Early symptoms of rabies may include irritability, headache, fever, double vision, and itching or pain at the exposure site. The disease eventually progresses to spasms of the throat and the muscles used for breathing, convulsions, delirium, paralysis and death.

By the time any symptoms may appear, rabies

cannot be successfully treated, health department officials said.

Ways to prevent the spread of rabies include:

- Ensure all pet dogs, cats, ferrets and livestock are vaccinated against rabies.
- Stay away from all wild animals, especially those acting abnormally.
- Do not keep exotic or wild animals as pets, regardless of how young or cute they may be.
- Exclude bats from inside living quarters by keeping screens in good repair and closing up any small openings that could allow them to enter.
- Teach children not to approach any unfamiliar animals.
- If a bat is found

inside your home, do not release it until you have spoken with the health department, as testing may be necessary.

If you are bitten or scratched, follow these steps:

- Promptly cleanse the bite wound with liberal amounts of soap and water.
- Contact your physician or go to your local emergency room.
- If the offending animal can be safely captured without further injury, hold the animal until the local health department can be consulted.

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ThedaCare shares summer safety tips for children at play

Play and recreation are vital to children’s well-being and development, according to an expert with ThedaCare.

“Spending time outdoors benefits kids in so many ways,” said Dr. Elizabeth Ermatinger, a pediatrician with ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Appleton. “From exploring the world to encouraging physical activity to engaging in imaginative play, outside time is a win.”

Ermatinger shared some safety reminders for children and parents alike.

“Don’t let a warm day go sideways,” she said. “Simple safety steps like applying sunscreen when planning to stay out in the sun and wearing a bike helmet when cycling can go a long way in reducing the likelihood of accidents and injuries.”

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends children wear a sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher.

“It’s important to wear sunscreen outdoors, regardless of the season,” Ermatinger said. “That applies to overcast and sunny days.”

For best results, people should apply sunscreen between 15 and 30 minutes before going outside, she said. She also encouraged people to:

- Cover all exposed areas, including the often-overlooked body parts of the ears, hands, feet, bridge of the nose and beneath swimsuit straps.
- Protect their lips with an SPF 30 lip balm.
- Apply sunscreen generously.
- Reapply every two hours or more, especially if swimming or sweating.

• Keep babies younger than 6 months old out of direct sunlight.

“If we teach our children to always wear sunscreen when they’re young, it can set up good health habits for the future,” Ermatinger said. “Ask your child’s doctor if you have questions about which sunscreen is right for them.”

Biking? Wear a helmet

Bike helmets can help prevent serious head and face injuries during a fall. Wearing one may decrease the risk of head injuries by about 85%, according to the AAP.

“Helmets and bike riding should go hand in hand for people of all ages,” Ermatinger said. “Kids watch what adults do. Set a positive example by wearing a helmet whenever you bike.”

It’s important to buy bike helmets that meet the safety standards of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, Ermatinger said. They should fit snugly, include a chin strap and be replaced if damaged during a crash.

“Make sure kids also wear helmets for other warm-weather activities like rollerblading, skateboarding, horseback riding and all-terrain vehicle riding,” she said.

Swim safety

Swimming offers a great way to get active and beat the heat. At the same time, it’s important to follow precautions to ensure everyone stays safe, Ermatinger said.

Drowning is a leading cause of death among children, especially for those between the ages of 1 and

4 years, according to the AAP.

“Enrolling your child in swimming lessons is a great first step,” Ermatinger said. “It’s also important to stay vigilant and ensure everyone follows the rules and safety precautions at pools and beaches.”

The American Red Cross offers water safety recommendations including but not limited to:

- Swimming in designated areas with lifeguard supervision.
- Avoiding swimming alone.
- Providing close and constant attention to children, even when a lifeguard is present.
