Larsen's appeal to live near West Side Beach denied

Sex offender's petition supported by some, opposed by others

Brynn Larsen said she wanted to return home to Oconto Falls, but the Oconto Falls Common Council said she couldn't – at least not in the spot she had picked. The council voted unanimously Aug. 18 to deny Larsen's request to move into a home she was buying in the city because it was within established boundaries where sex offenders are forbidden to live. Sex offenders are not allowed to live within 1,000 feet of schools, parks and churches, and the house Larsen wanted to buy on West Highland Avenue is within 1,000 feet of West Side Beach. Larsen informed Oconto Falls Police Chief Brad Olson of her plans to relocate

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during the second week of July, with the Wisconsin Department of Corrections claiming there were no restrictions that could be afoot of the law. Olson told the council he looked at the map and realized the proximity to the beach, so he denied

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Poaching suspect a no-show in court twice

Circuit judges issue arrest warrants for Pulcifer man

Two circuit court judges recently ordered an arrest warrant for a Shawano County man after he failed to show up for court appearances on nine poaching-related charges. Dylan J. Wolff, 27, of Pulcifer, faces several felony and misdemeanor charges in connection with alleged poaching incidents in Waupaca and Forest counties. Waupaca County Circuit Court Judge Troy Nielsen ordered a warrant for Wolff's arrest Aug. 18 after Wolff failed to show up in Waupaca for his adjourned initial appearance after he was charged with two felonies and six misdemeanors. Meanwhile, Forest County Circuit Court Judge Robert A. Kennedy Jr. ordered an arrest warrant five days earlier on Aug. 13 after Wolff failed to show up to face a misdemeanor charge. Wolff's charges in Waupaca County are two felony counts of bail jumping and two misdemeanor counts each of failure to obtain a deer hunting license, hunting deer during closed season and hunting/fishing/trapping after revocation (second offense within five years). He also faces one misdemeanor count in Forest County of hunting/fishing/trapping after revocation (second offense within five years). Wolff is also accused of several poaching violations in Oconto and Brown counties, but no poaching-related charges had been filed against him in either county as of Aug. 18. He also faced several poaching-related charges in Shawano, Forest and Waupaca county dating back to January 2025, but those cases were all closed. Waupaca County Assistant District Attorney Nicholas Bolz is handling the case against Wolff in Waupaca County. "Either he'll turn himself in or if law enforcement has contact with him and see that he has a warrant, he'll come back to the Waupaca County Jail and be seen in front of one of the judges, whoever's on intake," Bolz said. "We'll then discuss his bond again. It might get reinstated, or he'll get a cash bond. After that, we'll do the adjourned initial appearance again. That hearing will determine whether he

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her request.

“I notified Brynn Larsen that this would be in violation of our sex offender residency restrictions, and she was notified of the appeal process,” Olson said.

He told the plan commission that Larsen had already put down “a substantial amount of money” to buy the home. He added that he would not have known in advance of the move if Larsen hadn’t come forward to tell him, because the Department of Corrections doesn’t inform municipalities until the relocation has already taken place.

City ordinance allowed Larsen to appeal Olson’s decision, so she appeared before the city’s plan commission earlier in the evening before the case was taken up by the council. The ordinance required the appeal receive both the approval of the plan commission and the council.

Larsen was a former assistant coach and substitute teacher with the Oconto Falls School District who was sentenced in 2021 to two years in prison and five years on probation after having a sexual relationship with a 15-year-old student in 2013. She is designated as a level 3 sex offender.

“I wanted to leave everything out in the open,” Larsen said as she explained why she gave Olson a heads-up about moving back to Oconto Falls. “I did not want to hide anything.”

The ordinance does not prohibit Larsen from living in the city, as long as the property is not in close proximity to places where

children may congregate.

Larsen spoke about what she’d done and how she’s turned her life around.

“I understand that I did something very terrible,” Larsen said. “I take full responsibility for that.”

Larsen said she went through the sex offender treatment program, and now she has a commercial driver’s license and a full-time job, although she did not go into detail about her new job. She has also found a spiritual home at Grace Lutheran Church, and several people attended the council meeting to support her.

“People ask me why I want to stay here,” Larsen said. “I was born at the hospital. I was raised here for 37 years, and this place is my home. I messed up my reputation bad, but coming back here, this was always a place of warmth for me.”

Oconto Falls resident Carolyn Vandenlangenberg spoke in favor of approving Larsen’s appeal, saying she doesn’t view Larsen as a current threat to the community.

“I don’t feel that Brynn is detrimental to anyone,” Vandenlangenberg said. “I would have her babysit my grandchildren with no fear. It’s not like she’s pulling anything with you guys. She’s followed the law and the process in order to try to have a life.”

Vandenlangenberg added Larsen could be living three doors down from the proposed property and be outside the restricted area, but it would still be a neighborhood with children in it. She didn’t see

what the harm was.

“She has paid her dues, and she went through the right channels,” she said.

A letter from Larsen’s pastor, Chris Antoniak, was also read into the record as a show of support. In the letter, Antoniak wrote that he’d gotten to know Larsen over the last few months. He wrote that she was sincere and dependable, and she eventually hoped to get involved with prison ministry.

“As her pastor, I’ve had the opportunity to observe her in worship but also through her active participation in the life of our congregation,” Antoniak wrote. “She has become an active part of our church family. She currently oversees the care and changing of our altar pyramids, a ministry that requires both faithfulness and attention to detail. She is also about to begin training in our sound and video ministry, taking on additional responsibilities to serve the congregation.”

Not everybody in the audience felt that Larsen’s good deeds post-prison warranted skirting the law. Oconto Falls resident Kevin Rusch noted that when residents and businesses move into Oconto Falls, they look at things like where sex offenders are living, and he felt there was already enough activity in the city to warrant denying Larsen’s request.

“I’m wondering if we’re opening Pandora’s box here and opening ourselves up to future litigation because we allowed this one, but we didn’t allow that one,” Rusch said. “Maybe someone put the

cart before the horse and shouldn’t have bought the house.”

Oconto Falls resident Keith Lefebvre was also opposed. He made note of the current lawsuit against the school district claiming that sexual predators on its staff were allowed to flourish without action from administrators or school board members.

“I don’t think the city needs to open itself up to this,” Lefebvre said. “I don’t know Miss Larsen. I never laid eyes on her before tonight. I know nothing about her. I think she has a lot of bravery walking in here, and I commend her for that, but she made some choices. This is the find out part, and that’s the unfortunate reality.”

Red tape got into the mix to delay the council’s decision, because the ordinance required the council to receive the plan commission’s decision in writing.

Because the plan commission met right before the council, the minutes had not been written yet. Alderwoman Ashley Bahrke pointed this out and insisted the council must have it before it could take a vote, so Deputy City Clerk Jenny Friedman had to hastily type up the commission’s action on the agenda item. She brought it back 15 minutes later for a vote.

There was no further discussion by the council before the appeal was denied, but Mayor Clint Braun said he felt the council should abide by the rules the city has in place.

wants an attorney or qualifies for either a public defender or a court-appointed attorney, or he could hire his own attorney.”

The eight Waupaca County charges came after state Department of Natural Resources conservation wardens confronted Wolff on Jan. 8 at Zion Lutheran Church Cemetery in the Town of Matteson, just north of Embarrass.

The two felony bail jumping charges stem from a case in Shawano County. Wolff’s past court history in that county includes a conviction in April 2026 for hunting/fishing/trapping after revocation.

Local law enforcement departments are working on the case with assistance from the DNR and the state Public Defenders Office, according to Bolz.

“Some of it has to do with the calendars of everyone and the Public Defenders Office based on staffing, whether they can find an attorney for him if he qualifies,” he said. “If he gets picked up in Forest or Waupaca (counties), he’ll have to be seen in both courts before he’d be released.”

Cases that include several allegations, a number of law enforcement agencies and multiple counties

can be difficult to prosecute, Bolz said.

“It can, but thankfully, most counties are willing to work with each other,” he said. “I’m the dedicated DNR prosecutor for Waupaca County. It’s easier when you can talk to someone who has familiarity with DNR statutes and codes and works closely with the DNR to see what they’re looking for.”

Wolff was free on a \$2,500 signature bond in Waupaca County.

Bolz said the next step in the case is for authorities to apprehend Wolff.

“They’ll pick him up and we’ll bring him back,” he said. “In a criminal case, it’s the warrant that’s outstanding. If he lays low and doesn’t have any police contact, the warrant can be outstanding for months or even years depending on where he’s located.

“Some jurisdictions will make an effort to go find individuals. Given the fact that he’s not from Waupaca, they might reach out to another jurisdiction and say, ‘Hey, can you drive by the house?’ I don’t know if they’ll do that in this kind of case, but that is a possibility.”

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Marion booster club seeks to replace scoreboards

\$35K price tag to upgrade equipment for both fields

If everything falls into place, Marion High School's baseball and softball teams will play their home games with a new scoreboard starting next season.

The Marion Mustang Booster Club recently kicked off a fund-raising campaign to come up with \$35,000 to replace both scoreboards at the Marion Athletic Field.

Club president Luke Stuhr said the organization has raised a couple of thousand dollars for the project so far. He and club treasurer Carrie Aus attended the Marion/Tigerton football team's first game of the season Aug. 20 to help spread the word about the effort.

"We just started our drive for it," Stuhr said. "We're trying to raise \$35,000 for a new scoreboard for our softball and baseball fields. The softball field is dedicated to Debbie Malueg, and we have the John Bartelt Baseball Field. The goal is to have them in place for spring sports, which is going to come up really fast."

Aus said the scoreboards are more than 20 years old.

"The parts and maintenance are

hard to come by, they're hard to maintain," she said.

"The last five-plus years have been a struggle," Stuhr said. "Some years we would not have (a scoreboard), some years we would be waiting on parts halfway through the season. The battery life is depleted, so we'd need to be plugged in all the time."

Without a scoreboard, players, coaches and fans would be unaware of the score, inning and pitch count.

The club will do what it can to help save money, according to Stuhr.

"We're going to try to use as much existing poles and electrical to save as much money as we possibly can," he said. "The scoreboards are going to look fairly similar. We're not

looking at all the bells and whistles."

The club had fliers available at the game's concession stand that included a donation form. Sponsorship opportunities include platinum (\$1,000 and up), gold (\$750 to \$999), silver (\$500 to \$749) and bronze (\$250 to \$499). Sponsors' names will be displayed near each scoreboard.

Any other amounts will also be accepted.

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Radford homicide charges upgraded to intentional

New ADA on case says evidence indicates death was not reckless

James Radford is now being charged with first-degree intentional homicide in the death of his wife, Sabrina Radford, in 2016.

One month after the preliminary hearing for the case in which he was charged with reckless homicide, the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney's Office upped the charge. The intentional homicide charge also has a domestic abuse modifier.

The death occurred in the Town of Fairbanks on April 11, 2016. James Radford was taken into custody in April 2025 by Waukesha County and then transferred to the Shawano County Jail, where he is being held on a cash bond of \$800,000.

Assistant District Attorney Brent DeBord said the reckless homicide charges were filed before he became part of the district attorney's office, and he was recently assigned the case. He looked at the evidence, he said, and he felt that it pointed to intentional homicide and not reckless.

DeBord asked for the bond to be set at \$1 million cash, noting the huge incentive to flee, because the crime comes with a sentence of life imprisonment if convicted, as well as the threat of violence to the public.

That received an objection from defense attorney John Swimmer, who noted that his client has been in jail since the initial arrest. He asked for the cash bond to become a signature bond, noting James Radford's ties to Shawano County and claiming there have been no missed court appearances or bail jumping.

"Raising the bond from \$800,000 to \$1 million is arbitrary and capricious," Swimmer said. "The state

has the exact same evidence. There is not one iota of evidence that is different. There is not one new fact. Every fact is identical."

Judge Gregory Huber ruled that the bond would remain what it has been.

Swimmer also objected to proceeding with the current case even though the previous homicide case has not been dismissed. DeBord told the judge he was in the process of getting the case dismissed.

In the latest criminal complaint, it is alleged that James Radford found out his wife had been cheating on him that night and found a scarf with semen on it and claimed similar fluids were on the couch, although investigators found no evidence of semen on the couch. The defendant allegedly left the house for a while and returned at 3 a.m. April 11, where talk of him divorcing his wife came up.

The defendant claimed Sabrina Radford came back with James' gun and allegedly said she wasn't going to live without him. The Wisconsin Crime Lab reported one chamber of the .44 caliber gun was empty, one round had been fired and four bullets were still in the gun. Evidence indicates the incident wasn't a suicide, as James Radford had claimed, due to no blood or other blowback materials on the gun that would be there if the victim had put the gun to her chest and fired.

The criminal complaint also claims that there was a text message on Sabrina Radford's phone claiming James Radford was threatening her if she saw another man. The text was on Feb. 18, 2016.

A preliminary hearing has been set in this case for 11:45 a.m. Aug. 28.

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Marion Body Works seeks more land

Marion Body Works opened a satellite facility in Shawano four years ago after more than a century of fabricating commercial truck bodies in Marion, but now the company is looking at expanding its operation even more.

City Administrator Edie Sheppard told the Shawano Industrial and Commercial Development Committee on Aug. 20 that Marion is looking at more space adjacent to its current 113,000-square-foot manufacturing facility in the Bay Lakes Industrial

Park. He said the space would be the staging area for some of the chassis they're building.

Right now, Marion is looking to lease the land, according to Sheppard, although there are discussions about potentially building more infrastructure to keep up with demand.

"They're doing really well, and they're liking the Shawano location," Sheppard said. "Their immediate needs are some additional space. They reached out ... just to talk about what their long-term plans are."

The lease would be in

six-month increments, Sheppard said.

Marion is also looking at purchasing the building it works out of, according to Sheppard, to do some modifications and increase production. However, the purchase has not occurred yet, he said.

"These are very preliminary conversations but enough so where they want to talk about a lease, and even within that lease, what it can transition into," Sheppard said. "I think it's very positive that they're relatively new to Shawano, although they're not a new company — they've been in

Marion forever — but the Shawano location seems to have been a real solid addition for the company and they want to make a long-term change."

Sheppard said the lease would be drafted for the committee to vote on at its Sept. 17 meeting. He noted that if another company is interested in purchasing that property, Marion would have to decide whether to buy outright or vacate the land.

"We wouldn't set it up in any way that would restrict development," Sheppard said.

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Anderson resigns from county board

Borrowing for courthouse plans still moving along

\$29 million for first phase expected to be approved in September

Members of the Shawano County Executive Committee on Aug. 19 approved what's called a "heads-up" resolution alerting the bond market that the county intends to borrow \$29 million for the first phase of a \$121 million building project.

The full county board is expected to follow suit Aug. 26.

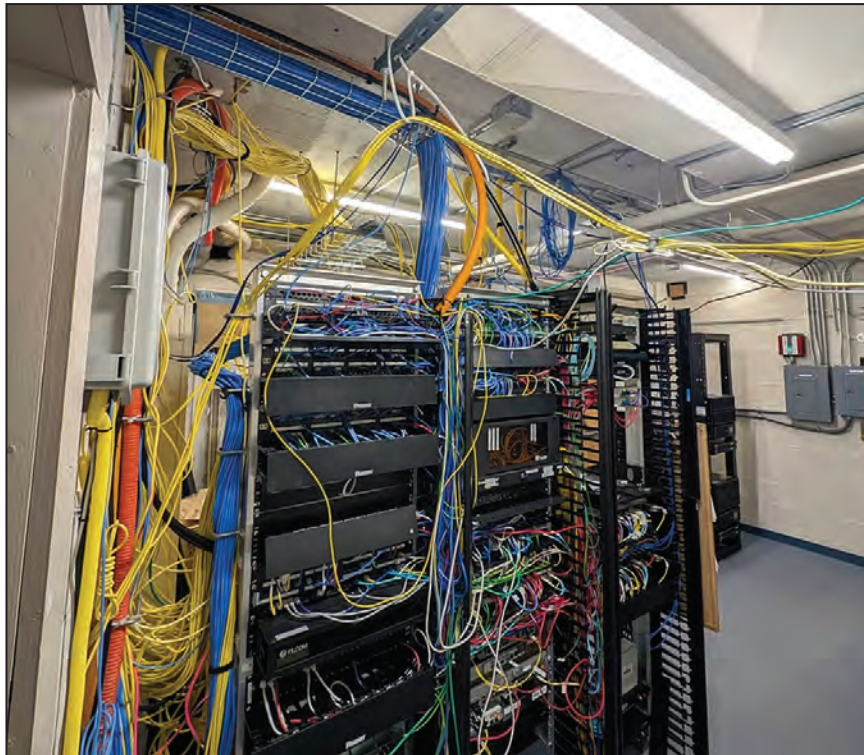
"You're not borrowing money at this time," said Carol Wirth, president and owner of Wisconsin Public Finance Professionals LLC. "You are simply establishing the fact that you are going to the bond market and provide funds for phase 1 of the financing."

Two other phases totaling \$92 million are expected to continue in 2027 and 2028.

The \$121 million project includes constructing and equipping a new courthouse, a secure connection to the existing jail, a vehicle sally port, jail intake and support areas and a new inmate housing unit, as well as acquiring land and related furnishings, fixtures and equipment.

At the Sept. 23 county board meeting, supervisors are expected to pass a resolution to officially borrow the funds. At that time, they will have final interest rates related to the borrowing.

Each phase of borrowing will be paid back over 20 years, the maximum allowed by the state.

"It basically starts with paying back the principal in 2027," Wirth said of the first phase of borrowing. "Then, there's a couple of years that there is no principal. That is intentional, because we're providing room for phase 2 and phase 3 to come in at that time. That's to make sure that we stay on target with the projections that were made back in February. Then we continue to pay that principal through the year 2046."

Green County borrowed \$35 million in August at an interest rate of

4.13%, Wirth said.

"The rates could continue to change ... until we go into the market in September," she said.

In February, she estimated a tax base growth of 8% and an interest rate for borrowing at 4.25%. Those figures would result in an increase in the tax rate of 45 cents per \$1,000 of equalized value.

As of Aug. 18, the growth was 8.75% and interest rate was 4.13%. Those figures would result in a tax rate increase of 44 cents per \$1,000.

Foreclosed properties for county sold online

After foreclosing on four properties in January, Shawano County has now rid itself of all of them.

Two properties were sold in April to the village of Gresham, while sites in Mattoon and Wittenberg were recently sold online through Wisconsin Surplus.

Members of the county's executive committee agreed Aug. 19 to sell the latter two properties to recoup its delinquent taxes and other costs associated with the foreclosures.

Land and a house at 502 S. Mission St., Wittenberg, was formerly owned by Ella Mae Decorah. It was sold for \$47,000 to Rachel Olson of RO Wealth Properties LLC in Bonduel. The county's costs were \$16,534.21, leaving a profit of \$30,465.79.

"I definitely feel like the \$47,000 is a fair price for purchasing this property," said County Treasurer Emily Kazik.

She said the property

had an appraised value of \$50,000; an assessed value of \$43,900; and a fair market value of \$51,600.

In Mattoon, property previously owned by Philip Merkle sold for \$10,005 to Dean Johnson, who owns property next to the one that was purchased.

"That definite sold for more than we appraised the value at," Kazik said.

The property was appraised at \$8,100, was assessed at \$6,500, and the fair market value was \$8,800.

The county's costs are estimated at \$7,107.88, leaving a profit of \$2,897.12.

"We may have some additional costs," Kazik said. "That's the estimated right now."

By law, checks for the profits will be sent to the previous owners' last known address, but because both owners are deceased and no one else has responded to previous letters, officials expect the money will eventually make its way to the state as unclaimed property.

City of Shawano taking lessons from Menasha tornado strike

The aftermath of the EF-3 tornado that damaged much of Menasha has raised questions of what would happen if a similar catastrophe hit closer to home.

No one can be fully prepared for the magnitude of such an event, according to Shawano City Administrator Eddie Sheppard. However, he said one way to mitigate the damage is to make sure there are good working relationships with other entities like neighboring municipalities, counties and even states.

"There are times when we're sending people out (of the city), and some wonder, 'Why are you doing that?'" he said. "It's the right thing to do, because lives are in danger, but you want to show up so people remember if something like this happens to you."

Sheppard noted the city does have plans in place for minor emergencies, but the EF-3 tornado entering an urban area is rare. He said standard processes tend to

go out the window in such instances.

"We have what we believe are very strong protocols and communications that we have set up for things like snowstorms and minor storms where trees are coming across the road with PD (police department) and public works. Those are things we can plan for and have people who are on-call," Sheppard said. "We make sure everyone knows who they're connected with and informed. I feel like we do a good job of that."

When major catastrophes occur, what Sheppard described as a city administrator's "worst nightmare," the important thing is for leaders to figure out priorities and determine who to contact right away for assistance, he said.

"You don't staff for anything like that," Sheppard said. "You're going to depend on other agencies. For the Menasha thing, as soon as we saw how bad it was, we were working with them, sending down the fire department and clearing gas leaks. Our linemen

went down there, because you can't get public safety people in if they can't get down the roads if there's power lines there."

Developing mutual aid agreements is key to provide aid to others who need it, but it's also a vital tool for when you become the one who needs rescuing, according to Sheppard.

"It's a horrible situation, but it's a reminder to communities that these things are not in our everyday lives, but they are things we need to be thinking about and preparing for," he said.

Sheppard noted having department heads join together, know all the protocols and practice them on a regular basis helps to make sure disaster recovery goes as smoothly as possible. Such measures should never be done after the crisis has occurred, he said.

"That's not the time to start," Sheppard said. "Us interacting daily and communicating is so important."

Sheppard added that what happened in Menasha is providing learning opportunities for other

municipalities. He said Shawano will look at what took place during the recovery, both good and bad, to see what can be done locally to streamline services so that utilities are restored, families are reunited and the community is returned to a semblance of normalcy as quickly as possible.

The League of Municipalities has sessions at their conferences regarding various tragedies to help Shawano and others to keep procedures in mind. One of the things is to make sure that first responders like the police and fire departments have priority service cell phones. Sheppard said that's to make sure that if cell service goes down, emergency responders can still communicate in times of emergency.

"What happened in Menasha could have easily happened here," he said. "I'm so thankful it didn't happen in Shawano, but you're never out of the woods. It could happen tomorrow. You just have to keep a cool head and make sure you have good people who know what to do."

Grants help Ho-Chunk, Menominee projects

By providing those items at no cost, the organization says the program helps people prepare for work, keep children clothed for school and stay safe during Wisconsin's changing seasons.

The Traveling Closet works with local community organizations and social service agencies in Shawano to reach households with the greatest need. Each event is expected to serve dozens of households and distribute hundreds of clothing items, helping families stretch limited budgets while supporting dignity, employment readiness and school attendance.

In addition to the mobile program, Community Clothes Closet operates several services across Northeastern Wisconsin, including a shopping floor at its Menasha facility, a New Start Boutique for job seekers, back-to-school support, winter clothing distributions, PajamaRama, Baby Kits and Closet to Closet emergency clothing kits for children entering foster care or crisis situations.

Together, those programs aim to ensure that individuals and families have access to clothing and essentials that help them feel confident, stable and prepared for everyday life.

Community partners say the mobile model has already made a difference in nearby communities.

In Clintonville, Compassionate Connections Center Executive Director Leah Wojnowiak said the Traveling Closet has had a significant impact by bringing essential clothing to families every 60 days.

"The Traveling Closet puts an incredible amount of time and care into

curating a clothes closet especially for the families they serve here in the Clintonville community," Wojnowiak said. "It has been a true joy for the Compassionate Connections Center to partner with the Traveling Closet and witness families select clothing that suits their personal style and needs, helping to empower them and boost their self-esteem."

Client stories have also underscored the program's effect.

At a Traveling Closet event in Oshkosh, staff met a new father who had welcomed a baby only days earlier. He and his partner are raising five children,

and despite the demands of caring for a newborn and a large family, they attended the event because their children needed clothing.

The father, who is attending school and hopes to run for a seat on the local school board, told staff he had never owned a brand-new pair of shoes, because he did not own socks.

After visiting the Traveling Closet, he left with clothing, socks and a renewed sense of confidence. For the first time in his life, he later bought himself a brand-new pair of shoes.

For Community Clothes Closet, stories like that reflect the organization's belief that clothing is more than a basic necessity. Clean, well-fitting clothing can help people attend school, pursue employment, care for their families and participate more fully in their communities.

Since 1980, Community Clothes Closet has provided clothing free of charge to people experiencing financial hardship. What began as a small church-led initiative has grown into a regional resource serving thousands of people each year through its Menasha facility and mobile outreach program.

The organization partners with more than 90 social service agencies and relies on volunteers, donors and community supporters to provide clothing in a welcoming environment where people can choose items that fit their needs and personal style.

Members of the Shawano County Historical Society are hoping to add on to Heritage Park, a site that features several 19th century buildings on Shawano's north side.

"This past spring, we were approached by Dean Proper, who is also the gentlemen that built our Zachow Depot," said Jesse Borlen, Shawano County Historical Society president, curator and archives director. "He would like us to build, with his help, a new museum building. It would be a space for temporary exhibits, meeting

space, stuff like that. He has already pledged a million dollars to the project."

In August, Borlen received the tentative OK from the county's highway and parks committee and the public property committee.

The building is proposed to be built west of the church and small stone building at Heritage Park near Sunset Island at North Franklin and West First streets. The land is vacant now.

"He has worked with Somerville Architects," Borlen said of Proper. "Somerville's estimate right now would probably be about \$3 million."

The project would require more fundraising on the part of the historical society.

Borlen said the society hopes to hire someone to write grants and become the spokesperson for the project.

"We'd also probably try to tie it in to our church and wedding venue, so we could rent it out for events," he said.

It was also noted that if nothing happens with the project within 10 years, the \$1 million pledge would be rescinded and given to Bonduel High School for scholarships.

Shawano, Menominee stories in new memoir

Davis highlights emerging movement for Indigenous education

A significant part of Thomas E. Davis' new memoir, "Beginnings," grows out of the people, places and events he encountered in Menominee and Shawano counties during a formative period of his life.

Published by All Things That Matter Press, "Beginnings" traces Davis' life from his childhood in western Colorado through more than five decades as an educator, writer and advocate for Native American education. For readers in the Shawano area, some of the book's most compelling stories unfold much closer to home.

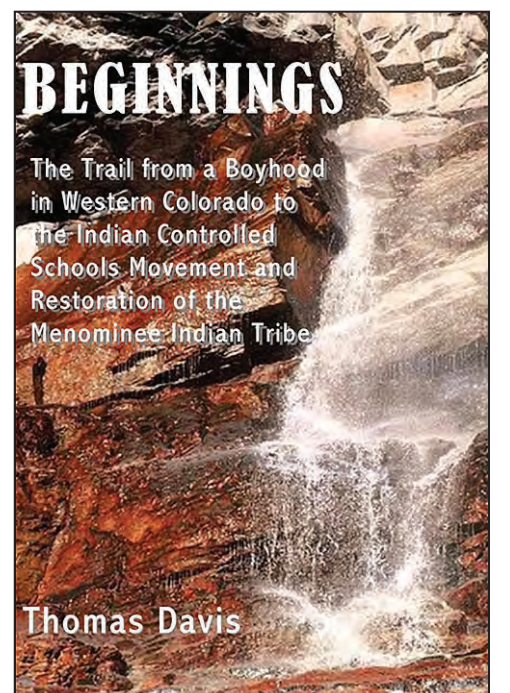
Davis' years in northeastern Wisconsin brought him into contact with the Menominee and with people involved in the emerging movement for Native American-controlled education. His experiences in Menominee County and the Shawano and Gresham area became an important part of his personal and professional development — and ultimately helped shape a career devoted to expanding educational opportunities for American Indian students throughout the United States.

The book recalls people and events associated with Menominee County, Shawano County and surrounding communities at a time when the relationship between Native communities and American education was undergoing profound change. Davis writes not simply as an observer, but as someone who became deeply involved in that transformation.

Those experiences eventually contributed to his role in helping establish the College of the Menominee Nation, the Native American-controlled schools movement and to his broader involvement in the tribal college movement. Over the following decades, his work in American Indian higher education would take him far beyond Wisconsin, including leadership roles at Navajo Technical University.

"Beginnings" is not primarily an institutional history. It is a memoir about the

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Nurse: Education helps with breastfeeding

While most U.S. infants receive some breast milk, only 27.9% are exclusively breastfed through six months, well below the Healthy People 2030 target of 42.4%, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Health experts say access to breastfeeding education and lactation support before and after childbirth can help families overcome challenges and continue breastfeeding for as long as they choose.

Bailey Trzebiatowski, a labor and delivery nurse and lactation counselor with Aspirus Health, said many breastfeeding questions begin during pregnancy and continue well after a baby is born. She said individualized education and lactation support can

help families address concerns ranging from latching difficulties and pumping to infant weight gain and feeding confidence.

“Aspirus provides breastfeeding support to moms during pregnancy and postpartum,”

Trzebiatowski said. “Every consult is customized. We cover latch, pre- and post-weighted feeds, and address any pumping or breastfeeding concerns. We support families both in the hospital and in our clinics.”

During hospital stays, lactation consultants are available to assist mothers with breastfeeding and address questions that may arise after delivery. After discharge, assistance is available through in-person visits, phone consultations and email support.

experiences, relationships, setbacks, discoveries and unexpected turns that shape a life, including the turmoil following the Menominee Warrior Society takeover of the Alexian Brothers’ Novitiate outside Gresham more than 50 years ago. Davis combines personal recollection with reflections on education, Native communities, his long-term association with Shawano, family, friendship and the meaning of a life spent trying to make a difference.

For readers familiar with Shawano and Menominee counties, the Wisconsin chapters offer something particularly personal: a look back at

people and communities during a period of significant social and educational change, seen through the eyes of someone who was there and whose life was permanently changed by the experience.

“Some of the most important beginnings in my life occurred in Wisconsin,” Davis said. “The people I met and the experiences I had in Menominee and Shawano counties changed the direction of my life. Looking back, I can see how those years became the foundation for much of what followed.”

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Harp of Cathedral Woods Lady finds a home

As I have mentioned in previous columns, I became hopelessly bewitched by the spirits of long-dead lumberjacks when I joined the staff of the Holt and Balcom Logging Camp in Lakewood. The camp was badly deteriorated, and subsequent efforts to restore it took seven long years.

With fundraisers and donations from numerous logging history enthusiasts, the oldest logging camp in America sitting on the exact site where it was built was saved, but it was a lot of financial help from direct descendants of the Holt family that enabled this long story to have a happy ending.

In the process, I became director of the camp. During our spring school tours for fourth graders studying Wisconsin history, I often visited the camp's unofficially affiliated site Cathedral Woods. Named one of the seven wonders of Wisconsin, this historic treasure is located just off Archibald Lake Road. Preservation of the Cathedral Woods began as a gift from lumber baron W.A. Holt to his

beloved wife Lucy Rumsey Holt, known as the "Cathedral Woods Lady." The U.S. Forest Service is tasked with maintaining the site.

Lucy Holt is a fascinating

figure. In her lifetime (1870-1935), wealthy men's wives usually raised the children, ran the household and spent their free time entertaining, churching and socializing with female friends. Most were like potted plants, pampered and petted but considered mostly ornamental.

Lucy was a notable exception. Though she lived in the city of Oconto all of her married life, she had a profound effect on

shaping and recording the history of northern Oconto County. For example, after seeing the results of "cut and run" logging, she was an early proponent of select cutting. Then, too, she was horrified by stories of injuries and deaths during the hazardous waterway transportation of saw logs. Therefore, Lucy supported her husband's expensive but risky decision to introduce the use of rail.

Gifted by her husband with both still and moving picture cameras, she captured priceless images of the logging industry in Oconto County.

Inspired by the thought of sharing her achievements, I decided to use role-play as an entertaining way to articulate her legacy. I found a costume: vintage hat, blouse, brooch, stockings and a full-length skirt. I was overjoyed to find a pair of shoes she may have worn. When I was dressed, I became Lucy from head to toe.

I began writing scripts, asking friends Beth Hartman, Cindy Jonet and Kathy Moerman to act alongside me as I channeled Lucy in dramatic presentations. We did

"Holts, Housewives and Hookers," "Love Letters from the Logging Camp," and "Lucy Loved Lakewood." We had lots of fun; the gals really dug into the experience. We attracted sizable audiences while raising money for the camp restoration.

In a totally unexpected blessing, I became an "adopted" member of the Holt clan, known simply as "The Family." Lucy's great-granddaughters, Marcia Wahoske and Sharon (Shan) Holt, invited Jon and me to visit Island Lodge, Lucy's summer home on Archibald Lake. Through them, we met many of her descendants who continue the tradition of family summer vacations on the Holt private island there.

I also became acquainted with grandson Peter DeWitt, who resided in Oconto. While visiting Peter many years ago, I was ushered into the grand living room to see his grandmother's most prized possession. There sat a beautiful harp. I got goosebumps. I knew Lucy had been a first-class harpist. Could it be? It was.

Last month, Shan, who lives in Philadelphia, met me for coffee at Northern Perks. As we chatted, she opened her phone to show me a photo. Lucy's harp. It's showing its age, but Shan said it's too expensive and somewhat risky to do a full restoration.

With the help of her

cousin, Professor of Archaeology and Religion Robin DeWitt Knauth, Shan said it would be gifted to the Oconto County Historical Society and put on display at the Beyer Home in Oconto. Robin shared some background.

"My father, Dr. Robert DeWitt, came into possession of Great-Grandmother Lucy Rumsey Holt's harp," she said. "I was only 9 when he died, and my mother took ownership. When she died in 2019, she bequeathed it to me. It was the only material inheritance from my father's family."

Robin DeWitt Knauth is thrilled with the result of the cousins' collaboration: "Honestly, the harp has never felt like my own possession. My sense was rather the weight of responsibility as caretaker of this important piece of family history. I am so happy that this bit of our heritage will be preserved."

The harp arrived safely back in Oconto in early August. With loving care, it was carefully positioned in the Beyer home parlor where it will dazzle future visitors. Just like heaven for Lucy, the harp is where it belongs, in its forever home.

Columnist welcomed to the family by some loons

Some bucket-list items involve distant destinations or once-in-a-lifetime adventures. Mine were much simpler: see a baby loon and photograph one.

You'd think that would have happened long ago. I grew up exploring Wisconsin's lakes and have spent the past 15 years at a Northwoods cabin where loons return each spring. Yet year after year, I heard their haunting calls without ever seeing a chick.

One misty morning changed everything. While quietly kayaking through a bed of water lilies, tucked in among the vegetation, I spotted a female loon sitting calmly on her nest, stretching her neck to gather nearby stems to reinforce it. As she leaned forward, I caught a glimpse of two olive-green eggs dotted with dark brown spots.

I stopped paddling. For several minutes, I simply watched. The lake was still except for the gentle sound of water against my kayak. I felt an overwhelming sense of joy and gratitude. Not wanting to disturb her, I quietly took a few photographs before slipping away.

For the rest of the weekend, I couldn't stop thinking about that nest. Every few hours I returned,

always keeping my distance. Research suggests loons can recognize individual people, so I hoped that by moving slowly, staying quiet and never lingering too long, she'd come to see me as just another harmless part of the landscape. She never seemed to mind having her picture taken — certainly less than many of my human friends.

When I returned the following weekend, my excitement turned to heartbreak. The nest was empty. The mother was gone. Later I learned a predator had taken the eggs. Nature can be breathtakingly beautiful and brutally unforgiving.

A few summers later, rumors spread around the lake that the

resident loons had successfully hatched a chick. I drove to the cabin as quickly as I could. Within minutes of launching my kayak, I found them. There they were — mom, dad and a tiny ball of charcoal-gray fluff floating between them.

Almost instinctively, I lifted my camera and captured my first photograph of a baby loon. My bucket list was complete, but the accomplishment barely crossed my mind. I was captivated by the tiny life before me.

Throughout the summer, each weekend brought new changes. I watched the chick become more confident, more curious and more independent. Every sighting felt like a gift. By autumn, the chick had grown nearly as large as his parents. His fluffy down gave way to sleek juvenile feathers.

Once the parents departed on their annual migration south, I knew it wouldn't be long before he left as well. Because young loons don't usually return to their northern breeding grounds for several years, I knew our time together was coming to an end. I wished him a safe journey. Maybe, someday, he would return to these waters.

This summer brought another emotional chapter. The resident loon pair hatched two chicks, but before I could see them, one fell prey to an eagle. The loss was a reminder of how fragile life is in the wild. Week after week, as soon as I arrived at the cabin, I searched the lake for the surviving chick, relieved each time I found him still swimming beside his parents.

Loons are devoted parents. I often watched them scan constantly for danger, pulling their chick beneath a protective wing whenever they sensed a threat. They patiently delivered tiny fish, one after another, until he was ready to learn on his own. At first, the baby simply peered beneath the surface, watching the adults, but before long, he was catching fish himself.

Like any youngster, the chick provided plenty of entertainment. On one occasion, he surfaced much farther away than his mother expected, sending her

racing across the lake faster than I thought possible. Other times, he popped up directly beside his father, who seemed mildly irritated by the surprise.

Today, the surviving chick is in an awkward adolescent stage, with patches of fluffy down still clinging to his neck while sleek juvenile feathers cover the rest of his body. Before long, he, too, will begin his journey to wintering grounds along the Gulf or Atlantic coasts.

Watching these loons has reminded me that nature offers no guarantees. Every successful nest, every surviving chick and every migration completed is something of a miracle. Those two empty boxes on my bucket list have finally been checked.

Looking back, the photograph was never the real prize. The true reward was being welcomed, however briefly, into the lives of one loon family. Watching a tiny chick grow into a young bird ready to begin his own journey has become one of the greatest wildlife experiences of my life and a reminder that some of nature's greatest gifts are worth waiting for.

Capture beauty of your garden with flower art

Transfer the beauty of favorite flowers onto paper or fabric to create works of art, greeting cards and gifts for family and friends. Pounding flowers is a fun and easy way gardeners of all ages can preserve the beauty of garden flowers.

Use watercolor or other rough surface paper when pounding on paper. Purchase ready to dye or prepared for dying fabric or prepare the fabric yourself. Supplies and directions can be found at most craft stores.

Prepare the space before pounding flowers onto paper or fabric. Use a large cutting board or piece of wood to protect the furniture below. Consider moving the project outside onto the sidewalk or other surface that can't be damaged by the pounding.

Cover the work surface with wax paper and secure it in place with masking tape to prevent the flower color from soaking

through onto the cutting board. Cut the fabric to size and secure it or the paper to the board with masking tape.

Take a walk through the garden and gather a few favorite flowers and leaves. Look for flowers with thin brightly colored petals and leaves for the easiest and best results. Consider starting with rose, daisy, geranium, petunia and pansy petals although any flowers and leaves can work. Remove or reduce the size of the large center of coneflowers, black-eyed Susans

and similar blooms so they lay flat on the fabric, or remove the petals, discard the center and arrange as desired.

Remove stems, sepals, or other plant parts you do not want to transfer. Place the desired parts face down on the paper or fabric and arrange as desired.

Once the design is set, cover it with several layers of paper towel or another sheet of watercolor paper. Tape the leaves and petals in place on fabric to help reduce the risk of the petals moving during the pounding process.

Gently tap the leaves and flowers using the flat side of a hammer. Next, evenly hammer from one side of the design to the other, making sure to hit every part of each plant.

Once the color is transferred, lift the paper covering and remove the crushed flowers and leaves from the paper along with the tape from the fabric. Allow the design to dry

and carefully brush off any remaining plant pieces.

Set the design on fabric using an iron set to the hottest setting without steam. This sets the colors but will not make it washable. Preserve the bright colors of works of art on paper with a UV protective acrylic spray. Be sure to read and follow label directions and apply in a well-ventilated area.

Pounding flowers is a simple way to transfer a plant's natural dye onto paper or fabric. Plan to get together with family and friends to create works of art, greeting cards and more. For more gardening projects, visit www.melindamyers.com.

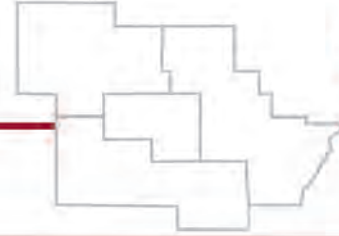
